Historical marker unveiled by county officials

FLEMING ISLAND – Although the National Register of Historic Places recognized its significance in 1973, St. Margaret’s Episcopal Church’s original chapel is now recognized as a significant Clay County historic site.

The Clay County Historic Preservation Board unveiled a new historic marker in front of the church on Sept. 30 marking the role that the church and Margaret Seton Fleming played in the early life of Clay County. More than 80 people attended an unveiling ceremony at the church that was built in 1897 in coordination with Episcopal Bishop John F. Young and named after

Super Mario inflatable can stay

\$19 M road upgrade planned for CR 220

DOCTORS INLET – A \$19 million plan to redesign an often-clogged section of County Road 220 from Knight Boxx Road to Shamrock Drive could begin as early as 2021, according to county and state transportation officials.

Florida Department of Transportation officials held a community information session on Sept. 28 to gather public input from motorists and residents who travel and live near that stretch of roadway. The initial plans call for adding two new lanes, rehabbing the bridge over Little Black Creek and adding sidewalks and bike lanes. Highpoint Community Church hosted the community event.

Many who drive on the stretch of CR 220 can share similar tales of the often-congested road. Traffic bottlenecks happen when the road shifts from four lanes to two lanes shortly before crossing the Little Black Creek Bridge.

Officials also aim to add two turn lanes to the Henley Road intersection turning south in an effort to speed traffic there as well.

As far as the bridge, state transportation officials aim to coordinate planning and design for the bridge and help orchestrate the flow of county and state dollars with more oversight over the project.

Final medical marijuana ordinance approved

ORANGE PARK – The Town of Orange Park has become the first municipality in Clay County to allow Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers.

The change comes after council members voted 3-2 Tuesday to approve an ordinance after almost a year of intermittent debate on the topic.

The new ordinance provides for pharmacies and MMTCs to locate in the commercial intensive, commercial general and planned unit development zoning districts.

Under state law, MMTCs cannot be placed within 500 feet of a primary or secondary school and cannot be zoned differently than pharmacies with zoning.

To give the council more say in where MMTCs can locate, the ordinance ensures pharmacies must maintain a 500-foot buffer zone between other pharmacies. This comes with the caveat of providing a pathway for variances from this rule to avoid costly litigation over the ordinance.

The 500-foot buffer zone is a similar tactic employed by the town council for gas stations. The original idea for that buffer zone was to avoid the town becoming a pass-through diesel highway.

Commercial general storefronts mainly include roadside businesses along Park Avenue from Loring Avenue to Kingsley Avenue and from Kingsley Avenue to Doctors Lake Drive. Commercial intensive zoning districts generally cluster together near



the north end of Orange Park.

The town does not track occupied storefronts by zoning category, so it is difficult to ascertain exactly how much available space for an MMTC exists in the densely populated town.

The ordinance was accompanied by anxiety on part of Council Member Ron Raymond, who has said he voted for Amendment 2, the 2016 state Constitutional amendment that permits the use of medical cannabis.

"I believe that our town is too small," Raymond said. "I believe that the surrounding municipalities and political subdivisions have decided to try to kick the ball down the road...An ordinance that prohibits can always be changed, but an

ordinance that allows cannot be changed... We have way more questions about this than I'm comfortable with...we really don't know what's going to happen."

The ordinance's passage comes as the city of Green Cove Springs in August extended a one-year moratorium on MMTCs and before the Board of County Commissioners and the City of Keystone Heights discussed the subject in their chambers.

The BCC placed a one-year temporary moratorium on MMTCs last January. That moratorium is set to expire after January. County Attorney Courtney Grimm said commissioners have yet to provide direction to staff on what they would like researched on the topic.

Commissioners could either choose to

outsource most of the discussion to staff or a board and await a report and recommendation, or take the conversation up themselves.

"The board will be considering it prior to that time," Grimm said. "I'm sure it'll be coming up soon, especially now that Orange Park has passed it...I'm sure that they'll be talking about it in the next few months."

Some council members expressed worries that the town would become the sole municipality in the county that provided for MMTCs in its code. That reality has yet to materialize, but the topic is being debated county-wide.

"We're currently still under a moratorium," said Scott Kornegay, Keystone Heights city manager. "I attended, along with the city clerk, a symposium at the Florida League of Cities last month and we are in the process of putting together an analysis for the city council and we hope to make a decision in the next probably three months on how to move forward."

The Town of Orange Park's moratorium expired Oct. 1, two days before council passed the ordinance. As the time comes for other municipalities to have the discussion regarding MMTCs after moratoriums expire, municipalities will inevitably have to make the decision on whether to allow or ban dispensaries completely, under the state rules passed in the 2017 Florida Legislature.

Fighting complacency post-Irma

ORANGE PARK – Disaster preparedness coordination last spring helped organize area church and volunteer response prior to the destruction brought by Hurricane Irma rather than after the damage was done.

A roundtable held in May between area pastors and county emergency officials organized by the nonprofit network Clay SafetyNet Alliance helped forge a lasting discussion regarding the county's disaster response that not only marshaled more volunteers for storm relief, but allowed for heightened coordination between agencies that in the years prior seemed sequestered from each other.

André Van Heerden with the Clay SafetyNet said the response has been humbling.

According to Van Heerden, roughly a

dozen churches and 19 out of state entities have helped or continue to help with clean-up and relief from Hurricane Irma. This is compared to five volunteers Van Heerden said helped after last October's Hurricane Matthew.

"A lot of the churches have stepped up providing homes, a lot of churches are providing volunteer groups to help muck out, to help cleanup, to help the elderly trim trees that are around their home and its really been an all hands-on deck for the community. It's been a great showing, the community has really stepped up."

According to John Ward, Clay County Emergency Management director, the hurricane damaged 858 homes and destroyed 275 of them.

Ward concurs with Van Heerden in that the May meeting help create a new level of awareness among the Clay County faith

community.

"We still have a lot of outside national-level volunteer groups that are in-theater in the county assisting us, but I think with that meeting that we had – that Pastor André coordinated – it was a new level of local support getting involved earlier rather than post and then coming in to help. I think they were involved much earlier," Ward said.

Ward praised churches efforts of talking at the beginning of hurricane season rather than waiting until after a storm hit

Park Ranger Earl shares love of outdoors with young readers

KEYSTONE HEIGHTS — For about 10 years, Park Ranger Steve Earl has worked with local libraries to bring kids and books out to the park where he creates a fun environment where children can learn about the outdoors and respect for public land.

The Sept. 30 event “Read With the Trees” was created as part of national literacy month and allows Mike Roess Gold Head Branch State Park to partner with other community organizations, which in this case was the Melrose Public Library.

“This is a way to promote libraries and reading, while having an outdoor experience as well,” Earl said. “Until a person has a personal experience with nature, they don’t understand. When they have, that’s when they’re going to be good stewards of it.”

The event started with an introduction and a brief storytime including readings from library volunteers, Earl, and children’s author Donna Henderson. This year marked the third in a row that Henderson participated in Read with the Trees. Earl said he selected Henderson because she is a local writer.

“She’s a local author and we wanted to promote local talent,” Earl said.

Henderson read a manuscript from her newest book, called “One.” The manuscript was accompanied by some rough illustrations that will be finalized and included in the book when it is finally sent to press.

The book, which is her second, focuses on the idea that each and every child should feel loved. For Henderson, this is the most important thing children can be taught.

“I hear of so many people, that, as adults, see problems that stem from not knowing deep inside that they are loved,”

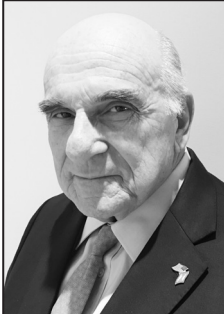
International medical graduates good for America

Doctors are becoming an endangered species. By 2030, the United States could be short 43,000 primary-care physicians.

U.S. medical schools have acknowledged the problem, but they're not doing much to solve it. Among last year's graduates of American M.D. programs, fewer than 9 percent went into family-medicine residencies.

Yet, these institutions are trying to keep graduates of international medical schools – even those with training in primary care – from practicing in the United States.

That has to change. International medical graduates are a vital part of America's physician force. Closing the U.S. primary-care gap will require more of them – not fewer.

U.S. medical schools have done little to address the issue. Two-thirds of graduates of U.S. med schools pursue careers in specialty care.

It's hard to blame them. Specialists typically make more money. In 2015, the median annual salary for a specialist was roughly \$425,000, compared to \$250,000 for a primary care doctor.

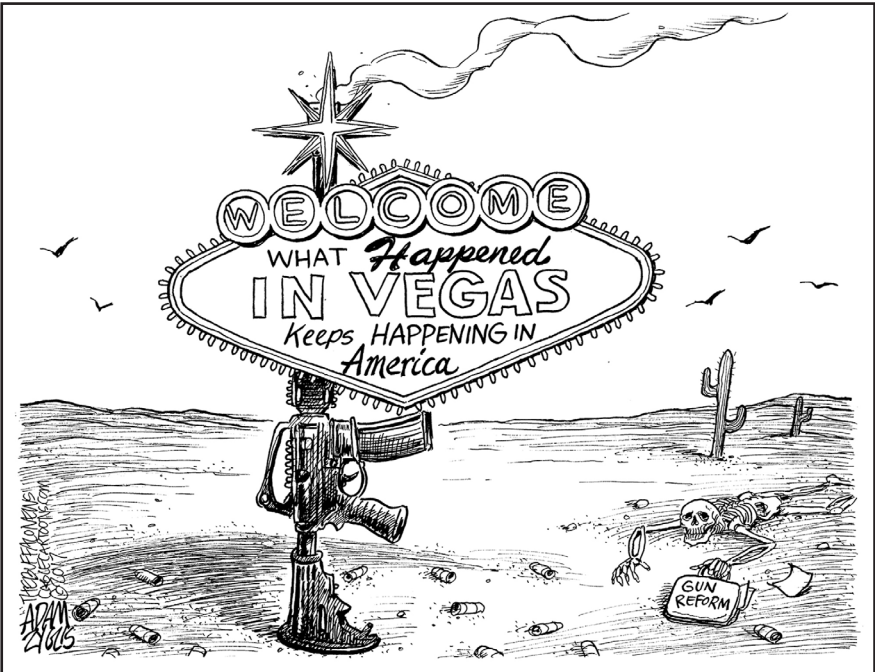

Unfortunately, at this juncture in Clay County, it seems most everyone has morphed into a microwave in that we all want what we're asking for "right now."

If storm debris cleanup were as simple as programming a digital screen set to heat on high for 3:30 for your Stouffer's lunch entrée, life would be a dream, aye?

But, that's not reality. It's more like the stuff of a TV sitcom.

Drive through any neighborhood along Black Creek and, if your spirits aren't moved by the downright devastation, please go get counseling now. As many as 1,400 of our neighbors, brothers, sisters, retirees, teachers, endured flooding in their homes that no human had the capability to predict would come our way.

Ask anyone in county government right now what they want for Christmas, chances are it would be a new County Road 218 bridge at Black Creek.

And Black Creek was not the only waterway in Clay County to flood homes. We've all seen the pictures of the St. Johns River coming over its banks at Club Continental in Orange Park. But what about nearby creeks and so forth?

San Robar Drive in Orange Park is not usually a headline grabber in times of heavy rains, however, this storm flooded homes in an enclave here. A

friend of mine has spent the past three weeks trying to get his family back to normal by cutting out sheetrock and everything else damaged by the floodwaters. He also lost a vintage collectible car.

And like him, every Clay County resident who cleaned up fallen tree limbs and other debris from Hurricane Irma sits and awaits the day the trucks will roll by with a crew to carry it all away.

Here's the rub.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency has yet to pay local governments' claims they made for reimbursement of costs associated with last year's Hurricane Matthew. So, now they are plodding along trying to pick up as much debris as they can without breaking their bank accounts.

Many are hoping that FEMA will come through with Matthew payments that they can then turn around and use to conduct Irma cleanup. Do you get an idea now of how long this is going to take?

The county has also contracted with outside debris cleanup companies in hopes of speeding up the cleanup program. And here's an unreported aspect of that. Clay County's August 2017 unemployment rate was 3.7 percent, which experts usually refer to as "full employment."

Full employment is the market "condition in which virtually all who are able and willing to work are employed."

Another friend whose dock was decimated by the storm told me that one company said it would be six months before they could even get to his house and measure his dock for a written estimate, much less do any actual repair work.

And chances are high, that the dock companies are having a tough time finding skilled labor needed to get all of their

attacked and killed their owner, Tina Marie Canterbury, 42, of Middleburg.

So, it's no surprise that U.S. med schools are failing to turn out enough primary-care doctors to meet the nation's demand.

It is surprising, however, that they're trying to prevent international medical schools from supplying the doctors that America needs.

The leaders of several medical schools in New York recently called for restricting international medical students from U.S. clinical training sites and denying them federal loans. They claim that students educated abroad receive subpar training — and are unqualified to practice in the United States.

That makes little sense. Nearly one-quarter of active physicians in the United States graduated from international medical schools.

International medical graduates are held to the same standards as their American counterparts. Both must pass the United States Medical License Examination. In fact, test-takers from the international

school where I work, St. George's University, pass the exam at equal to or higher rates than their U.S.-educated peers.

In many cases, international medical graduates deliver a higher standard of care than doctors educated in the United States. A study by researchers at Harvard's School of Public Health found that Medicare patients treated by internationally trained doctors had lower 30-day mortality rates following hospital admission than those treated by American-educated physicians.

Critics of international med schools assert that their students take clinical-training and residency slots from U.S. students. But most international medical graduates are Americans.

U.S. citizens and permanent residents make up 74 percent of St. George's 2016 entering class and 83 percent of the student body at Ross University, on the Caribbean island of Dominica.

These students should have as much a right to practice in their home country as graduates of U.S. schools.

In fact, America should be begging international medical graduates to come. They're more likely to practice where

there's the greatest need for physicians.

More than 56 percent of Caribbean-educated medical students — and 75 percent at St. George's University alone — choose primary care specialties, compared with less than one-third of U.S. graduates. Forty-one percent of third-year residents in internal medicine studied at an international medical school.

International medical graduates are also 70 percent more likely to practice in non-urban areas. And they take on more Medicaid and Medicare patients than U.S.-trained doctors.

America faces a shortage of primary-care doctors. Yet the U.S. medical establishment seems hell-bent on turning away thousands of qualified graduates eager to fill that shortage.

Such antipathy toward doctors who have trained abroad isn't just irrational; it's hazardous to the health of Americans.

At the end of the day, Earl knows that he and his fellow rangers can only carry the torch at Gold Head for so long. He continues to promote nature to local kids who might someday come up through the parks and devote their lives to protecting the land just as he has chosen to do.

"They're the ones that will inherit our Earth, and our parks," Earl said. "I think that it's really important to instill a connection with nature [in children] so our parks endure for years to come."

“You should’ve seen them when they walked in and saw their dads,” said Principal Becky Wilkerson. “We really wanted dads to feel like they’re just as important and needed as our moms.”

Wilkerson said she received 88 responses from dads interested in attending the special event. Some dads worked double, or even triple duty, with multiple kids in multiple grade levels, and stuck around for consecutive lunch periods. Some dads brought their kids a favorite meal, and others tried out the school’s menu for themselves.

“Right now, the bridge over [Little] Black Creek is structurally deficient,” said David Tyler, an FDOT project manager. “We need to replace the bridge, that’s the main driving fact behind this. And obviously the Henley Road and 220 is a real bottleneck and we’re seeing a lot of growth in that area so it’s really to just add some capacity there and help facilitate growth along CR 220.”

FDOT estimates that between 2016 and 2040, the number of daily drivers between the impacted stretch of road will grow from nearly 20,000 to 48,000.

Tyler said FDOT does not foresee that any businesses will have any trouble getting into their businesses during the construction of the project.

The county and FDOT are still in the planning and design phases of the project, but hope to split the bill roughly 50-50 between state and county coffers.

“...We’re doing the road portion of it and the DOT is doing the bridge portion,” said Stephanie Kopelousos, county manager.

The Clay County Board of County Commissioners identified the plan to upgrade this particular section of road was last April. Commissioners cited the long wait times on the road and the expected growth in the area as chief concerns to prioritize

the project. The county aims to eventually four lane the road all the way to State Road 21, however this project only covers the approximately mile and a half stretch between Shamrock and Knight Boxx.

County Commissioner Gayward Hendry gave traffic jams on sections of CR 220 the dubious title of “hideous” in an April meeting designed to identify transportation improvement projects for the 2016 fiscal year through the 2020 fiscal year.

Other road projects on the commission’s priority list involve widening County

Road 220 to six lanes from College Drive eastward to U.S. Highway 17 and widen County Road 209 to four lanes from U.S. 17 to Sandridge Road – among other projects.

Father unites with daughter for first time

JACKSONVILLE — Anticipation mounted as the first of two planes landed on the runway at Naval Air Station Jacksonville Monday. Families began the walk across the tarmac toward the taxiing P-8A Poseidon aircraft as the second plane touched down.

The two planes held about 40 members of the VP-16 “War Eagles,” men and women returning home after almost seven months running support missions out of Naval Air Station Sigonella in Sicily, Italy.

While in Italy, members of VP-16 offered support for the USS George H. W. Bush Carrier strike group as part of Operation Inherent Resolve, fighting the Islamic

State in the Mediterranean, according to base officials. The group completed a total of around 4,500 flight hours during the deployment.

Among the men were husbands and fathers, six of whom would see their newborn children for the first time after stepping off the planes. Starke resident Jacob Bennett was one of those first-time fathers. Jogging from the plane, he scooped up his five-month-old daughter Ellie out of his wife’s arms, lifted her up, kissed her and held her to his jumpsuited chest for the first time.

Bennett struggled to find words to describe the feeling, overwhelmed with the compounded happiness of returning home from deployment and meeting his daughter

for the first time in person.

“This is really a new feeling,” Bennett said. “This is the most exciting thing that’s ever happened in my life. It’s fabulous.”

Bennett shifted the child to his hip and kissed his wife as the young family prepared to go home together for the first time ever.

Across the runway, Middleburg residents Kriston Smit, her daughter Lezlie Baker, and one-year-old son John Smit reunited with Brian Smit. The family has more experience with deployments, but for Brian, this was his first time leaving his young son, and the first time they were apart for a serious weather event like Hurricane Irma.

“I was nervous because it was our first storm without him,” Kriston said. “He was calling us and wanted us to evacuate. It was really scary but we talked up until we lost internet.”

The family and their home made it through the storm, and with Brian home,

their focus is now on spending time together and hosting a welcome home party with friends and family. However, Brian has some favorite family activities that are top priority when he returns home.

“What does daddy do when he comes home?” Kriston said.

“Watch Star Trek!” Lezlie said, “And building LEGOs with me!”

“He usually wants to go to Chipotle, too,” Kriston said.

NAS Jax does what it can to make the spacious hangars feel comfortable for visiting families. This homecoming saw a couple dozen children, all full of energy and clad in American flag T-shirts or youth-sized jumpsuits. Sailors provided a bouncy house for the kids, as well as a huge area featuring a material that kids and cargo plane staff love: bubble wrap. The wrap was taped to the floor and offered kids, and some adults – who snuck over to pop a bubble or two – the chance at an almost endless sea of poppable bubbles.

keep the inflatable led him all the way to the United States Middle District Court.

During a mediation Sept. 22, legal counsel for both the shop and the Town of Orange Park agreed to put away their disagreements and allow Fisher to keep his inflatable Mario up penalty-free until officials can change the sign code to provide for similar inflatables.

According to Fisher, both new and old customers alike have come into his shop to rejoice about his victory.

“There’s a lot of congratulations,” Fisher said. “They’re happy it’s back. We’ve actually had a few new customers come in because of the Mario. It’s already been successful having it up. Ever since Irma happened, we’ve been pretty slow – which is pretty normal – there were important things people needed to spend their money on. We put Mario up and we just had a blowup day that Friday. It was a huge day.”

Fisher and his pro-bono council from the Virginia-based law firm Institute for Justice fought what they saw as an unfair and unconstitutional prohibition on inflatables within the town’s land development regulations.

Fishers’ attorneys contended the prohibition violated the First Amendment.

“The First Amendment does not play favorites. It protects everyone’s right to speak out, including small businesses,” said IJ Senior Attorney Robert Former in an April press release that announced their intention to counsel Fisher through the litigation.

Last September, Town officials contended that the inflatable Mario did not meet the town’s sign ordinance codes and would fine Fisher \$100 for every day the inflatable remained.

Fisher took the problem to the town’s special magistrate, and was denied an exception to the rule.

Previously, the town prohibited certain inflatables, as town code considers them portable signs. The town allowed holiday-themed inflatables however, and only banned displaying inflatables that relate specifically to a business.

The Institute for Justice filed the lawsuit against the town in early April.

Although town officials cannot comment on what was said or agreed upon during mediation specifically, Town Attorney Sam Garrison said litigating the issue any further is no longer among the town’s top concerns after the last month’s Hurricane Irma.

“There are a lot of really pressing needs in the town right now for resources, and in the hierarchy of priorities within the town, this just didn’t make sense to be something that we wanted to spend a lot of time, energy and resources fighting when ultimate-

ly we’re on the same team. We want this small business to succeed like we want every small business to succeed in the Town of Orange Park,” Garrison said.

Gene Broke Gaming held a sale on items storewide to celebrate Mario’s return. Anyone who takes a photo with the Mario and posts it to Facebook with a location tag would receive 10 percent off their purchase. That sale ended at the end of August.

Fisher said the next step is to shuffle around some fixtures in the store. Over the last year, he has knocked out a wall in his previously cramped storefront and added more storage space. That freed up an additional space to hold local video game tournaments and try-before-you-buy opportunities.

Wherever the future of his shop is, however, he said he would stick with just the one inflatable.

“I’m not going to go pop up six inflatables just to give the middle finger to the [town], that’s not what I want to do, I’m not here to make them mad, I’m here to grow and if I grow, the town makes more money...it’s a win-win,” Fisher said.

“I want the town to win – I want the town to have an awesome game store. I grew up here, I was born here and it’s home. I want my home to have a place like this. I want it to have the inflatable Mario.”

Fisher’s lawsuit did not ask for monetary damages. Still, the litigation drained town resources.

Town officials amended its 2016-2017 budget last month to include an extra \$27,000 in legal fees from extra costs incurred during Fisher’s litigation and another lawsuit by the owners of the now-closed Parkway Inn.

Former Town Manager Jim Hanson shifted unused dollars budgeted for a separate fund to pay for the discrepancy.

As far as the work hours needed to edit the sign code is concerned, Garrison said town staff are currently looking to revise the sign code already to bring election sign rules in the town more in line with state regulations.

Garrison he expects the revision to provide for Fisher’s Mario inflatable and the revisions to election sign regulations to be packaged together and put before the council in the next few months.

Alcohol a go at city parks

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – As expected, the Green Cove Springs City Council voted 5-0 to lift its ban on intoxicating beverages within city parks and properties at its Oct. 3 meeting.

In another unanimous vote, the council agreed to expedite the cleanup process in the wake of Hurricane Irma.

The alcohol ordinance update, which went through its second reading, lifts the current ban on alcoholic beverages within city parks and properties. The city’s move follows similar action the Clay County Board of County Commissioners took earlier this year to allow controlled alcohol sales at the county fairgrounds. The city based its ordinance on the one drafted and approved by the BCC, but left more restrictions in place and maintained slightly more control over what

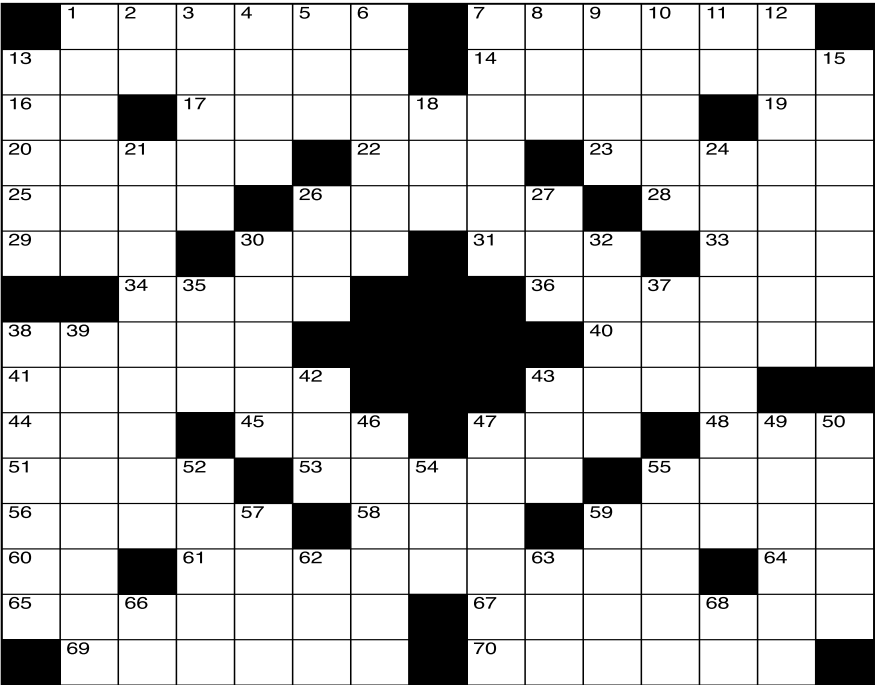
events can bring beer and wine into the city’s parks.

“Sale just kind of connotes profit making,” council member Van Royal said.

The council agreed to allow beer and wine, but opted to remove any language that implies the beverages can be sold. Removal of the word sale from all wording included in the ordinance will prevent organizations from attempting to set up for-profit beer gardens at city-sponsored events. The city will also decide on a case-by-case basis who will be able to serve alcohol at their event. The topic was brought up initially by Sandra Royal, the organizer and director for the CalaVida Arts Festival, which takes place in mid-October. At the event, Royal had hoped to serve guests two drinks maximum using drink tickets that would be traded for wine glasses instead of cash.

Saint Margaret of Scotland. “Historical markers take history out of the textbooks and they put it where you live, where you work, where you drive,” said Cynthia Stone, member of the Clay County Historic Preservation Board.

Stone said the new marker “joins 420 markers nationwide that honor women” for their role in their local communities, as well as another 7,648 historical markers nationwide that note the significance of churches. Stone said churches are much more than houses of worship.

“They are the centers of the community. So many early communities grew up around a church. When the church came, there was growth. The church is the heart of the community. St. Margaret’s Church was a labor of love by Margaret Fleming,” Stone said.

Stone said that while Margaret Fleming’s story is not printed in national history books, her story and her significance to Clay County is in local history books.

“She was a role model of kindness and grace and mercy that we would do well to emulate today,” Stone said.

Stone recognized fellow board member Julia Cramer who pushed to have the marker erected. Cramer said when she moved to Fleming Island in 1982, she read author Eugenia Price’s historical novel,

“Margaret’s Story,” which became an inspiration to her. She said the marker took about 18-to-24 months to coordinate with the Florida Department of State, which under state law, gives final approval for such markers to be placed in the state.

“It’s a visual, so anybody passing by will now see it. This church gets a lot of traffic from people just coming to look at the cemetery. Now they can come to read the marker,” Cramer said.

The church sits in what was once Hibernia Plantation, which was founded in 1790 by Irish immigrant George Fleming on a 1,000-acre land grant from the governor of East Florida. When George Fleming died in 1821, his son Lewis Fleming

inherited Hibernia. He had three children with his first wife, Cuban-born Augustina Cortes Fleming, who died in 1832 during childbirth. In 1837, George Fleming married Margaret Seton of Fernandina and went on to have seven children together.

Jokingly referring to himself as an “out-law,” Scott Ritchie of Austin, Texas said while it’s great to see the dedication of the new county historical marker, the best news to come out of the Sept. 30 event was that the Episcopal Diocese plans to reopen the church within the next year.

“That just warms my heart. We all want to see St. Margaret’s open again and the excitement is more around that, I would say in the conversations we’ve had. The Diocese is involved in this, they’re saying

they’re going to open it again and we love the historic recognition, but even more, everybody in the family would love to see [the church] open again,” said Ritchie whose wife Margot Fleming Ritchie is the great-great-granddaughter of George Fleming. Ritchie, who still owns a home in Hibernia, said his children were baptized in St. Margaret’s historic chapel.

Ritchie describes himself as an historian and has been researching and working on a book about the Fleming family for years. He said the working title, “Stick to the old place: the Flemings of Fleming Island,” comes from a statement Charles Seton Fleming, Margaret’s oldest son, uttered to his mother upon the death of his father, Lewis Fleming.

“I think it’s all a positive influence to keep the church as it is because at some point it becomes an historical place, more than a place of worship. It’s too bad, in a way – I think it can be a place of worship – but it’s going to be remembered more as a historical place in the local community,” said Ken Keefe of Jacksonville, a direct descendant of Margaret Fleming who attended the event.

While he has lived in Hibernia for 30 years, Connecticut native and Fleming family descendant Richard Austin has high hopes for preserving the enclave as Clay County continues to grow.

“Hopefully, there’s that preservation that can stay in a small little area as the world grows around it,” Austin said.

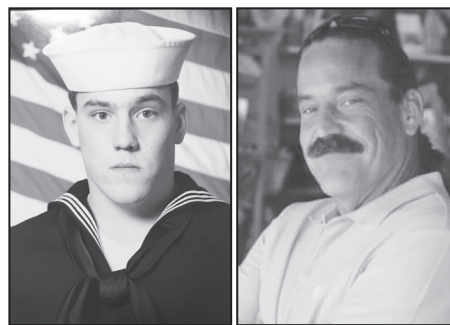

The wine has been donated for the event and will serve as an atmospheric element to a pre-dinner reception at a festival VIP event.

The council voted unanimously to approve the ordinance after changes to the language to remove any implication that alcohol can be sold for profit, in addition to a few changes City Attorney Jim Arnold mentioned after reviewing the drafted ordinance prior to the meeting's start time.

can," said Mayor Mitch Timberlake. "It's a whole lot harder to start off loose and try to come back and draw it in."

In other business, City Manager Danielle Judd added a supplemental emergency item to the agenda, asking the council for direction on how to go about speeding up the post-hurricane cleanup in and around the city.

"Staff and public works are doing a remarkable job on this debris removal but it's just not moving fast enough," Judd said.

Judd asked the council for approval to bring in additional trucks that can be used to haul away debris left behind in the storm's wake. The trucks will be contracted with on an as-needed basis and will cost the city extra money, which may or may not be reimbursed through the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

"I'm in complete support of this," Van Royal said. "Whatever it takes, Madam City Manager, I'm going to support you."

Following Royal's support for the emergency item, other council members indicated that the cleanup needs to be dealt with as soon as possible, and decided with another unanimous vote.

Error leads to sewage spill

ORANGE PARK – Operator error at an Orange Park wastewater treatment facility led to the discharge of more than 65,000 gallons of partially treated wastewater into the St. Johns River Sept. 28.

The water at the Miller Street Wastewater Treatment Plant had only been treated biologically by the time it was discharged. An on-call operator failed to answer three alert calls from the wastewater treatment system shortly after midnight.

Typically, wastewater is first treated biologically by microorganisms, then filtered and treated with chlorine. The alert sent to the on-call employee overnight directed the employee to switch from an empty chlorine tank.

“The person on call received three calls from our answering service then fell back to sleep,” said Dennis Martin, wastewater superintendent with the Clay County Utility Authority. “Since he failed to respond, there was no other alarms and the chlorine depleted out and when the day shift came in, the chief operator noticed it was in alarm position.”

When the tanks were not switched, the chlorine feed failed and the system automatically discharged partially treated water into the St. Johns River.

The 65,052 gallons of wastewater likely contain high levels of fecal coliform, a bacteria that originates in the intestines of warm-blooded animals that is typically a primary indicator of potability.

Treated water is not potable – or safe to

drink – but high levels of fecal coliform can be unsafe to humans and marine life. Chlorine, likewise, endangers marine wildlife.

CCUA discharges water daily to the St. Johns River depending on the current demand for treated water. Officials typically reserve wastewater for agriculture. If the demand isn't there, the chlorine is removed from the water and the water is discharged into the river normally.

At low tide, the Miller Street plant discharges water about 800 feet off the banks of River Road from a pipe roughly 10 feet under the surface, according to Martin.

Martin said it had been years since the last time a similar event occurred at the utility. The employee in question has since been reprimanded and suspended from work for the time being.

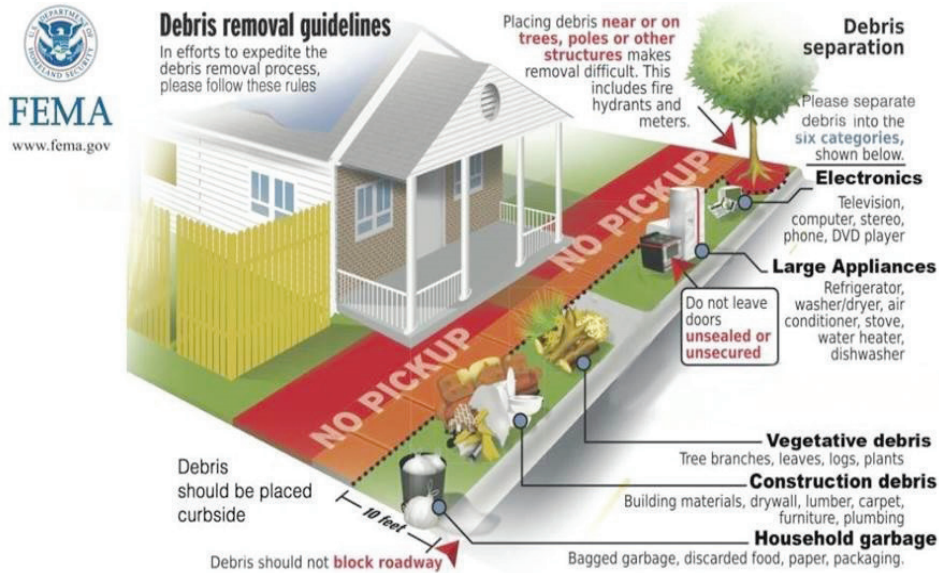
Although events like these are relatively rare, this event coupled with the myriad of toxins, runoff and pollution dumped into the river as an after effect of Hurricane Irma has conservationists worried about the health of the river.

“There's a lot of contamination in the river because we're downstream from the 100 miles of waterways and everything drains into the St. Johns,” said St. Johns Riverkeeper Lisa Rinaman. “Everything flooded during the storm. There's agricultural runoff, storm water pumps from industrial sites...it's just sort of a contaminated soup out there and we have to show extreme caution.”

The impacts of Irma, while immediately evident throughout the state, may show themselves further down the line, Rinaman said. Flooding caused septic tanks to leak sewage and fertilizer into the St. Johns River as well.

Rinaman also showed concern for superfund sites near the river and the runoff that could have washed into the St. Johns. According to the Environmental Protection Agency, there are two superfund cleanup sites along the St. Johns River.

Nutrient pollution, like those that come

pine ecosystem. 

The LGBT Community Fund, with support from an advisory board of community members, recently launched the Jacksonville-Area Community Assessment Project, a survey that aims to help the Fund learn more about the local LGBTI community. The survey is part of a research study approved by the Institutional Review Board at UCLA.

“Obtaining a comprehensive look at the LGBTI community in Jacksonville is a critical part of figuring out how we can make our community better and more welcoming, and fills a big gap as these data have not been collected before,” said Michael Meyers, president of the LGBT Community Fund.

The project is seeking participation throughout the LGBTI community. Lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and intersex

Bears become more active in fall

TALLAHASSEE – With the arrival of autumn, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission is reminding Floridians they can help prevent conflicts with black bears.

During the fall, bear appetites increase as they prepare for winter. In fact, bears require around 20,000 calories a day and will eat anything convenient. Accessing unsecured garbage often provides more calories in a shorter amount of time than what a bear can get from foraging in the woods. This attracts bears into areas where people live and work, which can lead to potentially dangerous situations.

“As bears become more active in the fall, they take the path of least resistance to find food,” said Dave Telesco, who leads the FWC’s Bear Management Program. “This draws them into neighborhoods and areas with convenient food sources, which can be dangerous for people.”

The search for food often leads bears across busy roads. Bears are most active around dusk and dawn, and therefore most vehicle-bear collisions happen



during these times of day. To reduce the risk of hitting a bear, motorists should stay alert and drive cautiously around heavily wooded areas, roads with curves and areas marked with bear warning signs.

In Florida, it is illegal to intentionally feed bears or leave out food or garbage that will attract bears and cause human-bear conflicts. If you see or suspect that someone is feeding or attracting bears, call the FWC’s Wildlife Alert Hotline at 1-888-404-FWCC (3922).

adults, 18 and older, who work, pray, play or use services in Jacksonville and live in Northeast Florida are eligible to participate. Adults who don’t identify as LGBTI but who have same-gender partners or who have a different gender identity from their assigned sex at birth are also invited to participate.

Researchers are particularly eager to make sure that subsets of the LGBTI community are appropriately accounted for in the survey.

Hundreds of LGBTI residents have al-

ready participated in the survey, which is available online at neflcommunity.com, a secure website for research studies, hosted at the University of California, Los Angeles.

to making those resources available is ensuring the agencies that provide those services are connected and can coordinate properly.

The public complacency present after Hurricane Matthew transformed over the course of a year, Van Heerdan said, from networking into planning prior before the storm.

“If you know who the players are at the table during blue skies, when gray skies come, you don’t have to start creating that, it’s already there,” Van Heerdan said.

Van Heerdan said after Clay SafetyNet Alliance invited county emergency officials to sit in with them in this networking session, his organization was invited to fill the role of what is called Emergency Service Function 15 for the county, essentially volunteer and donation coordination.

There is concern that the public will grow complacent now that Hurricane Irma has passed and the electricity switched on for most.

“This is a 100-year record event. It hasn’t happened in 100 years,” Van Heerdan said. “that both the north and the south forks of black creek flooded to in excess of

20 feet...80 percent of our county did not get affected, and within days they were back in school. Back in school, back in their jobs...they went back to work and they really weren’t affected, but 20 percent were absolutely devastated.”

“How do you get a community to rally around just a 20 percent devastation when 80 percent are kind of back to normal again and don’t really know what’s going on at ground-zero,” Van Heerdan said.

Out of state teams have provided immediate relief and some still provide their services to the community, but those teams won’t be here forever.

He said, at that point, it’s up to the community to help the community. This has become the crux of the problem. Clay SafetyNet Alliance is attempting to remove the coming community malaise via social media, traditional media sources and word of mouth.

He said despite his attempts, the inevitable has arrived.

“The complacency is already here,” he said.

The next day he could say, “It was just another ball game.”

Really important things have lasting importance!

to discuss how to mobilize teams of volunteers.

“They started to have a lot of conversations as to how they were going to get involved and how they were going to build their teams as to how they would get involved,” Ward said.

Deep into the repair process, Van Heerdan said he hopes to map each affected home using a digital tool that can determine the services each homeowner needs.

As the county moves from relief to recovery, it will mean resources such as the American Red Cross will eventually lessen. This, Van Heerdan said, is an important step – ensuring the local community has the resources to replace that gap in service.

“I’ve learned over the years that most communities already have the resources they need to solve many of their problems,” said Tom Bussey, campus pastor for Christ’s Church of Fleming Island and volunteer organizer. Bussey said the key

Autumn is upon us

Do not be fooled, fellow Floridians, by the high temperatures, heartless humidity, and merciless storms – autumn is actually here.

If you need convincing, simply walk into any retail store. There you will find Halloween, Thanksgiving, and Christmas decorations galore. Many retailers are on alert for the 2017 holidays.

Clerk: (Out of breath) “Sir, we just sold our last Iron Man mask and it’s still two weeks until Halloween!”

Manager: (Panicking) “Two weeks? Condition Cadbury! Roll out the Peeps ASAP!”

Only in America.

But marketing portents aside, there are celestial clues that autumn is here. The days have been getting shorter, the Sun’s path in the sky is lower to the ground, and the familiar seasonal constellations revisit us, just like old friends.

September 22 was the Autumnal Equinox – the first day of autumn in the Northern Hemisphere. This day represents one of only two days in a year when the Sun is on the intersection of the Ecliptic and the Celestial Equator.

Fret not, dear readers, we will sort through this.

As Earth orbits the Sun, it carves out a plane called the Ecliptic. Of course, from our terrestrial point-of-view, it appears to be the Sun revolving around us and tracing out this plane. But in science, and astronomy in particular, we must step back and consider systems from a larger perspective.

The Celestial Equator is merely the projection of Earth’s equator into space, creating another plane.

These two planes are not parallel; that is, they do not overlap each other. Earth’s rotation axis is tilted about 23.5 degrees off our orbital plane. Therefore, the Celestial



tial Equator is tilted 23.5 degrees with respect to the Ecliptic.

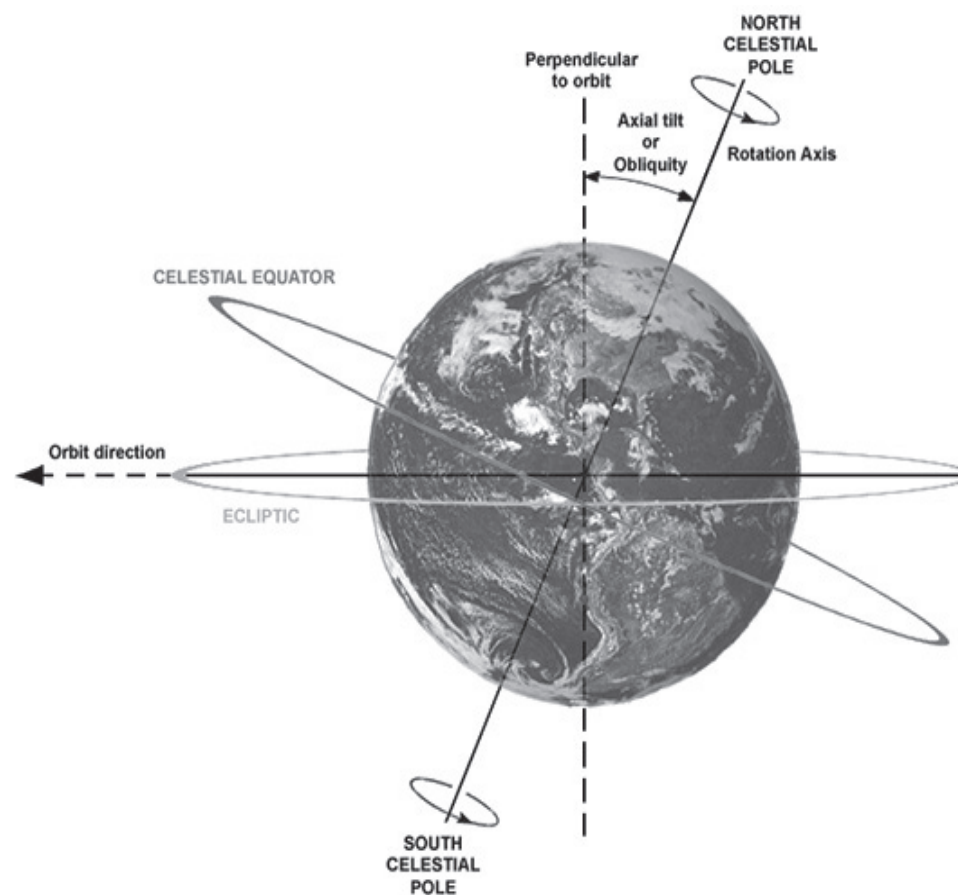
It follows, then, that as Earth orbits the Sun, there is a period when one hemisphere is tilted toward the Sun while the other hemisphere is tilted away. As the year goes on, this reverses.

It is this tilt, and not our proximity to the Sun, that gives us our seasons. In fact, during the summer months here in the Northern Hemisphere, Earth is actually farther from the Sun than during the winter months. But we are tilted toward the Sun, giving us longer days and more intense sunlight.

This tilt of Earth is evident not only in our seasons but on our globes as well. As Earth travels in its orbit, we see the position of the Sun change a little each day, moving either up or down in latitude. Two of these latitude circles represent the Sun’s maximum and minimum positions.

To begin our examination, let’s go back in time almost three months, to the first day of summer and the longest day of the year: The Summer Solstice.

On this day, which fell on June 21 this year, the Sun was highest in the sky in the Northern Hemisphere. Because of Earth’s tilt, this meant that the Sun was at a northern latitude of 23.5 degrees. The Sun was directly overhead at noon on this great circle of our globe. This latitude is called the Tropic of Cancer. Similarly, six months later, the Sun will be at its lowest point, 23.5 degrees south of the equator. This latitude circle is called the Tropic of Capri-



corn. Here in the Northern Hemisphere we experience the shortest day of the year and welcome the start of winter. It is the Winter Solstice and a time of many seasonal celebrations.

The equinoxes are the two points in between the solstices, when the Sun’s trek has it transitioning from winter to summer or summer to winter. On an equinox, the Sun is directly over the equator and we have approximately the same hours of day and night. Indeed, the word “equinox” actually means “equal night.”

We should note that these observations are biased toward an observer in the Northern Hemisphere. To our fellow Ter-rans in the Southern hemisphere the seasons are reversed.

For billions of years the Sun has followed this path in the sky, going from one

Tropic Circle to the other and back again. And although we can observe and record this motion of the Sun, we must never forget that it is actually Earth that is moving, not the Sun. So now we better understand the astronomy involved with the Autumnal Equinox and the changing of the seasons. But is there anything you should be doing?

Not really. These four dates on the calendar represent geometric alignments, not events to stay up and look for.

Until next time, remember to always question and always wonder.

2nd degree attempted murder charge for September stabbing

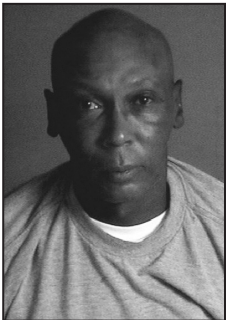
ORANGE PARK – Authorities have arrested an Orange Park man for attempted second-degree murder for allegedly stabbing his half-brother multiple times during an argument on Sept. 14.

Officers from the Orange Park Police Department obtained a warrant for Curtis Allen Simpson, 58, after responding to a home at 1800 Miller St. regarding a stabbing.

According to the warrant, Simpson went into the house and asked his brother to move his car. However, the victim said he did not want to leave “hot grease unattended in order to move his car.”

The victim told police that Simpson poked him in the head with his hand and they started a fight that ended up outside of the home. The victim told police that he tried to run from Simpson but he tripped and landed on his stomach with Simpson standing over him stabbing him.

According to officials at Orange Park

Medical Center who examined the victim, the man sustained a stab wound to his left scapula, his upper and middle back and his left side of his torso. His left lung collapsed and required medical staff to insert a chest tube to allow breathing. Doctors also said one stab wound went to the victim’s spine and broke the tip of his spine.

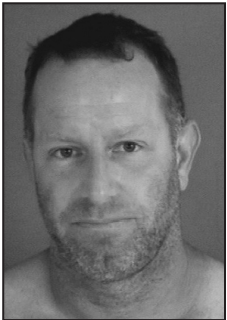
At press time, Simpson remained in the Clay County Jail where his bond has yet to be set.

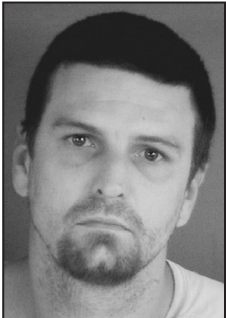

from lawn runoff and untreated water, can exacerbate the emergence of toxic algae blooms.

Residents who see any sort of oil slick on the water's surface or thick, green algae are advised to report it to the Department of Environmental Protection for testing.

"Just have extreme caution," she said. "Now is not the time to go tubing on the river."

For those with more questions, Orange Park Town Council Member Connie Thomas is holding a roundtable discussion Friday, Oct. 6 in the council chambers. The discussion will include a representative from the DEP and will examine issues surrounding local waterways after Hurricane Irma.

Consider a fall garden

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – As temperatures hopefully being to fall and our landscapes get less green, it is time to consider your fall garden.

With the luxury afforded by our mild winters, we can effectively grow some vegetables throughout this season and continue to enjoy our landscapes. Here are some tips for success:

Consider a Raised Bed

A raised garden, using a garden soil that drains well but is rich in organic matter is often the best way to grow vegetables in our region due to our sandy, low nutrient soil. These can be anything from pots to large scale wooden beds but overall, they make the management of weeds, diseases and plant nutrition much easier. time to grow through the winter and then harvest in the spring and early summer. Look for suitable varieties such as Chandler, Oso Grande, Sweet Charlie, Selva, Camarosa and Festival.

The Ornamental Landscape

The fall and winter can continue to be a very interesting part of the year for your landscape. Annual plants such as petunias, foxgloves and Shasta daisy can be planted in October and Chrysanthemums, the usual flower associated with autumn can also have a place in your planters and landscape. October is also a great time to do some maintenance work such as mulching with the cooler temperatures. You can even plan ahead for next year, considering trees like berry producing hollies and Black Tupelo for winter and fall color.

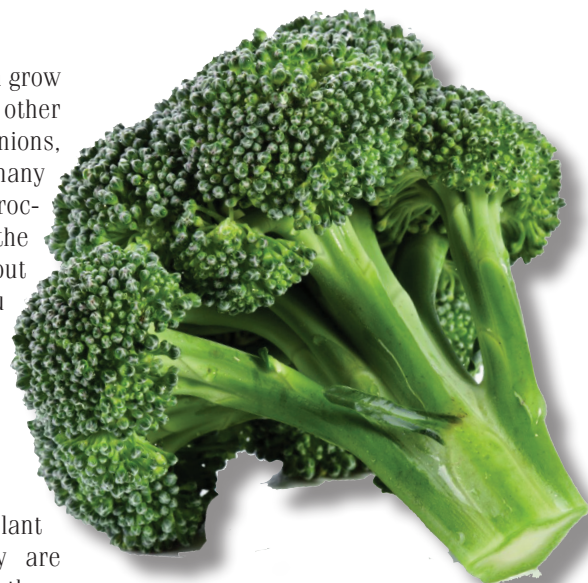

If you planted some spring crops in August and September, you can also have success until the first frost, which is usually around Thanksgiving.

Strawberries

October is the last month to plant strawberries for the spring. They are grown as annuals in our state, giving them

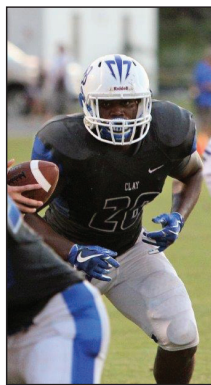

Carter rolls for 282 in Clay district opener

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — On Homecoming Night 2017, the Clay Blue Devils used shock and awe to stun the visiting Pedro Menendez High Falcons (3-2 coming into the game) by putting up 60 offensive points and stopping the hurry-up Falcon offense as they opened their district 5-5A play with a 60-49 victory at Blue Devil Stadium.

"I'm not real happy how we played defensively, but I'm going to be honest, we're 1-0 in the district and we finally got it up to 5A play," said Clay coach Joshua Hoekstra, who has endured rugged games with 7A powers Fleming Island, Bartram Trail and Oakleaf in his first half of the season.

Hoeksta reverted back to power football with fullback Aundre Carter pounding out 282 yards with four scores to push the Blue Devils into the playoff picture once again. Carter ran for over 200 yards last week against Oakleaf High School in Clay's win in that game.

"Everyday Coach is preaching to us, finish runs, work hard, keep moving the legs and it pays off in the game," said Carter, a transfer from Bradford County where he was a Class 4A first team all state selection. "I had my mind set. It was my last homecoming game and I was going out with a bang!"

Carter tied his personal record with four rushing touchdowns and played as hard or harder in the fourth quarter as he did on the first play.

"He's just extremely strong. He runs really hard all week long and that's what we talk about," said Hoekstra, who has had his share of power ball carriers in Bilal Ally, Shannon Asbell and Teddy Monroe, plus Louisville running back Colin Wilson, who had a 19 yard run on Saturday in the Cardinals 55-10 win over Murray State. "You're going to play like you practice. He practices extremely hard. Every run, he is running to score in practice so in a game, when he has two and three guys on him, he keeps his legs moving."

Hamlett field goal keeps Golden Eagles undefeated

OAKLEAF — Fleming Island High kicker Noah Hamlett kicked a 38 yard field goal late in the fourth quarter to seal a 13-7 district 3-7A win over Oakleaf High in a critical game Sept. 29 at Oakleaf High School.

"Our goals are to win championships—the district, the region and the state," said Fleming Island coach Damenyum Springs. "We try to think big."

Fleming Island, now 6-0, 2-0 in district play with a 27-0 win over defending district champion Gainesville Buchholz earlier in the season, takes a BYE week to recharge and ready up for a showdown with Bartram Trail High School that will determine the district champions. Oakleaf, 1-4, 0-1 with the loss, still has an outside shot at the playoffs but must run the table with upcoming district games against Bartram-Trail, Buchholz and Creekside then hope for some help from Fleming Island.

"We have to take care of the football, start fast and finish strong," said Oakleaf coach Steve Reynolds.

Against Oakleaf, Fleming Island sophomore running back Dewayne McBride, the hero against Clay High in their season opening win with two second half scores, ran for 95 yards and a touchdown to keep the Golden Eagles unbeaten.

With senior tailback Anfernee McCaskill out of the game with an injury and Chauncy Garrison, II, out with severe cramping,

McBride lined up at running back almost exclusively in the second half and provided a spark with his tough running that they had not had in the first two quarters.

After Oakleaf held the Golden Eagles to minus two yards rushing in the first half, McBride ran for 89 on 13 second half carries. His 40 yard scoring run with 3:45 remaining in the third quarter gave Fleming Island its first lead and embodied his running style. The sophomore ran right, broke a tackle, and was hit by several Knights. McBride fell along with—and on top of—the defenders, so that no part of him

touched the ground. Regaining his footing, the sophomore sprinted all the way to the goal line, stunning Oakleaf.

"McBride gets his feet behind his shoulder pads and keeps running," said Fleming Island coach Damenyum Springs. "He did what he does."

McBride's output was enough to keep Fleming Island atop District 3-7A with a 2-0 district mark, thanks to the effort of the Golden Eagles defense. The unit, which entered the game ranked fifth in North Florida in total defense, held Oakleaf running back Keshawn King, who was aver-

aging 132 rushing yards per game, to 80 yards on 22 carries and forced him to lose a fumble. King averaged only 3.6 yards per carry Friday, less than half of his 7.8 average entering the game.

"Our game plan was to stop number four [King]," said Springs after the game. "He is a great back, but we have got some good guys, too."

The defense also set up Hamlet's two field goals. Fleming Island's Jackson Bull snagged a Demonte' Stephens fumble out of midair at the Knights 18 yard line in the second quarter, resulting in a 32 yard field goal by Hamlet, the Golden Eagles' first points. Cornerback Bobby Brown picked off a Tre Simmons pass at near midfield and returned it to the Knights 38 yard line early in the fourth quarter. The ensuing drive stalled, but Hamlet converted from 38 yards out with seven minutes remaining to provide the final margin. Defensive tackle Josh Harris recovered a fumble for the Golden Eagles to go with a sack and two tackles for loss.

Oakleaf had gotten the better of their guests in the first half with a defense every bit as dominant as the Golden Eagles'. Led by end Chantz Williams and tackle Javiera Bovell, Oakleaf held Fleming Island to three points and two first downs in the first two quarters. Williams was unblockable, registering four tackles for loss by halftime. Bovell had two sacks, a tackle for

loss and a fumble recovery. Safety Zechariah Nesby stepped in front of a seam route to make an interception at the Oakleaf 16 yard line to end a Golden Eagles scoring threat.

The game might not have come down to the final play were it not for penalties that nullified two apparent Golden Eagles

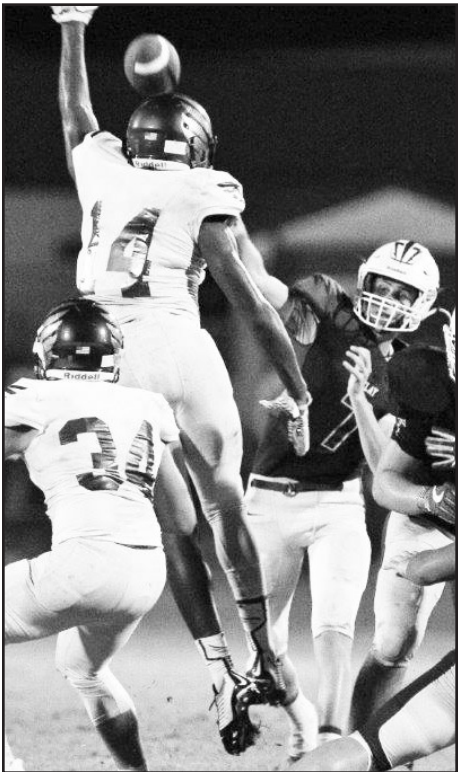

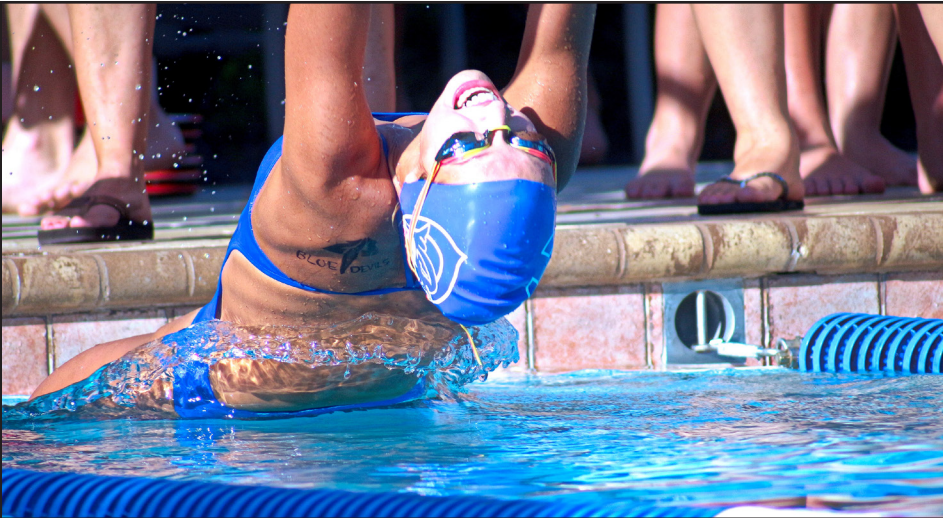
The next Falcon drive was turned over on downs. Clay couldn't capitalize on that drive and would punt the only time they needed to all night.

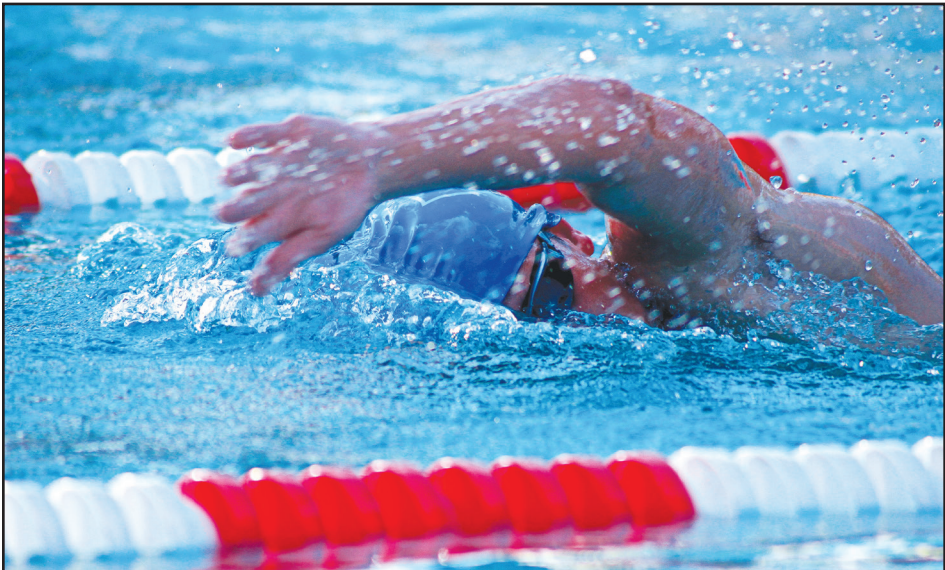

Wrestlers set to battle at the 'Bank'

Jaguars welcome area grapplers

JACKSONVILLE – The North Florida Wrestling Academy based out of Green Cove Springs will be hosting a special tournament on Sun., Oct. 8 with a little special invitation from none other than the Jacksonville Jaguars.

"We've been working on getting events around the community to generate interest in the Jaguars and being a former wrestler, I pitched the idea to our people," said Benjamin Krakower, a Jaguars ticket sales specialist who also wrestled at American University in Washington, D.C. "I knew this was a strong wrestling area and reached out to the local club out of Clay County; North Florida Wrestling Academy in Fleming Island."

That was about six months ago and the ball was rolling toward Sunday's (Oct 8) tournament that will be staged in the new indoor practice facility named Daily's Place Flex Field and located adjacent to Everbank Field in Jacksonville, the home of the NFL Jacksonville Jaguars. The event was given the green light by none other than Tom Coughlin, head of Jaguars football operations.

For NFWA coach P.J. Cobbett, who, with assistant coach Larry Insalaco, has had to move fast to organize the event and prepare the necessary transfer of mats, tables, chairs and clocks to Jacksonville.

"We got approval about two weeks after we thought was the date we would need to get this event on stage prior to the 2017 wrestling season," said Insalaco. "We will

get the meet ready to go and hope that the teams around Florida will show up. We have gotten plenty of inquiring phone calls and emails and hope that means a lot of wrestlers will show up Sunday. It will be unique."

For Cobbett, who has put the Fleming Island community on the wrestling map with a second in the nation finish at the AAU Scholastic Duals and a second in Class 3A in the Florida high school state championships, the grand plan is to improve wrestling as a whole in north Florida.

"The Academy, the year-round wrestling and training and now this are all put together to make wrestling better up here," said Cobbett, a four-time state champion for Clay High School. "We get a lot of wrestlers from outside the county to roll with us every week. It makes everyone better. The tournament will probably be much bigger in a few years if we keep it going. I'd like to see 30-40 teams show up in the next few years."

The tournament, named the 2017 AAU Southeast Fall Classic will have weigh-ins on Saturday at the North Florida Wrestling Academy at 1524-3 Virgils Way in Green Cove Springs (a right turn before Magnolia Point Golf and Country Club) with doors open between 8 a.m. and 2 p.m.. Wrestling starts Sunday at 9 a.m. with doors open at 8 a.m. at the Everbank Field indoor facility at the south end of the stadium off East Bay Street.

Admission is \$60 per wrestler with age groups starting at kindergarten and going to high school seniors. Each registration

A block by Lebesch and Madison Mas tied the game at 14-14, but Oakleaf held on with a scoring shot from Campbell to win 16-14.

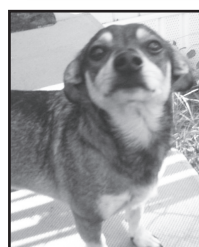
Fleming Island has finished their district schedule and travels to Middleburg on October 3 with Keystone Heights visiting October 10.

Because the administrative hearing process is designed to formulate final agency action, the filing of a petition means that the Department's final action may be different from the position taken by it in this notice. In addition to requesting an administrative hearing, any

petitioner may elect to pursue mediation. OWNER OCCUPIED REHABILITATION PROGRAM: Funds will be used in this strategy to assist qualified homeowners whose houses are in need of repairs. Repairs will be determined by the SHIP Coordinator. This program is for applicants with income in the extremely low, very-low and low category. Repairs will not exceed \$25,000.00 per house. These funds are available as either grants or no interest loans.

PURCHASE ASSISTANCE/ DOWN PAYMENT ASSISTANCE: Funds will be used in this strategy for qualified persons in need of down payment and/or closing costs assistance to purchase a new or existing home. This program is for applicants with income up to 140% of AMI. The sales price or value of the home may not exceed \$247,500. The maximum award under this strategy is \$15,000.00. 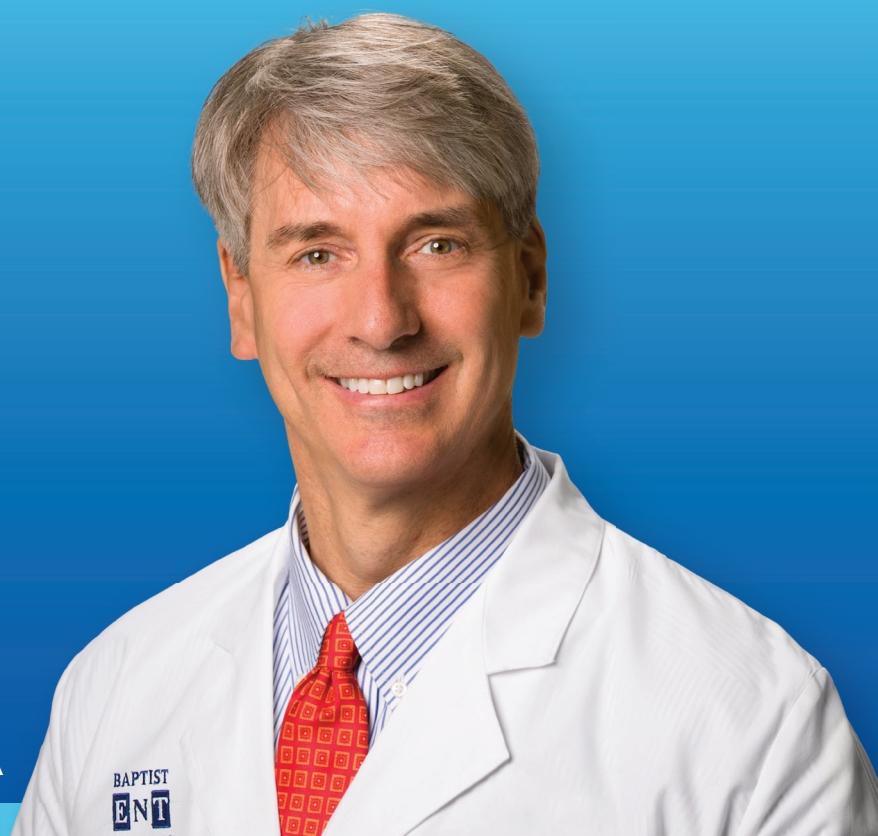
