Penny sales tax on August ballot

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Clay County voters will get to have a say in determining their quality of life when they head to the voting booths for the Aug. 30 primary.

The Board of County Commissioners Tuesday voted 4-1, with Commissioner Ronnie Robinson opposing, to place a ballot item allowing voters to extend for 20 vears the current one-cent sales surtax that is on the books.



life," said George Egan, chief executive officer of the Reinhold Corp.

Egan was one of nine speakers who approached the podium June 14 to voice support for the tax, which has generated

more than \$290 million since its first approval in 1990. In the past, the surtax had funded such big ticket items as the Fleming Island Headquarters Library, the four-laning of Henley Road, youth sports venues and other capital projects. As it was last extended, the current tax is set to December 31, 2019 if not extended

Appeals court upholds Wilder life sentences

 ${\tt TALLAHASSEE-The\ 1st\ District\ Court\ of}$ Appeal has upheld two life sentences given to an Orange Park man in 2014 in connection with the death of Clay County Sheriff's Office drug detective David White. The court also affirmed his conviction.

Attorneys for Ryan Christopher Wilder, 34, appeared before the court asking judges to throw out his conviction for trafficking methamphetamine, the felony that under state law. allowed prosecutors to try Wilder for White's death as well as the



death of Ted Arthur Tilley, the meth cook who was shot by a deputy in the February 2012 raid on Alligator Boulevard in Middleburg. Wilder and Tilley had been smoking meth the day CCSO drug agents went to the home in which they had been squatting to conduct a routine "knock and talk" acting on a tip that drug activity was going on at the home.

Wilder is currently serving two consecutive life sentences and a concurrent 30-year term for trafficking methamphetamine. Wilder's attorneys argued to the court that the liquid methamphetamine by-product should not have been included

Why Melissa Nelson is a contender for State Attorney

JACKSONVILLE – Melissa Nelson sat in a catty-corner conference room tacked to the side of her pop-up election office in the Town Center area of town sipping tea and flipping through a music playlist on her smartphone she compiled since deciding to run Fourth Circuit State Attorney. She has her personal favorite, Rachel Platten's "Fight Song," some Eric Clapton and, of course, Survivor's "Eye of the Tiger."

Confident about her decision to run against incumbent Angela Corey, Nelson's campaign has amassed more than \$233,000 since filing to run on May 5. Prior to Nelson entering the race, the state attorney's race, Corey appeared headed toward an easy win after raking in some \$294,000 compared to challenger Wes White's \$32,810.

Nelson grew up the granddaughter of World War II veterans who survived the Great Depression. Some of her fondest memories are of the long walks she took

with her grandfather to slice apples for the horses in the stable near her childhood home in Tallahassee.

"Those were life lessons on those walks," Nelson said. "Much of my character and the way I live my life comes from lessons I learned from him."

He passed away in 1997 and the stables she once frequented are now a housing development, but the wisdom he shared with her on those walks followed her through a 12-year stint as a prosecutor.

For those who know Nelson, her policy on "tough but fair" sentencing should come as no surprise. Her father started as a sheriff's deputy on the street and eventually from law enforcement as a U.S. Marshal.

"It was he, when I graduated from law school, who admonished me," Nelson said. "He wrote me a letter and told me to never ever lose respect for the awesome power that my signature now held to change the trajectory of a life."

Fresh from University of Florida Levin College of Law, Nelson cut her teeth on misdemeanor trials, and then ultimately began prosecuting high profile murder cases such as the Jason Simpson double ax-murder trial of 2007, which resulted in the death penalty. She was eight months pregnant with her second child at the time.

Her experiences as a former prosecutor and current role as a civil attorney also helped mold her stance on fair and balanced sentencing. To illustrate this, she gives an example of three children steal-

ing from a grocery store where "One steals because he was dared, one because he's hungry, and one steals because he thinks it would be fun," she said. The same punishment for each child is not appropriate, she said, and explained that the "facts and circumstances drive a resolution that makes sense with public safety being the number one goal."

The fundamental power of the state attorney's office, Nelson said, is to be proactive in the approach to crime in the Fourth Judicial Circuit and use the office's platform to remain on the front end of problems through diversionary and re-entry programs.

"The data and research is unequivocal on the positive impact on the taxpayer on the benefit of those programs," Nelson said.

Nelson is known around courtrooms for her "tough but fair" prosecution methods among her peers such as Bill Bolena, former homicide detective for Jacksonville Sheriff's Office.

Candidates decline Clay Family survey due to irrelevant questions

FLEMING ISLAND – A growing number of Clay County candidates are declining to participate in Clay Family Policy Forum Inc. candidate surveys this year due to concerns over the relevancy of some of the questions.

This year's 93-question school board survey polls candidates' positions on everything from the participation of parents in policy creation to the necessity of the state mandated three percent reserve fund

Many of the questions on the 2016 school board survey polls candidates' opinions on social issues as well, such as marijuana legalization, abortion, same-sex marriage and the severity of the threat of radical Islam while offering only tangential connections back to education.

"There are 90 something questions on the questionnaire, and most of them are not relevant to the job at hand," said District 4 School Board candidate Mary Bolla. "I'm running for school board, and I would answer questions about my education, my

philosophy answer and about what I teach. I'm not sure about the validity of this particular questionnaire for the position that I'm running."

From its inception in March 2006, CFPF has committed itself to sampling election candidates on a broad range of topics and what it describes as pro-family social issues facing the country.

"They claim this is the most accurate survey there is to see who agrees with you. That is true," said Smitty Huffman, who ran for school board district three in 2012. "Is it the most accurate survey to see who the best candidate for office is? Absolutely not."

CFPF arranges all of the surveys into a voter guide that lists a cross section of candidate answers. Candidate's perspectives on abortion legislation reform has appeared at the top of nearly every guide for every office from Sherriff to school board. Huffman said that CFPF cherry picks answers to issues like these to "point out the differences between the ones that disagree with their philosophy" to "target those candidates."

Huffman said the questions themselves manufacture a "no winner" situation through intentionally biased phrasing.

"There are probably 10 areas they select to report on, and I don't feel that that's fair, balanced reporting," Bolla said. "I think there's definitely a bias as to what they're going to report on in relationship to who they're talking about."

CFPF President Mary Lib Stevenson of Green Cove Springs declined to comment on the 2016 candidate surveys.

In 2014, Clay County School Board District 5 candidate Sandra Dunnavant attempted to sue CFPF on grounds that the organization changed her answers on the group's election survey. Dunnavant later recanted her statements and dropped the lawsuit. Judgment on the case called for Dunnavant to pay \$30,000 to offset legal costs.

CFPF has input answers for candidates in the past who have declined to respond to the survey. During the 2014 race for District 3 School Board, Tina Bullock chose not to respond to the survey. She was included in the voter guide next to her opponent Betsy Condon, who was elected. CFPF filled in "accepted" on whether or not she would accept endorsements from the teachers union, in addition, they also answered "no" to a survey question regarding if she had changed her political affiliation

"I don't think it's designed to inform the public," Bullock said. "I think it's designed to support candidates that they want to win, and not support those that they don't, looking for people who look just exactly like them, who fall into this little narrow group of parameters, not anyone with differing

I think we saw why.


As word spread what had happened, people wanted to do something, anything, to help.

The horse race

In my life I've had the pleasure of meeting so many people from different backgrounds – from TV celebrities, U.S. ambassadors, CEOs, on down to ordinary people with extraordinary stories to tell.

It's part of what makes life great, knowing there are other cultures and other ways of thinking and living and that life goes way beyond the street on which I live.

After all, our families and our cultural backgrounds – paired with our

experiences – inform who we become as adults.

Sam Cofer was one of those people.

Sam was salty, yet diplomatic. Straightforward, yet focused. Determined, yet cordial.

His white hair, thick eyeglasses and portly frame embodied the Southern man of his era. He served on the statewide board of directors for the Georgia Department of Natural Resources and had a solid reputation as a scrapper.

While serving as a county commissioner in Glynn County, Georgia, Sam decried one day to a resident at a public meeting, "A difference of opinion is what makes a good horse race, son."

Think about that for a moment. What Sam was trying to say is that we are not all supposed to think the same thing, believe the same things and live the same way. It was also his way of politely saying to the resident speaking at that particular county commission meeting that "we will agree to

disagree."

Now, some could take Sam's words as the antithesis of unifying, yet it would be difficult to label him as divisive.

Division will always exist, but in an election year, division becomes more obvious, bordering on downright ugly and in your face.

Here's a look at some of that division.

Clay County voters heading to the polls on Aug. 30 will be conflicted due to a law effecting what's called the Closed Primary, a primary in which voters from just one political party can vote on any particular race. If a write-in candidate enters any open race, however, that race gets closed in the primary to voters from just that party, whereas, in a universal primary, all voters would have been allowed to vote.

In the State Attorney's race and the school superintendent's races, only Republicans will get to have a say because there are write-in candidates in each of those races. There is currently a lawsuit weaving through the courts asking a judge to determine whether the write-in – Fleming Island attorney Kenny Leigh – is a sham candidate and to open the primary to all voters. In the race for State Attorney, as it stands prior to the judge's ruling, voters will choose between Republicans Angela Corey, Melissa Nelson and Wes White. No candidate has qualified to run for State Attorney as a Democrat.

However, in the race for Clay County Sheriff, there is no write-in candidate and all of the properly registered voters in Clay County will get to have a say in who will be the county's top law enforcement executive. Wondered if that was strategically planned or what?

In the school superintendent race, voters get to choose between challenger Addison Davis of Oakleaf and current Superintendent Charlie Van Zant Jr. of Keystone Heights. The winner of the Aug. 30 primary will go on to face Non-Partisan candidate Rebekah Shively in the November election. While qualifying begins next week, Democrat Marion "Keith" Nichols has also announced his intentions to run for superintendent.

Only Republican voters will get to vote for Davis or Van Zant.

Months, if not years, after the 2012 election, hundreds, perhaps thousands, of Clay County voters expressed concern bordering on anger that they did not get to vote for the office of school superintendent because they were not registered as Republicans that year. With almost four years having passed to do some voter education, many voters, however, still do not understand that they face being shut out once again.

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Only voters registered as Republicans will get to vote on school superintendent.

As of Tuesday, as I sit here pecking out this message, there are 140,941 registered voters in Clay County. Of that total, 76,637 are registered as Republicans, 31,328 are registered as Democrats and 32,976 are registered as 'Other.' Compare the current numbers to April 28, when I began tracking the numbers on the Clay County Supervisor of Elections website, there were 76,291 registered Republicans, 31,448 registered Democrats and 32,936 registered as Others for a total of 140,675.

I've been told there has been a focused effort to have voters switch parties in order to participate in the Aug. 30 primary,

however, some voters are going to do what voters do – think for themselves.

Van Zant was elected by a mere 1,590-vote difference in 2012. Voters have until Aug. 1 to make changes in their registration prior to the Aug. 30 primary.

Amanda Cheshire has been taking her children to the library for most of her young life. Libraries are something she has always valued.



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Single father honored for dedication to Orange Park

ORANGE PARK – The life of a single father can be an arduous journey, but Jerry Seabrooks seems to make the best of it daily.

On May 17 when the Orange Park Town Council honored Seabrooks for his 11 years of service as an employee of the Orange Park public works department, council members also honored the hardships Seabrooks has overcome to keep his three children happy and healthy.

By his own admission, 99 percent of his time is spent working or with his kids. He said, it's been about six months since he last went on a date and even longer since he brought a woman home to meet his kids, and there's a reason for that, he said.

"I don't really have any females around," Seabrooks said. "I believe in setting an example for the kids. I don't believe in having females running in and out of the house. I have a daughter, and I can't get at her for doing bad things if she sees me doing bad things, so I don't have females sleeping over, never done that, because I believe in setting an example."

Seabrooks spends his days servicing his half of the 27 lift stations that help maintain the flow of sewage into the Town of Orange Park's water and sewer system.

Seabrooks is "old-fashioned" and prefers to teach his children through example, and it pays off. His son Jerrell, 11, made A Honor Roll this year at Grove Park Elementary. His daughter Tatyana, 19, is on her way to joining the U.S. Navy and following in her father's footsteps. Jerry Jr., 15, enjoys riding his bike around the neighborhood with his friends.

Jerry Seabrooks Jr. is between moder-

ate and severe on the autism spectrum but still shows the same respect and kindness that Seabrooks has worked to instill in his children. "If you have kids, especially boys, you teach them to have respect," the senior Seabrooks said.

"Respect for females, respect for themselves. You have to start early with these kids, I'm no expert I'm just going off what I know. You don't have to have kids, kids are something you have to want. I see kids as a blessing, yeah it's hard sometimes, but they're a real blessing."

In his daughter, he instilled the same respect and diligence to schoolwork that his mother and step-father instilled in him as a child

Chuck Pavlos, Orange Park public works director, doesn't know how Seabrooks juggles all of the responsibility that he does and still retains a perfect attendance record at work.

Pavlos said Seabrooks never been late or missed a day.

Seabrooks and his wife are divorced. Thankfully, Seabrooks said, he was able to gain custody of the kids and that "It was in their best interests. "She's just got some issues," Seabrooks said. "I don't even worry with it. It's all good, I'm happy, so it's all good,"

The challenges of being a single father can't be overlooked, said Tina St. Claire, executive director of Family Services and Resource Center in Orange Park.

"Fathers face social stigma," she said.

"A single father is perceived different than a single mother whether it's because divorce or loss, especially in cases of divorce, whether it's going to school meetings or into the doctor's office."

That stigma may be because of the disproportionate amount of single fathers and single mothers in Clay County, according to the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey. The survey cites that in Clay County there are an estimated 2,847 households living with a single father in 2014. That same year, however, the Census Bureau estimated there are 9,368 families living with a single mother.

St. Claire said that one of the keys to holding together a single parent household is the existence of a strong support system of friends and family that the parents can rely on if necessary.

According to St. Claire, divorce can really shock families, especially when the responsibility of a family is plopped on just one person. To alleviate that, she stresses the importance of "self-care."

Undoubtedly, the artwork that Seabrooks scribbles on poster board is his method of self-care, but at the end of the day, the best healing comes from his family.

"The end of the day is when everybody done ate, homework is done, and everybody is in bed. That's when I go to bed," Seabrooks said













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Sheriff's deputies, business team up on Zika virus

ORANGE PARK – As concerns over a potential Zika epidemic dominate headlines, the Clay County Sherriff's Office is getting one step ahead of the deadly virus.

For the past few weeks, detectives from the Clay County Sherriff's Office have been going around the county educating business owners on the dangers that the Zika virus presents. However, they have been targeting some businesses that wouldn't normally be associated with a virus at first glance – tire shops.

Tires holding standing water are something almost expected at any repair shop or scrap yard, but that should never be the case, as the dirty water creates a breeding ground for mosquitos.

While any standing water can attract disease-carrying mosquitos, tires are particularly susceptible due to their shape. The rubber material and enclosed space inside of tires, allows it to retain heat which acts as an incubator for mosquito larvae. The shape also makes it harder to simply dump the water out completely, generally needing some effort.

"We're taking a proactive approach with this," CCSO Environmental Detective Robert Dews said.

Dews is CCSO detective, in the environmental unit, which investigates everything from illegal dumping to public health concerns.

He and another detective have been traveling across the county with important literature for tire shop owners on how to protect themselves and the community

However, neither victim contracted the disease in the United States, and were a result of travel abroad. The CCSO is hoping that this proactive approach will prevent any further spread of the virus.

Earlier this month, news media and detectives visited establishments to check out the tire storage. On the detective's checklist were 29 tire businesses, but special attention was necessary for business-

es that have outdoor tire storage, such as Tire Place in Orange Park. "I've never had an issue with mosquitoes," said Lisa Crews

owner of Tire Place. "No complaints at all."

Crews' business was just one of many in Clay County that were inspected. Dews did acknowledge that most of the county's tire busi-

nesses don't have an issue with their storage practices, but it still doesn't undercut Crew's dedication to maintaining safe storage.

"We have a community of houses in the back of us, if we do it properly, we don't have a problem, we suck the water out and shake the tires," said Crews. "We're big on that, not only for the neighbors, but for myself and my employees because we don't want to get bit either."

The CCSO provided Crews and other business owner's literature provided by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection. Some important tips they listed include storing no more than 1,500 tires a month, disposing of waste tires at a solid waste management facility permitted by the DEP, and a reminder that business owners remain responsible for tires even after they are hauled away.

Proper disposal of tires is a way to prevent mosquitos from inhabiting a tire that was left on the side of the road or maybe in someone's backyard, those tires are especially dangerous because no one is shaking them or inspecting them regularly.

Crews proudly hung her new found tire and mosquito information in her business for her costumers to read.

"I want my costumers to stay safe," Crews said. "Whether they have tires or not, a lot of people have it in their minds that this is not even a problem, but it's a big problem, if it goes worldwide a lot of people could lose their lives."

Discovered in 1947 in Africa, 80 percent of people with Zika virus never show symptoms, according to Heather Parth, consortium epidemiologist for the Florida Department of Health serving Nassau, Baker, Clay, Flagler and Volusia counties. Parth told the Board of County Commissioners June 14 that there are 38 cases of Zika virus in Florida, all among pregnant females.

"Melissa is a hell of an attorney," Bolena said. "I really enjoyed working with her because she challenged the job, she made it interesting, she was fresh and she wanted to win and I really liked that."





Prominent Clay business leader David K. Robertson dies

ORANGE PARK - Long-time Clay County resident and business leader, David K. Robertson, died Monday.

Robertson, 64, who was from Savannah, Georgia, joined the Jacksonville-based architectural and engineering firm RS&H in 1981 as assistant controller and remained with the company until he retired as president and chief operating officer in 2013.

During that time, he was instrumental in growing the firm into one of the most recognized architectural and engineer-

ing firms in Florida while expanding the company's presence into other markets. Magazine "Engineer-News-Record" ranked RS&H in the top 100 firms nationally in the past 10 years. After his retirement, Robertson remained on RS&H's David K. Robertson board of directors.



His reputation for integrity, fairness and business acumen led him to serving many high-profile roles in Clay County and Duval County, including chairman of the Clay County Chamber of Commerce, Clay County Utility Authority and Clay County Development Authority.

Robertson was well known in Northeast Florida for his passion for promoting economic growth. In addition to his roles as chairman, he served on the board of directors of the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce, was president of Leadership Jacksonville, board member at Baptist Hospital of Florida, Haven Hospice and the NE Florida Regional Leadership Academy. He also served on the Business Advisory Council of the University of North Florida, was a mentor for Leadership Florida and served on the leadership council of Take Stock in Children.

"David was a true leader in all aspects of his personal and professional life with exceptional motivation skill," said Leerie T. Jenkins Jr., chairman of RS&H's board of directors. "He was a loved and respected business partner for 35 years and a true friend. We will miss him greatly."

In 1990, the employees of RS&H, under the leadership of Robertson and Jenkins and other executives, purchased the assets and name of Reynolds, Smith and Hills Inc. beginning a trajectory of growth that exists today.

Robertson received a bachelor of science in accounting from Florida State University in 1974 and became a certified public accountant in 1978. He is survived by two daughters, Delaine Robertson of Tallahassee and Dawn Powell of Atlanta. Funeral arrangements had not been finalized Tuesday.

FWC to consider Florida Bear hunt options

TALLAHASSEE – After receiving extensive input from the general public, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commissioner released four options that FWC commissioners will consider on how to best move forward with controlling Florida's growing bear population, which is estimated to have swelled across Florida over the past 10 years.

The four options range from holding a bear hunt with the identical framework as last year to no bear hunting in Florida at all. The staff recommendation is for a more conservative and accountable hunt beginning in 2016. "The biologists and staff at FWC value all of the input we've received throughout the development of our comprehensive bear management program and we hope more Floridians will continue to provide input on the best way to manage Florida's growing bear population. We look forward to continuing to have a transparent, accountable process where everyone has their voices heard on this critical topic," said Nick Wiley, FWC Executive Director. "We look forward to presenting this information to the Commission at our June

meeting, and we invite all those interested to provide feedback on options that we've prepared for the Commission's consideration. Our focus will continue to be how to balance what's best for Florida's growing bear population with the safety of Florida families and our visitors."

Option 1 suggests holding a bear hunt in 2016 with identical framework to the hunt held in 2015, but with updated hunt objectives. Option 2 suggests holding a smaller scale bear hunt using input received from the public, a move FWC biologists recommend. Option 3 involves postponing bear hunting in Florida until 2017. Option 4 would be for the Commission to repeal bear hunt rules and not allow bear hunting in Florida in future years.

The Commission will consider all of these options, as well as the staff recommendation in its entirety for a more conservative bear hunt on June 22 at their meeting in Eastpoint. The public can provide input on all of the options at MyFWC. com/bear. The meeting will be streamed live on the Florida Channel.

ORANGE PARK — When a Wawa store opens in a community, the crowd is more reminiscent of the thousands fans that screamed at The Beatles when they first arrived on American soil in 1964.

For instance, when Wawa opened its first Orlando store, so many customers jammed themselves into the convenience store that the normal three-minute ticket times for hoagies had turned to two hours and even the Chief Executive Officer Chris Gheysens got behind the counter to assemble sandwiches for the excited customers.

In Clay County, Wawa hopes to draw that same kind of crowd when it opens its first store here as part of 25 to 35 stores the Wawa, Pennsylvania-based company plans to open in Northeast Florida in late 2017. Wawa is also the Native American word for goose.

The announcement comes from last Thursday's press conference held at the Thrasher-Horne Conference Center, which drew Wawa employees from all over Florida, Clay County business leaders, and Wawa's mascot – Wally Goose.

In Clay County, the first store is set to open at the corner of Blanding Boulevard and Filmore Street near the current location of the Community Hospice Thrift Store. Construction for the first wave of

stores will begin in the spring of 2017, with groundbreakings set about nine months after construction begins, said Brian Duke, real estate manager.

While Wawa answered many questions during last Thursday's press conference, some answers are a bit harder to articulate, namely, what is a Wawa?

For most, Wawa is a great place for a morning chat while grabbing a quick cup of coffee and a hoagie. For die-hard fans,

however, Wawa is a tattoo spread across their chest, for others still, Wawa is the place they got married.

On paper, Wawa is a convenience store who specializes in fresh subs made quick, coffee, gas and all the other standard fare. Ask any Wawa zealot and they'll say Wawa is a bit more than a sandwich and a smile.

"You can sell a good hoagie, but when you give out a hug, when you make someone's day that unexpected moment of caring, or fun, or laughter, that personal exchange," Gheysens said. "That's what our business is about. That's what really separates us."

Wawa cares about its employees as much as its customers. Opening pay for a Wawa employee is \$10 an hour. Employees hold stock in the company and have just as much input on the franchise's forward inertia as Gheysens, who introduced himself June 9 as "the least important person at Wawa."

"The people that, a little over a year from now, will make your coffee, will greet you in the morning, make your hoagies, the ones holding the door for you hopefully, the people that will see you late at night and early in the morning, those are the people who are most important of all." Gheysens said

The care carries over to the community as well, said Todd Souders, director of

Food nirvana on Blanding Boulevard

ORANGE PARK — Standing in refreshing contrast to the suburban banality of Blanding Boulevard is a yellow, red and green restaurant, serving mostly fish tacos and burgers, like one might find at Jacksonville Beach. Slogans inside the building and out — some painted on surfboards — read "Crave The Wave," Eat Well Travel Often," "Here may become there but never ceases to be . . ." and, most important to the joint's rationale of exoticism and satisfaction, "Food Nirvana."

With its combination of colorfully painted walls, beachy decorations, hanging surfboards and tiki heads, the Jimmy Hula's at 174 Blanding Boulevard serves food and fun.

Upon entering the restaurant, a huge menu of tacos, sandwiches, "munchies" and more greets customers. Inside, various ornaments hang from bright-blue rafters and colorful vinyl bench-seats from cars stand where booths would be in other restaurants.

The restaurant's building, once a home to pawn shops and before then a Pizza Hut, holds 90 patrons inside, 40 outside, and occupies about 5,000 square feet.

"It seems like everybody comes in here." said Mark Lockett, general manager.

The restaurant attracts a big lunch crowd of families and businessmen in Orange Park. The atmosphere, Lockett said, attracts customers more than anything else.

"This is a different place," he said. "There's not really anywhere else like this in Orange Park. . . . It's something tropical you can't really get anywhere else."

Indeed, Jimmy Hula's exudes a difference from typical Orange Park fare. Its wide offering of fish tacos, its roadside cornhole games and its wacky decorations don't remind patrons of same-old-same-old, sit-down establishments or rowdy, dirty sports-bars.

The restaurant gets its name from founder Jim "Jimmy" Hartman who, along with his son Zach Hartman, opened their first food shack — Jimmy Hula's Original Fish Tacos, Burgers & Beer — in Winter

Park, Florida in March 2011.

Lockett called the new Jimmy Hula's "the beach away from the beach" and the new franchise has brought an exhilaratingly unique aspect to the dining of Orange Park since its opening in February.

"It's dope!" Avery Hayes of Middleburg said of Jimmy Hula's. In addition to the atmosphere, the wide array of craft beers draws customers, such as Pam Dorfman of Middleburg, who commented, "I love their selection of beers!"

Jimmy Hula's, it seems, sets out to

satisfy completely. The delicious meals do provide "food nirvana," sure, but the funbut-not-too-fun and Hawaiian atmosphere of the place demands a more comprehensive slogan, perhaps "dining nirvana."

On Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays, patrons play cornhole outside, and on Fridays and Sundays, the restaurant's busiest days according to Lockett, various local bands play live music.

Now Orange Park residents no longer have to cross the Pacific, or even the Buckman Bridge, to get a taste of the islands.



Just a Pinch Café and Catering Fresh from the island, on the island

FLEMING ISLAND – The suites at Village Square on Fleming Island have a bit of a reputation of being competitive. Restaurants there compete in an endless arm wrestle for the lunch rush. The strong survive and the weak are washed up in a stream of mediocre online reviews. Luckily for Bernard Santiago and his fiancé Cleta Greenwood, they already kind of look fresh from a shipwreck.

In the last week, it's been full sails for Just a Pinch Café and Catering on Fleming Island. The attention comes when foodies caught wind of the 12,000 square foot kitchen that popular food blogging fite, Charleston Food Bloggers, named it best restaurant in Clay County.

In a June 8 blogpost, the bloggers broke down Florida bite by bite and named the best restaurant in each county. Charleston Food Bloggers proclaims itself as the "most followed food blogger in the south" and the numbers are there to back it up. Within the first week, the blogpost, which itself is so long the scroll bar becomes a tic-tac, had amassed more than 100,000

"I'd say 30 percent of people that have been coming in here have been because of this blog," Santiago said. "It's great."

In its eight months on the island, Just a Pinch Café and Catering on Fleming Island has already carved a name for itself among the bowtie crowd and t-shirt crowd as a go-to spot for weekend breakfast and weekday lunch.

Santiago, the general manager and executive chef, breaks down his style of cuisine as 70 percent Southern and 30 percent Hawaiian.

'We definitely win the arm wrestle for the breakfast rush on the weekend Saturday Sunday breakfast and brunch," Santiago said.

Santiago and Greenwood, co-owners, created their menu in their kitchen at home through a combination of both of their individual styles. Of course, Santiago has the final say on any changes, considering at any given time he is the only chef in the kitchen.

"Some recipes and preparation styles that I've done for years, she's tweaked or changed and made it better and we serve it today in our restaurant," Santiago said. "It's a great partnership."

While Santiago takes care of most of

store operations for Wawa Florida.

"When we talk about community, when we talk about culture, we live this every day," Souders said. "In Florida, we've donated over \$2 million dollars to local communities."

Customers pick up on that kind of care, Gheysens said, it's is one of the reasons Wawa is such a welcoming place. He cites the prolonged door holding that customers know Wawa for as one of the symptoms of that care.

Wawa also cares for its community through direct and indirect methods. Each Wawa represents a minimum \$5 million dollar investment in the community and, as Bill Garrison president of the Clay County Economic Development Corp. explains, Wawa's economic waves don't end after that initial investment.

"It's going to generate \$1 million dollars payroll per store [per year] at least, and God only knows how much sales tax it's going to generate," Garrison said.

The local one-cent sales tax that Clay County charges generates \$16.5 million dollars annually. That figure will only rise as Wawa opens more stores, Garrison said.

Because Wawa's minimum wage is higher than the current federal minimum wage, Wawa will put upward pressure on entry-level jobs, for which companies fight to retain competent workers.

The pressure doesn't end there, however. Wawa is one of the nation's largest gasoline distributors. When Wawa opened in Orlando gas prices dropped 10 cents to the delighted wallets of locals. Gheysens doesn't promise the same effect will happen in Clay County.

In the end, it might be impossible to nail down the exact reason for Wawa's cult following. A cult following that inevitably resulted in a Market Force study that named Wawa as America's most beloved convenience store in a 2015.

Residents will just have to see for themselves what all the fuss about Wawa is all about when Clay County's first Wawa

Gheysens, however, has a good idea on

why people just can't seem to get enough of Wawa.

"The beauty of Wawa is, it's your community," he said. "It's CEO next to soccer mom next to teenager next to purple, green, yellow, it's casual and comfortable. It doesn't really have a vibe that you'd find in other retailers, and that's why people hold the door."

the back end of the restaurant, Greenwood designed the dining room's décor with the idea of creating a warm and inviting area for guests. Santiago said that she succeeded in that.


The 30 seats in the restaurant help seal in a private, welcoming feel. Santiago said it also helps to have many of his customer's names and orders memorized.

extending the sales tax is vital to continue to make the county competitive as a place companies wish to locate high-skill, highwage jobs.

"Be it resolved the board of directors of the Clay County Economic Development Corp. does hereby support the extension of the one-cent optional sales surtax in order to retain a reliable source of revenue to fund Capital Improvement Projects which are critical to supporting the continued growth and expansion of Clay County's economy, and Clay County's unique and high quality of life," read CCEDC President Bill Garrison from a resolution by the organization's board.

Luis Torres, executive director of the Clay County Soccer Club, spoke out supporting the tax because he said it helps changes the lives of Clay County children by providing places to take part in healthy sporting activities.

"I advocate the tax because of the personal things I've seen and have witnessed and the benefits that youth sports brings to the children in Clay County and the board has graciously supported our efforts to grow our club," Torres said.

When BCC members set the public hearing, they first set out to obtain public input about whether the tax should be extended for 30 years, but at least two speakers Tuesday suggested a 30-year tax may be a hard sell in this year's contentious election environment.

"A lot of citizens will support this if it were scaled back to 15 years," said Brenda Kicsak of Fleming Island.

Under terms established by previous boards of county commissioners, the penny sales tax is divided proportionally among the various government entities in Clay County, as well as the Clay County School District. The BCC keeps 88 percent of the tax revenue to spend on capital projects. Both mayors of Green Cove Springs and Orange Park attended the public hear-

ing and spoke in support of the measure, however, no one from the school district attended.

"Speaking of the school district, is there anyone here from the school district?" asked Chairman Diane Hutchings. "That's interesting."

Before taking a vote on whether the tax should be extended for 30 or 20 years, commissioners took part in a debate amongst themselves. The majority of commissioners supported the concept of the tax, however, Robinson said he was going to vote against the measure because he remains opposed to how a previous bond was handled by the county. He said the county had an outstanding \$90 million bond on which is pays \$9 million a year in principal and interest.

If not passed, commissioners discussed the reality of having to hike property taxes to fund such necessities as roads, police and fire equipment and other facilities, such as a new county animal shelter.

"I do feel that there's not a question of anyone not wanting their property taxes to go up, because that's exactly what we would have to do is we'd have to hit the ceiling on every front with property taxes and you're putting all of the burden of the cost of government on the back of the people that own property, so that's about as inequitable as it can get and that's the alternative," Hutchings said.

In terms of the sales tax, Hutchings said sales taxes are more equitable because they get to be paid by everyone who comes to Clay County, not just the homeowners and other residents who live here.

"The one-cent, to me, is probably one of the fairest taxes, I think, in terms of local government and I'm not just thinking about this board, I'm speaking about boards before I came on have been very diligent with making sure that they were wise in their decisions," Hutchings said.

In the middle of the commissioners' discussion, County Manager Stephanie Kopelousos made a heartfelt plea intended to urge attendees to think about the future

needs of Clay County.

"This is about our community. It's going to take all of us standing together and if people have a concern about it, then we need to talk to them and understand that and work through those concerns because this is about the future of Clay County.

"We have this beltway coming and it's going to bring growth whether we're excited about it or not. It gives an opportunity to keep our community the way we want it and to plan ahead," Kopelousos said.

As approved, the ballot item will be placed on the Aug. 30 primary ballot asking voters to extend the tax to 2039. Kopelousos said the county preferred to place the item on the August ballot because the November ballot will contain a large number of state referendum items that push all local questions to the bottom of the ballot.

County officials, she said, will be available to conduct meetings and give presentations between now and Aug. 30 to explain the benefits of the tax. She even offered her cell phone number to attendees and web and TV viewers.

"We may disagree on the timing on it, but I hope we can all stand together and say this is important to our community and I say to all of you, feel free to give my cellphone number out if people have a concern because I think when people see what we've spent it on, and what the future is," Kopelousos said.

In other business:

Commissioners voted 5-0 to reject a proposal to convert a mobile home park on Doctors Lake Drive to a recreational vehicle park on grounds it was not compatible with the neighborhood. In discussing the issue while agreeing to "defer to my district commissioner [Hutchings represents Doctors Lake Drive]," Commissioner Wendell Davis pointed out that the land in question could alternatively be developed into 96 homes, therefore, creating even more of the similar concerns of congestion and road traffic raised by area residents opposing the RV park.

Commissioners discussed whether or not to direct county staff to amend a county ordinance prohibiting furniture, such as tents and tables, from being erected at polling places during upcoming and future elections. Currently, under state law candidates are prohibited within a 100 foot buffer from voting sites, while a county ordinance prohibits signs and other paraphernalia on any part of polling place grounds.

Dream Day conquers living with illness

JACKSONVILLE – For Jacob Lopez, life was a series of storms. At the age of 8, a car accident left him with a collapsed lung, five punctures in his bowel, a cranial fracture, a traumatic brain injury, a broken vertebra in his spine and a completely severed spinal cord. He spent nearly three weeks in a coma, and will likely spend the rest of his life in a wheelchair.

However, Saturday morning, as dark clouds bruised the sky, and thunder bellowed, it fell on deaf ears. All the sunshine in the world beamed from Jacob's smile. As he rolled down the red carpet he danced and, for at least one day, no storm would dare rain on his parade.

Surrounded by his favorite story book and film characters, Jacob arrived on a fire truck early Saturday at the third annual Dream Day, a special celebration for local children with life threatening illnesses. As a collaboration between Dreams Come True of Jacksonville, a dream-granting organization for children with life-threatening illnesses, and PRI Productions, the event gave 50 local children a day to remember.

"It's been an amazing experience," said Maria Munoz of Argyle, Jacob's mother. "He's been so happy, waiting for this day for so long. We didn't expect all of this, and when you come and see all these people cheering for him, it's amazing. It's such a beautiful experience for him and the other kids."

Life was difficult for Jacob in the months following the car accident that nearly took his life. After six months of wound care and passing through the stages of brain recovery, his parents worried they'd never fully have their son back.

"Our hope was purely to get back that little boy," said Bill Miller, Jacob's father. "We know his attitude, we know his spirit, we know those special things about him, and if we could just get that part of him back, then the paralysis is manageable. We can take care of that."

The biggest concern for the father was Jacob's brain injury, which left him in a coma for three weeks. During this time even when he was out of the coma, Miller said, he wasn't himself.

"With all of that, he's a remarkable, resilient, happy, outgoing young man," Miller said. "A little tired today, but he is an amazing kid. To come through what he has is just remarkable."

Jacob, who was the final Dream Day guest, spent most of his day on the dance floor with a crowd of actors dressed as some of his favorite movie stars and cartoon characters, a completely different

figure from the boy his parents saw in the hospital.

"Dream Day helped without a doubt," Miller said. "We've had so much support throughout this time period. He was still in the hospital when they notified us that he'd been nominated, and received a dream. At that point things were still really up in the

air for him, and to get something that big and that miraculous, just showed him the fun in life is still there, it's still part of who you are."

Dreamers like Jacob are the reason Dreams Come True and PRI Productions strive to create great memories like Dream Day, according Andrea Siracusa, senior manager of programs and community relations at Dreams Come True. When a child's struggles do not end after a Dream, the organization tries to provide moments of joy that will lift their spirits and show them that our community cares.

"He is a wonderful example of how a child can live with a disability, and make everyone smile," Siracusa said. "Throughout all of his suffering, his attitude has stayed positive and his ability to make the best of any situation is remarkable."

In the future, Jacob will fulfill his dream of visiting every theme park at Walt Disney World. According to his father, Jacob's dream was sponsored by Mandarin Middle School's Dream Club, which has sponsored a child's dream 20 years in a row. The family was welcomed to meet the sponsors in a party they through in Jacob's honor.

"It makes them feel special that they feel no matter what it is we have the support," Munoz said. "Seeing your child so happy, that's enough for you, you have everything."

in the amount the state required to charge him with trafficking. Wilder contends that because the by-product was "not marketable," it should be subtracted from the amount.

Tilley answered the door and opened fire on the deputies, killing Detective White and injuring another. Tilley then ran into the backyard where a deputy stationed in the backyard shot and killed him.

"Wilder was making meth during the time of the shooting," said State Attorney Angela Corey in a press release. "Even though Wilder was not the shooter, he was involved in another felonious act during this incident, which under state law, holds him responsible for the murder of Detective White and the death of Tilley."

After the situation was contained, deputies conducted a search of the house revealed approximately 1 gram of methamphetamine at various stages in the production process and a glass vase containing 26.2 grams of a liquid-by product left over from the manufacturing process.

"If Wilder is correct, then his trafficking conviction must be reversed because the weight of the remaining methamphetamine recovered at the scene was well below the 14 gram threshold for trafficking, and if Wilder's trafficking conviction is reversed, his first-degree and second-degree felony murder convictions must also be reversed because the trafficking offense was the predicate felony for those convictions," states the appeal court document released June 15.

Wilder was found guilty of methamphetamine trafficking, which under Florida law includes any amount above 14 grams.

He called for a reversal in the conviction because of this, and said that the methamphetamine present in the house was far below the 14-gram limit. "There is no ambiguity in these statutes," the report said.

The court ruled that Wilder's argument concerning marketability of the drug was not tied to how the legislature wrote the statute involving drug trafficking because the drug is illegal, marketability is not a factor

"This would be a hollow victory for Wilder because he would still be subject to a mandatory life sentence since the jury was instructed on – and the evidence was more than sufficient to support convictions for – the lesser included offenses of possession of less than 14 grams of methamphetamine

and third-degree felony murder of the deputy. Any mixture that contains any amount of methamphetamine is accounted for in the weighing process," states the appeal ruling.

Because Wilder's first and second-degree felony murder chargers are predicated on the methamphetamine trafficking conviction, however, if Wilder had been able to convince the jury to reverse his conviction, then his first-degree and second-degree felony murder convictions would have also been reversed because they form the base of his case.

Wilder raised four issues in his appeal, but only one merited discussion, the court stated.

While the drug raid and shooting deaths occurred Feb. 16, 2012 at 4874 Alligator Blvd. in Middleburg, police did not arrest Wilder until April 5, 2012.


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Do kids and lawn mowers always mix?

With all this wind and rain we have been having, lots of small branches get scattered throughout the lawn.

The other day I was passing a yard where a school-aged child was on a riding mower speeding along with no regard to what lay in his path.

As a result, the mower — I suppose without a functioning deck discharge guard — hurled something toward the roadway. This prompted this article about mower safety and what we should be teaching our children when we let them operate the family mower.

• Teach them to pick up all stones, sticks, pine cones and other debris before mowing to avoid damaging the mower or injuring someone with flying objects.

Teach children not to try to pick up debris – while on the mower with engine running – by reaching over to grab it, which I have seen some doing.

This is very dangerous. Pick-up first, before starting to mow!

• Teach them to mow so discharge is always away from the road and don't let pets or other children in the yard when it is being cut.

It's not cute to have a family dog go barking at the discharge shoot! Injury to their face and eyes is likely.

• Teach them to keep all mower safety equipment in place and repair/replace it if it becomes ineffective.

I have seen people tie the deck discharge guard back so they can mow grass when it is wet or too high so it won't chock the blades.

Don't do this — it's dangerous — even better — don't mow wet grass because it spreads disease and does not give you a sharp cut. If grass is so high it is chocking out the mower — raise the blade and slow the forward speed down.

• You do the filling when it comes to mowers because children do not under-

stand fully the danger of gas and its fumes. Remember – don't fill a hot mower with gas even if you have only a little bit more to do. Take a break for 20 minutes or so, and to make filling safer and easier, always pour from small containers. Anything larger than one gallon should be used as a "storage" container, not fill container. A twogallon container or larger is almost impossible to use as a filling container without spilling some all over the mower. To avoid damage from accidental spills to the lawn itself, when adding fluids (gas or oil), do the filling on a hard surface. This also allows for easier cleanup should a spill occur.

- Teach children never to try to free a bound mower blade or do any work under the mower, unless the spark plug wire has been disconnected. Better yet — they should get an adult to do it.
- If children are to do the mowing, be sure they are well instructed in safety and keep an eye out to make sure they follow the directions you give. Have them wear regular shoes not flip flops or worse no shoes
- When using a riding mower, stress to children to always look behind them when they back up just as with a car.

There are no rear view mirrors on the mower, so it's up to them to take extra care!

• Finally – mowing slopes or near ditches or slopes is the most dangerous task anyone on a riding mower can attempt.

Perhaps an adult should take over this job by mowing the lawn perimeter before turning the mower over to a child. It's just too easy to slip if using a walk behind, and even easier to turn over using a riding mower on a slope.

Each child is different in their maturity levels — I started mowing at 12 and even though mature, did lots of the stupid things I listed above even though I knew better. It's a wonder I still have all my toes and fingers.



his plea last week in U.S. District Court in Jacksonville. He faces a mandatory minimum penalty of not less than five years, up to 20 years, in federal prison and a potential life term of supervision. A sentencing hearing has not yet been set.

According to court documents, Federal Bureau of Investigation agents began an online undercover investigation to identify individuals who were using a particular website to access and receive images and videos depicting child pornography. The agents determined that Jacola had accessed this website using a particular Internet Protocol address. Further investigation with the Internet service provider traced the subscriber information to Jacola's residence in Green Cove Springs.

This case was investigated by the FBI and the Clay County Sheriff's Office and is being prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorney D. Rodney Brown.


Clay County woman is facing charges child sex charges


tion at Orange Park Medical Center. They were both transported to a juvenile correctional facility.

Jackson was arrested and transported to the Clay County Jail.


Shooter gets 21-years in prison

DOCTORS INLET – A Doctors Inlet man with a lengthy criminal history was recently sentenced to 21 years in a Florida prison in connection with the shooting death of his girlfriend in October 2014.

Judge John H. Skinner sentenced Elliott William Orsborn, 28, on April 27 for the shooting death of Jamie Lee Martin,

26, in a home they shared at 2041 Ashton St. in the Orange Park South community.

Orsborn was also sentenced to pay \$4,294 to the state Victim's Compensation Trust Fund after entering a plea agreement to charges of manslaughter

with a firearm and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon. He was given a threeyear concurrent sentence for the weapon's charge.

CCSO received a 911 call around 12:30 a.m. on October 4, 2014 shortly after witnesses said they saw Orsborn playing around with a .22-caliber handgun. Witnesses told police that Orsborn held the gun up to Martin's forehead, pulled the trigger and shot her in the forehead.

The couple had been drinking and play-

ing music in the garage of their home with friends who witnessed the incident. One witness told police that Orsborn had been playing and showing off the gun intermittently throughout the night and that she believed the gun was not loaded.

Another witness said at one point, Martin jokingly slapped Orsborn across the face, according to police. Shortly afterward, Orsborn allegedly removed the gun from this shorts pocket and shot Martin "in the forehead."

According to the police report, Orsborn "immediately said he did not mean to shoot her" and the fled the scene on foot. Meanwhile, Martin was transported to Orange

Park Medical Center where she was pronounced dead.

Orsborn has faced previous charges of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. In November 2010, while living temporarily at the Inn Town Suites at 442 Blanding Blvd., Orsborn was charged with pulling a knife on the hotel's courtesy clerk just minutes after he allegedly shouted obscenities and threw a cigarette lighter at the victim.

Court records show that Orsborn pleaded guilty to that charge — a second degree felony — and was sentenced to 90 days in jail while being given credit for having served 50 in the Clay County Jail while awaiting trial on the charge.

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



Property values increase in Clay

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - The 2016 taxable value of all properties in the county is estimated at approximately \$9.2 billion - an annual increase of more than \$440 million, according to Roger A. Suggs, Clay County Property Appraiser.

Suggs submitted the taxable value estimates to the Clay County taxing authorities on June 1 and, for the fourth year in a row, the taxable value of Clay County has increased.

The statutory assessment date for the 2016 assessment roll is January 1, 2016. Therefore, the overall value increase reflects an upward trend in the real estate market during 2015.

Although market values have increased, the assessed values of properties with a homestead exemption will be limited or

'capped' at a 0.7 percent increase (excluding any additions or improvements) and non-homestead residential and commercial properties will be limited or 'capped' at a 10 percent increase due to constitutional amendments passed by voters in 1992 and 2008, respectively. Taxable value is based on the market value minus differentials ('caps') and exemptions.

Robust permit activity and new construction are contributing factors in the taxable value increases in the county and most taxing authorities. Although new construction is still significantly lower than the peak in 2006 when it reached \$650 million, the taxable value of new construction has remained positive over the past four years.

Increases in the taxable value, and the taxable value of new construction for the various taxing authorities in Clay County,

include:

Board of County Commissioners: 5.00 percent increase; \$170,048,028 new construction

School Board: 5.00 percent increase; \$180,704,632 new construction

Green Cove Springs: 6.00 percent increase: \$19.614.612 new construction

Orange Park: 4.25 percent increase; \$4,258,569 new construction

Penney Farms: 6.0 percent increase; \$226,435 new construction

Keystone Heights: 2.50 percent increase; \$62,304 new construction

St. Johns River Water Management District: 5.15 percent increase; \$170,444,755 new construction

The Property Appraiser's Office is required to provide a certification of taxable value to the Department of Revenue and local taxing authorities on July 1.



OAKLEAF – Under new head coach Steve Reynolds, Oakleaf High football will have some questions to answer on one hand, but also, on the other hand, Reynolds will have an easy answer to the first obvious questions

Question one of the two: Offense?

Answer: Two four year players; quarterback Jordan Johnson and wide out Rontrez Morgan.

the near-miss of the playoffs, most hurtful. 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Sorrento gets national championship game time

ST. GEORGE, Utah — The Butler softball team is the 2016 National Junior College Athletics Association (NJCAA) National Champions after a 4-2 come-from-behind victory over defending national champ Chipola (Fla.) in the title game played Saturday at the Canyons Complex. The national title is the first in program history and is the 12th in Butler history (six football, two men's cross country, men's basketball and women's cross country).

One key player for the Chipola Junior College team is Oakleaf High graduate Brianna Surrento, a first baseman and pitcher. Surrento was named an All-Tournament selection for the Florida College System Athletics Association (FCSAA) championship tournament prior to the NJCAA tournament. Chipola won the FCSAA title. Surrento was also selected as a second team first baseman for the All Panhandle Conference team.

Against Butler, Surrento had three at-bats and one hit for Chipola. Surrento grounded out twice, but singled in the top of seventh to set up a possible Chipola comeback. Surrento, at first base for Chipola, the defending national champions, also executed a double play in the bottom of the sixth inning with a 5-6-3 play around the infield. Surrento had eight putouts for the game.

In Chipola's 9-7 semifinal win over Salt

Chipola was the 2015 national junior college champions.

Lake, Surrento was the starting pitcher, but gave up seven earned runs in 3.1 innings with two homers. Reliever Ilona Andringa finished the game with three strikeouts in 3.2 innings to earn the win.

For the 2016 season, Surrento played in 63 games, hit at .356 with six homers, 53 runs batted in and just 16 strikeouts.

As a pitcher, Surrento finished at 10-2 with two saves in 30 game appearances and 14 starts (114.1 innings). Surrento gave up 113 hits, 38 earned runs and 22 walks to finish with a 2.33 earned runs average. She also had a .967 field percentage from her first baseman position with just six errors in 183 touches.

In the championship game, Butler (53-8, sixth ranked in NJCAA) fell behind early on as Chipola's Madison Ragan launched a solo home run to right with two outs in the top of the first inning against Butler starter Jennifer Hittinger.

Chipola (49-15) added another run in the third inning on a triple and a Butler error to take a 2-0 lead.

Hittinger would then throw three straight scoreless innings to earn the win, finishing the year with a 24-1 record.

Chipola won games over Miami Dade, Central Florida, Florida Southwestern and Seminole State to advance and win the FC-SAA title 6-2 over Florida Southwestern State.

The Florida Gators have a very deep pitching staff, making it tough for even quality arms to get regular innings. Such has been the case for Dunning, who has the stuff to start, but because he has more value for the team as a reliever, hasn't been a regular part of the rotation in 2016. Dunning has gotten some starts on Tuesdays, but because of him being needed to relieve on weekends, it's been sporadic. But many scouts feel he has the stuff to be in a rotation at the next level. He has a plus fastball, up to 95 mph, sitting 92-93 mph and with outstanding movement. He has a very good feel for his changeup as well. His breaking ball is fringy, but shows glimpses of being an average offering. Dunning's arm is so quick that he sometimes struggles with keeping the ball down in the zone, an issue most feel is correctable. Dunning reminds some of another talented Gators arm who had trouble finding rotation innings in college: Anthony DeSclafani, Dunning has the chance to be similar, a relatively quick to the big leagues back-end starting



Cleveland Indians Round 24, 722 pick

Skylar Arias, LHP (Tallahassee CC, Oakleaf High School grad.)

From Scout.com (Jeff Ellis): With their 24th round pick (No. 722 overall) in the 2016 Draft the Cleveland Indians have selected left-handed pitcher Skylar Arias out of Tallahassee Community College (FL). Skylar Arias is a 6'3" lefty from Tallahassee Community College. He just completed his freshman year and like most of the guys the Indians have targeted he is a player who showed excellent command all year. He had 89 strikeouts to just 19 walks this year and averaged nearly 11 strikeouts per nine innings. The negative is he also averaged

more than a hit an inning. Yet this is the profile for the Indians of late: give up hits, trust the defense and don't walk anyone. The coaching staff at TCC compared his delivery to that of Chris Sale, which I am sure means his mechanics put off some teams. He was in the high 80's in high school and with a skinny build you could expect some added velocity as he fills out.



Pittsburgh Pirates Round 19, Pick 585

Pearson McMahan, RHP, SJRSC, Middleburg Grad.

From piratesprospects.com: The Pirates drafted McMahan after his first year of JC ball. He pitched in relief, giving up 35 hits and 25 walks in 42.1 IP. He struck out 61, so he appears to be able to get swings and misses but needs to improve his control. He throws a slow curve, which may account for a lot of the strikeouts.

Cincinnati Reds Round 18, 528 pick

J.C. Flowers, CF, Trinity Christian, Oakleaf High School

A two-way player and multi-sport athlete, Flowers has had an uneven spring that has made it a bit more difficult to figure out his Draft stock. More scouts seem to like him on the mound, while he might prefer to hit. At his best early in the spring, Flowers was touching 95 mph and sitting 93 mph with a loose arm and the potential to add more as he matured. He'll show a circle change which, like his fastball, has tailing life to it and good deception. His slider will also flash as a solid pitch, thrown

with good three-quarters break, but his arm and delivery had gone backwards. Word was Flowers wanted to go out as a center fielder, where his football background as a receiver helps him take good routes and angles and his plus arm works well. He's not a burner and there was some concern about a lack of a feel to hit. A team that believes what they saw early in the year is the true Flowers on the mound may roll the dice, if they feel they can convince him to pitch and forego his commitment to Kentucky

From Redsminorleagues.com: Flowers was ranked as the No. 142 prosepct by Baseball America coming into the draft. He split time between football and baseball while in high school at Trinity Christian Academy in Florida. He's got above-average speed that plays well in center field. He also has a very strong arm — as a pitcher he could touch 95 MPH. He's considered to be raw, but incredibly athletic. At the plate there's some power potential to tap into, but most teams seemed to prefer him as a pitcher. Perhaps the Reds will let him try to hit at first, which he seems to prefer, and if that doesn't work try to move him to the mound where he's got plenty of potential.

Chicago White Sox Round 36, Pick 1076

Reese Cooley, CF, Chipola College, Fleming Island High grad.

From Indianprospectinsider.com's Jeff Ellis: Reese Cooley is a 6'2" right-handed high school outfielder who just oozes athleticism. He might not be unsignable as he is only committed to a junior college, but would be very hard to do this late. I think if he was willing to sign for 100K he would have been drafted much earlier. The Indians draft a kid like Cooley here because they can talk to and get to know him. The thought is if he improves they already know him and remember being a JUCO player he will be draft eligible in a year. Cooley has plus speed and plus power from the right side, but has not been able to put it all together yet. The reason he slid was his cost to sign was more than likely too high for what he has been able to show on the diamond this year. Cooley is purely an upside bet, but if it all comes together he could be a special player.



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Martins' track vision close to finish line

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Johns Country Day School, and two area coaches are within inches of the finish line to giving the county some running pride.

"I said about 10 years ago that we should get started on building a new track at Middleburg High School because I thought it could become something big in the area," said April Martin, who, with husband Craig, has had a vision of a rubberized competition track at Middleburg. "The possibilities of hosting larger meets here; districts, regions and cross country championship meets, is what has driven us since we got here."

As of the summer of 2016, the Martins, through donations from area businesses; mainly 1st Place Sports, a running store based in Jacksonville with an Orange Park branch on Park Avenue, and Chick-Fil-A of Wells Road, have accumulated nearly \$100,000 on the way to a need of nearly \$130,000 to put shovels into the ground. Both have been coaches and teachers at Middleburg for more than 10 years.

"The legacy will become part of Middleburg running athletes over the past 10 years who have volunteered at up to 22 running races a year for 1st Place Sports," said Craig Martin. "Doug Alred of 1st Place Sports has been the kindest of donations because he sees the value of a state-level competition track. Chick-Fil-A was part of

the donation stream for a while until the government changed nutrition standards in schools which eliminated us from selling biscuits to raise money. Now, we're just short of our goal and have to find other sources to finish the project."

Ironically, Orange Park High School was the first to have a synthetic-type track which is in need of refurbishing and Oakleaf was built with a concrete track upon its inception. Ridgeview, Orange Park and Fleming Island have all started fund-raising campaigns to do the same at their respective schools, but none have the capital in hand as the Martins.

The Martins vision is to uproot the present concrete track at Middleburg

sons of 11, 22 and 19 catches the past three years with two scores each in 2013 and 2014 and five scores in 2015.

"We've had the chemistry since eighth grade, but this is the final shot to get to state which is the goal," said Morgan, who recently got a college offer from Indiana State University. "We signal each other on and off the field if we see something on the field."

Morgan arrived early to a Wednesday 8 a.m. team workout for a 7:30 a.m. run up and down the Oakleaf High stadium steps.

"I went out the first day by myself because I know I have to be better and a leader," said Morgan, just 5-foot-11, 170 pounds. "Today, more people were asking about it and I had six guys join me. I just want to get more and more guys to have the same effort."

Johnson, who has yet to garner a college offer, partly because of a lack of size, has been the focal point for Oakleaf's offense. "We certainly can't replace a guy like Shaq on the sideline, but Rontrez and I both have to find a way," said Johnson, who linked up with Morgan for a key 65 yard touchdown pass play in the Knights' spring game against Robert E. Lee High. "The whole team has to want to be great and it's my job to push us there."

In the Lee spring game, Morgan had three pivotal plays for Oakleaf; a 90 yard kickoff return for a score, the 65 yarder and a second half 40 yarder that set up a short touchdown pass to Swain, who adds 200 track speed to the mix with Morgan for Johnson's passes. Swain took an inside



slant route 90 yards to paydirt against Lee to swing the momentum back to Oakleaf after a defensive fumble recovery.

"That's what Jordan is good at out there," said Reynolds. "He is so smart with his reads and we feel we will be able to make contact anywhere on the field."

Johnson and Rontrez both have a knack for the big play, including Johnson's favorite, a Hail Mary pass to graduated end Darius Perry against district rival Atlantic Coast two years ago that propelled the Knights to an undefeated season, a district title and a region championship berth, and Morgan's being a key 45 yard pass to midfield against Niceville in the region 1-7A final two years ago, a 35-0 loss. Oakleaf success though has always been contingent on two things; pass pocket protection and good center snaps. Center snaps have become the Achilles Heel for the Knights offense with plenty of scoring drives stifled

midway as Johnson was forced to scramble for a loose ball to his left or right.

"That is frustrating and I have to take ownership in working with the center to get that right," said Johnson. "It's the start of everything and I just have to get with those centers before and after practice to make that automatic."

Johnson's agility behind the line of scrimmage and his ability to throw on the fly have been trademarks of Oakleaf's offense maintaining drives and also scoring off big plays.

"We try to keep him within the playbook out there, but there are times when he improvises with his passes that causes some initial anxiety, then a well done comes out of it," said Reynolds. "Having a receiver like Rontrez opposite him in a scramble is a bonus because he also is smart enough to keep plays alive."





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
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
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


Day 4, June 9

First Coast YMCA hosts kids triathlon



Run for the Pies 5K

Allen second in Pies 5K

JACKSONVILLE - Fleming Island master's runner Shelly Allen noted she was pretty close to the elite race qualifying time for the annual Run for the Pies 5K race festival, but chose to stay in the adjoining open race that followed and her choice netted her a second overall finish among nearly 700 runners Saturday night in downtown Jacksonville. The Run for the Pies 5K is also the final race in the Jacksonville Grand Prix race series that awards runners based on their finish on nine area races. Allen was fourth in the Grand Prix standings prior to the Pies 5K.

"The qualifying time was under 20 minutes and I've run near 20:30, but the I didn't want to be the back end of the elite race," said Allen, 52, and a frequent top three finisher overall in area races on the Jacksonville Grand Prix Series. "The girls in the elite are high school and college aged runners with very fast times."

Allen's prediction of her finish compared to the elite finishers proved prophetic as Kelsey Beckman, a 24 year old Atlantic Beach runner, won in a fivesecond dual with Fletcher High School senior Kayley Delay, 17, a Class 4A third placer finisher in the 3200 and a fourth place finisher in the 1600 this year and a second place finisher at the Class 4A cross country championship race, with a winning time of 18:05 to Delay's 18:10. Third place went to Crystal Davis, 22, of Jacksonville, in 18:20.

In the open Run for the Pies 5K race, Allen finished second in 20:54 to Charisse Winter, 33, of Apopka, who won in 20:32. Cari Holbrook, 40, of Jacksonville, was third in 21:15.

spective schools, but none have the capital in hand as the Martins.

The Martins vision is to uproot the present concrete track at Middleburg which is similar to most of the tracks in Clay County, refurbish the foundation and put a modern rubberized competition surface on top. With that, the boundaries of the new track would have improvements in the triple, long and high jump facilities.

"Right now, we are ahead of the curve in money," said April Martin. "Our original estimate did not include the foundation work, but the contractors said the present track was so old and the rubber track on top of it would quickly deteriorate."

April Martin also commented on improvements to other areas within the track including the jump pits and overall athlete safety.

"It's a shame that we don't even have a high jump facility here. We set up the high jump pit at the start area of the 100 meters at the west end of the track," said Martin.

Craig Martin would like to see the county and other high schools share the vision to have at least one track in the county with district and region capabilities. St. Johns' track is just six lanes, but rubberized. FHSAA rules requires eight lanes and rubber for region and state championship meets.

"Once we get the track installed, and we will hopefully by the fall of 2017, the track revenue will pay for the track itself very quickly," said Craig Martin, who already has hosted the Clay County track and field championships as well as the Clay County Cross Country championships on top of the annual Clay County Elementary School track championships.

"We have been asked to host district cross country, but our finish is on the track and that is a negative. Track meets last all day and concessions alone, on top of maybe a \$5 or \$6 gate ticket, would bring in more money than most sports. The elementary school meet has been here for years, but a kid falls on the concrete and it can be serious."

Craig Martin noted that the closest district and region ready track for the Clay County schools has been Nease High in Ponte Vedra and Bartram Trail.

"When they built both schools with rubberized tracks, they drastically improved the track and cross country programs' chances of improving over time to where both have been state champions in either track or cross country recently and both are always top contenders," said Craig Martin. "It goes back to school pride and all that. If we build it, track athletes will come to it."

The Martins have yet to approach Clay County School Board personnel or Clay County Commissioners for money only because their fundraising efforts have been fruitful. "Any one of those boards that wants to give us the final check would be fine with me," said April Martin.

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
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
