Darwin on trial

Textbook adopted 3-2 after public hearing

FLEMING ISLAND — Clay County School Board Member Ashley Gilhousen is unhappy with the current selection of science textbooks for grades K-12 and found herself in the presence of others who shared that feeling, and those who didn't, during the Feb. 1 school board meeting.

During a public hearing to approve the advertised science textbook adoption, Gilhousen expressed the problems she had with how the textbooks teach evolution, claiming that it's presented more as fact rather than theory. She also showed concern that evolution is the only theory in the textbook used to teach the origin of life.

"I think what we heard tonight is a whole lot of science that's been left out of our textbooks and there is scientific argument to the theory of evolution that is not being presented," Gilhousen said. "If you look at what the state requires, it only requires our students to know the supporting evidence for [the scientific theory of evolution] and that's my point of contention."

Gilhousen, who is running for re-election this year, said her faith is not a part of this discussion and that rather, she wants a comprehensive science education that challenges students to think critically and

Time to fly? Airport study process unveiled

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — By the end of the year, there should be a clear picture as to whether or not an airport will be built at Reynolds Industrial Park.

According to a presentation at the Green Cove Springs City Council Tuesday evening, the feasibility study is on the cusp of Phase 1, with the project engineer Andrew Holesko, the vice president and national director of Aviation Services at

Passero Associates, estimating six to nine months until the study is complete.

"We're just starting this study, we do not have any answers to any of the questions that some of you might have," Holesko said.

After the presentation Feb. 6, Holesko and Reynolds President Ted McGowan said they will also give the same presentation to the Clay County Board of County Commissioners before beginning the study process.

"We do want to consider whatever our options are in the future: private, municipal, sell, close it down, expand," McGowan said.

The study will be four-tiered and include four meetings of an appointed Planning Advisory Committee starting each of the phases. After each phase, representatives will return to the City and BCC meetings to present their findings before

Board withdraws from HB 7069 lawsuit

FLEMING ISLAND – In a contentious 3-2 vote, the Clay County School Board voted Feb. 1 to pull out of a multi-school district lawsuit against the state for the passage of House Bill 7069 on grounds the bill is unconstitutional. The measure was placed on the agenda after board member Betsy Condon asked last month the issue be re-addressed for fear of losing state funding.

“This is atrocious that we would even consider dropping out of this lawsuit,” board member Janice Kerekes said. “Mrs. Condon, maybe it wasn’t intended the way you said it last month, but it certainly did sound like a bribe or a blackmail or something going on between Senator [Rob] Bradley and yourself.

“I don’t see the value in dropping out of the lawsuit and not fighting for public education, for our teachers and our children,” Kerekes continued. “I, for one, will not vote to drop out of this lawsuit.”

Last September, the board became the 15th Florida school district to join a lawsuit challenging the constitutionality of House Bill 7069 after a vote that passed 3-2, with Condon and Ashley Gilhousen voting no. School Board Attorney David D’Agata said last August that the bill affected at least 70 different sections of the Florida education code. Legally, based on the Florida Constitution, opponents con-

tend, House Bill 7069 should have been broken into 70 different bills.

Beyond the constitutionality issue, the bill calls into question a number of facets educators, parents, school district leaders and the school board believe are faulty. The bill forces local school districts to share local property tax dollars with charter schools in their districts. It also creates a “Schools of Hope” program, which legal experts say essentially creates an unlawful second Florida school system.

At the same time, there are sections of HB 7069 that seemingly benefit teachers, however. House Bill 7069 would make it easier for teachers to qualify for the “Best and Brightest” bonus program, which last year, 7,118 teachers qualified for earning a bonus of \$6,816. It would also make room for additional bonuses for

teachers who qualify as “highly effective” or “effective.”

Orange Park High teacher Jenifer Burghart doesn’t even see this bonus as a bonus.

“Pay is now tied to performance,” Burghart said. “So \$7,200, which I can’t even count as a bonus – it has to be counted as part of my salary in order to make ends meet – is now just a bonus and not part of the salary base pay.”

Ten Clay County residents, ranging from concerned parents to disappointed teachers, stepped up to the podium to voice their opinions. All 10 of them were unhappy the board was considering rescinding their vote on the joining the lawsuit.

Orange Park High economics teacher Laura Mayberry likened the state to thieves if this bill continues to stand.

“If you’re going to back out of this lawsuit, are you going to be willing to come to my classroom and tell my students that, ‘I wanted to do what’s right but it was just too hard,’” Mayberry said. “The state has been taking from us and taking from us – public money that is rightfully ours.

“It’s like having a thief come to your house and steal everything, and then have the nerve to come back and say, ‘Well, I’ll give you 5 percent back but only if you don’t call the cops,’” Mayberry continued. “I don’t want 5 percent back. I want it all and we want it all and our students want it

all and they deserve it all.”

After over an hour of heated discussion, each school board member spoke on the issue.

Condon stated that no backroom deals were made in her decision to ask the board to rescind their vote. At a previous school board meeting held in January, Condon asked that the board consider dropping out of the lawsuit in an effort to receive more money from Senator Bradley, who is now chairman of the powerful Senate Appropriations Committee. Condon reasoned that if the board is suing the state legislature, the chances of receiving any money from Bradley will be greatly decreased. She also said that for her, rescinding the vote is about looking forward and not backward, searching for additional resources for the district, and that at the end of the day, it’s about the students and teachers in the classroom. Gilhousen reaffirmed her reasonings from a previous September meeting, saying that for her, this is a financial decision for the district.

Board member Mary Bolla acknowledged that she was the one who originally suggested that they join this lawsuit and how it was an incredibly personal decision for her as she was, and is, still a teacher and still holds a Florida teaching certificate. She called HB 7069 ‘horrible’ but

heading into the next step of the process. Two representatives from both the Green Cove City Council and BCC will be included on the 10-person PAC, in addition to local aviators and those with interests in a new airport in Clay County.

The study will start small and examine the need for an airport and forecasted demand for aviation in the surrounding area. Next, they would look into what kinds of facilities would be planned to support the estimated demand for services at the airport and how those services would be paid for. Eventually, they will work through federal regulations, both environmental and aviation, as well as examine options for who would own and manage the airport upon its completion.

So far, Holesko noted that there are four options for the potential ownership and management of the theoretical airport – the City of Green Cove Springs, the Clay

County Board of Commissioners, another outside entity, or retained ownership by Clay County Port.

Once this decision has been reached, the port will make a decision to hold on to the property or sell, and whether or not the airport would be a feasible option for the property, and then present that decision publicly. Though the whole process seems clear, there were concerns from all members of the City Council about the potential impact of an airport in their riverside community. “There’s an argument to be made that there’s been money left on the table, and, actually, services and infrastructure that have been provided over a span of time that we’ve done with the anticipation [that Reynolds would become something other than an airport],” said council member Van Royal. “We’ve seen numbers on some pretty nice things and opportunities, yacht basins, high-rises, all of which we’ve put into plans when we’ve talked about expansion.”

According to Royal, the city has accommodated the Port for decades, so that

when they would move on any of these development plans, they would be able to. However, Royal said the city never expected an airport. In addition to commenting on the potential effect on the city’s tax base, Royal mentioned the existing city airport in Keystone Heights, which he said would be a better option for the type of airport being considered at Reynolds.

“If the idea is that this small community is going to take one for the team, I’m not doing that, not quietly,” Royal said. “Too many people have worked for too long to build this little town up.”

Council members Steven Kelley and Pam Lewis shared the same sentiments, noting concerns that an airport could prevent future development south of downtown and along the river near Reynolds.

“If you drive around airports in small communities, there’s a lot of warehouse type properties, and they’re not beautiful homes, we have beautiful homes and beautiful neighborhoods – it affects quality of life,” Lewis said. “There are a lot of things we have to take into consideration

but quality of life is probably the number one thing.”

As the city grows, the council will continue to see plans for housing developments, but noted that other airports of similar size have no such development in the area.

City Manager Danielle Judd asked Holesko and McGowan if they have even looked at how much land they have that would not be considered wetlands and whether or not that would be enough to support an airport.

After members of the council spoke on why they thought an airport would not be in the best interest of the city, Holesko assured them that the study is not yet complete and would be starting with a blank page at the first meeting of the PAC.

“I don’t think we’re here with the expectation that the study is going to come back as not feasible,” said Mayor Mitch Timberlake. “I’ve heard more on this than I heard on the drag strip when it was out there, people calling saying, ‘You need to shut this down, we don’t want it.’”

FLEMING ISLAND – When Natacha Mohbat was three years old, her father would put her in a backpack, hit the slopes and start skiing. She would immediately fall asleep.

At age four, she put on skis of her own and never looked back.

Today, she is competing in the XXIII Olympics in Pyeongchang, South Korea as the top female skier in Lebanon.

That's great news to her grandparents – Alan and Sue Swain of Eagle Harbor – and the many friends Natacha has made on Fleming Island and the surrounding area. She's spent virtually every sum-

mer since she was a little girl visiting her grandparents here, even attending school for several months at Fleming Island Elementary when war broke out in Lebanon in 2006. Over the years, she swam on the Eagle Harbor swim team, played tennis there and was a member of the North Florida Gymnastics team. She also attended

Takeaways from Tallahassee

Hey, we get it. There's a lot going on in the 2018 Legislative Session – and it's only Week Six.

With budget negotiations, the passage of 27 bills this week and it being an election year, it's easy to get lost in the noise. So, here's a brief – very brief – update on some contentious legislation that is facing some hurdles in the process.

The controversial “sanctuary city” bill is likely dead in the Senate. After much buildup on whether the Senate would act differently on the measure that has been a hot political issue this year, the bill hit a roadblock. Sen. Aaron Bean said his bill did not have enough votes to pass its first of three committee stops and asked a Senate panel to temporarily postpone it. Potentially indefinitely.

Aaron Bean's ‘sanctuary city’ bill runs out of steam in the Senate.

Controversial bills to ban the breeding of Orcas and fracking in the state – two big money fights – have yet to be heard in committee. Sea World has been lobbying hard against the Orca bill, which doesn't even have a companion bill in the Senate. The fate of these bills is not looking promising even as advocates rally at the Capitol.

A pair of gun bills that would allow guns in religious institutions with schools attached are headed to the full floors for consideration. The measures have one big difference: The Senate wants to keep guns out of churches attached with schools if school-sponsored activities are going on, the House does not.

Sen. Dennis Baxley, who is championing the effort in the Senate, said he has talked with House members to see where things will go.

The same scenario took place last session, ending with a dead proposal in the Senate. So, this one is a tossup.

With that out of the way, here's the usual assortment of tidbits, leftovers and not-ready-for-prime-time moments by Ana Ceballos, Jim Rosica, Danny McAuliffe, Andrew Wilson, Michael Moline and Peter Schorsch.

Outta' the woods

It's still not too late to take a kid duck hunting this year or go deer hunting in Zone D's late muzzleloader season.

“Waterfowl hunting takes you to places you would probably not otherwise find yourself. There's nothing quite like the marsh coming alive with teeming wildlife at first light,” said John Hitchcock, president of Florida Wetlands Forever. “And it's a great opportunity to spend some quality time afield with a young person and help pass on the hunting tradition to the next generation.”

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, in conjunction with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, established Feb. 3-4 as this year's statewide Youth Waterfowl Hunting Days. That weekend was specifically set up for children 15 and younger to hunt while supervised by anyone 18 or older. Make plans now for next year.

“Hunting waterfowl can teach a

youth a unique awareness and appreciation for the outdoors and expand their understanding of wetland habitat, the importance of conservation and an awareness of where our food comes from,” Hitchcock said.

Only kids 15 and younger may hunt with adults only assisting and no licenses or permits are needed, including federal duck stamps, on these two days. And if you're not a duck hunter but your child is showing an interest, the FWC can assist you at MyFWC.com/NewHunter.

Hitchcock offers these tips for new hunters.

He said teach them gun safety “and let them become familiar with the gun they will be shooting,” Hitchcock said. “Keep the hunt simple and teach hunting regulations as you go.” He said closely observe what the young hunter does with their gun, “and make sure they understand their shooting zone and the importance of keeping their gun barrel pointed in that safe direction.”

Youth waterfowl regulations:

Youth can hunt ducks, light geese, Canada geese, mergansers, coots and common moorhens during the Youth Waterfowl Hunting Days. Bag limits and other regulations are at MyFWC.com/Hunting; click on “Duck/Waterfowl” then “2017-2018 Migratory Bird

week: **Unconstitutional system** – A federal judge said Feb. 1 that the process used in Florida to restore voting rights to felons who have served their time is unconstitutional and guided by “no standards.” U.S. District Judge Mark Walker said the current system crafted by Gov. Rick Scott’s administration is “nonsensical” and violates the constitutional rights of ex-felons, adding that it is often driven by politics. Scott’s Office said in a statement he would continue to fight for the state system in court. “The Governor believes that convicted felons should show that they can lead a life free of crime and be accountable to their victims and our communities,” Scott’s Office said.

■ **Some child brides OK** – Legislation that would prohibit children from getting married in the state headed in two different directions in the House and the Senate this week. In an emotional vote on the full floor, the Senate unanimously passed a strict ban on all marriages if a person is under the age of 18. The next day, however, the House altered its version of the bill to allow 16-year-olds who get pregnant and want to get married to the father of the child, if he is 18 years or younger. House members who were against the all-minor marriage ban said that doing so could lead to someone getting an abortion if they can’t get married or have a child out of wedlock, which would be against some religious beliefs.

■ **Marijuana money** – State Rep. Jason Brodeur has told the state’s top health officials to get to work on medical marijuana – or they won’t get paid. The Sanford Republican has offered an amendment to the House’s 2018-19 budget proposal that would freeze more than \$1.9 million in salaries and benefits for the Department of Health’s brass, including Secretary and state Surgeon General Celeste Philip and other top officials. They’ll get paid, Brodeur said, when the department’s Office of Medical Marijuana Use starts dealing with the backlog of applications for marijuana growing and dispensing licenses, and for state-issued patient ID cards, among other things.

■ **Florida Forever funding halfway there** – Legislators seeking \$100 million annually for the Florida Forever land-buying program got a win in the Senate, with the passage of Senate Bill 370. The proposal, by Sen. Rob Bradley (R-Fleming Island), ensures that money will not be spent on general operations, but rather on land and water conservation efforts. The measure would comply with the wishes of voters in 2014 who approved Amendment 1, which sets aside taxpayer money to the conservation of land in the state. The fate of the bill in the House remains uncertain.

■ **Sanctuary cities gubernatorial snafu** – The issue of “sanctuary cities”

policies blew up in the gubernatorial race this week, even though no such policies currently exist in the state of Florida. The immigration debate snowballed after House Speaker Richard Corcoran’s political committee dropped \$500,000 on an inflammatory TV ad that portrays undocumented immigrants as a lethal threat to Floridians. Corcoran has not yet announced his candidacy in the governor’s race, but the ad wiped nearly all doubt. The ad has also unleashed a weary back-and-forth between Corcoran and declared Democratic candidate Andrew Gillum on debating the issue. But no time, place or moderator has been determined and based on their tweets, they have different ideas of where the debate should be.

PIP quibbles

The Legislature is barking up the wrong tree on Personal Injury Protection repeal, according to Florida Justice Reform President William Large. Fixing Florida’s bad-faith laws would do more to lower premiums, he said in a written statement.

“This landmark PCI report on HB 19 proves it – repealing no-fault and mandating bodily injury insurance will cost every driver in Florida more money,” Large said. “And mandating medical payments coverage, as proposed in SB 150, will just cost drivers even more.”

He referred to an analysis released by the Property Casualty Insurers Association of America.

“Meanwhile, the legislature has yet to show interest in fixing Florida’s bad faith laws, which the PCI report shows could deliver real savings estimated at 6.7 percent,” Large said.

“The bottom line is, more insurance costs more money. HB 19 and SB 150 won’t deliver for Florida’s drivers. The Legislature should start over and commit to an auto insurance system that delivers only the coverages Florida’s drivers need at the lowest cost.”

CRC shot down amendment proposals

The full Constitutional Revision Commission is floating a mid-March session start date and as that near commissioners are working to sift through the proposals that will make it to the November ballot.

Just this week, 10 proposals were either killed by commissioners or withdrawn from considerations. Some of those proposals include one that would have amended the state constitution to expand the prohibited basis of discrimination to broadly include “any disability,” not only physical disabilities.

Darryl Rouson is giving his own CRC proposal the boot.

Other proposals that were killed included the six-year lobbying ban and a proposal restricting home rule powers.

Among the proposals that were withdrawn from consideration this week, was Sen. Darryl Rouson’s proposal that aimed at restoring voting rights to felons who have completed their sentences and paid restitution. He withdrew his proposal after a ballot initiative seeking the same thing qualified for the ballot days before.

Grimsley: farmers need Irma relief now

Sebring Republican Sen. Denise Grimsley said in a letter to U.S. Sens. Bill Nelson and Marco Rubio that if Florida farmers have to wait much longer on a Hurricane Irma relief package, it could “pose a serious disruption long-term recovery.” “Florida farmers and ranchers continue to hold out hope that relief is on its way from Congress,” she wrote. “The five months that have now passed since Hurricane Irma struck have only served to confirm that the damages were substantial and widespread.”

Denise Grimsley is pushing relief for Florida farmers after Hurricane Irma.

The agriculture commissioner candidate also said she was grateful for Nelson and Rubio’s advocacy for the package in the Senate.

“Thank you for insisting that the measure before the U.S. Senate receive imme-

mediate attention. We stand ready to assist in any way you believe would support your work to secure its passage. Please know that your efforts are not without purpose and many Florida farmers are prayerful that your efforts on our behalf meet with success.”

House Democrats still keeping track

The House Democratic Caucus updated its “running count” of bills heard in committee or on the House floor to include the third week of the 2018 Legislative Session.

To the surprise of few, the caucus found Republican bills in the House are still getting substantially more attention than Democrat-sponsored ones.

The breakdown on the “What’s the Agenda?” site shows that during Week 3, 15 Democrat-sponsored bills were heard, compared to 116 Republican-sponsored bills. Another 29 bills heard in committee had both Republican and Democrat sponsors.

The “keep track” effort also recorded 13 Republican bills making the House floor during the week, while a pair of Democrat-sponsored bills made the grade.

Including the five committee weeks leading up to the 2018 Legislative Session, Dem bills make up about 18 percent of those on committee agendas while GOP bills take a nearly 70 percent share.

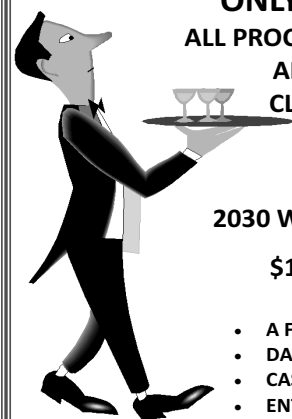

Fair showcases best of best in science

CLAY COUNTY – Last year during summer break, Ridgeview High School senior Jason Chen emailed NASA.

Chen was working on his project for this year's science fair and wanted to see if they had the equation he was developing. They didn't.

The math that makes up his project could help determine the optimal location for solar-powered bases on the moon by solving for the amount of sunlight that reaches any given point on a sphere. Should he make it to the state science fair

competition, Chen will further develop the idea into a computer programming language that would take the math and put it in a practical form that NASA could actually use in mission planning.

"It's just really complicated math," Chen said when introducing his project. "Theoretically, this could work for not just our moon but other moons, and with some tweaking, for other planets and celestial bodies."

Chen was among a couple hundred of his peers at the Clay County Rotary

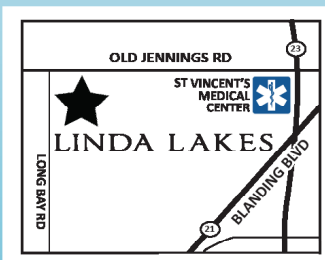

Season Dates and Bag Limits.”

Zone D's late muzzleloader season

Zone D has a late muzzleloading gun season that extends deer hunting by a week after general gun ends, and runs Feb. 19-25 on private lands. The season was established to give hunters an opportunity to continue hunting the rut, which runs from mid-January through February in northwest Florida.

A \$5 muzzleloading gun permit is required to hunt during this season. On private land, hunters have the choice of using a muzzleloader, bow or crossbow. A hunting license is also needed, which costs residents \$17 annually – or folks can opt to purchase a five-year license for only \$79.

On wildlife management areas, this post-season becomes archery/muzzleloading gun season. Dates vary by WMA, so consult each area's brochure. Hunters can use bows or muzzleloaders, but no crossbows – unless they possess a Persons with Disabilities Crossbow Permit. Bow hunters must have the \$5 archery permit,

and muzzleloader hunters need the \$5 muzzleloading permit.

Legal to take; bag limits

Deer and wild hogs are most commonly hunted during this season. Only legal bucks may be taken (includes bowhunting). South of Interstate 10 in Deer Management Unit D1, one antler must have at least two points. North of I-10 in DMU D2, all bucks must have at least three points on one side or have a main beam of at least 10 inches long to be legal to take.

If hunting deer, you'll need the \$5 deer permit. On private land, the daily bag limit is two.

Season dates, bag limits and antler regulations for deer on WMAs may differ, so check before you hunt.

There are no year-round bag or size limits for hogs on private lands and most WMAs. Hogs are legal to take during most hunting seasons except spring turkey. On selected WMAs, specific bag and size limits do apply, so check the area's brochure.

Hunting regulations

During the late muzzleloader season on private lands and archery/muzzleloading gun season on WMAs, dogs may not be used to hunt deer. However, leashed dogs are allowed for tracking. Turkeys are off-

limits during this season.

Bows and crossbows must have minimum draw weights of 35 pounds. Hand-held releases on bows are permitted. Broadheads used in taking deer must have at least two sharpened edges with a minimum width of 7/8 inch.

During this late season, the only muzzleloaders allowed are those fired by wheel lock, flintlock, percussion cap or centerfire primer (including 209 primers) that cannot be loaded from the breech. For hunting deer, muzzleloading rifles must be at least .40-caliber, and muzzleloading shotguns must be 20-gauge or larger.


Legal shooting hours are between a half-hour before sunrise and a half-hour

after sunset. You're allowed to take deer and hogs over feeding stations on private land, but it is illegal to use feed on WMAs.

Public hunting opportunity

In Zone D, 12 of the WMAs have a February archery/muzzleloading gun season, which requires a \$26 management area permit. Those areas are Apalachicola, Apalachicola River, Beaverdam Creek, Blackwater, Chipola River, Choctawhatchee River, Econfina Creek, Escambia River, Perdido River, Point Washington, Tate's Hell and Yellow River.

Licenses and permits are sold at most retail outlets that sell hunting and fishing supplies, Florida tax collector offices, 888-HUNT-FLORIDA or GoOutdoorsFlorida.com online.

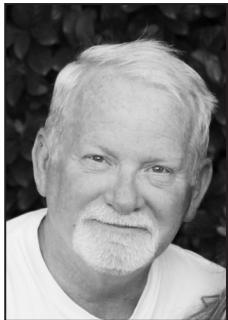

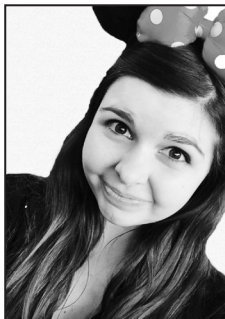

Science Fair held Feb. 6 at the Clay County Fairgrounds. This year, a total of 274 combined entries were accepted into both the junior and senior high divisions. Of those 274, only 14 will be selected to move forward to the state level of competition, according to Rotarian organizer Lillian Bell. This year's event was actually a first in that the judges not only selected the winners at the county level, but also selected the 14 projects that they think would do well at state.

"So far it looks like things are running pretty smoothly," Bell said about an hour into the fair. "This combined judging is something that has not happened before."

Bell said the combined Rotary groups from around the county start planning the event in November each year, then representatives from each Rotary group go into their respective communities to recruit judges and get sponsors for the fair.

Projects range from the more serious technical applications of math and physics, like Chen's project, to things more light-hearted on the junior high side such as attracting animals with light and whether or not fidget spinner toys affect students' concentration at school. However, many

judges and even school administrators were baffled by the complexity of some of the projects and the perceived advancement in learning since science fairs held decades ago.

"This proves that our teachers are getting kids actively engaged in STEM initiatives, and it just shows that they care," said Clay County School Superintendent Addison Davis. "Our kids are more intellectually sophisticated than I was, they would've blown my project away."

As he walked from one tri-fold piece of cardboard to the next, Davis was in awe at the level of thinking going on throughout Clay County schools, and stood proud to be at the helm of a school district producing such competent young people.

"Science is becoming a bigger part of our everyday lives," Davis said. "These kids are learning quick thinking, and problem solving, but also learning to engage with adults as well as public speaking."

The State Science and Engineering Fair

from across the state prior to the international level of competition in June.

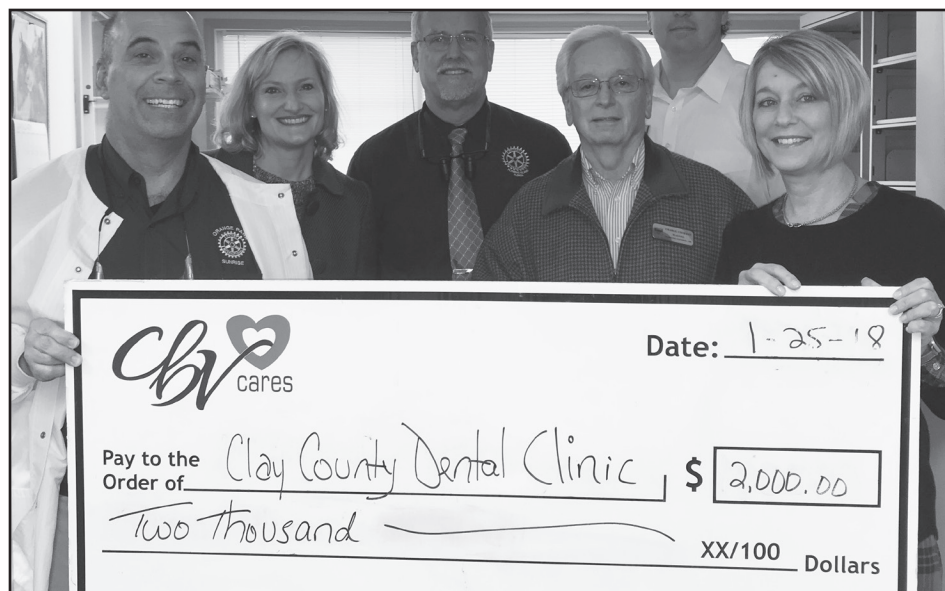

Orange Park remains diligent on stormwater improvements

ORANGE PARK – The Orange Park Town Council is stepping up efforts to complete stormwater cleanup and maintenance, and prepare the town for the upcoming hurricane season.

During its regular meeting on Feb. 6, council passed a motion 5-0 to direct staff to increase the general fund budget by \$500,000 using money from its rainy-day fund to pay for these projects. Currently, the town's fund balance has an estimated \$5.7 million in it that was not used in previous budget years.

The fund balance idea was presented by council member Gary Meeks who said the money freed up in from Capital Improvement Plan amendments simply wasn't going to cut it.

"If we are going to do this, \$81,000, I just don't think that's going to touch it," Meeks said. "This is what the \$5 million is – it's for a rainy day and the rainy day is here."

Mayor Scott Land agreed with Meeks reminding the council that the purpose of

the fund balance is for situations like the destruction caused by Hurricane Irma.

"We just had a hurricane, a disaster, come through this town, and that's what the fund balance is for," Land said. "People put that money in the fund balance and there's nothing wrong with using that money for the people."

The \$81,000 Meeks referred to is money the town council has available for the purpose of stormwater maintenance after amending the CIP. In December, the council proposed changes to the CIP such as pushing a \$75,000 town hall fire sprinkler job back two years and indefinitely postponing a \$30,000 town hall acoustics improvement job.

In a motion that passed 5-0, council amended its CIP based on suggestions from a December meeting, which will give staff on direction when creating this year's budget.

Town Manager Sarah Campbell recommended to the council that \$180,000 listed under town hall improvements – which Public Works Director Chuck Pavlos said might be a smaller number now as some of

it has been used – be moved to operating funds.

"Unfortunately, that doesn't help the stormwater conversation but it does help with Irma cleanup in that we will have it in a place where we can actually use it," Campbell said.

The council made a motion based on Campbell's recommendation that passed 4-1, with Raymond dissenting.

After nearly two hours of discussion regarding amendments to the CIP and directing staff regarding stormwater improvements, the council turned to an item of old business regarding this summer's Fourth of July celebration. The town's original contract with Moosehaven has the retirement community holding a Fourth of July event on July 7, the Saturday following the holiday. John Capes, executive director of Moosehaven, quickly laid this contract to rest.

"Well we can solve this problem pretty easily. We're not going to hold the event on the seventh, simple as that," Capes said.

Instead, Capes told the council that the celebration can take place on the Fourth

of July, or not at all, citing expenses that reach past \$100,000 – expenses Capes said Moosehaven covers the majority of. He said the event has seen a continued decline in community attendance and overall revenue in recent years.

"If you agree that we will reduce the scope of the event, I think that it's still a good event and it allows us to celebrate on the Fourth of July without incurring the enormous expense that we would otherwise incur," Capes said. "That is my counteroffer to you."

According to Campbell, the contract does not include specific events that will take place during the celebration but it does include what the Town of Orange Park is going to provide.

"[Orange Park] will provide \$10,000 plus support through our police, fire and public works department," Campbell said. "The celebration will be on July 4 now and the town will provide the same level of support it has in prior years but Moosehaven is going to scale back."

Capes said he envisions a smaller Fourth of July event to consist of some local entertainment acts rather than a national headliner act, a collection of food trucks, and a start time of 5 p.m. with a fireworks show at 9:20 p.m.

The council voted 5-0 to approve the contract with the amended date of July 4.

December home invasion arrest made

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Authorities arrested one of two men wanted for a December home-invasion robbery that took place in Green Cove Springs.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office arrested Jayvin Monte Rashard Tobler, 19, on Feb. 6 using an outstanding warrant that was issued shortly after the crime spree.

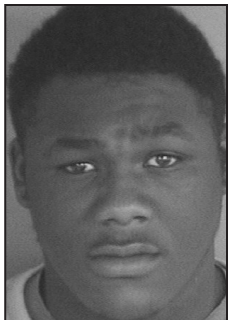
According to the warrant, Tobler and one other man broke into a couple's home

Inmate charged with concealing drugs

ORANGE PARK – A woman serving a weekend sentence for petit theft now faces a new charge if introducing contraband into a county detention facility after police found 69 pills concealed in her vagina.

On Feb. 3, a Clay County Jail Detention Deputy, while picking up food trays, noticed smoke coming from the mouth of 52-year-old Jamie Jo Calhoun, according to the police report. After noticing attention had been drawn to her, Calhoun attempted to conceal an unknown object in her underwear. After investigating, the deputy confiscated a clear plastic bag containing four aspirin, four generic Ibuprofen, one multivitamin and 61 unidentified pills.

Calhoun later provided several other pills, although these were in the proper bottles.

At press time, she remained in jail with her bond set at \$50,003.

Clay County Sheriff's Deputies arrested Jacob Thomas Lipp, 22, on Feb. 1 after he allegedly broke into two homes in the 300 block of Lido Place in an attempt to confront his estranged wife over a suspected affair between her and a neighbor.

According to the police report, Lipp allegedly kicked in the door to the home where his estranged wife was staying. He proceeded to wake her up and demand the location of the neighbor. Lipp then attempted to break into the neighbor's home.

Two deputies arrived as Lipp was re-entering the first home, where they found Lipp chasing his estranged wife. The deputies then tackled and arrested Lipp, despite active resistance.

Once in custody, Lipp continued to physically resist the officers, flailing around and spitting in two deputies' faces.

Due to his erratic behavior, Clay County Fire and Rescue escorted Lipp to Orange Park Medical Center. After being medically cleared, deputies relocated Lipp to Clay County Jail.

Lipp is charged with assault and battery during burglary, two counts of battery on a law enforcement officer, unarmed burglary, simple assault, vandalism and resisting arrest without violence.

Lipp is being held in the Clay County Jail without bond, and his next court date is scheduled for March 7.

Child pornography charge for Middleburg man

MIDDLEBURG – Clay County Sheriff's deputies arrested a Middleburg man after an investigation revealed he allegedly uploaded child pornography online.

On Jan. 18, deputies met with Trent James Stone, 18, after receiving a cyber tip. Stone voluntarily spoke with the officers, despite being informed he wasn't under arrest, according to the police report. He then consented to a voluntary search of his phone.

Deputies met with Stone again on Jan. 31, where they showed Stone the images, many of which contained underage women being sexually battered by adult men. Police then placed Stone under arrest for one count of possession of photographs depicting children performing sexual acts.

Stone has since been released from the Clay County Jail on an undisclosed bond.

Phone bandit collared

ORANGE PARK – An Orange Park man faces a charge of unarmed robbery after

he allegedly punched another man and stole his phone, wallet and earbuds.

According to the police report, Austin Deferran Bland, 18, and the victim were allegedly in an argument at Bland's home in the Tanglewood area. The argument turned violent when Bland and another man began to punch the victim and take his possessions.

Police said the victim escaped and called law enforcement, who later arrested Bland.

Bland is being held with a bond of \$50,003, and his next court date is scheduled for Feb. 6.

Drug deal gone wrong

MIDDLEBURG – A Middleburg man faces armed robbery charges after allegedly robbing two men during an arranged drug deal.

Clay County Sheriff's deputies arrested Mitchell Tabor Ambrose, 19, on Feb. 5 following an investigation of an armed robbery that occurred in July 2017.

The two victims met with Ambrose, someone whom the victims claim they've known for years, at their home so they could purchase \$95 worth of cannabis from him. However, Ambrose reportedly produced a pistol after taking the victims' money.

An unknown driver then fled the scene with Ambrose, according to police.

After speaking with Ambrose, deputies arrested him and transported him to the Clay County Jail, where they charged him with armed robbery with a firearm. At press time, Ambrose remained in jail with bond set at \$100,003.

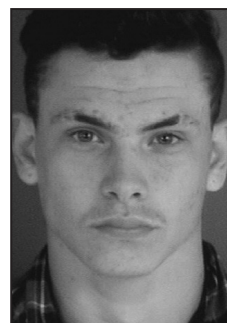
CCSO car in fender bender

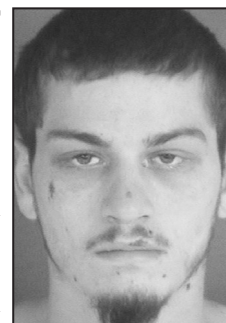

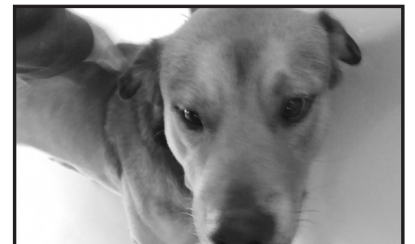
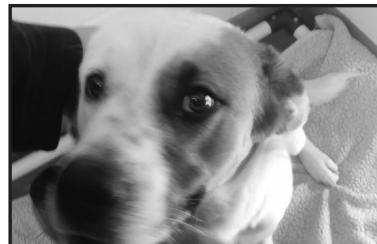

Orange Park man dies in train collision

CAYCE, S.C. – Two Amtrak employees, including one man from Orange Park, died on Feb. 4 after their passenger train collided with a CSX Corp. freight train and derailed.

Michael Cella, 36, of Orange Park, was working as a conductor on Amtrak Train 91, when it collided with the CSX freight train around 2:35 a.m. in Cayce, South Carolina. The freight train was parked at a loading facility in Cayce, which is just outside of Columbia. Michael Kempf, a train engineer from Savannah, Georgia, also died in the collision.

In an email to Clay Today, Amtrak Media Relations representative Kimberly Woods stated Amtrak is fully cooperating with the National Transportation Safety Board, which is heading up the investigation. She said CSX is responsible for maintaining the area in which the collision happened.

“CSX maintains all of the tracks and signal systems,” Woods said. “[They] control the dispatching of all trains, including directing the signal systems which control the access to sidings and yards.”

The cause of the collision remains undetermined, but officials are focusing on a

switch that was in the incorrect position. It’s believed the switch caused the Amtrak train to leave its track and enter the siding yard where the freight train was parked.

“The signal system in this area was inoperative due to signal maintenance and signal upgrades,” said NTSB Chairman Robert Sumwalt, in a Feb. 5 press conference. “When the signals are not operating, [trains] are able to work under track warrants, whereby the dispatcher will authorize the train to operate in a certain territory.”

Sumwalt said the CSX dispatcher would have to have given the Amtrak train clearance to pass through. However, the investigation showed that the switch that rerouted the Amtrak train was locked in the wrong position. Further investigation is required before a full cause can be determined, according to Sumwalt.

Train 91’s maximum speed between its last stop and impact was 57 mph, within the 59-mph regulation for that track, according to NTSB’s Newsroom Twitter. Prior to impact, the train’s horn was activated and the engine was throttled down to idle while emergency and air-brake systems were employed. The last recorded speed

prior to impact was 50 mph.

Train 91, which operates between Miami and New York, was carrying approximately 8 crew members and 139 passengers on board, while the CSX train was unoccupied. More than 100 people were transported to hospitals after the crash,

according to the Lexington County Sheriff’s Department.

“Amtrak is working to take care of everyone who was on the train, including family members of our passengers and crew,” said Woods.

make their own decisions based on empirical evidence and scientific data.

She continued on saying that what she said was echoed by constituents in the audience.

Scott Yirka, pastor of Hibernia Baptist Church on Fleming Island, said it's a shame that students can't have supplementary material when teaching the origin of man.

"I'd like to see our kids have [supplementary material]," Yirka said. "I'm not necessarily espousing that you teach creationism but to at least have the opportunity to have a conversation about the flaws that are in evolution."

Yirka believes that the reason many educated people disagree with much of what

is taught when it comes to evolution is because they see that the cosmology is more intricate than some sort of accident, that we are far more than atoms and molecules that just randomly appeared.

Yirka's son, Graham Yirka, a junior at Fleming Island High in the AICE program, said he does not believe in the theory of evolution and when he brings up intelligent design, he gets ridiculed. He also believes that the theory of evolution leads people to believe they are superior to others.

"[Evolution] doesn't just say, 'this is science.' It's culture because people are taught you can be evolutionarily superior to someone else," Yirka said. "At the core of evolution is the repudiation of equality and if in schools you want equality, equality of education, equality of opportunity, and equality all around, this is not something that's going to further that and in fact, it's something that's going to hinder that."

Others agreed with the Yirkas and also presented other problems they have with how evolution is taught in schools. Henry Allen, whose grandchildren are in Clay County schools, wants his grandchildren to be taught that they have choices in what they believe the origin of life to be. Darrell Thompson, whose daughter is a ninth grader at Ridgeview High School, doesn't want his daughter taught evolution as fact — although, according to Florida's Sunshine State Standards, evolution is called the scientific theory of evolution and should be taught as a theory.

There were others, though, who disagreed with Gilhousen and those in sup-

port of her position.

Shana Meiselman is a teacher who, despite her religious beliefs, does not believe it is her responsibility to teach beliefs that are not founded in science — citing creationism among others. She also stated that the theory of evolution is based in science and if properly taught, taught as theory and just that.

Renna Lee Paiva, president of the Clay

County Education Association, said teachers should be teaching evolution as theory because that's what state standards dictate, something confirmed by Superintendent Addison Davis, who said that despite personal beliefs of anyone, the Florida standards dictate what is taught and how it is taught and to go against that would be unlawful.

School Board Attorney David D'Agata

reminded the board that it's important to maintain neutrality in this decision, not calling into account any personal beliefs one might have.

"The court says that the custom for the analysis under the First Amendment is that it mandates government neutrality between religion and religion and between religion and nonreligion. You have to have strict neutrality — set aside all personal views — when you act on behalf of the government, in respect to this issue," D'agata said. "The trouble is basically, when we are talking about neutrality, that there is no alternative scientific theory to evolution that is neutral. That's what federal courts have time and time again concluded."

Davis finished the discussion by explaining why the textbook that was presented is the one chosen for adoption by the district.

"I would tell you, if there was a better curriculum, would have brought it to you and when I agree with a curriculum that's aligned with the state standards from DOE and 21 of your 21 teachers agree with it, I trust the experts and practitioners, along with my mindset of what the standards are that were given to use by the Department of Education," Davis said. "That's why I brought it and you won't find one that's better."

After Davis' comments, the board voted to approve the adoption of the advertised science textbooks for grades K-12 in a 3-2 vote with board members Betsy Condon and Gilhousen voting no.

In other business, the board finished the night by voting on a resolution allowing the sale of a tract of property the district owns on the grounds of Tynes Elementary School is not needed for educational purposes and will instead be sold to the Clay County Utility Authority.

One of the greatest hymns ever written is, "There is a Fountain." The words are powerful! The first verse says:
There is a fountain filled with blood
Drawn from Immanuel's veins
And sinners plunged beneath that flood
Lose all their guilty stains.

The hymn was written by William Cowper and first published in 1772. It has been sung by millions in these ensuing years and is still sung in worship today.

Many things about Cowper's life were sad. His mother died in childbirth when William was five years old. He was tormented in his early school years by older boys. His frailties became even more apparent as the years passed.

He was emotionally tormented and was committed to mental institutions twice in his life. He made several suicide attempts. But through all these trials he continued to write the blessed poetry of his Savior.

The wonderful thing is that his poems and hymns still live today, to bless multitudes of people.

He was a friend and colleague of John Newton, the former slave ship captain, who wrote the beautiful hymn, "Amazing Grace." Newton and Cowper collaborated on many hymns and jointly published them. Even so, Cowper's emotional struggles and fears continued to plague him.

No matter how strong the emotional, spiritual, mental attacks against him were, he continued to contribute great poetry to the annals of faith by his talented – even inspired – writing.

God used the life of this man, despite his mental depression and spiritual doubts, to pen words that have been an inspiration to the church for 200 years. The Holy Spirit has used these words to encourage many saints and to call sinners to find their peace with God. This is peace

that can only be found in that "fountain filled with blood, drawn from Immanuel's veins."

Dear dying Lamb, Thy precious blood
Shall never lose its pow'r,

Till all the ransomed church of God
Are safe, to sin no more.

church with her grandparents at St. Mary's Episcopal in Green Cove Springs.

Having watched her grow up so closely, her grandparents are understandably proud of her making it to the Olympics.

"I think it's wonderful that she stuck it out and did what was needed to be done to get there," her grandfather said.

Her grandmother agreed. "I'm so excited for her to have this experience and opportunity to meet these young people from all over the world. It's just a thrill," she said.

For Natacha, it's a dream come true. "I'm very excited," she said earlier this week from her family's home in Lebanon (her whole family has dual U.S.-Lebanese citizenship) while she was packing for her trip to South Korea.

Sports have always been a part of Natacha's life, going back even to her grandparents, who started the ski club for their daughter's high school when they were living in Williamsburg, New York.

Her mother, Sally Anne, now a physical therapist, won a full scholarship to the University of Indiana as a gymnast, and her father, Patrick, who is part of his family's textile business in Lebanon, is quite a good skier, her grandfather said.

And if Natacha needs any advice on participating in the 2018 Olympics, she can always ask her brother, Alex, who

competed in the 2014 games in Sochi. Also a longtime Fleming Island visitor, he is now 22 and about to graduate from St. Michael's College in Vermont with a degree in international business. Alex was the top male skier in Lebanon in 2014.

Natacha was also supposed to compete in the Sochi Olympics in Russia but she tore her anterior cruciate ligament and had to have surgery. It's been a long haul back from that, she said.

"It was very depressing," she said of the injury, surgery and rehabilitation since she wasn't sure at first what would happen. "It was four years of hard work," she said.

But the injury wasn't the only obstacle she and the other members of her 3-person Olympic team faced. Training is difficult as

Lebanon has a short winter (about three months) and the runs are relatively short. That left Natacha doing a lot of training in Austria and South America.

She has nothing but good feelings about Fleming Island, and still visits often. "It's like my Zen. It's such a peaceful place," she said. "I used to wait all year long to go to my grandparents on Fleming Island. I love it there. I always have a good time."

Her grandmother especially remembers their excitement when they were little. "When they came, it was always like they were going to Disneyland," she said.

Some of Natacha's favorite memories from when she was younger include her time at Fleming Island Elementary. "It was very different," from what she was used to,

she said. She especially remembers riding her bike to school, P.E., the cafeteria, the playground, "the whole way of teaching" and fire drills.

"We don't have those here in Lebanon," she said.

She remembers spending a lot of time explaining where Lebanon is to her friends and coaches.

"I had a lot of friends and people pushing me. I had a lot of people who taught me what being committed to sports was," she said. (For the most part, sports are more of a hobby in Lebanon, she said, with the focus for those still in school on very difficult academics.)

"My coaches had a huge impact on me," she said.

Natacha said she was realistic enough to realize that she isn't among the ultra-elite skiers who train constantly.

"I know my chances are not very good because they train all the time," she said. "But I want to do better than any other Lebanese has ever done."

Out of a field of about 100, she said she is in the Top 15 or 16.

Natacha will be in the opening ceremonies on Feb. 9 at 8 p.m. on NBC. Check the internet for viewing opportunities at nbcolympics.com and the olympicchannel.com (Channel 624 on Comcast). Her specific event – the slalom – should be on Feb. 17.

"We'll definitely be watching," her grandmother said.

BARTRAM TRAIL – After stunning area soccer fans Wednesday night with a 2-1 overtime semifinal victory over district top seed, ranked No. 1 nationally, defending Class 4A champion Fleming Island, the question would be "Could the Oakleaf Knights keep that level of intensity and face off against the Creekside Knights Friday night?"

Answer: Oakleaf High senior forward Albert Cooper.

"Two nights ago we found success beating Fleming for the first time in school history, then tonight we win the district title," said Cooper. "It's just an amazing feeling."

Ironically, Fleming Island tied Fletcher 2-2 on Fri., Jan. 26 with both teams maintaining unbeaten regular season records.

On a night when Oakleaf's first-year head coach Matt Hollyoak had a commitment out of state that he could not get out of, assistant coach James Bayles took the reins and never looked back.

Eagles just short of Highland Prep

Detwiler still unbeaten

BRANDON, Fla. — With a slew of defending state champions in front of them and the honor of wrestling one of the top 10 high school wrestling teams in America, Fleming Island High's wrestling team, led by still-unbeaten Paul Detwiler, hammered away at Lake Highland Prep's star-studded lineup, but fell just short at the Tony Ippolito Memorial Wrestling Invitational held Saturday at Brandon High School.

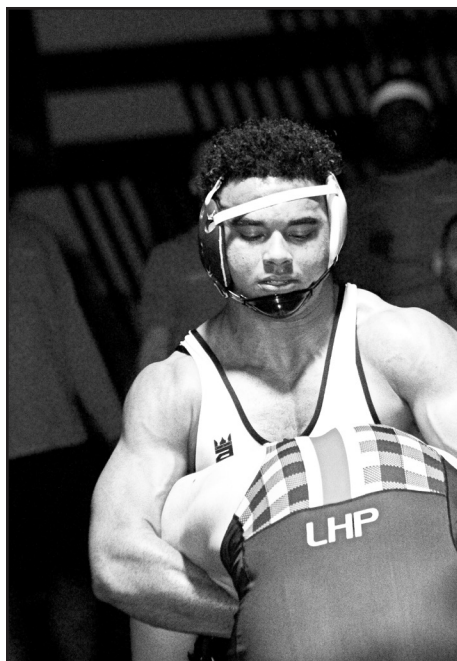
Ironically, a much-awaited match between Detwiler, third at 152 last year in Class 3A, and Lake Highland Prep's unbeaten two-time defending Class 1A champion Erich Byelick never happened as Byelick, who was at the tournament in street clothes, was not on the Lake Highland Prep roster in the 170 bracket. Byelick was also a defending national champion.

"We don't run away from competition," said Fleming Island 113 pound wrestler Briar Jackson. "We know coming in that we have to wrestle just a little bit better than out best and gets some breaks along the way to take out a team like Lake Highland Prep or even Brandon."

Lake Highland Prep scored 351.5 points for the team title with Fleming Island runnerup at 316 followed at a distance by Brandon at 230 points.

Jackson, who followed teammate Lou Gagliardo's championship win at 106 over Manatee's Noah Wadle 13-2, took out Lake Highland Prep's Jake Wohltman. Wohltman finished fourth in Class 1A last year; losing to Gagliardo.

In the slamfest of state powerhouses; Lake Highland, Class 1A champions; Bran-

don, Class 2A champion and Fleming Island Class 3A runnerup to South Dade, the finals set up to be a handful of Fleming Island vs. Lake Highland Prep as the two teams stayed within as little as 11 point in wrestling rounds prior to the finals.

"We had six of seven finalists matched up with them (Lake Highland)," said Fleming Island coach P.J. Cobbert. "A couple of breaks here and there and the score is very different."

In the championship matches, after Gagliardo and Jackson established a first strike for the Golden Eagles on the scoreboard, Lake Highland struck back with defending champion Nic Bouzakis at 120 pounds, just an eighth grader, beating a

bloodied Albie Snedaker 16-5. Bouzakis had a string of first period pins before meeting Snedaker in the final. Snedaker matched Bouzakis in destruction with his own three pins to the fall with one in 43 seconds.

From there, lake Highland Prep rattled off a string of wins with state medalists; Ryan Chauvin (126 champ), Joey Silva (132 champ), Noah Castillo (138 champ) and Kai Bele (3rd 145) to boost the team score and heighten the upcoming heavy weight matches with Detwiler, Ryan Smenda and Jose Concepcion all set to compete against Lake Highland Prep opponents in the final matches of the night.

Ironically, at 160, Brandon wound up with two wrestlers set to battle in the final prior to Detwiler's match with Highland Prep's Max Cosmides, a Class 1A runnerup last year at 152. As Detwiler started to ramp up his warmup, Brandon pulled their wrestlers for a injury forfeit that forced Detwiler to cut his warmup short.

Cosmides, wrestling in place of Byelick, had no answer to Detwiler's speed and power as Detwiler dominate the match to a 14-2 major decision.

With 182 and 195 going to Lake Highland and Manatee, the anticipated show-

down between Smenda, still unbeaten after a late start from football, and Lake Highland's two time defending champion Ben Goldin turned out to be the barnburner as expected with Smenda fighting to a 1-1 tie after three periods. Both wrestlers had rifled through their preliminaries rounds with smashing pins.

In the overtime periods, Smenda, fifth in 3A last year, fell behind 4-1 in the matching 30 second overtime periods that pushed the match to a final segment that Smenda had to score in or the match would end.

With Goldin in the bottom position, Smenda surprised the crowd, and probably Goldin, with a shocking Spradle hold that tossed Goldin to his back with just 2.5 seconds to go that had both wrestlers roll toward the scorer's table. Officials scored no points for Smenda to end the match at 4-1.

In the 285 pound match, pitting Concepcion, sixth in 3A last year, against Lake Highland's Curtis Ruff, third in Class 1A last year, in a battle of stalwarts. With both wrestlers battling on their feet, each scored an escape to end the regulation time at 1-1 and force a tournament ending overtime bonanza that Ruff scored a final escape to win 3-2.

Top six medal winners were Justin By-

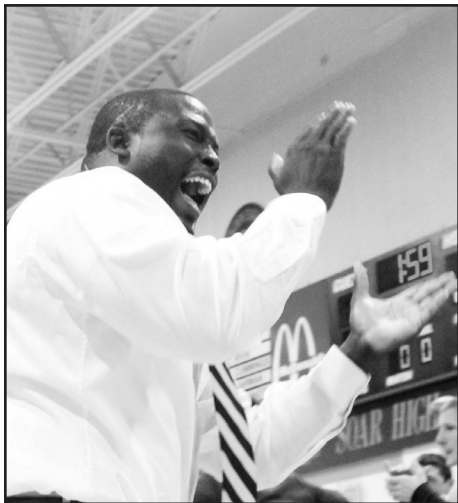

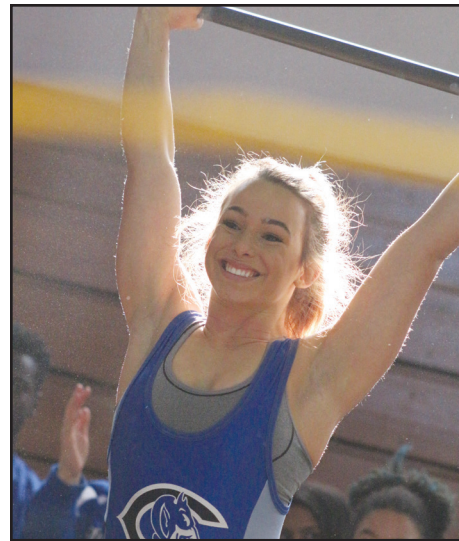

region play, will face Creekside in Friday's championship game. Creekside beat host Bartram Trail 1-0 in the second game of the semifinal night. On Mon., Jan., 29, Oakleaf advanced with a win over Nease while Creekside beat St. Augustine in quarterfinals action.

Fleming Island, previously unbeaten, but tied, most recently a 2-2 tie with Fletcher on Fri., Jan. 26 that caused concern for coach Michael Green.

“We were not clearing the ball from in front of the net,” said Green, after the Golden Eagles roared back from a 2-0 half-time lead against Fletcher to salvage the tie. “Tonight, (against Oakleaf), we had our opportunities, but we could not get the ball in the net.”

Fleming Island, quickly moved for the first shot of the game straight from the opening kickoff, opened the night with a quick strike score in the first five minutes of the game with forward Lucas Hauth pounding Oakleaf goalie Marcos Acosta with a left-to-right shot that Acosta knocked down in front of the goal. With no defenders near him, Fleming Island's opposite side forward, Evan Parks, retrieved the ball and popped it over the felled Acosta on the ground.

“I told them to just stay with the momentum and not lose their game,” said Oakleaf High first year coach Matt Holyoke, also a key Clay County Soccer Club coach. “All the guys on this field play with and against each other at the club level so the intensity is very high. We knew all season that it might come to this game.”

After Fleming Island lost senior defender Noah Hamlett to an ankle injury earlier in the game, Oakleaf took quick advantage of the Golden Eagles having inexperience on the defensive front. Cooper, on another striker attempt from right to left, got tangled up with defender Joshua Cook and

dropped just inside the 18 yard line to set up a penalty kick.

“Coach didn't want me to take the kick, but I wanted it,” said Cooper, who set up for the kick near the 22 minute mark of the first half. “Coach wanted Ammon to take it and told him I wanted the ball. I'm the senior and I wanted the game on my back.”

Cooper faced off against Zermeno and drilled the ball into the left corner to tie the game at 1-1.

“I usually don't like the guy who gets penalized to take the kick because they get all emotional from the penalty, but Cooper insisted and waved off the other guys,” said Holyoke. “He did his job and we got a break.”

After the emotional lift to the Knights' sideline, both teams exchanged near-miss scoring bolts, but the half ended still locked at 1-1.

“Noah is such a seasoned player back there and that play hurt us,” said Green.

In the final 20 minutes of regulation time, Oakleaf stayed with their slow sideline-to-sideline game just inside the Fleming Island side of the 50 yard line with the Golden Eagles trying to put Davis in position to end the game.

“We were well aware of Davis' ability to win games from last year with three gamewinners in their state run,” said Holyoke. “We cut the field in half on him. I feel bad for him because he's a talented player.”

Fleming Island got a free kick near the sideline about 30 yards away from the Oakleaf goal and Golden Eagles got a wicked center shot straight from Jakob Hastie at Acosta and high that Acosta fingertip-pushed over the cross bar in one of the closest near-goals of the night.

In the overtime, with first goal being a gamewinner, Fleming Island pushed into the Oakleaf zone, but Ammons and Henderson made one quick escape that was blocked by Zermeno, but the duo repeated the attack moments later for the game winner with just two minutes off the clock.

Pre-game, Bayles reminded the Knights of their epic situation.

ing to the goal hard and ripped off a shot. A Creekside defender was hit with the ball and Cooper picked up the ricochet, fired, and blasted the ball past the keeper's left side giving Oakleaf a 1-0 lead just before the halftime break.

"After 20 minutes and we didn't score, I was kind of anxious, but then we kept getting chances." Cooper said. "I just thought, okay; they'll come. Then I kept crashing the ball, I took a shot, the defender hit it, it hit my leg and went in and I was surprised;

it was just meant to be."

At the water break of the second half, with 19:11 left in the game, Oakleaf held Creekside to not getting off a single shot on goal. 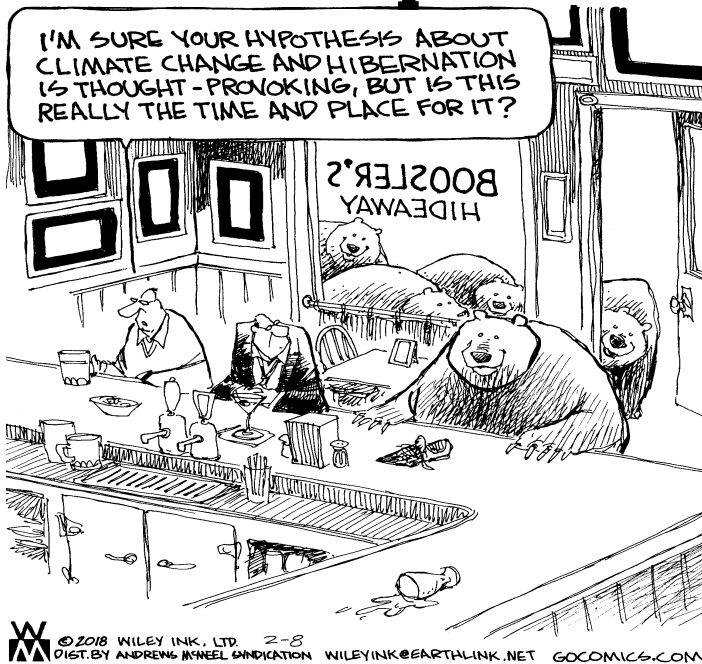

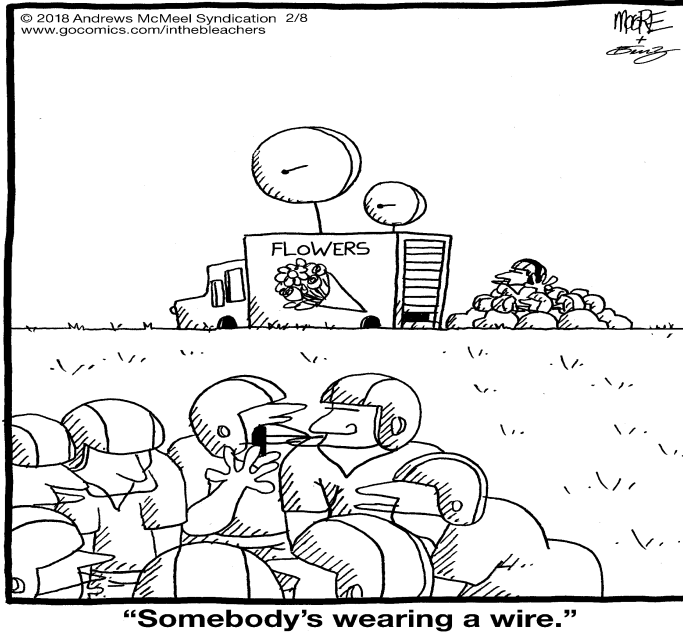

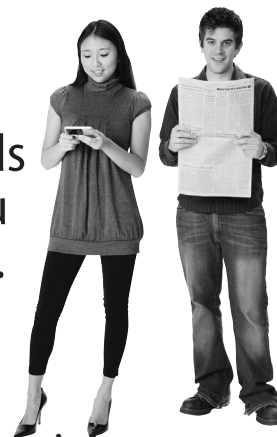
