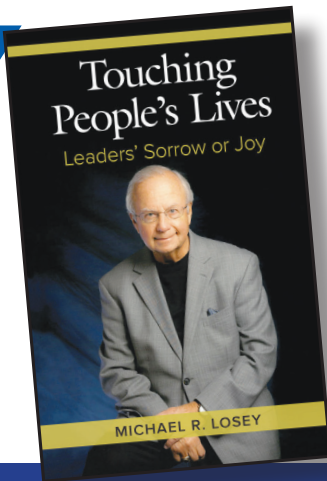


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Greyhound trainer's license suspended

Dogs test positive for cocaine

ORANGE PARK – A Jacksonville greyhound trainer who raced at bestbet of Orange Park received an emergency suspension notice on his operating license last month after a state investigation found 12 of his

greyhounds tested positive for a primary cocaine metabolite.

In under two months, the greyhounds trained by Charles McClellan tested positive 17 times for a substance called

State continues reviews for resentencing

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – It was just five days after Christmas 1997, when police discovered Shannon Holzer's body in a wooded area near her abandoned car, partially clothed and riddled with nine stab wounds.

Holzer had been on her way to deposit money from her place of employment, Buddy Boy's, a small convenience store in St. Johns County, when she offered to give a ride to John Calvin Taylor II to Green Cove Springs to retrieve a rental car.

Several co-workers saw Taylor in her vehicle. She dashed away their concerns.

He "was harmless," she said. "I'll be fine. Don't worry about it. I'll be back in a minute."

Police discovered six stab wounds in her heart the following afternoon and another three in her lungs. According to state records, a forensic pathologist at the trial concluded each stab could have been fatal, and that Taylor made the initial wound while Holzer was sitting in

her car. What police didn't find was the \$6,000 co-workers said she was on her way to deposit.

Taylor had that. He deposited \$1,700 into his bank account, went to a local bar and racked up a tab buying random patrons drinks. He tipped the bartender two \$100 bills on a \$200 tab and left.

Police arrested Taylor the next day for an unrelated burglary in his mobile home. He was in boxer shorts at the time.

On those shorts, police found bloodstains that matched Holzer's DNA.

Two years later, a jury sentenced Taylor to death. It was a split jury, a 10-2 decision. Now, 20 years later, Taylor and other Clay County murderers will see a resentencing due to retroactive changes in Florida's death sentence.

The changes stem from the outcome of the 2016 U.S. Supreme Court ruling

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Fight continues to protect voter information

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – In just a few keystrokes and three mouse clicks, Chris Chambless, Clay County's supervisor of elections, can find information on any registered voter in the State of Florida.

Chambless isn't using a database maintained by the state government, or any special list available to supervisors throughout the state, he is using a public website, www.flvoters.com. The website lists the voter identification number, full legal names, physical addresses and birth dates of every registered voter in the state.

"I think it's an abuse of information, and it goes far beyond First Amendment foundations," Chambless said. "I think this is a problem."

Aside from the general sense of fear people have when seeing their name, birthdate and private address listed on a public website, there are several nefarious reasons people would seek out this specific information.

According to Chambless, prisoners have been known to request voter infor-

mation on the men who work as guards. The information can be used by realtors and political shamers during elections as a source of accurate addresses for people in certain demographic groups that these businesses and organizations see as targets for their ad campaigns.

But the most private information is still exempt.

The 2005 change maintained exemptions for voters' Social Security numbers, drivers' license numbers and signatures, but this is not enough for Chambless to feel like the state is serving its citizens while maintaining their privacy.

Chambless – currently serving as past president of the Florida State Association of Supervisors of Elections – and other supervisors from around the state do not think a voter should have to volunteer private information solely for the right to vote. So, they began lobbying for bills to make the information private again.

First, in 2016, a bill was sent to the legislature that would re-exempt all information made public with the original 2005 change. The bill died in committee

and never saw the inside of the legislative chambers. That bill would have kept all voters' information private, but when they couldn't get that passed, Chambless turned his attention to the voters he wants to protect first and foremost, children.

The information isn't limited to those who are of legal voting age. In high schools throughout the state, 16- and 17-year-old students are encouraged to pre-register in an effort to get them to the polls – to fulfill their civic duty when they turn 18.

"They're not even of age and their information is now public record," Chambless said. "It is a shame that we had to, as a second offering, reduce our ask down to 16 or 17 year olds because I don't think it's necessary to have your information out there on the internet."

So, in 2017, another bill was drafted, this time all they were asking was that voters who had pre-registered would not have their personal information made public until they were at least of legal voting age. The bill moved through committees, passed in the house, but died before it could be brought to the senate.

The failure of these two bills does not sit well with Chambless, who works to encourage people to register with his office and participate in their government. Since voter information went public in 2005, he has seen people giving up their registration in an effort to protect their privacy.

"What we have is individuals removing themselves from the roles [of a registered voter] purely out of concern for their personal information," Chambless said. "It's time to take a hard look at the necessity of having this information public."

According to Chambless, this sort of thing is a lose-lose for those who wish to maintain privacy. Once the voter information is released, it is out there. Removing yourself from the registry won't remove your information from websites such as flvoters.com. The only way to make the information private again is through involvement in the political process, and maintaining your status as a registered voter.

"Certainly do not remove yourself from the roles," Chambless said. "Contact your legislators, we will be bringing a bill again next year."

Improving their odds

Homing program tames abandoned kittens

ORANGE PARK – Pat Terranova spends three hours per day – one and a half in the morning and the remainder at night – caring for more than 100 cats. That's on top of her full-time job. She said the hours are not ideal, but kitten season came hard and fast this year.

Terranova is a volunteer with the nonprofit group Community Critter Care of Clay County, better known as 5C. Terranova and other 5C members take care of feral cats and teach people they can live comfortably with the cats until the populations naturally decline through sterilization efforts.

She cares for several cat colonies, providing them food and trapping them to get them spayed or neutered in a practice called trap-neuter-release. Feral cats live independently outdoors, with some assistance from colony caregivers. But when the cats are raised and live without much human interaction, they are fearful and people don't want them as pets. Most shelters won't take them. That's what Ter-

ranova hopes to change.

When new kittens show up in her colonies, she takes the kittens and raises them indoors. They become socialized and get used to humans, which improves their appeal as pets. Kittens have the best chance of being adopted, she said, and she brings them to adoption events and works with another volunteer to find them homes.

Between the kittens, adult fosters and the feral colonies, Terranova currently takes care of more than 100 cats.

She began taking in the kittens last year. At adoption events, she said, people don't care that they were born feral. They just see a cute kitten.


She said some of the kittens are old enough to be spayed and neutered and placed back outside with the colony, but their chances of living longer than five years is slim. However, if they were adopted, the chances of a longer life are greater.

"They get hit on the road," she said, "or they get attacked by dogs." She has also seen cats that have been poisoned. "I'd like to believe it wasn't intentional. Maybe

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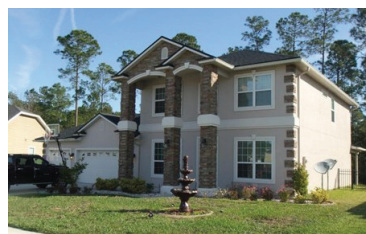
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Fighting our modern-day slavery

At a time when America faces serious challenges, it is imperative that Washington put aside partisan hostility in favor of common-sense solutions that move our state and nation forward.

Some people argue that it's not possible to reshape the dialogue to a more public-spirited approach, but I believe that Florida can lead by example – working together to do what is right. That's my goal as chairman of a diverse, 29-member Florida congressional delegation that includes Republican U.S. Sen. Marco Rubio, Democratic Sen. Bill Nelson, 16 Republican House members and 11 Democrats.

A prime example of our bipartisan resolve occurred last week when the Florida delegation held an official hearing to tackle the growing problem of human trafficking – a form of modern-day slavery.

Florida ranks third in the nation, behind California and Texas, in the number of reported trafficking cases and it experienced an alarming 54 percent increase last year. Children account for more than half the cases of human trafficking, a crime in which the victim is abducted or recruited for sexual exploitation. It can also involve illegal organ harvesting and forced labor.

At the hearing I co-chaired with Democrat Alcee Hastings of Fort Lauderdale, we spoke with several Florida experts on ways to combat this vile and monstrous crime.

One of the witnesses was Elizabeth Fisher, founder and head of Selah Freedom, a national anti-sex-trafficking nonprofit based in Sarasota. Ms. Fisher briefed the members on her group's efforts to help more than 2,000 young women in the Suncoast region. She also shared the harrowing story of a Bradenton girl who was trafficked from 11 years old up until she was 26.

The scope of the global problem is staggering: 27 million people are caught in the modern slave industry, which turns billions of dollars in profits for the heinous individuals behind these crimes.

This is an issue that demands immediate action. Several of the witnesses offered constructive suggestions to confront the problem. Ms. Fisher told us that Congress should focus on helping victims reclaim their lives, given that demand for services is tripling annually.

Another witness at the hearing, Dr. Suzanne Harrison with the Florida State University College of Medicine, noted that training in the medical community is essential to treat the girls and young women who "go unrecognized in clinics and emer-

Lawmakers get low marks on Sunshine

The Clay County School District may be one point away from being an "A" District this year, but our legislative delegation did not fare so well on recent grades they received for part of their performance.

Sen. Rob Bradley (R-Fleming Island) received a C-plus, while Rep. Travis Cummings (R-Orange Park) and Rep. Bobby Payne (R-Palaska) both received a D-plus in a ranking of how well they supported the state's Sunshine Law in this year's Florida Legislature.

Based on information compiled by The Florida Society of News Editors, more than half of Florida's state lawmakers received a "D" or "F" grade on the first Sunshine Scorecard.

The Scorecard was produced using information from the Tallahassee-based nonprofit First Amendment Foundation on how well lawmakers supported legislation that added exemptions to public records and meetings laws in 2017. None of the state's 160 legislators received an "A" grade and only nine earned a B. There were 71 Cs, which is considered average. And half of the legislators received a subpar grade, with 77 Ds and three Fs.

The Legislature passed a near-record number of Sunshine Law exemptions this year, adding to more than 1,100 exemptions added over the years. Every exemption makes government shady and accessible to the voters.

The Legislature passed 17 new provisions – and reauthorized six others – that create carve-outs in the state's Sunshine

Law, according to the Foundation, which advocates for transparency in government and annually tracks Sunshine-related legislation.

The number of exemptions this year is the second-most since 1995 – five fewer than the record 22 exemptions lawmakers passed in 2014, said Barbara Petersen, president of the Foundation.

Petersen said these attempts to weaken government transparency in Florida are bi-partisan. For example, it was State Rep. Cynthia Stafford (D-Miami) who sponsored a "witness protection bill" that would shield the identities of murder witnesses for two years after the crime. Stafford said the bill was needed to stop what she called "the no-snitch mentality."

Regardless of these bills' perceived merits, each one slowly chips away at Florida's transparency, which had served as a model for the nation.

"The vast majority of the bills we track are justified, and we take a neutral position on them, or we work to make them such that we're neutral," Petersen said.

Petersen also said these exemptions chip away at the Florida Constitution.

"We agree that the requirements of our famed Sunshine Law can be an inconvenience for government officials at times. But the right of Floridians to oversee their government and hold it accountable for its actions – a right imbedded in our constitution – far outweighs such minor annoyances," she wrote one politician in a letter.

And it's not only the Sunshine Law exemptions that created issues for the 2017 Florida Legislature. Last minute budget negotiations – specifically education funding – were shrouded in secrecy and the House, in particular, advanced several highly consequential Sunshine exemptions that – although many didn't pass – sought

5 years ago, 2012

- The Board of County Commissioners placed \$225,000 in its capital improvement budget to use as matching funds for athletic associations that lease county parks and ballfields for youth sports. Commissioners passed the measure under the hope that the nonprofits would conduct fundraisers to match county funds.

- After serving four years as a housing counselor to families seeking to have their dream home, Carolyn Edwards was promoted to president of Clay County Habitat for Humanity.

- After a three-year search, the Clay County Sheriff's Office arrested Benjamin Rex Moats, 29, for running a psychedelic mushroom grow operation in his apartment near Orange Park. Police seized 169,000 psilocybin mushrooms, 41,000 inoculating mushrooms and 13,000 sport syringes.

10 years ago, 2007

- The Clay County Sheriff's Office arrested more than 230 people in a sting dubbed Operation Night SITE, which stands for Strategic Intervention and Tactical Enforcement. known as Hurst vs. Florida.

The case established that Florida's current death sentencing scheme was unconstitutional because it limited juries to an advisory role, which violated inmate's trial by an impartial jury promised under the Sixth Amendment of the U.S. Constitution.

Previously, Florida courts decided capital punishment by a simple majority. Now, states are required to impose the death penalty by a unanimous jury.

This ruling applies retroactively, meaning even 20-year-old cases decided by a non-unanimous jury will now go back to lower courts for a new penalty phase.

Another Clay County murder case that will get a resentencing hearing in the wake of the Hurst decision is that of David James Martin of Jacksonville, who was convicted in the 2008. Martin was convicted of bludgeoning Jacey McWilliams, 24, and dumping her body in a wooded area near Middleburg. He was given the death penalty after a jury voted 10-2 and not unanimously.

Criminal justice experts say that of the 395 prisoners currently on Florida's death row, nearly 150 of them qualify for resentencing hearings under Hurst.

Of those, 35 of them are within the Fourth Judicial Circuit, which is made up of Clay, Duval and Nassau counties.

"I'll use one word – chaos," said retired Supreme Court Justice Gerald Kogan of Miami in describing what the aftershock of the Hurst ruling in Florida. "It's just a mess."

Prosecutors, some of whom argued these cases years prior, will resentence the cases with a new jury while maintaining their normal caseload.

Each of these cases must be reinvestigated and presented in full by both the prosecution and the defense.

Because these cases will receive new penalty phases exclusively, jurors will not decide on guilt, rather jurors will decide on the punishment.

The state recognizes a life sentence if even one juror votes no to capital punish-

ment.

Fourth Judicial Circuit State Attorney Melissa Nelson said she has already heard new mitigating factors and evidence from defense attorneys arguing older cases while the state goes through the process of identifying which cases they will again seek capital punishment on, and which and they will commute to life sentences.

The Hurst ruling may also effect current proceedings. In late April 2016, the State of Florida filed a notice to seek the death penalty in the case of Bobbi Lee White and her husband Joseph Lloyd White for the alleged murder of a Jacksonville man whose remains investigators found inside a torched van in Jennings State Forest.

Last July, Bobbi's attorney filed a motion to block the state from pursuing the death penalty due to the change in death penalty guidelines.

Joseph's public defender has yet to file any such motion.

While the State Attorney's Office has not yet identified even a cursory price attached to these coming proceedings, Nelson said the figure will be significant.

"Each [case] will be slightly different...but I think after we go through one, we will have a high figure associated with the cost of resentencing," Nelson said.

While taxpayers might pay the price for the Hurst ruling, Nelson said survivors and loved ones of the dead will pay the true cost.

"We are calling them sometimes 30 – in one case 40 years – in many cases 20 years after the fact, and explaining what this new law means and walking them through the process," Nelson said. "They deserve, and obviously the community deserves, for us to make timely decisions – but certainly the next of kin do."

The State Attorney's Office will complete preliminary decisions on which Hurst-qualified cases they will seek the death penalty on by Saturday.

agency rooms. Congress should take these suggestions to heart as it moves to address human trafficking.

I have co-sponsored bipartisan legislation, the Abolish Human Trafficking Act, to increase penalties for perpetrators and give law enforcement more tools to treat human trafficking like organized crime.

I also voted for the Put Trafficking Victims First Act, a bill that provides federal grants to train prosecutors on how to best protect victims and investigate human trafficking. It also provides assistance for trauma care and mental health services to victims. The proposal is currently awaiting

action in the Senate.

Too often, the subject of human trafficking flies under the radar and only receives mainstream attention when it appears on the movie screen. We must continue the fight, not as Republicans or Democrats but as Americans, to raise awareness and combat this abhorrent crime against women and children in our communities. The time to act is right now.

20 years ago, 1997

- The Board of County Commissioners raised concerns about covering its employees who have pre-existing medical conditions as it debated approval of its health insurance plan.

- Rescuers with the Clay County Sheriff's Office failed to save Patricia Allen, 40, when she and her husband James Allen fell off their boat in Black Creek. James was saved, but his wife drowned.

30 years ago, 1987

- With new bylaws in hand and nominating committees appointed, the Lake Asbury Elementary School Parent-Faculty Association prepped for its first second meeting in preparation for the start of the

school's first year of operation.

- The Green Cove Springs City Council voted to authorize staff to procure a \$1 million loan to cover capital improvements for the next five years.

- Sheriff Jennings Murrhee said Richard Allen Webb, 29, of a Canis Drive Address near Orange Park was charged with armed robbery after an investigation at the Jax Liquors store on Blanding Boulevard.

40 years ago, 1977

- County Commission Chairman Hank Bruning met with state officials to try and recover \$308,732.56 it paid into the Cross Florida Barge Canal Authority Fund since the project was abandoned by President Jimmy Carter.

to gut the spirit of the Constitution's open government guarantees.

One unsuccessful far-reaching exemption would have let two local elected officials meet in secret about government business without having to let the public know or having to disclose what they discussed. House Bill 843 made it to the House floor, but failed in an unprecedented outcome.

Now, back to Clay County's lawmakers. Cummings and freshman lawmaker Payne voted identically on the seven bills used to produce the Sunshine Scorecard.

They voted yes on the following bills: HB111 would hide IDs of murder victims, SB118 would hide criminal histories, HB441 adds court clerk liability protec-

tion, SB1018 required telling the public about major pollution and HB7093 hides employees' families' info. Both also voted on HB351, which would hide college president searches, but the bill died in the Senate Education Committee and HB843, which would let two board members meet privately, but the bill failed to make it out of the House. Both lawmakers received three points each for voting on HB441 and SB1018.

Meanwhile, Bradley received nine positive points for voting no on HB 111, yes on HB 441, yes on SB1019 and yes on HB7093.

Hopefully the scorecard will cause lawmakers to think twice before further closing the door on open government in Florida, but I'm not going to hold my breath.

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HR exec shares stories of his life's work

FLEMING ISLAND – A new book written by a Fleming Island human resources expert gives insight on leadership, failures, success and the impact on people. Michael R. Losey's "Touching People's Lives" was written based on his five decades of experience in human resources, 26 of which he spent with Unisys, a global information technology company.

Losey begins the book with a story about Michael, a fourteen-year-old boy Losey babysat during a summer home from studying at the University of Michigan. Michael went to a school for children with intellectual disabilities, Losey states in the book, and at first, it was difficult to find activities to pass the time.

However, Losey said, over the course of the summer, he saw a transformation in Michael and the two became friends. Los-

ey helped Michael convince his parents to send him to the local high school, he said, and the experience of helping improve someone's life gave him immense joy. This set him on a path of human resources.

Losey once held the title of president and chief executive officer of the Society for Human Resource Management, the largest worldwide professional society for HR. Though he is now retired, SHRM awards the annual \$50,000 Michael R. Losey Excellence in Human Resource Research Award, to recognize a professional for significant past and ongoing research that impacts the HR management field.

During his career, Losey testified as an expert in human resources before Congress and collected an abundance of interesting and entertaining stories that will provide ad-

vice on leadership.

Published by SHRM, the book is told in short chapters that center on specific anecdotes that are grouped by the lessons the experience taught him. It covers everything, from mergers that threatened employee morale, unintentional workplace discrimination and how failure to anticipate change can bring even the most powerful companies down.

During his years as head of personnel for several companies, Losey learned the importance of being a leader and how leadership impacts others' lives.

He said he once received a phone call from an employee who was worried about an upcoming merger and threatened to shoot himself while on the phone.

"I remember it like yesterday," he said. He told the employee he would get help, called the police and spoke to his boss personally.

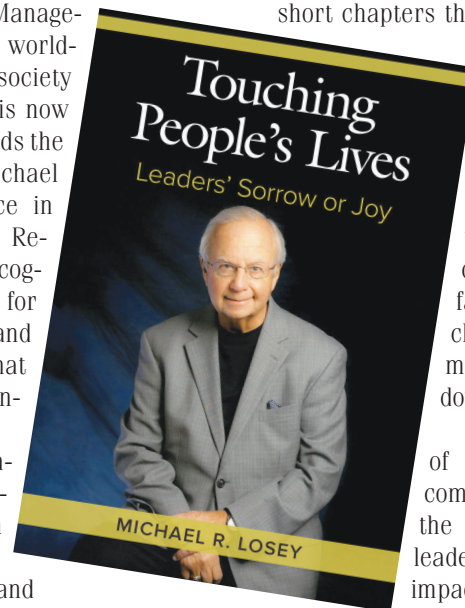
That is an extreme example, but Losey's book is full of moments in which key decisions by management or him personally had a drastic impact on others. He stresses the importance of making the right decisions the first time. As Losey says in the book and the last story proves, there is not always a second chance to fix those mistakes that touch other people. The damage is done.

As CEO for SHRM, Losey made a full-force effort to change the laws of Congress. At the time, members of Congress and their staff were exempt from many labor laws. It was done in the name of separation of powers, he said, but without being subject to those laws, leaders in Congress were affecting people's lives without considering the full impact.

"I loved it. I love the field," he said. "And people will say that I changed the field to make it better."

Losey started off in business school and he hated his HR classes. However, a professor took Losey under his wing and taught him to love the field.

He said the biggest change he saw during his career was the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the law that made it illegal for employers to discriminate based on race, re-

Foundation gives food bank \$6,000 grant

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The foundation created by the late actor and philanthropist Paul Newman recently awarded a \$6,000 grant to the Food Pantry of Green Cove Springs. The award presented by Newman's Own Foundation is part of the organization's commitment to address issues of fresh food access and nutrition education.

The grant to the food bank will be used to purchase food for Clay County residents who face food shortages. Because the food bank has no paid employees, 100 percent of the grant will go to direct assistance for these families. Each year The Food Pantry provides food to approximately 10,000 Clay County residents who are referred to the nonprofit organization for fresh produce, meat and nonperishable food.

The Pantry has no government assistance and relies instead on donations from individuals, community groups and grants. Generous donors such as Newman's Own Foundation make their mission possible. Organized in 1989, The Food Pantry acts as a stop gap to provide emergency food for families and individuals in times of crisis. The Food Pantry and its cadre of volunteers helps people who are trying to help themselves but who face such obstacles as illness, injury and abandonment. It also

provides food to people who are awaiting approval for food stamps.

Paul Newman believed that everyone has the ability to make a difference in the world. Since the start of Newman's Own in 1982 with his personal salad dressing, which he bottled and sold, Newman gave 100 percent of the profits to charity. Newman said, "From salad dressing, all blessings flow."

Newman's Own Foundation turns all net profits and royalties from the sale of Newman's Own products into charitable donations. To date, Paul Newman and Newman's Own Foundation have given more than \$495 million to thousands of charities around the world.

The VyStar board of directors has selected Kathy Bonaventura, VyStar's chief lending officer, to serve as interim president and CEO effective Aug. 12 until West's replacement assumes the role. Bonaventura has more than 30 years of experience in the financial industry. She began her

career with VyStar in 1992 as vice president of mortgage lending. West's last day will be Aug. 11.

"As you might imagine, deciding to retire was not easy. Sadly, there is no perfect time to leave a credit union that you have nurtured for almost three decades. However, I recently turned 63 and decided it is time to

move on to the next phase of my life as VyStar moves on to its next phase," West said in a prepared statement.

He began his career with the credit union in the fall of 1988, when it was known as Jax Navy Federal Credit Union as vice president of member services. He was named president and CEO in December 1991.

someone set out rat poison.”

Instead, she keeps the kittens indoors until they have been spayed or neutered and have been treated for any illnesses. That way, they are ready to go for adoption events. Vet care can get expensive, she said, but she does what she can for the animals.

She starts the day by letting the kittens out of the kennels to run and play.

“I have a full-time job. They all think I’m crazy,” she said. “I get up at the crack of dawn every morning because everybody’s got to be fed, all the kennels cleaned.”

Inside Terranova’s Orange Park home are a handful of cat trees, perches and

kennels. Some cats are confined to kennels, while others roam free and follow Terranova through the house. Most cats are friendly and run to her and meow for attention. The clipped ears, a sign the cat was part of a TNR program, are the only indication the cats were once feral.

Around the house, shelves built into the walls and cat doors leading to screened-in patios give the cats plenty of space to roam.

Terranova is lucky in that her neighbors understand what she does and do not complain about the cats, she said. She said local businesses often criticize people who feed animals on their property.

On private property, it is difficult for advocates such as Terranova to trap and spay or neuter the animals to try to stabi-

ligion, sex or national origin. Losey said though he graduated with a master’s in human resources in 1962, just two years before the act passed, his degree did not prepare him for the change.

“I never had one word about Civil Rights in my courses at the University of Michigan,” he said. “Anticipating the future is the most important part of management. If there were no changes, you wouldn’t need

leaders.”

The book details Losey’s struggle to expand employment to African American employees. He said that the law itself did not immediately bring about opportunities for people of color; it took an active effort from the company.

Another change he has seen is the increase in the number of women in the workplace. He said HR is now dominated by women. At the beginning of his career, that was not the case.

“There were no women, except for clerical,” he said.

Losey said he expects the role of women to continue expanding.

One of the biggest challenges, he said, is health care.

lize the population.

People think there’s a genetic difference between feral and domesticated house cats, she said, but once the feral adults get used to her, they are just as friendly as any pet.

“One thing I’ve noticed, whether it’s kittens or adults, they look for people. They crave people,” she said.

Terranova’s efforts to care for local cats began when she noticed others were already feeding feral cats in the neighborhood, but they were not being spayed and neutered. She began trapping the cats and getting them spayed and neutered to reduce their numbers.

Opponents of TNR argue that the method is ineffective and feral cats are a threat to birds. However, Terranova said, it is the humans who destroyed habitats for local wildlife and allowed outdoor pet cats to reproduce. She said if enough people in a community work together to sterilize the cats, it would work.

She has heard people say animal control needs to come in to handle the problem of feral cats in neighborhoods, but it is not a practical solution.

“If they had any idea what it would cost in taxes, in everybody’s tax dollars, to go into a neighborhood, round up every cat that didn’t belong to somebody and euthanize them – which to me is a horrible thing to do anyway – but even if they did it, who’s gonna’ pay for it?” she said, adding that euthanasia costs about \$70 per cat.

Terranova said, cats are extremely territorial, and if cats are removed from an area, new cats will move in to claim the territory. TNR isn’t a perfect solution, she said, but no one has the funding to remove

and eradicate the feral cats.

“It’s not a perfect solution, but there isn’t a city, town or state that has the kind of funding that anybody would ever approve to eradicate billions of cats,” she said. “And there are billions out there. They’re everywhere.”

She said there are people who hate those who feed cats, but the bigger problem is people who do not spay or neuter their pets or abandon them outside.

“The reason there are ferals out there is a people problem, not a cat problem,” she said.

5C aims to educate people about feral and community animals and assist in local TNR efforts. Using TNR, a method in which feral and stray animals are trapped, sterilized, and returned to the location they were found, the populations can dwindle naturally without animals being killed in shelters or by Animal Care and Control.

Currently, Clay Humane offers free spay and neuter services for all cats, with no qualifying paperwork required. Free sterilization for feral cats is offered every Wednesday. According to Clay Humane, more than 4,000 feral cats have been sterilized for free in the last three years.

The Clay Humane website states that about half of the 6-8 million homeless animals entering U.S. shelters every year are euthanized. By controlling animal overpopulation with spay and neuter services and keeping feral and community animals taken care of without going into shelters, nonprofits like Clay Humane and 5C are helping to lower the euthanasia rate.

benzoyllecgonine, the main cocaine metabolite screened for in drug tests, according to the June 9 suspension order.

According to the emergency notice from the Florida Department of Business and Professional Regulation, between March 1 and April 29, one female dog, "WW's Flic-ka," tested positive six times and in two of those races came in first place. The dogs were housed at Steve M. Serras Kennels at the time of testing. By law, the winning dog in a race and a separate, random dog are tested for foreign substances.

The state has never issued an emergency order such as this according to GREY2K USA, a national nonprofit organization that lobbies against greyhound racing.

"This is the biggest greyhound drug case in American history," said Carey Theil, GREY2K executive director. "I've never seen an emergency order like we saw in this case – as far as I know, this is unprecedented."

A bestbet spokesperson said trainers are independent contractors and the business does not directly employ them. The spokesperson added that McClellan was removed from the premises as soon as bestbet was notified of the state's order.

"bestbet Orange Park completely supports the swift action taken by the state in this matter and as always, fully cooperated with state officials as they conducted their random and routine tests. Bestbet Orange Park maintains a zero-tolerance policy for any trainer or staff member that does anything [that] puts one of the dog's health at risk. In this instance, the process carried out by the state of Florida and the regulators was carefully followed under state law," a bestbet spokesperson stated in a prepared statement.

Activists and critics of the greyhound racing industry point to occurrences such as these as proof of animal rights abuses on a grand scale, while supporters maintain the greyhounds receive top-shelf care and attention and drug cases are isolated incidents.

Kennel owner Steve Serras responded to the allegations in a statement posted

online by saying the levels of cocaine present in the greyhounds at the time they resided in his kennel did not exceed levels that would cause a human to fail a federal drug test.

He said environmental contaminants or contact with humans could have accounted for the levels of cocaine in the greyhounds.

"Animal rights extremists are intentionally withholding the amounts found in the positive samples," Serras said. "Quite simply it is propaganda against the greyhound industry. These animal rights extremists also have ties to domestic terrorist groups. They prey on hysteria and fears to elicit anger and support in any form especially in terms of donations."

According to the document, because McClellan was slated to race his dogs not only the day of the suspension's issuance, but for two days thereafter, "[T]here is an immediate and serious danger to the public health, safety and welfare that requires an emergency suspension of his" license.

The state will now usher McClellan through his due process of a full license revocation, but the case is unlikely to be referred to criminal court.

Rarely do state investigators delve into how dogs encounter these substances. It's a trend, Theil said, that is frustrating, yet slowly changing.

"The state should be applauded for issuing their emergency order...I think that it is appropriate and I think this should be an example," Theil said. "Am I happy that six months passed before it came down? No, I don't think that's appropriate. Am I happy they don't appear to be referring this to law enforcement?...No, I'm not, but

things are markedly better at the department than they were even two years ago."

The Department of Business and Professional Regulation has procedures in place aim at keeping these incidents from occurring again. One is to begin the process of full revocation of McClellan's state wagering license. Another is to bar him entirely from obtaining any similar licenses in the state and barring him from patronizing wagering businesses.

The Department has revoked 27 wagering licenses and barred 24 patrons from affiliate wagering businesses since 2006, according to the department's website.

There have been several greyhound doping cases before in the United States, many of which have come from Florida, one of the 10 states in the country that

has yet to outlaw the sport.

For example, in January, the state revoked a St. Petersburg trainer's license after five dogs tested positive for cocaine.

Industry critics maintain the only way to remove the possibility of greyhound doping is to ban the sport. Supporters and industry insiders claim negative stories do not represent the industry as a whole.

"Greyhound racing has its own process for addressing such situations. In addition to complying with all state and local laws, National Greyhound Association members also must comply with rigorous association rules governing greyhound care. Any member who fails to do so may be banned from greyhound racing for life, and others prohibited from doing business with the violator. These tough penalties send a strong message that illegal or improper behavior will not be tolerated," read a statement from the National Greyhound Association in response to the allegations.

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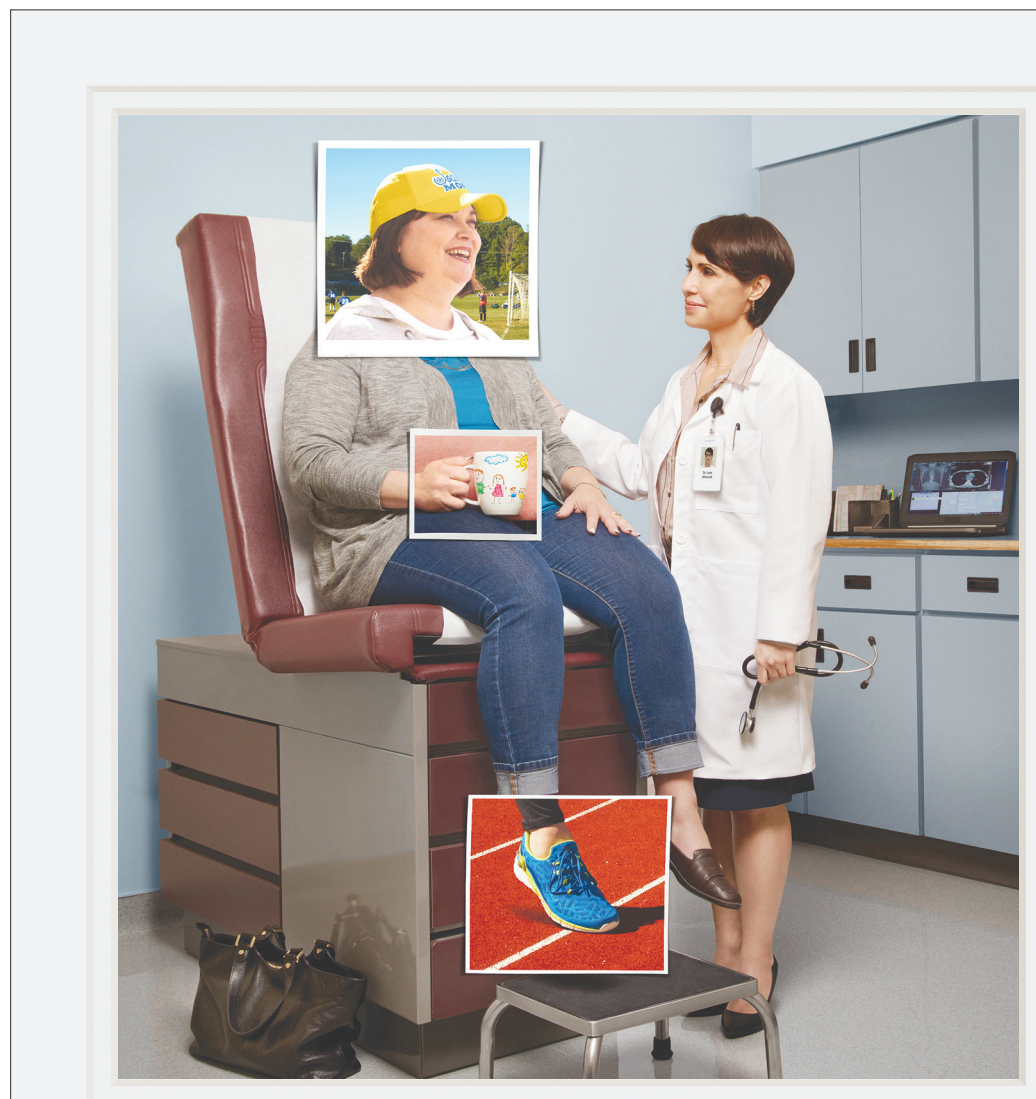

Air Potato Patrol mobilizes public in recon of problem plant

GAINESVILLE, Fla. – In Florida, air potato is a state-wide problem, but the battle against the invasive plant starts in greenbelts and back yards, according to scientists with the University of Florida and the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.

Experts are calling on the public to join the Air Potato Patrol, a citizen science project that trains residents to identify and report air potato vines in Florida and the Southeast.

"If someone has air potato vines on their property, we want to get status updates on these plants – for example, are they growing and expanding or are they dying back?" said William Lester, Hernando County horticulture agent with the UF Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences Extension.

"We also want to know if people see air potato leaf beetles on the vines. That's because the beetle eats only this plant, and we want to know how many are out there seasonally, and how successfully they've been able to control the vine," he said.

Air potato is a vining plant named for potato-like tubers called bulbils. The plant grows aggressively and can quickly overtake and kill other vegetation. The plant is currently found in 60 of the 67 counties in Florida, as well as in Alabama, Georgia, Louisiana and Texas.

Air potato leaf beetles, which are native to parts of Africa and Asia, eat only air potato leaves and can decrease the density of air potato in an area by 25 to 70 percent, according to a UF/IFAS Extension publication. From 2012 to 2015, the U.S. Department of Agriculture released air potato leaf beetles at more than 2,000 locations in Florida, including Hernando County.

About a year ago, Lester started getting calls from locals concerned that they weren't seeing as many air potato beetles

as they used to. Lester suspected that winter weather had hit the beetles harder than usual, leading to the decline in numbers.

Those calls showed that everyday people were a valuable source of intelligence in the ground fight against air potato.

In response, Lester contacted Chris Kerr, who leads the air potato beetle rearing program at the FDACS Division of Plant Industry facility in Gainesville. As the two discussed how they could get the public more involved in air potato control, the Air Potato Patrol was born.

Lester and Kerr collaborated on the videos and training materials that teach citizen scientists how to identify air potato and report on plant growth and beetle activity. Videos and more information on how to participate are available at airpotato-beetle.com.

"Anyone who wants to learn more about controlling this invasive plant, and has access to air potato on their property or a friends', is welcomed to participate," Lester said. "The data collected will be used to help better understand the timing and seasonal distribution for both air potato plants and beetles."

Jim Selph, a retired UF/IFAS Extension Desoto County director and livestock agent, jumped at the chance to participate in Air Potato Patrol. Now a DeSoto County commissioner, he is still committed to controlling air potato in order to help the environment.

But the problem is also a personal one. A creek runs through Selph's property, and the area around it used to be engulfed in air potato, making the creek inaccessible. "Wading through those vines, that was something else," he said. "I couldn't get down to the creek to enjoy it."

Now, thanks to the work of the beetles, he can. "The air potato vines are reduced by 40 or 50 percent, and each year it gets better."

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Black Creek project gets green light

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – The St. Johns River Water Management District has approved a contract with an engineering firm for a multi-million dollar project to pipe water from the flood-prone Black Creek near Penney Farms to Lake Magnolia in Keystone Heights.

The District approved a design bid from Jacksonville-based engineering firm CDM Smith and will now move to negotiate a contract. Their design work will be due by 2019.

“The board’s action today is the district’s first major step in the biggest water resource development project ever in northeast Florida,” said Ann Shortelle, executive director of the St. Johns River Water Management District. “The Black Creek Water Resource Development Project has far-reaching benefits and is truly an all-around win for the region.”

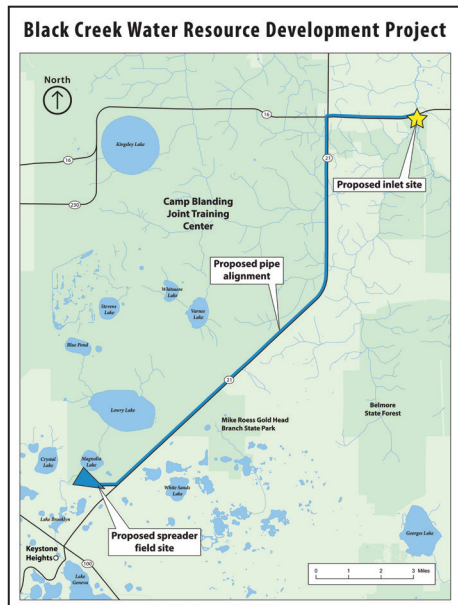
The project would capture water when levels are high along Black Creek. Excess water would travel through a proposed pipeline along State Roads 16 and 21 to a spreader field near Lake Magnolia on Camp Blanding property.

The water would then travel down Alligator Creek, which would increase the water levels of all bodies within the Etonia Chain of Lakes – which include the ailing Lake Geneva and Lake Brooklyn.

Approximately 75 percent of the time, the Black Creek Water Resource Development Project will capture flow in the creek above a predetermined threshold.

The pipeline would have a 10 million gallon transmission capacity. The project’s main goal is to recharge the upper Floridan Aquifer through the bolstering of Lake Geneva and Lake Brooklyn, which are aquifer recharge areas.

Approved during the 2017 Florida legislative session, the project comes with \$13.3 million in current legislative appropriations and an expected completion year of 2021. Estimates have put the project’s total cost at \$44 million.

Legislators have earmarked \$5 million a year from the Land Acquisition Trust Fund as recurring payments to complete the project.

Voters approved the Florida Land and Conservation Initiative – Amendment 1 – in 2014 to divert 33 percent of net revenue from the existing excise tax on documents to the Land Acquisition Trust Fund.

The fund was developed to acquire and improve beaches, wildlife habitats, conservation easements and drinking water resources

“I was [at the SJRWMD board meeting] yesterday and actually spoke to the agenda item, and we’re just incredibly excited and very, very thankful to our legislative representatives...for all the hard work they did,” said Keystone Heights City Manager Scott Kornegay. “We’re looking forward to the project getting underway.”

Senator Rob Bradley (R-Fleming Island) along with Rep. Bobby Payne (R-Palatka) championed the legislation during last session.

“Amendment 1 created a revenue stream that will allow water resource pro-

tection projects of this magnitude to move forward, and I applaud my colleagues in the Florida Senate for supporting our funding request,” Bradley said. “I am very excited about the benefits of this project to meet the future water supply needs of Northeast Florida and to replenish the

lakes in Keystone Heights.”

Kornegay said the city would have a celebration when the lake levels rise to where they were decades ago.

“I don’t know about a ceremonial dive,” he said, “but we’ll certainly celebrate.”

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Middleburg native doing her part abroad in Spain

ROTA, Spain – A Middleburg High School graduate and Middleburg native is serving in the U.S. Navy aboard the Arleigh Burke-class guided missile destroyer, USS Donald Cook.

Petty Officer 2nd Class Brianna Riebe is an information systems technician aboard the forward-deployed Arleigh Burke-class guided missile destroyer operating out of Rota, Spain. Donald Cook is one of four destroyers homeported in Rota.

A Navy information systems technician is responsible for the ship's internal network and communications systems

"I like the people I work with," said Riebe. "We are a small family and we treat each other as such."

Commissioned in 1998, the Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyer, Donald Cook, is 509 feet long, the length of more than three football fields.

The ship is named after Donald Cook, a Vietnam War prisoner of war who died in captivity.

Donald Cook is a tactical multi-mission surface combatant capable of conducting anti-air submarine surface warfare in conjunction with being outfitted with Aegis ballistic missile defense capabilities.

"Donald Cook is Sixth Fleet's premier forward deployed unit with an extremely high operational tempo," said Cmdr. Timothy Moore, commanding officer aboard USS Donald Cook. "My sailors continue to impress me with how hard they work, the pride they possess and the dedication they show day in and day out in the execution of their duties. Being able to command a ship with such a great group of professional sailors is an enduring honor and a privilege."

Approximately 30 officers and 300 enlisted men and women make up the ship's company.

Their jobs are highly specialized and keep each part of the cruiser running smoothly. The jobs range from maintaining engines to handling weaponry and everything in between.

"I love being overseas and the experience of this culture," said Riebe. "I get to travel and do things people don't do very often."

Although it is difficult for most people to imagine living on a ship, the challenging living conditions build strong fellowship among the crew. The crew is highly motivated, and quickly adapts to changing conditions. It is a busy life of specialized work, watches and drills.

As a member of one of the U.S. Navy's most relied upon assets, Riebe and other Donald Cook sailors know they are part of a legacy that will be last beyond their lifetimes.

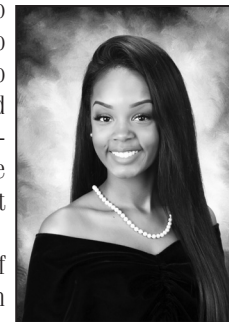
"Serving means being able to help keep people I love safe and that means a lot to me," said Riebe. "I may not be on the front line but I am doing my part."

Two Clay students awarded military-related scholarships

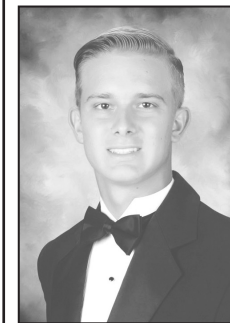
CHERRY HILL, N.J. – The Heroes' Legacy Scholarship Program has awarded two Clay County graduates college scholarships.

VyStar installs anti-skimming card readers

JACKSONVILLE – VyStar Credit Union has installed new check card and debit card readers aimed at preventing skimming and, therefore, theft.

More than 200 VyStar-owned ATMs are

now equipped with ActivEdge card readers, a new kind of technology that helps prevent the most common type of ATM fraud – skimming.

Now, rather than asking customer to insert the short edge of their card into the machine and quickly remove it, VyStar ATMs prompt users to insert the long edge and leave the card in the machine for the duration of the transaction. Although the configuration is a 90-degree twist in what customers are used to, credit union officials say the new system makes a big difference in protecting its members against fraud and the theft of personal financial information.

According to the ATM Marketplace, 98 percent of all financial losses at ATMs around the world in 2015 resulted from skimming. Card skimming devices are used by fraudsters to illegally collect financial data from the magnetic stripe of credit, debit and ATM cards.

Because skimming devices are designed to look just like the traditional card-scanning technology found in ATMs, gas station pumps, retail stores and even handheld devices, card skimmers are difficult to detect and often go unnoticed.

Fraudsters place the devices directly over existing readers at payment terminals, leave them to collect the card data from unsuspecting consumers, and later retrieve the skimmers and use the card information for fraudulent activity. Unfortu-

nately, skimming is something all financial institutions that own ATMs and issue credit, debit and ATM cards must constantly battle. It is not unique to VyStar ATMs.

The new card readers are part of a partnership with Diebold Nixdorf, the creators of the ActivEdge card reader, to tackle card skimming from a different angle. The new readers use technology that has a new gate-locking feature that helps deter criminals from using skimming devices.

If a fraudster traps a card in an ATM, the ActivEdge's tamper-proof gate-locking feature keeps the card safe within the ATM and ensures the criminal cannot access it. ActivEdge readers are compatible with EMV chip technology too, adding an extra layer of security.

Boards meet jointly on Comp Plan update

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – In a joint workshop of the Clay County Board of County Commissioners and the Clay County Planning Commission, board members heard a staff report from the county's planning department on the current status of the 2040 Comprehensive Plan.

The county's comprehensive plan is reevaluated every seven years to make any necessary changes as required by state law. The evaluation also gives staff a chance to see what worked and what didn't work, to allow extended deadlines for some projects, and to discuss things that might need fixing. The updated plan is only a draft at this point, but will soon move into its final stages as the October 1 deadline for submittal to the state looms.

Ed Lehman, the county's planning and zoning director, spoke to the boards first. He started by stating that the county is in a good place to support any future population growth. According to Lehman, there will be enough housing to support the county's population into 2040, which is expected to reach about 300,000 by that year.

County Commission Chair Wayne Bolla asked for clarification as to whether or not we currently have enough housing to support the increase in population expected by 2040.

"Not the current number," Lehman said. "This is based on the amount [of dwellings] that could be built based on land uses that have been approved."

In an effort to keep the meeting brief, presenters cycled out relatively quickly, providing information only on what would change, and allowing time for brief discussion at the end of the presentation of each of the 13 elements in the plan.

Planner Tony Robbins of Prosser Inc. in Jacksonville stepped up to the podium after Lehman's presentation. Robbins discussed some of the housing issues that will be addressed in the updated plan, first and foremost creating a unified definition for affordable housing.

Robbins also discussed the topic of economic development, something that Clay County Economic Development Corp. President Bill Garrison worked on with staff.

Among the suggestions from Garrison

were ideas to zone the land around major interchanges along the future First Coast Expressway in an effort to target specific businesses to those areas that could provide jobs and economic growth for the county.

"The ideal element is to ensure that, whatever industry, whether it be restaurants or shopping, that they do have subsidiaries that want to come along, and competitors that will come along and have that ripple effect," Robbins said.

Garrison's suggestions also included creating a space in Clay County that would be welcoming to young entrepreneurs, giving them a destination that would encourage them to move here, and work in-county, instead of adding to the 60 percent of residents who drive out of Clay County every morning for a job.

Shaun Fountain, a colleague of Robbins' at Prosser, spoke about parks and conservation in the county. Fountain mentioned the need for new recreation facilities in Clay County, something that will be included as part of the parks master plan.

"We're deficient in a number of areas," Commissioner Mike Cella said.

Cella went on to suggest a closer look into the parks budget, and abandoning the idea of placing numerous pocket parks throughout cities and towns while saving up for something that would actually add value to the county-wide parks system.

At the end of the discussion, the county's Chief Planner Carolyn Morgan ran through brief updates to the Branan Field and Lake Asbury Master Plans, which are both areas that expect to receive the majority of the population growth between now and 2040 as the beltway moves through the county and these two villages grow around the highway.

Following Tuesday's workshop staff will continue to work on the master plan, taking into account some suggestions from members of the Planning Commission and County Commission. The plan will eventually be finalized and presented to both boards for voting.

meetings was added to Tuesday's agenda.

"I know the arguments against it are that it's been tried in the past and people don't necessarily turn out, and I understand that," Rollins said. "I think we owe it to the public to give them that opportunity. They're used to public meetings being in the evenings."

One of the major concerns with changing meeting times was that county staff would have to stay longer on meeting days, however County Manager Stephanie Kopelousos assured the commissioners that the staff could work when they were needed.

"I think that from our team's perspective we're going to make whatever time you set work, we will definitely be flexible with our staff," Kopelousos said. "I think that most people who present to you are department heads and we will make appropriate accommodations if we go well into the evening."

For some commissioners, this was all the convincing they needed to move back the meeting time. As long as the staff and

speakers would not be affected negatively, the board seemed open to the idea of trying something different.

Commissioner Mike Cella came to the meeting with research in hand. Through some searching, he brought the board a list of meeting times for other county commissions, with some starting early in the morning and others late in the evening.

"I have no problem doing the people's business at any time," Cella said, claiming the proposed 4 p.m. meeting time was a good middle ground between the regular 2 p.m. meetings and the evening meetings held by area councils and the school board.

The rest of the board agreed, with Commissioner Diane Hutchings suggesting that, in addition to changing the start time, they could push more contentious or controversial items to the end of the agenda so as to accommodate public discussion even more.

Chair Wayne Bolla agreed with Hutchings and closed out the discussion before asking for a motion to approve.

"I will do anything that enhances the public's ability to attend the meetings and participate," Bolla said. "That's the idea of having public meetings. If the 4 o'clock start will do that, great."

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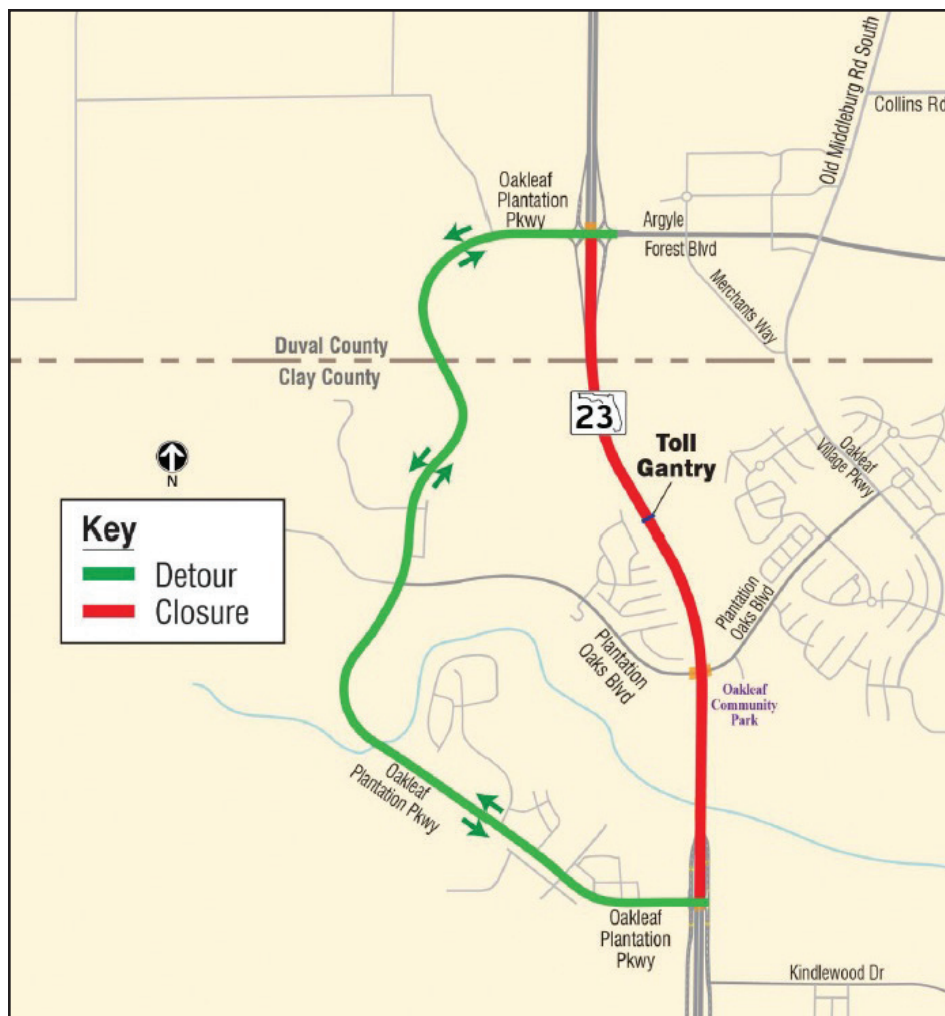
First Coast Expressway detours impact overnight driving

OAKLEAF – Detours have been set up this week at two locations on State Road 23 in the area considered the First Coast Expressway South project. Having began July 10, the detours are scheduled to end tomorrow, July 14, at 5 a.m.

Drivers should look out for the full closure of northbound and southbound State Road 23 from Argyle Forest Boulevard to Oakleaf Plantation Parkway in Clay County to allow traffic shift work on State Road 23. Drivers will detour onto Oakleaf Plantation Parkway for north-south travel.

Drivers should also look for the full closure of northbound and southbound State Road 23 from Argyle Forest Boulevard to 103rd Street in Duval County for installation of a toll gantry structure. Drivers will be detoured onto Old Middleburg Road South for north-south travel.

Once completed, this FCE South project will become part of an 18-mile-long SunPass administered toll road that connects I-10/U.S. 90 in Duval County to Blanding Boulevard (State Road 21) in Clay County. This project involves the sec-



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tion of the FCE from north of Argyle Forest Boulevard to Blanding Boulevard in Middleburg, connecting to two other FCE projects, both north of this site. Work on this six-mile-long project began in May 2014 at an estimated cost of \$85 million. FDOT hired Dragados USA to complete this project. Up-to-date lane closure information is available at www.nflroads.com and more FCE project information can be found at www.firstcoastexpressway.com.

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What's wrong with my oak tree?

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Oak trees are a favorite tree for the home landscape and many can offer decades, or even centuries, of enjoyment in Florida. Several species exist in many gardens and natural areas including the Live Oak, Turkey Oak, Red Oak and Water Oak. Each of these species have specific needs and attributes that can affect their success.

In most instances, the oaks are looked at as some of the toughest trees in the landscape but there are some issues that can lead to a decline in their health. One of the first things to think about is if there have been any disturbances of the roots such as new construction, heavy traffic, trenching or digging. For example, in Live Oaks, damage to roots can lead to the death of the tree in one to five years. Another issue to check for is if Metasulfuron Methyl has been applied to turf around the trees as research shows that this chemical can potentially enter the roots and damage the tree.

Another cause of tree decline to check for is lightning, as it can strike trees, damage the living cambium layer in the trunk and the tree will likely die within a year of the event.

Police and Fire conducting school supply drive

Supplies can be dropped at CCGSO headquarters in Green Cove Springs and the agency's two sub-stations north of Middleburg and near Orange Park, which are both on Blanding Boulevard. In addition to damage, make sure the oak is being cared for properly. Mulch should be kept around the root zone of the tree but leave a circle, about 1' in diameter, around the trunk open. Irrigation and fertilization are usually not needed for established trees. In fact, some species, such as the Turkey Oak, do not respond well to irrigation and fertilization so be sure to know your species and make sure they fit your site.

Pruning should be done (in the dormant season of winter is best) to maintain a strong central leader and to remove suckers, dead limbs and any branches that do not help the structural integrity of the tree. Most oaks do require some space to grow so these may not be ideal for small areas.

If you have an oak that is showing issues and is getting proper care, there are a few things to look for as likely culprits. As far as insects, look for aphids or scale on the leaves. Wood boring beetles are also

known to attack stressed trees.

If you care for the oak properly and allow beneficial insects to thrive, these are not normally a major issue. There are some common diseases, mainly fungi such

as Armillaria root rot which can attack the roots and move up the tree, causing a quick decline and death. A tell-tale sign to look for with some of the fungi are mushrooms that grow near the base or on the trunk of the tree. There are no practical controls for these soil-borne pathogens except to give the specimen the environment it needs – avoid injuring the trunk – and to reduce stress.

If you are having issues with your tree, you can find many helpful fact sheets online developed by the University of Florida or contact your local UF/IFAS Extension office. Sending in some pictures or bringing in a sample can help in determining what may be happening. If the tree poses a hazard to property or life, the University of Florida recommends consulting with an ISA Certified Arborist and hiring a licensed and insured service to conduct any work.

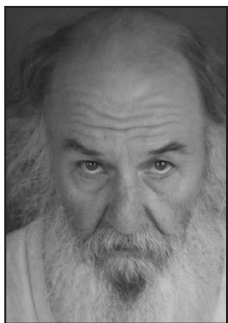
Drinking spree ends in arrest

At press time, Stover remained in the Clay County Jail awaiting a bond hearing.

DOT responds to fatality of 8-year-old

OAKLEAF – A two-vehicle crash that occurred July 10 in the Oakleaf area has the Florida Department of Transportation not only offering condolences to the families involved, but pledging to make changes to the traffic signal at the dangerous intersection where the crash occurred.

The Florida Highway Patrol reported that Angel Rios, 8, of Lakeland, was a passenger in his mother's 2002 Toyota Camry traveling eastbound on Oakleaf Plantation Parkway. He was later pronounced dead at Orange Park Medical Center.

FHP said Michelle Rios, 27, attempted to make a left turn to go north of State Road 23 when her vehicle was struck in the passenger side by the front of a 2006 Honda CRV driven by Angelica Joyce Soloman, 28, of Jacksonville. Soloman was heading westbound on Argyle Forest Boulevard in the left lane when, police said, she struck Rios' Toyota.

Michelle Rios and her daughter Giselle Rios, 9, were also transported by Jacksonville Fire and Rescue to OPMC for minor injuries. Soloman was not injured.

"First and foremost, our condolences to the family involved. The loss of life in the motor vehicle crash which occurred yesterday at the intersection of SR 23 and Argyle Forest Boulevard is a tragedy. Our thoughts and prayers are with the family and friends of Angel Rios," said Mary Justino, a FDOT public information officer.

Justino said FDOT conducted field reviews of the intersections within the involved, active construction limits on Tues-

day and looked at ways traffic safety could be improved. She said where changes or improvements are warranted, they will be made.

She said crews worked after rush hour on July 11 "to change the traffic signal so that it includes a protected left turn using solid red/green arrows. This safety improvement may cause general delays at the intersection and we ask drivers to exercise patience while the work is being done this evening and after the changed signal pattern takes effect."

Meanwhile, FHP said no charges have been filed as the crash is still under investigation.

Man bites officer during attempted hospital escape

ORANGE PARK – A Keystone Heights man was arrested after attempting to escape from Orange Park Medical Center and allegedly biting a deputy.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office arrested Brandon James Haugdahl, 28, on July 8 at 12:30 a.m. after he cracked a glass door while attempting to escape Orange Park Medical Center and then attacked a law enforcement officer.

Orange Park man attacks pregnant girlfriend

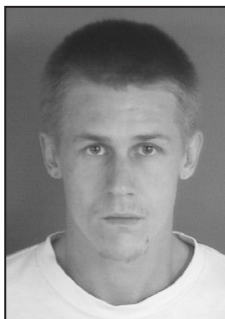
ORANGE PARK – An Orange Park man was arrested after attacking his pregnant girlfriend at their Orange Park apartment.

Steedley faces three felonies for child pornography and is being held in the Clay County Jail on a \$75,000 bond. His next court date is set for August 9.

Belamy had a warrant issued for his arrest in March after allegedly robbing a woman in Orange Park. 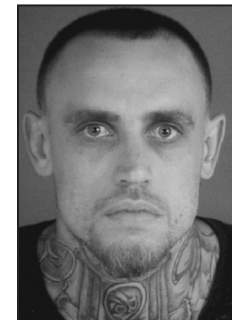

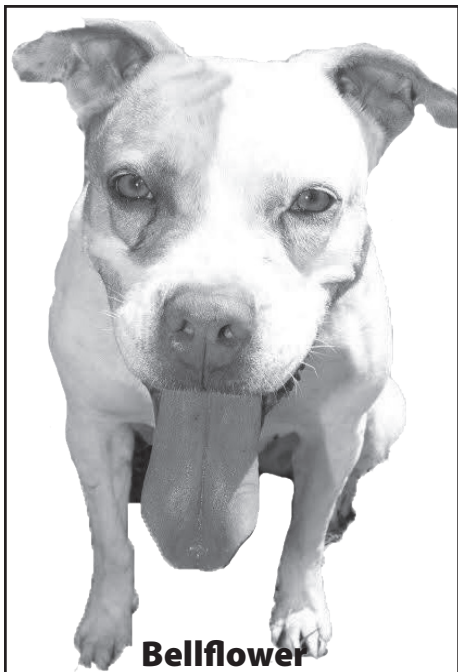

Middleburg woman dies in boating accident

ST. AUGUSTINE – A Clay County teacher died last weekend after falling off a boat Saturday night, July 8 in the Intra-coastal Waterway near the St. Augustine Inlet.

A spokesman for the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission said Jodi Nesi, 42, of Middleburg was hit by the boat's propeller.

Nesi died the next day at a St. Augustine hospital. FWC reports that Nesi was run over by the new Stingray boat she and six others were on, according to the accident report.

FWC officers were called about 8:30 p.m. to the scene. Nesi had been kneeling on the bow of the 19-foot boat being driven by her husband when it ran into

rough water, the report said. Nesi lost her balance and fell overboard, then was run over and hit by the propeller. She was transported to Flagler Hospital in St. Augustine where she died the next day, the report said. No one else on the boat was injured.

Nesi was a speech pathologist at Plantation Oaks Elementary in the Oakleaf community in Clay County. Prior to serving at POE, she was at Doctors Inlet Elementary.

Funeral services in celebration of her life will be held at 11 a.m. on July 14 at Orange Park United Methodist Church, 2051 Park Ave., with Rev. Oscar Otero, pastor of Asbury United Methodist Church officiating.

Police arrested Sheila Kay Topp, 51, on July 11 at 4 p.m. where she turned herself in to the CCSO at its Green Cove Springs headquarters. The investigation began October 25, 2016 when an officer with the state Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement contacted a law enforcement officer for the state Department of Agricultural and Consumer Services regarding what officers believed to be a fraudulent health certificate issued from Baldwin Animal Clinic in Baldwin, Fla. west of Jacksonville.

During the investigation, the clinic's owner, Robert Engle, told investigators that he did not issue the fraudulent certificate nor given anyone else permission to use the certificate or his veterinarian

license number.

On November 9, 2016, investigators were led to Topp's home in Keystone Heights to "obtain a statement and review documents pertaining to the sale of dogs," states the arrest warrant. However, when police approached the home, no one answered the door, but heard dogs barking from inside an air-conditioned garage. Investigators left Topp a voice mail asking her to call them back.

When she finally did call the officers back, investigators stated, "I received multiple telephone calls from a woman who identified herself as the defendant. She was very irate, harassing and refused to cooperate in any way."

After booking in the Clay County Jail, Topp was released on \$35,015 bond.

CHICAGO – Clay High baseball got a fleeting double-dose of Major League Baseball luck with the connection of the Dunning brothers; Dane and Jake, as the Chicago White Sox recently put the two flamethrowing pitchers together in their minor league system, but the moment lasted just three months.

Dane Dunning, 22 years old and six years younger than Jake, joined his brother in the White Sox farm league with the A-Kannapolis Intimidators in December trade before being promoted to A-Advanced Winston-Salem in April. Dunning responded with five innings of shutout ball en route to a 1-0 Dash win over the Lynchburg Hillcats of Virginia in his first outing. Dunning is listed as a top 10 prospect in the Chicago White Sox farm league, according to a White Sox Top Prospect Report of July 7 on Chicagonow.com.

Jake Dunning, drafted by the San Francisco Giants in 2009 in the 33rd round, was signed to a minor league contract with the Chicago White Sox on March 5, 2017, but was released June 29 from their Charlotte affiliate. On June 17, he was injured before being released in June. Dunning, who played college ball at Indiana and also Florida State College at Jacksonville, did make it to the Majors and pitched for the Giants in 2014 and 2013, but has incurred injuries recently.

Dane Dunning, who pitched masterfully for the Kannapolis Intimidators in North Carolina, reported to Winston-Salem with a recent White Sox Minor League Pitcher of the Month award for

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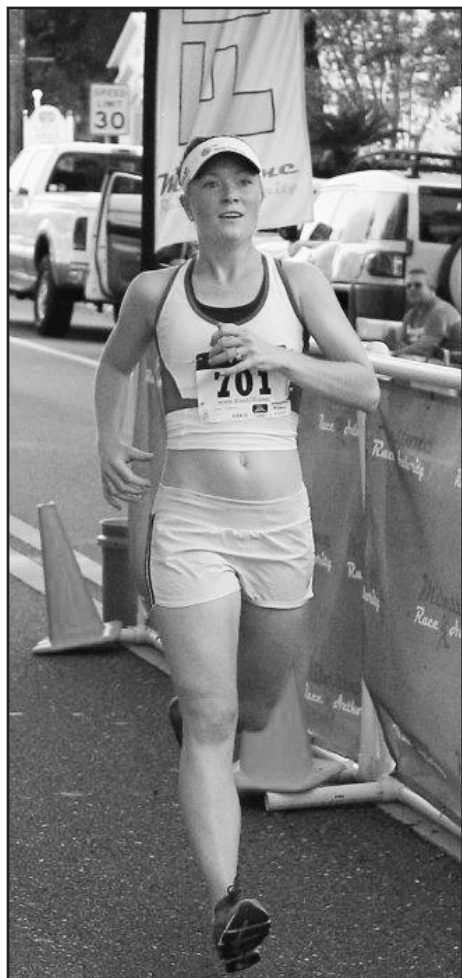

Casias brings Loggerhead expertise to Clay County

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — Fleming Island High graduate Kyle Casias has been through quite the gauntlet of emotions the past couple of years since returning home from a stellar high school career, a stint as a college level swimmer for the U.S. Air Force Academy to having his mentor abruptly pass away to amping up a swim program near his home that brought the circle of swim life right to his doorstep.

Casias, second in the Class 3A 100 yard butterfly for the Golden Eagles in 2010, erupted on to the state swim scene after just four years of bonafide swim interest.

"I was so new to the game back then and it was having a lot of people come together for me at the right time that made it all work," said Casias. "My path is evidence that good parents, good coaches and good teammates are essential to athletic success. That's what I want to do at Magnolia Point."

Casias, now head coach for the Loggerhead Aquatics-Magnolia Point Swim Team, an affiliate of the very strong Loggerhead squad based out of Julington Creek, commented that one of his primary motivations for bringing the Loggerhead brand under head coach Mark Corley, a professional coach since 1984, and the Stroke Doctor methods of former swim guru Shawn Delifus, was simply to eliminate the 45 minute drive from Clay County to Julington Creek.

"Because I live here and had to commute daily over there, I knew that one hour grind," said Casias. "Some of the swimmers here also did the same drive and, about a year ago, I thought, 'Why not bring it here?'"

With Delifus abruptly passing away for unknown reasons about a year and a half ago, the swim community which had em-

braced his energy on numerous pool decks; Barco Newton YMCA, Central Florida YMCA, Pennsylvania and, finally, Julington Creek, it was Casias who joined Delifus when he returned to Julington Creek that connected two significant dots of swim preparation.

"He was a one of a kind motivator and could point out little things with his swimmers," said Casias. "He had that gift. I had the gift of understanding technology. Together, we branded a hybrid coaching style that got swimmers to a more competitive level by connecting physical abilities with mental training and advanced technology such as underwater cameras, mirrors, and virtual reality visuals. Shawn was

able somehow to make kids do things they didn't think they could and then do it with a smile. From my end, the kids love the Go-Pro cameras we use underwater."

After Delifus passed away, Casias, with his direct connection to Delifus' Stroke Doctor brand of coaching, was thrown into the mix with a decision about his next career move. The Delifus family created the Shawn D. Delifus Foundation in 2016, a non-profit swim education program that aims to introduce swimming to low and moderate income families in north Jacksonville. Casias negotiated hard for nearly a year to bring the Loggerhead Aquatics brand to Clay County.

"Look at the swimmers that have come

out of Clay County recently; namely Caeleb Dressel and Ashley Neidigh, both competitors in the recent U.S. Nationals," said Casias. "Dressel (two Olympic gold medals at RIO 2016) is a prime example of the use of mental preparation for excellent results. He's not breaking all those records by chance. Clay County has always had strong swimmers."

Casias, who works with former Fleming Island High teammate Stuart Jamieson, a state level breaststroker and Florida Tech University collegian, and Fleming Island High coach Laura Campbell, who has combined her aquatics exercise expertise with high school level coaching with great results on both fronts, to build a quite formidable amount of coaching firepower for Magnolia Point to build from. Also on Casias' team is noted sports psychologist Joni Neidigh of Orange Park, who runs her Peak Performance Hypnosis program out of her Kingsley Drive office, with Casias to help competitive athletes overcome the mental anxieties of high-level competition.

"The people of Magnolia Point, including owner Trevor Rothfel, have been great to get this started here," said Casias. "We hope to keep building on the entire program."

Casias also commented that the Loggerhead program is not primarily for elite swimmers, but also encourages first time swimmers to inquire. A masters' swim program is also on the docket as a future program. "With the latest news of children drownings in Jacksonville, we do offer beginning swim lessons for parents here as well," said Casias. "Coach Campbell is an expert swim stroke instructor at every level and loves the kids."

FLEMING ISLAND — Most soccer players remember a goal-scoring shot as their most memorable play, but for Longwood University soccer ace Janese Quick, the big play was a corner kick that wound up fueling a higher conference seed last year.

"We were in overtime and setting up for a corner kick in a final conference game before our Big South Conference tournament," said Quick, a Fleming Island High School graduate and now a senior at Longwood, which is in Farmville, Virginia. "I hit my corner shot and one of our players headed the ball in to end the game right there. It was pretty chaotic after that."

Quick's corner kick wound up beat-

ing Presbyterian 1-0 in their final regular season game, their seventh straight win and a second consecutive shutout to end the season. The win gave the Lancers a first round conference tournament game against Gardner Webb College, the fourth seed. Longwood would win in another overtime match with a 4-2 shootout win after regulation time ended at 0-0. In the conference semifinal, Longwood faced top-seed High Point and lost 1-0, also in overtime.

Quick was instrumental in a four year Final Four playoff run for the Golden Eagles including the 2014 Class 4A finals where they eventually lost to Melbourne 2-1 in double overtime. In their 2012 region final against Niceville, Quick delivered a game-winning corner kick to teammate Sara

Urbano to put Fleming Island into the Final Four where George Jenkins won 1-0 in the state semifinal. In 2013, Fleming Island returned to the state semifinal only to lose to Jenkins again, this time in overtime. In 2011, Fleming Island made the state semifinals, but lost to St. Thomas Aquinas. Members of those four Fleming Island teams; Quick, Mikayla Olson, Taylor North, Emily Cooksey, Abby Austin and Kennedy Singleton all have college experience and have also played for the Florida SOL team.

On Fri., July 7, the Florida SOL won 3-0 over Florida Gulf Coast Dutch Lions FC, but in a match scheduled for Sun., July 9 against the Florida Krush, rain cancelled the match. Florida SOL

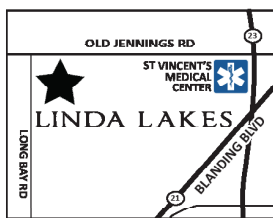

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July to be test of Jags' preparations

JACKSONVILLE – With new faces set for the offensive line, a running back with power, a seasoned quarterback and linebackers among the best in the league as a trio, the Jacksonville Jaguars are set to return to the practice field in mid-July for training camps.

“I don’t know about momentum but we talked to the players about what we’ve been doing to get in shape and get stronger,” said head coach Doug Marrone. “This way, when we come back, we can make a difference. When the players come back in great shape and stronger, we can practice with better tempo and efficiency.”

Marrone repeatedly urged his Jaguar players to come ready to practice with a sense of purpose.

“We have had days of 100 plays run on one day and then 80 on the next day,” said Marrone. “The good teams can keep getting those 100 plays in each day and not have to go back too far to stay up to speed so we can concentrate on execution.”

For third year quarterback Blake Bortles, his fourth season comes with a bit of anxiety to make things work.

“There are still a bunch of little mistakes that we have to fix,” said Bortles. “Mechanically, I think I’m doing alright. We look at the film after each session and assess our techniques.”

One aspect of Marrone’s approach to the first round of practices was to simulate actual game situations. Bortles agreed.

“We have to treat situations in practice like game situations,” said Bortles. “We were notorious for three downs and out on our first game possession. We can’t fumble on the first play. We have to find a way to be successful.”

Rookie running back Leonard Fournette was getting plenty of reps during the OTA sessions and was getting more passes out of the backfield snaps.

“It’s more a mental thing in those first sessions,” said Fournette, out of LSU, “First day, they were throwing a lot at us, like Spanish class. Mentally, knowing the plays, that was what coach Marrone had us working on.”

Fournette commented that the veterans have been instrumental in preparing for the grueling practices.

“I talk to Calais (Campbell) every day, his locker is next to mine,” said Fournette. “I ask him a lot of questions about what I need to do to improve.”

Fournette said anticipating the first day of pads is all about getting ready for the upcoming games.

“Football is the same whether in college or here except that here it’s much faster

finished at 3-4 for the season with a sixth place finish in the Sunshine Division.

"It's great to have seen those players even after high school," said Quick. "I'm thinking my college soccer days will be done after this year so I can start my professional career. I'm glad I have the opportunity to play college soccer."

Quick, a midfield defender for the Lancers, returned home for the summer to play games for the Clay County-based Florida SOL FC womens soccer team at the Clay County Soccer Complex in Eagle Harbor. The Florida SOL team, coached by Wale Leyumi and Luis Torres, is part of the Women's Professional Soccer League and features a gathering of elite incoming young players from area high schools plus college level players also from area high schools including such notables as U.S. Olympian Morgan Brian, Seattle Reign pro Carson Pickett, also an NCAA champion for Florida State University and locals Autumn Woodward of Ridgeview High School, Annie Bobbitt of St. Johns Country Day School and the University of Florida and Brianna LaFontant, a recent graduate of Wofford College and a Ridgeview High standout.

"The value of the Florida SOL team is, first, being able to get game time with elite players from around the country," said Quick, who, during one summer season, played against the Florida SOL as a member of a Tampa-based team. "You just can't replicate game situations with ordinary

summer training and conditioning programs. It's very competitive and the players are coming in just after finishing their spring seasons so they are in great shape."

Torres, the director of the Florida SOL FC program for nearly a decade, concurred that the program offers top-level playing time for college athletes, but that those same college commitments, plus summer jobs and traveling for the players, makes the season and game play unpredictable.

"The girls come in and play as much as they can, but jobs, travel and college commitments keep the roster changing all summer," said Torres. "Still, we have had some great players come through here in Clay County."

Quick returns to Longwood as last year's top scorer for the Lancers with four goals and two assists for 10 points with 31 shots on goal.

"I got there as a defender, but they put me at the midfield spot and gave me chances to take shots," said Quick, who has an older sister, Justine, who played at St. Johns Country Day School and the University of Central Florida. "We keep getting closer and closer to the conference title and should have a good group of new players this year."

Longwood finished 8-10-2 overall, but 7-2-0 at home. The 2017 season is set to open August 18 at Richmond University after an exhibition game against Old Dominion University on August 8.

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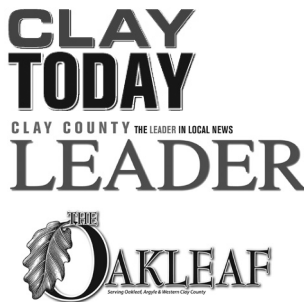

The infrastructure improvements ("Improvements") are currently expected to include, but are not limited to, stormwater management system, roadway improvements, water and sewer systems, recreation improvements, and other improvements, all as more specifically described in the Improvement Plan, on file and available during normal business hours at the address provided above.

The District intends to impose assessments on benefited lands within the District in the manner set forth in the District's *Special Assessment Methodology Report for Assessment Area 1* (the "Assessment Report"), which is on file and available during normal business hours at the address provided above. The Assessment Report identifies each tax parcel identification number within the District and assessments per parcel for each land use category that is currently expected to be assessed. The method of allocating assessments for the Improvements to be funded by the District will initially be determined on an equal assessment per acre basis. Also as described in more detail in the Assessment Report, the District's assessments will be levied against all assessable lands within the District. 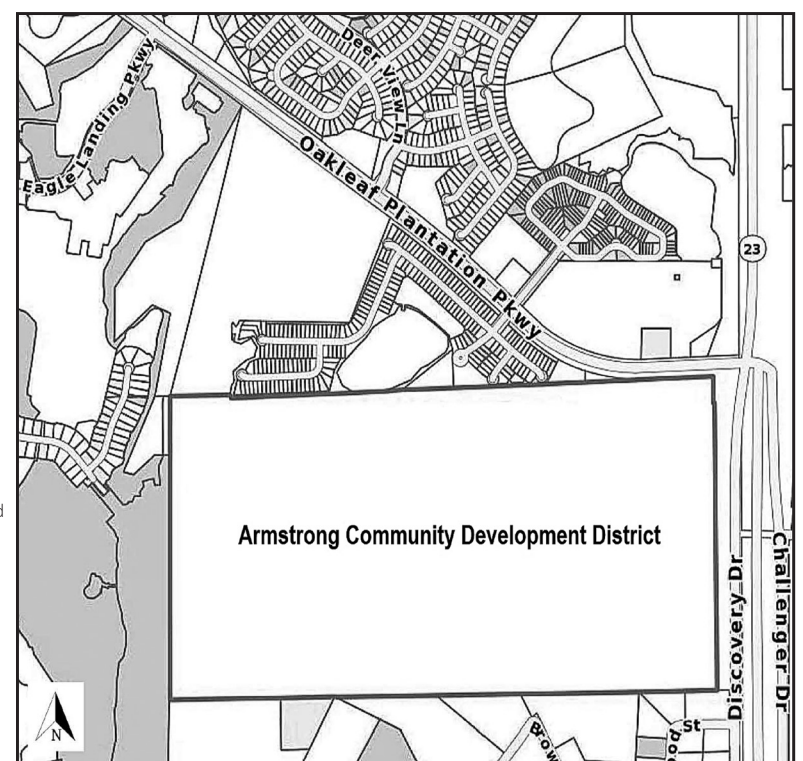

WHEREAS, the District hereby determines that benefits will accrue to the property improved, the amount of those benefits, and that special assessments will be made in proportion to the benefits received as set forth in the draft Special Assessment Methodology Report for Assessment Area 1, dated June 7, 2017, attached hereto as Exhibit B and incorporated herein by reference and on file at the Eagle Landing Sales Center, 3973 Eagle Landing Parkway, Orange Park, Florida 32065 (the "District Records Office"); and

WHEREAS, the District hereby determines that the Assessments to be levied will not exceed the benefit to the property improved.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE ARMSTRONG COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT:

- Assessments shall be levied to defray a portion of the cost of the Improvements.
- The nature and general location of, and plans and specifications for, the Improvements are described in **Exhibit A**, which is on file at the District Records Office. Exhibit B is also on file and available for public inspection at the same location.
- The total estimated cost of the Improvements is \$23,946,153 (the "Estimated Cost").
- The Assessments will defray approximately \$29,600,000, which includes the Estimated Cost, plus financing-related costs, capitalized interest and a debt service reserve.
- The manner in which the Assessments shall be apportioned and paid is set forth in Exhibit B, including provisions for supplemental assessment resolutions.
- The Assessments shall be levied, within the District, on all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or bounding and abutting upon the Improvements or specially benefitted thereby and further designated by the assessment plat hereinafter provided for.
- There is on file, at the District Records Office, an assessment plat showing the area to be assessed, with certain plans and specifications describing the Improvements and the estimated cost of the Improvements, all of which shall be open to inspection by the public.
- Commencing with the year in which the Assessments are levied and confirmed, the Assessments shall be paid in not more than (30) thirty annual installments. The Assessments may be payable at the same time and in the same manner as are ad-valorem taxes and collected pursuant to Chapter 197, Florida Statutes; provided, however, that in the event the uniform non-ad valorem assessment method of collecting the Assessments is not available to the District in any year, or if determined by the District to be in its best interest, the Assessments may be collected as is otherwise permitted by law.
- The District Manager has caused to be made a preliminary assessment roll, in accordance with the method of assessment described in **Exhibit B** hereto, which shows the lots and lands assessed, the amount of benefit to and the assessment against each lot or parcel of land and the number of annual installments into which the assessment may be divided, which assessment roll is hereby adopted and approved as the District's preliminary assessment roll.
- The Board shall adopt a subsequent resolution to fix a time and place at which the owners of property to be assessed or any other persons interested therein may appear before the Board and be heard as to the propriety and advisability of the assessments or the making of the Improvements, the cost thereof, the manner of payment therefore, or the amount thereof to be assessed against each property as improved.
