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No criminal charges in BASCA investigation

State Attorney rules it a 'civil matter'

ORANGE PARK – After months of scrutiny, authorities have chosen not to pursue any

criminal charges against an Orange Parkbased nonprofit serving adults with intellectual and physical disabilities despite the findings bordering on criminal wrongdoing.

Documents from the Clay County Sheriff's Office indicate investigators found BASCA leaders had knowingly permitted a

violent group home resident to live in the home despite multiple violent outbreaks. Documents also state, that at one point, the adult — who was BASCA's operations manager's grandson — was drugged to calm him down. BASCA was also declared as having committed Medicaid fraud, how-

ever, the state attorney's office "deemed no criminal violation occurred," instead characterizing the allegation as a "civil matter."

Sheriff's office documents sent to the media late on Jan. 5, detail several

Nice Music closes after 67 years


ORANGE PARK — From his desk in the east corner of the Nice Music store, Bob Nice took advantage of a brief lull in the store's closing day traffic and sat down to rest after helping a musician locate the last ukulele in the store.

After 67 years of selling instruments, teaching lessons and providing a space for musicians to play together, Nice Music closed its doors Dec. 31. Even though Nice said he has mixed emotions about closing, he is ready for a rest.

"It's going to be sad and glad," Nice said, who worked six days every week. "At my age, I'm working 55 hours a week and I don't take many days off."

The 73-year-old owner joined the family business in 1966 after working in the

Hotel was a magnet for new settlers, tourists and residents

ounder Washington Benedict began developing Orange Park in the mid-1870s. First job on the list was the construction of the grand Park View Hotel with its 65 rooms, golf course, sulphur water baths and welcoming gingerbread trimmed verandas that wrapped two floors.

While still under construction she was the center of all activity. The development company directors and work crews met there. Some even lived there. Others commuted daily into Jacksonville while their own homes were being built in Orange Park.

Tourists and potential settlers were moving luggage into the rooms as the paint was drying. The Park View officially opened in February of 1878.

Jacksonville's Daily Sun and Press covered the grand opening ceremonies calling the hotel "one of the most complete and attractive hotels on the St. Johns River, or in the State. The rooms are large, airy and pleasant, all having a splendid view and nearly all have a river view. Some command a magnificent view of the river for 10 or 15 miles up and down."

The Sun and Press went on to extol that "the furniture is all new, manufactured specially for the house." And that "The din-

ing room is very attractive at all times. But in the usual meal hours, the snowy table linen, the brightly burnished table cutlery and cookery and above all the smoking, savory viands from the hands of one of the best cooks in the State, render it unusually attractive."

The Sun and Press representative goes on to close with "The citizens living near and around the place are as intelligent, refined and moral as can be found in any community." A condition one can only hope continues to this day.

The Park View hosted many famous guests including, in 1880, Ulysses S. Grant former President of the United States. He was accompanied by his wife and Lt. Gen. Sheridan and Mrs. Sheridan. On July 8 that same year, the hotel register was signed by Buffalo Bill and Texas Jack with Sitting Bull.

Harriet Beecher Stowe frequently lunched at the hotel with friends and family and was much impressed with the Orange Park development. She wrote several complimentary pieces describing agricultural, commercial and cultural activities of the community to appear in Benedict's advertising publications in the north.

Sometime in the summer of 1881, E.N. Holt purchased the Park View from the

development company. Holt had been the second person to purchase land in Orange Park in 1876. He served as postmaster from 1886 to 1890 and was selected town clerk from 1880-1882.

In 1890, Holt enlarged some portions of the hotel and renamed her in honor of his wife, the Hotel Marion. A Mrs. Zealy purchased the hotel property and called it the Sparhawk but neither the new owner or the new name stuck. Subsequent owners operated the Hotel Marion with vary-

ing degrees of success until 1921 when the property was acquired by The Loyal Order of Moose.

In that year, for all intents and purposes the Victorian Gem disappeared. In actuality her gingerbread draped verandas were replaced with cement and stone porches and her clap board siding was covered with cement and pebbles. She went from dainty to daunting and became Brandon Hall until 1951 when she was razed for a new single story construction.

Florida nurses closer to multi-state licensing

TALLAHASSEE – Registered nurses in Florida are one step closer to being allowed to practice across state lines as a bill regarding licensing is set to weave its way through the 2016 Florida Legislature.

Twenty-five states currently participate in the Nurse Licensure Compact, which permits nurses to practice across state lines – Florida isn't one of them. If it were, nurses from other compact member states could respond to a natural disaster in Florida – or other critical needs – and many are calling for a welcome mat to be put out.

Rep. Cary Pigman (R-Avon Park), chairman of the House Health Quality Com-

mittee, called experts to testify before his committee shortly before Christmas, has proposed House Bill 1061. One of

the testifying experts was Dwight Cooper, chief executive officer of PPR Travel Nursing in Jacksonville Beach. Cooper's company places nurses with hospitals and clinics around the country. Cooper said specialized nurses often move around, so it's

important for states to compete for their services.

"Some subsets of nurses are very transient; they move across the country, as do ours. Across the country, we hire 12,000 health care workers a year and that includes 6,000 RNs. So, we face licensure issues all the time and the 25 states in the compact have become states of choice," Cooper said.

The 46-page bill from Pigman – who is a physician – provides the framework that would retool for Licensure Compact to meet the state's unique needs. As written, it would replace the existing compact and require approval from participating states. After being passed in the legislature and signed by the governor, Florida nurses could request licenses that would be honored by multiple states.

"Specialty nurses are small populations and because they move around a lot. It's essentially a redistribution of about 25,000 nurses. It's a small number, but it's a very important one because beds can be closed if hospitals can't fill those positions," Cooper said.

While patients, nurses and hospitals would all benefit from Florida joining the compact, Florida Center for Nursing Executive Director Mary Lou Brunell said Florida currently has a nursing shortage, but it's no different from any other area of the nation.

In 2013, the Center found 9,111 vacant positions and forecasted a shortage of ap-

Bald eagle shooting raises gun concerns

FLEMING ISLAND – Though the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission found no suspects in a recent bald eagle shooting, the witness reported seeing two young boys with air rifles at the time. State law mandates those younger than 16 years to have adult supervision when shooting a firearm and gun safety experts are raising concerns

There was also a hawk shooting prior to the eagle being shot and Steve Robbins, FWC Hunter Safety Coordinator, said if ei-

ther protected bird was shot by a child, the crime is the parents' fault.

"When something like this happens, it's the parents' fault. The child has to have parental supervision to shoot that firearm until they are 16 and the parent is still responsible until the child turns 18," Robbins said.

Robbins also said safety training is required for a state hunting license, but he doesn't

believe the eagle shooting has anything to do with hunting or a local culture where hunting is valued and hunting indoctrination of youth is a right of passage.

"This is not a sportsman committing these acts. Whoever is doing this is a vagrant or doesn't know any better. People who do this treat guns as a plaything and have no education on what hunting is all about," he said.

Robbins said Americans have a long history of hunting going back to the nation's founding when grocery stores didn't exist. Some may question this as a need for hunting in modern America, but Robbins said there is a growing subculture that doesn't want hormone-filled mass-produced meats from factory farms.

"I strongly urge anyone to take our hunter safety course to learn that we've always hunted for sustenance and game management since we landed on these

shores," he said. "There's also a whole new group of people getting into hunting nationwide just because the meats sold in grocery stores are pumped full of hormones and they want food that's better for them."

With Christmas gifts having recently been bestowed, there may be additional weapons in the hands of Clay County vouth. Orange Park Police Lt. John Jock said parents should lock those firearms up so kids can only use them on family outings to a gun range.

"If you're going to get your kid a pellet gun, you should get them safety training. Parents have to take responsibility and

they have to think things through. The rural parts of the county may be parents' fault. The child suitable for shooting, but where is that pellet going to end up? Will it ricochet off of something? Will it travel over a roadway? Parents have to think is still responsible until these things through, Jock said.

> "It all boils down to parental supervision and education. To me, it's pretty simple – make sure your kid knows

what's right and what's wrong. The only way they're going to know is if you train them.

Green Cove Springs Police Chief Robert Musco said it's important for parents to wait until a child is old enough to introduce them to a firearm. He said the weapon should be an air rifle or .22 caliber handgun - just as you wouldn't buy an expensive sports car for a teen who just got his driver's license.

"My children were taught at a young age not to touch daddy's service weapon. I took them shooting growing up and I put them through safety training. They're both grown up and have concealed weapons permits, but I taught them right from an early age, he said.

"It's important for children and adults to respect a weapon and what it can do. You have to teach them from the get-go that it's not a toy and you have to teach them to respect it. They have to understand it's real – it's not like the game where the zombie keeps getting up. If they respect the weapon, then you have a good foundation."

Though pellet guns may be a good option to start out with, Jock said many air rifles today are more powerful than those in use in the 80s and 90s when today's parents were young. He said these modern weapons shoot larger projectiles than the older ones did and this is one of the things parents need to think through.

"We don't point guns at anything unless we intend to destroy it and that certainly does not include protected species of birds. I don't recommend a parent buy a child a high-powered pellet gun, but if you're going to do that, you have to take responsibility,

"You have to put the time, thought and effort into the child's training if you're going to get them an air gun – even if they're 16. but especially if they're younger."

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Many Floridians of note deserve U.S. Capitol honor

Florida had been a state for less than a century when it came time to honor famous citizens with two statues at the U.S.

Capitol, and there were few plausible candidates. Dr. John Gorrie, the physician who invented mechanical refrigeration – imagine modern Florida without it – was an outstanding choice. But from today's perspective, Confederate Gen. Edmund Kirby Smith is a head-scratcher.

Let 2016 be the year the Legislature finally retires him.

Smith's historical distinction was to command Rebel forces west of the Mississippi for the final two years of the Civil War and to surrender the last major Confederate command. But, as state Sen. John Legg has framed the issue, "He just did not shape Florida history."

Indeed, he had nothing to do with Florida after leaving to attend West Point. However, Florida culture and politics were still steeped in the so-called Lost Cause when Smith was selected in the 1920s. If Smith wasn't exactly on a par with Robert E. Lee or Jefferson Davis, he would just have to do.

Lutz, Fla. Republican Legg is sponsoring legislation, SB310, to remove Smith's statue and select another notable person. The first part will be the easier.

A potential trouble with the bill and its companion, HB 141, is that it would be up to the Ad Hoc Committee of the Great Floridians Program and the Department of State to recommend a single candidate to the Legislature.

The lists of "Great Floridians" chosen since Rick Scott became governor have been rather long on athletes and included at least two persons who never lived in Florida: Walt Disney and the explorer Juan Ponce de Leon. Last year brought Alto Adams Sr., who may have earned distinction as a cattle rancher but not as a Supreme Court justice.

The final choice of another Floridian for a Capitol statue should be left to the Legislature, where the process would be more transparent, and the bill should call for more than just one nomination from the committee.

That will be the harder part of the process, as there's no shortage of plausible candidates.

Former Govs. LeRoy Collins and Reubin Askew come immediately to mind. Collins kept Florida peaceful after the U.S. Supreme Court called for school desegregation, became the first Deep South governor to declare segregation in conflict with

Talking to children about traumatic events

As we travel through life, we have to come to terms that good things and bad things do happen. When faced with a traumatic event such as death, recent terrorist attacks, or acts of violence, we all try to

make sense or come to terms in our own way to be able to grasp in our minds the reality and shock of what has happened. As parents this is a hard task, but let's explore some ways to address trauma with children.

Children thrive

on being secure and when they witness or hear about a traumatic event they may question their sense of security. By processing their thoughts, children often display fears and anxieties. Usually, these reactions are normal, however, without proper assurance, the impact could last a long time. With the proper guidance and assurance, children can become resilient enough to grow regardless of the traumatic experience and become stronger individuals

When talking to children, adults must be aware of their own thoughts and feelings. Be sensitive to the fact that your children are influenced by your reactions. Try to remain calm when you are around your children. Talk to your child about your own emotions, but consider their age and maturity to be sure not to overwhelm them. Remember to be aware and in control of your own emotions before creating a dialogue with your child.

Be available to your children as much as possible when they need to talk about trauma. Express your love for your child and remember to verbally and physically reassure your child that they are safe. Remember children need the opportunity to express their thoughts and feelings after a traumatic event. Focus on your child's thoughts and feelings without judgments or suggestions —

by doing so you will be providing him or her a safe ground to process and giving them what they need.

Limit your children to horrific media images of a traumatic event. It is up to parents to interpret what has happened and provide facts in line with your child's appropriate age and level of understanding. Keep your answers simple when talking to your child. Be consistent with your answers so that your child will have a sense of security of what has happened.

If, after a traumatic event, your child appears to be upset, there are ways to help him or her process their emotions. A parent may suggest that the older child or adolescent journal his or her thoughts and feelings and talk about them later with the parent(s). A suggestion for younger children is to give them the opportunity to draw what they are thinking or feeling. The key is to have them process the event in a safe environment and talk about it. If the anxiety or other symptoms do persists, a parent may want to consider help with a professional.

Tell your children about the heroes (paramedics, firefighters, emergency rescue teams, everyday heroes who did extraordinary things in the face of danger). Explain to your children that they are always there to help and that you are always there to listen. By doing so, your child will feel safer and be able to better process tragedy and trauma.

the constitution and Christianity, and as the first director of the new federal Community Relations Service helped avert a second bloodbath at Selma, Ala. Askew, his disciple, presided over Florida's most politically progressive era and, among other things, appointed the South's first African-American Supreme Court justice.

Something worth keeping in mind, however, is that no state has ever commemorated the civil rights revolution with a full-bodied statue at the Capitol of any native son or daughter, black or white. That's a conspicuous oversight. The late Rosa Parks, whose defiance of segregation led to the Montgomery bus boycott, is in Statuary Hall by act of Congress. It was dedicated, ironically, on the same day of the U.S. Supreme Court argument that led to John Roberts fulfilling his long-held ambition to gut the Voting Rights Act of 1964.

Florida's history boasts no fewer than five prominent African-Americans who would be deserving additions to Statuary Hall. In alphabetical order, they are:

Mary McLeod Bethune, the civil rights activist and educator who merged the school she founded into what is now Bethune-Cookman College at Daytona Beach, founded the National Conference of Negro Women, and was an adviser to three presidents, most notably as Franklin Delano Roosevelt's director of Negro affairs in the National Youth Administration.

Zora Neale Hurston, the novelist and folklorist who grew up in Florida and is best remembered for her role in the Harlem Renaissance and her book, "Their Eyes Were Watching God."

James Weldon Johnson, one of the earliest civil rights activists, born in Jacksonville in 1871, who held two ambassadorships under President Theodore Roosevelt, served as chief executive of the NAACP, and became the first African-American professor at New York University. He wrote

the civil rights anthem, "Lift Every Voice and Sing."

Harry T. Moore, a Suwannee County native who became the first martyr of the modern civil rights era when a bomb likely planted by the Ku Klux Klan exploded under his bedroom on Christmas 1951. Moore's wife, Harriet, died in a hospital nine days later. Moore, a teacher and NAACP leader, filed the first lawsuit to pay black teachers the same as whites in Florida. It was unsuccessful, but he inspired others that succeeded. After the U.S. Supreme Court declared white-only primaries to be unconstitutional, his Progressive Voters League registered 116,000 blacks, 20 years before the Voting Rights Act. He was assassinated shortly after calling national attention to the questionable rape convictions of three black men in Lake County.

A. Philip Randolph, born in 1889 at Crescent City, Florida, founder of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, whose intent to lead a civil rights march on Washington prompted Franklin Roosevelt to ban race discrimination in federal contracting during World War II and to establish the Fair Employment Practices Commission. He also was a principal organizer of the 1963 March on Washington best remembered for Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s "I have a dream" speech.

Bethune, Hurston and Moore are memorialized at Tallahassee as "Great Floridians." So are Collins and Askew. Johnson and Randolph belong on that list also, as well as on the short list to replace Edmund Kirby Smith.

Florida would be the fourth state to replace a statue. Alabama did so for Helen Keller, Kansas for Dwight D. Eisenhower, and California for Ronald Reagan.

Legg's bill cleared its first committee in the face of scattered protests that it represents "revisionist history." That's not so. The issue is that there has been more than enough history since 1922 to call for a new and truer symbol of what Florida has contributed to the nation.

compact is enacted across the country.

Cooper said because compact states have a better chance of attracting nurses, they're less likely to face a nursing shortage. Not being part of the compact makes Florida less-equipped to compete and this may contribute to a nursing shortage in a state where sunshine doesn't compensate for low wages.

"There are two things to think about here. The main thing is patient safety — when there is an emergency because a specialized nurse is needed, but not available, they call agencies like mine and I go into my database to help fill the need in that emergency situation," Cooper said. "The second thing is that any nurse who wants to permanently move to Florida will have to declare residency and get a Florida license, but the compact makes Florida more nurse-friendly and helps nurses deal with the bureaucracy."

The Florida Legislature convenes on Jan. 12.

proximately 50,000 Florida registered nurses by 2025.

"From a workforce perspective, I'm not sure there are advantages. The shortage we're experiencing is going to be national and I'm not sure we'll see an influx of nurses into Florida. For the nurses, it would present flexibility and from the patient's perspective, what matters is that the nurses are qualified, but the requirement for continuing education could be an issue because continuing education isn't required in some states," Brunell said.

The bill is far from its final version, but what has been proposed would replace the compact currently in place and require ratification by the currently-participating states. Brunell said she is confident Florida officials wouldn't permit state requirements to be watered down and that other states would raise the bar if a Florida-led

Rep. Van Zant wants to single out veterans

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS - A bill proposed in the Florida House of Representatives by Rep. Charles Van Zant Sr. (R-Keystone Heights) would single out military personnel for special treatment when applying for housing.

Van Zant wants to eliminate background checks that accompany housing applications, which are typically credit checks and criminal background checks.

Local leaders of veterans groups doubt the necessity of such special treatment.

"I don't think they should get special treatment - if a veteran has bad credit, I don't know if they should get a Rep. Charles Van Zant Sr. lease just because they're



in the military," said Tom Rentz, post commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 8255 in Middleburg.

Though a criminal background check could identify someone with a mental health need not being met, Rentz said background checks with housing applications shouldn't be counted on to catch those issues.

needs of the recently-deployed when they return from combat. However, many veterans continue to experience post-traumatic stress disorder years after re-entering civilian life. Many veterans don't reach out for treatment.

"If an association requires a background check as a component of a rental application, the association must waive such requirement for a service member if he or she produces poof of active duty military service," the bill states.

Clay Today requested an interview with Van Zant, whose legislative aide, Brad Caoulette, said Van Zant wasn't available to be interviewed.

Via email, Clay Today sent him questions asking why he felt the bill is necessary, what specific background checks his bill refers to and what conditions the bill refers to.

Caoulette responded by phone, saying Van Zant told him he wouldn't have answers to those questions and that Van Zant maintains a policy of having breakfast with any reporter first as a pre-requisite to granting an interview.

Gary Newman, president of the Clay County chapter of Vietnam Veterans of America said housing application processes shouldn't be connected with any mechanisms in place to catch untreated mental health issues in the veterans community.

"I don't know if it's good to cast a wide net because so many things are in place to help those coming back from combat," Newman said. "They have counselors and screening processes that we didn't have

when we came back from Vietnam. Back then, there was no such thing as PTSD, but that's recognized now and even the county has things like veterans court in place to help veterans. So, I think the net is already wide enough."

Rentz agrees that veterans groups provide an adequate network that can catch these issues but doesn't agree with singling out active duty personnel as outlines in Van Zant's bill.

"There's a big safety net out there; the problem is identifying it. I don't think we should look to housing managers who aren't trained in dealing with mental health or other military issues like PTSD to catch those issues." Rentz said. "The VFW. Disabled American Veterans and others are better-suited to point that guy in the right direction. Nonetheless, exempting active duty from background checks doesn't seem to serve anything."

St. Johns River blue crab trap closure starts Jan. 16

TALLAHASSEE — Recreational and commercial blue crab traps in all waters of the St. Johns River system must be removed from the water before Jan. 16, the first day of a 10-day trap closure. This closure will give groups authorized by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission the opportunity to identify and retrieve lost and abandoned blue crab traps from the water.

The closure includes all waters of the St. Johns River system, its associated lakes and tributaries from west of the St. Johns River's intersection with the Intracoastal Canal through and including Lake Hellen Blazes in Brevard County.

Traps can be placed back in the water in this area starting Jan. 26, although closures may be reduced in duration if it is determined that the number of lost and abandoned traps in the region will take less time to remove. Until the trap season reopens, blue crabs may be harvested with other gear, such as dip nets and fold-up traps. Blue crab harvesters may also use standard blue crab traps during the closure if the traps are attached to a dock or other private property.

Lost and abandoned blue crab traps are a problem in the blue crab fishery because



they can continue to trap crabs and fish when left in the water. They can also be unsightly in the marine environment, damage sensitive habitats and pose navigational hazards to boaters on the water.

The closure is one of three regional, 10-day blue crab trap closures in 2016 on the Atlantic coast of Florida.

There are six regional closures total: three in odd-numbered years on the west coast and three in even-numbered years on the east coast.

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



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
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IN THE DARK

school and thinking about as a young girl who Helen was and how she pioneered. I think these stories are important for that reason and they speak to everyone."

When Jimmie was 10-years old, he died of tuberculosis and she left the institution in grief. Thodos said she felt it was important to highlight Sullivan's backstory because it fueled her passion to help Keller and to prevent her from entering an institution.

"Because Anne is such a strong character, it was important that we present why she cared so much about reaching Helen," Thodos said. "Institutions back then were horrible. If people or kids were put there they were pretty much just thrown away. She was really committed to Helen not going to an institution. [Anne's involvement] was the last straw. [Helen]

restaurant business in New York's World Fair selling Rheingold beer and hot dogs.

"I used to feed the all-star players when they all came for the games because the World's Fair was right next to Shea Stadium when it opened that year," Nice said.

His wife announced she was pregnant and the couple moved back to Florida. A Florida native, attended Fletcher High School in Jacksonville Beach and studied political science at the University of Florida.

The family business opened in 1948 and was founded by his grandfather, Clarence Carter Nice. From its original location, The Nice House of Music in Riverside sold two instruments at the time – pianos and organs. Nice's father, C. Carter Nice Jr. founded the Jacksonville Starlight Symphonette, a local music group that gave free outdoor concerts for more than three decades. Nice's brother. Carter Nice III. was an accomplished violin prodigy and played with the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra. Although Nice said his own musical skills are basic, his family was immersed in music and he has been a music and arts advocate his entire life.

In the early 1970's, Nice, his wife and three children then moved to Bavaria, Germany. He sold home organs to music stores under the Nice company umbrella. He wanted his family to have the experience of living abroad and learning the culture.

"I moved to Europe with three kids and sold organs in Southern Germany, Austria and Switzerland," Nice said. "I wholesaled them. They asked where I wanted to go. I drew a circle on the map and said this is the most beautiful part of Europe. It's all of Switzerland, all of Austria, and the Southern part of Germany including Bavaria. I lived right there in the mountains in Bavaria."

The family lived abroad during the soccer's 1974 World Cup when Germany won, beating Holland. For him, it was an unforgettable experience.

"We thought our Super Bowl was big," he said. Two years of battling icy roads during winter seasons and navigating the rail system, the Nice family returned to Jacksonville.

"You can't make a lot of money over there but I wanted to do it for the experience. I put my three children in German schools. They spoke only English. They had to learn German. That's all they heard in school and on the TV and with their neighbors and friends. The kids all learned to speak fluent German."

At its prime Nice Music, was a family of nine stores around Jacksonville and in Orlando. They sold home organs and pianos and later expanded, selling drums, guitars and electronic equipment.

On the store's closing day, musician Eric Wendorf strummed the four strings of the baritone ukulele, the last one in the shop. Even though it was Wendorf's first time in the store, he drove from Jackson-

"Nice Music really has some nice instruments. There's a lot of vintage stuff here but in really good shape."

Wendorf heard about the retirement sale from a friend's Facebook post and came in to find a ukulele built mid-century in Hawaii when "true" ukuleles were fabricated.

"There's a crack in the back that I noticed but it's still a nice ukulele," Wendorf said. "When you get into the vintage, you want to make sure it hasn't been rebuilt. It's very rare. In time they tend to bow. This one's in good shape."

Wendorf, who plays ukulele professionally, said that although most people pick up popular instruments, sitting down and actually playing the instrument is paramount to make sure it fits the player.

"When people buy ukuleles, they don't often play it. They don't know there are four different sizes and each of them will fit your hand differently when you play simple chords. Each one is different. They sound

such as Amazon. The trouble with buying instruments online, Nice said, is that the musician is at a disadvantage because they don't get to touch and feel the instrument in the manner Wendorf suggests.

"Amazon will sell everything I've got in the store but people should go in and try the instrument before they buy it, really. All instruments don't sound the same even if they look the same or have the same brand name on them. They all have different wood. It's how it's made and who made it — tone quality. People that buy online... they'll buy so much bad stuff online. They come in and want us to fix it or make it play better. They have no idea the quality they're getting on the entry level instruments," Nice said.

Even though Nice said his musical abilities were good enough to demonstrate a few chords, he has spent his career encouraging children and young people to study and play music. He said a principal walked into the store one day and told Nice

how proud he was that all of his second graders could operate a computer.

"I told him, but they're not taking music and art," Nice said to the principal. "I said to him the kids aren't smart because they can operate a computer. They can follow directions. Kids just learn to do. It's not really an education. It does their math for them and spell checks for them. They don't have to do creative thinking at all and that's what art is. You can be lousy at art but you're still creating. Just because you can't draw well doesn't mean you're not creating."

Nice focused on building relationships with customers and offered them a space to play at their leisure. He even sold instruments to start-up churches and young musicians on nothing but a verbal promise.

Over the years, he's seen fewer students come in for lessons, chalking the change up to the use of electronics.

"This is another thing that's killing the music industry for young people – electronic devices. I tell every customer that walks in here: 'If your child would spend three percent of the time he spends on electronic devices on a music instrument, we'd have a country of geniuses.' Kids spend hours and hours and hours on either the television or electronics. They didn't used to do that."

Stephen Male has been working for Nice Music since May 2009. He went to work at the store when he was 18 and said no other place has provided him with such a strong sense of community.

"You can go to George's or Guitar Center and I'm sure they can sell you a guitar, but this place has the whole 'for musicians by musicians' kind of vibe to it and it becomes like a family," Male said.

ORANGE PARK - When it comes to sharing her positive HIV status, Renee Burgess lives her life as an open book and a new project she is a part of hopes to address the stigma people experience when living with the virus.

Burgess' portrait, journal and recorded

interview, along with 14 other participants, will be on display Jan. 17 at 1324 Kingsley Ave. when the traveling exhibit "Faces of HIV" rolls through Orange Park.

ration for the project. A QR code links to poignant interviews of Burgess and the others sharing intimate details about contracting the virus, processing the news of a diagnosis, family and friend's reactions and living with the virus.

"I think the stigma associated with it is that I'm not going to get it, not realizing that there's millions of people in the world who have it," Burgess said. "Everyone is at risk. Nobody is immune at all. I was married and with the person for years. People

think that just because you're married, you are immune but you're not with that person all day every day.'

Burgess learned she was HIV positive in November 2007. She was a newlywed and pregnant with twins. All of her lab test results were fine except for one issue. Burgess had an inkling that the problem might be diabetes but the doctor asked if it would be acceptable if her husband left the room while she broke the news.

"She basically looked at me and said 'you tested positive for HIV," Burgess said in the recorded interview. "I looked at the


wall. I didn't want to look her in the face. I was completely in shock."

Burgess' left her husband and later learned that knowingly infecting your partner without disclosing a positive HIV status is a felony in Florida. With the help of officials in the sex crimes unit of the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office, Burgess' ex-husband answered questions on tape about past sexual encounters with men and women

and how long he had been positive.

"He had known he was positive since 2002," Burgess said. "Once I got the recorded confession they issued a nation-wide warrant for his arrest. They arrested him. He plead guilty. He got sentenced for the maximum in the state of Florida which is only, I hate it, but it's only five years."

"Faces of HIV" is part of a broader statewide campaign by the Florida Department of Health's "We Make the Change" initiative. Launched in 1999, the movement was designed to increase the awareness of HIV and AIDS, and educate residents about its impact on minority communities throughout Florida.

According to the DOH, "more blacks in Florida are living with HIV or are already dead from AIDS than any other racial or ethnic group."

For African-American women between the ages of 25 and 44 living in Florida, HIV and AIDS has been the leading cause of death for more than 15 years.

"This compares with approximately 1 in 310 non-Hispanic white males, 1 in 1,625 non-Hispanic white females, 1 in 148 Hispanic males, and 1 in 553 Hispanic females," according to the DOH's website.

Because the gap is greatest between positive white people and African-Americans, the Florida Department of Health "has redoubled its commitment and mobilized its resources to address the disproportionate impact of the HIV and AIDS epidemic on minority communities," according to the website.

Since her diagnosis, Burgess has become an advocate for HIV education and uses social media as a platform to talk

about safe sex and sex education.

"The only change for me has been the amount of people who are hearing my story and reaching out," said Burgess, who encourages those with questions to seek her out on Facebook. "I've been speaking since 2008 and everything I speak about is sex

education and HIV. I speak to all ages. I've spoken to teenagers and young adults, I've spoken to elders because people don't realize the rates increase for those 55 and over. They get divorced and don't realize they have to be careful and they forget that things have changed."

was wild. They loved her but they didn't know how to reach her."

Instead of strictly following the plot of the play and film interpretations of "The Miracle Worker," Thodos and Thodos Dance Chicago Advisory Board member Ann Reinking wanted the story ballet to unfold in Sullivan's past.

"For our purposes we really wanted to tell the story through [Sullivan's] connection," Thodos said. "We made a choice to build Anne Sullivan's character in a little bit different way. We made a choice that the play and the movie both don't go into to really give the audience an understanding about why Anne was so passionate about reaching Helen. We felt that was important for the arch of her character."

To prepare for the ballet performed by 12 dancers, Thodos and Reinking spent time at the Helen Keller National Center in Long Island, N.Y., a facility that houses people who are hearing and vision impaired.

"We had a lot of research to do about how someone would function and move and react if they couldn't see or hear and that research was really pivotal in the development of the piece and the coaching of the dancers," Thodos said.

During their stay, Thodos and Reinking interviewed a deaf and blind female staff member working at the Helen Keller National Center. Through an interpreter, they asked the staffer if she had ever experienced anything in the performing arts.

"She said she had the opportunity to experience 'The Lion King' and we were like, how did that work?"

Before the show, the staff member planned a touch tour where visually-impaired guests go onto the stage and touch the set pieces and tour where things are located on stage.

"So she was able to learn where they were located on stage and how they felt so when she was actually in the audience, she had some images in her own mind's eye of where things were," Thodos said. "Then we wondered how you could experience it if you couldn't see or hear and she had an interpreter on her left who described all of the visual things like the color of things and where things were. She had an interpreter on her right who explained the storyline."

Even though she is also deaf, the

staffer was able to feel the rhythm of the music through the floor.

"It was neat because we learned this community has really found ways to integrate into environments that normally would pose so challenging," Thodos said. "She had an incredibly rewarding experience."

The Thrasher-Horne plans to include one interactive touch and feel tour for a performance for school aged children on Jan. 27. Students at that performance will be able to view and touch a table and chairs since many scenes in the ballet are set around mealtime at the Keller's home.

Staying true to the time period, the costumes reflect the Victorian era in Alabama.

"Helen was born in Tuscumbia, Alabama and so the suits were lightweight," Thodos said. "The women are in Victoria era dresses and Anne's costume is very reflective of a teacher in the Victoria era. It's very conservative, [with] black boots, and a vest like a governess."

Denton Yockey, Thrasher-Horne executive director, said even though Keller's story is familiar, experiencing it through contemporary ballet adds a powerful element.

"Helen and Anne had to overcome impossible obstacles to communicate and that specific moment the breakthrough happens is as powerful a moment as any in all of human drama," Yockey said. "And of course, overcoming challenges in any story is still relevant today. Human compassion such as Anne Sullivan's shows how a caring teacher helped guide a blind and deaf girl into a career as an internationally-acclaimed writer and political activist. It's a story that created two heroes in their own time."

To add even more emotional components to the performance, Thodos worked with a composer to create the score. Dancers received theatrical coaching to be able to channel Sullivan and Keller's emotions.

"In order to convey the things you want to convey, you have to feel them all," Thodos said. "You have to feel all the rage. Anne has to feel what she feels and she has to feel her love for Helen and this emotional layer is critical and has its own important place and it's acquired through working with the dancers and coaching them through what they bring to the table."

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Having organized car shows for organizations such as Boy Scouts and churches, Greg Ducharme is now getting one ready for Clay County Special Olympics that will show off more than 200 cars, trucks and more at the Clay County Fairgrounds.

"I've been putting on car shows for about six years, so the Special Olympics called me and asked me to put on a fundraiser. So, I called 200 individual car owners and about 26 car clubs. "I started out organizing the church carnival at St. Luke Catholic Church with some other parishioners and I just kept going. I thought it would be more fun to organize a fundraiser as a car show, so I pulled together some other retired people

and this is my way of giving back. I just love doing this – especially for kids. I love seeing the smiles on their faces," he said.

While Ducharme focuses on the car show itself, Cathy Warlock is helping him put together some other attractions.

"I was brought in to help with the vendors and crafters while Greg works on the car part. I have handmade wood crafts, crochet items, seashell crafts, jewelry, origami, liquid candle warmers that are like candles without a wick, homemade barbecue and other sauces, kettle corn - a wide variety of items," Warlock said.

The car show will be held from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Jan. 30 at the fairgrounds. The vendor entrance fee is \$25 for a booth and an item of \$15 or greater for a silent auction. Funds are also being raised with vehicle registration fees for those entering the show to the tune of \$25 ahead or \$30 on the day of the show.

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
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Arbor Day

Arbor Day is a great way to recognize the importance of trees. Celebrated at the recommended planting time for trees in each state, Florida has one of the earliest on the third Friday in January. For 2016, this falls next week. This tradition was started to acknowledge all trees do – provide oxygen and shade, hold soil, host wildlife and provide for a multitude of uses in life.

A tree planted today will be a gift to your children and their children. Just as English cathedral builders would plant oaks to grow in time to replace the structure's beams

in a few hundred years, each generation plants the trees to mature for enjoyment by the next generations to come.


The variety and interest of trees is fascinating. There are small trees, medium trees and enormous trees, with canopy shapes from pyramidal to round to spreading or weeping.

There are trees with flowers, with fruits, and with leaves in every shape and shade of green imaginable. With so many choices, taking some time to get to know your selection – and the space you have for it – is a good idea before planting.

For many folks, there's just no room to add trees. There are plenty of opportunities in the community to make a difference this Arbor Day. From schools to community



organizations and more, check the Arbor Day Foundation website for creating or connecting with volunteer opportunities: http://www.arborday.org/takeaction/volunteer/.

If you are lucky enough to have a spot, then a few tips will help you successfully select a tree that will create your own landscape legacy this Arbor Day.

Double Check Space: Get out the measuring tape and double check the site you want to plant. Write down the length and width of the area. Remember, it's easy to underestimate how big a tree will get — so know the limits of the space you have before you choose.

Stare at the Shadows: How much light is the site getting each day? Note the conditions your planting site is getting. For species needing full sun, there needs to be 6 hours or more daily. For shady yards, look for understory species that like the shade of larger trees.

Soil Your Hands: Take a look at the soil and note its texture and drainage. Is it sandy and fast to drain, or is it a slow draining clay or muck? There are trees that will thrive in all these conditions. Making sure your selection likes your soil can be the difference between a great tree and a dead tree.

Take Notes: Are there potential problem spots around your site, such as powerlines and building eaves overhead, spots where pipes or cable wires run underground, or spots that are unusually shady, wet or dry? These can affect your tree selection. For example, a sewer or water line would need a costly repair if damaged by a thirsty tree species, but a small-rooted palm could work instead.

Window Shop: Use books and/or the Internet to get to know the possibilities. Be sure to check Florida information – your local library, Master Gardeners, or Extension office can help you, or look for research-based information from the University of Florida by adding the search terms "IFAS" (Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences). A great starting point is the "Florida Tree Selector" online tool http://lyra.ifas.ufl.edu/FloridaTrees/FloridaTreeSelector.swf which lets you click to pick your zone and your conditions for sun, water and soil to automatically generate a list of possibilities!

Another helpful free resource is "The Florida-Friendly Landscaping TM Guide to Plant Selection and Landscape Design," at http://fyn.ifas.ufl.edu/pdf/FYN_Plant_Selection_Guide_v090110.pdf

Avoid Temptation: Visit a nursery to see what's available, but don't make a purchase without doing a little research. Write down a list of what interests you and head home before getting out the wallet. Trees might have an 'average' size and a 'potential' size that's quite different, or special requirements for soil, shade, or other growing conditions. Also look into leaf and fruit litter that might get tracked in the house, pruning needs for strong structure and form and other considerations.

Start Strong: Check your plants before purchase with a thorough inspection. Look for leaves and stems free from any signs of insects and disease. Be sure to look on the underside of leaves, where many insects like to hide, as well as stems and branches that may host scale insects. Also check the health of your selection below the soil. First, find the topmost root on the trunk – it should no less than two-inches from the soil surface in a healthy tree. Avoid trees planted deeper than that. Next. look at the bottom of the pot to make sure roots haven't grown through, and inspect inside the pot to get a better look at the roots. Ask the nursery for help if you're purchasing a larger plant, and avoid purchasing plants that have roots circling inside the pot - a condition known as "root-bound" that can lead to health or growth problems as the tree matures.

Plant Right: Get your tree off to the best start by mastering planting technique. Dig the planting hole wide and shallow. Place the tree so the top of the rootball is slightly above the surrounding soil level to ensure good drainage and root health. Gently backfill the hole using the soil you removed, and gently water in to settle the soil and remove air pockets. Add two-to-three inches of mulch around the tree, but leave the top of the rootball bare. A well-selected species will be suitable for your site and will not require soil amendments or fertilizers – good news for your wallet and schedule! Note - if you need to consider special considerations such as slopes, poor drainage, or installing root barriers, check http://hort.ifas.ufl.edu/woody/detailsplanting.shtml for illustrated .pdf files to show you how to plant in these conditions.

If it seems like a lot of work to plan and plant a tree, consider the time invested as well as the many years of enjoyment your tree can bring. This year, celebrate your Arbor Day and the many benefits trees bring.





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

incidents in which Shaun Scott is named as the violent resident of the BASCA group home for disabled adults at 650 Pine Forest Drive. The documents indicate Jonnie Scott was BASCA's operations manager at the time of the investigation and the documents also identify her as Shaun Scott's grandmother.

The 28-page report, most of which was written by a sheriff's office investigator, indicates Shaun Scott had been placed in an intensive group home with the Jacksonville location of the May Institute, which is licensed to restrain violent residents. The report declares "[Jonnie Scott] removed Shaun from the May Institute because she didn't like that he was being restrained when he went into behaviors. Jonnie placed Shaun in one of BASCA's homes (Pine Forest) under her own control."

In a report dated Aug. 5, 2015, the investigator wrote that staff in the Pine Forest home had asked Jonnie Scott and BASCA founder and former executive director John Cone to "place Shaun in a more suitable environment where he could receive the appropriate care and services needed and to allow the other residents to live without fear, but they were repeatedly told 'this is Shaun's house' he was not going anywhere."

This was because on several occasions, Shaun Scott became violent and injured others, including his own grandmother. The investigator wrote "I have obtained numerous documents, which recorded Shaun going into behavior and physically attacking staff and/or clients living within the home. One such document revealed no one was able to control Shaun and Jonnie had observed the incident via a camera system which she monitors and she responded to the residence, states the CCSO report.

"No one could calm Shaun down and even Jonnie was unable to restrain him. Witnesses report Jonnie took a controlled substance, Ativan, and gave it to Shaun. While she was administering the controlled substance, she told the staff 'this is grandma doing this, not the operations manager.'

The investigator wrote that the medication she gave Shaun "was only prescribed to be given to him just prior to having blood work or dental work done, in order to calm him. It was never prescribed to be used when he went into behaviors. Jonnie Scott is not licensed to be dispensing controlled substances when the prescription clearly indicates when it is to be administered and

for what purpose.'

The sheriff's investigator wrote that Florida Department of Children and Families Adult Protective Investigator Paula Lenox "discovered there was an incident where Shaun was out of control and had gone into a violent rage and Jonnie had responded to the home in an attempt to calm him down. According to several witnesses, Shaun kicked Jonnie and pushed her to the ground, breaking her hip.

"As Jonnie was lying on the ground in pain, Shaun stood over her and laughed. Staff had prepared an incident report regarding this incident, however, it never made it to [the Agency for Persons with Disabilities]," which oversees BASCA's and other group homes' participation in the statewide Medicaid Waiver Program.

The sheriff's office report indicates Cone and Scott had handled documents in a questionable manner that played a role in the investigator using strong language.

"Jonnie Scott and John Cone tried to convince API Lenox the home located at 650 Forest Dr. was a 'behavior focused' home, which is also what they were billing Medicaid for. Upon further investiga-

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tion, it was deemed they were not licensed

as a behavior focused home and therefore


had committed Medicaid fraud. When John Cone made that statement to API Lenox, he knew this to be false as BASCA had already paid a fine for this violation," the report reads.

Immediately following, the investigator went on to write "it is believed the reason they were trying to indicate this home was listed as a behavior focused group home was because it would be easier to let Shaun 'slide by.' By indicating the home was behavior focused, it would be a step down from where Shaun was before and as long as the documentation didn't show any of his real behaviors, they could make a stronger case to support he was no longer a risk and/or threat to others."

Through the Medicaid Waiver Program, BASCA allegedly receives \$100,000 each year for Shaun's care, according to information the investigator received from Ken Dolch, a former house parent of a former Pine Forest group home resident.

Melanie Etters, spokesperson for APD, said Wednesday morning that no further sanctions had been taken against BASCA

beyond the settlement it reached with the organization in September 2015.

The terms of that settlement included Cone stepping down as administrator and continuing with BAS-CA in a public relations and fundraising role. Cone was also required in the

settlement stay away from group homes,

except to visit his son, and he cannot be a board member. Neither can Jonnie Scott be a board member or BASCA employee or have contact with BASCA group homes.

The organization remains with the Medicaid Waiver Program and Mary List was named as the executive director of services and Cone was named executive director of community development. By September 2015, Mike Esposito had become operations manager and the settlement agreement also stipulated that he and others offering direct care retake the agency's abuse and procedures training.

The sheriff's office documents also indicate Cone had placed a set of "staff rules" at the Pine Forest home that "instructs staff to contact 911 as a last resort when they can't get in contact with him, Jonnie or Mary List."

It also details other incidents of violence by Shaun Scott and questionable re-

sponses from BASCA leaders. This includes multiple times when Scott became violent inside a transport van. Dolch, whose wife, Steffanie, had received "a sprained back, sprained/twisted wrist, cuts, bruises and has been bitten, pushed and kicked by Shaun," told investigators of incidents when Scott unbuckled his seat belt and grabbed the steering wheel or attacked staff.

The report reads that Dolch told the investigator that Cone downplays the incidents "and says 'well we haven't had an accident yet.' Ken advised whenever someone is injured by Shaun, John refuses to let them go to the emergency room but instead tells them they must go to Care Spot, across from Orange Park Medical Center," the report states.

On the final page of the document, the investigator wrote that on Nov. 4, 2015, "Assistant State Attorney Anna Hixon,

with the Clay County State Attorney's Office notified me she had reached a decision regarding the prosecutorial merits of this investigation.


"Hixon was provided with a complete copy of the investigative file, which she thoroughly reviewed for approximately six weeks

Details of the police report, to include interviews, witness and suspect statements along with the DCF investigation/investigative report, which were also reviewed by ASA Hixon's supervisor and they deemed no criminal law violation had occurred, stating it was all a 'civil matter.' Due to the SAO's decision, this case is submitted as unfounded."

Founded in 1994 as the Baptist Association for Special Children and Adults, BASCA now only goes by the acronym and uses the slogan "Building Abilities of Special Children and Adults."







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
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Eagles bruised at Osceola Knockout

JOHNS, Fla. – After two Christmas tournament losses to top ranked University Christian and unbeaten Ribault High School, the Oakleaf High girls basketball team got to psynchronicity Tuesday night with a resounding 54-36 district 4-7A win over Bartram Trail High School. 





Outlook: Creekside, at one point rated as top team in USA by Maxpreps, now at fourth, has been dominant team in district with two ties to 3A-Ponte Vedra (12 wins, four losses, eight ties; lost in state semifinals 2015, 2014; lost in 3A Final Four in 2013, won 3A title in 2012 and won a 3A title 2009), both 1-1 (Nov 10 and Dec. 19) and a tie to 3A-Merritt Island (Final Four 2015, 3A runnerup 2014, region finalist 2013, 3rd ranked all classes on topdrawersoccer.com), 1-1 on November 7. The Knights lone loss was to 2A-Bolles (14-3-3, defending state champs, 15th ranked all classes on topdrawersoccer.com), 2-1 on December 18, in a showcase loss that snapped a 33 game winning streak.

"It's a different make up with a lot of young players," said Fleming Island coach Darrell Ivey. On the fringe is Nease who took Ivey to a

"The four teams after Creekside will be in a battle to get that number two spot for the district championship game," said Ivey. "This team has had a history of a strong middle. Emily (senior Surgeoner) has been an outside midfielder for us, but we are trying to get her experience in the middle as we head into districts."

The Golden Eagles have lived and died by a strong middle leg; Emily Cooksey, Abby Austin, Janiece Quick and Gianni Conte in past years, but the leg this year belongs to one of five seniors; Emily Surgeoner, Lizzy Zagar, Jillian Laird,

"Michele's speed sets back the defense for sure with her speed," said Rountree. "Our go-to player is senior captain Lindsey Patton who can do it all with sophomore Alyssa Farmer making good contributions from the opposite side of Kanaskie."

With an early season blowout (8-1) by Creekside and a 6-0 late-night loss to Bolles, Rountree has settled down the Knights' attack to push to plenty of one or two goal losses to some of the area's stronger teams including a 2-1 thriller to Fleming Island.

"I see everyone below Creekside at the top as the mixer for the district final," said Rountree. "Us, Nease, Fleming Island and Bartram Trail all have capable athletes to get the job done. Creekside has one up because of great soccer skills with great athletes. Most teams have one or two with both of those traits. Creekside has a bunch"

Oakleaf will get a strong non-district test on Tues, Jan. 5 from unbeaten 1A-St. Johns Country Day School, the four-time state champions looking for a fifth straight title. Following St.

Johns, Oakleaf has Episcopal and Bartram Trail to finish; both strong teams that could get the Knights sharp for districts. Rountree had some very famous junior high championship wins in his early tenure at Oakleaf Junior High School with many of the girls now on his high school team, but this is big-time time and he must find the next level to succeed.

"Our key is to get a strong first half and not let teams hang around for too long," said Rountree. "Obviously, if a team scores early, there is an advantage, but this team feeds off that momentum. We close better from the front."

fourth before the finals started."

Top finishers for the Golden Eagles were Jason Davis at 195 and Jose Concepcion at 220 who both faced off with defending state champions in their quarterfinals matches and fought back from losses to take third place finishes.

Davis who has blasted through lineups in Fleming Island's first four matches; all team wins and all with Davis top wrestler at 195, faced off against 3A-South Dade junior Chei Hill, who was the defending state champion. Davis lost a 7-3 decision to fall back into consolation where he won two matches to finish third. Davis beat Camden County senior Matt Wall 9-2 in his consolation final.

"I wrestled way too conservative against Hill and it cost me," said Davis, a third place state finisher at 182 last year. "He hit me with a two-point takedown early and it put me on defense."

For Concepcion, who got into the quarterfinals with a bye and a 1-0 win over Camden County senior Knute Jones, 3A-Miami Southridge defending champion Darius Hamilton, 28-0 in 2015, got a pin at 1:41 to dash Concepcion's hopes of an individual title.

"I got a good roll on him in the first round, but we landed out of bounds," said Concepcion, who rebounded with two pins in the consolation rounds for his third place finish. "He was a good athlete and very fast on his feet."

At 170, Fleming Island senior John Martorana faced off against 1A-Lake Highland Prep state champion Elijah Cleary who dominated the match with a 10-0 major decision. Martorana returned to take out Osceola's Ethan Delong with an 11-2 major decision before losing to 3A-Sarasota senior Jared Hardinger (29-2) by an 8-4 decision for fourth place.

"That's a matchup of the main players, except for Flagler not being here, for the 3A state meet," said Cobbert. "John is a state placer and went toe-to-toe with some strong guys. He's smart enough to know where to go to come back in February to battle with these guys. It's a long road to

the state meet and this tournament is step two with Bill Scott last week the first step."

In other matches, at 115, Fleming Island freshman Deandre Demus suffered his first losses of the year after beating numerous state caliber wrestlers in the first four weeks with Camden County's Lucas Nelson, a 5A state runnerup at 106, taking a 6-2 decision in the semifinals to push Demus back to the consolations rounds where he lost twice to finish sixth.

"He's only a freshman and he got his taste of a handful of great wrestlers," said Cobbert. "We'll toughen him up for the state meet so he's ready to battle six hard matches in a row."

At 128, Fleming Island senior Tracy Davis had the "moment of the tournament" with a heads-up two point takedown in the final two seconds of his consolation quarterfinals with Palm Harbor's Joe Capone to win 5-3 to advance and finish fifth with a pin over St. Thomas Aquinas' Vincent Sessa at 4:57.

"We preach mat awareness and wrestling to the whistle," said Cobbert. "His guy stopped for some reason at five seconds to go and Tracy took him down to win."

At 140, sophomore Paul Detwiler had a familiar face opposite him for a third straight time in Winter Springs' Dmitri Alicea, a key region opponent for Detwiler. Alicea beat Detwiler 6-4 in his quarterfinals with a late escape before doubling up with a 9-4 second win to push Detwiler to sixth place.

"He's got to find a way," said Cobbert.

At 184, sophomore Ryan Smenda fought back from a second round loss to Camden's Dominique Hargrave, a Georgia state runnerup last year, by major decision 10-2. Smenda got a pin over Winter Springs' Devon Quesinberry in a key region matchup before pinning 2A-Springstead's Brandon Burgess, a state qualifier, for fifth place

At 285, Brandyne Mackey, all of 215 pounds, matched up with at least 50 pounds against opponents over 250 pounds for a sixth place finish. Mackey lost his opener to Winter Springs's T.J. Boyd, a region 1-3A qualifier, by major decision 14-3 before going 3-1 before facing Boyd a second time and losing 9-7 for sixth place. Boyd, third at the Bill Scott Invite at Lyman



Olympians battle in half marathon

JACKSONVILLE – In one of the fastest half marathon fields in the United States, 27 male athletes answered the Olympic call with a record field qualifying for the February United States Olympic Trials Marathon.

With winner Jonathan Grey, 27, of Boulder, blasting ahead to win in one hour, two minutes, 47 seconds, the Jacksonville Bank Half Marathon course proved fruitful for the next 26 athletes who were all battling for a sub 1:05 split that would invite them to the Olympic Trials marathon. Men needed a 1:05:00 split to qualify while women needed a 1:15:00 split for their invite.

The closest call came to Tim Chichester, 27, of Mount Morris, Neb., who finished in 1:04:55 in 27th place while J.P. Slater, 25, of Berkeley, Calif., ran 1:05:05 to miss the standard

For the women, who ran in a tight pack past the eight mile mark, it was winner Stephanie Dinius, 26, of Brookline, Mass., leading the way in 1:13:39 with 14 women making the 1:15 standard with Wendy Thomas, 36, of Windsor, Colo., the final qualifier in 1:14:50.

Kim Pawelek-Brantly, 41, a four-time Olympic Trials marathon participant, ran a 1:26:38 for 49th place of the women.

In the adjoining marathon, Orange Park High graduate Justin Jacobs, now in Jacksonville, finished third in the rainy conditions with a 2:41:33 effort behind overall

Man charged with threatening to kill sheriff, judge

ORANGE PARK – Authorities have lodged new charges against a Middleburg man after he allegedly threatened to kill numerous public officials.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office first ar-

rested Anthony Brett Nix, 55, on Nov. 4 on battery charges after being admitted to the Orange Park Medical Center under the Baker Act, as officials deemed him to be a danger to himself or others. Nix's new charges stem from a Jan. 2 incident in which he was

again restrained under the Baker Act as he was found to be very agitated and hostile according to the CCSO report. was arrested for Two days later, on Jan. 4, two nurses witnessed Nix "throughout the day... became aggressive and verbally confrontational" and "began making statements about killing" Clay County Sheriff Rick Beseler, Fourth Circuit Court judge Peter L. Dearing, a Clay County Sheriff's Office deputy and one other man, the report stated. Nix's heavily redacted statements were confirmed by two OPMC nurses and he was charged with corruption by threat against a public servant, a felony under Florida law. He was booked into the Clay County Jail. At press time, he remained in jail without bond.

In his November arrest, Nix was charged with one count of battery on health

services personnel and criminal mischief.

Multiple drug charges for Orange Park woman

ORANGE PARK — An anonymous tip recently led Clay County Sheriff's Office investigators to charge an Orange Park woman with multiple drug offenses.

Police arrested Misty Regina Howard, 34, on Jan. 4 at 1:13 p.m. after launching their investigation on Dec. 30.

According to the police report, the anonymous caller told police that Howard had been selling prescription drugs and buying heroin.

During an interview inside the front

seat of a CCSO patrol car, police said, Howard turned her body to speak to an officer in the back seat, and when she did, "her shirt moved down and exposed the corner of a plastic bag sticking out of her bra," states the report.

A check of the plastic bag revealed a half gram of cocaine, a half gram of heroin, 21 methadone pills of differing dosages, six-and-a-half Xanax pills and three pieces of pills police could not identify.

Howard was booked into the Clay County Jail on two counts of possession of a controlled substance and one count each of possession of cocaine and possession of heroin. Her bond was set at \$70,012.

Crash kills father, two kids

JACKSONVILLE – The Florida Highway Patrol reports that an Orange Park man died in a one-vehicle accident near the merger of Interstates 295 and 10.

Police said James Wiley Roe III, 42, of Orange Park, was driving a 2002 F-150 truck on Jan. 2 at 11:10 p.m. when the crash occurred.

According to the FHP press release, Roe was heading north on I-295 toward the I-10 entrance ramp eastbound in the outside travel lane when he lost control of the truck and struck a piece of construction zone equipment. The investigation showed that Roe's truck continued westbound, collided with a tree causing it to rotate counter clockwise approximately 180-degrees and became engulfed in flames.

FHP pronounced Roe dead at the scene of the crash and transported his two children, Mya Allyssa Rose, 13, and Allyah Madison Rose, 10, to UF Health hospital where they were treated for minor injuries.

Sextortion charge for Middleburg teen

MIDDLEBURG – A Middleburg teen faces charges of threatening to extort a woman after she refused to have sex with him.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office arrested Zavian Charles Oliver, 18, on Jan. 2 at 6 p.m. at his home after conducting an investigation.

According to the police report, the in-

cident began on Dec. 28 when the victim – whose age was not disclosed –began communication with Oliver on Facebook video conferencing and text messaging.

Man charged after alleged drunken sex attack


MIDDLEBURG – A Middleburg man faces charges of holding a woman against her will and attempting to have sex with her following an investigation.

The witness told police he then forced the victim on the ground while he got on top of her and began demanding she have sex with him. He allegedly fled into the woods after the witness called 911.

After CCSO captured him, he was booked into the Clay County Jail, where at press time, he remained with bond set at \$50,003. He is charged with sexual battery on a victim with a weapon or force.

\$700K bond in Middleburg molestation case

MIDDLEBURG – Bond has been set at \$700,012 in the case of a Middleburg man arrested and charged with sexually abusing a local boy.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office arrest-

ed Adam Michael Mutchler, 28, on Dec. 31 at 3 p.m. after an investigation into the allegations.

According to the police report, the child's mother contacted the CCSO after she learned her son stated he had been molested.

While the age of the boy was not released, Mutchler's charges indicate the child was between the age of 12 and 16 at the time of the molestation.



CCSO officers set up a checkpoint near Carter Spencer Road and Deer Park Boulevard in hopes of stopping Rogers after he fled the scene, but one officer had to "push himself away from the driver side of front fender of the vehicle for fear of being ran over," states the CCSO report.

Police followed Rogers east on County Road 218 where they said he was driving erratically, lost control of his vehicle and got it stuck in a ditch. He was later placed in handcuffs after being taken down after a foot chase with police.

Rogers was booked into the Clay County jail, where at press time, he remained without bond.

Teen dies from Russell Road crash

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - The Florida Highway Patrol reports that a 17-year-old Clay County resident has died from injuries sustained in a Dec. 29 crash on Russell Road.

While stopped, police said, the ATV was struck from behind by a 2000 Chevrolet Silverado driven by Jeremy Truesdell, 18, also of Green Cove Springs

The ATV overturned into the dirt shoulder where it came to final rest. Truesdell's vehicle came to a final rest facing southeast halfway on the road and the dirt shoulder.

There is no indication that charges will be filed in the case.

Sexual battery charge dates back to 2012

ORANGE PARK - An unemployed Orange Park man is being held on \$75,003 bail after he allegedly performed sexual acts on a woman while she was uncon-

The Clay County Sheriff's Office arrested Bruce Alan Carter, 49, and charged with one count of sexual battery Jan. 5 after a warrant was issued for his arrest.

Between 2012 and 2014. Carter allegedly penetrated the victim's vagina with his fingers "while she was incapacitated under the influence of a narcotic," the Clay County Sheriff's Office report states.

The victim, who was 19- or 20-years old at the time of the incident, was given a narcotic by Carter for back pain "and the effects of the medication caused her to fall unconscious," the report states.

While the victim was unconscious, Carter inserted two or three fingers into her vagina and "was so rough during the act, she woke up from the pain," according to the report. The victim allegedly kicked Carter in the groin in order to get away from him.

At press time, he remained in the Clay County Jail.
