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Rodeway Inn answers town lawsuit

ORANGE PARK – After 11 months of hearings and investigations into criminal activity dating back to a 2012 murder and at least two meth lab busts, the Town of Orange Park has formally asked a county judge to enforce the town's Nuisance Abatement Board's order to close the Rodeway Inn and Conference Center.

Town Attorney Sam Garrison said he

filed paperwork on Jan. 5. Meanwhile, this week, attorney Dan Copeland, who represents the motel's owner, is filing a response to the town's suit, as well as a countersuit alleging the board only has jurisdiction over criminal matters, not the fire and health code violations for which he said the board issued its order.

"We're filing an answer and countersuit with six defenses," Copeland said. "The





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County commission approves park leases

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Play ball!

That's the word from the Clay County commission who on Jan. 12 made resolving park leases for sports one of its main issues of the New Year so thousands of Clay County youth will be assured of uninterrupted play in 2016.

Commissioners voted 4-0, with Commissioner Wendell Davis absent, to approve a series of lease agreements with county athletic organizations that will allow them to continue using county parks and fields for their athletic endeavors. The groups range from those supporting soccer to baseball, softball, football and a range of other activities.

The leases generally go for \$1 a year, but include requirements of support from those leasing the venues in the form of mowing fields and providing other upkeep and support. The leases vary in length, generally from 10 years for those dealing with

revenues of more than \$50,000, to three years. Those with the higher revenues are required to provide more support and take care of more maintenance.

It's an issue that has captured the attention of parents, the youth of the county and supporters of young athletes throughout the county for the past several months. The park leases became a hot issue when it was discovered that some of those athletic organizations leasing the parks weren't in compliance with their lease obligations, and some had even lost their nonprofit, tax-exempt status with the Internal Revenue Service.

That discovery came after the commission instructed Mike Price, the county auditor, in August to conduct an audit report of all the 12 leases then in existence to make sure the associations holding the leases were in compliance with their respective lease obligations. In conducting the audit, Price discovered that the IRS had revoked four of the athletic associations' nonprofit,

tax-exempt status for failure to file their tax forms for three consecutive years. The IRS requires annual filing.

The tax-exempt status is important to the nonprofit associations because it allows them to rent fields to play on from the county at the low rates and without a competitive bid process. It also allows donors to deduct donations from their taxes each year, and certifies the nonprofit organization to be exempt from payment of Florida sales and uses taxes. Most important, Florida state statutes require the 501(c) (3) nonprofit status, and without it, leases with the county are considered void, Price has said.

Other problems with the then-existing leases were inconsistencies dealing with insurance and background checks for people working with the children.

In addition, the county missed many of the problems and went ahead and renewed leases, probably because staff dealing with such things had been greatly reduced over the past 10 years due to the recession and budget cutbacks, county officials said.

When the issues first came to light, representatives from organizations who had lost their tax-exempt status said they were essentially unaware of their status problems.

After months of discussing and dissecting the problems, the commissioners came to agreement Jan. 12 to provide some of the remaining organizations — of which some have disbanded or reorganized — with lease agreements and specific field assignments.

Those receiving 10-year leases, and the parks they were assigned include: Clay County Soccer Association at Eagle Harbor Soccer Park, Oakleaf Sports Association at Oakleaf Community Park, YMCA at Plantation Sports Complex and Fleming Island Athletic Association at Paul C. Armstrong Community Park.

first is that the board didn't have the authority and its action is invalid. The second is similar, but is an alternate pleading – they lack authority over health code and fire codes. They don't have the authority to shut my client down."

Copeland said his third point is that the board abused its power by exceeding its authority and by shifting its emphasis from criminal violations to the fire alarm system after Orange Park Deputy Fire Chief Alvin Barker testified to the violations he found upon inspection.

"My client was left with no negotiating ability to defend himself because you can't hit a moving target, Copeland said.

"This put him under duress, which is the fourth point, and the fifth is impossibility of performance. They required all of these signatures and it was impossible to get all of them because the health department isn't required to do what they demanded of my client. They don't have to issue a statement at any given time that there are no health violations at a given property and sign it."

Barker had inspected the motel and testified before the Nuisance Abatement Board in October. The board gave the Rodeway Inn's owner, Jitendra Patel, 30 days to put a plan together to bring the motel up to fire and safety code standards. He was

not expected to complete the work in 30 days, but to merely present a plan yet he hadn't done so when the board met again in November

At that time, the board gave Patel another deadline extension. He had another 30 days to submit a plan by Dec. 11 or the Rodeway Inn would be ordered to close when the board met on Dec. 14. Because a plan endorsed by Barker was not received by the end of the business day on Dec. 11, the board followed through with its promise when it met on Dec. 14 to follow up.

However, the plan Patel presented after the deadline was signed by Orange Park Police Chief Gary Goble. Copeland's sixth point of defense is that, having received Goble's signature and the Rodeway Inn having greatly diminished its criminal activity, the board had no basis to proceed to close the motel because criminal activity was the only thing it had authority to demand an action plan for.

Garrison argues that the board's order to close the Rodeway Inn isn't just about health and fire safety – he said it's about the big picture. Garrison said the motel is so run-down that it attracts criminals. Therefore, meeting the same health and fire safety standards every other public building is held to would merely elevate the motel and help it succeed.

"The board found that the criminal activity is the result of how they run their business. It's so run-down that it isn't safe

and those factors all play into it having been declared a public nuisance last February," Garrison said.

He said the Rodeway Inn's fire and safety violations are simply part of the underlying issues that create a magnet for criminals. Goble told the board in September that OPPD had received nearly 800 calls to the motel in the 12 months prior to the Nuisance Abatement Board meeting in March 2015. In the same September meeting, he told the board there had been about 350 calls to the motel during the six months between March 1, 2015 and that September night.

By the end of the series of board meetings from September to December, there had been a new alleged drug case. Also, Copeland notes that a married couple wanted on outstanding warrants in another state were apprehended at the Rodeway in late December, but management and security regularly call police when these things are discovered.

"They can't expect my client to ask everyone who checks in if they have any warrants out for their arrest," Copeland said.

He went on to say that, at some point, the allegations being thrown at his client outside of their context are without merit and are only being made because they sound as salacious as past allegations that did have merit in light of their context.

He also said the six points of defense he

is making are the basis for Patel's countersuit against the Town of Orange Park.

"In our complaint, we're basically turning those defenses into actionable claims in our counter petition," Copeland said.

In the meantime, he said Patel is working with an electrical contractor to improve wiring at the motel and is on-schedule to meet fire and safety code standards.

"We're continuing the process of upgrading the fire system to bring it up to code and the final completion will be by March 14. It's on schedule and we're in the process with the electrical contractor," Copeland said. "We are bringing the Rodeway Inn into compliance and, also, there are no outstanding health code violations."

There are as many as 100 people at the Rodeway Inn who call it home. The motel charges the cheapest rate in the area and gives a discount as it works with churches and other nonprofits who assist those who would otherwise be homeless. A coalition of such groups are working to connect with the Rodeway Inn's long-term guests, many of whom have been reluctant to ask for help getting out of the Rodeway Inn.

As of press time, Copeland hadn't filed his paperwork with the Clay County Circuit Court, but planned to do so during the second half of this week. Garrison said he and Copeland will work with the court to schedule a hearing for a time in which all parties can agree.

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Robotics growing to new heights in Clay schools

ORANGE PARK - Plugging the robot into a computer between rounds, Taylor Oberfoell tweaked the coding instructions slightly to increase the number of wheel rotations her team's robot needed to complete the mission of pushing the Lego octopus back into its circular habitat.

The octopus has to go straight into the circle," Oberfoell, 12, said. "If it's not in the circle, you don't get the points. Before, it was at 6.1 rotations and that's why it didn't go as far. I increased the rotations to 6.2 so it will go a little bit farther and actually make it inside the circle."

Oberfoell and her team from Tynes Elementary were one of 17 teams competing in the regional First Lego League robotics competition. The fourth annual local event held Jan. 8 at the Thrasher-Horne Conference Center was the largest to date and included teams from Clay, Nassau, Columbia and Duval counties.

After tweaking the code, or directions, and increasing the wheel rotations, the team earned additional points in round three, according to Oberfoell's teammate Kennedy Young, 11.

'Round three went a lot better," Young said. "We got the truck and everything we wanted so this round was much better."

Teams of 10 students prepared for as many as three months or as few as two weeks for this year's regional competition that blends science, technology, engineering and math, or STEM subjects. Students programmed code to weave their robots

through a predetermined obstacle course to earn up to 600 possible points. Most teams at the event scored around 300 points. Missions related to this year's overall theme of Trash Trek determined by the First Lego League, an international organization that encourages children to solve complex tasks with creativity and teamwork. Prior to the competition, each team received a map of the obstacle course and designed the missions accordingly.

"For the people mission, we have to drop the Lego people into the career station," said Kelly Brown, a fifth grader at Middleburg Elementary whose team named their robot Pirate. "For the truck mission, we have to push the truck and dump the contents. For the turtle mission, you have to take a plastic bag out of his habitat. For the composting mission, you're supposed to push a button and a composting hockey puck will come out and you have to drag it back to home base."

At the heart of the league are values such as inclusion, cooperation and profes-

sionalism. To verify that teammates treat each other respectfully and work together, judges in three separate categories asked students to talk about the coding and to run the robot through a couple of missions. Each team also played a game focused on communication and teamwork to see how well they interact. In the third judging room, teams presented a research project tackling this year's world problem of waste.

"It doesn't have to be a problem in Clay County," said Leslee Bryan, the regional leader of the robotics competition and a STEM curriculum specialist for the Clay County School District. "They could pick something from a third world country and they have to come up with a solution. If there is a solution in place they think they can [make] better, that's okay too."

For their research project, the team from Middleburg Elementary came up with the idea to replace their Styrofoam trays with biodegradable ones.

The Styrofoam trays will sit in the landfill for 500 years," said student Kaitlin Konnick. "We learned to work together to reduce the amount of waste to get it to where it's not as bad."

If a team has a robot or design capable of earning a high percentage of points or accomplishing a mission, all other teams

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The biggest story of 2015: cheap and effective gene-editing

If you pay attention to the news, you'd think Florida, the nation and the world are doomed.

South Florida is falling into the sea. Disney World is installing metal detectors to thwart terrorists. Jeb, the Donald, Ben and Marco – Florida's presidential wannabes – are predicting that Islamic extremists soon will destroy the West.

But cheer up. The big story of 2015 is Crispr/Cas9 and it's very good news.

For laymen like us, the scientists are calling this a "gene-editing tool."

With Crispr (clustered regularly interspaced short palindromic repeats), scientists have discov-

was expensive, slow and often ineffective.

Some predict that Crispr may transform food production, allow doctors to cure all kinds of diseases, bring woolly mammoths back from extinction and enable scientists to create designer babies.

"Crispr is causing a major upheaval in biomedical research. Unlike other geneediting methods, it is cheap, quick and easy to use, and it has swept through labs around the world," according to a June article in Nature.

Scientists hope that the technique "may one day help rewrite flawed genes in people, opening tremendous new possibilities for treating, even curing, diseases," according to a May article in The New York Times.


You know this science is a big deal because investors are plowing tens of millions of dollars into this research and there are legal battles over patents.

Two of the scientists credited with making significant contributions to the Crispr research were awarded \$3 million each in late 2014.

Just to stress how sexy all this has become, actress Cameron Diaz had her photo taken with the winners – Jennifer Doudna and Emmanuelle Charpentier — at the Breaktrough Prize ceremony. (Click on the Times link above to see the photo and a good graphic of how the technique works.)

Florida scientists are using the tool. At the University of South Florida Morsani College of Medicine, researchers are developing Crispr technology to correct genetic mutations in a gene called LRBA.

Patients with the mutation often develop autoimmune disorders such as type

Manatees' future far from certain

On Jan. 7, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service announced plans to downlist all West Indian manatees from endangered to threatened under the Endangered Species Act. Given the political inconveniences of manatee protection in the U.S., the move to downlist Florida manatees was expected. The decision to include the whole species is surprising, since there are about as many manatees in the entire rest of the range - Greater Antilles, Mexico, Central America, and South America – as there are in Florida, and "population trends are declining or unknown in 84 percent of the countries where manatees are found," according to the FWS.

The Service's announcement came at an interesting time in Florida. In December, Florida's human population surpassed 20 million, a seagrass die-off affecting 40,000 acres in Florida Bay made the news, and the National Marine Manufacturers Association reported that boat sales could increase 8 percent in 2016, reaching pre-recession levels. Red tide blooms on Florida's west coast began in the fall and claimed manatee lives in the final weeks of 2015 and continue in 2016. When guestioned whether the model used for the U.S. manatee population included record mortality events from 2010 and 2013, the Service indicated that analysis was incomplete but they were moving forward based on available information.

The Service's announcement that it believes the risks and threats to manatees are pretty well under control indicates that they're satisfied with the status quo that leaves manatees dying of boat strikes, poisoned by red tide exposure and facing loss of winter habitat. The 12-month finding states, "Within the southeastern United States, the potential loss of warm water at power plants and natural, warm-water

springs used by wintering manatees is identified as a significant threat."

The Core Biological Model, which weighed heavily in the decision-making, "predicts that it is unlikely (less than 2.5 percent chance) that the southeastern U.S. population will fall below 4,000 total individuals over the next 100 years, assuming current threats remain constant indefinitely." But we know that the threats won't remain constant, they'll increase as more than 60 percent of the manatee population is affected by the "pending" loss of artificial warm water. There are no plans yet developed to determine how to replace lost warm-water habitat, how to get manatees to transition to new sites, or how to minimize negative impacts to the manatee population in the process.

Recovery is about much more than just species abundance. While Service officials acknowledged that population numbers aren't always the best way to approach recovery, they seem comfortable in using them to justify downlisting. And what about the pent up coastal development that is about to burst with the recovering economy? The agencies are not prepared to prevent or offset these cumulative effects. In a 2010 Service report on warm-water habitat, the agency stated, "Implementation of management decisions is very much influenced by stakeholder values and public perception of manatee status and protection from threats." How will the Service garner the public and financial support needed to recover manatees if the public thinks the manatees' future is "rosy."

The Service says protections for manatees won't change with downlisting. That's not comforting since some big changes are needed to get the manatees' habitat secured for the future. Unfortunately, the

1 diabetes, inflammatory bowel diseases, lung diseases and rheumatoid arthritis. said Dr. Jia-Wang Wang, the USF researcher who is leading the research.

But even if you don't have a genetic disease or work in agribusiness, Crispr may soon enter your life. Do you want a perfect pet? Easy gene-editing may soon allow you to find the ideal genetically engineered pet. Chinese scientists have already produced special beagles and miniature pigs with the Crispr-Cas9 technology.

The next logical step - customized humans – has many scientists concerned.

They're worried that the tool could be used "to alter genes in human embryos, sperm or eggs in ways that can be passed from generation to generation," The New York Times reported. "The prospect raises fears of a dystopian future in which scientists create an elite population of designer babies with enhanced intelligence, beauty or other traits."

For now, reputable scientists seem to agree that it would be a good idea to temporarily halt research on genes that can be inherited.

"Some scientists want to see more studies that probe whether the technique generates stray and potentially risky genome edits," according to a June article in Nature. "Others worry that edited organisms could disrupt entire ecosystems."

You can't argue with that.

But sooner or later, rich people are going to want taller, smarter, stronger and better looking kids and there will be doctors - probably in China - who will be happy to take their money and produce superior offspring.

My hope is that the Crispr/Cas9 tool eventually will enable scientists to produce more compassionate, less violent humans. Those traits are embedded in our DNA somewhere.

We're going to have to depend on science because so far, religion, education and military force aren't producing a sane and peaceful planet.

agencies will be lucky if they can manage to hang on to existing protections in the years to come. The Tampa Tribune reported one manatee foe's beliefs: "there is no longer a need for widespread boating restrictions" or "sanctuaries in which vessels are prohibited..." Another group's website states that downlisting, "may also prevent additional unnecessary regulations and reduce the need for some existing ones..." The latest anti-manatee tactic is to paint them as destroyers of the environment, making statements including, "If we can't do anything to manage the size and location of the herd, we are doomed to sit back and hope the manatee does not over pressure the SAV (submerged aquatic vegetation)..." These same folks are trying to get legislation sponsored in Tallahassee that would destroy the Florida Manatee Sanctuary Act and are lobbying for rules to allow the legal take (read: killing) of mana-

One Service official at their press conference explained that if they didn't reclassify manatees to threatened, they would show no progress. That's really what this



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is about. The Endangered Species Act has enemies and if the agencies don't show movement, they come under fire. The agency's director is quoted as saying he sees a "giant clash" between those who favor conservation and those who favor economic development, and believes conservationists "must accept a world with fewer wolves, salmon, and spotted owls" and apparently manatees.

Save the Manatee Club has been working for almost 35 years towards a day when manatees can be downlisted and ultimately delisted from the Endangered Species Act, but the manatees' future is far from certain which means the work is far from over.

Dr. Tripp has been Save the Manatee Club's director of science and conservation since May 2008. She received her Ph.D. in Veterinary Medical Sciences from the University of Florida where she conducted research on manatee physi-


40 Years Ago, 1976

Schools prepping next generation of computer programmers

ORANGE PARK – Using only his computer, Agustin Allala's mission is to chop down three trees and build a house before sunset.


The 10-year-old student at W.E. Cherry Elementary is learning to code – or tell a computer what to do by typing step-by-step computer commands – during a weekly 30-minute computer science class period. Allala learned to build code through one of three computer games chosen by Allala's technology teacher through Code.org, an educational nonprofit that's on a mission to expand access to computer science to children around the world including girls.

Allala clicks on one of the coding choices prompting the character to move forward three spaces before turning left to

chop down one of three trees to fulfill the level's requirements before advancing.

To complete the mission requires students to write about 10 lines of code. The student builds the code before hitting the play button, prompting the character to act out the script or code.

"What is under these blocks of code is Javascript," Allala, 10, said. "You have to write 'move forward' then two parenthesis and a semicolon and that's what under the blocks so it's really interesting."

Javascript, a language used by computers, is often used to make webpages interactive.

To earn more computer time building code, Allala gets up early every Friday

morning for Code Club, hosted by Julie Smithers, the school's technology teacher. She teaches coding to the school's fourth, fifth and sixth grade students.

"A lot of this is trial and error," Smithers said. "A lot of it is logic skills and solving problems which, to me, is critical in education. And not to give up. They keep trying until they get it and that's when you hear cheering because they get so frustrated when they're first learning. Then they get it and they have the a-ha moment. It's very rewarding."

Like Allala, Code.org Founder Hadi Partovi was 10 when he learned to code living in war-torn Iran. His father brought home a blank computer and a book about coding and he and his twin brother taught themselves to write code and, after moving to America, he graduated from Harvard University with two degrees in computer science. He worked in the technology field before starting the nonprofit that has gained the attention of celebrities and President Barack Obama.

In Partovi's Technology, Entertainment, Design, or TED Talk, he said computers are changing the world and students need to learn algorithms and computer science in addition to dissecting frogs. Most schools do not teach computer science even though most companies will require computer programming in some form in the future. Through games and lessons on Code.org,

students learn logic skills and creative ways to solve problems.

"In this day and age, computer science is no longer just vocational for getting a job, in this day and age, computer science is completely foundational for any job you many want to have in the next 20- [or] 30-years," Partovi said in his Ted Talk. "So the real question is can the public school system evolve?"

The goal of Partovi's nonprofit is to focus on expanding access to computer science and increase participation of girls and minority students. On Smithers' wall hangs a Code.org poster of Malala Yousafzai, a Pakistani advocate for girls' education.

"Right now, women are so underrepresented in computer programing and I've got a feeling that if any of these girls in this

room loved the job, loved what they're doing, they could get a job like that," Smithers said and snapped her fingers.

Trinity Koonce, 10, built the code to move R2D2 through the levels of a Star Wars coding game. The goal of the computer game is to collect mouse droids and multiple them to total 20, earning a pass to move to the next level.

Even though Koonce said she is not completely sure she wants to be a computer programmer when she gets older, learning about coding has made her more curious about technology.

"Every time I see a game like this or a controller, it makes me think what kind of code made it happen?" Koonce said. "I play the Wii and I wonder how does it wirelessly connect to the TV?"

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, in the year 2020, there will be 4.6 million jobs in computing and information technology.

Business owner sworn in as council member

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A Green Cove Springs small business owner is the city's newest council member.

At its Jan. 12 meeting, Steven Kelley, owner of Spring Park Coffee at 328 Ferris St., was sworn in to replace former council member Ray Braly who announced Dec. 8 he would be resigning and moving to Pace, Fla. Council members officially accepted Braly's resignation at a brief special called meeting on Jan. 5 and backdated his resignation as accepted on Dec. 31. It was also at that meeting, where council members discussed bringing forward the names of potential council members who would replace Braly. Under state law, council had 14 days to appoint and seat a new council member after officially accepting the resignation or be subject to a gubernatorial appoint-

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

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Hotel transforming into assisted living facility

ORANGE PARK – After purchasing the Astoria Hotel on Park Avenue in 2012 and losing money on the project, Jacksonville doctor Saed Hussein is turning the property into something he knows – a health-care facility.

"Being in healthcare and having connections in Orange Park, he decided to turn it into an assisted living facility," said Rhonda Alnahdy, a nurse who is overseeing the conversion and will be the facility's administrator when completed.

The motel – originally built as a Holiday Inn – continues to operate, but some of the rooms are being converted, as is the conference center to make up the new facility. Alnahdy said the remodeling has to be finished before inspections can take place and those inspections are needed before she can apply for licensing with the Florida Agency for Health Care Administration. Pending the smooth process of paperwork and licensure, the facility is scheduled to open sometime in March.

"The health department and building inspector need to sign off on it and once

we complete that, we'll submit the application with FAHCA. Then, they'll come in and do their inspection and we'll go from there, she said.

"The inspections will make us or break us. This is an old building, so we're remodeling it to meet state and county codes for safety and for assisted living facilities. We have to meet the Aging and Disability Act with wheelchair and walker accessibility and there can't be any rust – there can't be any potential health hazards. Rooms have to be a certain size and we put up doors to the bathroom areas for privacy."

Alnahdy said rooms are 365-square-feet, which she said is larger than mandated by the state. They are all converted motel rooms with access from the outside on the ground level from the conference center. The rooms are a mix of single- and double-occupancy, she said.

The assisted living facility will be designed for low-income residents age 55 and older. Alnahdy said while the ALF will be set up to accept Medicaid and other assistance, the facility will offer resort-style amenities

A putting green will be installed between the rooms and the former swimming

pool, in the center of which a fountain has been installed. A library has been created with books donated from the Clay County Public Library and a home-theater style movie theatre has been created with about a dozen large reclining chairs.

One of the motel rooms has been converted to a hair salon and a satellite dining room near the rooms will accommodate residents who would prefer to eat there, rather than the main dining hall. The main dining hall is inside the former conference center and the satellite dining room was two motel rooms that have been remodeled.

A guard shack will be built at the entrance off Eldridge Avenue. Because the Rodeway Inn and Conference Center has been immersed in controversy and is in close proximity, Alnahdy said it's not only necessary to have security, but for the Astoria to do its part to change the culture in

the north U.S. Highway 17 area of Orange Park

"Bringing senior citizens into the area will change the culture of the building," she said.

She also said the Astoria Hotel has changed how it operates because of the Rodeway Inn and its troubles with criminal activity. No stranger to the crime spotlight, the Astoria was the scene of brutal 2014 murder in which Cmdr. Alphonso Mortimer Doss, 44, a career naval officer, was found dead in his room at the hotel Suites on Feb. 12, 2014. Alnahdy said the Astoria doesn't receive guests past 4 p.m. except for reservations made earlier and, in the long-run, the portion of the property that continues to operate as a motel may not last long.

"After we get the assisted living facility up and running, we'll re-evaluate the motel and see what we want to do," she said.

Queen and 21 other girls at S. Bryan Jennings Elementary School attend weekly meetings of the Jaguar Jewels, a group focusing on positive female relationships and empowerment.

The best thing I've learned truly is that it doesn't matter what your background is or where you come from or what you look like, you should be treated the same no matter what," Queen said. "When someone's treating you wrong because of your skin color or where you come from is not right. What I've learned here is that everybody should be treated the same." The club's founder, multi-grade teacher Christine Santa-Maria created what she calls the "boost board" to celebrate the girls' accomplishments.

"A lot of the girls can't go to gymnastics after school," Santa-Maria said. "Maybe you want to learn a new language or do something special. It doesn't have to be this major, huge accomplishment but it might be something new to you. We do AB honor roll to celebrate the academic goals. It's being in chorus or field hockey, but it brings out a lot of things they're good at. And they get to take the stickies with them at the end of the year to remind them about what they've done."

The Jaguar Jewels, named for the school's jaguar mascot, focuses on leadership, education, goal setting, empathy and relationship building for sixth grade girls. At the Jan. 7 after-school meeting, the girls recited the Jaguar Jewels' motto in unison, promising to celebrate differences, volunteer and continue their education. Girls entering the program at the beginning of the school year are required to sign

"Looking around this classroom, we have the greatest group of gals from all different backgrounds, all different interests," Santa-Maria said. "If we were all the same it'd be super boring."

Santa-Maria started the club last year after seeing at-risk girls struggle to balance school and home life. This year, she opened it up to any sixth grade girl who wanted to join.

"I saw girls struggling with a lot of problems and emotional things, she said. "I was feeling like there needs to be a little extra something to give them more support so they feel like they belong. Even in a small school, some of the girls felt lost."

Before joining the club, Alana Bonilla-Lopez, 11, felt the insecurities most kids endure.

"I used to be shy and did not talk a lot but this group helped me visualize that I have friends that are always going to be there," Bonilla-Lopez said. "They're helping us to ignore the haters."

The girls keep notebooks with goals, inspirational songs, healthy snack ideas, articles about inspirational girls such as Pakistani activist Malala Yousafzai, and ideas on how to help others, which is something the club's co-leader Ilona Hagen said was difficult for tweens to learn.

"Especially going into junior high, it's such a difficult age," Hagen said. "There's so much going on. They either tend to be all-about-me or they don't think about themselves at all and clam up. We're trying to let them know what's out there and what's available and how they can be a help to others.

To serve others, the club recently collected old and unused purses and filled them with toiletries and snacks to deliver to homeless women.

We thought it would be special that we got all these purses we didn't use or need anymore and we packed them with snacks like granola bars and fruit rolls and put in some toiletries like deodorant, shampoo and conditioner so they could freshen up," said Aliya Sherali, 12.

On the school campus at 215 Corona Dr., the club decorated posters using uplifting phrases and hung them in the girls'

The trainees completed an intensive,

eight-week program that included train-

ing in military discipline and studies, Air

Force core values, physical fitness, and

restroom, taking pride in the shared space.

"We put some air fresheners on the walls and we decorated around the border of the mirrors because they were rusty and old." Oueen said. "It was important. We need to know that someone is always looking out or caring for us."

Lessons on empathy led by Santa-Maria and Hagen helped Ta'Niya Townsend, 12, change her attitude about interacting with other girls.

"I used to be rude to people and after I came to Jewels, I started thinking, 'oh, they have feelings too,' so I shouldn't do that because I don't want anyone to do that to me."

Queen sees the club as more than a routine school activity. To her, the club is like a family, but more willing to listen and share her concerns.

"For other girls in this club, it might be different because they might treat girls like they treat their younger brother or sister, but this is like a family where we can express our feelings and actually get to communicate and talk." Oueen said. "They have different interests and backgrounds that you should respect. You shouldn't be afraid to accept yourself no matter what your weight is or your skin color or how tall or short you are."

In the coming months, the Jewels will be recruiting "gems" or up-and-coming fifth grade girls to join the club next year.

"It's another generation of inspirational girls, just like when you have generations of family," Queen said.



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Stride into the new you

etting started on something new requires self-motivation and extra energy. It's not easy staring out new. Most organizations have a new employee orientation, or an on-boarding process to train employees faster into their culture and routines. And so the same is true for fitness. New fitness goals, new activities, joining a fitness group or class, all have that same similar feeling and upstart

For me, it was joining a local running club (and even those gym fitness classes). Every Sunday or Thursday I would see a group of runners on Blanding Boulevard or U.S. 17 in Orange Park. I knew it was the Florida Striders from the yellow tent set-up. Eventually, I worked up the nerve to join last year and overcome some of these feelings of "newness." This month I had the privilege to meet and speak with Florida Strider's Vice President, Michelle McCollough. She's an active runner of 10 years, and a member of the run group for three years.

1) I remember a friend asking me to join the run club back in the early 2000s, but I was hesitant. I finally joined in 2014. What is Florida Striders all about?

of physical fitness and sports, as well as support Children's Run/Walk Programs in more than 60 elementary schools throughout Jacksonville. It doesn't matter if you're a shy beginner or a competitive guru, we welcome all levels.

2) What are some of the benefits of joining a run club like Florida Striders?

In addition to the great company and fellowship provided by run clubs, the Striders also have weekly training runs in different parts of town and times of day. are encouraged to inquire about the coding or design.

"If they go to the other team and say how did you do this, then that team is supposed to take it upon themselves to show the design and explain the programming behind it," Bryan said. "Even though they're sharing it, they know our playbook, they'll be as good as us, the idea is they're building yours and catching up to you. Your team should still be progressing. Sharing information is elevating everybody but you should continue to get better yourself."

Even though teams hier two coaches, another goal of the competition is to show students that adults are lifelong learners.

"Teachers do not have the answers," Bryan said. "We all learn together. It's important to us as educators because most of our educators are not robotics people. The other thing is that even adults can learn and every person in society should be learning. A lot of times our students don't see adults as learners."

Middleburg Elementary fourth grade teacher and robotics coach Jenny Karably said her role in the club is more of a guide and she is still learning.

"It's their programming so they have to figure it out," she said. "We're not even allowed to go into the judging rooms. We just guide them but they're doing fabulous for their first year."

Preparing for the competition helped Young from Tynes build professionalism, communication skills and self-confidence, things she said translated to her other classes. "I was nervous to go up there but then I started to feel confident in myself and I gave it my all and tried my best," Young said.

Young and Oberfoell earned spots on the Tynes robotic team simply by the luck of the draw. Some schools had as many as 40 applicants to join the school's club and were required to write essays in addition to submitting an application.

"I feel really special that I actually get to be in robotics because they just do a hat drawing," Oberfoell said. "If you put this in front of me two years ago, I would never had realized what this was or how to make it work"





St. Vincent's Formation program nurtures leadership and spirituality

MIDDLEBURG — A Clay County hospital program gives every employee, from maintenance workers to executives, a chance to pause and remember they are not human beings on a spiritual journey, but spiritual beings learning to be fully human.

St. Vincent's Medical Center Clay County employees go through a program

called Formation, which focuses on workplace spirituality and leadership formation. The program's goal is to improve each employees' life in tandem with offering patients more well-rounded health-

"As people, we all have three callings from God and the first is to be fully human. How do we fully realize who God has called us to be? The second is vocation; what has God called us to do – as individuals and as a community? The third is the calling to ministry – to serve the needs of others. Formation looks at all those things and helps us fully live out who we are as human beings in our work," said Tracie Cox Loftis, chief mission integration offi-

cer for the hospital.

The program begins with training received by top brass and junior executives, who pass it on to associates in workshops or seminar style monthly meetings. Along with St. Vincent's campuses in Riverside and the Southside area of Jacksonville, the Clay County campus is led by Blain Claypool, president of acute care. He said he takes master's level theology courses online as a student of the Aquinas Institute of Theology, a Catholic seminary in St. Louis. He said the coursework has enriched him, not only as a Catholic, but as a healthcare executive.

"My whole career, I've trained to be a

healthcare executive and have worked for public and community-based not-for-profits, but this is the first faith-based hospital I've worked for and it has changed me," Claypool said. "The Formation program has affected my relationships with my family and friends, how I present myself and open myself to them and, as a leader, it has given me the strength to pause."

Claypool said the healthcare industry changes quickly and works at a continuously rapid pace. He said he has been trained to work like a fighter pilot who is responsible to make split-second decisions. Employees are trained to make de-

New program aims to break cycle of poverty

ORANGE PARK – The cycle is one many teenagers know – it takes a job to get money and it takes money to get a car, but it takes a car to get to a job unless mom or dad play taxi or buy the teen a car.

A nonprofit organization is launching a program on Jan. 18 to assist Clay County residents living on the edge of poverty and struggle purchase less-expensive used cars as a help to pull themselves out of poverty and get to work.

Spearheaded by Rev. Bill Randall, Rides for Work is a new program of Miller Street Renewal, a nonprofit organization he started a few years ago to renew the Orange Park area around St. Simon Missionary Baptist Church at 1331 Miller St.

"The first thing we're going to do is convince corporations, individuals and government to donate used cars for low-income working-poor people to assist them in getting out of poverty, he said.

"Then, Rides for Work will resell the cars to the individuals at a cost below wholesale

Woman makes Catholic pilgrimage

LAKE ASBURY – In September, Margo Hay flew to Europe for a two-month-long 500 mile hike from the French border to the northwest corner of Spain. Hay, who is Catholic, said she went on the pilgrimage simply because she felt it was her duty.

For five years, the 71-year-old said God "nudged her" about the El Camino pilgrimage, which was made popular in the 2010 film "The Way" starring Martin Sheen. The final nudge came when she went to her mailbox last year on Sept. 9.

"Amongst the junk mail was my monthly copy of Catholic Extension magazine. On the front cover was the title of an article inside the magazine called 'The priest who walked 500 miles.' My mouth gaped open and I thought 'no way,'" she said.

"I opened the magazine and it was the story of a priest who walked the El Camino a few years prior to raise funds for yet another ministry. That was the moment I suddenly recognized all the nudges God had been giving me over the previous five years. That was also the moment that I lifted up my hands in surrender to the heavens and said 'OK, God, if this is what you want me to do, I'll do it."

El Camino, which means "the way" is short for the way of St. James, a pilgrimage of physical endurance that ends at the cathedral in Santiago de Compostela, where the remains of St. James the Apostle are said to be buried. Hay had planned on walking the entire way, but her hip had other ideas.

"I was brought to a grinding halt. On foot, I only completed about a third – around 180 miles. I could have come home, I guess, but it never crossed my mind. I made it to Leon and was having so much pain in my hip that I went to the hospital. They took X-rays and when the doctor looked at them he said 'stop walking now.' He didn't mean I couldn't walk to the bus stop, but I couldn't continue the El Camino," Hay said.

She prepared for a year by walking and by eating differently. She lost some weight and had her first hip replacement in 2014. The implanted hip did fine over the course of nearly 200 miles of walking, but the other one was bone-on-bone, causing her to stop. Reflecting on her journey, Hay said she never considered giving up.

"I had started at Pamplona and I knew I had to get to Santiago de Compostela. I could have come home, I guess, but it never entered my mind. When the doctor told me I had to stop, I went back to my hotel and had a five-minute hissy fit, then asked 'what's next,'" she said.

When the doctor told her to quit walking, she was discouraged, at first.

"From my hotel room in Leon, I got my maps and guides out and figured out how to get to Santiago de Comostela. I completed the remainder of the pilgrimage by bus,

train, taxi when there was no other public transportation, and got lifts a couple of times from different people, she said.

"From then on, the focus became the churches in the various towns I visited. I lit candles and prayed for people and I prayed for world peace. There were some remnants of disappointment because I had worked hard for this. For a year, I walked anywhere from three to nine miles a day. I read books from people who did the pilgrimage, but nothing prepares you for it."

Hay said the long hike across northern Spain is physically and mentally challenging. She said she had to watch every step – only getting a chance to take in the scenery if she stopped walking and looked up to enjoy it.

"On the first day of walking, I fell climbing a hill called the Mountain of Pardons.

It's pretty steep and when you get to the top, there are gigantic metal silhouettes of pilgrims there," she said. "You stop and take your shoes off to give your feet some air, take a breather, cross a road and start down the other side. It's a 40-degree decline and it was like a dried-out old river bed that you might see in old westerns."

Hay is now preparing for her second hip replacement surgery. She wonders if the pilgrimage prepared her for the complications she's had with her hip, though she didn't make the hike for any specific reason

"I wasn't seeking God and I didn't go with a specific goal other than to find out if there was anything more God wanted of me in this life and, if there was any other goal, it was to simply get through it," she said.

-cisions simply out of habits – emotional habits, set ways of thinking and other components of daily life that should be reexamined from time to time.

"Formation has given me an ability to say 'stop. Get off the treadmill and pause.' Then, we can take that to the associates and say 'stop. I hear you; let me listen," he said. "Then, we can think through why we make the decisions we make as a team, who benefits and who we reflect upon in making those decisions."

Cox Loftis said the program is sensitive to the wide range of backgrounds employees come from, but is firmly rooted in the organization's Catholic identity.

"Formation nourishes the inner life and is rooted in theological and spiritual teaching, but not everyone who receives Formation is Catholic. Many times, Formation begins with opening our eyes differently to

our experiences to see what God is doing, she said.

"This deepens our relationship with ourselves, as well as others and as we live it out, it transforms our work and our ability to live out our identity as a ministry of the Catholic Church."

For Claypool, applying faith formation

to his work has taught him what he describes as servant-based leadership skills that have moved him toward the approach of total quality management and away from scientific management, where leaders lord their authority over others and treat them as subjects.

"As a leader, Formation has brought me to a place where I'm comfortable with who I am — my strengths and weaknesses and my ability to share them — to be vulnerable with my team so they know it's okay for them to do the same," Claypool said.

Building such a community within the hospital's walls allows St. Vincent's leaders to convey the organization's faith-based mission to its employees, who then live it in front of patients and their families.

"We aren't just a hospital treating illnesses — we treat the whole person because we lead with our faith and our faith compels us to deliver healthcare. We aren't just an acute care hospital, we truly are a ministry," he said.

and help them get financing for the maintenance and warranty. The payments will never be more than \$100 per month and will be financed by VyStar Credit Union."

VyStar wouldn't confirm details, which Communications and Public Relations Manager Sandy Baker, said are being worked out with Randall. She said the credit union will make a public announcement when details are finalized.

Randall has connected with regional car dealerships and said getting vehicles won't be a problem. Rides for Work will not purchase inventory that will sit on its lot waiting for drivers to take them home, but the program is looking to collect a few cars at its 1145-8 Miller St. lot.

Rides for Work participants will have to purchase their car insurance and pay for tag and title fees. Randall said the program is far from a hand out and will serve only those who have a job. VyStar will process participant loan applications, while Randall will fundraise to guarantee the loans.

"This is about getting people out of poverty by helping them get transportation to work and building their credit. Rides for Work is not for people on welfare sitting at home or for drug pushers – they have to have a legitimate job. If they've only been on the job for a week, that's okay but they need to be taking positive steps that make a difference," Randall said.

If a client is a young person who has never learned to drive, the program Work will teach them how to drive. Randall said the program will also teach participants the importance of car maintenance and oil changes and tire rotations are important. Rides for Work will also teach basic financial management to help clients set budgets and make payments on time, so they increase their credit scores.

"We're talking about low-income people who've most likely not had a car in the past or had one and abused it, so they need to be taught – that's why it's so important for us to do this," Randall said.

There is no income eligibility requirement with Rides for Work because Randall understands those who've never been told to pick themselves up by their bootstraps can also have financial footing ripped out from beneath them by a job loss, divorce or other circumstances.

"Someone making \$30,000, \$40,000 or \$50,000 per year could have fallen on hard times. Their car may have been repossessed and they're having to start over. We want to help those people because there's a need there," he said.

Randall said the program will be staffed in a way that helps give those with time on their hands a way to use it for the common good.

"Rides for Work will be managed by seniors – all seniors – through AARP and the Experience Works program. We're not hiring anyone from the outside and these are all seniors who will work no more than 20

hours per week, Randall said.

"I call them volunteers, but they're in training through AARP and they provide them a stipend. That way, as a nonprofit, I don't need employees."

Randall is also planning to turn an adjacent lot into a salvage business that will provide a few jobs. He said he has to apply for the appropriate licensing with the state, but would like the salvage yard to provide cars from which parts can be used to repair vehicles for Rides for Work.

Randall already has the license for Rides to Work. He is launching the program in conjunction with the Jan. 18 MLK Day celebration at Shiloh Church, south of Orange Park. The 8 a.m. program will include a 10 a.m. food distribution for needy families and Everest University Campus President Jeff Sherman will issue five \$5,000 scholarships as part of the college's American Dream Scholarship Program. Sherman said three of the five recipients live in Clay County.

races: River Road Resolution, Run to the Sun, Memorial Day, and Hog Jog Cross-Country. Monthly, we provide the "StrideRight" newsletter, and host several run clinics, coaching advice and social events including great speakers, such as Donna Hicken, Hal Higdon, Todd Williams and Jay Birmingham to name a few, at no charge.

3) What about those new to running. How can your running club help?

We have many members with competitive coaching experience and we all started somewhere, so if you are thinking about joining and need a little convincing, the Striders are a great place to get involved. We hold two 8-week adult running classes each year, one in the spring and one in the fall. Both classes lead up to one of our 5K events and we have coaching groups for all levels from "Walking" to "Advanced."

4) In March, Jacksonville will host the largest 15k in the U.S. once again. How are the Striders involved with the Gate River Run?

The Striders have been a mainstay at the Gate River Run for many years. Since 1992, we have hosted a private hospitality tent for Striders members at the annual race. We provide a place to stow your belongings during the race, as well as

Three year leases went to Keystone Recreation Association at Little Rain Park, Keystone Youth Soccer Club at Twin Lakes Soccer Park and Tanglewood Athletic Association at Tanglewood Community Park, Police Activity League at Walter Odum Community Park and Green Cove Baseball/Softball Association at Carl Pugh Community Park.

The Middleburg Athletic Association has received much attention over the parks situation. Theresa Simmons, who has headed up the organization, now called the Middleburg Association of Athletes, has appeared frequently before the commissioners to try to keep the young people in the MAA able to play ball without missing a step. Part of the problem with that group was that they thought they were listed in a subordinate status through its football program with another tax-exempt nonprofit, the Mills Association of Plainfield, Ill. But the Mills group lost its IRS status in April 2014, leaving Middleburg without status as well, although it did not know it until recently, Simmons has said.

Simmons appeared before the commissioners Jan. 12 and said her group has partnered with Oakleaf Sports Association until Middleburg receives its own proper status, allowing the young

people of Middleburg to continue with their athletic programs.

"We have developed a fantastic partnership and after this is over with we will continue that partnership and we will do great things for Clay County," Simmons said

The commission assigned Oakleaf Sports Association/Middleburg Association of Athletes a one-year lease at Omega Park.

"As painful as this was, and I don't think any of us didn't go without angst on that, I can see some real leadership and that our county stepped up and some collaboration is starting and I've been inspired by the way that the organizations have come to each other to help out," said Commission Chairwoman Diane Hutchings.

Commissioners also voted 4-0 to hire a staff member to help ensure the parks stay compliant.

"At the last meeting I think I was more than clear that we are not getting the job done today," said County Manager Stephanie Kopelousos.

Kopelousos said Price had actually recommended hiring four more employees, but it could be done by one staffer.

Commissioner Wayne Bolla asked how much the staff member would be paid, eventually arriving at the figure of \$35,000 without benefits and between \$50,000 and \$60,000 with benefits. Bolla said he would like to see the new staffer better promote the county fairgrounds.

 ${\tt FLEMING\ ISLAND-Nets\ stretched\ across}$ the Barco-Newton YMCA gym. Fletcher Turner, 70, grabbed his paddle and headed to the blue-lined court with his partner. He stepped behind the baseline, stretched his paddle out behind him with one hand and held out a plastic, whiffle-type ball with the other. He dropped the ball and swung, sailing it diagonally across the net into his opponent's service box.

And after a few more serves and volleys, Turner and his partner won their game of pickleball.

"Well my wife is the athlete," he joked on the sideline, "but I've been playing over a year now. It's high energy, but it's low impact and there's no age limit."

Pickleball has been described as one of the fastest-growing sports in the U.S., with leagues popping up and tournaments being played more all over the country.



"Anyone who plays falls in love with it right away," said Edith Hardee, 71, another pickleball devotee.

Former Congressman Joel Pritchard and his friend Bill Bell created the game for their families one afternoon in 1965 on the Pritchards' badminton court. They didn't have badminton racquets or a birdie. so they made do with pingpong paddles and a plastic, perforated ball.

Now, it is one of the most rapidly-growing sports in the United States with more than 2,000 places to play - double the amount of places just five years ago.

A few of those locations are here in Clay County, including the Barco-Newton YMCA. In the fall of 2014, Sports Director

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Former McAlister's Deli owner owes \$50,000 in state sales taxes

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - A Missouri man turned himself in to the Clay County Sheriff's Office headquarters on charges

of failing to pay \$50,601.85 in sales tax for his failed Fleming Island busi-

Shortly after his Jan. 12 arrest on one count of failure to remit state sales tax, Bruce D. Swisshelm. 69. of Battlefield, Mo., bonded out of the Clay Coun-

ty Jail by posting a \$25,003 bond. He was arrested using a warrant signed by Fourth Circuit Court Judge John H. Skinner.

Between May 2010 and October 2011,

Swisshelm "did with intent to unlawfully deprive or defraud the state of its moneys or the use of benefit thereof, fail to remit taxes collected," according to the judge's information document charging him with the second degree felony. His charges stem from former ownership of the Fleming Island McAlister's Deli on County Road 220. The restaurant – and several other fast food franchises he and his company owned in Missouri - was closed after Swisshelm filed for bankruptcy in 2012.

In July 2015, in a separate case of fraud allegations, Swisshelm, who was 68 at the time, and his son, Bruce Swisshelm II, then 43, pleaded guilty in separate appearances before U.S. Magistrate Judege David P. Rush, according to a Federal Bureau of Investigation press release from 2015.

"Swisshelm pleaded guilty to bank fraud and money laundering," states the release.

Swisshelm was the owner of Horned Frog Deli Inc. and Swisshelm Properties Inc. The two corporations "owned and developed commercial properties in Springfield and elsewhere," the FBI document states. Under the corporate umbrella, Swisshelm owned and operated Burger King restaurants, Macaroni Grill restaurants. San Francisco Oven and the Fleming Island location of McAlister's Deli.

McAllister's Deli on Fleming Island was located at 1615 County Road 220, just behind O'Charley's restaurant on the west end of a strip mall. It closed abruptly in the fall of 2011 along with two other branches in Jacksonville, including one location on Beach Boulevard and the third location on Deer Lake Court in the Tinseltown area.

According to documents, Swisshelm submitted false financial documents to Great Southern Bank to receive more than \$5.5 million in loans in 2011. According to

the FBI, "Swisshelm submitted financial statements to the bank that claimed his businesses earned a net income of more than \$780,000 in 2010," but Swisshelm's tax documents stated those business "had losses that exceeded \$1.8 million in 2010," according to the FBI.

Federal law states that Swisshelm may be sentenced to up to 40 years in federal prison without parole and a fine of up to \$1.2 million and an order of restitution. Swisshelm's son was aware of his father's fraud and, because he failed to contact authorities, may be sentenced for up to three years in federal prison without parole, plus a fine of up to \$250,000.

Under the terms of the 2015 plea agreement, Swisshelm must forfeit to the government \$5,592,583, which constitutes the proceeds obtained from his criminal activity, states the FBI press release.

Couple escapes evening fire

Clay woman charged with striking cop

ORANGE PARK - The Clay County Sheriff's Office arrested and charged a Clay County woman on Jan. 8 with battery on a person age 65 or older after a three-day drinking binge.

Penny Williamson Cunningham, 50, had been depressed due to her husband leaving her in the past and began drinking three

days prior to the victim's call to authorities. According to the police report from the Clay County Sheriff's Office, Cunningham was sitting in the victim's home "speaking with foul language" when the 71-year-old victim $told \ \ her \ \ to \ \ leave. \ \ \mbox{Penny Cunningham}$



When Cunningham refused, the victim picked up the phone to call a friend to pick up Cunningham. Cunningham "became upset and grabbed [the

victim's] face with her hand causing her fingernails to dig into her face," the report stated. Officials allegedly observed redness around the victim's eves who also said

Cunningham was allegedly found lying on the floor wearing only a nightgown and refused to put on clothes. She was too intoxicated to support herself and her speech was slurred and inaudible. She was transported to Orange Park Medical Center for medical clearance but received another felony charge when she allegedly committed battery against a nurse working in the emergency room while intoxicated. Cunningham pulled off some leads and when the nurse tried to put them back on, Cunningham allegedly grabbed the nurse by the shirt. Seeing Cunningham grab the nurse by the shirt, an officer held down Cunningham's arm, "at which time she kicked [the nurse] in the head with her foot. She was then fully restrained to the bed," the report stated.

Once cleared for transport, Cunningham was transported to the Clay County Jail where her bond was set at \$50.006.

Baseball attack ends in arrest

OAKLEAF - An Orange Park man received a felony assault charge after he allegedly tried to hit another man with a baseball bat.



Qualifying – the period in which candidates declare they are running for an elected of-fice – for this year's city council election runs from Feb. 1-5 with election day being April 12. Council Member Mitch Timberlake, who offered Kelley's nomination, described Kelley as a long-term resident of the city who would be an asset to the council.

"I think most of the council members know him," Timberlake said. "I think he'll be a really strong addition to the council and bring another set of ideas that will benefit the city of Green Cove [Springs].

After an almost 20-minute discussion on the issue, council members voted 3-1 to appoint Kelley with Council Member Felecia Hampshire casting a no vote. However, Hampshire said her vote was not personal. Hampshire kicked off the discussion by offering the nomination of Constance Butler, a licensed practical nurse at the Clay County Health Department and city resident, as Braly's replacement. She cited Butler's community involvement in the arts, women's organization and her church to characterize Butler's local involvement.

Hampshire read a prepared statement from Butler citing her desire to serve on council: "Her interests — 'to see that our community remains a family atmosphere, to see that the Augusta Savage Arts and Community Center become whole once again with functional activities within the city and correlate a plan to involve more people to be concerned about our city, strengthen and support our local businesses,' and those were just a few things," Hampshire said.

Hampshire said Butler may also be interested in running for the council seat.

Meanwhile, Council Member Pam Lewis nominated Magnolia West resident Pasquale Wojciechowski whom she described as "nice, honest and enthusiastic."

"I think we have three very fine, honest candidates," Lewis said. "I think that's a compliment.

It shows there are people who'd really like to bring our city forward."

Part of the council discussion involved when to officially seat Kelley, so they voted to swear him in as the last item of business before adjourning. In accepting the appointment, Kelley said he was honored and thankful to be considered.

"I do appreciate you guys — ever since we started to put businesses here and I brought the kids and everybody down here, it's been my goal to wind up here eventually and I feel like now's finally the time and I've been considering this for quite some time and I planned on running anyhow in the spring, so this kind of gives me a pretty

good opportunity to get in and get my feet wet and hopefully contribute," Kelley said.

A three year member and current chairman of the city's Planning and Zoning Board, Kelley also announced for the record his resignation from that position as he accepted the nomination. Council will elect a vice mayor from among the council at its Jan. 26 meeting.

In other business:

Council appointed a Citizens Advisory Task Force to serve and provide input as part of the city's application process for a Community Development Block Grant. Under federal guidelines, the task force must be comprised of city residents who meet certain income levels described as low-to-moderate to be considered. Council appointed Martha Sims, John Reese, Lloyd Haight, Jennifer Baily and Lori Witham to the task force.

Megan Casson oversaw the sport's humble beginnings. She said it caught on first with the seniors because it is low-impact but still action-packed and interactive.

"It really exploded down in The Villages. It got popular at the Ponte Vedra YMCA, and then a little later two guys put a net up in the gym here and started playing. Ever since then it's caught on, now we have as many as three courts set up during the week," she said.

Barbara Martin, Barco-Newton mem-

ber experience maker, helped get the program started. She said she's seen an awesome response from members and the Clay area in general.

"It's a really welcoming and friendly environment, people want to learn how to play and everyone wants to help you learn," Martin said.

The overwhelming spike in popularity has Clay County Parks & Recreation Manager Jeff Boyer trying to add to the five parks that already have pickleball courts.

"All future renovations and repainting projects for tennis courts will include pick-leball lines," he said.

So how is it played? It is a cross between tennis with a half-size court and badminton with a low net, played with pingpong paddles. Players can only win points on their serve, and play to eleven. It involves a lot of strategy, especially in doubles, trying to cover the entire court with a partner. Most of the game is played close to the net and in the air.

"It's invigorating and exciting to play with other people," said Edith Hardee.



And Fletcher Turner can attest the sport offers more than just exercise. "It's a great community. People form friendships from it," he said.












Chipoletti steps down





Williams also added that his team will need to do a better job of prioritizing what is important to the success of his team.

"We emphasized how important this game was in terms of seeding for the district tournament," said Williams. "I'm concerned some players outside interests may be affecting us in a negative way. We will meet as a team, regroup and hopefully our senior leaders will step up for us."

Both teams showed how well coached and disciplined they are in the opening quarter by playing mistake free basketball early and leaning towards their strengths. 

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


