

State re-examines post-2002 capital cases

FLEMING ISLAND – In 2008, David James Martin used a hammer to bludgeon to death 24-year-old Jacey Lynn McWilliams and left her body in a remote wooded area in Middleburg, near Jennings State Forest, and took her car.

The Clay County jury that heard the case voted

9-3 to sentence him to death.

New Clay sheriff sworn in

Daniels pledges transparency as new sheriff

ORANGE PARK — Outside the Thrasher-Horne Center for the Arts, protesters gathered. Inside, hundreds of people packed into the lobby, where the public swearing-in of Clay County Sheriff Darryl Daniels was held Monday evening.

Organizers delayed the start of the ceremony for 40 minutes while they figured out where to put all the supporters, colleagues and curious citizens as the

county's first black sheriff prepared to take office.

"Darryl Daniels was elected because of the content of his character, not the color of his skin," Clay County Commissioner Diane Hutchings, paraphrasing Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., said to the crowd as she emceed the event.

Daniels, a former Duval County jails chief and Naval officer, garnered 35 percent of the vote to win a four-candidate Republican primary in August. He replaces Rick Beseler, who retired after 12 years as sheriff.

"I've been this color my whole life," Daniels said to the crowd. "The color of my skin isn't relevant.

"You only have a few moments in life to achieve greatness, and I want to try as sheriff to achieve greatness," he continued during an impassioned speech. "I'm talking about eating away at the blight

Hard roads helped shape the history of Clay County

hard road is an invite for the unusual and new to come and for the old and familiar to go. A ragged, rutted trail seems to sing to stay and – stay the same.

When Clay County was lopped off from the southern part of Duval County in 1858, residents began choosing up sides over the question of roads. Some saw hard surfaced roads as necessary to the development of the county, an enticement to new settlers and a boom to business. Others were convinced that roads would just mean more competition, encourage invasion by dangerous riff-raff and, most feared, higher

For decades from the Civil War until the 1920's, the hard road opposition held sway and foiled all efforts to pass bond issues for paved road construction. Instead, the haphazard system of private landowners carving out ragged dirt trails then petitioning for designation as a publicly maintained road persisted.

By the late 1870's, the taxpayers of Clay County were stuck with the impossible responsibility of maintaining miles of stump littered, dirt trails. Maintenance consisted of mule drawn graders and county prison labor. Supervision was the responsibility of

Some of these so-called roads went nowhere any one wanted to go. Other areas boasted four or five roads all going to and

A hard road causes a place to change. A from the same place. Citizens petitioned to have roads closed to reduce the ever increasing maintenance costs.

> Clay County's numerous creeks and sloughs were just another nightmare of road upkeep. Any road that crossed water had to have a bridge or ferry. Travelers never knew what condition the bridge would be in when they got there. Rough log bridges were common where water was relatively shallow. But these were prone to rot or just tear up and disappear if water ran high or someone needed the logs for some other purpose.

> Traditional bridges were truly a headache. They were expensive to build and a target of choice for anyone with an ax to grind or a score to settle. The Governor's Creek Bridge just north of Green Cove Springs was a prime example. It was heavily traveled and close to the courthouse so people who met with misadventure on the structure were still furious when they arrived to complain.

> A particular problem was its tendency to give way and swallowed up horses and mules. In 1872, the ever strapped for funds commissioners dealt with the problem by posting a sign warning that the bridge was unsafe for horses. The bridge was patched and repaired and residents continued losing horses until a new bridge at a cost of \$1.000 was completed in 1883.

In the late 1890's, Florida was swept



In the late 1800s, the Governors Creek Bridge was notorious for disintegrating under horses and

up in The Good Roads movement sweeping the nation. Sadly, no money came with those enthusiastic notions.

After attending a back-slapping convention in Jacksonville with movers and shakers from all over the state, the Clay County Commissioners were complete converts to the need for hard roads in the county. A commitment was made to build an oyster shell road and bicycle path from the Duval County line south to Governors Creek as part of the overall state plan.

Still unable to pass a bond issue, the commission voted to increase property taxes to cover costs. This stirred up a real

hornet's nest. At the next election less than a year later, several commissioners were replaced but the road was complete, almost to Putnam County in the south. It was promptly christened The Hard Road by locals and as years passed became known as The Old Hard Road.

Outside of hard surfaced roads built by towns, it remained the only hard road in the county until the 1920s. Voters in those days meant what they said and elected officials didn't cross them without suffering the consequences.

Bradley files bill to help Clay lakes and St. Johns River

TALLAHASSEE- Sen. Rob Bradley (R-Fleming Island) filed legislation Jan. 3 to protect the St. Johns River and the lakes of the Keystone Heights region for future generations.

Senate Bill 234 requires the state to spend a minimum of \$35 million annually from Amendment One funds on projects that preserve or provide public access to the River and the Keystone lakes.

"I grew up on the banks of the St. Johns River and visited the lakes of Keystone Heights as a child, and my family enjoys these incredible gifts from God today," Bradley said. "This is very personal for

me. These natural resources define the character of the northeast Florida region of our state."

In 2014, Floridians overwhelmingly adopted Amendment One. a constitutional amendment mandating that the

Legislature spend one-third of documentary stamp tax revenues on environmental preservation efforts. The bill directs a portion of those dollars to the River and Lake

"As a conservative, I believe in absolute fidelity to the State Constitution." Bradley said. "The Constitution requires us to protect these natural resources, as we should, and this bill helps fulfill that constitutional obligation to the people of the northeast

Senate President Joe Negron recently

appointed Bradley as chairman of the Senate appropriations subcommittee on the environment and natural resources.

"President Negron and I share a passion for implementing real solutions to the environmental challenges facing our state in the 21st century, from Lake Okeechobee and the Everglades to our springs to the St. Johns River. Not only do we need to insure that our water is clean, but we need to insure the public has reasonable access to these wonderful natural assets for all time.

ORANGE PARK – Two competing thrift stores from two competing hospice organizations have recently stepped up the com-

Previously located across town from each other, the Haven Hospice and Community Hospice thrift shops are now within walking distance of each other in the 800 block of Blanding Boulevard.

Community Hospice – which took the space formerly occupied by the Goodwill Thrift store at 845 Blanding Blvd. – held a soft opening on Black Friday. Haven Hospice, now at 821 Blanding Blvd., plans to open in the next few weeks after moving from its previous location on Wells Road.

Community Hospice Communications Manager Jay Magee noticed the Haven Hospice sign last week while dropping off a donation to his newly-opened store and was pleasantly surprised by the new com-

"It's a good place for us and really the shopper wins in the end because they've got the convenience really within walking distance, I mean, if you really wanted to brave Blanding Boulevard on foot, then you could do it." Magee said.

And daring shoppers could do just that as the Teen Challenge Thift at 868 Blanding Blvd. is across the six-lane thoroughfare from Magee's shop.

According to a February 2016 study by market research firm IBIS World, U.S. consumers spend \$10 billion a year at thrift stores. The study also found that thrift stores employ 117,918 U.S. workers.

Both thrift shops saw their leases expire around the same time. Community Hospice Thrift Shop's previous location, as well as the Ford Quick Lube location that was behind it. have both closed to make way for a new Wawa store to be built at that location.

Time to scrap common core

Some things just shouldn't be political. For example, why have the issues of climate change and protecting the environment become politicized?

Is it because Al Gore was the face of

environmental protection in the early 2000s? Is it because energy companies lobby and fund lots of Republican candidates? Is it because of the growing number of conservative media outlets, which promote an agenda instead of simply reporting the news?

Ten years ago, climate change was an accepted fact by the vast majority of Americans. Nowadays, lots of people pretend not to understand science.

Personally, I'd think the Christian Right would want to preserve God's green earth.

For liberals, one of their babies is Common Core, an initiative begun about seven years ago and adopted by most states to set universal curriculum standards in English and math in schools at multiple grade levels. It requires frequent testing to gauge progress.

The English portion encompasses reading, writing, language, speaking and listening, and media and technology. The math portion includes practical mathematics and mathematical content (various forms of math).

It all sounds good on its face, right?

Most of my liberal friends are automatically in favor of Common Core. They think it uplifts education, which our country desperately needs to do, and they can't understand why anyone would oppose it.

Most of my conservative friends are automatically against Common Core, believing it's government interference in the classroom.

But I'll tell you who really dislikes Common Core, and not for political reasons –

teachers

Show me a teacher and I'll show you someone who hates Common Core.

As a reporter, I've covered education on-and-off for a long time, and I have yet to meet a teacher who likes Common Core. I have teachers in my family, and they all give Common Core a big, fat "F."

One woman in my family retired from teaching early because, as she put it, "Common Core is ruining education."

At Clay County School Board meetings, I've seen numerous teachers speak against it. One woman said her class had to learn long division *before* learning multiplication – all because of the standards and testing of Common Core.

Teachers hate Common Core because it removes real learning from the classroom. Instead of promoting critical thinking, creativity, ideas and depth of understanding, Common Core means rote "teaching to the test."

The exasperated woman in my family who retired early? She said her life had become endless piles of testing and grading instead of teaching.

Also, most students I've talked with hate it. They feel like they're only learning how to take tests, and the constant stream of tests are extremely stressful.

A primary criticism of the math curriculum (aside from concepts being taught out of order) are that students receive a broad but shallow knowledge of mathematics. Critics of the English curriculum cite a lack of free thought for students. And, overall, questions exist about the relevance of some of the material taught in Common Core.

Virginia, Texas and Alaska are the only states that haven't adopted Common Core. Every other state has, either in part or in full.

Indiana, Oklahoma and South Carolina ended up repealing it.

It's time for Florida to do the same.

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ments from our shop wasn't in the primary location for a lot of retail shoppers," said Courtney Patterson Quirie, director of volunteer services with Haven Hospice. "Many of them in the community tend to go to multiple stores at one time, so being closer to multiple retail stores isn't necessarily a bad thing and we're pretty confident that we offer good items at a good. fair value and that keeps everybody competitive."

Quirie said the addition of the Haven Hospice thrift shop in the same area as Community Hospice's would benefit both

thrift shops due to customer cross traffic.

Both thrift shops use almost all of the money raised in their shops towards paying the medical bills of those that may not have health insurance or other means to pay for care at their respective hospice locations.

"Initiatives like the thrift shop allow us to provide that to anybody in our five-county service area," Magee said. "It's important for us to be there not only as a thrift shop but as a symbol to let people know we are there for a community and an opportunity to learn about the care they provide.

A lot of people are not comfortable talking about end of life care."

Both thrift store chains operate almost entirely off a skeleton staff. Most store associates are volunteers. Haven Hospice's thrift shop only employs three people between its five attic stores. January marks the fifth year the Community Hospice Thrift Shop has operated.

Likewise, both stores will see an increase in their available floor space. Community Hospice saw its Orange Park thrift store's show room go from 8.000 square feet to 10,000, while Haven Hospice's storage space has also increased to facilitate the storage of medical equipment used in patient care at the Custead Center, also on Blanding Boulevard.

"I think we have a good relationship with the community," Quirie said. "It's two different businesses serving the same area. We have a good relationship with them and I think both stores will benefit with them being so close to each other."

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Town enters new three-year red light camera contract

ORANGE PARK — The Orange Park Town Council voted 3-2 Tuesday in a hurried motion to approve the town's red light cameras for another three years despite several impassioned pleas from residents to do away with them.

The town's seven cameras at the intersections of Kingsley and Park Avenues, Kingsley and Debarry Avenues and Park Avenue and Loring are safe for another three years.

The town's contracted red light company, American Traffic Solutions, will continue to evaluate other intersections for more red light cameras in the future.


The decision comes after a special committee reviewed sealed proposals from four separate camera companies. ATS included a three-month credit in its proposal, meaning the higher cost of their contract became negligible when committee members factored lost revenue from camera down time from other companies.

However, while council members evaluated which proposal was a better deal, many citizens in the audience hoped there wouldn't be a deal at all.









"If you look at it long enough you start to believe the safety benefits are very dubious at best, I drive through here several times a day just about every day, I see several flashes a day and not many accidents," said audience member Travis Christensen of Lake Asbiry. "I hope you decide to get rid of them."

The town's red light cameras were introduced in 2013 on a three-year contract. Last year, they brought in approximately \$579,167, while also increasing town expenditures by \$327,300. Expenditures do not include the cost to watch the videos

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Delinquent water bills, fire code violations keep Parkway Inn closed

ORANGE PARK - The crime plagued Parkway Inn motel shuttered by court order July 1 cannot reopen as court order allowed on Sunday until it pays approximately \$40,000 in delinquent water bills and remedies a laundry list of fire code violations.

According to Orange Park town officials, the 200-bed, \$44-a-night motel has not paid its water or sewer availability fees since August, so the town cut off services on Oct. 4. Now its owners are required to pay the delinquent water bills, a reconnection fee and a required deposit.

Additionally, problems that would have resulted in the motel's closure anyway namely the building's lack of a fire alarm – have also now become barriers to the motel's return. The closure was ordered after a lengthy battle with the Town of Orange Park Nuisance Abatement Board, which began fielding complaints about the property more than a year ago.

According to Town Fire Chief Alvin Barker, Jax Inns Inc., the company that owns the Parkway Inn, has been without a fire alarm since September 29, 2015. Barker has unsuccessfully worked with the motel since to ensure the motel's fire alarm is reinstalled.

"There were a lot of issues, like cooking in rooms that were not meant for cooking, that was a constant issue," Barker said.

There are, however, smoke alarms in each of the rooms. Residents, many of whom stayed in the motel for prolonged periods, can switch off those smoke alarms. If the smoke alarm problem is resolved, the motel would still have to seal off its kitchen area, which meets neither fire prevention code nor building code requirements, Barker said.

The lack of a fire alarm and the inconsistency in smoke alarms led the motel to hire a professional security team. Security officers would walk the premises 24/7 looking for signs of fire and criminal activity as part of an agreement with the Nuisance Abatement Board.



Barker said the firewalkers were the sole reason the motel remained operational as long as it did. Similar businesses, such as the Astoria Assisted Living mixeduse facility have had similar problems with their fire alarms, but Barker added that the assisted living facility resolved its issues within a week.

Circuit Court Judge Mike Sharrit ordered the Parkway July 1 through Dec. 31 over pervasive criminal activity including meth labs, prostitution, health concerns for residents and building code violations.

"The number of calls [to the Orange Park Police Department] were way beyond excessive, and the information was provided to the Nuisance Abatement Board, and a lot of those were drug and prostitution related." said Town Manager Jim Hanson.

In one year, his department had 760 calls to the motel's premises, a number Police Chief Gary Goble called taxing. Many of the calls were drug or prostitution related, which eventually led to the Nuisance Abatement Board's decision to declare the motel a public nuisance in February 2015.

Property values on the Parkway Inn, formerly known as the Rodeway Inn, have plummeted over 62 percent in the last three years. Taxable value on the land itself has also been on a downward trend, Clay County records show.

While the motel remained shuttered. workers shuttled in and out of the business to remodel and remedy some of the problems. According to town officials, however, priority actions, such as the fire alarm, sat neglected.

While under its court ordered closure. the motel repainted many of its rooms and upgraded some of the landscaping on the premises, according to motel attorneys.

Town officials say the convenience store Wawa has contacted them regarding the purchase of the land, and although Wawa officials did not respond for comment before deadline, motel attorneys confirmed their interest.

"There is a serious buyer looking at the hotel," said Jax Inns Attorney Daniel Copeland. "There is an offer out there for the purchase of the land and that's in process. The parties are conducting their due diligence but no closing date has been set as of yet.

Copeland said, however, that regardless of whether the Parkway Inn continues to operate, its owners' lawsuit against the town will move forward.

The suit claims the town discriminated against the motel using selective enforcement of the public nuisance ordinance and in doing so infringed on the owner's right to equal protection under the 14th Amendment.

Motel attorneys claim similar businesses – namely the Astoria Assisted Living Mixed-Use Hotel – met requirements

to also be declared a public nuisance and was not, leaving the Parkway singled out for enforcement.

A separate federal lawsuit went to mediation, but no settlement has yet been reached.

"As to the litigation, the parties participated in mediation in November," said Michigan-based Jax Inns Attorney Bradley Defoe. "We were unable to reach a settlement, but agreed to reconvene after the case has progressed further. As a result, the Parkway Inn is continuing with discovery to develop additional information to support its claim."

Motel attorneys recently filed an uncontested motion to add the operator of the motel. Rick Patel of Rashee Inc., to the lawsuit as well as the owner of the motel, Jitendra Patel of Jax Inns.

'Rashee Inc.'s damages are in excess of a million dollars and Jax Inns' damages are in excess of a million dollars," Cope-

Mediation continues in the suit, but if no settlement is reached, motel lawyers and owners have prepared to take the case

'We were hopeful that it would settle in mediation, but in this point in time based on the attitude that we have received, we are not optimistic," Copeland said.

Copeland expects the case to go to trial in February 2018 while Town Attorney Sam Garrison expects the next step to be to file for summary judgment.

'Typically cases of this nature, if the facts are not in dispute, they resolve one way or another in summary judgment and I don't think the facts are necessarily in dispute." Garrison said.


If the hotel fixes its problems, pays its bills and reopens, Hanson hopes the days of repeated police response to the hotel are over for good.

"I hope that in either event we don't go back to the days where we had significant drug and prostitution problems there, because that's not what Orange Park is all about," Hanson said. "We don't want to be known for where you can go buy drugs or a prostitute."

captured by the cameras.

The town is also looking at placing more cameras on the east side of Wells Road intersection with Park Avenue, where Police Chief Gary Goble has noticed a high volume of violations.

The town has wrestled with a decision on whether to renew its red light contract since before council adopted its 2016-2017 budget in September. On Sept. 29, the council voted to extend the red light camera contract for 120 days to give the council time to request new bids and evaluate the effect red light cameras have on public safety. Had the cameras not been extended at that time, the cameras were scheduled to "go dark."

State lawmakers authorized red light cameras in the 2010 Mark Wandall Traffic Safety Act with the intention of improving public safety. Soon, state and local governments began to earn millions more in yearly revenue.

A 2015 legislative analysis found red light cameras net around \$128 million in revenue every year. The red-light camera tickets are \$158 and the town gets \$75

"Revenue generation becomes compelling for a town of about 9,000 people," said Thomas Kalil, who spoke at the meeting. "It does kind of remind me of Waldo and those other small towns in that it's a money grab without really increasing safety.

Other speakers said the Wandall Act itself elevates video evidence to irrefutable testimony of a civil infraction while disregarding the citizens' own testimony, which stacks the deck in the state's favor.

Following public comment, where nearly all speakers opposed the red light cameras, the council appeared open to nixing the contract. Council member Scott Land, the most vocal critic of the cameras, motioned to end the contract and not seek new contracts. The motion failed 1-4.

"I think one of the things we've seen is the initial reduction of red light camera violators," said Goble. "I think it has changed the way people drive."


Before the program started in April 2013, Goble's department wrote 1,200

red light infractions is difficult in the town because of the intense traffic along the town's main thoroughfares, Park and Kingsley Avenues.

that's around Clay County, and eating away at some of the crime I've seen in Clay County, and eating away at things I don't like seeing in Clay County. I want to mend broken fences and be a bridge between the community and the sheriff's office.

"There is no more 'us versus them.' We're all 'us."

The ceremony, which took place on the

lobby stairs, included speeches by two pastors and multiple prayers, with Daniels' Christian faith as a theme. Daniels promised a transparent administration as sheriff. He said that he and his officers will walk through neighborhoods each month

and hold monthly town-hall meetings.

"I think it's important, especially in this day and time, to earn the trust of the people in the community," Daniels told Clay Today after the festivities.

Daniels has expressed an openness to the use of body cameras for officers, which is an idea Beseler was not especially fond of during his tenure.

that direction, but we're going to explore it," Daniels said. "I know the budget can't support it right now, but in the spirit of transparency and accountability, I think we need to explore every avenue."

Estimates to start a body-camera program range between \$3 million and \$5 million, with a \$3 million annual cost to sustain it.

The protesters showed up outside the swearing-in, which was performed by Jacksonville Judge Virginia B. Norton, because of Daniels' controversial decision to name former State Attorney Angela Corey as his general counsel. She was voted out of office - defeated by former colleague Melissa Nelson - after two terms. She became unpopular for what many voters saw as routinely over-charging defendants for political reasons as well as for giving raises to her staff and herself that were perceived as questionable.

Her hiring was one of his first moves prior to Daniels' assuming office, and it caused immediate political blowback.

"I'm leveraging her experience," he said. "If you trusted me enough to vote for me, then trust me in bringing her on

He has said Corey will only serve as counsel through April, and she will set up legal guidelines for his staff to follow.

For those four months, according to multiple reports, Corey will increase her retirement payout by approximately \$35,000 - from \$448,200 to \$483.272. She will also make around \$34,000 in salary from now through April.

"I've known Angela Corey for 25 years," Daniels has said. "I didn't hire her to be attorney general."

Steve Johnson, who had initially supported Daniels, recently started a change. org petition demanding the removal of Corey as general counsel. Johnson, who has said he feels betrayed by Daniels, had gathered more than 200 signatures as of Wednesday morning.

"The county voted to remove Angela Corey from office," wrote Cecilia Nippe, who signed the petition. "Why would I want her back again?"

Mike Lewis, who also signed the petition, wrote of the Corey hiring: "This is a travesty. Darryl Daniels, stop wasting our tax money or you will be run out of town."

Desiree Allen, founder of Orange Parkbased Community Impact – an organization focusing on issues of justice, neighborhood involvement and public service - didn't support Daniels' campaign and is also unhappy with his decision to hire Corev.

"I've met him and don't trust him," she said of Daniels. "I think he deceived the voters of Clay County. Some of the initiatives he has promised sound very positive, but I'll believe it when I see it. He never showed his face in some of the black neighborhoods in our county when he was running for election, and I just don't feel honesty coming from him.

"We have a bunch of bright African American kids, bright Asian kids, who will never get out of jail because of Angela Co-

Allen added that after initially meeting and talking with Daniels, she saw him at several other events and was rebuffed because she didn't get behind his campaign.

"I went up to him and said hello, and he wouldn't speak to me," she said. "He simply turned his body away from me and looked the other way. So I guess if I didn't support your campaign, you're not going to protect me as sheriff?

"We want to work with the sheriff's office, so I'll give him a chance," she said. "But we'll see what he does."



Scott proposes counter-terrorism/ intelligence task force

ORLANDO - Vowing to do everything he can to prevent another terrorist attack like the June 12 Pulse nightclub massacre, Gov. Rick Scott pushed for nearly \$6 million to create a new counter-terrorism and law enforcement intelligence task force in Florida.

"Terror like we saw in the attack on the

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Pulse nightclub is a threat to our state, our nation and each of us," Scott said in announcing the proposal at the Florida Department of Law Enforcement's Orlando Regional Operations Center Wednesday. "We need specialists who are solely dedicated to identify these terrorists and stopping them before they can attack.'

Joined by other law enforcement leaders including Orlando Police Chief John Mina, Scott and FDLE Commissioner Richard Swearingen outlined plans to seek \$5.8 million in this year's budget to hire 46 antiterrorist specialists who would be divided into eight units and assigned to work with the eight joint anti-terrrosim task forces coordinated in Florida by federal authori-

The new positions would include 38

anti-terrorism special agents, and eight crime intelligence analysts. He said the new positions would be in addition to antiterrorism efforts the agency already has. But he said the current efforts sometimes require agents to be pulled off from other units on an ad-hoc basis and the new positions would better assure that full-time anti-terrorism agents are pursuing terror-

Swearingen said the current threat environment has "seen a vast expansion in terrorism related threats in recent years and our federal law enforcement partners - who do a great job - have said they do not have sufficient resources to combat the spread of terrorism on their own," he said. "This must be a collaborative effort of federal, state and local law enforcement."

The budget request, of course, will have to survive in one form or another the Florida Legislature's budget-writing. Two lawmakers present with Scott Wednesday, state Reps. Mike Miller of Orlando and Bob Cortes of Longwood, both spoke positively for the proposal Wednesday. Both are Re-

Miller, a member of the House Justice Appropriations Subcommittee, said he looks forward to championing anti-terrorism money this spring. Cortes said a recent national anti-terrorism symposium he attended has him convinced of the need, and said \$5.8 million is "not a big ask."

'We live in a very difficult time and we're going to do everything we can to help keep everyone safe," Scott said.

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
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Artist brings dream to life with mobile show

The orchestra hopes the new location will make it easier for young musicians to perform and practice in their home county.

Middleburg supplementary arts school Wehner's School of the Arts on College Drive. The new space will give students more opportunities to perform in and around their county by collaborating with neighboring musicians at JSYO's main location at Florida State College at Jacksonville's South Campus.

Students hoping to join strings classes can pick between violin, viola, cello and

"We're opening this new satellite to lure entry level musicians who might have never picked up an instrument, or some who maybe have some experience already," said Kathryn Rudolph, Youth Orchestra Manager with JYSO.

"This gives them a place right in their backyard, their neighborhood. It's not as hard to get to as FSCJ South Campus, so we're hoping to get more

students involved where that transportation might be a big barrier."

Without an opportunity for early exposure to symphony orchestra, however, many students in Clay County begin to pick instruments in middle or high school due to the cost of travel to JYSO's main location.

"We don't have a symphony orchestra close enough for most our students to experience," said Lauren Hoffman, president of Concert on the Green, the nonprofit that organizes the annual event of the same name that is dedicated to orchestral music. "You just learn so much when you get 100 or 120 musicians together all playing in synchronized form. I remember as a young child hearing the symphony orchestra for the first time and it was life changing. I was amazed at what was possible."

Other barriers exist for entry to the program, however. The program costs \$200. Concert on the Green's main aim is to support students who cannot pay for their admission fees through scholarship opportunities. The Jacksonville Symphony Guild, the Jacksonville Symphony Association and various other benefactors also support new students.

"I was in the inaugural season of the JSYO in 1993." said Kyle Wehner, co-owner and namesake for Wehner's School of the Arts. "I've grown a lot since then of course and [JYSO] has grown leaps and bounds in the last 24 years since its inception."

Wehner and his wife Holly, who cofounded the school in 1987, have long wanted to bring the orchestra to the school and fill the instructional void left from the absence of musical teaching in an orches-

Wehner said there is a major difference in private lessons over orchestral settings that is felt by the students.

Talks began last summer and the location is just starting to assemble enough members for performances. Currently, the school has seen roughly 10 members register. Wehner said he expects to see those numbers rise once word reaches throughout the community.

Associate Conductor in charge of Education and veteran violinist Naira Underwood-Cola said the core strength of the new satellite comes from its ability to connect budding musicians "who would not normally have the opportunity for exposure to the program" with the potential result of the students ascending into higher orchestra levels.

You do see that light come on when they're working as an ensemble as opposed to taking individual lessons," Underwood-Cola said. "It gives them a sense of being a part of something larger...When you're able to be in an ensemble and around kids who study the same art form and play and perform music together it's a lot more encouraging and fun when you're that age."

actually made one woman cry through just sheer joy and wonderment seeing this."

McGovern, a graduate of Florida School of the Arts, designed and constructed the structure himself using revenue he and his mother could raise from his art sales and other income sources to fund the \$10,000 buildout.

McGovern and his mother Sheila McGovern, who work together during art shows, took on the project without prior knowledge of construction, that is until they took a class about the basics of home building.

He said challenges came early and frequent.

Tiny houses are a minimized version of a normal home measuring between 100 and 400 square feet. It's a home building fad which has gained popularity among those aiming to lead a more bohemian, bare bones life.

Many times houses are placed on wheels to meet zoning laws and facilitate the owner's move from location to location. However, the majority of tiny house's life is spent on land rather than on the road. Scott had to construct his tiny house with the reality that he would truck his shack between art shows weekly, and elected to construct it on a steel frame he designed.

From there, he framed the home with wood sourced from the home improvement store. Home Depot and other materials such as faux cobblestone blocks to give the construction an authentic feel similar to a Gypsy vardo.

"I knew I wanted something kind of wonky, something kind of unique," Scott said. "For the roof, I had an idea for kind of like a dilapidated, old, sagging, wizard's cottage in the woods."

The structure bows out as the wood beams ascend towards the ceiling, giving the roof a slanted and haphazard appearance to it that Scott said was a project in itself to design.

He said the project has been a long time coming.

"I've always been fascinated with fantasy since I was very young," Scott said. "I was one of those kids that always played [Dungeons and Dragons] with his friends. It's what I get a lot of inspiration for my art work as well."

Before his father, Shaun, passed away during his first year of college, Scott would watch him build furniture, among other things, from scratch.

Shortly before he died, Scott and Sheila planned to move to a plot of land they had purchased and build a log cabin. But Shaun passed away before construction began.


"I don't know if I'd be doing any of this if he was still alive, but he would have loved this, he really would have," Scott said. "Some of the inspiration for some of these ideas — I have no idea where they came from. I like to say some of these ideas came from him in spirit."

Scott and Sheila hope to finish the interior and electrical by next month, although that hasn't stopped him from shipping the booth all over Florida already.

"It has been an amazing business," Scott said. "And this trailer is just the next step for us. We're hoping it will bring us to bigger and better things. Lots of higher end arts shows. We'll be able to sell our work in it and then camp inside it instead of paying for hotel rooms."

Spreading his wings

Local grad trying to make it big in movie biz

LOS ANGELES – Three days after graduating from Florida Gulf Coast University, Tyler Cole packed up his car and moved to Los Angeles with no job, no place to live and very little money.

One way or another, he was going to make it in the movie industry.

"I've known my whole life that I was going to be in L.A. and make films," said Cole, a 2008 graduate of Fleming Island High School. "I told my mom that one day I'm going to take her on the red carpet at the Oscars"

Cole, who majored in communications and theater, made his West Coast move a little over four years ago. For most of his first year out there, he slept on strangers' couches that were advertised on Craigslist.

"It was kind of weird," he said. "I didn't have any bad experiences though. Everybody was really nice. This one guy had a small studio apartment and the sofa was right next to his bed, so it was almost like going to bed together every night. That was different."

How much does couch-surfing cost in L.A.? About \$100 per week.

Cole, who was the mascot at both Fleming Island High and Florida Gulf

Coast, also stayed with his sister Jocelyn in L.A. for a brief time. For a few months, he stayed with an actor and comedian friend of his, Marc Price (remember Skippy from "Family Ties"?).

Cole worked a variety of jobs, from telemarketing and serving frozen yogurt to being Price's personal assistant. But it was working at a restaurant and staying

on the couch of a guy named Aaron Burt, who was a waiter at the same restaurant, that would change Cole's life.

"I was only going to stay with him for a month, but we just became great friends and then roommates," he said. "And now we're partners making a movie."

Burt, who is into true-crime novels, wrote a script for a full-length feature film he entitled "The Promise." He and Cole co-founded a production company called Tunnel Light Pictures. Cole is producing and directing the film, but the duo needs to raise money.

On Thursday, they are launching a month-long funding campaign at *tunnel-lightpictures.com*, where people can donate. Donations can also be made at igg. me/at/ThePromiseMovie. Their goal is \$30,000, although they hope to far exceed that figure. Cole and Burt are also holding a contest where they will host the premiere in the state that produces the most donors.

Since that day he moved to L.A., it has been a long journey for Cole to reach this point, with a production company and a film in the works. Another turning point, aside from meeting Burt, was when he was able to join the Screen Actors Guild union.

As a freshman at Florida Gulf Coast, whose teams are also called the Eagles, he went to the athletic department and asked to be the mascot, "Azul the Eagle."

"They said, 'Sorry, we already have a mascot, but you can be the backup and fill in a couple times," Cole said.

He did so well filling in that the university fired the regular mascot and gave Cole the job, which he held for four years. Just like that, he went from understudy to lead – and then all the way to LA.



The dreaded citrus greening

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - Last week, we discussed the wonderful nature and popularity of the citrus trees of Florida.

They are by far one of the most popular landscape plants but also one that I am asked about most frequently and with those questions, one topic seems to loom large in the worries of homeowners and the citrus industry as a whole.

commonly known as citrus greening disease, is present in our county and unfortunately is spreading throughout many of the trees throughout the state. The bacterial disease was first found in Florida in 2005 and has moved throughout much of the Southeast United States. Native to Asia, it is spread by the Asian Psyllid, which is a small winged insect that was discovered in Florida in 1998, possibly

through illegally imported **The bacterial disease** plant material.

Once infected, the dis- Florida in 2005 and ease will cause discoloration has moved throughout this time. of the leaves, usually on a much of the Southeast few branches before moving throughout the tree and

roots. This results in a lower yield at first, with misshapen and discolored fruit, followed by the eventual death of the tree. In Central and South Florida, this disease has wiped out a high number of orchards and overall citrus yields continue to decline.

To diagnose greening, a laboratory test is needed, but some signs can be visible. The first and most common sign is the leaf discoloration. Areas of the leaf will be a lighter green or yellow than normal in a splotchy, asymmetrical pattern as seen in the image accompanying this article. Nutrient deficiencies are often mistaken for this disease but with those issues you will

see a similar, mirrored pattern on both sides of the leaf rather than the more random patterning associated with greening.

Other signs of the disease can be seen in the fruit. Over time, you will notice a decline in yield and the fruit may become misshapen. When cutting open the fruit, vou may see that one side of the fruit is larger than the other. Fruit can stay discolored on the tree as ripening occurs, retaining a green color, but this is different among different varieties and species of trees. The fruit is still safe for human consumption.

If you suspect your plant has greening, you can contact the UF/IFAS Clay County Extension Office by phone at (904) 284-6355 or by email through our website at http://www.clay.ifas.ufl.edu. Pictures of the tree including closeup shots of the leaves' fruit can be very helpful and we can work to get potentially infected trees tested.

The worst news that comes with the disease is that, as of this moment, there is no treatment or cure other than to remove the affected tree to stop it from being a source of the disease. If another psyllid were to feed on that infected tree and then

> move to a healthy tree it will likely infect the new host. There is also no effective biological or chemical control at

The best hope for controlling the disease and maintaining the citrus industry

in Florida is through the development of resistant plants, which is currently being undertaken by the University of Florida, where advancements have been made and work continues to find a variety of citrus tree or citrus rootstock that can withstand infection.

he would be put to death, courtesy of the State of Florida.

If Martin and Kaczmar were hoping for new hearings for their death sentences, they're in luck.

They'd had reason to hope, because for most of this year, the state had a temporary moratorium on executions and capital cases. Last January, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that Florida's capital punishment law was unconstitutional because it allowed judges – not juries – to impose the death penalty.

The state legislature followed up by passing a law that jurors must unanimously agree that a case includes at least one aggravating circumstance to warrant a death sentence, and it increased the number of jurors needed to approve capital punishment from seven to 10. But in October, the Florida Supreme Court went even further, ruling that juries must unanimously vote for death, not just a super-majority of 10.

So Florida's death penalty was in limbo for 11 months – until Dec. 22.

In a 6-1 ruling, the Florida Supreme court declared that all death sentences decided after a June 2002 U.S. Supreme Court ruling — Ring v. Arizona — either would be reduced to life imprisonment or be granted a re-hearing.

Gov. Rick Scott and Attorney General Pam Bondi both released press statements in which they said they're "reviewing the ruling."

The decision affected 384 inmates on death row, with 213 receiving a second look at their sentences.

Assistant State Attorney Bernie de la Rionda of Jacksonville didn't want any past cases, including those decided after 2002, to have death sentences reduced or re-heard.

"It should not be applied retroactively," de la Rionda told Clay Today while awaiting the high court's ruling. "The death penalty is a legally accepted punishment, and it is appropriate in certain instances. I can understand applying certain new guidelines in new cases going forward, but not for past cases.

"We'll have to respect and accept the decision of the Florida Supreme Court."

Ring v. Arizona went all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court. On June 24, 2002, the court ruled that juries in Arizona, not judges, must determine whether the death penalty is warranted in cases. In its decision, the court specifically called out the State of Florida for its law, which was similar to Arizona's, but Florida continued allowing judges to impose capital punishment until last January's U.S. Supreme Court ruling.


The Dec. 22 decision by the Florida Supreme Court came in the case of Asay v. Florida. Mark James Asay was convicted and sentenced to death in 1988 for the murders of Robert Lee Booker, a black man, and Robert McDowell in downtown Jacksonville. Asay, who is white, called Booker a racial epithet and then shot him.





He proceeded to shoot McDowell, who was dressed as a woman, after agreeing to pay McDowell for oral sex.

Asay was under a stay of execution and seeking a commutation, but his death sentence now will proceed. He is set to become the first white person put to death for murdering a black person in Florida.

The one dissenting opinion came from Justice James Perry, who retired Dec. 30. Perry wrote that all 384 death row inmates should have had their sentences commuted to life imprisonment, arguing that the 2002 Ring v. Arizona ruling shouldn't be a dividing line. "This creates an arbitrary application of law to two groups of similarly situation persons," Perry wrote. "Coupled with Florida's troubled history of applying the death penalty in a discriminatory manor, I believe that such an application is unconstitutional."

Harry Shorstein, a Democrat who served as State Attorney for the 4th Circuit from 1992 to 2008, prior to Angela Corey's tenure, agrees with Perry.

"I would have preferred to see these sentences set aside uniformly rather than have a cutoff date," Shorstein told Clay Today. "We've already put lots of people to death since 2002."

As a young prosecutor in 1973, Shorstein handled the case of Ernest John Dobbert Jr. A jury convicted Dobbert for the torture deaths of his young son and daughter but voted for life imprisonment rather than capital punishment, because there were no bodies found and no witnesses. A judge overruled the jury and sentenced Dobbert to death, and he was executed in an electric chair in 1984.

To date, it is the only case in Florida history in which a judge overruled the jury, sentenced the defendant to death and the sentence was carried out.

"You're not talking to a liberal here," Shorstein said. "When I first became State Attorney, I was very strongly in favor of the death penalty. But I've learned through data, many studies and speaking with law enforcement officers, law professors at

prominent institutions, and some prosecutors that it just doesn't work.

"It is not applied evenly. And I've seen some prosecutors seek it in almost every murder case for political reasons. Also, people need to understand the cost. We just can't afford it."

Incarceration of a non-death row inmate costs approximately \$30,000 per year, according to multiple studies. Incarceration of a death row inmate costs around \$49,000 per year. The average death penalty case, because of automatic appeals, routinely reaches seven figures. Several states estimate the trial and the initial appeal alone at a cost of approximately \$2 million.

Inmates sit on death row for an average of 13 years while exhausting their appeals.

Three-vehicle accident almost kills Good Samaritan

FLEMING ISLAND – The Florida Highway Patrol reports that a Jacksonville man is in critical condition at Orange Park Medical Center after being pinned between two vehicles alongside U.S. Highway 17 South on Fleming Island after a bizarre crash.

Police said Jude Aristhene, 31, was helping push a disabled 2000 Toyota Tacoma to safety from the roadway at around 11:37 p.m. on Jan. 3 when the crash occurred near Harbor Island Drive.

The driver of the Tacoma was inside steering while Aristhene was pushing the truck out of the highway. FHP said 19-year-old Savannah Hicks of Orange Park was driving a 2008 Chevrolet Equinox when she failed to stop behind Aristhene's 2015 Mazda 3, which she struck with the front of the Equinox.

"The impact pushed the Mazda into the ditch," states an FHP press release.

The Equinox continued heading south on U.S. 17 and struck Aristhene pinning him between the Equinox and the Tacoma.

A passenger in the Equinox, Emily Kay, 20, of Orange Park, was seriously injured and also transported to Orange Park Medical Center. Meanwhile, Sonel Desir, 31, of Fleming Island, the driver of the Tacoma, escaped without injury.

FHP charged Hicks with one count of careless driving.

Keystone Heights accident claims one

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS – The Florida Highway Patrol reports that a 40-year-old man died in a one-vehicle crash on Jan. 1.

Police said Patrick James McGee of Keystone Heights was driving a 1999 Ford Econoline van on County Road 214 at Twin Lakes Road when the crash occurred at 6:15 a.m.

Police said McGee failed to negotiate a curve properly, which forced his van off the roadway onto the grassy shoulder. FHP said McGee's van then struck a large pine tree and caught on fire.

"Several good Samaritans passing by the scene observed the fire and pulled the driver from the driver compartment," states the FHP press release.

Clay County Fire Rescue pronounced McGee dead at the scene of the crash.

Driver, passenger killed in New Year's Eve crash

JACKSONVILLE – A two-vehicle accident on Interstate 295 near Blanding Boulevard claimed two people and left a third with critical injuries on New Year's Eve.

The Florida Highway Patrol reports that the driver, Justin R. Conn, 28, of Green Cove Springs and a passenger, Christina A. Ross, 29, of St. Augustine, were killed in the crash that took place at 2:21 a.m. Victor Williams, 29, of Green Cove Springs, a second passenger in Conn's 2002 Ford

Mustang, was critically injured and transported to Orange Park Medical Center.

FHP said Conn was traveling behind a tractor-trailer and attempted to overtake and pass the tractor-trailer when he lost control of the Mustang. The front left of the Mustang crashed into the front right of the tractor-trailer causing both vehicles onto the shoulder. FHP said Conn's Mustang became trapped underneath the tractor-trailer. Both Conn and Ross were pronounced dead at the scene of the crash.

FHP said Conn was wearing a seat belt, while Ross was not. FHP also said tests to determine if alcohol was involved are pending as are charges as well.



patrol car and walked toward her, Adair "quickly came within a foot of the victim and punched the victim on the left side of his head."

The officer then "defended himself from any further attack by delivering one strike with a closed fist to [Adair's] left eye."

Police said Adair did not appear to have been drinking but "appeared to be under the influence of a controlled narcotic."

Adair was booked into the Clay County Jail, where at press time, she remained held, with bond set at \$15,006.

Daniels extradited back to Clay for second time

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – For the second time in nine months, a Clay County

judge will get to determine whether its prison or probation for Jerry Fred Daniels, 21, of Conway, South Carolina.

Daniels was 16 when he was arrested in 2012 in connection with the shooting death of Clay County Sheriff's Office detective Da-

vid White. Daniels was in a home at 4874 Alligator Blvd. in Middleburg the night of February 6, 2012 when Ted Arthur Tilley

and detective David White were killed during an exchange of gunfire.

He was brought back to Clay County on Dec. 29 for a probation violation after running into trouble with law enforcement in South Carolina, the second such arrest of 2016

South Carolina Probation Officer Stacy Francisco filed papers on November 14, 2016, weeks after Daniels was stopped on October 26, 2016 for speeding after leading a Conway Police Department officer on a high-speed chase while driving street-type motorcycle.

A drug test after the arrest showed Daniels had amounts of THC in his blood, breaking a condition of probation laid out in his June 3, 2015 plea agreement in Clay County. Under terms of the 2015 plea agreement signed by Fourth Judicial Circuit Court Judge Don H. Lester, Daniels pled guilty to one count each of manslaughter, possession of methamphetamine with intent to distribute and possession of codeine. In the document, he also agreed to not engage in criminal activity or associate with others engaged in criminal activity.

On February 20, 2016, Horry County, South Carolina deputies searched a car in which Daniels was a passenger and seized 3.1 grams of cannabis, a marijuana pipe and a second plastic bag containing five whole Xanax pills along with multiple broken pieces of the anti-anxiety drug located on the floorboard behind the driver's seat. Police said all four people – including Daniels – denied knowledge of the marijuana and pills.

After Daniels' 2015 plea agreement hearing in Clay County, he went to live in Conway, S.C. with one of his grandparents while his five-year probation was transferred to authorities in South Carolina. According to court documents, Daniels' case goes before a judge on Jan. 25.

Clay teacher faces DUI

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — A teacher at RideOut Elementary faces DUI charges after she ran over a curb and nearly smashed

into the side of the McDonalds Restaurant at 1165 N. Orange Ave.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office arrested Dena Boley, 49, on Dec. 28 just before midnight. The McDonalds manager on duty called the sheriff's office after a driver who had

ran over curbs and almost crashed into the side of the building. Allegedly, Boley hit the building with her vehicle's side mirror.

The report said Boley "smelled of extreme odor of alcohol." Officers asked for her license and she searched her purse for about five minutes before finally realizing it was in her wallet in her lap, the report said.

While deputies questioned her, Boley allegedly appeared to sway and have trouble holding her balance. When officers

asked if she had recently consumed alcohol, she allegedly said, "yes, I drank vodka at my house." Deputies later found Boley had urinated on herself.


Deputies arrested Boley and transported her to the Clay County Jail, where she was later released on an undetermined bond.

worth the work," she said, despite being displaced from her home due to damages sustained during Hurricane Matthew. The Green Cove Springs resident persevered and took residence at the Shiloh Baptist Church for the remainder of the fall semester.

"I completed the last semester of my degree living in a church," she said. "But I feel blessed to have a place to stay as our home is rebuilt."

Also among the graduates was Shannon Bates, 22, who thinks everyone needs someone to believe in them. Bates said that she earned her Bachelor's Degree in Early Childhood Education so she can become that person.

"Teachers help children grow into who they will become," Bates said. "I want to be a positive influence by letting my students know that they are worthy of any dream they may have."

Bates hopes to find a teaching position in time for the next school year and has held onto her vision of being a "teacher-cheerleader" for as long as she can remember, although her path has not always been as cheery as her dream. She met some serious emotional challenges along the way.

At the beginning of her studies, Bates gave birth to her daughter, Ariella. Although Bates completed her first semester, she encountered unbearable separation anxiety while away from her daughter. "It almost killed me to be away from her," said Bates, who recalls sobbing hysterically over the situation and feeling like a failure in the eyes of her teachers, family, classmates and herself.

"My daughter had colic, I had a heavy course load, and I was exhausted. It was suffocating. I felt as if I wasn't able to give 100% to my schoolwork or my daughter," Bates explained. "After someone reached out to me, I went to see a doctor. I was diagnosed with postpartum depression and anxiety. It's incredibly common, but people don't often speak out about mental health, especially postpartum." She soon reached out to the program's dean and was encouraged to take some time off, emphasizing her need to be healthy and happy above all else. That message hit home deeply for Bates.

"I felt so liberated and cared for," she said. "I don't know if Dr. Allen even remembers that conversation, but she changed my life that day."

Following the dean's advice, Bates returned to SJR State that summer. She remembers how faculty helped her get back on track with her classes, and while her prior challenges hadn't totally escaped her, her support system was far more powerful than her challenges. "I was encouraged and supported by my family, friends, fiancé, classmates, professors and the

entire education department," said Bates. "They are my most valuable part of SJR State. They are the reason I will be walking across that stage and into a classroom of my own."

Also among the graduates was Kimberly Stubbs. Fascinated by how and why mechanical systems worked during her childhood, Stubbs fondly recalls watching her father rebuild his 1965 Mustangs and loved helping him out whenever she could. This interest led her to major in materials engineering; however, she dropped out half way through her second semester. "There were many times over the past 25 years when I considered going back to college, but with young children and a husband in the Navy, attending classes didn't seem like an option for me," Stubbs said.

As Stubbs entered her 40s, her fascination for exploring how things work was still there. Now, at age 44, she is graduating with her Associate in Arts degree from SJR State and transferring to the University of Florida, where she will major in mechanical engineering in a combined bachelor's and master's program. "Upon graduation, I hope to work in robotics and the evergrowing field of autonomous systems," Stubbs said.

While Stubbs never lost her sense of wonder about how things work, she was afraid that she had lost her math skills. "I was concerned about returning to the classroom environment in my 40s, particularly after feeling as though I had lost the majority of my math skills over the years," she said, crediting her first class (pre-calculus) and her professor for giving her the confidence needed to move forward into physics, chemistry and calculus the following semesters. Stubbs eventually channeled her confidence and skills in math, chemistry and physics into tutoring other students in the College's Academic Support Center

Taxslayer Bowl: Georgia Tech beats Kentucky

Westry, Meyers, Brumbaugh return home for Taxslayer Bowl

JACKSONVILLE – University of Kentucky quarterback Stephen Johnson passed for 175 yards and a touchdown and rushed for a team-high 49 yards and another score, but the Kentucky football team came up short on Saturday, falling to Georgia Tech 33-18 in the TaxSlayer Bowl at EverBank Field.

Kentucky (7-6) was able to match Georgia Tech's potent offense, as the Yellow Jackets had 371 yards, while the Wildcats had 324. Tech's offense came largely on the ground, as the Yellow Jackets rushed for 266 yards, compared to Kentucky's 149. The Yellow Jackets passed for just 105 yards, while Kentucky threw for 175. Georgia Tech had 21 first downs, compared to 20 for Kentucky.

Defensively, linebackers Jordan Jones and Denzil Ware led Kentucky in tackles with nine apiece. Courtney Love had eight stops, while Josh Allen, Mike Edwards and Marcus McWilson each had seven.

Two area athletes and one coach; Oakleaf High graduatge Chris Westry, a sophomore defensive back for the Wildcats,

Miami Hurricanes win Russell Athletic Bowl

Quarterman, Owens get key tackles

ORLANDO – In dire need of some offense and with his team trailing West Virginia early in the Russell Athletic Bowl, University of Miami head coach Mark Richt called a simple hitch route to open the Hurricanes' seventh offensive series.

Freshman wide receiver Ahmmon Richards caught a pass and blew by four defenders for a 51-yard touchdown, jump-starting a dominant stretch by Russell Athletic Bowl MVP Brad Kaaya that propelled Miami to its first bowl win since 2006, 31-17 over West Virginia.

Two Oakleaf High graduates, both line-backers, Shaquille Quarterman, a freshman, and Darrion Owens, a sophomore, both excelled at their positions for the Hurricanes.

"I'm extremely proud to know that our preparations for this game; from practicing at home to practicing in Orlando, translated to playing in the game," said Quarterman, in a post-game interview. "Things like that people may not understand the difference, but it's very important."

Quarterman gave the Hurricane win, a first in nearly 10 years in post-season bowl action, a springboard for momentum for 2017.

"We have high aspirations as a young team that is growing up," said Quarterman, who was one of three freshman line-backers on the Hurricane starting defense; Micheal Pinkney and Zack McCloud being the other two with Owens a fourth line-backer. "I give my thanks to coach Manny Diaz who trusted us to put three freshmen out there. D.O. (Owens) does a great job too."

Owens, in on pass situations for the Hurricanes' defense, assisted in a key sack

near midfield on a fourth down and four situation for the Mountaineers that prevented a West Virginia field goal attempt. Miami had four sacks and one forced fumble

Quarterman finished with five total tackles with three solos and one tackle for loss. Owens finished with two assisted tackle and a half sack for minus seven yards.

After Kaaya hit Richards, 48,625 fans watched the junior complete 18 of his next 20 passes, a streak that included a Miami bowl record-tying four touchdown passes.

The Hurricanes (9-4) offense had strung together six straight three-andouts and totaled just 31 yards over their first six drives.

Kaaya started 5-for-13 for 29 yards.

"One play kind of sparked the team, offensively especially, and I think helped Brad," Hurricanes' head coach Mark Richt said. "He was just missing some targets. Balls that may have been catchable, but not the darts that I'm used to seeing him throw.

"After that, he took off."

The offense might never have had the chance if it wasn't for a stout performance from the Hurricanes defense that started on the Mountaineers' first drive and lasted the entire game.

"The game started out sorry. The defense was playing great and it started sorry offensively," Richt said. "The defense could have started pointing fingers and getting mad and all that kind of thing. We just don't do that here."

The Mountaineers fumbled on their opening drive, as junior Chad Thomas stripped Mountaineers quarterback Skyler Howard on a 3rd-and-5 rush and sopho-

Ridgeview High graduate Ramsey Meyers, a junior offensive guard for the Wildcats and Keystone Heights graduate Jimmy Brumbaugh, four years as a defensive line and strength coach, all had special intentions for the game.

Westry, the strong side defender for the Wildcat secondary, returned as a freshman All-Southeastern Conference selection last year, finished a quiet year at his position with opposing teams shying away from the 6-foot-5 defender with a near-12 foot wingspan from fingertip to fingertip.

"To be honest, I don't know why the numbers are down on my side, but I know I come to work everyday to get better," said Westry. "The biggest thing this year was to get in the weight room and get bigger. I had to be durable to face up with the bigger guys in our conference."

Westry met up with former Oakleaf coach Derek Chipoletti at a Wednesday practice at University of North Florida and got emotional about the role of his high school coaches and teammates for his Kentucky successes.

"Playing in my first college bowl game is special knowing where I came from to get here," said Westry. "It's good to be home. Everybody is coming to watch."

For Chipoletti, now doing financial advising in the Jacksonville area after leaving Oakleaf, seeing his former players on television in college bowl games at the SEC level is special.

"These guys are living out their childhood dreams on the big stage," said Chipoletti, who had Westry at Kentucky and two grads; Shaquille Quarterman and Darrion Owens, both linebackers at the University of Miami, Nelson Santiago, an offensive lineman at University of South Alabama, and Aaron Duckworth, a running back for the University of Idaho, all getting playing time in major college bowls recently. "The same thing I preached to them at Oakleaf; hard work, attention to detail and putting team ahead of self, is what they have used to be successful in life in general. Football is a small part of being a conduit to the real life successes. These guys just happen

to be talented enough to be able to play at this level."

Brumbaugh, who has a storied career as a former Keystone Heights High School and Auburn University standout and long-time college coach starting in 2004 and including stints at LSU (part of 2007 national title coach staff), Syracuse, Louisiana Tech and now Kentucky exuded his excitement with being able to return to the Jackson-ville area to perform in front of family and friends

"Any time you have the ability to play or coach back at home is nice," said Brumbaugh, who played in three bowl games while an All-SEC lineman Auburn, winning two. "This is only the second time I've been able to come back to the Jacksonville area for a bowl game. In the past, it was seven hours to Auburn, 13 hours to Louisiana, now my family only has to travel 35 minutes."

Brumbaugh's return as a coach is a little different than as a player.

"Every knows Jacksonville is home to a lot of great athletes," said Brumbaugh. "I spent two days in Keystone Heights this week, Christmas was at home and it was special. I'm a little bigger these days so I wasn't recognized on the street like before."

Brumbaugh noted that kids like him from small towns that have strong football $% \left\{ 1,2,\ldots,n\right\}$

programs are harder to get into college, but that the persistence on and off the field was what got him into big doors.

"They can't measure heart in a player from film," said Brumbaugh, who was coached at Keystone Heights by Wesley Dicks and Bob Wright with current coach Chuck Dickinson an assistant coach at the time. "In recruiting, you can see three and five star players in a flash, but things you can't coach are guys who fly around every play and play anywhere the team needs them"

Ridgeview High graduate Meyers, a starting guard for the past two years, has already indicated that he will not return to Wildcat football for his senior year in anticipation of other interests.

Against Georgia Tech, Kentucky got the ball first and the Wildcats moved the ball into Georgia Tech territory. But on a third-and-two from the Tech 49, Kentucky quarterback Stephen Johnson was stripped, and Tech's P.J. Davis scooped up the fumble and returned it 38 yards for a touchdown, giving the Yellow Jackets and early 7-0 lead.

After a Kentucky punt, Georgia Tech drove 75 yards in 12 plays, but the Kentucky defense held. Tech got a 23-yard field goal by Harrison Butker, giving the Yellow Jackets a 10-0 lead. That would be the score at the end of the first quarter.

On Kentucky's next drive, the Wildcats drove into the red zone, but the drive stalled, and Kentucky was forced into a 37-yard field goal by Austin MacGinnis which was good, cutting the Georgia Tech lead to 10-3.

The Wildcat defense then forced Georgia Tech into a three-and-out and a punt, giving Kentucky the ball at their own 28 yard line. From there, the Wildcats marched into Georgia Tech territory and when senior running back Jojo Kemp ran right for 25 yards, the Wildcats were in business at the Georgia Tech 14. But on a fourth-and-one from the Georgia Tech five yard line, Kemp was caught in the backfield and stopped short of the marker, giving the ball back to the Yellow Jackets.

Georgia Tech (9-4) took advantage, driving 94 yards in 11 plays and 4:29, ending with a 21-yard touchdown rush by Justin Thomas, giving the Yellow Jackets a 17-3 lead just before the half.

Kentucky seemed to have the last possession of the half, but on fourth-and-two, Grant McKinniss had his punt blocked, giving Tech one more possession and 24 seconds with which to work. As the half expired, Butker hit a 52-yard field goal to extend the Tech lead to 20-3 at the break.

On the first possession of the second half, Kentucky forced Georgia Tech into a three-and-out, then Nico Firios blocked Ryan Rodwell's punt, setting the Wildcats up at the Georgia Tech 43. But Kentucky couldn't take advantage of the good field position, and was forced into a punt of its own.

Neither team could get anything going until late in the third quarter, when Tech got good field position, beginning its drive inside Kentucky territory at the 45 yard line. But after driving inside the Kentucky 25, Tech was forced into another field goal from Butker, who connected from 44 yards to increase the Yellow Jackets' advantage to 23-3 with 2:15 left in the third period.

As the third quarter ended, Kentucky was mounting perhaps its best drive of the day. And early in the fourth quarter, Johnson hit Dorian Baker in the corner of the end zone for a 21-yard touchdown, cutting Tech's lead to 23-10 with 13:40 left in the game. Kentucky went 75 vards in 12 plays in 3:33 to score its first touchdown of the game. Tech responded with a 12-play, 68yard drive, covering 7:18 and ending with a 26-yard Butker field goal, extending the lead to 26-10. But Kentucky was not finished. The Wildcats drove 75 yards in nine plays, culminating in a 21-yard scoring scamper by Johnson. Kentucky converted on a two-point conversion when Johnson hit C.J. Conrad, cutting the lead to 26-18 with 3:57 left in the game.

The Wildcats needed a stop on Georgia Tech's next drive, but the Yellow Jackets drove for a touchdown by Dedrick Mills to seal the game.

Kentucky finishes the season at 7-6, marking the program's first winning season since 2009. Saturday's TaxSlayer Bowl was Kentucky's first bowl appearance since the 2010 BBVA Compass Bowl.

The onslaught started early in the first quarter when quarterback Jacob Mezera, an Orange Park High School graduate, found Layne Bieberle for a 55-yard touchdown at the 10:48 mark. About six and a half minutes later Shaquille Cooper's shiftiness and speed could not be harnessed as he broke free for a 65-yard touchdown run making it 14-0 in favor of FHSU through one quarter.

With a 15-of-26 passing effort, Mezera set a new FHSU single-season record for completion percentage at 63 percent. It passes the old mark of 61 percent set by Mike Garrison in 2009. Mezera's 2,541 passing yards for the season ranks sixth in FHSU history.

Fort Hays State finishes 8-4 for the second straight season, reaching the single-season school record for wins for an eighth time in program history. Head coach Chris

Brown moves to 38-30 over six seasons at FHSU, giving FHSU four consecutive winning seasons. That's the most in a row for the program's NCAA history and most since four straight from 1990-1993. Though they tied for fourth in the MIAA, the Tigers finished with the fourth-best overall record among MIAA teams alone after Washburn lost in the Mineral Water Bowl and Pittsburg State did not play a postseason game.

Eastern New Mexico picked up its only touchdown of the night at the 13:13 mark of the second quarter on a fourth down situation at the goal line.

Following the New Mexico score, lightning struck again for the Tigers when kick returner DeAndre James took the ensuing kickoff 88 yards to the house for his second-career return touchdown pushing the Tigers further ahead, 21-6. James finished with 119 kick return yards.

At the 5:28 mark, Mezera found Bieberle once again for a 12-yard touchdown pass to cap a 10-play, 70-yard drive that consumed 4:46, making the score 28-6.

Eastern New Mexico kicker Bailey Hale punched through a 32-yard field goal to pull the Greyhounds within 19 with 41 ticks left on the clock in the opening half, but FHSU was not done yet as Cooper turned on the jets down the left sideline on a 40-yard touchdown pass from Mezera. It

gave the Tigers a commanding 35-9 lead at the break.

Neither team scored in the third quarter and then Hale capped the scoring for ENMU early in the fourth with a 45-yard field goal. But the Tigers put points on the board twice more for good measure, a 24-yard touchdown run by Kenneth Iheme and a 26-yard field goal by Brandon Brown.

Penalties were crushing to Eastern New Mexico all night, which finished with a mind-blowing 21 for 226 yards, despite gaining 408 yards for the game.

Cooper showed why he is one of the most feared offensive threats in the MIAA by finishing with 146 rushing yards on 11 carries (averaging 13.3 yards per attempt) and 66 receiving yards on two catches (33 yards per catch) for a total of 212 all-purpose yards. For his efforts, he was named the Heart of Texas Bowl Most Valuable Player







"I think against the different styles of wrestling from around different parts of the country, my strength for my weight is the key to keep moving up in the brackets," said Davis, who was third at 195 in Class 3A last year. "I'm getting more comfortable with my weight at 182 or 184 because my strength is starting to come back. I think I'm as fit as ever and faster on my feet."

For the Golden Eagles team effort, a fourth place finish, the appearance of coach P.J. Cobbert's boys on the state stage has been a result of some inward resolve.

"We showed today that we can wrestle move for move with the best guys in the state...to a point," said a coy Cobbert about halfway through the quarterfinal matches that had seven Golden Eagle wrestlers. "We just have to get a little grittier in the tough moments of matches to swing the result toward us. We go toe-to-toe, but it's little things that make teams like Camden and South Dade repeat champions."

"That's why they call it the death round," said Cobbert. "You have to dig down deep somewhere and know you are going to face a pretty good wrestler from there on if you win. Some guys have the attitude to not let that get in their head, some don't. That's the difference to the gold medal any sport."

Cobbert's reference to Camden County. Ga, the twice Georgia state champions and South Dade, the three-time defending Florida 3A state champions (11 total titles back to 1995), was in part due to Camden County winning the overall team title with 259.5 points to South Dade's 227 points. Southwest Miami finished at 143.5 for third just 3.5 points up on Fleming Island's 143.0. In the next five, Winter Springs, the 3A runnerup to South Dade last year, took fifth at 122, with Flagler Palm Coast, another key district and region rival for Fleming Island, sixth at 115.5. Lake Gibson, St. Thomas Aquinas and Osceola finished out the top 10. Clay High School returning the Knockout lineup after a brief hiatus, took

"A pin here and there, a guy who maybe lost in quarterfinals that should have held on for another five seconds to win and we are right in the mix," said Cobbert. "Some of the best matchups we saw today will be for region titles in two months and possible state medals. That's how good the competition was here. We just got to get that grit to win."

Smenda would finish third at 197 with a 3-1 win over 1A fourth place finisher Cam Brown of Florida High School.

Getting fourth place finishes; Jackson, Detwiler and Concepcion allsurvived strong consolation matches to end up in the consolation finals. Demus and Mackey both finished sixth.

Jackson, who has progressed at rocket pace since his transfer from Middleburg High, lost to South Dade's unbeaten Bretli Reyna 12-3 in this semifinal and returned to finished fourth overall. Jackson eliminated Clay High's Lou Gagliardo in the quarterfinal matrch 7-3 with Gagliardo wrestling back to a fifth place finish.

"Briar has made the transition from Middleburg wrestling to ours," said Davis of his smaller teammate. "We wrestle tough for three periods and a possible fourth and he has taken up that extra conditioning necessary for that."

Demus, at 122, faced off a second time against Flagler Palm Coast's Michael DeAugustino, a key district and region rival that beat Demus at the Bill Scott Lyman Invite two weeks ago in that final. At Osceo-

la, Demus pinned Clay's Chris Merring, the 1A runnerup last year, before losing a 5-3 decision to DeAugustino.

"That's going to be his guy at the season's end," said Cobbert. "Deandre is tough in the third period and that's where he's scored. He's just got to control the first period scoring so he's not having to reach for points."

Detwiler lost 6-2 to South Dade's Todd Perry, who beat Detwiler in the quarterfinal 4-3. Detwiler got a second win over Winter Springs rival Dmitri Alicia, the 3A 138 runnerup last year, with a 4-3 win in the consolation semifinal to set up an interesting region scenario later in the season.

At 287, Concepcion, who lost a tough 3-1 semifinal match to defending 3A champion Kyron Taylor of South Dade, would lose in a 3-1 sudden death overtime match to Miami Southridge's Melchisedek Jeudy. Southridge was second to South Dade in 3A last year.

Mackey, down to 220 pounds after last year's venture as a small 285-pounder, pinned 3A-Freedom's Patchine Prophete in his second round match but lost an overtime 3-1 match to Sarasota's Austin Gould to head to the consolation rounds. Mackey would win three matches before facing Gould a second time only to lose a second time 3-1 for fourth place.

For Clay, Jackson's epic battle with South Dade's defending champion at 195, Chei Hill, seemed all to be a battle of two athletically strong wrestlers both strong up top.

Ironically, at the opening whistle, Hill struck first with a lightning-fast ankle pick that felled Jackson to his back where Hill launched himself in position for the 19 second pin.

For Clay coach Jim Reape, the return to the Osceola lineup was sort of a test of readiness for his Blue Devil team.

"We knew coming in that this was going to be one of the strongest fields we might face all year," said Reape. "Our guys got a good dose of 3A wrestling at its best and we will be able to assess the goods and bads from it for the rest of our season."

After Jackson's second place finish, Clay's lineup had Gagliardo at fifth in 108 and Kaleb Collins at sixth at 197.



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Briley nails fifth best triple in nation

OAKLEAF — Oakleaf High triple jumper Melvin Briley hit the sweet spot in a recent indoor track meet in Alabama and came

home with the fifth-best triple jump mark in American, according to coach John Carter and Track and Field News.



"He went better and better with each of his three jumps; 48 feet, 48 feet, then

49 feet, as his confidence im- proved," said Carter, a 45- plus year track coach in north Florida with recent stints at Gaines-ville Eastside and Oakleaf Junior High and Oak- leaf High School. "If we would have had a finals round, he may have broken 50 feet." Briley's jump, a 49-foot, 1-1/4 inch leap put him at the top five of the national 17-18 year olds list and previews the upcoming spring track season as one to watch. The national high school record stands at 54'- 10-1/4". The previous best in the USA of 2016, according to Track and Field News rankings, is a 51'-6" leap with a 49'-7" number two.

"We don't have the great facilities to coach and practice long or triple jump in Clay County so when we got to these meets, we have to make minor adjustments for his approach and takeoff points," said Carter. "He is such a great athlete and the triple jump is one of more technical events for track that little things add up to success." Briley finished seventh in last year's Region 1-4A meet with a 43'-10" triple


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

Six bowl-game records were set in the win and there were bowlrecord ties in four

other categories. And it well may have been the coldest game in the history of all college football bowl games with a chilly 22 degrees at kickoff falling to an icy 17 by the second quarter.

That, however, didn't slow the Vandals who put up some of their most impressive numbers in school history. Junior quarterback Matt Linehan led an offense that totaled 606 yards (381 passing and 225 rushing).

Oakleaf High running back Aaron Duck-

worth made quick work of his first carry of the fourth quarter; a 42 yard scramble to the Colorado State five vard line that preceded his five yard ice-slide into the end zone to put the score at 48-14 for Idaho. Duckworth finished with 57 yards on six carries with the lone touchdown.

Idaho, though scoreless in the first quarter, put up 20, 21 and 20 points in the final three periods for the win. Colorado State did score an amazing 36 fourth quarter points, but it was still not enough.

Ironically, the records they broke; the Potato Bowl records for total points in a game, total points in the second half and total points in the fourth quarter previously had been held by the 2009 Idaho team in its victory over Bowling Green State.

Their victory also makes them undefeated in bowl game appearances with the trophies from the 42-35 1998 victory over Southern Mississippi and the 43-42 decision over Bowling Green State in 2009 already in the showcase at the Kibbie Dome.

In earning the Most Valuable Player award, Linehan had the 16th best pass efficiency rating in school history at 213.56 and moved into first in the Sun Belt Conference in passing yards with 3,184 yards after posting his 13th game of 300 or more vards.
