Frack no Groups travel here to 'protest'

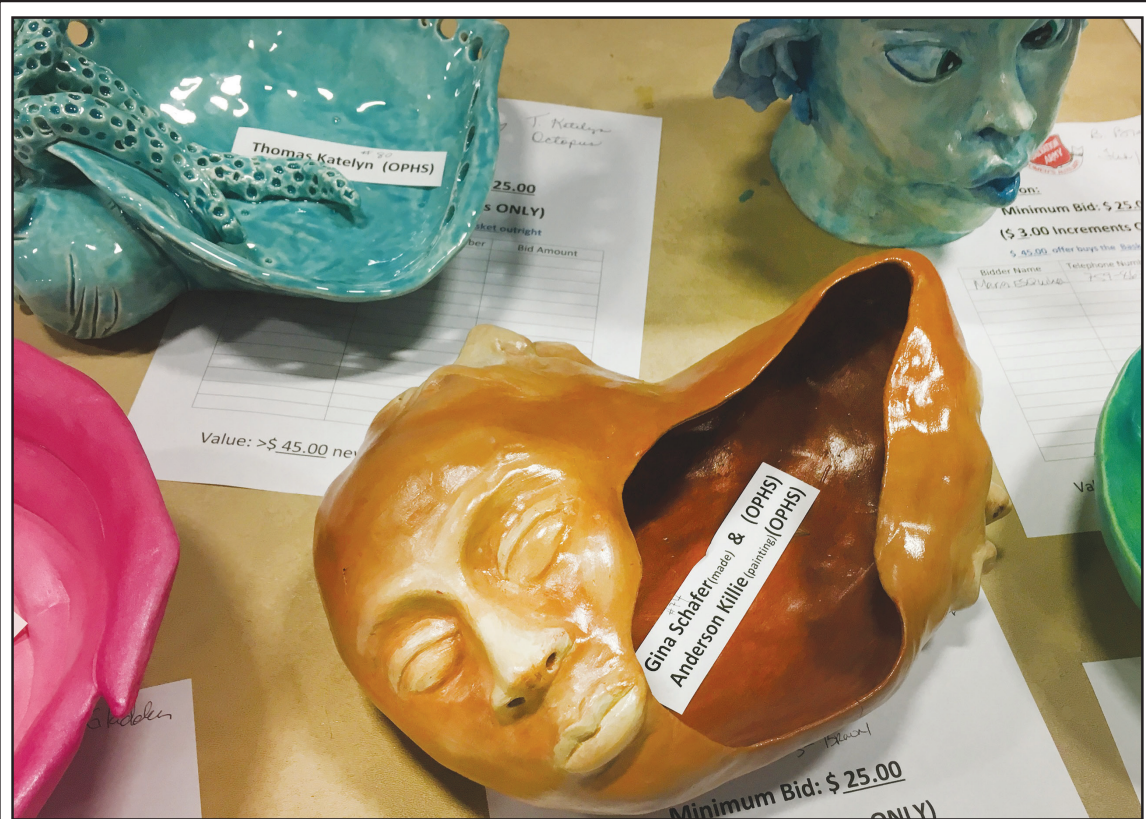
ORANGE PARK – There were no signs, no megaphones and no chants Monday when a handful of concerned citizens gathered outside the local office of Sen. Rob Bradley(R-Fleming Island).

Those gathered, all members of environmental organizations, were there to voice their support for

a bill that is currently waiting to be read before the Florida Senate's Appropriations Subcommittee on the Environment and Natural Resources after being passed through the Environmental Preservation and Conservation Committee.

Bradley, who chairs the latter of the two committees, showed support for the bill during its first vote,

Making the case for medical marijuana

ORANGE PARK – Michael Mitchem swallows 35 pills a day.

His 15 different medications help remedy a lengthy list of conditions including chronic low back pain, cirrhosis of the liver, bipolar disorder and depression.

The pills come with their own side effects, so it's much like switching out one set of ailments for another.

At age 63, he would like to change that by taking medical marijuana.

"It's a burden," Mitchem said. "Seems like all I do all day is take pills. I schedule my day around the pills. It would be a relief to have one medication that has none of the side effects that I have."

Not just for him, he said, but his wife, who currently has an inoperable tumor on her carotid artery. A number of small

Expo shows students alternatives to college

JACKSONVILLE — Clay County students recently got a chance to drive skid loaders, dump trucks and backhoes in a grown-up version of their childhood sandboxes.

Students from schools throughout the county moved from station to station with smiles on their faces as they took control of almost every piece of machinery used in road construction as part of the Florida Department of Transportation’s annual Construction Career Day at the Jacksonville Equestrian Center.

“These kids like hands-on stuff,” said FDOT employee Stephen Sedwick who was working the event. “We try to give them experience with a lot of different types of jobs.”

Students got a chance to learn about construction industry jobs that ranged from more managerial positions that would require college degrees to the more hands-on jobs such as bridge maintenance and road work.

Orange Park High School student Jacob

Barnes, 16, has an interest in construction, so when he was given the opportunity to participate in the FDOT career day he went without hesitation.

“I like working with my hands,” Barnes said. “[Construction] is something I enjoy and that I’ve been wanting to go into. I want to do road work or work with big machines.”

Barnes said that before working for FDOT or JEA, however, he hopes to earn a degree or certificate from a college or tech school with the goal of understanding the job better and hopefully starting out above an entry-level position.

The event, in its fourth year for this region, attracted about 600 students March 30 with Clay County making up about half of that number. FDOT officials hope they can interest students in working with them in the future, especially since the region is currently sitting on about \$1.2 billion in unfinished road projects.

“With that much work, we have a clear need for the next generation to help build the infrastructure in Northeast Florida,”

said FDOT engineer and the event’s Co-Chair Scott Lent. “We are trying to educate students about the transportation and construction industry as a whole. We need contractors and consultants, so we’re try-

ing to engage the next generation into the industry.”

The event took up most of the inside of

Dog Club to host all-breed show this weekend

ORANGE PARK — Dog shows provide professionals and beginners alike the unique chance for recognition for work that, in many cases, begins before an owner even selects their dog.

More than 850 dogs will compete in the Greater Orange Park Dog Club’s All Breed Dog Show on April 8 and 9 in St. Augustine to show off each entrant’s beauty of breed, poise and restraint.

Breeds will participate in a conformation event — essentially a beauty pageant — a rally trial, where handlers and dog must follow a set of commands quickly and accurately, and an obedience trial, aimed at highlighting a dog’s intelligence.

Dog shows, or “conformation” events concentrate on the distinctive features of purebred dogs and help to preserve characteristics espoused by the American Kennel Club as desirable.

Officials judge dogs against their individual breed standards, which have been established for the AKC-recognized breeds by their parent clubs.

Each standard describes the ideal size, color and temperament of each breed, as

well as correct proportion, structure and movement.

The event starts at 8 a.m. at the St. Johns County Fairgrounds, but for handlers and owners who must keep their animals in showing condition throughout the

year, the show never really ends.

“Dog showing is an art,” said club member Lynn Wetherelle. “I take it real serious. I’m not a bad loser, but I don’t go out and say ‘hey, I think I’ll lose today.’”

Wetherelle, who has a treadmill for her

Belgian Tervuren, Rev, said that while dog showing is the only sport where beginners can compete against professionals. She said if someone expects to take a dog that’s been lying down on the couch all year and show them, then they’re probably not going to do well in the actual competition.

For those that want to show dogs, the challenge begins at birth. Dog showers check for temperament and appearance in puppies to give them a better chance of winning.

The Greater Orange Park Dog Club has been a forum for area dog lovers since its establishment in 1978. Club President Carolyn Bassingthwaighte said, that in the past, the club held their annual event in Clay County, but were eventually pushed out by high event rental prices and the higher demand for horse shows in the county.

For those who want to become involved in dog showing, the event on Saturday morning offers an introductory class to dog showing. The club also offers a number of obedience training sessions and handler crash courses around Clay and surrounding counties throughout the year.

Bassingthwaighte said initially the only

Town Council to hatch backyard chicken pilot program

ORANGE PARK – Town of Orange Park Council member Steve Howard left a porcelain chicken on his desk throughout the council meeting Tuesday night.

Howard revealed its purpose towards the end of the meeting when he used it as a prop to illustrate his desire for town staff to research a pilot project for town families to raise chickens in their backyards.

The project would sunset after 12 months, and would pave the way for a more permanent solution for what some residents want.

Reading only from a prepared statement, Howard urged staff to draft an ordinance allowing backyard chickens that would meet the egg needs of an entire family.

“The hens are low cost maintenance, provide fertilizer, provide weed control, pest control, fertilizer, in addition to the eggs,” said Karen Donovan, an Orange Park resident who spoke in support of the measure. “I hope you will allow us to begin this pilot program.”

Town staff have already begun to research possible ordinance options, but Town Clerk Sarah Campbell said there wouldn’t be a draft ordinance proposed until the May 2 meeting. If approved, the ordinance would then have to go to a first and second reading before approval, so residents can expect to have regulations in place in late June.

It remains unclear whether a permit fee would be involved in the ordinance.

Senate amendment quickens pace for medical marijuana treatment center growth

A Senate panel is poised to approve legislation this week that could add five more medical marijuana treatment centers in Florida by October and lower the threshold for adding additional treatment centers in the future.

The Senate Health Policy Committee is scheduled to discuss and vote on a bill (SB 406), sponsored by Sen. Rob Bradley, that would implement the 2016 medical marijuana constitutional amendment. The Orange Park Republican has filed eight amendments to his bill, incorporating aspects of several other implementing bills filed in the Senate during the 2017 Legislative Session.

One of the most significant changes Bradley has proposed would lower the threshold for adding new medical marijuana treatment centers. Under an amendment filed Friday, the state would be required to add five additional medical marijuana treatment centers – at least one of which must be a black farmer – by Oct. 3, 2017.

The amendment then stipulates within “six months after each instance of the registration of 75,000 qualifying patients with the compassionate use registry” the state register four additional treatment centers “if a sufficient number of MMTC applicants meet the registration requirements.”

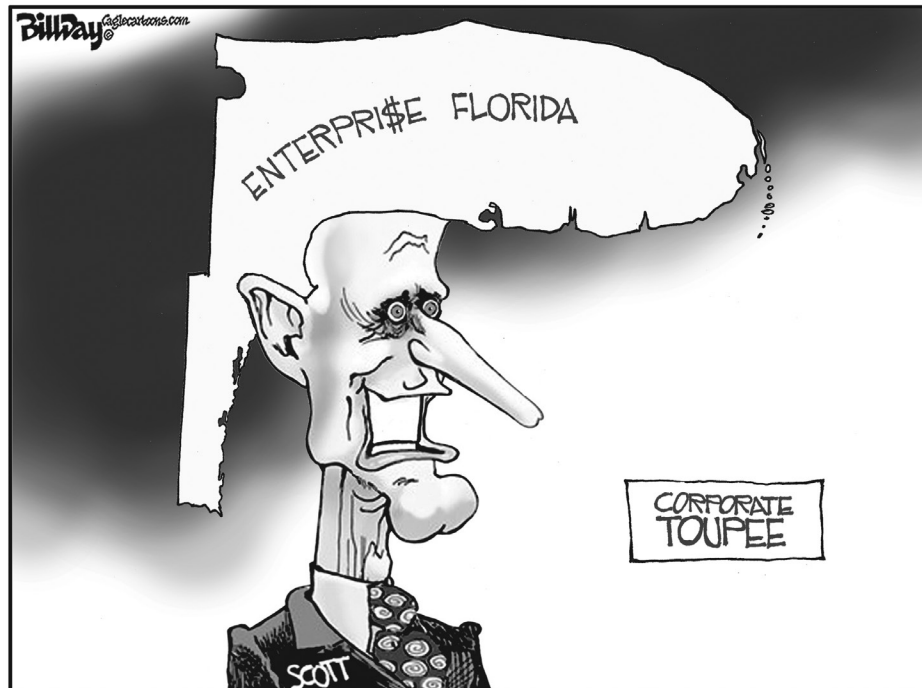
That’s a significantly lower threshold than what Bradley first proposed. Under the bill Bradley filed in January, the state health department would have been required to add more treatment centers only when an additional 250,000 qualified patients registered with the compassionate use registry. After that, five new medical marijuana treatment centers would be registered when the number of patients reach 350,000; 400,000; and 500,000.

During a workshop in March, Bradley said based on feedback he received he had come to believe his bill was “too restrictive.”

If approved, the Senate bill has the potential to open the door for far more medical marijuana treatment centers than the House proposal (HB 1397).

That proposal, sponsored by Majority Leader Ray Rodrigues, calls on the state to issue licenses to five applicants denied by the Department of Health and one black farmer after 150,000 qualified patients are registered in the compassionate use registry. New applicants would then be allowed once there are 200,000 qualified patients.

From the editor

A decade of mist and fog

It’s Tuesday and I’m sitting here looking at the blank page wondering what to write. It’s not the first time this has happened, but today it’s particularly difficult, almost painful.

Today marks 10 years to the date and exact day of the week that my dear mama breathed her last breath.

The anxiety, pain, odd feelings, what have you, leading up to today began probably in November. And that day, it was not so much the knowing that I would have to recall the night I walked into her bedroom and saw her lying there so peacefully, but it was the realization that I would wonder where did the last 10 years really go.

Was I standing still? Did I make a difference anywhere? What happened in my life the last 10 years and the more I thought about it, I looked back over a quilt of mist and fog.

Sure, I completed a master’s degree, helped our son graduate from high school and college, saw my mother-in-law pass away, came to work at Clay Today, but what about the plans I had?

Is it unfair to look back and wonder if I really got anything accomplished? Is it unfair to ponder whether I was as disconnected each day during the past 10 years as I feel this very moment? Or is it simply how I’ve looked back over the past 10 years to realize – and finally honor – what my mother meant to me and so many people.

I recall the stories she was finally able to tell me about the care she gave us while raising nine children.

How I’d vaguely recall her rocking me to sleep at night and the story she told me as an adult of her doing that very thing.

Apparently, I was a night owl and I still am.

“I used to rock you and Frank (my older brother) to sleep in front of the fireplace,” she told me two months before her passing. “Y’all would fall asleep in my lap and I’d slide one of you onto the floor and go put the other one to bed.”

And then, there were the stories my sisters and I would tell two nights later outside around a fire ring. My sister Laurie told us about the prized red dress mama had when she was a newlywed and how Daddy took the dress and cut it into little pieces.

“He said he didn’t ever want another man to look at her because she was so beautiful,” Laurie said, holding back tears.

While I was shocked to hear such a story, I really wasn’t at the same time. Having nine children ends up as a recipe for nine separate sets of nine separate unique memories.

I looked into the fire and around the circle at my family’s glowing faces and love enveloped us all. Mama’s dog Happy – who seemed to carry her same loving spirit – walked around the fire ring ensuring we were all safe wanting to steal a pat on the head where he could. (Happy would, weeks later, come to live here with us.)

My nephew Mark, who was almost like a younger brother, shared stories of his Gramma and how much he loved her.

There was an irony around the fire that night at the family farm and the home I’d grown up in.

We were doing two things that had always been prohibited – imbibing in adult beverages and starting a fire. Daddy, who said I was always a pyromaniac, was asleep in the house as we fellowshiped outside on the edge of the yard and field.

And as I glimpsed upward at the crisp April night sky, I knew in my heart we were making a memory that would last a lifetime, despite my own personal mist and fog.

This week in History

5 years ago, 2012

A Clay County Sheriff’s Office sting operation named “Don’t Play in Clay” ended with sex charges for 19 men who thought they were luring children via the internet to have sex with them.

Orange Park Town Council members Jim “J.B.” Renninger and Marge Hutton filed paperwork to run for the same seat on the Clay County Board of Commissioners, while Town Attorney Rob Bradley filed papers to run for the Florida Senate.

Green Cove Springs City Council voted 4-1 with vice mayor Pam Lewis dissenting against the appointment of Eugene Francis to the board of the Augusta Savage Arts and Community Center. Lewis said she voted no because of past conflict Francis had with the former city manager.

10 years ago, 2007

Gov. Charlie Crist appointed Orange Park attorney Rob Bradley to fill a vacancy on the Clay County Board of Commissioners in the aftermath of one commissioner being suspended for possible connection with the highly-publicized illegal dumping scandal and coverup.

Green Cove Springs Mayor Debbie Ricks won 56 percent of the vote in the city’s election. By a vote of 480 to 374, Ricks defeated businessman Bill Gause.

Enterprise Florida and the Florida Defense Alliance announced a \$500,000 grant had been made to renovate the single-story 1950s-era 10,000 square-foot Moody Hall on the campus of Camp Blanding. Plans called for transforming it into a conference center.

20 years ago, 1997

The Clay County Sheriff’s Office charged Tony Jurrell Harper of Pearson, Georgia with aggravated assault and false imprisonment after he allegedly abducting his mother-in-law.

Orange Park Junior High student, 14-year-old Mandy Williams, built a website “for and by the citizens of Greater Orange Park” ushering Clay County into the age of the World Wide Web.

The campus at Clay High played host to 200 bicyclists who were taking part in the coast-to-coast event known as Bike Florida.

30 years ago, 1987

Authorities were on the search for Craig “Bo” Gaskins, a football player at Orange Park High, who had been reported missing for two days.

the Equestrian Center and a large area of empty field next to the complex with the goal of showing every student a job they might want to do in the future.

Middleburg High School student Travis Collins is already committed to the United States Marine Corps upon graduation, but at the FDOT career day event he was looking toward the future.

“I’m going into the Marines to be a combat engineer,” Collins said, “so that should help me get a job [like this]. I’m just looking for choices after I get out of the Marines.”

Sedwick said that one of the goals of the event is to show the students that don’t think they would be a good fit in higher education that they have other options.

“We let them know that without a college degree they could still make 50, 60, or \$70,000 salaries,” Sedwick said. “We show them every job from start to finish that is needed to complete a DOT project. It is all covered; they are able to see every aspect.”

No matter what the student is interested in, Sedwick seems certain that students could find their place in the construction or transportation industry.

“Partners like FDOT and the sponsors for this year’s Construction Career Day open our students’ eyes to opportunities they may not have been aware of or able to access,” said Clay County Superintendent Addison Davis. “These experiences are an important part of the rigorous and relevant instruction we provide to prepare students for the workforce they will soon enter.”

Rodrigues’ bill cleared the Health Quality Subcommittee on a 14-1 vote, and will next be discussed in the House Appropriations Committee.

Bradley has also proposed an amendment that would require medical marijuana to be tested by an independent testing lab to ensure it meets the standards established by the state’s quality control programs. A bill (SB 1388) filed by Sen. Frank Artiles also called for independent third party testing.

Committee members will also be asked

to vote on an amendment Monday that would establish the Coalition for Medical Marijuana Research and Education within the H. Lee Moffitt Cancer Center and Research Institute.

The purpose of the coalition would be to “conduct rigorous scientific research, provide education, disseminate research, and to guide policy for the adoption of a statewide policy on ordering and dosing practices for the medicinal use of marijuana.” The amendment appears to be substantially similar to a bill (SB 1472) filed Sen. Bill Galvano, which passed the Senate Education on a 9-0 vote on March 27.



Detour planned for Branan Field Road, Blanding Boulevard area

MIDDLEBURG – Drivers who frequent Blanding Boulevard and Branan Field Road are in store for detour and road closure this weekend.

In order to move to the next major construction phase, contractors for the Florida Department of Transportation will close a section of an intersection of Blanding Boulevard and Branan Field Road so reconstruction and raising of the roadway can take place quickly over the course of one weekend.

In Middleburg, the Branan Field Road side of the Blanding Boulevard intersection will be closed Friday, April 7 at 9 p.m. The contractor will work around the clock to complete the work and will have the intersection reopened by Monday morning, April 10 by 5 a.m., weather and schedule permitting.

In addition to one small section of Branan Field Road closing, one lane of Blanding Boulevard southbound will also be closed to facilitate the tie-in with the intersection. The two left turn lanes from Blanding Boulevard northbound to Branan Field Road will also be closed. Traffic will be detoured with the primary route being Old Jennings Road.

This closure impacts access from Blanding Boulevard northbound and southbound to Branan Field Road and thus to

St. Vincent's Medical Center Clay County and to shopping centers located nearby. However, access to these sites will remain open using the suggested detour route on Old Jennings Road. Detour signage is in place now so regular commuters in the area will know to expect the closure this weekend.

The Blanding Boulevard widening project involves the six-laning of Blanding Boulevard from Old Jennings Road to Branan Field Road at a cost of approximately \$15 million. Additional improvements include bike lanes, sidewalks, new mast arm traffic signals at intersections and additional street lights. This project is now more than 90 percent complete and scheduled to be completed this summer.

Up-to-date lane closure and detour information is available at www.nflroads.com. The Florida Department of Transportation urges motorists to always follow the speed limit and stay within the limits of orange cones and barrels while traveling through construction zones.

Walking for a cure

FLEMING ISLAND – After years of symptoms attributed to various maladies such as mononucleosis or acid reflux, doctors finally realized in 2013 that Sydney Ward had multiple sclerosis, a disease with no known cure that affects the central nervous system.

"In the beginning, I didn't wanna hear it," Ward said, 17. "I was in denial. I kept saying, 'I don't have MS, I don't have MS.'"

After her sister Aerial made a video with a friend in school, Sydney garnered a great support network for her first Walk MS event in St. Augustine the same year she was diagnosed. After that event, her outlook changed.

“After the first walk I started reading about [MS],” Sydney said. “After reading about it, and attending the Deliver the

Dream retreat, I started to accept it, and take my medicine."

The walks, which started in 1998, are one of the most important fundraisers for people living with MS, and following this year's walk season, the collective amount raised is expected to reach the \$1 billion milestone.

"It is the largest gathering point for people who care about the MS community," said Corrina Madrid, president of the National MS Society North Florida Chapter. "The walk is a fun healthy way for people to show that they care."

Sydney and her mother, Danie Mars, said the most important thing about these events is the learning that goes on for people who may not know anything about MS.

"A lot of people [don't know what it is]," Mars said. "We didn't know what it was until she was diagnosed with it."

Sydney is now 20 years old, and after

finding the right medicine, has minimized relapses as much as possible, allowing her to get back to daily life, attending classes at St. Johns River State College.

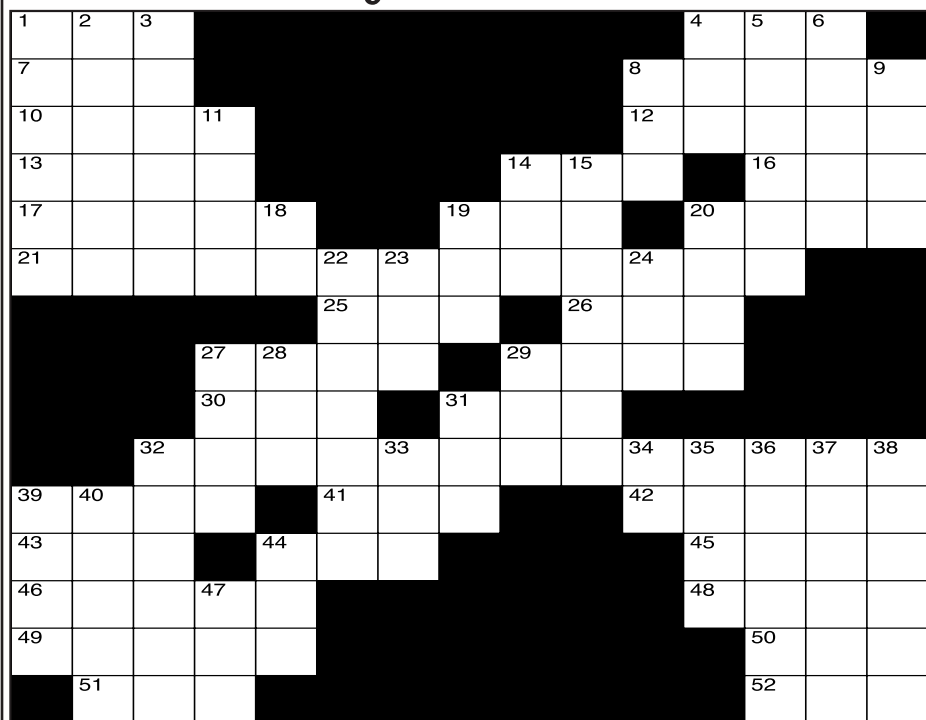
"She does normal stuff," Mars said. "Since graduating high school, she's going to school and doing her own thing."

Sydney said she expected a group of about 30 at this year's Walk MS event on Fleming Island.

"We've got a great network of people," Mars said. "I'd love for more people to come out, learn about [MS], and be active in the cause; and I'd like to meet people that need help, especially the kids."

studies on patients living with cancer found a reduction in nausea and vomiting caused by chemotherapy, but more recent studies have found marijuana can reduce the size or even kill cancer cells inside of a petri dish.

Recently, Mitchem has developed small, persistent tremors. While doctors have not found the reason for his onset tremors, they have ruled out Parkinson's disease. Mitchem said it's possible the interaction of his list of medications could be, at least in part, to blame for this new symptom.

Overall, however, he said he would like to stop taking opioids as a treatment for his lower back pain. While working on a tugboat in his youth, a worker had him hold an engine from below floor level while the worker tinkered with the engine. This caused an injury that inevitably left his lower back damaged.

The elderly are not immune to America's opioid crisis.

After a decade of opioid use, Mitchem said he doesn't feel much of any effect from them anymore. And while he said he doesn't have an addictive personality, many seniors report forming a strong dependency on opioids as they progress through their treatment.

A December study by a Washington Post Kaiser Family Foundation Poll found nearly all long-term users of prescription painkillers say they started the painkillers with a prescription from a doctor. And while nearly all studied long-term users reported they used the drug to relieve pain, 34 percent reported being physically

dependent on the drug.

It's common for chronic pain to develop later in life, and often through work related injuries. This pain only becomes more acute as an individual becomes older, so often doctors turn to opioids as a permanent bandage when corrective surgery is not an option or necessary.

However, seniors who do seek help find that Medicare does not cover most types of addiction treatment, so the ordeal can be costly.

Mitchem uses CBD oil made from hemp to replicate some of medical marijuana's healing effects. But it's expensive, a con-

centrated form of the plant extract runs around \$160.

For a time, there was a CBD dispensary operating in the Town of Orange Park, but police raided the installation in late November after their product was found to contain trace amounts of THC, the euphoria-inducing compound found in marijuana.

"I don't feel like we should regulate cannabis at all," Mitchem said. "We shouldn't have cannabis as the last possible option."

Mitchem said he is frustrated, as undoubtedly others are, that legislative implementation for the medicine is still work-

ing its way through the lawmaking process. He's also worried whichever bill passes will not provide for the availability voters affirmed by 71 percent.

Voters approved Amendment 2 to approve expanded use of medical marijuana in patients with "debilitating illnesses" in November.

But since then, legislators have drawn critics for proposing restrictive bills that operate within the legal structure of the 2014 'Charlotte's Web' bill that legalized the use of medical marijuana for terminal patients.

Restrictions such as a ban on smoking marijuana and a ban on edibles exist in HB 1397, proposed by House Majority Leader Ray Rodrigues(R-Estero), while other proposed bills mire the industry in regulatory red tape.

"There are still some inherent obstacles for patients to access this," said Fleming Island physician Calvin Siegers, who is now one of five Clay County physicians who are registered to recommend medical marijuana. "Even if I were to be in a position to certify that someone has a need, they would still have some difficulty in actually obtaining medical marijuana, and those are rather slow moving things to change."

"My pessimism hasn't changed, but it also hasn't increased. I think this is a very slow moving change, and I think there are players in the system that would just as soon have it remain a slow-moving change."

Mitchem will spend his time sorting through his medications each morning until a bill eventually passes the governor's desk. He would prefer that be sooner rather than later, however.

and those gathered outside his office both thanked him for his support. They urged Bradley to schedule a hearing so that the bill can become ratified before the end of this year's legislative session. With the bill appearing dead in the Florida House, environmentalists are asking Bradley and the Senate to lead by example and hear Senate Bill 442.

Tallahassee-based ReThink Energy Florida hosted the press conference, and were joined by members from two separate chapters of the Sierra Club, a member of the Madison County Garden Club, and, via proxy, Todd Sack of the Physicians for Social Responsibility.

Members from each group spoke as if directly addressing the senator about why they think he should push this bill through as quickly as possible. All of the conversation culminates to one sentiment – the risks of fracking in Florida outweigh the potential benefits.

"We all know there are leaders in the Florida House that would oppose a ban [on fracking]," said Doug Miller, ReThink En-

ergy Florida's campaign director. "Our organizations understand that energy problems are real, we just think that betting on fracking is just a temporary fix."

Though he could not attend the Orange Park event, Sack sent a prepared statement on the behalf of the Physicians for Social Responsibility, who have studied

fracking at length and written their own policies on the "clear health risks of natural gas fracking."

"The health risks of fracking are far too great to Floridians and to our fragile aquifer that gives us our drinking water, supports agriculture and supports tourism," Sack wrote. "For the small amount of

natural gas that might come from Florida, gas that the world does not need, and the small number of jobs in the gas industry, the risks to our health are too great."

Sack's message to Bradley also cited a 2015 EPA study pointing out health risks involved in the process.

"Fracking in other states uses hundreds of chemicals that likely cause birth defects, liver failure, brain injury and cancer," he states.

There are currently two bills in the Florida legislature that address this issue, SB 442, and the companion bill in the House, House Bill 451. Both bills are awaiting their next committee hearing before, potentially, they will be sent to the two floors for a final vote.

Echoing the statements of Miller, Tom Larson, conservation chair of the Florida Chapter of the Sierra Club, thinks fracking is only a temporary solution to a very big problem.

"The opportunity for renewable [energy] is cheaper," Larson said. "This is the sunshine state and we should have a significant expansion of solar. Each sunny day is a gigantic solar energy spill."

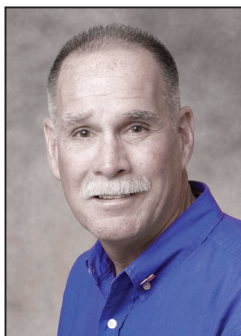

necessary quality in a dog shower is a love for animals. The tact and finer points can all come later.

Competing handlers start with 200 points. Judges deduct points for inappropriate behavior. Winners of each breed compete against the AKC breed standards to win best in show. Winners receive a trophy and a ribbon.

It's not about the awards, however, "It's about the prestige of winning best in show. You're not receiving an exorbitant amount of money," Wetherelle said.

But sometimes the playing field isn't even. Some owners hire professional handlers and trainers to groom their dogs simply for winning the competition's bragging rights.

Of course, some dog owners don't have a choice but to hire professional handlers. Some owners are immobile, or have other conditions that prevent them from showing, but still would like their dog to compete.

While not all of the dog club's 40 members will compete in this weekend's show, the ones that do will certainly have solid competition.

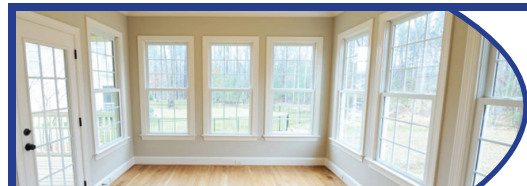

A young, lifelong artist

ORANGE PARK – Adrianna Horne has been drawing since she was five years old and doesn't intend to stop anytime soon after winning the annual Concert on the Green poster contest, which reaffirmed her dream.

"I want to one day be a famous artist," she said.

Horne's marker drawn poster 'Musical World' will serve as Concert on the Green's official poster this year and hang in the Thrasher-Horne Center for the Arts until May 26.

The poster will also appear on the out-

good that other people are beginning to recognize her abilities and talents.”

Concert on the Green’s main focus is music, however organizers with Clay County’s leading symphonic concert have their eyes set on involving as much student artist participation as possible.

“We’ve certainly grown in what we’re able to do with kids,” said Lauren Hoffman, Concert on the Green president. “We’re trying to do everything that we can do to encourage the growth of this and we’re doing everything we can do to talk to our school board about what we can do about arts in our schools.”

For example, one other art program Concert on the Green is involved in sponsorship of the Clay County School District’s 19th Annual All-County Elementary Chorus Concert held this past January. And, through its many artistic connections, procured the talents of Darren Dailey to direct the event. Dailey, a Fleming Island resident, is executive and artistic director of the Jacksonville Children’s Chorus.

Meanwhile, Concert on the Green began 30 years ago when a group banded together to attempt to bring the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra to the county. Hoffman said experiencing symphonic music live can be a monumental experience in not only the lives of students, but of adults as well.

“I wouldn’t want to live in a county that doesn’t do something like this, I’m not kidding,” Hoffman said. “That’s the only opportunity that all our citizens” get to see live symphonic performances.”

To that end, she has also jumpstarted a symphonic music summer camp at W.E. Cherry Elementary to expose elementary students to music early. Currently, elementary students in the county have limited access to any music programs until they reach higher grade levels.

Approximately four years ago, Concert on the Green began using funds generated

from the event to fund scholarship opportunities for local artists in Clay. Other opportunities exist through the program as well. The concert hosts an annual music contest among students. Every year, one student vocalist and one instrumentalist from the music contest, perform a solo with members of the Jacksonville Symphony.

Hoffman said the concert’s programs are part of an effort to get students more motivated in artistic endeavors as a whole in the county. And its annual poster contest is a great way to accomplish that for visual artists.

“I was so happy when I won, I didn’t know what to do,” Horne said. “My emotion – I was just so happy.”

Concert on the Green will be held May 28 on the grounds of St. Johns Country Day School in Orange Park.

Other winners in the Concert on the Green poster contest were:

Capturing second place in the senior division was Catherine Drawdy, a junior at Orange Park High, followed by third place winner Savannah Gilreath, a freshman at Ridgeview High. Honorable Mention winners were Bailey Binderim of Fleming Island High and Lisette Coll-Roman of St. Johns Country Day School. Three eighth graders swept the junior division. Alivia Claxton of Lake Asbury Junior High, won first place; Allison Korahais of St. Johns Country Day School, placed second and Emma Lantinberg of St. Johns Country Day School won third, while Karah Martin of Lake Asbury Junior High was honorable mention.

Three students were declared elementary division winners. Ellie Susser of St. Johns Country Day School, won first, and two students from Seven Bridges School were awarded second and third place – Stuart Smith and Bobby Hahn. finalist recital scheduled for May 17 at 7 p.m. at Penney Memorial Church in Penney Farms.

To be eligible to enter, students must either live in Clay County or attend a school in Clay County. Students in grades 9-12 will compete in the senior division, while students in grades 6-9 will compete in the junior division. As a 9th grader, students may choose to enter either division.

Participants must be sure that the musical selections they choose are arranged for orchestral accompaniment.

At the audition, participants are asked to bring a picture of themselves, three copies of their selection for the judges as well as the original editions. Students are also asked to set time aside in their schedules for the finals, as well as the Penney Farms outreach recital on May 18.

Participants may choose their own piece for the competition. However, if a “Young Artist Winner” is declared, Concert on the Green reserves the right to request an alternate piece for performance that is part of the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra repertoire. Music must be memorized for consideration for first, second or third place.

Applicant’s audition must be accompanied, including senior division pianists. Applicant should arrange for an accompanist, or a list of accompanists will be provided for you. Accompanist fees are the responsibility of the applicant.

In the senior division, participants must perform a solo piece from a concerto composition which has symphony orchestration and is consistent with symphony

performance.

In the junior division, participants are asked to follow the same guidelines, if possible. Participants may play a sonata or classical piece of their choice. It does not have to have orchestral accompaniment. Pianists must have four years of experience or a Level 3 in piano proficiency.

Vocalist participants should choose their own pieces for the competition that are appropriate for their ability and vocal range. Participants are encouraged to consider the below list of pieces for audition. Check the Concert on the Green website for a list of songs that may ensure a chosen vocalist “Young Artist Winner” will perform at the Concert on the Green event with full symphony accompaniment.

All vocalist participants must perform two pieces which are consistent with symphony performance. Pieces with known symphony orchestration are preferred. One piece must be a classical art song or aria in the original language. One selection must be from a Broadway Show. Music must be memorized for consideration for first, second or third place.

Beyond the white lab coat

Physician shares his passion for photography

ST. JOHNS, Fla. — For years of traveling and vacations, Doug Roane subscribed to a certain mindset — “Why bother taking a picture when you can just buy a postcard?”

Roane, like a lot of dads, stuck to family photos with a small camera, but during the

advent of digital photography he decided to try a digital camera, which eventually led him to ditch the postcards and start making his own pictures.

“In about 2005 digital SLR cameras were new on the market,” Roane said. “I got a little Canon Rebel because I wanted to take better quality family photos.”

In addition to his travels around Montana, Roane and his wife and three children, have taken several vacations since his photographic awakening. He began to look at family vacations as prime opportunities to follow his passion.

“I always made a point to wake up early when we would go on vacation,” Roane said. “Sunrise was my time [to shoot], while the family slept.”

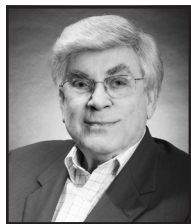

Striving for art appreciation, outreach

OAKLEAF – The smell of freshly-cooked food blew through the air in front of Oakleaf High Saturday as guests approached the school's cafeteria where the second annual Art Walk was being held.

Food trucks set up outside to provide lunch options, as well as snow cones, to guests during the event that ran through the lunch hour. In addition to the food trucks, there were several tables featuring a variety of kids' crafts, although adults were also encouraged to participate, including face painting and a make-your-own pet rock table.

"We have a variety of people here," said Oakleaf senior Angelena Santiago, president of the school's National Art Honor Society, which hosted the event. "We wanted to get the community to look at and appreciate art more."

Past the kid's activities and food trucks, student artists and established local artists displayed an eclectic mix of products for sale along with displays of artwork from various classes at the school.

"The goal is to make sure we have the community involved in art," said Oakleaf art teacher and event organizer Kezia Laberis. "We also want to show students what it is like to be a professional artist."

Besides the visual art displays, there were also performers throughout the day, varying from ambient post-rock guitar symphonies to quiet, personal poetry readings.

"I don't think any of these people have heard my music," said guitarist and Oakleaf senior Jonathan Richardson. "I've played a lot in Daytona. This is my first time doing anything with the school."

The event accepts applications from artists of all levels for participation.

Oakleaf sophomore Rachel Katrinic sold handmade dreamcatchers at the Art Walk after only learning how to make them a couple months ago. When she saw fliers for Art Walk she decided to try and sell some of her handiwork.

"I had a bunch [of dreamcatchers] in my room, it was an obsession," she said. "Then I found out they're pretty easy to make. Today I'm just hoping to make a good profit and get more exposure."

On the opposite end of the spectrum is former art teacher, and painter of various automobiles, Michael Viafora. Viafora has been painting his "automotive fine art" for years, participating in shows as often as five times a month. He was contacted by the Art Honor Society and asked to participate in the Art Walk.

"I'm here to support the Art Honor Society and showcase my automotive art," Viafora said. "I would like to participate again next year. They are very organized in their planning for the art walk and gave me a lot of space to display my art."

Viafora paints cars using either acrylic or watercolor, but goes beyond the traditional realistic car paintings you might see on sale at a shopping mall or flea market. Viafora uses the paint and the brush strokes to evoke motion from the vehicles, attempting to breathe some life into the two-dimensional flat canvases. His works ranged in price from small \$10 original watercolors to large acrylic paintings that sold for hundreds of dollars.

As the event's organizer, Laberis was pleased with the day's turnout and will probably start planning next year's event soon. After the success of the inaugural event last year and with the participation at this year's event it will continue on into the future.

"We have a few more food trucks this year, and a higher population of student artists," Laberis said. "Our main goal is community outreach focused on art."

Empty Bowls reinforces care for the needy

ORANGE PARK — The Clay County Salvation Army Corps from made sure no bowl was empty Tuesday while serving an array of soups from area restaurants to those attending the annual Empty Bowls fundraiser.

This marks the 15th year for Clay County's Empty Bowls Luncheon, which provides diners with soup, bread and water, providing them a glimpse into the life of someone less fortunate than themselves.

The event is an outgrowth of a national grassroots campaign to raise money for local food pantries.

"Our goal, of course, is to raise money for the needy here in Clay County," said Judy White, president of the Clay County Salvation Army Women's Auxiliary, organizers of the event. "The Salvation Army feeds 450 people every month. Everything from the ticket sales goes toward the food pantry."

In addition to the food, the \$20 cost of admission buys guests a handmade clay bowl created by students from local schools or community groups. The event gives the artists a chance to show their ceramics skills as well as leave guests with a reminder of the event and that there are people out there who need help.

The event featured live music performed by the Salvation Army band and a silent auction featuring everything from gift certificates to premium handmade

bowls provided by the Orange Park High School Advanced Placement 3D Studio Art class.

Aside from volunteers from the Salvation Army, there were also several elected officials and local business people working

as servers. Among these was Clay County Sheriff Daryl Daniels, who had eaten at Empty Bowls in the past, and decided to volunteer his time this year.

"It's good to be able to volunteer on this end for a good cause, especially a cause

that is giving back here in Clay County," Daniels said. "There are different leaders in the community out here as well and that's good because leaders set the standard."

The luncheon is an important fundraiser for the Salvation Army every year, with 83 percent of every dollar raised directly providing food and supplies for Clay County's families in need. Something the Salvation Army prides itself on is keeping money raised at events like this in the community where it came from.

"Everything that's raised in Clay County stays in Clay County," said Lt. Sheena Marquis of the Salvation Army. "It's nice getting to see people from the community and how much the community supports the Salvation Army."

Since the event's inception a decade and a half ago, Empty Bowls has grown into a very successful fundraiser, and will continue to grow into the future, according to White. She said they try to exceed the proceeds from the previous year at each luncheon, something that has become necessary with a growing number of food pantry patrons in Clay County.

Started in a Michigan high school art class in 1990 as a way to raise funds for a food drive, Empty Bowls has become a nationwide program. In its second year, the Michigan art class had developed into the Empty Bowls Project and became a full-fledged 501(c)3 that would promote the concept.

A similar ordinance approved in Neptune Beach last month allows for 25 permits in its pilot program, which would each cost \$50.

"I've had them, there's a lot of them around town right now, they're all over the place," said Councilman Gary Meeks. "If we're going to do this, we don't need to charge people. This is not a monetary generator."

Residents and council members suggested the ordinance bar roosters to ensure residents aren't bothered by the noise they create.

"I would like to encourage you to try this pilot program, the children have a wonderful time helping me collect my eggs, and they are good pets," said Tina Baker, who lives in Middleburg.

Baker owns chickens under Clay County's backyard chicken ordinance, which was adopted in 2015. Residents may own four chickens under that ordinance and must keep them in an enclosed area.

"I think it's a good way for a number of people to save money on their grocery bills but, but it's also for people to understand, especially if they have young kids,

where their food comes from," said Brad Burbaugh, UF/IFAS Clay County extension director.

Burbaugh wrote a letter to the county showing his support for the 2015 ordinance before its passage.

As the ordinance progresses, residents will have time to comment during its public readings, which have yet to be scheduled. It is clear that not everyone is for the ordinance.

"I've talked to several people and no one I've talked to other than an email I got today have I had anyone that was for chickens in their backyard," said Vice Mayor Scott Land, who was the only dissenting vote Tuesday. "I've talked to quite a few people and they were all pretty much against it."

In other business, Town Manager Jim Hanson is applying for reimbursement from the Federal Emergency Management Agency for damages caused by the Oct. 8 arrival of Hurricane Matthew. Although the estimate can be continually adjusted, the current reimbursement estimate places cleanup costs at \$250,000. FEMA will reimburse the town for 75 percent of eligible costs associated with storm cleanup.

The majority of the cost was from equipment and labor fees.

UF shares in \$2.45 million to research tickborne disease risk

GAINESVILLE, Fla. — To protect personnel on Southeastern military installations from tickborne diseases, a federal program has awarded a five-year, \$2.45 million grant to a team of researchers with the University of Florida Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences and other institutions.

The grant was provided by the federal Strategic Environmental Research and Development Program, an initiative supported by the U.S. Department of Defense, Department of Energy and the Environmental Protection Agency.

Scientists will determine how tick populations are affected by invasive plants, fire and the availability of host animals in specific locations; this information will help the team assess tickborne disease risk under future climate conditions.

A portion of the UF/IFAS-based project will get over \$700,000, said Jack Payne, UF senior vice president for agriculture and natural resources.

"This project requires an interdisciplinary approach to account for all of the relevant ecological factors that influence the risk of people being exposed to tickborne diseases," Payne said.

Participating faculty represent UF/

IFAS, the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and Boston University, Payne said. Field studies will take place on more than a dozen U.S. Department of Defense properties where the lone star tick is found, including sites in six states where the tick co-exists with an invasive plant known as cogongrass — Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi and South Carolina. Researchers will also assess Midwestern sites where the tick is present but the invasive plant is not.

The team will conduct three years of field work to assess tick populations, white-tailed deer populations, plant communities, plant invasions, and pathogen presence in ticks, said Jackie Burns, UF/IFAS dean for research and director of the Florida Agricultural Experiment Station.

"This is an extremely well thought-out approach," Burns said. "To my knowledge, this project is the first attempt to assess tickborne disease risk by examining a suite of environmental factors that are critical to the tick's life cycle and tickborne disease epidemiology in nature."

The effort focuses on the lone star tick, *Amblyomma americanum*, because it is the most significant disease vector among Southeastern ticks, Burns said.

Program awards \$14,682 to conduct tree inventory in city

Estranged boyfriend facing kidnapping, robbery charges

MIDDLEBURG — An Ormond Beach man is charged with robbery and kidnapping and other felony charges after a fight in which he asked his girlfriend not to break up with him.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office arrested Michael James Armour, 27, on March 29 at 4:17 a.m. at a home in the 3000 block of Alec Drive.

According to the police report, the victim had taken extensive measures to lock her home and eventually locked herself in her bedroom. However, police found, Armour had broken into her home and kicked in her bedroom door before entering and forcibly taking the woman's cell phone. Police said Armour then picked up the victim and threw her on the couch where he began choking and slapping her.

The victim was able to convince Armour to get off of her, and minutes later, she was able to get away from Armour. She attempted to go to a neighbor's house to get help, but Armour ran after her, grabbed her from behind and carried her back into her house where he allegedly began choking and beating her all over again.

When officers arrived at the scene, one officer witnessed Armour "attempt to conceal himself" between two vehicles while also attempting to hide what was later found to be marijuana and a piece of drug paraphernalia.

Armour is charged with one count each of simple domestic battery, robbery, felony battery, domestic battery by strangulation, assault and battery during burglary, kidnapping to facilitate a felony, marijuana possession and drug equipment possession.

At press time, he remained in the Clay County Jail without bond.

He also faces a count of violating conditions of a pre-trial release agreement in relation to a previous domestic violence arrest.

Traffic stop ends in felony charges

TANGLEWOOD — A 29-year-old Middleburg man faces multiple felony charges after what started as a routine traffic stop.

On April 1 at 12:40 a.m., deputies with the Clay County Sheriff's Office Operation Safe Streets Unit stopped a vehicle at the intersection of Jefferson Avenue and Independence Drive in Orange Park for an equipment violation. The vehicle was driven by William Alexander Gaspard.

During the stop, a drug-sniffing dog alerted the officer to search the vehicle. Two OSS deputies approached the vehicle and instructed the driver and passenger to

exit the vehicle.

According to the police report, Gaspard became argumentative and refused to exit the vehicle. Police said Gaspard then started the car and drove off and struck one of the deputies. One of the officers fired an unsuccessful single shot towards Gaspard. No one was hit or injured as a result of the gun shot.

The vehicle was stopped a short distance away and Gaspard was taken into custody and booked into the Clay County Jail where his bond is set at \$210,019. He faces one count each of battery on a law enforcement officer, fleeing and eluding, resisting with violence, possession of a controlled substance (cocaine) and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Screwdriver attack ends in arrest

MIDDLEBURG — A Jacksonville man was arrested Monday, April 3, after attempting to throw a bottle of soap and a coffee mug at a woman, and then threatening her with a screwdriver.

According to the Clay County Sheriff's Office, the victim and Wayne Howard Gray Jr., 26, got into a verbal argument over a temporary tag located on a vehicle outside. Gray then came into the living room of their Middleburg home where the two continued arguing.

Police said Gray became upset during the argument and threw a bottle of soap and a coffee mug at the victim. Gray then allegedly grabbed a screwdriver that was in his pocket and threatened her with it, according to the police report.

The victim then called police. Gray, who had fled the scene, was found by CCSO after sliding on a dirt road in a vehicle and hitting a mailbox. Police identified the man at the scene of this accident as Gray and he was arrested and charged with aggravated assault with deadly weapon without intent to kill and domestic abuse.

Gray is currently residing in the Clay County Jail with a bond amount set at \$102,505.

Domestic attack ends in arrest

ORANGE PARK — An Orange Park area man was arrested April 2, after allegedly assaulting his pregnant girlfriend of three years.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office said Anthony Jean Piere, 23, and his girlfriend were arguing outside of their home in the

Ridgecrest area when Jean Piere's girlfriend went upstairs to grab something for their daughter.

Jean Piere allegedly followed her upstairs where he pushed his girlfriend down onto their couch and sat on her lap, preventing her from getting up. The victim threatened to call police and in response, Jean moved a dresser to block the only exit out of their place, according to the police report. He then placed a shotgun on the sofa.

The victim messaged a friend via Facebook who called the police for her. The victim moved the dresser blocking the exit just enough that she could squeeze out while Jean Piere grabbed her by her clothes and arms. When police arrived, they noticed visible scratches and stretched clothing on the victim, according to the police report.

Jean Piere was arrested at the scene and charged with domestic aggravated assault with intent to commit a felony, domestic aggravated battery on a pregnant female and adult false imprisonment. He was booked into the Clay County Jail but has since been released on bond.

Car ramming ends in felony charge

MIDDLEBURG — Authorities said a Fleming Island man was arrested after allegedly punching and stomping his feet on

a man's face on March 31.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office said Rodney Sir-Patrick Roberts, 27, borrowed his friend's car to go pick up his girlfriend. When Roberts returned, he asked to use the car again but the owner of the car told him he could not use it again that night because she needed it.

According to the police report, Roberts left the Middleburg apartment and attempted to leave in the car, against Fields' wishes. Field's boyfriend, Aaron Carter, stood in front of the vehicle in an attempt to stop Roberts from leaving.

Police said Roberts struck Carter with the car causing Carter to fall backwards onto the ground. Roberts then got out of the vehicle and began punching Carter in the face while stomping his head in, according to the police report.

Police charged Roberts with aggravated battery with a deadly weapon. At press time, he remains in the Clay County Jail with bond set at \$35,003.00.

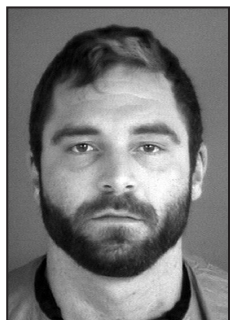
Lake Asbury man charged in driveway shooting

MIDDLEBURG — A Lake Asbury man was arrested April 3 after allegedly following a vehicle to a home and shooting at passengers in a car with a gun.

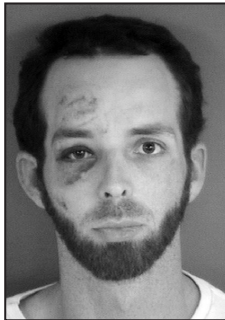
The Clay County Sheriff's Office said Justin Lee Croy, 27, was following his friend, who was on his way to Croy's house to pick up his vehicle.

Police said when Croy's friend arrived to Croy's driveway, he and the others in the car noticed a vehicle that had been fol-

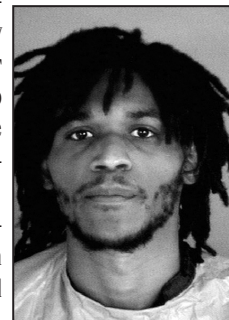

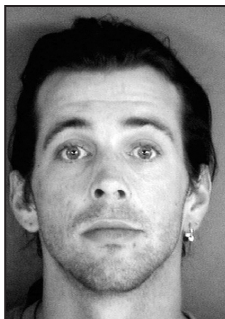

Croy was arrested and charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon without intent to kill, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon and controlled substance drug possession without a prescription, say police.

Fleming Island knife attacker busted

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Authorities arrested a Fleming Island man last weekend for allegedly assaulting a man with a knife following a car accident.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office arrested Nickolas Jesus Atilano, 39, on April 2 after responding to a car accident near the intersection of County Road 315 and State Road 16 West.

Police said the victim approached Atilano after the accident and saw that Atilano was sitting in his car with a knife in his hand.

According to the CCSO report, Atilano then got out of the car and began to walk towards the victim with the knife in hand. The victim asked Atilano if he wanted to get shot, as the victim had a concealed weapon in his vehicle that he planned to use if Atilano continued any further. Atilano backed off and went to his own vehicle, according to the police report.

After investigating the scene, Atilano was arrested and charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon without the intent to kill.

He is currently free from the Clay County Jail after posting an undisclosed bond.

September robbery suspect collared

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – A Jacksonville man was arrested Friday, March 31, after a warrant was issued for his involvement with a robbery in September of last year.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office said Isaac Dequan Blake, 34, went to the Kangaroo gas station at 1890 Kingsley Ave. last September with another person. Once inside the store, the other person distracted the woman working behind the counter.

During this time, police said, Blake jumped over the counter and began removing cigarette cartons from the shelf. The store employee attempted to stop Blake who struck her in the face causing her to fall, according to police.

Both Blake and the person who helped with the robbery fled the scene. Blake's accomplice was arrested shortly after the robbery as police found him driving a vehicle that matched the one used in the robbery, according to the police report.

Around two weeks later, a warrant for Blake's arrest was issued.

On March 31, months after the robbery, Blake was arrested and charged with unarmed robbery.

He currently resides in the Clay County Jail with a bond amount set at \$250,003.

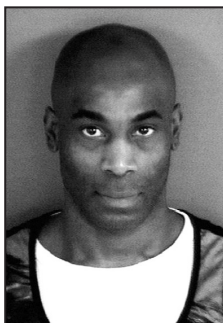
Doss gets 12-year sentence in estranged husband's murder

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – The estranged wife of a murdered Navy commander is currently in a Florida Department of Corrections reception center awaiting transfer to a state prison following her recent sentencing in a Clay County courtroom.

Volinda Hunter Doss, 47, accepted a plea agreement March 15 that gives her a 12-year sentence for the lesser charge of manslaughter. She was also given credit for 954 days she was incarcerated in the Clay County Jail.

In August 2014, Doss and Anthony Delane Washington, 36, and Ronnie Randolph Wilson II, 25, were indicted on one count each of murder and burglary in connection with the February 10, 2014 murder of her husband, Cmdr. Alphonso Mortimer Doss, three weeks before he was to be honorably discharged from the U.S. Navy. Evidence showed Alphonso Doss was strangled to death while living at the Astoria Motel on Park Avenue in Orange Park.

Volinda Doss, Washington, 36, and Ronnie Wilson II, 25, were accused of planning Alphonso Doss' death so they could collect life insurance money. During his trial last fall, Washington testified that he killed Alphonso Doss in self-defense after he and Wilson went to the hotel room. The investigation revealed that the 6-foot-7, 255-pound Washington, who weighed 365 pounds at the time of the murder, was at

the motel, strangled Doss, stole his breathing machine and left him on the floor "gurgling" and in the throes of death, according to police.

Judge John Skinner sentenced Washington to life in prison on November 8, 2016.

Florida Gopher Tortoise Day is all about community awareness

TALLAHASSEE – Florida Gopher Tortoise Day is being celebrated on April 10 and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission is encouraging communities, organizations and individuals to help conserve the threatened species.

This year, seven counties – Alachua, Brevard, Charlotte, Collier, DeSoto, Indian River and Sarasota - and the cities of Cape Coral, Flagler Beach, Melbourne, North Port and Venice are adopting Florida Gopher Tortoise Day resolutions. But anyone can get involved in helping Florida's gopher tortoises.

Looking for ways to celebrate Gopher Tortoise Day and conserve the tortoise? Go to GopherTortoiseDayFL.com for information and activities for April 10 and all year



long.

During April and May, you may spot one of these gentle, slow-moving reptiles which become more active in spring. They exit their deep burrows in search of a meal of spring greenery and often to look for a mate. Look for tortoises and their half-moon shaped burrow entrances in yards, neighborhoods, along roadways and on many of the state's private and public lands.

"If you're a fan of the gopher tortoise, help us spread the word on conserving this threatened species, whose burrows are home to hundreds of animals, including the eastern indigo snake, gopher frog and Florida mouse," said Deborah Burr, who heads the FWC's Gopher Tortoise Management Program.

"If you see a gopher tortoise crossing a road, pick it up and place it on the roadside in the direction it was heading, but only if it is safe for you to do so," Burr said. "Remember, the gopher tortoise is a land animal, so never put it into water. And don't forget it is illegal to harm a gopher tortoise, its eggs or its burrow."

You also can help by using the Florida Gopher Tortoise app to report gopher tortoise sightings and learn about the species.

Gopher tortoises are found in all 67 Florida counties, but need plenty of sandy, sunny habitats with an open tree canopy to thrive and survive. The FWC's Wildlife Management Area system, which is celebrating its 75th anniversary this year, provides habitat for gopher tortoises. Local governments and private landowners, including farmers, foresters and ranchers, also work with the FWC to help conserve and restore gopher tortoise habitat.

On the Gopher Tortoise Day website, you can access many resources, including a resolution template for your community to adopt Gopher Tortoise Day, a guide to living with gopher tortoises, gopher tortoises and road safety and ideas for kids' activities, such as build a burrow instructions and the Gopher Tortoise Field Trip Guide.

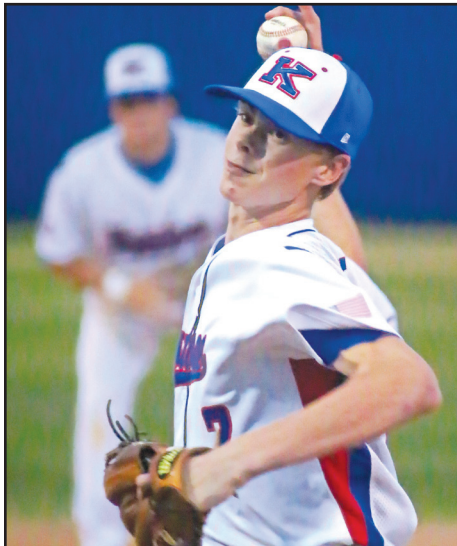

“He didn’t say much all season, just did his job,” said Fleming Island coach Frank Pontore. “Although I would have liked a four point lead at halftime, I was less nervous in a lot of our second halves because of Reed. He found a way for us. And he comes back next year.”

Davis, set to attend Jacksonville University after Fleming Island, has plenty of friends around him from the Golden Eagle lineup that have been selected to the Clay

Today All County boys soccer first team including forwards Mark Suhrer and Marcus Murphy, both instrumental in creating the three-way threat from midfield to goal that caused chaos on opposing defense. Murphy, with an area high 23 assists plus 17 goals, offered speed and daring footwork while Suhrer, with 11 goals and seven assists, was the cerebrally-precise guy who found slivers of opportunity to take advantage of which included a game-changing first goal header in the championship game 4-0 win over Doral Academy.

From Keystone Heights, senior forward Jesus Perez was an equally adept goal scorer with his 45 goals and his prowess up front put the Indians into the district and region playoffs under coach Trevor Waters.

School. “We got him some regular lifting shoes and he is doing alright with them. He’s going to be in a fight though.”

In the 129 pound division, where Beall finished third in 2016 with a 430 total, Beall comes in with a total of 440 with a region title.

In that 129 weight class, the top seed for the state meet is D’Marques Johnson, a senior at Cedar Creek Christian, who is just five pounds up at 445. Johnson was seventh in 2016 with a 405 total.

Joining Beall in 129 will be four lifters all within five pounds of each other with three qualifiers hitting the 445 total and Beall at 440.

“It will be who has the better day,” said Dickinson. “Taylor is a tough competitor and doesn’t like to lose, but I’m sure the others are tough too. It’ll be tense.”

Also in 129 are Clay High senior Shane Ballesta at 390 and Ridgeview High freshman Rolando Gray at 370.

“Rolando wasn’t a surprise, he’s had a great year and has been working hard with us since the summer,” said Ridgeview coach Cameron Porch. “Both guys (Gray and senior Jonathan McDow at 238), num-

bers were on the move the week of regions so we are trying to ride that wave up to state and see if we can get them to peak on Saturday.”

For Orange Park’s Bailes at 238, who returns to the state meet with his first region title and a 605 total, the target will be Cardinal Mooney’s Dillon O’Neill, the runnerup last year at 675, who comes in at 695. Bailes’ total in 2016 was 580. Ridgeview’s

Jonathan McDow will also be in the 238 division with a 600 total. Both Bailes and McDow have a shot at a top six medal with nine of the top 10 lifters situated between 600 and 625 pounds.

“McDow has a chance to place if he has a solid day which would be awesome for him being his senior year,” said Porch.

Also among the Keystone Heights qualifiers is senior Rian Prieto at 199 who returns to athletics in general after a season ending knee injury during football season. Prieto enters with a 550 total against the top seed of 625 from Seth Bradshaw of Pedro Menendez High School.

“Rian Prieto has had two knee reconstructions within the last 18 months, but was cleared to compete at maximum effort on March 23, two days before the regional finals on March 25,” said Keystone Heights coach Lantz Lowery. “He is the best leader in the weightroom.”

In the unlimited division, Keystone Heights offensive lineman Matthew White got tabbed to advance with his 665 total with teammate Dan Dodd just out of the list totals at 585. Top seed is Interlachen’s Joel Makatura, the runnerup last year at 700 who comes in with a 725 total. Makatura’s older brother, Jared Makatura, won four straight titles (2011-14). In the weight class is also Orange Park High’s Shawn Bizzell who finished fourth last year at 690 and comes in with a 685 total from regions.

The rest of the Keystone Heights lineup includes Brandon Spivey (139) who returns to the state meet with a 465 total with the top seed at 480. Spivey has teammate David Spivey also in at 395.

“All of our lifters have to hit their lifts, nothing spectacular just be steady and we will have a chance,” said Lowery. “Madison looks the best, they are really strong. Bradford has the kids to win it all as well so does Baker County.”

At 169, Keystone Heights senior Zachary Blalock comes in at 545 with the top seed at 590, Zion Barber of nearby Bradford County High.

Region champion Justin Raysin, a senior at Keystone Heights, enters as the fourth seed at 580 with Kima McDaniel, of Madison County, sixth in 2016 at 575,

the top seed at an impressive 660 pounds. Hunter Collins, a senior, joins Raysin with a 515 total making the cut.

At 219, Keystone Heights senior Nolin Robertson advanced with a 570 total, but top seed Jeff Brown of West Florida High, is at a 690 total. Clay High’s Marcus Jones, a linebacker and fullback, comes in at 610. Jones was sixth in 2016 with a 605 total.

In the 2A meet, set for Fri., April 7, Fleming Island junior Tyler Nguyen, eighth in 2016 with a 560 total, improved to 620 for a region title and a number two seed. On top of the 154 weight class is Choctawhatchee senior Justin Scott at 645.

“Tyler has placed first in every competition/invitational in which he has competed,” said Fleming Island coach Craig Nosse. “Tyler still has a chance to achieve his goals of winning a state championship and setting a new state record on the clean and jerk. It is incredible that he is only a junior and will be back next year no matter what happens.”

At 183, Oakleaf High junior Jakobie Baker sits as second seed with a 635 total behind leader and 2016 runnerup at 169, Josh Placecki of St. Cloud’s 700 total. Baker is grouped with four lifters at 635 all with a shot at a top six medal. Also in 183 is Oakleaf senior Anthony Laskowski who totaled 600.

“Jakobie has a real good shot standing high on the medal stand,” said Oakleaf High coach Dana Arthur. “If Anthony has a great day, he will be standing on the medal stand.”

Two impressive top seeds; Kamario Bell, a senior at Columbia at 199, and Graylon Johnson, a senior at Choctawhatchee and the defending 238 champion, come in with immense totals of 730 and 810 pounds, respectively. In those two groups, Fleming Island’s Jason Manalo enters with a 620 total in 199. Bell, a favorite in 2016, failed to total last year. In the 238, Middleburg’s Brent Caviness and Oakeaf’s Eric Rand are in at 610 and 615, respectively.

“It’s always awesome when seniors come out and lift,” said Arthur. “Usually they get ‘senioritis’, but Eric has done good job working and staying focused on his goals.”

In the lightweight classes, at 119, Middleburg’s Tylr Braswell totaled 370 and sits behind top seed Andy Montalvo of Columbia’s 470. Braswell was seventh in 2016.

At 139, Fleming Island’s D.J. Pimiento enters at 445 with University High’s J.D. Brandon holding a 530 total.

In 169, Fleming Island senior Franco Bello enters at 560 with leader Derek Beauchamp of Spruce Creek at top seed at 630. Bello improved from a best total of 545 in 2016.

“Jason, Franco and DJ are also extremely strong and dedicated kids but are a few pounds away from being able to challenge for a state championship in their respective classes,” said Nosse. “I do expect for each of them to compete for a medal and finish somewhere in the top six in their classes. If we go down there and execute our lifts, I feel very confident this will happen.”

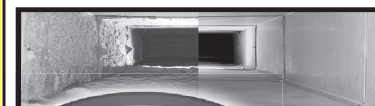

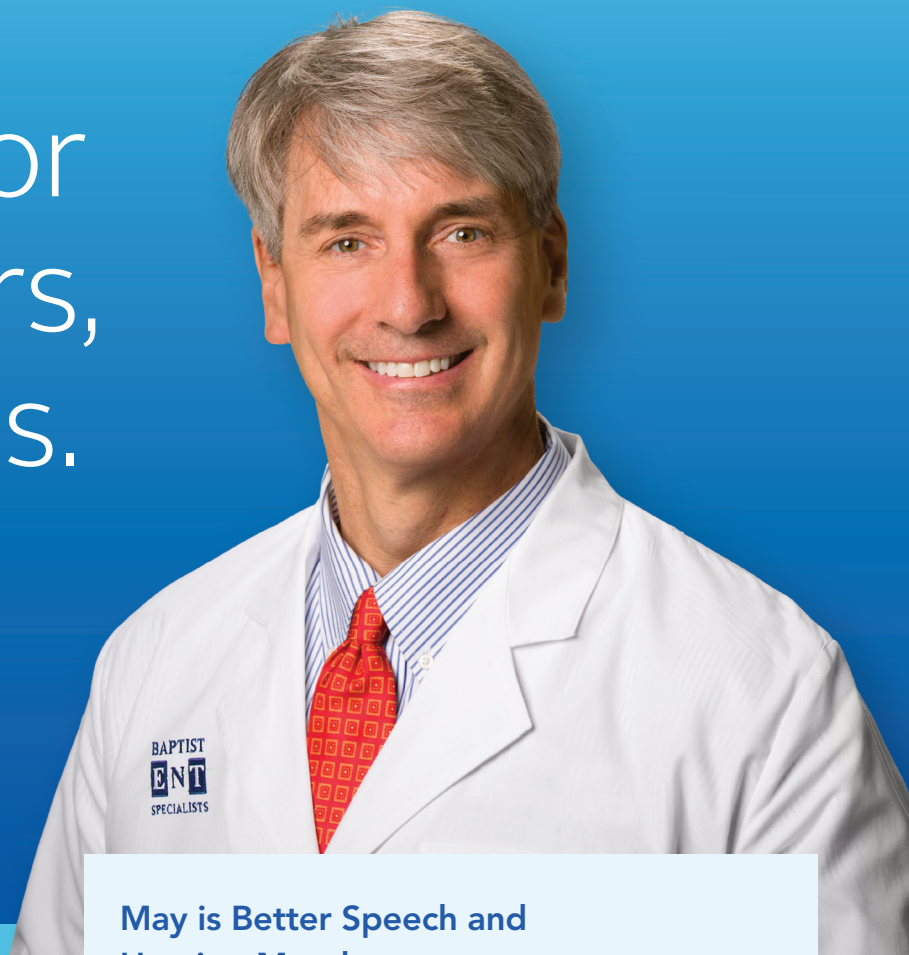
