GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Clay County voters made history Aug. 30 by electing the first African American sheriff and, for the second election cycle in a row, ousted an incumbent school superintendent and incumbent school board member.

Oakleaf resident and former Chief of Jails for Duval County, Darryl Daniels, defeated three opponents to become Clay County's next sheriff. Also an Oakleaf resident, Addison Davis defeated Superintendent Charlie Van Zant Jr., who is currently

Daniels received 14,503 votes or 53.45 percent to defeat former Clay County Sheriff's Office undersheriff Craig Aldrich

Daniels wins sheriff's office seat

ORANGE PARK - In what may have been

the most expensive political race in Clay County history, Clay voters elected Darryl Daniels, a retired Jacksonville Sheriff's Office jails chief, as the new sheriff in Tuesday's primary. A total of \$341.513 in cash and in-kind contributions was

collected among the four candidates The race was open to all voters since there was not a declared write-in for the

November election, so with 35.42 percent of the electorate behind him, Daniels becomes the first candidate to fill the sheriff's shoes in 12 years as Sheriff Rick Beseler steps down after his fourth term. Daniels will be Clay County's first African American sheriff.

Daniels beat out fellow Republican candidate Craig Aldrich, the retired Clay County undersheriff. Aldrich offered stiff competition as Daniels' toughest opponent, losing by just under six percent of the vote. Daniels also defeated James Jett. former county clerk of courts and Harold Rutledge, a former law enforcement officer and county commissioner.

Clay County Memories

The third Magnolia Springs Hotel, Queen of Clay County's tourist hotels

In 1881, Boston hotelier, Isaac Cruft, welcomed guests to his newly-built and posh Magnolia Springs resort hotel on the west bank of the St. Johns River just north of Governors Creek.


For almost three decades Florida tourists, invalids and investors came and filled her 200-plus rooms, suites and five privately-owned three-story cottages to capacity of more than 800 during the peak of the winter season.

Croft designed his complex to provide a successful balance of pampered luxury and exotic adventure. Magnolia Springs offered something for everyone and every age.

Some guests were delivered to the site by riverboat after a breathtaking trip along the St. Johns River from Jacksonville. Others arrived by train and traversed the golf course by mule-powered tram to the hotel.

Each new group of arrivals at the end of the 600-foot hotel pier was greeted by the resident brass band and took refreshments in the two-story, pagoda styled party house.

Guests arriving by train were served spring water and champagne at the gothic inspired train station that also served as the golf course clubhouse. After imbibing, the guests with their copious baggage of steamer trunks and carpet bags, were transported to the hotel in a mule drawn tram.



Dripping in gingerbread decked porches, the Magnolia Springs Resort Hotel perched on a rise 90 feet back from the shore of the St. Johns River. The main hotel façade stretched 175 feet wide and to a height of five stories.

The main building encompassed more than 60,000 square feet. The first floor provided a billiard room, storage, mechanical space and sleeping rooms for the hotel staff. The second story held offices, parlors and reading and writing rooms. The well-appointed dining room with its multitude of mirrors, stained glass windows and ornate furnishings was also on this floor offering a spectacular view of the river.

Communication throughout the enclave

was provided by wire. Guests in far-flung areas could summon staff, relay a request to the kitchen or laundry, arrange an excursion to hunt, fish or schedule riding lessons at the stable housing more than 40 horses trained in dressage, jumping or pleasure riding.

An in-house telegraph office kept vacationing moguls in touch with their minions. Newspapers from around the world arrived daily.

Particularly popular with the gentlemen were the Boston Girls who wandered the dining room, parlors and piazzas with large silver pitchers of chilled spring water refilling guest's silver goblets. The lovely damsels, as much of the staff, worked the winter season in Florida then returned to Boston to work in Isaac Cruft's hotels in that city.

The operation of the hotel's new technology created quite a stir one evening. In the early 1880's, many feared Edison's electric lights so the hotel was equipped with gas light fixtures inside and used electric generators only to provide exterior landscape and architectural lighting.

Electric illumination fixtures required only a flick of a switch somewhere deep in the bowels of the basement. Well, it seems an amorous guest and one of the lovely Boston Girls slipped into the shadows of the shrubbery to steal a kiss when the outside lights came on. They are said to have bowed to applauding onlookers and hastily fled

When clients began to drift further south in the early 1900s, the hotel closed for lack of business and later became home to Florida Military Academy. The grand dame of Clay County hotels burned to the ground in November 11, 1923.

passed away Monday.

Clayton E. Revels, 86, of Green Cove Springs, died peacefully in his home with his family by his side on Aug. 29. Owner of Revels Chrysler-Plymouth in Green Springs, Cove

Revels Chrysler-Plymouth Dodge in Starke and Palatka, and Revels Nationwide RV Sales in Green Cove Springs and Jacksonville, he will be remembered as a business man who contributed to the community.

"Clayton was the ideal community person," said Van Royal, Green Cove Springs city council member and former mayor. "Friends and family meant a lot to him, and he treated the people of Green Cove Springs like family. He was committed to the community with his philanthropy, from the food pantry to helping with various buildings."

Revels, who was born on April 8, 1930 in Mayo, Fla. to parents Clayton and Thelma (Long) Revels Sr., was a member of First Coast Baptist Church and was on the board of the Baptist International Missions

He pastored for 15 years in Clay County and will be dearly missed by his loving family and friends. The senior center on Walnut Street was named the Clayton and Mildred Revels Center in his honor.

"He was an outstanding, communityminded man," said Joan Bazley of the Council on Aging of Clay County. "Our seniors are indebted to him for all that he did. He was a fine gentleman."

Among his philanthropic work, Revels donated \$500,000 toward the construction of the senior center on Walnut Street in Green Cove Springs.

"He was very up-front, very likable," Royal said. "You have to chuckle, because he always liked a little back-and-forth and making deals. He was a character. I was very fond of him. It was a very rewarding, enjoyable experience being his friend."

Revels was preceded in death by his parents, his wife Mildred Moody Revels, son-in-law Mark Brown, brother J.P. Revels and his sister, Gwen Keen. Survivors include his daughters, Rhonda Revels Brown of Georgia and Trina Revels Baker and husband Rick of Green Cove Springs; brother Jack Revels and wife Vivian of Green Cove Springs; sister Kay Harrison and husband Jim of Jacksonville; granddaughters Melissa Hildebrand, Melodie Wimberly, Melinda Edgy and Chelsi Baker-Shaw; and 11 grandchildren and one on the way.

The family will receive friends from 6 p.m. until 8 p.m. on Sept. 1, 2016 in the Broadus-Raines Chapel.

Funeral services will be held at 11 a.m. Friday, Sept. 2, 2016 at Russell Baptist Church with Rev. Gary Wimberly officiating.

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Snapshots of a 75-year marriage

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - In the Spring of 1941, Delmar and Opal Lewis both agree this happened.

When Delmar's commanding officer denied his leave request from the U.S. Marine Corps, 20-year-old, stubborn Delmar went absent without leave. He walked off base with nothing but two duffle bags of raw tobacco slung over his shoulder, hitchhiked for more than 1,800 miles from San Diego, California to St. Louis, Missouri, ate his meals off a Samaritan's dime and slept in backseats for three days in order to marry his high school sweetheart, Opal.

Delmar's stunt cemented a marriage between the two that has survived 24 wars. Last Thursday, the two held a quiet 75-year anniversary with family and friends inside their doublewide trailer.

Before their marriage could begin, however. Delmar owed Opal an explanation for why he showed up to her door. He explained what it meant to leave AWOL, how he left without permission right before his squadron deployed and would spend time in "the brig" for it.

Then he had to explain what the brig

"I guess I was happy with him," Opal said.

They married in a living room surrounded by relatives and "Missouri hicks,"

as Opal called them. All the jobs had dried when he did," Opal said. up at that time in post-Great Depression America and cash was rare - let alone cash to spare on a honeymoon. So they decided against it.

Opal dubbed herself a "Depression kid" and defined herself by her and Delmar's ability to stretch a penny from San Diego to St. Louis. The jobs wouldn't return until December when Japanese soldiers bombed Pearl Harbor, which dragged the U.S. into World War II and created an explosion in the manufacturing industry.

Then, as quickly as he appeared, Delmar returned to San Diego where he turned himself in and spent the next year in jail. There, Delmar learned the Japanese sank a fleet in the waters around Wake Island in the Central Pacific Ocean - his fleet.

"It was fate that he walked out of there

While Delmar waited in jail, Opal realized she was pregnant.

But Opal and Delmar didn't see each other for the next four years. While his son grew, Delmar traveled from island to island in the Pacific for the remainder of the war.

The letters came every day and on holidays. Opal could make stacks of letters the size of Ottomans, so eventually she had to start throwing them out. The letters were simple, "love you," they said. They wrote about what they ate for lunch and the "news of the day," but they eventually grew bored and started writing letters with jumbled lines and intricate spiral patterns so they had to work to find out what each other were saying.



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Elected unopposed, pols must decide what to do with leftover campaign cash



With nearly \$3.5 million in the bank and no races to spend it on, some Florida lawmakers are left figuring out what to do with the last of their campaign cash.

While their colleagues are sweating out contested races, 42 members of the House and Senate are looking for ways to spend down the war chests they didn't end up needing. They have a few options, and just about a month left to decide what they're doing with the extra dough.

State law requires candidates to dispose of any surplus funds within 90 days of either being elected, eliminated or winning unopposed. That means the more three

Plan for the future now

There will be thousands upon thousands getting help in our hospitals, nursing homes, and health system in the coming

vears, as Generation X finds a way to care for their Boomer parents. Imagine the difficult place that many will put their families in, not knowing what to do when faced with inevitable effects of aging, chronic illness, and weakening of a body's

systems. There will be a premium placed on conversations occurring between family members beforehand about what kind of medical care they want, and what kind they don't.

It is incumbent upon each of us to sit down and talk about our medical wishes with our loved ones, and appoint someone who you know will carry out your wishes to the letter. In Florida, unless someone has guardianship over you, no one can go against your wishes for medical care--if you are in a state of health that will allow your voice to be heard.

If you don't have an Advanced Directive, you owe it to your family to make one. It is the document with which your voice — and choice — will be heard, even when you are too ill to make a sound. An Advanced Directive guides the healthcare team to help your family members under-

stand what is going on with your health, as well as guide decision-making when it comes to the tests, procedures, machines, and where or when you are transitioned in your care.

The hospitals in our area have begun using a tool known as Honoring Choices Florida, a document that you can complete yourself or with the help of a certified facilitator. It shows you how to have the conversation with the persons you choose as primary and secondary healthcare surrogates

You get to decide if you want to receive life-saving measures or whether you would like to be made comfortable, should the healthcare team determine you are nearing the end of your life. Imagine again leaving with your family the understanding that the document is highly regarded by local hospitals as most clearly spelling out what you feel is in your best interest. You may choose to have the conversation with your physician, and completing Advanced Directives with patients is now an allowable medical procedure under Medicare rules.

Whatever document you choose, please remember to discuss this important issue with those in your peer groups, churches, social gatherings when appropriate. It's not taboo, it's a reality of life.

Voters spoke, questions remain

Months of walking neighborhoods, attending political forums, buying ads,

posting messages on social media, paying expensive political consultants and general water cooler-type conversations came to end Tuesday for most of the candidates seeking office in this year's primary held Aug. 30.

Clay County voters proved once again that a tide may be turning here.

Voters elected two men who hail from Duval County, or at least that was the message put out during the campaigns of Addison Davis for school superintendent and Darryl Daniels for sheriff. However, in the sheriff's race, Daniels' supporters downplayed his Duval ties, while Davis' detractors played up his role as second-in-command of one of the largest public school districts in the U.S.

Are these two races an example of what could be labeled a new era for Clay County or perhaps voters proved they simply wanted a change? Or, more specifically, did voters simply decide they wanted a professional educator leading their school district. I'd venture a guess that the same people who painted Davis as "going to bring Duval's failing education system to Clay County" were also some of the same people who supported Daniels.

The bottom line is either way, the voters have decided.

Meanwhile, Davis prepares to face Rebekah Shively, a Clay County teacher with a doctorate in educational leadership, in the November general election and Daniels gets to take office in November without getting 50 percent or more of the vote due to the fact that the Florida Legislature years ago killed the run-off system for voters.

And, regardless of the outcome, Clay County voters and residents who did not vote will get to see how things shake out in the coming months.

Will the fraud investigation involving School Superintendent Charlie Van Zant Jr. move forward?

I'd venture to say parents whose children are in Exceptional Student Education want to know how the investigation plays out. After all, the school board chairman, Johnna McKinnon, acted on her own without board approval to ask the Florida Association of District School Superintendents to investigate the allegations as of the last board meeting on Aug. 18. And the voters held McKinnon accountable as well on Aug. 30 as she went down in defeat to educator and challenger Mary Bolla, who pledged to be a fulltime school board member.

Will morale among teachers improve knowing the school district has new leadership heading their way come November?

I was told Tuesday night at the victory celebration for Davis, Bolla and school board member Carol Studdard — who campaigned as "Team ABC" — that Duval County residents probably heard the cheering from the Wells Road Holiday Inn when the results for the election were announced. She said the cheers among the 200-plus in attendance were exhilarating and joyous.

In the meantime, we will now get to see how Daniels plans to make good on different campaign ideas he presented during the run up to the election.

What will his idea of establishing a



Munro, who turned 100 on Aug. 20, said love is essential for living a good life.

"We're a very close family. I talk with them often. I'm on Facebook and if I don't get email from them, we're on Facebook, so keeping in touch with each other and loving each other, it just rubs off on everybody else in my family. They're all very loving," Munro said at her birthday party Aug. 20 attended by more than 100 family members and guests.

Munro has six children, 19 grandchildren, 29 great grandchildren and 13 greatgreat grandchildren.

A Massachusetts native, Avis Munro

and her late husband Ronald Munro moved to Orange Park in 1984 and became involved in the community. They joined St. Giles Presbyterian Church and got involved in the Scottish Highland games. In 2007, the couple were honored to serve as heads of Clan Munro, which was named the honorary clan at the Northeast Florida Scottish Games and Festival held yearly at the Clay County Fairgrounds.

"My husband and I traveled over to Scotland five times. We've had meals with the chief and his wife. We've eaten a number of times at the [Munro] castle," she said.

The Munro Scottish heritage took center stage at her birthday celebration. Art Tinney, a member of the First Coast Highlanders – formerly the Clay County Sheriff's Office Pipes and Drums Corps – played "Scotland the Brave" on bagpipes to kick off the party. Party organizers played a video of her great grandson, Travis Lee, 23, a music student at Brigham Young Uni-

Lee, a graduate of Middleburg High School, was also wearing the traditional Munro kilt that his great-grandfather – Avis Munro's late husband – used to wear at the Scottish Games.

Avis Munro said shortly after she and

her husband got married, they would travel to cemeteries in New England and search for graves of distant Munro relatives. Their journeys became a lifetime of researching genealogy and together publishing a book about the Clan Munro that is housed in the

Her grandson David Munro, 56, and his wife traveled 1,900 miles by motorcycle from Capitan, New Mexico to attend the birthday celebration. He said his fondest childhood memories were while "sitting at grandma's feet" listening to her stories from childhood.

"Grandma would tell about those stories and they were just fantastic to sit there and listen." David said.

Bernie "Pat" Munro, 58, of Cape Coral, Fla., recalls tagging along with his grand-parents on those after-dinner walks, but would bail out after about a half of a mile.

"That two weeks of my life, when I was probably 10 or 12-years-old, it's a time in my life that I will never forget," Bernie Munro said

He said, along with the after-dinner walks, he recalls his grandmother preparing healthy meals and simply having a balanced life.

"Ever since I could remember, she was always preparing a very balanced meal with vegetables and fruits and very healthy food and between the healthy foods, the healthy lifestyle and the walking every day, I think that's what has gotten her to 100," Bernie Munro said.



Their options are limited. Return a portion back to donors or donate to charity. Set aside \$20,000 for their re-election

campaign, give up to \$25,000 to their party, or transfer some to an office account.

And for some candidates, the best answer to do a little bit of everything.

Fleming Island
Republican Rob
Bradley won reelection in June

when no one challenged him in the newly drawn Senate District 5. The district is much larger than his current Senate district and includes 10 full counties.

"I spent a lot of time after session up until qualifying getting to know the counties in the Senate district," said Bradley. "I spent a great deal of time and effort getting to know the nine new counties I was going to represent."

To do that, Bradley raised \$481,756 toward his official campaign. Records show he spent \$201,708 through June 24, the last day of qualifying, much of which dedicated to advertising. Bradley said he sent a lot of mailers and was active on social media to try to convince voters he was the right man for the job.

It worked, but it left him with \$280,047 in his campaign account.

So what's he going to do with it? Brad-

ley said he was giving \$25,000 to the party to help with Senate re-election campaigns. He's also planning to set aside \$40,000 — or \$10,000 a year for each year he'll be in office — to fund his office account. The rest of the money will be given to charities, most likely ones that help at-risk teens and children in his district.

Of the 42 House and Senate candidate who were elected unopposed earlier this summer, Bradley ranked among the Top 5 fundraisers this election cycle. Lauren Book, an Aventura, Fla. Democrat, was in the top spot.

Book, a first-time candidate and a child abuse advocate, didn't garner an opponent this election cycle. Some of it might have been name recognition, but a healthy war chest didn't hurt. Records show Book raised \$586.659.

Steve Vancore, a Democratic political consultant who worked with Book, said she made sure to communicate with her would-be constituents early on in the campaign. She qualified by the petition method, working the community to get twice as many of the signatures she needed to get on the ballot.

"It's a poor strategy not to be spending money," said Vancore. "It takes a lot to get on the ballot by petition. You want to do polling, so you're not freaking out, and you should be communicating with voters in the late spring and early summer."

Records show Book had \$203,074 in the bank as of June 24. Among other things, Vancore said Book planned to send a "thank you" communication to voters in the district with her leftover funds. State law allows candidates to purchase "thank you" advertising for up to 75 days after a candidate withdraws, is unopposed, is eliminated or elected.

Other top fundraisers included Sen.

Denise Grimsley, who raised \$371,021; George Gainer, who raised \$324,217 and loaned his campaign \$500,000; and House Speaker Designate Richard Corcoran, who raised \$305,345. Majority Leader Bill Galvano raised \$269,415, while Sen. Wilton Simpson raised \$260,560. Both Galvano and Simpson are in line for the Senate presidency.

Corcoran and Rep. Jim Boyd were the only House members who were among the Top 10 fundraisers elected unopposed. Boyd raised \$169,150. Corcoran had \$79,618 in the bank.

A spokesman for Corcoran said the Land O'Lakes Republican planned to give the maximum \$25,000 donation to the party, do paid "thank you" ads, and donate at least \$25,000 to several organizations, including Guiding Star Tampa/Life Choices Women's Care, Volunteer Way, New Life Solutions, Oasis Pregnancy Center, and the West Pasco Pregnancy Center.

Senate candidates might have dominated the list of Top 10 fundraisers elected unopposed, but plenty of House candidates raised big money.

Thirty House candidates were elected without opposition, who had a combined \$1.5 million in the bank.

Rep. Dane Eagle was among those House candidates to go unchallenged. He raised \$125,511, and had \$44,575 left.

Elected in 2010, this was the first time Eagle has won a race unopposed. He was prepared to run a full-fledged campaign this year and was ready to do that until the last minute. He said he used his campaign account for radio ads to keep constituents informed.

Eagle gave some of his surplus funds to local charities and the party. He said he was doing his part to help make sure the House retains a Republican majority.

"Fortunately for myself and my colleagues in Southwest Florida, it's a Republican stronghold so you can keep it in Republican hands, but there's other parts of the state where it's 50-50," he said. "(We're doing) as much as we can help bring those people back, and bring people I've worked with back that are darn good legislators."



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

Penny sales tax extended

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Clay County voters put in their two cents on election

Well, actually just one-cent.

The referendum to extend the county's penny sales tax for 20 years passed by

an overwhelming margin in Tuesday's primary. Out of 41,382 votes cast, 30,691 or 74 percent, were in favor of the extension.

'We're very happy about it, very pleased," said Bill Garrison, president of the Clay County Economic Development Corp., who has been an outspoken proponent of the 1-cent tax.

"Clay County runs on a lean budget and is fiscally

conservative," Garrison said. "We're not adding any new taxes; this is an existing tax. It helps business growth and helps maintain a high quality of life here, which attracts new businesses.'

Since 1990, the penny tax – one cent per dollar for purchases of \$5,000 or

less – has generated approximately \$290 million in revenue. It currently brings in \$16.5 million per year. Projections for future revenue, according to the Board of County Commissioners, approach \$21 million annually.

The tax was set to expire on December 31, 2019. If the extension hadn't passed


this year, the next chance to vote on it would have been 2018

"It supports the capital budgets for the county in a very meaningful way," said George Egan, chief executive officer of the Reinhold Corp. "It goes to capital projects, like roads, the Fleming Island library, the courthouse, an animal shelter, the jail."

Egan's company donated \$15,000 to "A Better Clay For All Of Us," a political action committee that supported extending the tax. Several construction and realty companies donated as well, with the PAC receiving a total of \$72,350

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Make your yard a little more wild

The chirping of birds, the scurrying of lizards, the fluttering of butterflies, and the occasional sign of a squirrel – all of these are a part of the natural Florida environment that people visit parks, zoos, and nature preserves to see. However, these can all become an attractive, and helpful, part of your yard.

One of the University of Florida/IFAS Florida-Friendly Landscape Practices is to attract wildlife. Wildlife species provide a sensory experience to your garden, with colors, movement for the eyes and songs for the ears. Many of these creatures also provide essential services such as pest control and pollination.

If you would like to bring out your garden's wild-side, providing cover is one of the first steps. Animals normally do not like being out in the open so providing them places to hide and nest will help attract them. These can range from plants and shrubs, to brush-piles, to snags, which are standing or fallen dead, decaying trees.

Nesting boxes can also be added to the landscape, with birdhouses, bat houses and owl boxes being common. While also being of visual and auditory interest, these creatures also provide pest control with birds and especially bats eating mosquitoes and other insects and owls consuming many rodents.

A water source should also be provided for the wildlife and can be a bird-bath or small pond. Check the water regularly for mosquito larvae, as they can breed in still water and become an issue. If the water is deep enough and filtered, fish can be added and the water source will also allow amphibians, such as frogs and toads to breed. You can tell this is happening if tadpoles appear.

Plants chosen for the landscape should also provide a food source for the creatures you want to attract. Common food sources for wildlife include seeds, vegetation, fruits and pollen. Seeds can be provided by sunflowers, acorns from oaks, millets and grasses and many other species. Some wildlife will feed on the leaves and stems of the

plants, but in a native landscape this is to be expected.

Fruit trees such as persimmons, Chickasaw plum, and peaches provide a high sugar treat, as well as bushes and vines such as grapes – bunch and muscadine – blackberries, and blueberries.

Wildlife gardens will also often contain plants to attract pollinators, such as butterflies and bees. The plants have colorful, showy flowers to attract the insects and provide them with food in the form of pollen and nectar. These insects then provide the service of spreading genetic material from one flower to another. Reptiles, such as lizards, snakes, and tortoises should be welcomed as they provide pest control and visual interest.

By providing backyard habitat to wildlife, you are helping to provide homes for animals that were displaced by human activities and working towards Florida-Friendly Landscape Principles.







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Long road to recovery for Middleburg man

MIDDLEBURG — A Middleburg man who sustained multiple injuries when a drunken driver hit his tent while participating in the Register's Annual Great Bicycle Ride Across Iowa last month still faces a long road to recovery.

According to family members, it's already been a crazy ride.

James Foley, 67, slept in a tent propped at the 59er Motel & Campgrounds in Shenandoah, Iowa on the night of July 24 when the drunken driver of a pickup truck plowed through his tent, dragging Foley nearly 50 feet.

Helicopters rushed Foley 46 miles from Shenandoah to Creighton University Medical Center in Omaha where he was treated for critical injuries.

Doctors have performed eight surgeries on Foley since the accident, including a complete reconstruction on half of his pelvis. Foley's injuries are more stable now and he recently was able to go outside for the first time in more than a month with

the help of a wheelchair, so his family is hopeful.

They believe Foley will be able to be transferred to a Clay County hospital in the next two weeks.

"He's seen better days, but each day he's getting better," said Adam Foley, James' son. "He was able to talk yesterday to my sister on the phone. He's been through a lot, don't know if the worst is over yet, but every day is a positive outlook for us."

For Foley, this year marked 14 years of consecutive participation in the event, sometimes called the cyclist mecca of the United States. Cyclists ride approximately 500 miles during the course of the week to the eastern edge of the state, essentially the Mississippi River.

Program directors use the \$175 entry fee to cover costs of the event including round-the-clock policing of the approximately 10,000 riders throughout the week and night supervision of approved campsites.

James and his team of 15, dubbed "The Foley Boys" did not officially register this year and therefore were barred from approved campsites.

Many who participate do not officially register or follow the policed route, increasing the likelihood of accidents related to the event. Non-registered cyclists boost the bicycles on the road during the event to approximately 20,000.

"Our number one concern is to get the bikes safely across from the western part of the state to the eastern part of the state," said Sgt. Scott Bright with the Iowa State Patrol. "One concern we have in law enforcement is alcohol, that's one of the big concerns we see even with some of the riders going into the small towns and overnight towns and drinking along the way."

So far online fundraising has helped Adam Foley bring in \$35,000 to help pay for his father's medical bills, a bill he said could surpass millions of dollars.

RAGBRAI riders are a tight-knit group, so word of James Foley's accident spread throughout Iowa and throughout the cyclist community quickly. Other fundraisers have

popped up along the state, mostly through mom-and-pop stores and the cyclists themselves.

"Whenever anyone is injured out there our hearts go out to the families," said T.J. Juskiewicz, RAGBRAI director. "[The Foleys have] been to Iowa quite a few times for the event so people knew who they were. For someone as far away as Florida, they keep coming back to Iowa, obviously they enjoy the event and enjoy the people they've met over the years."

Juskiewicz said RAGBRAI would help promote fundraising efforts and didn't expect any changes to the way the event is policed in the future.

On the same day as James' accident, a vehicle struck Wayne Ezell, 72, of Jacksonville while he travelled westbound on U.S. Highway 34. At the same time, RAGB-RAI cyclists were preparing for the event's

first "Mile of Silence" to remember fellow cyclists who were injured or killed while cycling.

The goal, Adam Foley said, is to get his dad cycling again. Adam and his brother Josh haven't been able to accompany James through the weeklong ride through Iowa in many years, however Adam said he wants the three of them to go together again next July.

"It's kind of like a bonding thing we did with my dad riding across the state," Adam said. "It's kind of like a dad and his boys. It's an older vacation, where you're old and you get done with a

long day and you share a drink with your dad."





Opal worked in a San Diego parachute factory during the war, but she was 19 at the time and had trouble finding a place to live.

"This woman walked up to me, I never will forget it," Opal said. "She said I have a place you can stay, I have a room that has a door leading outside to a back porch. If you would like to stay there, you can."

The woman, "Mrs. Young," let Opal live rent-free in a one-room apartment overlooking a single lemon tree.

"Everyone said I took her daughter's place," Opal said. "She had been killed in an accident the summer before."

Mrs. Young's four sons all served during wartime. One disappeared as a prisoner of war, so Mrs. Young waited in the building by the lemon tree for him to come home for five

Delmar was the first person to hear from Mrs. Young's son.

"When I was in combat in Guam, I found a picture of our backyard, took it off of a dead Jap," Delmar said. "In that picture, our landlady was standing under the lemon tree out there.'

The solider took the picture from Mrs. Young's son while he was in the prison camp. Naturally, Delmar was astonished.

After the war when Mrs. Young's son returned, he was never quite the same. He came back more bones than skin from five vears of starvation. His ankle bones deteriorated while in the prison camp, making him almost incapable of walking without breaking them.

"He went over a kid and came back an old man," Opal said. "Can you imagine?"

In late 1945 after the war was over, Delmar came home and met his son for the first time. He left the Marines and joined the Army as a sergeant and Opal gave birth to a daughter. Things were good. Delmar said. Then the Vietnam War started.

Delmar left and the letters came flooding back, letters about how soldiers would hunt tigers in their spare time, the meals he ate from cartons, cans and trays. "Love you," the letters said.

The Army sent Delmar back to San Diego for a month-long vacation in 1964 and he put in for retirement before the month was up. Delmar got quiet when asked why.

Delmar and Opal, now in their 90s. find ways to pass the time. Delmar writes poems about Opal and the past – although there doesn't seem to be much distinction between the two anymore. Opal makes scrapbooks and talks about her children, who have both been married nearly 50 vears. They reminisce about the lemon tree. about letters written in code and the time 75 years ago when Delmar showed up on Opal's doorstep 1,800 miles away from where he should have been, but inches away from where he needed to be. "We have been very, very lucky," Opal said.



First babies born at St. Vincent's new Family Birth Place

MIDDLEBURG — Although they're not playmates yet, Michael Harris and Scarlett Abrecht already have something in common as the first babies born at St. Vincent's Medical Center Clay County's new Family Birth Place.

"It just happened that I was the first person to deliver, it just happened by chance," said Virginia Harris of Middleburg, Michael Harris' mother. "I thought that was kind of cool."

Swaddled in zip blankets and born only an hour and a half apart on Aug. 23, Harris and Abrecht look around at a completely new world. Last Tuesday, St. Vincent's Healthcare showed a new world to expecting parents to be in Middleburg and all over Clay County.

The J. Wayne and Delores Barr Weaver Women and Infants Pavilion added 12 state-of-the-art patient rooms and marked the completion of St. Vincent's \$33.1 million expansion on its Middleburg facility.

The addition, nearly a year in the making, has 56 associates all educated in neo-

natology, 24-hour security and a certified lactation counselor to help teach first time mothers how to breastfeed properly.

"I had a great doctor, everything was lickety-split," said Sarah Abrecht of Green Cove Springs, mom of Scarlett Abrrecht. "Originally, we didn't think we'd make it here... they were great, they kept popping in 'can we get you anything, can we help you with anything.'"

For the Abrecht and Harris families however, their favorite feature seemed to be the 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. room service. The first of its kind in Clay County, patients can upgrade their meals through a concierge service for food reminiscent of five-star hotels that offer such fare as steak and lobster dinners

Also through the concierge service, patients can upgrade their bed linens, premium robes, baby clothes and equipment.

One of the most important features of the new facility, however, might just be the rooms themselves, which contain all the equipment necessary to deliver babies.

"That gives these moms the opportunity to stay in one room from admission to discharge...they don't have to go to another

room," said Priscilla Lagmay, nurse manager. "That's just a feature not all facilities have and it's just some [parents] really enjoy."

The entire facility is setup to reduce stress to the parents before and during delivery as well as when they get home. Patients can come back to the facility after birth and ask questions to lactation counselors that might have slipped their minds while they were in the birthing facility.

Abrecht said the entire experience was stress free. Likewise, the calming atmosphere rubbed off on baby Scarlett. "She's not fussy at all, she's very relaxed," she said.

The Abrechts delivered their first daughter, Sophia, 10 years ago at St. Vincent's in Augusta, Ga. This time, baby Scarlett will have an older sister "eager" to help care for her.

It took them nearly a decade to decide on if they even wanted a new baby or not.

"We were tossing it around for like the last 10 years," Abrecht said. "We talked about it and decided we were getting too old so we should probably do it if we were going to."

While her experience was stress free, Abrecht said the first thing she's going to do is take a shower and sit down in her rocking chair for a few minutes.

"That's all I want to do, just sit down and relax," she said. "Just get back into the groove of being home."

Michael and Scarlet were the first born at St. Vincent's new birthing suite, but reactions are good and hopes are high. Lagmay said she hopes to see plenty of new faces in the facility, which means plenty of new faces in Clay County.

TALLAHASSEE – High school saltwater fishing teams are encouraged to apply for grants before the application deadline of Sept. 15.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, along with the Fishing League Worldwide Foundation and The Bass Federation's Student Angler Federation, have made \$500 Recreational Boating & Fishing Foundation grants available to

saltwater teams and clubs in Florida.

This grant program encourages the creation and success of Florida high school fishing teams and clubs, with a particular emphasis placed on establishing new high school angling teams and supporting existing ones in schools with diverse student populations. The grants were originally only available to freshwater student anglers, but are now also available to saltwater student anglers.

The program will provide grants of up to \$500 per club or team to assist with expenses related to fishing team or clubsponsored tournaments, team jerseys, insurance and education for novice anglers. Supported teams and clubs will also partner with the FWC, FLW Foundation and The Bass Federation to complete a conservation project. 



Having good vision is important for us all, but when your vocation requires you be exact, it's even more so. Sharon Rebar is a busy hair stylist. Her clients love her because she gives them the hair styles they want, with precision and finesse.

"Now the hard work begins," Daniels wrote on social media. "Our win will be making Clay County a better place for all. We will be out in the community and Sheriff's Office. Please let us know what we can do to make things better. Thank you and let's get to work."

Voters from Clay and Duval similarly flocked to social media to express their excitement.

"Congratulations," said Sandy Roberts Russell of Green Cove Springs. "The only thing that I want is big city ideas on how to handle the big city crime coming to the county."

Daniels has yet to identify specific initiatives he will take in November. Instead, Daniels focused on walking neighborhoods to increase community engagement with the sheriff's office, something he falsely touted he would pioneer during a June 24 debate.

During the campaign, Daniels was able to garner support from influential voters. Greg Clary, a member of the Clay County Development Authority, said he supported Daniels because he believes in the initiatives Daniels has proposed.

"I agree with all of the initiatives, from community policing and bridging the gap between the citizenry and policing," Clary said. "It's a lot of work to make sure that community relationships get stronger and stronger."

Clary also said he supported Daniels because he believes he will be tough on crime

Daniels also promised to make schools safer, likewise without offering initiatives or actions he would take to do so once elected. Daniels instead preferred to talk about his accomplishments and qualifications for sheriff at debates.

"We'll see if he follows through with his promises he's made to the county — time will tell, four years will tell," Rutledge said. "I think if he does, then this will become an even better county. I pray for him and wish him the best of luck."

Although all sheriff candidates brought in substantial sums of money from campaign contributions, Daniels exceeded all other candidates with more than \$141,000 raised since January 2015.

Since January 2015, Daniels spent \$101,000 of his contributions on the political consultation firm Reliant Florida in, a substantially higher sum than any other Reliant Florida clients in Clay County.

A longtime resident of Clay County, Daniels moved to the area after he enlisted in the U.S. Navy at 17.

Daniels was honorably discharged eight years later and soon started work in the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office in the patrol division.

During his career, Daniels rose through the ranks as a sergeant, lieutenant, assistant chief and division chief.

Daniels did not return several calls by deadline.

a ministerial alliance in Clay County look like and will it, once established, really have any impact on bringing down crime? After all, crime is already down. Just look at our pages of Arrests & Bookings, Crimewatch and Police Briefs or attend the Legislative Delegation meeting in December when county officials will again reiterate this fact publicly.

Also, voters will want to see Daniels walk the neighborhoods of Clay County, just like Sheriff Rick Beseler and Sheriff Scott Lancaster before him. But, as I've stated here in this space before, usually acts such as walking neighborhoods

can't pull a gun out of someone's hands in the middle of a senseless act that leads to murder. Neighborhoods walks are usually publicity stunts.

And last but certainly not least, is how will these two administrations handle transparency? How will they continue to engage a changing Clay County?

In the case of the school district – the entity that handles our most precious commodity, our children – what steps will be taken to pull the district up from its current "B" grade and No. 20 ranking in the state?

These are, perhaps, some of the real questions voters went to the polls seeking answers to on Tuesday.

in special-interest contributions, according to the Supervisor of Elections.

The BCC receives 79 percent of the revenue from the penny sales tax. The school district gets 10 percent. The four municipalities of Green Cove Springs, Orange Park, Keystone Heights and Penney farms divide up the rest, with shares between one percent and four percent.

The commission's share has gone to road improvements, vehicles for law-enforcement and fire and rescue, park improvements, renovation of public buildings and other capital projects.

Revenue from the penny tax, according to Florida law, cannot be spent on government salaries or daily operations.

"I think the voters trust our county government, because they see where the money is going and that it's being used in a positive way," Garrison said. "If we were to lose the revenue source of the penny tax, we'd have to cut elsewhere to make up for it"

A strong argument for extending the one-cent tax was that it prevents an increase in property taxes. The penny tax spares home owners, owners of rental properties and their renters, whose costs would all go up if property taxes are raised. Everyone who makes purchases in Clay County, including visitors, pays the one-cent sales tax.

In the past, the one penny sales tax has funded such projects as the Clay County Courthouse, the Fleming Island Library and miles and miles of roads in Clay County

More AEDs in patrol cars means more lives can be saved

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Clay County Sheriff's Office recently added more automatic electronic defibrillators to its patrol cars with help of a grant from the Firehouse Subs Public Safety Foundation. The devices arrived Aug. 18 and deputies began delivering them to the patrol deputies.

At a cost of \$1,400 each, the CCSO was able to buy 18 AEDs for a total value of \$25,200.

Sheriff Rick Beseler said he is proud of the partnership the CCSO has built with Firehouse and encourages other



businesses or organizations to consider a donation to fund even more AEDs for the community, such as Prevatt's restaurant did recently in Middleburg. CCSO Finance Bureau members, led by CFO Elise Gann, helped obtain the grants and Safety Coordinator Robert Williams makes sure training and maintenance takes place, too.

"There are times when Patrol Deputies are first to arrive at cardiac or drowning scenes, so access to an AED can be the difference between life and death," Beseler said



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

Healthy Start, health department to form infant mortality committee

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The Healthy Start Program plans to form a stakeholder committee to help in the continued fight against infant and fetal mortality.

The committee, an outgrowth of the Infant Mortality Task Force, will focus on incorporating countywide action plans regarding the most pressing causes of pediatric fatality.

The Clay County Infant Mortality Task Force already meets monthly to improve birth outcomes through education and plan creation, but a committee of stakeholders and community leaders could improve productivity, buy-in and get more interested parties involved.

"They're getting their partners together to develop the health messages and materials," said Patricia Cepeda, community health director with DOH. "They're going to talk about obesity, [Sudden Infant Death Syndrome], smoking cessation and access to prenatal care and continuity of prenatal care during pregnancy."

The Northeast Florida Healthy Start Coalition provides services to at-risk women in its service area — Clay, Duval, Nassau, Baker and St. Johns Counties. Although a definite date isn't set, the coalition's board will meet in October for Project Impact, where they will review data they've collected on fetal and infant mortality rate and develop strategies for next year.

Most risk factors for infant and fetal death remain preventable, such as obesity and smoking, both on an upward trend in Clay County. In 2014, obesity during pregnancy accounted for 23.9 out of every 1,000 births in Clay County, more than two points above the state average.

"Here in Clay, compared to the other five county areas, very high rate of smoking among moms," Cepeda said. "It's a high stress time in their lives, especially if someone in the house is smoking, real hard. If all the communities come together, we have a consistent message, then maybe we can help her work her way through that."

Smoking cessation programs put a dent in mothers who smoke during pregnancy, Cepeda said, through the continued partnership of Healthy Start Programs and leaders across counties.

Some risk factors, however, are often times beyond a parent's control. With 15 percent of Clay County adults living without health insurance, access to prenatal care and continuity of care continue to drag down rates across Florida. Access to transportation and adequate health insurance remain roadblocks to raising the rate of adequate prenatal care regardless of race or ethnicity.

Each county is required to assess the data involving infant mortality for a 10-year period as a means of devising what aspects of the healthcare system need to improve in the future to lower deaths with countywide Healthy Start Programs.

Of course, each county is different and initiatives can vary wildly from county to county based on specific challenges and resources.


For instance, "The major difference between" Clay and Duval is Jacksonville's concentrated "Urban core," absent in Clay, said Tracy Claveau, fetal and infant mortality review manager with the Healthy Start Coalition. However, that's not to say the problems associated with a concentrated urban core – such as racial disparity and poverty – are absent in Clay, she added.

Overall, Clay's infant death rate was 6.2 in 2014, slightly above Florida's infant death rate at 6.0. A percentage point ac-

counts for one infant death out of 1,000. Rates dropped last year to 4.8.

"When we talk about different communities, Clay has a very active and very involved Healthy Start Program, as does Duval, but you just run into more challeng-

es in the urban core such as poverty and racial disparity," Claveau said.

Duval's rates are over two points above Clay. Likewise, Duval's fetal death rate was nearly five points higher.

A disparity continues to present itself with low birth-weight among black births. Black mothers are also more likely to receive inadequate prenatal care during the first trimester.

Alternatively, SUIDS cases among white infants is higher than other races. Rates in Clay County spiked in 2014 to 1.9, up nearly a point from last year.

"At this particular time, one of the biggest [initiatives] is decreasing the sleeping infant death rate we have here in Northeast Florida," Claveau said.

To reduce the risk of SUIDS, mothers can remove items in the crib. Officials say consistent messages among care providers is key in educating mothers-to-be about crib death.

Although the coalition has only set a tentative date, the board will meet in October for Project Impact, to discuss new findings and identify new initiatives across the counties to try to stamp out pediatric death in Northeast Florida.

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

Roberts gets three INTs

JACKSONVILLE – Three interceptions by senior defensive back Nick Roberts – one a 60 yard scoring pick – led the Oakleaf High football team to a 27-6 win over 5A-Westside High in their season opener on Aug. 26 in Jacksonville.

"Nick is so fast on his feet and such a great cover man on our defense," said Oakleaf High head coach Steve Reynolds, who opened his first season as the head coach at Oakleaf after years as an assistant. "We also got great pass rushes from our interior linemen; Jayon Bradley and Brad Williamson-Hunter to force their quarterback to hurry his passes."

Roberts, who commited recently to the University of South Florida, nearly had a fourth interception late in the game, but could not keep his feet in bounds.

From the opening whistle, Oakleaf had little trouble moving the ball offensively with quarterback Jordan Johnson using his bevy of weapons like a skilled surgeon. Tailback Keshawn King scored twice for the Knights with a 33 yard run in the first quarter and a 30 yard pass play preluding a 20 yard scoring pass from Johnson to wideout Jamaric Bonner in the first quarter.

"Sometimes you can watch a guy warming up before a game and see that he is in his own zone," said Reynolds. "Jordan was sharp in warm up and just as sharp in the first half. The second half, I think he lost some rhythm maybe because of the score, but our schedule is not going let us have letdowns in the second half."

Roberts struck for his first interception on the next Westside series. The steal set up a 20 yard pass play from Johnson to Jakari Williams to the Westside three yard line where King caught a scoring pass in the end zone for a 20-0 Oakleaf lead.

Just before the half, Roberts snagged number two interception to end the stanza.

"He showed why he is highly recruited," said Reynolds.

Westside would score in the third period to put the score at 20-6, but Roberts went coast-to-coast for a 60 yard interception touchdown for the final score.

Johnson would finish with 15 completions on 31 attempts with two scores and one interception. King would finish with 83 yards on nine carries with one touchdown with Jakobie Baker adding 69 yards also on nine carries.

Through the air, Williams finished with a game-high seven catches for 79 yards with Bonner and King both getting three passes for the night.

"Our passing game was sharp and even our senior guy, Rontrez Morgan, had a touchdown called back because the officials thought he did not have control with the catch in the end zone," said Reynolds. "It was a catch of beauty. He'll get more opportunity."

On defense, sophomore linebacke Dexter Moore led the tackling with 11 for the night; eight solos with Deanthony Hill adding seven from his defensive back position. Defensive lineman Javiera Bovell registered three tackles for losses for the Knights' defense.

"Dexter kind of put it out there that he can play the game as did freshman defensive end Chantz Williams who disrupted many plays with his athleticism," said Reynolds. "In the middle, Jayon (Bradley) was an absolute rock. I think we had four sacks on a good offensive line and a very mobile quarterback."

Oakleaf (1-0) will travel to 5A-Orange Park (1-0) on Fri., Sept. 2 for a non-district game. Orange Park beat Creekside in their opener.

After Clay, Parrett kept the Knights fo-




Keystone Heights' outside hitter Karizma Calloway has been strong at the net for the Lady Indians.

rin and the focus paid off.



and it was evident tonight," said Hoekstra. "We lost the battles on the line of scrimmage, that's for sure. There's no secrets up there. Colin (Clay running back ColinWilson) can't go if the blocking is not there."

Clay did strike first in their second offensive series after a missed field goal by Fleming Island.

With the Blue Devils starting at their own 20, Clay quarterback Jaylan Jenkins generated just five yards on two hand-offs, but found Wilson all alone behind the Fleming Island defense for a 53 yard passing score the squelched the Fleming Island faithful on the west side of the stadium.

The Golden Eagles got started off the first miscue of the game, a Wilson fumble at the Fleming Island 40, just as the first quarter ended.

After a slant pass to wideout Rhodeo Gray put Fleming Island at the Clay 32, Garrison, an Alabama-born transfer, punched out a 24 yard yard run to the Clay 37 and a nine yard run to the 23. On first down, McCaskill, a legit 11-flat 100 meter track sprinter for Fleming Island, burst past the battling linemen for an apparent eye-opening score that resuscitated the Fleming Island fans with its ferocity to the end zone.

A penalty flag for a hold only simmered the fervor in the stands as McCaskill, all of just 5-foot-6, snuck behind his offensive line for a 15 yard gain to the Clay 24 where Garrison blasted straight up the middle for the score to tie the game at 7-7 with kicker Noah Hamlitt's PAT.

"God blessed us with Chauncey Garrison," said Springs. "He runs hard, he is coachable, and he is humble."

Clay, desperate to establish a response, could only muster an 18 yard drive from their own 20 to the 38 with Mackey catching Jenkins with a third down sack that cost the Blue Devils 12 yards and forced a punt.

ing to give us their best shot."

Brown, on first down after a 14 yard swing pass to Garrison put Fleming Island at midfield, struck again with wideout Jackson Bull snaring a drag pass in front of Clay defender Dakari Augustin, hitting the brakes before the Clay sideline and sprinting the rest of the 30 yards to paydirt as

the Clay sideline watched in bewilderment.

"We knew the running game was going to be critical in getting us downfield and we knew that would be Clay's focus on defense," said Brown.

Both teams would go four downs and out on two series to end the half at 14-7.

"We knew Clay would want to reset and come out strong in the third period," said Springs.

With Clay kicking off, Brown and the Fleming Island offense stayed on the ground to open the second half, with McCaskill and Garrison again doing most of the barraging of the scrimmage line. McCaskill would blast a 17 yarder to the Fleming Island 36 to give Brown some breathing room before Bull caught his second pass of the night for a 14 yard gain to the Clay 41. Two handoffs to both Garrison and McCaskill would cash in from the 16 with McCaskill flying in off left tackle. Hamlitt's PAT kick put the score at 21-7, but noone on the Fleming Island sideline was breathing easy.

"We told them to just calm themselves and execute," said Creech.

Clay, on the other side, was ramping up to deliver a Clay-like second half bludgeoning to get the score closer.

On first at the Clay 22, Wilson took command and ran over half of the Fleming Island defense for a 15 yard gain that stamped round one of the series heavyweight stanza. Jenkins would bound outside for four more before wideout Ajay Belanger caught a short slant and got slammed on the tackle by safety Isaiah Walker to the tune of an additional 15 for spearheading.

Now at the Fleming Island 31, Jenkins kept the pressure with four more yards before Wilson smashed the interior of the Fleming Island defense for gains of 10, three and three before a pass to running back Tymious Goodman put the Clay offense within smell of the end zone at the nine yard line. Wilson would exact the revenge with a final two yard scoring plunge and a 21-14 score.

On the third down, Jenkins attempted to sneak off the right tackle a second time only to run into Ashe on the corner for the stop.

With 6:16 on the clock, fourth down for Clay on the Fleming Island seven and the score at 21-14, Jenkins dropped off the line and looked into the end zone for a pass. Finding the 6-foot-3 Belanger in the back of the end zone a step ahead of the Fleming Island defense. The ball sailed through Belanger's outstretched fingertips.

"We have to make that play and the other dropped passes," said Hoekstra.

Fleming Island still had 8:18 to keep the Blue Devils from squashing the slim lead.

Starting at their own seven, Brown doubled down with another timely pass with a drag pass across the middle to North Carolina transfer Robert Palmer who turned a 13 yard gain to a 59 yard death blow as the Fleming Island sideline sprinted stride for stride to the Clay 35 yard line.

"They were not covering beyond the line of scrimmage and we saw an opening over top with a short pass," said Brown. "Robert just made the big play for us."

Four plays later, Hamlitt would hit a 14 yard field goal pushing the game to 24-14 with 4:04 to go.

Clay, again, was not going down without a burst, as Jenkins hit Belanger in front of Ashe for a 49 yard gain to the Fleming Island 20 yard line. Jenkins would pass three times into the end zone, but would miss three times with Walker and Gray thwarting the attempts. 

Senior safety Allituan Temoney gave a passionate speech to his teammates in hopes of changing the culture for this season.






