

# Blue Devils look will have fans seeing double

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Clay High football coach Kyle Kennard will have to be a bit more careful when he asks for certain players to go into his games as the Blue Devils will have two sets of twins on their roster: the Swilley brothers; Dominic and Darius, and the Roberts brothers; Javaris and Lavaris.

"I think we are the first school to have two sets of twins on the team," said Kennard, who enters the 2024 season after a four-win. six-season loss that started with four wins and a season-opening loss to rival Fleming Island, then ended with five losses. "All four boys are going to be impact players for us with all four very similar type

athletes on the field. Should be interesting."

As for transforming his 4-6 team into the annual contention teams of Clay High football lore, Kennard has steadily rebuilt the Blue Devils brand up from the Hoekstra-era powerhouses to, what he deems, pretty close to what the Blue Devil fans have come to expect.

Blue Devils double trouble: Twin brothers Lavaris and Javaris Roberts and Dominic and Darius Swilley.





"We want to put the type of team and program that Clay High has been noted for over the last decade or so," said Kennard, who took over in 2020 off a 1-9 season under then-coach John Stilianou who followed the decade reign of now-Bolles coaches Joshua Hoekstra and Matt Toblin.

Kennard opened with a 10-2 season in 2020 with a playoff run to Ocala Vanguard then a 7-3 slate that featured a dramatic 21-14 win over Fleming Island and an equally dramatic 23-21 win over Middleburg as highlights of the season, but the Blue Devils have slowed down in recent years as Kennard has had to rebuild his roster the last two seasons.

"I think we have the right players in the right places this year after missing a piece or two the past two years," said Kennard. "I'm excited, the team is excited and the Blue Devil fans, I think, are going to get a good product on the field. This is a great town to play football in."

Kennard's fervor on the field is amplified by his optimism coming from his players emulating his enthusiasm for the game with the Swilley brothers to be dominant on defense; one of the defensive line, one in the secondary and the Javaris Roberts slated to be one of the top tacklers on the squad

after 73 stops last year put his reputation in the top tier box in the county.

"He came on big last year and will be one of the best linebackers in the county," said Kennard. "He's bigger, stronger, faster and will have a good front on the line in front of him. He's our Jack Lambert."

That "front in front of him" will feature the 1-2 punch of seniors Omar Goosby and Aaron Stacy, both very athletic, but not so big, linemen who both feature high-octane engines.

"Those two are going to be a big factor in our defense right from the snap with Stacy a beast because, though a bit smaller on the line, a wrestler-strong body with great footspeed and agility," said Kennard, noting 41 tackles, three tackles for losses. "Those big guys up front will have a hard time finding him at the snap because he's so quick."

For Goosby, slightly bigger, but equally agile, the defensive end position has produced a history of great Blue Devils.

"I like our combination with me and Aaron side by side," said Goosby. "We are both fast and can chase down people. We know our linebackers; Javaris and Kade have our back. We 2003

On the outside, Kennard has a twin combination with the Swilley brothers.

"The Swilley brothers will be our defensive ends with Goosby and Stacy inside," said Kennard. "Omar is our guy. Javaris Roberts at linebacker is probably the best defender out there. Aaron is an undersized guy but he has an engine."

At the linebackers, Roberts is built for the position; large, strong and fast, evidenced by an 80-yard breakaway score in a recent Clay intrasquad scrimmage. A new face next to Roberts will be Kade Williamson, a sophomore, but another multiple athlete.

On the edges, Kennard will have wrestler Vonte Burke as the nickel back.

"The way the game is played nowadays, you got to have athletes that can move," said Kennard.

In the secondary, Lavaris

Roberts is in one corner with Mikeise Battle a new face on the other side with Gavin Bailey also getting reps.

"J'vion Cobbert is another great athlete that can go both sides and he'll be at safety," said Kennard. "Depending on the quarterback situation, both Landons can help out in the secondary or Landon Martin likes linebacker."

Chadwick has been at multiple positions on both sides and still will be a guy that can be installed on the field.


"He just wants to play," said Kennard. "He's very athletic."

At kicker, Ethan Bellemare had two game-winners last year; against Orange Park and Tocoi Creek, with solid kickoffs all season

On offense, with three quarterbacks vying for that spot; senior Merrick Rapoza, last year's starter, with Landon Martin and Landon Chadwick both taking reps over the summer with Rapoza playing summer baseball.

"We had Merrick for two days before the Spring game, but he's also an all-star baseball guy," said Kennard. "Right now, it's just a good competitive spot that we will make some kind of decision down the line. Baseball went to the region finals last year with him."

Running the ball, the Roberts brothers are slated to be ball carriers, with Antonio Thomas

being an any-position player with a great skill set.

"That position will be by committee; we got Oliver Pierre, Antonio, Vonte can run, Chadwick or Martin can go there," said Kennard. "Javaris definitely will tote between the tackles and we'll get the other guys on the perimeter."

Thomas looks to be the next great playmaker for Clay in the make of guys like Bilal Ally, Wes Weeks and Jaylan Jenkins.

"I watched those guys play when I was in junior high," said Thomas. "I worked to get myself ready to be that kind of player. They were great because they came to work every single day."

"Daylen was a junior varsity guy, but he learned a lot, lifted every day and was just here every day," said Kennard.

On the offensive line, the big names are Eli Oscoa, Josh Hetz and Blake Warren who come in as the main trio with Dashon Douglas with Touni Sauod as the new names. "I like our offensive line; we've been together for three, four years and have developed that trust of my brother," said Oscoa. "We like to think we can move any defensive line with hard-hitting, fast-blocking schemes." Kicking for Clay will be Ethan Bellemare, who came in with two game-winners last year; Orange Park and Tocoi Creek, and was


a strong kickoff guy leaving Clay's opponents starting at the 20 most times.



"Our entire offense is filled with quality players in every position," said Broughton. "Our mentality is to get the ball to as many different hands as possible to keep defenses guessing."

Broughton accounted for 29 touchdowns running and passing and 3,300 yards of total offense in 2023.





hir Jackson. While Broughton will often run the ball himself, Fleming Island will rely on the 210-pound Jackson, who ran for 500 yards and seven touchdowns last year, to share the load and to convert short yardage situations.





"We feel like we have the right people in position to make offense exciting," said Jackson.

Speedster wideout Trace Burney emerged last season as Broughton's favorite receiving target, and the 5'7" jitterbug returns this season to lead the receiving corps.

Burney, who holds offers from three Division I schools, will be a multi-position weapon on offense.

Burney has been on the receiving end of many of Broughton's long passes downfield and even riddled secondaries in a recent 7 v 7 passing scrimmage but took a more emotional response to play off Broughton's abilities.

"I look at like we've been together for a long time and this is our final season together," said Burney. "I just want to cherish the moments we make from here on out."

Burney will also be returning kickoffs with Tacori Allen and Sebastian Cruz returning punts.

Oliver Picchot, a sophomore that coaches expect to have a breakout season, and Tristan Stephenson, who played defensive back last year, will man the other receiver spots.

Cohen Cioffi, a junior, entertaining five Division I offers, will make an impact from his tight end position. Cioffi, still growing at 6'2", 225 pounds, will also start at defensive end.

On the young offensive line that loses All-State tackle Braden Cunningham to Florida Atlantic University, the guards will be junior Easton Isbel, who can bench press 300 pounds, and Kevin Reyes, a two-time state weightlifting champion and a defending regional wrestling champion.

The Golden Eagles plan to run the ball up the middle often,

they need strength in the interior. Thus, Steven Franklin, a 6'4', 290-pound senior who played left tackle last year, will move to center. Incoming freshman Gavin Holt (6'2", 220") will man one tackle position while sophomore Griffin Vallerston has the inside track on the other side of the line. Freshman Sawyer Peterson and Logan Kirkland will be the top backups if they do not win a starting job.

While the offense may experience a few growing pains with Franklin's position change and the young tackles, the Fleming Island defense on paper is above average at all three levels. The Golden Eagles intend to use four down linemen, two linebackers and five defensive backs in their base package.

One factor that gives Fleming Island a decided defensive advantage is the addition to the coaching staff of coach Mark Michaels.

"Definitely, coach Michaels has brought a whole new look to our game and that just makes us better," said Van Hof. "We've been lifting and working out together and it's a good bond."

The line will consist of Cioffi moving to end from the line-backer position he played last year, and Reyes on one side, and returning starters Nate Van Hof and Jarius Rodgers on the other. Van Hof was very productive last year, while Rodgers is a 6'5", 210-pound junior who runs a 4.6 40-yard dash. Rodgers was a state qualifier in the high jump and 110-meter hurdles last spring and has offers from Notre Dame and Florida State.

"We are coming off a good defensive year last year and look to be even better this year," said Van Hof. "We have coach Michaels and we're playing as a pretty tight unit."


Another young player looking good is sophomore Braden Street, whose quick development led to the decision to move Cioffi from linebacker to defensive end. Street will be paired at linebacker with A.J. Witt, an Army commitment, who is a smart tactician known for his intelligence and physicality. David Smith is the fourth piece of the linebacker puzzle.

"Having those guys in front us; Nate, Cohen and Jarius, makes our job a little easier because they will clog the lanes and force guys around them," said Smith. "That's where Sebastian and I will meet them. It's an awesome situation."

Witt jokingly called Cioffi his twin brother as both have developed similar striking patterns and thought processes.

"We might look different, but you can say we are twins," said Witt. "We are similar in build and movements and we are going to make some noise out there."

The secondary will be extremely green but very athletic. Sophomore Tacori Allen, who started at safety last year, will move to cornerback while junior

# Playoffs, bragging rights in new districts

FLEMING ISLAND - Well, Well, Well, football just got a little more interesting for the upcoming 2024 season as the FHSAA, in their presiding wisdom, has returned to the Class 1A, Class 2A, etc. system of classifications with new alignments set up that will make Clay County football very interesting.

### No Cupcakes

"The whole state of Florida is good football," said Middleburg coach Ryan Wolfe. "That's just how Florida is, every district is going to have a few juggernauts. Last year, we had Columbia. There are no cupcakes."

With the new alignments, Clay County teams will stay closer to home with trips last year to Titusville (FIHS), Melbourne (OPHS), and Daytona Beach's Taylor-Pierson (KHHS) not on the schedules in 2024. Middleburg takes a ride to North Marion at the end of their season and Oakleaf will visit Hawthorne and Ridgeview takes a long drive to West Nassau as the furthest trips on the schedules.

### Rivalry Games

"It's good for our football because our rivalry games will all be good games," said Orange Park coach Marcus Wimberly, who lived through the District of Doom (FIHS, OHS, Bartram Trail, Buchholz and Creekside). "It's still not a cakewalk because not only playoff points at stake, but county bragging rights."

In one of the more strategic "rivalry" moves for the fall, district 3-5A will have Fleming Island, Orange Park and Mid-

dleburg all in one package with Beachside and Ponte Vedra district foes.

Ponte Vedra, being the more recent consistent playoff team of the five with deep runs in Classes 5A, 6A and 7A back during the Matt Toblin days of head coaching in 2015 up to 2020; seasons of 8-3, 13-1, 7-5 and 8-3, when Toblin left for Bolles.

Last year, Ponte Vedra lost their season opener, but ran the table to the playoffs with a seven game streak that ended with two losses to Nease and Creekside and a region playoff loss to Buchholz: the Bobcats the Class 4S state runnerup last year to Lakeland by a 21-20 score. Buchholz now Class 6A; District 3-6A with Bartram Trail, Nease and Tocoi Creek thus eliminating the once-District of Doom (3-4S) that featured Buchholz, Bartram Trail, Creekside, Fleming Island and Oakleaf.

## District of Doom

Locally, Middleburg enters as the lone playoff team of the District 3-5A group with both Oakleaf and Fleming Island unable to thwart the District of Doom damages last year. Orange Park missed a few key plays in their season to not make the playoffs and Fleming Island could not catch the frontrunners, but dealt with new coaches, new scheme and being in the dreaded District of Doom.

## Pot Stirring

For 2024, a little pot stirring in district 3-5A is likely to happen. One, Middleburg's notoriously treacherous schedule under Coach Ryan Wolfe's last two years offered just a 5-5 won lost record with three losses out of the box to three state contenders; Hawthorne, unbeaten Class 1A champion; Bradford, Class 4A runnerup, and Ponte Vedra.

Wolfe survived the opening salvo of games, but Orange Park coach Marcus Wimberly gave a glimpse of Uh!Oh! with an upset win in game nine that was just shy of a playoff upset.

# Resurrecting the pounding run game

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS - Back in the not-so-distant past, the Keystone Heights High football team was noted for one thing.

"We could just run the ball all night," said former coach and still Athletic Director Chuck Dickinson, who orchestrated a near curtain call 10-2 season with two playoff games; one a 50-0 bruising, and had, arguably, one of the more unstoppable ground games in all of Florida with three stallions; Dalton Hollingsworth, Tyler Jen-

kins and Logan Williams, who accumulated like 5,000 yards of rushing with an astounding 58 touchdowns. "We only threw the ball on the goal line to score touchdowns; 18 of 41 for the season with five touchdowns to our two tight ends; Bryar Schenk and Caleb Moncrief with one to Logan."After a few tough seasons a product of a huge graduation class from the 9-1 team, fast forward to 2024, with his assistant coach on the sideline at the time; Steve Reynolds, taking over two seasons later, the Indians, with what looks like a carbon copy of that iconic Keystone Heights team have the blueprint for 2024; big offensive linemen, a smart quarterback, a great batch of wide receivers, two bulldog running backs and bunch of flying missiles on defense.

"We're very excited about this season after a very productive spring and summer season," said Reynolds. "We have a very competitive schedule opening with Interlachen, we got Bradford as always with Newberry, Palatka and Union County always tough."

One additional piece of the puzzle is an expanded passing game under the leadership of a Patrick Swayze (Point Break) looking surfer bad-ass quarter-back named Baylor Ford and a quarterback coach who stepped away from his mentee for about

a week before returning to Keystone Heights to guide his young protege to raising the Indians lore back up to country-rugged status.

"I felt bad about leaving Keystone Heights (to go to Middleburg High) and decided that I wanted to come back and at least get a chance to help Baylor be the best quarterback in Clay County," said Ken Mudge, himself an iconic slinger for Orange Park High in the Danny Green era for the Raiders. "He has all the tools physically and the best of athletes around willing to follow him. Coach Reynolds has given me some good direction to use the tradition of Keystone Heights tough football and add the passing game to it."

Reynolds was glad Mudge returned to Keystone Heights.

"I was glad he came back," said Reynolds. "He has a great rapport with kids, and he and I were getting in sync with the offensive game plan. He wants to be a head coach someday and he is almost an assistant head coach with me. He called most of the offensive game plan last year."

In 2023, Ford and his compadres opened up a little shocked with two losses right out of the gate; 35-0 and 49-26, before Reynolds and Mudge tweaked the strategy a little going from 49 yards passing and 118 yards passing in those fateful games to blowout wins in a row; 49-0 and 46-8, with Ford more able at getting the ball downfield quicker with games of 161, 193 and 136 following

to finish with three wins and a playoff opener loss to Yulee.

"He's learning more and more and developing a good quarterback intellect to read and react to defenses and get the ball to the right guy," said Mudge, as summer passing drills against the likes of Fleming Island and Clay, as a direct challenge of Reynolds to his team to raise their game. "His receivers will do whatever it takes to get their hands on the ball and they all were making each other look good against some of the best athletes from Fleming Island and Clay."

With Ford accumulating 1,092 yards last year with 13 touchdowns, Keystone Heights in 2024 will have a new look as Ford's favorite targets; Andru Siemer and Wyatt Van Zantt have graduated.

For Reynolds, who had his history under the lights of Bradford County and Oakleaf with head coach Derek Chipoletti, the mix of passing and running is something he's not hesitant to look forward to.

"I can see us going to move to the balance of an offensive attack," said Reynolds. "Baylor has learned more and more the past two years from coach Mudge and we have pass catchers; Tyler Sapp, Jackson Parmeter, and Tallon Campbell, all willing to go horizontal to get to passes. They will all run through a wall for Baylor."

up quarterback and safety, and Tanner Campbell who was impressive in the Indians' spring games against Ridgeview and Interlachen in May.

"Baylor is the kind of quarterback that can get through his reads quickly and get to the guy that is open and can keep the ball moving," said Campbell. "It makes our job a little easier because if we get open, he will

find us."

Up front, where the self-nicknamed "Tractor Boys" will be, is a very big, powerful and very motivated batch of boys that look to follow the footsteps of guys like Mason Dicks and Luke Snider, two behemoths for Dickinson.

For 2024, the biggest guy will be sophomore center Bryce Daniels, 6'-4", 305 pounds, with

"They could be the best five-man crew ever at Keystone Heights, if not in the state," said coach Gregory Daniels, who has escorted son Bryce to a variety of college campuses with some of the Tractor Boys coming along to get the very best look at big-time college blocking.

Reynolds says Daniels' trips around the southeastern college football campuses have been a learning experience for him to better his footwork and his movement.

"Remember, he's only a sophomore and got his bruises last year as a freshman," said Reynolds. "What he learned from all those college visits, he can pass on to his guys next to him and they all get better."

The OL crew has had their trial by fire the past few years with the Indians having tough schedules year in and year out with teams like Bradford County (14-1), Newberry (9-3), Union County (8-4) and Dixie County (7-4) on the docket as Reynolds slowly nurtured the intensity of Keystone Heights' run game into the big boys up front.

"The strength of this team is our offensive line for sure," said Reynolds. "Our backfield has good size to hit; Zane Leger, Damian Dunlap and Colton Hollingsworth carrying the ball. We are very similar to that 2021 team."

Put all that together into a tight offensive package and add two running backs not hesitant to lower their helmets and bash tacklers; Zane Leger and Colton Hollingsworth (sound familiar?) and Reynolds and Mudge, with first down plays looking like a plus five every time behind that offensive line and Leger, 6'-0", 210 pounds, more than likely the first handoff, second downs could very well be in the second and three, second and four

range.

"Zane is the prototype
Keystone Heights running back;
big strong, tough, but Colton,
Dalton's brother, is a tough kid to
get on the ground," said Reynolds. "Colton is smaller and can
hide behind the big offensive
guys and find openings."


On defense, Reynolds sees Herman, 23 tackles, returning to his spot at defensive tackle where he was a leader for last year's rugged defense.

"He's a little bigger than Trey Jeffries who was with him









last year, but he's very football smart," said Reynolds. "All those guys on the offensive line will rotate in on the defensive line depending on the situation with Bryce probably getting in on third and shorts, fourth and shorts." Reynolds knows that durability is part of the process of Keystone Heights football and, with most of his guys a part of the Indians state-ranked boys weightlifting team, Reynolds will be hoping for more depth as a big help. "They have been working hard and lifting all summer knowing that an injury to any of our guys could be critical," said Reynolds. "We don't have 35-40 guys on our roster."

Linebackers are familiar with Kyle Perkins and Layton Wright both returners with Leger on one of the edges.

"Again, if we are holding on to the ball on offense with Zane (22 tackles) and Colton running and eating the clock, we should be okay," said Reynolds. "A quick turnover could hurt our guys who are going both ways."

In the secondary, Reynolds will have Parmeter, two interceptions, and Hollingsworth will return as probable safety with Hollingsworth the enforcer in the backfield.

"Since his brother graduated, Colton has been our best tackler out there (33 tackles) and he's only half his size," said Reynolds. "Damien Dunlap is also one of our top guys on defense." Reynolds had one of the best punters last year in graduate Connor Guy with Tyler Sapp taking over in 2024.

In the district schematic, Reynolds acknowledged the new team; Newberry, is a tough opponent with Santa Fe and Union County top opponents beyond the annual Bradford County rivalry game.

"Chiefland is another one of those small schools that puts out tough football teams," said Reynolds. "We'll prepare each week as hard as anyone, I know that."










then finish with Fleming Island; 3-7, but potentially much improved, and North Marion, a highly touted program in the past season, but still 1-9 last year.







In the backfield, Wolfe has some choices to take guys like senior Jaden Boyd, a secondary athlete with a good skill set and great football instincts, but tabbed to be free safety over the summer. Boyd and graduate Errick Fryer were great team leaders last year and should continue with Sulph to possi-

bly be Boyd's wingman in the secondary and possibly Dusty Silcox as a safety; and possibly Travis Pinkard, both solid athletes who don't mind sticking their helmet in front of bigger ball carriers.

As of August, Wolfe had Sulph getting the backfield as his main running back with a handful of guys possibly joining him

"We have to see who steps up as the fall part of the season progresses," said Wolfe.

One guy who seems to be the Swiss Army Knife candidate is Wing Back, tight end maybe Mason Zwilling, last year's plug-in guy at quarterback and multiple offensive slots catching passes. Zwilling has embraced his versatility on the field and could be a surprise player for Wolfe.

"Mason can be an H-Back, fullback kind of guy for us," said Wolfe. "He can block, made some nice catches and runs over the summer for us, and is

just ready to play anywhere on the field."

Up front, big Charles Little is the menace in the trenches as the biggest guy and sporting a state weightlifting ticket from last year.

With Little, will be junior Trent Pavlus at left tackle, senior Noah Montoro at left guard, senior Travis Antienowics at center, Little at right guard, and junior Jaykeyvious Carter at right tackle; all 300-plus pound movers and shakers.

"We've been just working out hard in the weight room, eating right, and making ourselves ready for the trenches," said Little, one of a handful of 300-pound plus mammoths on the offensive line under the direction of former Fleming Island High standout Nate Chase,

who played at Southeastern University. "We want to be able to move the entire line as a unit. We are pretty athletic and if we get our guy outside the tackle, we want to lead the way. Iron sharpens Iron; we come to work every day."

Little liked that his quarterback, Stewart, is a side-to-side pocket guy with his options opening up as he moves out of the traditional pocket.

"Over the summer, we have learned about his tendencies and we are on the same page knowing that if we keep on our feet and head on a swivel, we can get downfield to protect him for extra yards," said Little.

One spot the Wolfe will be filling a big void is linebacker Austin "Cowboy" Cruce is gone with his nearly 100 tackles all four years. Cruce's menacing nonstop seek-and-destroy attitude is one part of the Bronco defense that will be inherited by a new face and it may come from a guy a little bigger, but a

lot closer to the point of attack in nose tackle BJ Carter. Carter, a monster defensive end with wingman Tucker Cody on the opposite side last year, has gotten bigger, faster, and stronger and carries a lot of Power 5 college interest for his talents.

"He's going to dominate, pretty simple," said Wolfe. "He and Tucker were a great duo last year and we have him in the middle this year so he can go either way. Because we have a three-man front, we will be mixing and matching them for situations."

Carter said the move gives him more space to operate which makes a strong side or weak side kind of a moot point for opposing offenses.

"Being in the middle is a different feel, but I'm working through the small adjustments so I can be effective across the whole field," said Carter, 49 tackles, 5 TFLs, and 10 quarterback hurries as a defensive end. "From the middle, I can

attack both sides of the offenses which should get me more tackles. I think my strength will get me through the double teams that offenses will try on me."

Junior Gabe Baker is a second third of the equation with junior Brad Darnold the third third. Defensive coordinator Benjamin Traywick sees the best of both worlds in his defense.

"We have B.J. in the middle, we have a great secondary with Boyd and Sulph and we have a few guys that will be effective as our linebackers; Hanifen and Mooningham with Danny Raines out there," said Traywick. "They will make some noise. I think Austin Cruce put the standard of linebacker on our team and these guys know what is expected; energy, pursuit, and 11 hats to the ball."

Behind the defensive line. Wolfe will have wrestler Daniel Raines, a junior, as one middleman, and junior Kadin Hanifen next to Raines.

On the perimeter, Angel

Valdez and Keensdee Roseme. both juniors. "One thing we do is make sure our junior varsity guys are practicing as hard as the varsity," said Wolfe. "We don't anticipate a drop off in our play because our JV teams have been pretty good the past three years. We just plug a guy in and the execution and expectation are the same."

In the secondary, Floyd Reed and Joel Lowe will man the corners with both showing good reaction and skill in summer passing sessions with Sulph in a safety slot with Boyd, Sulph, and Silcox floating around in centerfield as well.

"Me and Jaden have been working in the weight room to get bigger to be able to deliver the tackles from our spots," said Sulph. "From being a wide receiver, I think both of us have good tendency reads when we are back-pedaling, knowing how receivers kind of thing when crossing the middle. Our group is going to get a lot of

picks this season."

Sulph also acknowledged that facing off against Fleming Island's senior quarterback Cibastian Broughton is one of the top things circled on his calendar. "He's the best and the rivalry will only be a great game," said Sulph. "He's my boy and we know what each other can do." Kicking-wise, Wolfe loses everything weapon Kaleb Robison to Central Carolina

University and will be seeking another guy who can put kickoffs into the end zone and not miss from the field.

"I don't think we are going to surprise anyone this season being the past two seasons, we have been the only team in the playoffs from Clay County," said Wolfe. "I think we'll be getting everybody's best games when they face us and that puts some pressure on us."

equally big defensive line, rugged linebackers and a secondary with sticky fingers.

Foy will be with a quarterback is a question mark. He has two guys; junior Jayven Moreno, last year's backup to Brandon Wallace, Jr., and transfer Jack McKissock, a prolific player from The First Academy where he accounted for 1503 yards passing and 19 scores for a 6-4 season in 1M with 11 interceptions. Wallace leaves after putting up 1373 yards passing with nine touchdowns last year as well as 442 yards rushing with six touchdowns.

"I wanted to play with the big boys, that's why I'm here," said McKissock, early in the summer.

In the backfield, Foy has a Foy as his lead back, "Wendy's son" as he calls him, meaning senior son Chris Foy II, who brings a strong pair of legs, soft hands for swing passes and an intensity that keeps his offensive linemen in check.

"He's like a quarterback out there because he knows what everyone in front of him is supposed to do," said Foy. "We go as he goes."

Next to Foy II will be senior Malachi Worthen who was mainly a wide receiver last year but looks to be a speed back out of the backfield.

Foy jokingly said his H-Back position or wingback will be "a linebacker or someone like that."

"That's mainly going to be another big body up close to the offensive line to clear the

way," said Foy. "We might even use Amare "Biggie" Thomas (6'4", 325 lbs.) out there or one of my big guys up front, Mykel Mayo (6'3", 310 lbs.) may get that call."

Foy will have a handful of firepower on the outskirts of the field with the speed, hands and savvy of guys like sophomore sensation Michael Conner III, his wingman Jordin Price and superman Carlos Witherup.

Up front, the big guys include Reggie Houston, Chris Jules, Jaden Adams at center, Lewis Nixon and Mykel Mayo, all averaging nearly 325 pounds in total body mass.

"They are big, strong and fast," said Foy. "The big difference between our big guys and other big guys in the county, is our guys can dunk a basketball."

Reggie Houston, a massive offensive lineman, concurred with his coach.

"Doing the things he asks of us; like running in sand, is what is going to make us mentally tough and physically fit," said Houston. "We work and sweat as a unit in the sand pit and when we get on the field, it's the same mental toughness that gets us through the fourth quarter."

The workhorse on the offensive line, according to Foy, is Chris Jules.

best defensive player in the county," said Foy. "But, we got guys there that will make the plays; Trevin Davis at outside linebacker is going to be a big factor."

In the secondary, Foy has track-fast athletes that will be severely tested this season with what Foy calls, one of the best groups of wide receivers in the state. "James Kitchens is the experienced one back there with Kaylib Singleton (transferred from Fleming Island, brother to FSU running back Sam Singleton and arguably as fast) able to cover a third of the field and TJ Erling the brains of the operation," said Foy. "We will be facing great wide receivers on our schedule with Jaime

French from Mandarin, (62 catches, 1247 Yds, 14TDs) and Naeem "The Dream" Burroughs of Bolles (47 catches, 1019 Yds, 15 TDs); offers from Notre Dame, West Virginia, Ole Miss, all legit big college recruits lining up against us. Riverside has two senior receivers coming back; Myles Kendrick (40 catches, 710 YDs, 9TDs); committed

to Indiana, and Tae' Shaun Gelsey (48 catches, 859 YDs, 9TDs), a Florida verbal commit. They will be challenged."

### Raiders are hoping three's the charm


ORANGE PARK - Orange Park High football got Marcus Wimberly here as coach just three years ago with a Tennesse high school state title on his resume, a national championship ring on his finger from the University of Miami, and an NFL career, albeit, shortened by injury.

Three years later, with seasons 2-8 and 4-6, Wimberly is looking to bank on his third year as the changeover season.

"These guys here as seniors have been my guys since I got here and I think we've changed the culture to what a Raider football player is supposed to be," said Wimberly, who brings an experienced quarterback back, Gabe Taylor, as the focal point of his attack. that probably showed the kids where the program should be," said Wimberly. "That game and the Fleming Island game the next Friday set the tone for the preparation for this season."



"Both can run, both make solid catches," said Taylor, with 1651 yards passing, 15TDs last year. "We'll mix it up pretty good on offense."

Taylor's best games were against Episcopal; 34-19 win with 229 pass yards with one score and a 101 QB rating and 217 yards against Ridgeview; a 36-12 win, with two scores.

Taylor noted that extra practice time with his two targets has given them a good rapport on the field and makes his reads more effective.

Up front, where Smith sees Reese as a defensive noseguard.





over the summer as learning technique first, and then, letting athleticism take over to get to the ball. "They have to learn what it takes to get to the ball first; preparation, then be fast enough or strong enough to get there," said Smith. "It's just football."

"Clay is our first district game in game six and we hope to be more prepared at that point than at game one," said Smith. "I would like to think we will have a strong game one to build some momentum. From there, we can build to be ready for Clay, Columbia, and St. Augustine."

For the district, though, Fleming Island, Orange Park and Middleburg should be improved enough with a second year for Golden Eagle coach Chad Parker, a much-softened schedule for Wolfe, and a third year of "his" guys for Wimberly.

Wolfe's schedule is lightened with the Broncos not seeing a team with a 2023 winning record until Ponte Vedra (8-4) on October 11.

Orange Park has a few more winning records on their schedule; Mandarin preseason (11-4), Riverside (9-3), Bartram Trail (8-5) and Beachside (9-1) so Wimberly has upped the ante for his Raiders to earn a few more playoff points.

Fleming Island is, on paper, fully loaded with a four year quarterback, a big running back, a defensive front that features fast and furious chasers, but with a much-inexperienced offensive line, must reverse last year's disappointing finish amidst five teams on their schedule with eight or nine wins; one being Beachside (9-1).

For Oakleaf second year coach Chris Foy, the prospect of getting out of the District of Doom is not lessened by inclusion in District 2-6A that features Mandarin (11-4), Fletcher (7-4) and First Coast (6-5), all past powerhouses for the north Florida area and all playoff finishers last year.

Fletcher is always a high-scoring offense; last year with wins of 31-0, 35-6, 58-16 and 65-20 so that's job one for Foy's defense.

Mandarin, knocked a win over Bartram Trail in regular season play, ran four wins in playoffs then finished with a state runnerup finish to Miami Columbus in a shootout, 38-19. The Mustangs lose a stable of two thoroughbreds in the backfield, but a hot quarterback and a hot wide receiver.

### New Quarterback

Foy comes back with a new quarterback, a solid running back and one of the best receiver corps around plus a whole bunch of very big and agile linemen on both sides of the ball.

Oakleaf and Fleming Island will be another barn burner of a game, but for no district points with Foy's schedule almost as torrid as Parker's with Hawthorne (12-0, 2X 1A champs), Riverside (9-3), Bolles (8-6, 2M Final Four) and Mandarin on the slate.

Ridgeview and Clay don't have much traveling to do in their new district 3-4A lineup with Columbia Lake City and St. Augustine the third and fourth teams in the district.

## Merlin's Magic

Ridgeview's new coach Merlin Smith is promising some good news for Panther fans and that could come with some wins against less sizable opponents; West Nassau (Freelance), KIPP Bold City (1A), Impact Christian Academy (Freelance) and Episcopal (1A) though the A number on a team not indicative of the talent level as 1A powerhouses Hawthorne and Madison County can attest.

At the 2A level, smaller roster numbers are usually the difference at the end of the season with 23-25 guys just getting beat up each week for 10 weeks making for a tough finish.



Last year, I predicted 2023 would be St. Augustine's best chance at a title run since they lost the state championship to Naples in 2007. The Yellow Jackets found themselves in Tallahassee just two seconds from their second title when Mainland's Jacob Gettman kicked a game winning field goal. The goal in 2024 is to return to the final. They enter the season on a 14 game regular-season win streak with their sights set on another championship game.

University of South Florida commit Locklan Hewlett will once again be the trigger man after throwing for 2700 yards and 23 TD's in just 11 games last year. The senior brings

back three of his top four targets. Seniors Carl Jenkins Jr. (1172 yards, 15 TD) who is a 4-star USF commit, Trenton Jones (1007 yards 6 TD) who currently has 11 FBS offers and is also return threat and Junior Somourian Wingo (531 yards 6 TD) Graduating WR Myles Simmons who had 874 yards and 12 TD will be replace by Julio Santiago who had 69 catches for Tocoi Creek last season. The biggest question mark on offense is the loss of 1500 yard rusher RB Devonte "Bam" Lyons now a freshman at Florida International University. Junior Trendell Anderson is the likely replacement. Former Flagler-Palm Coast Bulldog great Josh Singleton should bring stability to the offensive line. With three of their four leading tacklers now in college, if the Yellow Jackets intend to bring home their first title since 2005 they will need the returning players to take the next step. Seniors DL Brent Bell, DL Bubba Gardner, LB Mike Wright and LB Matteo Bernardi will anchor the front seven. The secondary remains among the best in the area with seniors Bravlon James who is a Cornell commit, Jimmie Wheeler and Kyon Wilcox leading the way.

Quarterback Benjamin Burk has graduated. In addition to leading the team in passing, he was the Sharks second leading rusher. Drew Price is the favorite to win the starting job. The Sharks will be a physical team up front anchored by junior OT Brody McLeod who already had FBS offers as a sophomore. Ponte Vedra will need to overcome the transfer of TE Landon Okla to a high school in Tennessee and graduation of center Jake Guanera who will suit up for Big Blue at the University of Michigan this fall. RB Brian Case is a senior who rushed for 21 TD's and despite being power runner, showed ability to break the big play. PV will lean on him heavily in 2024. There is a big question mark at receiver with Ponte Vedra losing their top 4 receivers from 2023.

Defensively the Sharks return veterans upfront in DE Robby Grieco and DL J.P. Dolan and a stout linebacking group with Talan Babin (son of former NFL All-Pro Jason) who was second in the team in tackles last season as a sophomore and senior Mason Hauseman. They will need to put pres-

Zach Harbison enters year two in greater St. Augustine with a revamped defensive staff and a new district. The Toros best path to the playoffs will be an at large bid in 2024. 2023 was an up and down season with upset wins against Beachside and then undefeated Palatka but losses to Matanzas by six, Bishop Kenny by three, and

Clay by two. Like most up and coming teams their success will depend on their ability to put teams away late.

The offense will be led. by QB Ryan Killmer, a Trevor Lawrence doppleganger who threw 16 TD passes last season. Junior RB Vincent Gallela got better as the season went on rushing for 831 yards and will form a thunder and lightning combination behind a massive offensive line, with speedster RB Davian Garcia who missed all of 2023 with an injury who may also get looks at receiver. A large part of the receiving corps left with a diploma after last season, and junior Julio Santiago took his 69 catches to St. Augustine. Imposing 6'-4" TE Zander Erasmus had 25 grabs in 2023, the remainder of the returning team combined for just eight catches a year ago and their growth may determine how far the offense will go in 2024.

S Dakota Wright led the team in tacklers but the next 6 on the leaderboard either graduated or transferred. Defensive back coach Ronnell Ray is now the coordinator, a role he held at Menendez previously and will be tasked with the development around veterans CB Caden

Walden, and LB's Aiden Matos & Xavier Santana in his 3-3-5 defense. The defensive line will be led by seniors Trenton Kelly and Garrett Mitchell.

The perennial powerhouse made another deep playoff run in 2023 under new coach Cory Johns who took over for Darrell Sutherland, the only coach in school history to that point. Five losses a year ago do not tell the whole story. Those losses were to State Champion Mainland, State Runner-Up St. Augustine, Superteam IMG and two losses to State Semi-Finalist Buchholz. The district could ultimately be decided against Buchholz October 25th but most likely Bartram Trail will make the playoffs for the 16th straight season.

Junior QB Jaden Weatherly, a dual threat, has patiently waited his turn behind outgoing UCF Bound Riley Trujillo, taking hold of an offense that averaged nearly 40 points a game. Arthur Lewis IV is likely the best running back in the county replacing Utah Ute Laython Biddle who led the state with 2198 yards last year. Lewis is a dangerous returner and was the team's leading receiver and 3rd leading rusher. The Bears will be a run-oriented team behind an offensive line that returns 4 starters and will average 290 including C Zach Marshall. Junior WR De'Andre Caldwell will be to the go to guy in the passing game, while sophomore TE Connor Winn showed

his potential as big play receiver last year.

The defense will be overhauled this year with 11 new starteres. CB Tamajh Mitchell had 2 interceptions as a 10th grader will anchor one side of the field. Look for LB Kru Casey, CB Tristan Allen and S James Deleo to take advantage of additional playing time and improve a defense that allowed 30 points a game a year ago.

Back in 2014. I called a game between Creekside and Matanzas where the Knights recovered a fumble in the red zone with a minute left, scored and won 7-6. When Sean McIntyre was hired three years later, he inherited a program with one winning season in school history and a 22-game losing streak. McIntyre has turned the program around finishing .500 or better in the last five years with four consecutive playoff appearances. The team scored 33.4 points per game last year. Unfortunately, they allowed 33.2 points per game including an average of 46.2 in their losses. Like last season they will likely need an upset or two to keep their playoff streak alive.

There is a lot of continuity on the Knights high-octane offense. QB Sean Ashenfelder enters his 3rd year as the starter.

He threw for 1774 yards ran for 591 more and had 26 total TD's. Sean will join RB Harrison Garrido who ran for 1300

yards and 15 TD's to control the ground game. WR Kaleb Taylor-Burch is coming off a 57 catch season and will be the primary target in the passing game and WR Eros Taufer will have an increased role.



The Barracudas enter the season on a 9-game winning streak after a week one 38-35 loss to Tocoi Creek. Beachside was an independent but joins the FHSAA for 2024 and will have a more challenging schedule featuring Nease, Ponte Vedra and Bishop Kenny. They should contend for a wild card and are an upset away from a district title.

QB Edward Jordan garnered some FBS offers after throwing for 2500 yards and 35 TD's in 10 games last season. While the Barracudas are a pass heavy team, there is no running back on the roster who had a carry last year and no word at this point who will be the primary carrier.

The Barracudas are deep at WR returning Drew Watson, Marco Lanza, Brennan Monaco, and Drew Aldrich who combined over 100 passes for 1200 yards and 14 TD's. Time will tell if the offense mirrors last year's 368 yards per game output against a more challenging schedule.

Beachside had 33 sacks but the players returning only made 12 of them with eight regulars donning caps and gowns this past May. Their strength is on the D-line led by DT Aiden Rivera who had seven sacks and DE Riley Hofrichter. Peyton Mooningham and Nigel Eldridge are versatile players who can line up on the edge or at outside backer. Junior Nate McCleese will be the inside backer.

All 11 interceptions last season were made by departing players and the young secondary will have to get up to speed, essentially in the first two weeks, with their September schedule stacked with effective passing attacks.
