



DISC GOLF AT THE GROVE A GREAT OUTDOOR ACTIVITY FOR EVERYONE

Many people have inquired about the new 18 Hole Disc Golf Course that is being constructed on the back nine of the golf course. The Grove is excited to bring this amazing sport to the community of Loch Rane & OPCC.

The sport is one of the fastest growing family sports in our country. With over 7,500 certified courses across the nation, the state of Florida now contributes 275 of them and is growing at a record pace.

In North Florida we currently have 13 courses and The Grove will be #14. In 2023 alone, there were over 30,000 combined rounds of disc golf played at two of the local courses that tracked it.

Disc golf is a fantastic sport that combines the thrill of traditional golf with the accessibility and simplicity of frisbee. Whether you're a seasoned player or a beginner, disc golf offers endless fun and excitement for people of all ages.

"What Is It Exactly"?

Disc golf, also known as Frisbee golf, is a game played similarly to traditional golf. Instead of using clubs and golf balls, players use specially designed flying discs to complete each hole. The objective is to throw the disc into a basket or target in as few throws as possible. Just like in golf, the player with the lowest score at the end of the course wins. Disc golf courses are typically set in parks or natural areas, providing a scenic and refreshing backdrop for a family outing.

Inclusive and Beginner-Friendly

Disc golf is a sport that can be enjoyed by everyone, regardless of age or skill level. Whether you're a young child, a teenager, a parent, or a grandparent, disc golf offers an inclusive and beginner-

OPCCOA/LRIA Steering Committee Report

The meeting was called to order at 5:57 pm by Larry Warren sitting in for Chairman, Daniel Butler. There was a quorum of members present. The March 2024 Minutes were unanimously approved subject to making a change in the Roads Committee report. The March 2024 Financial report was also unanimously approved.

Committee Reports

The Joint Landscape Committee provided estimates from Southern Tree Experts for removal of 2 dying oak trees near the gate house in the amount of \$2,200 and for removal of dead lead from an oak tree in the last island before the wing wall in the amount of \$500. Both estimates were approved. It was reported that the irrigation maps should be completed soon. There was no report from the Roads Committee. They will be asked to provide an update on the brick wall at the 4-way stop.

Old Business

Issues with CCSO Billing

Due to the way CCSO charges and payments are made there has been a significant increase in the amount of time Lifestyles Property Services spends on the shared expense bookkeeping. They have been doing weekly timesheets with weekly paychecks. There are about 9-10 officers receiving checks. We have been notified that Lifestyles will be increasing their monthly fee for the shared expense accounting by \$350/month and there will be an additional charge for doing the 1099 forms for these officers at the end of the year. Should we choose not to stay with CCSO and return to Giddens for the nightly patrol, they will provide one officer to do one complete drive through behind the gate between 11 p.m. and 2 a.m. for a charge of \$50/night.

No decision was made by the Steering Committee. This topic will have to be discussed by both Boards.

Gatehouse Roof Replacement

Universal Roof & Contracting completed the roof replacement project on April 15, 2024 and the Building Department made its final inspection and approved the project. There was an extra cost for the additional plywood and wood trim needed in the amount of \$482.00. Total cost for the project was \$10,887.41. There will also be an additional cost to paint the trim that was installed and to repair and paint some trim that was damaged by an incoming truck.

New Business

Creation of a Scope of Work Handbook for the Gate Staff

Giddens is the process of putting together a handbook using data supplied by us as well as material they created. They are having a meeting with us via phone or google on Tuesday, April 23 at 2 p.m. to review the work done so far.

The next meeting will be May 16, 2024 at 6 p.m.

OPCC Board of Directors Meeting

The main focus of our monthly meetings continues to be the review/update of the community's covenants. While this meeting review dealt with Article VI, each meeting is open for discussion on any past article. Your review and input are critical to preparing an enforceable set of rules for OPCC. Our hope is that the monthly meetings will enable us to provide a completed document that is ready for community-wide review at an open meeting within the next few months. The existing document is way past needing updating, with many references to the original developer and outdated laws.

Each month, I include a reference to ARC rules to hopefully avoid unnecessary heartburn for our residents. Any exterior work must go through the ARC for approval, or you risk the potential for added expenses. This month had the following ARC approvals: 1 fence, 2 paint projects, 1 roof replacement, 3 paver projects, 2 tree removals, 1 exterior modification (front door) and 1 patio screen enclosure.

Mulch and new flower plantings are scheduled when plants are available.

There is a committee in place that will be discussing options for revenue enhancements that will ease the need for special assessments. Mark Blakewood is the chairman, and the committee will be working on suggestions.

Our pools are open and ready for use. Please remember to clean up any mess generated and put any moved furniture back where it was originally placed. And NO GLASS containers of any type are allowed inside the cabana. It would be helpful when you are having a group gathering at the cabana that you would clean up the tables and take the garbage from the event home with you.

We hope to have an update on The Grove next month, probably by one of the principal owners.

There has been considerable work done at the gatehouse with more to come.

Loch Rane Board of Directors Meeting

The April 2024 meeting of the Loch Rane Board of Directors was held on 4/23 and was sparsely attended by residents.

2024 Special Assessment

Please be on the lookout for the Special Assessment bill for 2024 as it should be arriving in mailboxes soon. The first installment of \$500 is due May 1 with a 30-day grace period. These funds go directly to repairing our aging storm drains and repaving our roads!

Street Sign/Mailbox Pressure Washing

We are soliciting bids to have all the mailbox areas and street signs pressure washed as they are looking a bit grimy! (Note: we also plan to seek bids for cleaning the tennis courts as well!)

2024 Infrastructure Repairs

- We are still obtaining bids on the repair work and repaving on Devonshire.
- We approved a bid of \$6,400 to inspect and clean out additional storm drains within the community to allow us to further prioritize which ones to reline later this year.
- Connelly and Wicker have completed their proposal for the redesign of the 5a retention pond (behind Cameron) and have submitted that to SJWMD for approval.

Tennis Court Area Weeds

The vendor who maintains the common areas has been made aware of the weed situation at the tennis courts and will address/rectify.

Fine Committee

We have been made aware of the new state laws that are changing regarding fines within HOAs and that this will require a mandatory monthly meeting of a committee of homeowners (that are not board members) to review fine appeals. Previously this committee only met when a homeowner requested a hearing. Due to this change we will need additional homeowners to volunteer to serve on this committee in order to continue to levy fines for violations.

(Note: Homeowners are not required to levy fines, but instead are there to hear appeals from other homeowners about fines levied by the BOD. This meeting is also able to be held virtually via zoom vs in person)



As summer approaches, many of us are compiling a list of "summer reads" - those books we've been waiting to read while at the beach, or the mountains or simply the backyard! We know how important reading is to our overall well-being. Luckily, others in our community share the value of reading and are committed to spreading this joy with children by collaborating with *Dolly Parton's Imagination Library*. (DPIL) As noted on the DPIL website www.imaginationlibrary.com: "Dolly Parton's Imagination Library is dedicated to inspiring a love of reading by gifting books free of charge to children from birth to age five, through funding shared by Dolly Parton and local community partners in the United States, Canada, United Kingdom, Australia and Republic of Ireland. Inspired by her father's inability to read and write, Dolly started her Imagination Library in 1995 for the children within her home county. Today, her program spans five countries and gifts over 2 million free books each month to children around the world."

Locally, a professional and social organization for women educators, Beta Mu Chapter of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International (DKG) partners with the Clay Education Foundation to support this program and share the importance of literacy and its impact on the success of young children as they prepare for school. This early childhood literacy program mails free, age-appropriate books each month to children from birth until age 5, no matter their family's income. Although the books are free to the families, there is a cost involved that requires donations and fundraising from the community to stay afloat. While the Imagination Library negotiates wholesale pricing for the books, the Local Affiliates and Partners are responsible for securing funds to cover that cost plus shipping, making the books free to the child.



Thank you for reaching out to us for the latest news about the Grove and all the exciting things we are currently working on. We realize that our number one priority is to get the Clubhouse open and operational for the community to enjoy.

We are currently waiting on the final architectural plans to be approved before we start the interior conversions of

the Clubhouse. We anticipate having the final plans for this within the next few weeks.

You will notice that we have been actively replacing wood around the clubhouse as well as the cart barn, that is soon being converted into a 6,000 sq. ft fitness center for members of the Grove.

We have also begun the process of cleaning up the neglected landscaping around the Clubhouse. You will see that we have removed many of the bad trees already and trimmed back others. The front of the clubhouse will be receiving a landscape makeover, but the back of the

building will be a much larger renovation. This area was cleverly designed with beautiful landscape features, coupled with first class hardscape concepts to offer large parties an amazing outdoor space to celebrate.

We have completely removed the old green maintenance barn to make room for a smaller maintenance facility and additional parking for the pickle-ball members. This area is considered a construction zone and should be avoided.

The pickle ball facility has added Bocce Ball and Corn Hole to bolster the activities that will be offered. Both are great attractions for the members of the Grove to enjoy. Construction on the courts is expected to begin sometime in the month of May.

The revival of the Driving Range is on the master plan but we don't have a firm date to begin construction activities there.

Lastly, the little bridge behind the club has now been completely repaired, but for safety purposes we would like to ask the community to please refrain from crossing it until we have completed the entire project at the Club.

I hope this gives you a glimpse into our immediate plans. We look forward to providing you with future updates with additional progress.


