



State panel suspends former Clay teacher's certificate

TALLAHASSEE - The State of Florida Education Practices Commission has sus-

pended the teaching certificate of a former Clay County teacher almost two years after his arrest on armed burglary and armed trespassing charges. In the Commis-

sion's order filed June 5, Jason Scott Lipsitz, 38, formerly of Middleburg, is

prohibited from employment with any Florida public school district "in any capacity requiring direct contact with students for the duration of the suspension period." When he was arrested October 19, 2015, Lipsitz – then a teacher at Lake Asbury Junior High where he was certified to teach English and English for Speakers of Other Languages – was placed on administrative leave.

The ruling was handed down June 2 after a teacher hearing panel of the Education Practices Commission accepted terms of a settlement agreement that both Lipsitz and Education Commissioner Pam Stewart entered into regarding the allegations.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office arrested Lipsitz after his former girlfriend told

Too early to modify budget after charter school termination

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – While the Clay County School District officially terminated its charter school agreement with Orange Park Performing Arts Academy on Aug. 1, it is too early for district officials to be expecting a budget windfall

By terminating the contract with the charter school, means the Clay County School District will no longer be paying approximately \$1.5 million to the school

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Town manager to resign after budget season

ORANGE PARK - Orange Park Town Manager Jim Hanson read aloud a resig-

nation letter to the Town Council and public Tuesday night capping three years of service to the town.

Hanson. who turns 64 this month, said in an interview that his resignation comes at a time when he's looking



to spend more time with his wife and kids. "My wife is retired and we felt it was a

good time to move on," Hanson said. "We have a lot of things on our bucket list.

Hanson, who was hired on in 2014, leaves behind a number of accomplishments including pension reform and a road resurfacing schedule that has made the town more efficient at maintaining its aged roads.

"I'm certainly honored to have the opportunity to work in Orange Park," Hanson said. "It's a very special community that has a hometown feel that is very special and it's heartwarming in an uncertain world."

Hanson will work through the finalization of the next fiscal year budget before

Local feelings about Harriet Beecher Stowe were mixed

n 1867, the Tallahassee Sentinel published this caustic announcement. "Harriet Beecher Stowe has purchased a plantation on the St. Johns River and will reside hereafter among the people whom she has represented as worse than barbarians."

Early blessed with the rigid rightness of her opinions and perhaps anxious to – like her five minister brothers – convert the ignorant, Harriet embarked on the only career open to decent and respectable women: writing for the proliferation of popular and religious magazines, which flooded the market at the time.

Uncle Tom's Cabin was first published as a serial in 50 installments in the trendy magazine National Era in 1851. A year later, it was in book form and translated into French, German, Italian, Spanish, Russian, Danish, Dutch, Flemish, Polish, Portuguese, Bohemian, Hungarian, on and on.

Mrs. Stowe felt no compunction to actually visit any of the Southern states until 15 years after the publication of the book and two years following the conflict that left the South destitute and killed and maimed a near generation of young men. Abraham Lincoln referred to her as the "little lady who caused this Great War."

Shrewdly, Mrs. Stowe selected to purchase land on the Eastern shore of the St. Johns at Mandarin, where sympathies firmly lay with the Union cause throughout the war. On the opposite side of the river, in Clay County, not everyone was enamored with the author. In fact, many firmly lay the responsibility for their wartime losses in

lives and livelihoods precisely on her doorstep.

But Mrs. Stowe was a formidable woman so most kept their mouths shut and went about their own doings relying heavily on Southern training and proper manners. Sadly, the woman had no compunction about telling others how to run their business. That was, in fact, what brought her to Florida in the first place.

Capt. Frederick Stowe, Harriet's son, took a shell fragment in his right ear at Get-

tysburg. He barely survived and continued to suffer from severe headaches, which he self-treated by frequently succumbing to the curse of strong drink. Desperate to affect a cure, she purchased Frederick a partnership in renting a thousand acres of the Laurel Grove Plantation at what is today Orange Park.

Mrs. Stowe was particularly attracted by lofty goals of the endeavor – to raise cotton and generate tremendous profits. Of course, Mrs. Stowe packed her bags and made her first trip into the land of the barbarians to supervise the venture.

Locals all knew that raising cotton – even the highly adapted Sea-Island cotton – was the most labor-intensive crop to choose. Anyone with experience and success in the area accepted that a one crop farming venture was risky and that cleared Florida soil was tricky to make produce much of anything but weeds, palmetto scrub and pine trees. Mrs. Stowe ignored any and all advice.

The Laurel Grove enterprise was a failure but, in the meantime, Mrs. Stowe purchased 30 acres for herself in Mandarin. For a while, she was content to settle back and watch the oranges in her established grove of trees grow. She took great pride in the first crop sent north and supervised their placement in crates stenciled, "Oranges from Harriet Beecher Stowe." Soon, winters in Florida were routine for Harriet and her husband the esteemed Professor Calvin Ellis Stowe. As wife to a poorly paid college teacher Mrs. Stowe had long assumed the brunt of family support. With the loss of capital in her son's plantation and thousands spent on the waterfront property as well as maintaining a home in the North, she was again driven to pick up her pen.

In the early 1870's, she began writing a series of articles for the Christian Union magazine about her life along the St. Johns River, which were subsequently published in book form. Overall her accounts were glowing with vivid descriptions of flora and fauna mixed with advice about traveling and settling in the area.

She found Fleming Island and Hibernia charming and assured her readers that although she had never personally stayed there it was "a fine, attractive-looking country house, embowered in trees ... where about forty boarders are yearly accommodated." Green Cove Springs she dismissed with "there are two or three well-kept boarding houses there" and recommended it as a place to stroll three-quarters of a mile south along the river and shop in when staying at The Magnolia House."

Northerners huddled around some heat source, purchased first the magazines, then the book and wore them to shreds reading and rereading. Then, they vowed that next winter they would be in Florida on the St. Johns River. Fourteen-thousand tourists visited Florida in 1873 and that was just the beginning.

So once again, Harriet Beecher Stowe brought the Yankees to Clay County but this time they had money not guns. Maybe, in the end, the barbarians won.

police that he went to her home on October 19, 2015 on Khaki Court in Orange Park South, went into her unlocked vehicle and removed her .40-caliber semi-automatic handgun from her purse. The woman also told police that she and her boyfriend observed Lipsitz walk behind the house with her gun in his hand and out of the holster while stating, "You shouldn't have left your van unlocked, I have your gun."

The victim told police she shut the blinds when Lipsitz attempted to look in through the windows. She said he then walked into her open garage and allegedly stuck his head through a doggy door to look into the home he once shared with the victim.

When officers finally stopped Lipsitz blocks away on County Road 220 after he fled the scene, he admitted he was at his ex-girlfriend's house and went on to tell police, "I'm done now, I won't go back there ever again," states the CCSO report.

Part of the settlement agreement handed down by the Education Practices Commission also requires Lipsitz to take part in the Florida Department of Education's Recovery Network Program, which "was established in 1994 to help educators obtain assistance due to impairments related to drug, alcohol and/or mental health issues," according to the FDOE website. According to records filed with the Clay County Clerk of Court, Fourth Circuit Judge Don H. Lester withheld adjudication on Lipsitz and, instead of prison, sentenced him to 24 months of probation and entry into the Mental Health Court of Broward County, where Lipsitz now resides. Judge Lester sentenced Lipsitz to probation on June 6, 2016 after he pled guilty to the charges, the same date the Clay County School District accepted his resignation.

And while Lipsitz was placed on a twoyear suspension, he is not prohibited from renewing his Florida teaching certificate, according to the Settlement Agreement. According to FDOE records, his certificate was scheduled to expire on June 30, 2016. After completing the Recovery Network Program, Lipsitz is required to provide the FDOE written verification that he completed the counseling program.

Lipsitz did not return phone calls made to him before deadline.

In Florida, as in most states, certified educators are held to high standards of conduct and professionalism.

"The Principles of Professional Conduct represent the guideposts of what professional educators and members of the community can and should expect from educators. They also serve as a reminder to the educator that there are obligations and expectations associated with the profession," states the Commission's website.



Food program also nourishes the soul

MIDDLEBURG – The Middleburg United Methodist Church Food Bridge only distributes items on Thursday, but volunteers work every day to sort and pack the food items.

As they work, brown paper bags cover every surface of the long tables spanning the room.

The church's volunteers work to collect and distribute food to those in need began as a humanitarian effort, but according to Food Bridge Coordinator Craig Van Gundy, it quickly became a way for volunteers to build community and share their love of Christ.

He said once the volunteers are finished with their work at the Food Bridge, they talk and pray together, and they've become a tight-knit group.

That goes for attendees too. Van Gundy said several months ago, a woman shared her story that after a struggle with serious financial and health issues, she planned to kill herself, but changed her mind after coming to the Food Bridge and finding the community there.

Van Gundy said the goal of the Food Bridge is to help people through periods of hardship, for people between jobs or paychecks. For long-term help, he said,

they need housing assistance and budgeting help, which the Food Bridge can't provide.

Van Gundy said the church doesn't require clients to show proof of income, although they are asked to sign a form stating their monthly household expenses are greater than 80 percent of their income. Clients do need to show identification and proof of household size.

The Food Bridge is open every Thursday from 9:30-11:30 a.m., but volunteers work all week to get things ready, Van Gundy said. He said they have a refrigerated truck they use five days a week to pick up goods from several retail stores.

Once the goods have been unloaded at the Food Bridge, they must be weighed and recorded before they can be packed up for donations. Feeding Northeast Florida helps manage contracts and also provides food for the church program, Van Gundy said.

There is music and a devotion before food is served Thursday, he said. According to Van Gundy, it's like a church service, and although clients aren't required to attend to get their food, the food is a tool to lead people to the church. He said the goal is to get those people into a Christian community, whether with MUMC or somewhere else.

On Saturday is the Bread Basket, Van Gundy said. In addition to the bread, he said the church gives out any perishables they've collected that won't last until the next week's Food Bridge.

The church also has a clothes closet, which is usually open on Saturday, and a backpack program to provide children meals during the weekend.

Van Gundy said the church works with guidance counselors at Middleburg and Shadowlawn Elementary schools to identify low-income children who receive the weekend backpacks. MUMC volunteers pack drawstring backpacks full of food and snack items to get kids through the weekend.

This week, along with its regular food program, Food Bridge will help ease the burden by distributing school supplies to families in need by passing out school supplies.

Families can line up at 8 a.m. with distribution running from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. Along with food, items being distributed include pencils, paper, composition notebooks, crayons, scissors and any other items on Clay County District Schools' requirement list.

While 57 percent of the individuals and families Feeding Northeast Florida services have jobs, many are forced to make tough decisions about where to focus their funds, and often feeding their family comes last.



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Time to speak up for **Florida panther**

Heads up, citizens: the federal government is about to review the endangered status of one of our state's rarest species - the Florida panther – and now is the time for all of us to make our voices heard.

We Floridians clearly love our wild

and mysterious panthers; in 1981, the state's schoolchildren chose the panther as our official state animal over other animal contenders like alligators and manatees. Biologists esti-

ist on Earth. Compare that to Florida's human population, which has reached 20.6 million. Federal protections for Florida panthers are as essential as ever to prevent the big cats from going extinct. No scientific justification exists to strip panthers of their endangered species protection, and there is simply no pressing need to do so.

This U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service review comes at a time when panther deaths on Florida roads are outpacing the number of documented panther births. The statistics are alarming: Last year alone, an average of three panthers a month died on our roadways as they traveled in search of food and mates. So far, this year 13 panthers have been struck and killed on roads. These highway deaths come on top of other causes of mortality, including poaching, predation on kittens and disease.

The road toll alone is too high to be sustainable. Every year since 2012. Florida has set a new record for the number of panthers killed by vehicles. Our panther population will face continual threats because massive new developments are planned for the southwest Florida lands that are

When a politician or legislator wields terminology, that they are sure to stir strong feelings in the public. Using that language causes one to imagine a team of ghoulish committee members, rubber

As any clear-minded and forward-thinking individual can understand, death is the expected end of our time on this Earth as mortal beings. The fact that our lives will someday end has been a subject of philosophical thought and religious exploration for as far back as recorded time.

All of us would like to have as much say over how our lives end as possible. For the lucky, they will have a peaceful death, surrounded by family and friends, in a setting of their choice while having medical care provided that will ensure their comfort and quality of life.

What is difficult is the time before the actual end of our lives. where many individuals and their families end up utilizing the healthcare system at the highest levels, seeking to increase the number of days they have left. While there are times when it's reasonable and prudent to seek aggressive, invasive medical care in order to prolong life, there are also times when such care does little more than decrease the quality of a person's life. In other words, for some individuals with chronic, end-stage, life-limiting illnesses, repeated hospitalizations and procedures actually become more burdensome than beneficial. Several well-known studies establish that a small percentage of us (from 5-20 percent) are responsible for most of the healthcare expenditures our country makes in a year (from 50-80 percent depending on the study). It is most likely that these individuals have chronic, endstage, and life-limiting illnesses – but feel they have no other choice than to access the healthcare system through emergency rooms via ambulance, having healthcare crises that they see as requiring immediate expert medical care.

As medical professionals can attest, many chronic, end-stage, and life-limiting conditions have "management" options but no "curative" options. An individual of advanced age with heart failure, whose heart has weakened to the point of functioning at 10-15 percent, can have excess fluid drained off of them (management option) but are not candidates for heart transplantation or extensive surgery (curative options). Similarly, those with end-stage liver disease, end-stage COPD, and late-stage cancers find very little benefit to their long-term prognosis through repeated hospitalizations.

Currently, these individuals and their families can opt to continue accessing the healthcare system, being readmitted to a healthcare system that can only offer management options – not a cure. These individuals are better served with a form of medicine that focuses on managing their symptoms, establishing goals for how to take care of them based on their wishes, and enhancing their quality of life.

Even more important to the healthcare reform debate is normalizing a form of medicine that reduces hospital admissions and allows people to receive medical care at the setting of their choice. That area of medicine is called palliative care.

Palliative care is currently underutilized in the healthcare system. At any one time, studies show that an average of 4 percent of individuals in an inpatient

the panther's last home. Strip malls, housing developments and new roads will all greatly impair Florida panthers' prospects for survival.

Panthers are particularly vulnerable to human threats due to their already-low numbers and because they require large ranges - stretches of land where they can thrive. Biologists know that the leading cause of species extinction around the world is habitat loss and human persecution. With developers encroaching more dramatically in southwest Florida, the panthers need the protection the Endangered Species Act provides more than ever.

We know too well how fragile our Florida panther population is; the cats were put on the Endangered Species list in 1967. In the 1990s, the population dwindled to just 20 to 30 cats before intensive rescue efforts began to save the species from extinction. The progress made in reviving

setting are receiving palliative care. Palliative care can also include hospice services, which are medical services that follow an individual wherever they are, and provides equipment and medication as well as a physician, nurse, nurse's aide, social worker and chaplain.

While purveyors of scare tactics and rhetoric will use the term "death panels" to scare individuals into believing that healthcare reform is seeking to bar them from receiving medical care, the truth is that a bipartisan effort to expand palliative care would ease the burden on the health-

care system and could be a solution for many currently suffering through unnecessary, ineffective medical treatments that destroy their quality of life.

No "death panel" will remove your medical care, but medical care that is focused on what's in a person's best interests for the end of their life should be provided when faced with late- and end-stage conditions.

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Lynne Wetherell helped found Head Start Canine 25 years ago to teach obedience training to dogs. Then, as agility training gained popularity in the U.S. in the 1990s, she helped found Pals and Paws Agility Club off Morris Road in Orange Park.

"It's the fastest-growing and the most popular sport in dogs today," as Wetherell described it, the agility contest consists of 20 obstacles arranged and designed to test each dog's speed, fitness and ability to obey commands quickly. Each dog gets one attempt to complete the course as quickly as possible, and often a single mistake can lead to disqualification.

To further toughen things up, each course's obstacles are arranged differently, and each owner has only 10 minutes to examine a map of the course. Wetherell summed up the difficulty that this aspect brings with a comparison: "One person has briefly looked at a dance, the partner hasn't looked at it at all, and you've got to do it perfectly."

Agility isn't the only dog sport, though. In conformation, the competition of Westminster and the American Kennel Club National Championship, dogs meet standards set for their breeds in beauty, grooming and more. In dock jumping, dogs run and

jump off of a dock and try to grab a hanging or thrown toy. In herding, dogs lead sheep and ducks. In obedience, dogs learn to follow commands. In some competitions, dogs even hunt for rats in a haystack.

Three times a week, Wetherell teaches agility classes at her home in Green Cove Springs. She has a full agility course in her yard, and she shows her students how to guide their dogs seamlessly from obstacle to obstacle.

Her students hold her in high regard. Deena Calivas called her "the best instructor in the area," and the results of her students prove her excellence: Journey, the first dog Calivas ever trained for agility, has already won one of the four competitions she's entered, and she completed the course perfectly.

Like her students, Lynne Wetherell and Pals and Paws are not strangers to success. Her dog Ranger is "the fifth triple champion in the history of Belgian Tervurens," being a champion in breed competition, agility and herding. Jack has won his breed at the Westminster Dog Show and the AKC National Championship. Pals and Paws has sent three members to compete on the U.S. national team in international agility competition.

Though technically Wetherell instructs a class, she really coaches a team. Calivas said of her fellow students, "Everybody supports each other; everybody has fun. We all cheer for each other."

Agility training can bring out the best in people, as in dogs. The camaraderie cre-

ated by Wetherell and her team has helped support shy students as well as one with autism, and, for misbehaved and inactive dogs, has provided an outlet for energy and a source of discipline. The team even has a nickname – "The Storm."

Training isn't just a duty for these dogs – they enjoy it. Wetherell's young dog Mojo competes in obedience, and while she was doing a demonstration with him, 12-yearold Ranger joined excitedly, proving that he remembered the obedience training of his youth while desperately trying to steal Wetherell's attention from Mojo.

The enthusiasm of Wetherell and her students' dogs, whether while warming up on the agility course or demonstrating obedience, proves just how beneficial training and competition can be. "They love to work," Wetherell said. In short, Wetherell has created an uplifting community for dogs and their owners alike.

Green light Town to draft medical marijuana ordinance

ORANGE PARK – To dispense or not to dispense is no longer a question after Tuesday's Orange Park Town Council meeting.

On a 3-2 vote, council members directed the town attorney and town staff to craft an ordinance to allow dispensaries within the Orange Park town limits as well as regulate where pharmacies can be placed within the town.

Under state law, county and municipal governments cannot regulate dispensaries any differently than they would regulate regular pharmacies.

When Orange Park Planning and Zoning Board members met last month to devise a recommendation for the full council to vote on regarding how to regulate dispensaries, they realized that the town charter currently has next to no regulations on where pharmacies can actually be placed.

To mitigate this, the board recommended the council to construct an ordinance that will provide a clear definition for which zoning categories pharmacies can fit into.

Town staff will craft an ordinance with a 500-foot buffer zone between pharmacies and also have a grandfather clause to

protect existing structures. The ordinance will also provide a pathway for pharmacies – or dispensaries – to apply for regulation variances to protect against potential litigation.

Dispensaries must also abide by state regulations that stipulate a dispensary must not be within 500 feet of a school.

Pharmacies will no longer locate within commercial neighborhood zoning categories - categories normally reserved for neighborhood convenience stores and gas stations. Pharmacies will be allowed within commercial general, commercial intensive and planned unit development districts.

Mayor Scott Land cast the deciding vote.

A motion by Council Member Ron Raymond to bar dispensaries from the town died on the floor from lack of support.

Council Member Garv Meeks seconded Raymond's motion, hoping that the town could institute a temporary prohibition on dispensaries within the town limits and wait to see if Florida would write recreational marijuana into law.

"I feel that there is still enough 'Boogeyman' out there that I don't think we really need it in the town," Raymond said. "...we have a relatively small town, we're boxed in, and we certainly don't need to add -

don't need to be more attractive, we all know what happens at 'pill mills' we all know what the folks will do that do that, so if they're coming to Orange Park then we're adding an extra burden to the police department.'

Council Member Connie Thomas countered Raymond's argument.

"I, for years, taught alcohol and drug abuse classes for court-mandated people..." said Thomas, who is a counselor at Grace House Counseling Center. "I have many clients now who have severe migraines that they can't get rid of. I have people who have epilepsy, many, many disorders that this is their last chance for help.'

"I feel as a town that we need to show leadership here to help those in need not look at the stigma of marijuana per se but look at really the need of people who medi-

cally need something like this as their last resort and can help them live a quality life," she said.

Council Member Alan Watt seconded her opinion.

Land's swing vote was based on the percentage and town and county voters who approved medical marijuana by their affirmative vote on Amendment 2.

"I certainly understand both sides," Land said. "But 67 percent of the town voted for this, 71 percent of the county voted for this, so that's a clear majority of the town that voted to have medical marijuana...It is a medicine...Why should we treat it as any other?"



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City electric system to get upgrades

GREEN COVE SPRINGS – Members of the Green Cove Springs City Council spent the majority of their Tuesday listening to numbers.

The first of the city's fiscal year 2018 budget sessions provided council members with information on their insurance plan, as well as summaries of the budgets for stormwater and solid waste, but nothing received as much attention as their infa-

mous electric utility service.

Early Tuesday morning, the city reviewed their current insurance plan, leading to a unanimous decision by the council to eliminate the option for retired city employees to stay on their insurance indefinitely, even after becoming eligible for Medicare.

"I'm gonna suggest that we change the policy," council member Van Royal said. "As Danielle [Judd] has aptly pointed out, this is not something normally done in the public sector."

According to the report, there are about four retired city employees still using the city's insurance plan. Those retirees will not be affected, but going forward, the city will release retired employees from coverage after their 18 months of COBRA coverage. This will be effective Oct. 1.

Council members were then shown staff's recommendations for awarding those who took part in the city's wellness program, which promised a discount on insurance should the employees complete the required health checkups and screenings. No formal vote was taken, but it was advised that the council should pick up any increase in those employees' premiums, as well as offering a \$2.50 discount on their premium. "There are dollars in the budget right now to do what I've recommended to you," said Danielle Judd, city manager. "If you're going to have a program, you have to do what you say."

Insurance talks will be continued during the Aug. 15 special session when council will cover the payroll budget.

The discussion then moved to the city's utility services, with their electric contractor, Hooper Corp., whose representatives presented next year's proposed budget to the council.

Prior to the budget discussion, the council received a brief demonstration of the graphical information system mapping that Hooper has worked on throughout the summer with CHW Engineering.

The GIS maps will show the locations of every electric pole, line and substation on the city's system, allowing city electric employees to use iPads or laptops to access the city's electric system the same way web surfers use Google Maps. Poles are clickable, with a click revealing information on the type of equipment on the pole, and show potential for outages should the pole go out and break the circuit.

This information will be used to handle outages and other problems more quickly. Before this mapping software was implemented, the total number of poles in the city was unknown. As the system ages, it will also provide technicians with a collection of historical outage data, and allow them to schedule updates for the system by showing weak points that need repair. The data will also be useful by developers as it will provide locations for service hook ups for future subdivisions.

"This is an opportunity for the city to self promote now that we've done this," said Mayor Mitch Timberlake. "I'm really interested in seeing what our long-range plan is for GIS and how we're going to get there."

Following the demonstration, a conversation started that continued through lunch well into the afternoon. Through their review of the city's electrical system, Hooper requested they hire two more linemen to have a dedicated construction crew that can begin replacing poles and electrical equipment.

"One of the things that we were hoping for was that [Hooper] would be able to spend a lot of time doing the capital projects that we've always had to contract out," Judd said. "What we've found is there's a lot of daily stuff that we just can't devote one hundred percent [to capital projects]."

With the current system, linemen are called away to perform service calls and end up never being able to spend enough time on construction projects such as pole replacements to get anything accomplished. Hiring two more employees and creating a rotating system for their technicians from service to construction and back again would fix the problem, according to Hooper.

The budget has the city spending about \$2 million every year for improvement projects for the system, but the city left the option on the table to potentially take out a loan or bond to expedite this process outside the capital budget.

"We should do this and take the budget like it is," Royal said, "and then, in two or

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Solar eclipse to showcase grand splendor of nature

Some spectacular science will be occurring this August: Americans will be the audience for a special solar eclipse, one that travels from sea to shining sea.

Amazing! But first, some definitions. In general, the word "eclipse" simply means that, from the point-of-view of an observer, light from an object is blocked by

a third object. Shadow puppets, for example, are due to the artist's hands eclipsing the light from a lamp, creating silhouettes on a screen. We use curtains and blinds to eclipse the outside sunlight. When my wife feels I am not listening to her, she will step in front of the TV, eclipsing my reruns of "Barney Miller."

(I will leave any conclusions about the size of my TV and my wife to the imagination of the reader.)

In astronomy, we are often referring to the Earth-Sun-Moon system, and the type of eclipse we witness here on Earth depends on the position, or phase, of our Moon.

During a lunar eclipse, the Moon is in its full phase; that is, in a straight line with the Sun and Earth. The orbital motion of the Moon carries it through Earth's shadow cone in space.

Solar eclipses occur when the Moon is between the Sun and Earth – a phase called new Moon. Here, the disk of the Sun is blocked (eclipsed) by the Moon.

Even though solar and lunar eclipses frequently occur within two weeks of each other, solar eclipses are much rarer to witness because of their short duration.

Now, I can hear you saying, "Tom, you're the best. But we have a new Moon and a full Moon every month. Why don't we have eclipses every month?"


What a great question. You see, the orbit of the Moon is tilted five degrees off the plane defined by Earth orbiting the Sun. So, most months, the Moon is simply too high or too low to cause any eclipse phenomena.

In other words, we have to add another dimension to our thinking. Eclipse conditions occur only when all three objects are in alignment when considered from above and from the side.

There will be a total solar eclipse on Aug. 21. The path of totality, where the entire disk of the Sun is blocked by the Moon, will cross the contiguous United States. Because of this, it is being called the Great American Solar Eclipse. This is the first time such a trans-continental eclipse has occurred since the US declared independence in 1776.

The path of totality is only 70 miles wide. The actual eclipse, as seen from our rotating Earth, will appear to move at about 1,700 miles per hour, beginning in Oregon at 9 a.m. Pacific Time and moving eastward to South Carolina.

Unfortunately, Northeast Florida lies

just outside the path of totality. However, we will have the opportunity to see a partial solar eclipse, with nearly 92 percent of the disk of the Sun being obscured by the Moon. The partial eclipse will begin at about 2:10 in the afternoon, peak at 2:50, and end roughly 40 minutes later.

Now I need everyone to pay very close attention to your ol' buddy Tom: It is never safe to look at the Sun, even during an eclipse. Many incorrectly assume that since all or part of the Sun is blocked, there is no danger.

Not true! The Sun's intensity is too high under any circumstance, and serious eye injury or even blindness can occur from looking at the Sun.

Squinting, trying to look between your fingers, and even wearing sunglasses do not provide adequate protection from the Sun's radiation. Solar viewers or welder's glass rated 14 or higher may be used (with adult supervision, if need be).

The safest way to observe a solar eclipse is simply to poke a hole in a piece of cardboard and hold it up with your back to the Sun. The eclipse can be seen on the projection created on the ground. And, in this time of technology, the eclipse will be streamed live online.

But I put it to you that a solar eclipse is not something that is just glanced at for a moment - it is an experience that goes beyond the eyes. Whether you have plans to drive to the path of totality or are merely going to step onto your front porch, pay full attention to your surroundings.


Feel the change in the wind; note the drop in temperature; listen to the silence of birds and other animals; look at plants wilting, the color of the sky, and stars becoming visible. These sensations will make the occasion come alive and perhaps even foster a love of nature and science.

"This could well be this generation's Apollo moment," said Mike Reynolds, professor of Astronomy and Physics at Florida State College. "What a great way to get kids excited about space."

Indeed.

Florida will not be privy to another solar eclipse until 2024 and then not until 2045. Take advantage of this rare opportunity to appreciate the grand splendor of nature and Earth's special place in space.



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

be sent home at the beginning of school. To apply for Free or Reduced-Price Meals, households must complete an online application or a paper application and return it to the school or the Food and Nutrition Services Office. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

Households that receive SNAP – Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program – or TANF – Temporary Assistance for Needy Families – are required to list on the application only the child's name, SNAP/TANF case number, and signature of adult household member.

Foster children will receive free benefits regardless of the child's personal income or the income of the household.

Households with children who are considered migrants, homeless, or runaway should contact the district liaison at (904) 336-1346 or migrant coordinator at (352) 955-6855.

For the purpose of determining household size, deployed service members are considered a part of the household. Families should include the names of the deployed service members on their application. Report only that portion of the deployed service member's income made available to them or on their behalf to the family. Additionally, a housing allowance that is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative is not to be included as income.

PALATKA – The St. Johns River Water Management District's Blue School Grant Program began accepting applications from educators on Aug. 1.

He said the OPPAA governing board has voted to transition the school to a private school instead of operating as a publiclyfunded charter school under state law.

"We expect many of the students to qualify for scholarships through various available resources, whether that be Step Up for Students, the Gardiner Scholarships or Educational Savings Accounts," Norwood said. "In Florida, we have a robust system of public school options and private school options, both which are funded with public dollars."

"As a District, we stand ready and prepared to offer the best, high quality educational opportunities for students affected by the closure of OPPAA. Clay County Schools will take immediate action to ensure that all families impacted by this closure are provided with thorough guidance to enroll their children at their neighborhood schools. We are excited about engaging this cohort of learners and educating their families about Clay County's endless educational possibilities." Davis said, in a prepared statement Aug. 1.

he departs, however that could prove to be a turbulent hurdle.

Town budget meetings have historically been among the most contentious, and despite his accomplishments, Hanson has not been divorced from blame from council members.

During the 2017 fiscal year's budgetary process last September, some council members questioned his judgment on his reluctance to hire an additional town mechanic to service perceivably-aged town vehicles.

"If the town manager was doing his job, he would have told us we needed another mechanic and we would have had a better list of vehicles to purchase next year," said former Council Member Steve Howard during the Sept. 20, 2016 budget meeting. "It's been to where it's incumbent on us to get involved with the business of the town." Other council members defended Hanson's decision.

"I'm a little confused why we're trying to play town manager here," said current Mayor Scott Land said. "I don't see that as our job, dictating how to run the town. We're not the town manager, we're the town council. It's not our job to tell what employees we need and what vehicles we need."

Hanson pushed back against Howard's comments.

"I did give you my best recommendation. I don't think a mechanic is needed. I don't think this vehicle needs to be replaced and I would put the money somewhere else. Having said that, it's your budget. You can man it the way you want, but I gave you my best recommendation after consulting the department heads, and trying to figure out what was best for the town. I'm sorry you disagree," Hanson said.

When asked how much the criticism affected his decision to resign three years into his position, Hanson said, "none. Some of that comes with the job of being a city manager," said Hanson, who has had a 41year career as a city manager at LaGrange, Georgia and Atlantic Beach, Florida. "I've been used to it."

"There's probably been more of it in Orange Park than many other places, but unfortunately that's part of being a local government employee and particularly a manager – but if you can't stand a little criticism, you'd be in the wrong job to be a city manager."

Assistant Town Manager Sarah Camp-

bell will take over Hanson's duties beginning Sept. 22 until the town launches a search for a suitable replacement. When Hanson first landed the position, Campbell was runner-up.

In the meantime, Campbell has com-

pleted a master's degree in public administration. The council could look elsewhere for a town manager, or promote Campbell. Currently, Campbell is one of the top three contenders to be the city manager of Atlantic Beach.

convene Aug. 9 in a special meeting to discuss the next steps in the town manager search. Campbell said if Atlantic Beach Commissioners offered her the position, that she would at least give a 30-day notice prior to her resignation.

"Right now, I don't have offers from Atlantic Beach or Orange Park, but if I get an offer from either city, I would consider it," she said. "I would have to weigh all the options. If I get two offers – I'd really have to think a lot about that."

Hanson said early on in his tenure, he sat down with Campbell and told her he would help her become a city manager.

"That's also a commitment I made to the town council...to get her ready as best I could," Hanson said. "Quite frankly I'm very impressed with Sarah. She is very bright, works very hard."

During the work week, Hanson lives out of an Orange Park apartment.

He said the first order of business after he retires would be to pack up the apartment and ration the furniture to his children, who he said are "just starting out" in life and could use the furniture.


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Blunders & Blooms 🔌 💓 "Green Horizon"

Disheartened. Discouraged. Dismayed. Disillusioned?

Nah, but darn disappointed.

Years back, having taken one of our county's fabulous and FREE extension workshops courtesy of the University of

Florida - go ahead, Gator fans, give a smug smile - and successfully repaired a rental property's weedy lot to a lush turf, I was ready to tackle the next level: a garden of my very own.



And not just any garden. Nope. This one was going to be

in the front yard as the dogs' domain would be the backyard. This vision of floral paradise would be, for the most part, dedicated to wildlife, especially our pollinator pals. As you may already know, both honey and native bees and many butterfly species, including the majestic monarch, are losing health and critical yardage as habitat continues to get devoured by agriculture and land development.

Like the words from the Wonder Woman movie's opening. I too wanted to help save the world, this beautiful place, a land of wonder: but, how could I without the powers of a superhero do anything of real benefit?

The answer came in transforming a gently sloping suburban yard from the traditional St. Augustine grass lawn into one abuzz with life thanks to no pesticide or herbicide, multi-colored flowers and protective greenery from mostly local and native plants.

Admittingly, the first year or two was rough as some neighbors who prefer a golf course-type lawn were not reticent about their displeasure. And there were others who just explained me to their grandchildren as "the funny lady."

But, after the third year of hard, continued work, a meadow-like garden emerged and when families would detour favorite pathways to walk or bicycle down our street and slow down to enjoy the house with all the butterflies. I felt like I had made a real impact on how we can live in harmony with the best of nature.

Then Hurricane Matthew hit in Octo-

ber of 2016. Most of my garden, including the young orange tree, survived and I felt grateful. The winter that followed was anything but cold so I worked the garden to expand it further. Early spring brought more *oohs* and *ahhs* from visitors and even some of those disapproving neighbors relaxed. All was well - or so I thought.

Late spring brought unyielding heat, followed by a bad wind storm (mini tornado as this Midwesterner would know), especially in northern Orange Park that included marble-size hail, and then rain. Lots and lots of rain, day after day. First, my happy garden was cooked, then it was blown to bits or pummeled, and if that didn't end it, mother nature then tried drowning what remained. The final straw or needle, I should say, came when I recently noticed the long-leaf pine my daughter had been given at One Spark as just a tiny bundle of green needles and within two years had grown into a full six feet of stately conifer had developed little white globules and wasn't looking quite as fit as "Captain Jack" (yes, apologies, we name some of our plants) had been looking a couple of weeks earlier.

Gasp! A bit of Googling told me that the captain had developed scale, an insect that can put him in the landlubber version of Davy Jones Locker. I hurried inside and grabbed a pair of old garden gloves, pulling each one of those insect balls off before nightfall. Since I had also read that certain wasps and milkweed assassin bugs - yeah, I know, cool name for a bug, huh - I was thrilled to see those insects the next morning with the hope of any remaining scale serving as breakfast, second breakfast, lunch, supper and as much leftovers as they can stuff themselves on.

But now what?

Do I give up on the idea of a garden more aligned with the needs of nature yet also vulnerable to nature's shifting temperament?

Did Wonder Woman guit? Of course not – well, maybe for a few moments with the confusion about Ares but temporary doubt is allowed even in the land of superheroes. What about Captain Jack Sparrow - would he give up? Not if there's rum involved. Or treasure. Or wenches. Or even better, all three.

And neither will this intrepid wildlife gardener. So, me hearties, bring me the green horizon. Yo, hoe, hoe ...

angular shaped moths that rest in shrubs and plants during the day and are most active at dusk, laying their eggs in clusters on the grass blades. When they hatch after 3-4 days, the larvae go through 6 growth stages, known as instars, increasing in size as they do. The younger instars can be as small as 1.2 millimeters and do most of the damage by "window-paning" the grass while older instars can be up to 11 millimeters long and chew and defoliate the grass.

To scout for the larvae, look all around the leaf blades of the turf and check for damage or caterpillars which feed at night and hide in thatch during the day. Remember that other larvae may be found in your

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Student-run food truck will train, nourish

By Jesse Hollett Staff Writer

GREEN COVE SPRINGS - She will be massive - 24-feet long end to end, with a television with menu items. Steam tables, a three-foot griddle and preparation tables lining both sides. A food truck operated with students. for students.

And on Thursday, if district leadership gets the green light, the blueprints staff have for a custom, district-operated food truck won't be a dream anymore – it could be rolling into schools this winter.

The Clay County School Board will decide tonight whether to design and build a district-operated food truck for student lunches. The food truck design is modeled after a similar program run in Alachua County

Since Superintendent Addison Davis took office in November, he has been steadily directing staff to develop a plan to bring a food truck into district schools a strategy employed by both neighboring Alachua and Nassau counties.

As proposed, the truck would travel between schools with new menu items for students to choose from. The district will hire new staff to operate this vehicle along with help from students in the district's Culinary Academy programs at the different high schools.

The \$162,000 price tag for custom construction and outfitting will come from the district's food service fund, which is funded through the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Staff salaries would also come from federal funding.

Davis said the food truck will boost food sales and increase excitement both in regular and Culinary Academy students.

"We wanted to think different about how we can be creative by engaging students who are in our culinary programs." Davis said. "One of the things we see from a national trend is we see...restaurants engaging in a new, creative way of pro-

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viding exciting opportunities for food, and one of those mechanisms is through a food truck.

The Alachua County School District's food truck travels around the county delivering meals to children both during and out of the school year.

"We see that that trend is not only nationally in the restaurant industry, but we see that schools are also starting to adopt the same strategy in order to get kids actively engaged...to take their skills and les-

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

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


sons they've learned in the classroom and transition them to a food truck."

He said working in the food truck would give students entrepreneurial experience as well as presentation, customer service and menu crafting skills that they could bring with them when they start their careers.

Davis said this is another method to make practical use of student's skills to show off their talents. The food truck could also rope in students who don't necessarily want to be seen in a cafeteria setting.

"You take the same type of food and you put a little bit of twist or spin on it, and all of a sudden it's the greatest thing," said Susan Glover, director of food and nutritional services for the Clay County School District.

said.

Upon board approval, the design would go for construction. Glover estimates the truck could take approximately four months to construct. Principals would then have to create calendars of when they would like the food truck to come to their school.

The food truck would also provide free school lunches for children over the summer.

As the program progresses, Davis said, there could be further opportunity to purchase a second food truck and have student-run culinary competitions between high schools both in, and out of the district.

"We may at the end of the year crown a champion through the food truck," Davis said. "So not only are we allowing them to be an entrepreneur and have the interaction of their skills and demonstrate and present their skills, but at the same time create some kind of healthy competition throughout all the skills to see if we can have some kind of food truck war."

It's a great opportunity for the district and for students, said Superintendent of Operations Michael Kemp.

"It's just a great, age-appropriate opportunity for kids, because it offers kids something different, exciting," he said. "Kids like different, and exciting, and anything new and exciting, if it's rolled out right, marketed right with the right strategies is going to be successful."





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Back-to-School Sales Tax Holiday a win for Floridians and retailers

TALLAHASSEE – The Florida Retail Federation, the state's premier trade association celebrating its 80th year of supporting Florida's retailers, is reminding Floridians and retailers of the upcoming back-to-school sales tax holiday weekend, taking place Aug. 4-6.

Serving as the state's 2nd busiest shopping "holiday," the weekend is expected to bring in near record-breaking sales, while Floridians are able to stretch their hard-earned dollars further and employees benefit from additional jobs and wages.

This year's holiday sees the return of eligible technology items up to \$750 tax free, which means substantial savings for Florida families.

"We are looking forward to another successful Back-to-School Sales Tax Holiday, and applaud Gov. Scott and the Legislature for recognizing the significance it has on our hard-working families and the 270,000 retailers throughout the State of Florida," said R. Scott Shalley, FRF president and chief executive officer. "Each year, shoppers show up in record numbers and provide a tremendous economic boost overall to retailers' sales numbers while they are able to afford more of the supplies they need."

Nationally, the average family is expected to spend \$687.72 on apparel and accessories, shoes and school supplies, up eight percent from 2016, according to FRF's national partners at the National Retail Federation's annual survey conducted by Prosper Insights and Analytics. Nationally, sales for this back-toschool shopping weekend are expected to reach \$83.6 billion, a more than 10 percent increase from last year's \$75.8 billion.

According to the survey, back-to-school shoppers plan to spend \$10.2 billion on clothing (purchased by 95 percent of respondents), \$8.8 billion on electronics such as computers or calculators (60 percent), \$5.6 billion on shoes (93 percent) and \$4.9 billion on school supplies such as notebooks, folders, pencils, backpacks and lunchboxes (97 percent).

Parents say they will spend an average of \$238.89 on clothing, \$204.33 on electronics, \$130.38 on shoes and \$114.12 on school supplies. While consumers plan to spend more across all categories, shoes and school supplies seeing the highest expected increase.

For the first time, the survey asked consumers what types of electronics they plan to purchase.

Among electronics shoppers, 45

percent said they would buy a laptop computer while more than a third plan to purchase a tablet (35 percent) or a

calculator (35 percent). One in four plan to purchase electronic accessories such as a

mouse, flash drive or charger.

According to the survey, 65 percent of back-to-school shoppers say half or more of their purchases are a direct result of their children's influence, up from 57 percent last year.

And while children's influence is growing, so too is their willingness to help their parents pay the bill: teenagers will contribute \$37.64, up from last year's \$32.90, and pre-teens will contribute \$27.09, up from last years \$20.08.

More families will tackle their backto-school lists early this year with 27 percent beginning two months before the beginning of school, up from 22 percent last year.

But not all shoppers are early birds, 21 percent will wait until the last week or two before school starts, about the same as last year's 22 percent. Of those shopping early, 60 percent say they are trying to spread

out their budgets, 48 percent don't want to miss out on sales and 43 percent want to avoid crowds.

When it comes to where parents will buy, they are shopping across a variety of retailers; 57 percent will shop at department stores, 54 percent at discount stores, 46 percent each at clothing stores and online, and 36 percent at office supply stores. For those shopping online, 91 percent plan to take advantage of free shipping and 54 percent will buy online and pick up in-store.

The back-to-school sales tax holiday has been one of the most popular shopping holidays among consumers and retailers and has been providing vital tax relief since it first began.

The holiday has been recognized in 16 out of the 20 years since it first began in 1998

Why experts say high-speed internet access matters to families

America's heartland decades ago, experts say that today, expanding broadband to every part of the country will have positive impacts on all communities nationwide. "To not have access to high-speed Internet today should be unimaginable as it is needed for education, commerce, health care and government services. Yet millions of rural Americans have limited or even no access to robust broadband," says Bloomfield. "It is critical to deliver this service affordably to the unserved, and to ensure those already receiving broadband remain served."

Advocates at NTCA - The Rural Broadband Association say that the future economic health of the country depends on broadband, and it should be included in any broader infrastructure initiatives, with an emphasis on programs that have worked in the past and a focus on addressing obstacles that can cause delays on projects moving forward.







FINA World Swimming Championships **Dressel's seven FINA golds tie Phelps**

Day 7: Three golds in one day

BUDAPEST – Caeleb Dressel was asked about going from the swimmer that was chasing the world's best swimmers to the guy that those same swimmers are now chasing after he blitzed the 100 freestyle final at the FINA World Swim Championships on July 27 in Budapest.

"I don't think it changed anything," said Dressel, in a post-race interview, who set a new American record in the event with his 47.17 split over American Olympic gold medalist Nathan Adrian, second in at 47.87. "Those guys are going to always be coming, you just always have to stay hungry."

Dressel, who won an astounding seven gold medals; with three individual golds, in his eight days in Budapest, was named the meet's Most Outstanding Male Swimmer. Dressel's lone non-medal event was the 50 butterfly where he finished fourth in 22.89 after posting the fastest split in the semifinals 22.76.

"The 50 fly is not popular in America and we only see it at world trials events," said Dressel. "We don't train for the 50 fly."

In a gold medal cache that tied American Michael Phelp's 2007 record of seven gold medals in a single world championship competition, Dressel, after winning the 100 free on Thurs., July 27, earned the first individual sprint gold medal since 2001 when American Anthony Ervin won the 50 and 100 freestyle finals. Football alums take Hatcher challenge for cause

ORANGE PARK – In its second annual collection of area football stars and former stars, the Derek Hatcher Foundation's fight to raise awareness of Opioid Addiction, the downfall of one of Clay County's finest quarterbacks, showed out Saturday morning at Dye-Clay YMCA at the QB-5 flag football tournament. "When I pulled up this morning, I thought last year the parking lot wasn't full," said David Hatcher, father to Derek Hatcher, a Ridgeview High standout quarterback who died of a drug overdose a year ago while trying out for his third college football team– Webber International University in Lake Wales. "This year, the parking lot was full. I think everyone likes getting out here early. It's a great turnout. When you have a foun-SEE ALUMS, 28

dation, you want it to grow and that's what it's doing."

Derek Lee Hatcher was a standout quarterback at Ridgeview High School, setting numerous Clay County records in his four years of play. At graduation, Hatcher was recruited and signed with the University of Arkansas Razorbacks as a punter.

After a year with Arkansas, Hatcher sensed a gap between the business end of big-time college football and searched for a smaller, religion based college. He later transferred to Charleston Southern University where he was nearly named the starting quarterback, but was also introduced to the drugs that eventually got him kicked out of school.

After returning home and working on getting sober, Hatcher fell prey to harder drugs and the associated crimes. Hatcher's world spiraled quickly out of control after being arrested and jailed.

After a somewhat successful rehabilitation program that required Hatcher to talk to high school teams about the drug addiction and lifestyle that stole his ambition, Hatcher had his second chance with a walk-on tryout at Webber.

But, the lore of the addiction soon resurfaced and Hatcher was found dead of an overdose while readying to play football again on Feb., 21, 2016.

Faced with this tragedy, his mother, Debbie Kelly, made her own choice; she could hold in the pain, or turn this around and do something. QB-5 had its birth.

"I had a nephew who was 13 when Derek passed away, he loved Derek, and he thought- Let's do a Flag-Football Tournament, so here we are," said Kelly. "This is our second year and we have 20 teams this year. The proceeds of the event go towards substance abuse education and addiction education." Kelly said the money from the tournament was able to purchase 200 DVD's of Derek speaking (about his story).

"We'll be spreading those out to area high schools and colleges and junior high schools," said Kelly. "It's a video of Derek speaking to youth before he passed away. He wanted people to know what happened to him and he wanted to keep anyone else to from having the same problem."

Hatcher was amazed with this year's turnout.

"For me, it's kind of sad as you prepare for it," said Hatcher. "Then you get out here and see the smiling faces and you realize how many people loved Derek, how many friends he had."

ORANGE PARK - Ridgeview High soccer standout Ricky Prestridge, Class of 2014, had a precarious choice in the middle of his senior season as a starting midfielder for the Panthers.

"I had an offer to play at the University of Central Florida and was all set to play there until the day before I was supposed to move in," said Prestridge. "I was also getting interest to play with the Jacksonville Armada FC club right here in Jacksonville.

Prestridge, 21, signed to play at UCF and continued his high school days with split time between Ridgeview High and an Orlando-based club team; Orlando City where Prestridge was a captain and a nationally-ranked scoring machine.

"Ricky is a scorer, but he is also a great all-around player who isn't afraid to play defense," said Brindley, who took Trinity to a NCCAA Division II national title in his three year tenure, while compiling a 43-17 overall record.

So many of us can attest to good hearing - but will it last? Suppose you get the flu or go into the hospital with pneumonia or have diabetes? These all affect hearing. Hypertension can cause head noises (tinnitus); ototoxic drugs can be given for cancer treatments, thyroid problems, congestive heart failure, arthritis or even a headache - Do you have allergies or fullness in the ears - these are all culprits of hearing loss. When hearing acuity diminishes gradually, look first at your history: Did you work around loud noises, were you in the service (quinine), any acoustic trauma in your background? Check your medications for side effects; get an otoscopic exam of your ear canal to check for ear wax. Did your loss come on suddenly and is one-sided? A hearing evaluation may be the first step towards uncovering an acoustic neuroma (brain tumor); do you have ringing in the ears, dizziness, and a low frequency hearing loss - Meniere's Syndrome. First sign of a stroke may be a sudden hearing loss. Hearing loss may affect brain structure in a way that contributes to cognitive problems. Treating hearing loss more aggressively could help stave off cognitive decline and dementia. Smith comes aboard as a volunteer after serving as the women's soccer head coach at Hannibal-LaGrange University for three seasons.









later won the 50 free on Sat., July 29 to equal Ervin's accomplishment.

"I think the comparisons (to Phelps) are inevitable," said Dressel. "I'm not the same person as Michael. I'm not here to count medals. I just want to keep doing my own thing at this meet and for the future."

Dressel's total tally for the week included a 50 free gold in an American record, a 100 butterfly gold in an American record and just .04 seconds off of Micheal Phelp's 2009 world record and the 100 freestyle gold medal in an American record that has stood since 2009. Dressel also has a gold from the 4 x 100 free relay, a gold and world record as part of the mixed 400 medley relay, a gold in the mens 4 x 100 free relay and his final gold medal in the men's 4 x 100 medley relay with Dressel on the third leg; the butterfly.

The American team was named the Best Team of the Championship with 38 medals.

"There are a lot of young, up and coming swimmers in USA swimming and I don't think you can put the best swimmer all on me," said Dressel. "There is plenty of talent to go around."

In the 100 free final on Thurs., July 27, with France's Mehdy Metella out-touching Dressel in the semifinal rounds the night before for the top time of that series of races, Dressel blasted the first 50 in a remarkable 22.31 split then held on with the second fastest split for the second 50, 24.86 to edge out Adrian and Metella, who snagged third in 47.89.

"It was great to have the top seed flanked by Adrian and myself," said Dressel, positioned in lane five with Adrian in three and Metella in four. "I knew those guys would be coming after me. I just wanted to go out and do the best I could."

Adrian, seventh in the event at the 2015 World Championships, stormed back and overtook Metella in the final 10 meters with a strong 24.90 final 50 with Metella falling back at 25.31 after a 22.58 opening 50 meters.

In 2015, China's Zetao Ning won the 100 free final in 47.84.

"Nothing can prepare you for a meet like a meet," said Adrian, the Olympic gold medalist and U.S. Olympic Trials champion. "We got a lot of rest in Croatia before we came here and I think I kind of outpsyched myself in that first relay (4 x 100 free). I just relaxed in this one."

In the mixed medley relay, Dressel swam a 49.92 third leg in the butterfly with teammates Matt Grevers in backstroke, Lilly King in breaststroke and Simona Manuel the anchor in freestyle crushing the field in 3:38.56 to best the previous record of 3:40.28, also a previous American held world record. Dressel did not swim the morning preliminary round of the mixed relay, but the USA team was revamped with Dressel, in butterfly, and Matt Grevers in backstroke, teaming with Lilly King in breaststroke and Manuel in the anchor freestyle leg.

Dressel was the top qualifier in the 100 butterfly with a 50.08 split in the preliminary rounds on day six; Fri., July 28, and

an even faster split, 50.07, in the semifinals, both at the time the third fastest ever for the event with American Michael Phelps holding the world mark at 49.82 from 2009.

"I didn't consider myself a butterfly swimmer, but I guess I'll be swimming a lot more fly in practice," said Dressel. "It's nice to get close to the record."

On Sat., July 29, in the 100 butterfly final staged just 35 minutes after Dressel had bested the field in the 50 freestyle in 21.15 seconds, Dressel calmly warmed down, replenished and reset for his second of three finals on the evening.

"The NCAA championships are similiar to the schedule here so I was familiar with racing, cooling down, warming back up and mentally resetting," said Dressel, who has three 50 free NCAA titles; two 100 free NCAA titles and one 100 butterfly NCAA title for the University of Florida where he is finishing his junior year. "I have an algebra test on Tuesday (August 1), but my teach-

The second public hearing is being held pursuant to Chapters 190 and 197, *Florida Statutes*, to consider the imposition of operations and maintenance special assessments ("**O&M Assessments**") upon the lands located within the District, to fund the Proposed Budget for Fiscal Year 2017/2018; to consider the adoption of an assessment roll; and, to provide for the levy, collection, and enforcement of assessments. At the conclusion of the hearings, the Board will, by resolution, adopt a budget and levy O&M Assessments as finally approved by the Board. A Board meeting of the District will also be held where the Board may consider any other District business.

Description of Assessments

The District imposes O&M Assessments on benefitted property within the District for the purpose of funding the District's general administrative, operations, and maintenance budget and providing the funds necessary to pay debt service on outstanding bonds as reflected in the District's debt service budget. A geographic depiction of the property potentially subject to the proposed O&M Assessments is identified in the map attached hereto. The table below shows the schedule of the proposed O&M Assessments, which are subject to change at the hearing:

The proposed O&M Assessments as stated include collection costs and/or early payment discounts, which Clay County ("County") may impose on assessments that are collected on the County tax bill. Moreover, pursuant to Section 197.3632(4), *Florida Statutes*, the lien amount shall serve as the "maximum rate" authorized by law for O&M Assessments, such that no assessment hearing shall be held or notice provided in future years unless the assessments are proposed to be increased or another criteron within Section 197.3632(4), *Florida Statutes*, is met. Note that the O&M Assessments do not include any debt service assessments previously levied by the District and due to be collected for Fiscal Year 2017/2018.

For Fiscal Year 2017/2018, the District intends to have the County tax collector collect the assessments imposed on property within the District. It is important to pay your assessment because failure to pay will cause a tax certificate to be issued against the property which may result in loss of title, or for direct billed assessments, may result in a foreclosure action, which also may result in a loss of title. The District's decision to collect assessments on the tax roll or by direct billing does not preclude the District from later electing to collect those or other assessments in a different manner at a future time.


