

'Moms' celebrate recently-signed legislation

Group visits RI Statehouse as governor signs 'red flag' and bump stock ban bills

On Friday, June 1, the Rhode Island Chapter of Moms Demand Action for Gun Sense In America celebrated as Rhode Island Governor Gina Raimondo signed into law the "red flag" legislation that allows courts to disarm individuals who are believed by law enforcement to represent a violent threat to themselves or others, and a ban on bump stocks and other rapid-fire gun modifications.

Rhode Island is the eighth state to prohibit bump stocks following the Las Vegas mass shooting, and the fourth state to pass a red flag law following the Parkland, Fla. mass shooting.

Both pieces of legislation moved swiftly this session as compared to the domestic violence gun bill, which passed into law in 2017 after many years of study and debate.

Many Barrington residents attended the bill signing ceremony at the Rhode Island Statehouse.

Stray cat scanned, returned to its owner

Barrington police responded to a County Road real estate office on Friday, June 1, after a stray cat turned up there. The police officer brought the cat to the Riverside Animal Hospital to be checked out — workers at the animal hospital scanned the cat's microchip. The scan revealed that the cat belonged to a Bristol resident. Police called the Bristol woman who came to pick up her cat; the Bristol woman said her cat had gone missing two weeks earlier, on Friday, May 18.

Sowams students map local landmarks

Sowams School third-graders share projects about Del's, the Newport Mansions, RIPTA, and lots more

There was a project about Iggy's doughboys, and another about Fort Adams.

One project featured a model of a Newport mansion, while there was also one that explored Bristol's Colt State Park.

For the second straight year, third-graders at Sowams School worked on a map project that focused on all things Ocean State-related. After completing research projects about different Rhode Island-themed subjects, students created special placards that were then placed all over a huge — 16-foot-by-24foot — floor map of Rhode Island.

The plastic floor map travels to different

schools all across the state as part of a program offered by the Rhode Island Geography Education Alliance. At Sowams School, the third grade classes led by Jenny Gaynor, Susan Fagan and Kathryn Carey were involved in the project.

Students have the option of building a model to go with their project or creating an online slideshow. Students' project placards are given a small "quick response" code, or QR code.

During the recent family night at Sowams School, students and their parents could use tablets and phones to scan the codes and check out the presentations.

One of the placards promised a slideshow about Block Island, and there was another that was focused on Rhode Island diners. There were other placards for the New England Patriots, Del's Lemonade, Fishing, Brown University, and Lime Rock Lighthouse. Third-graders Anna Bahena and Molly Thurston completed their project on The Elms. The two girls also created a model of the famous Newport mansion.

"We used shoe boxes and covered them (with paper)," said Molly. "There's some fake grass."

Anna said she helped make some of the bushes.

Both girls said they would like to visit the mansion and, if they were allowed, play a game of hide-and-seek inside.

"I would like to run around the inside," added Anna.

The map, which allows students to complete some project-based learning, has become so popular that Sowams School Principal Jim Callahan recently approached the Barrington Education Foundation and requested a grant so the school could purchase its own Rhode Island floor map. BEF obliged.

Special presentation will highlight land trust meeting

The Barrington Land Conservation Trust will hold its annual meeting on Wednesday, June 20, at 7 p.m. at the Barrington Public Library Auditorium.

Following a brief business meeting, Mark Richardson will present a talk entitled "Replace your Lawn for More Biodiversity." Mr. Richardson's multi-media presentation will explain that traditional lawns are resource-heavy — they require irrigation, fertilizer, and pesticides to thrive in the New England climate.

He will make the case that most residents would be better off reducing or eliminating lawns altogether and he will discuss how people can replace their lawns with native plants that are functional, beautiful, and environmentally friendly.

Mr. Richardson oversees the New Eng-

land Wildflower Society's botanic garden, Garden in the Woods, and its native plant nursery in Whately, Mass. He studied ornamental horticulture at the University of Rhode Island and helped run a mid-sized ornamental plant nursery before finding his passion in public horticulture. He is the author of a new book "Native Plants for New England Gardens."

Police: No parking on Nayatt

Police chief says cars parked on side of road are dangerous

Barrington Police Chief John LaCross is reminding residents and non-residents

that parking is not permitted along Nayatt Road.

Recently, people unable to find parking spaces in the dirt lot at the Tillinghast Place property owned by the Rhode Island School of Design on Nayatt Road, instead parked their cars, trucks and SUVs along the edge of Nayatt Road.

Chief LaCross said the parked cars created a dangerous situation for motorists, bicyclists and pedestrians on Nayatt. He said parking is not permitted on Nayatt, and added that he may request "No Parking" signs be installed along the road.

Local legislators sponsor 'Safe Schools' and weapons ban bills

Members of RI Coalition Against Gun Violence visit Statehouse

More than 50 members of the RI Coalition Against Gun Violence attended a Lobby Day at the Rhode Island Statehouse in late May to advocate for the passage of the Safe Schools Act (H7591, S2289) and the Assault Weapons Ban (H7766, S2493).

Barrington Representatives Jason Knight and Joy Hearn, and Senator Cindy Coyne are sponsors of these two bills.

Rhode Island is one of only four states that generally allows the carrying of concealed guns in K-12 schools. The Safe Schools Act would ban the concealed carrying of guns in Rhode Island K-12 schools except for peace officers, which includes police officers (including retired officers) and school resource officers.

The RI Police Chiefs Association supports this bill.

The Assault Weapons Ban is a bill to ban the sale, transfer, manufacture and importation of military style weapons and high capacity magazines. Neighboring states Massachusetts and Connecticut — and 8 other states — already ban weapons of war for civilian use.

Health dept. awards Barrington grant

Grant will allow town to hold workshops focused on climate change


The Rhode Island Department of Health recently awarded \$42,000 in grants to 10 local groups, including \$4,900 to Barrington, to work on projects related to climate change education and community resilience. The grants are aimed at helping communities prepare for, respond to, and recover from the adverse effects of climate change.

In alignment with the RIDOH's Climate Change Program's mission, Barrington officials intend to use the grant to assist in the creation of a multi-faceted community outreach program that will "function to both raise awareness of and motivate actions to mitigate the harmful health risks from climate change that are associated with extreme heat, mosquitos and ticks, storms, and flooding."

The outreach program will be a week of workshops that will be held in August.


"The PROJECT will be designated as 'Barrington Emergency Preparedness Week: Health Risks in a Changing Climate," stated a recent press release.

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EDITORIAL A level playing field

t's time the Rhode Island Interscholastic League levels the playing field.

For too long, public high school sports teams have been forced to play against private high

school sports teams that recruit players from a

wide region.

Our gripe is not with the private school teams. Our gripe is with the league that allows the privates to compete against the publics for the same titles.

One does not need to have an extensive sports background to see the challenge public high school sports teams face each year when they step on the pitch, court or track oval against private school sports teams. In many cases, the student-athletes from Barrington High School, East Providence, Portsmouth and beyond are facing off against hand-picked all-star teams.

In fact, the public school teams in Rhode Island face the double-hit of losing talent (often some of their best) to local private schools and then having to play against that same talent twice a year during the regular season and again in the playoffs.

Barrington High School's boys and girls lacrosse teams

The BHS boys' lacrosse team was eliminated from the playoffs by Moses Brown in the semifinals this spring, while the BHS girls lost to Moses Brown in the girls' championship.

The Interscholastic League makes a choice to allow the private schools to play against the public schools. LaSalle, Bishop Hendricken, Prout, St. Raphael's and the other Rhode Island private schools could take their games to private school leagues, such as the New England Preparatory School Athletic Council. There, the Rams, Hawks, Quakers and others could play against similar teams that recruit. Many would likely flock to see a basketball game pitting Hendricken against St. Andrew's School or Tilton School or Vermont Academy.

It's time officials take a serious look at the inequities in Rhode Island high school athletics. It's time they get serious about leveling the playing fields.

And with this plan there is absolutely ZERO risk to the Rhode Island taxpayer. Guess we learned SOMETHING from the 38 Studios debacle. TI send Curt Schilling a fruit basket. DUH SPEAKAH

To the editor:

I'm all kinds of amused that I was the subject of a defensive diatribe by Mr. Fuller in this past week's Letters to the Editor, and just had to answer before I go back to my "leftist" life. By the way, "puritanical" was such a hilariously inept assessment of me that it just leaves me chuckling.

I must admit to not having an American Civics class in middle school. The topic was not considered an essential course of study in the British educational system in which I was raised. Within the current climate of our society, as determined by the political administration that has been in charge since 2016, those civil liberties we "should" have are overshadowed by prejudice, fundamentalism, religious heavy handedness in a country that was founded on the separation of church and state, and an outrageous misuse of power.

The Hate Has No Home Here signs are saying, that's not okay, that's not the climate we think is ethical, nor is it the climate of which the United States should be in the midst. Especially given this country's origins and the tenets on which it was built, tenets which are still respected and valued by the majority of its people. Is Mr. Fuller saying America is only America if its views are those of the original 20? Seriously?



'Dancing' on the spectrum on stage

New play explores romance and relationship between a dancer and a teacher on the autism spectrum

Star crossed lovers and the attraction of opposites; now that's a story as old as stories itself.

In the play "Dancing Lessons," now at 2nd Story Theatre, this age old trope is given a new and timely twist. In this poignant, quirky heartwarming play, a Professor with Asperger's syndrome needs to learn to dance. He finds instruction from a dancer with an injured leg. From this unlikely meeting springs romance, insight and mutual understanding.

When I attended a recent rehearsal, 2nd Story Theatre Artistic Director Ed Shea explained that "these two characters are etched mired in the vast expanse between left brain and right brain." The teacher is very literal minded, focused on the facts of the matter. The dancer, as artists are wont to be, has little concern for such mundane matters. This dichotomy inherent in the play meets in the middle between the joy of 'dancing' and the hard scholarship of 'lessons.'

Learning can and should be a joy as well, and language connects us all. Talking can be like learning to dance. But we are all each wired differently and perception varies widely. Onstage language is action itself, it is freedom. But learning to listen and decipher is the key to that freedom.

At the rehearsal I attended, considerable insight was provided by Nick Gallop of the Asperger/Autism Network. "The thought process of existence takes over the body," he explained, to live on the spectrum is "to be overwhelmed by the intensity of thought." A friendly and gregarious man, Mr. Gallop was generous enough to come and share his insights and experiences with the cast of "Dancing Lessons." This proved to be an illuminating and wonderful experience.

Mr. Gallop aided and assisted the actors on the realities of living, and thriving, with the Asperger's diagnosis. Much of this consisted of "trying to do what 'neurotypicals' expect and the struggle to "imitate neurotypical behavior." This is, he explains "often a choice between being more lonely and being yourself."

"Assimilation," he expounds, "is a mask." Diagnosed at age 8, he recalls his life "on the spectrum," an Asperger's diagnosis that affects one in 68 Americans. He describes a hyper-awareness that shapes his ends and notes the struggle to imitate "what neurotypicals expect."

"I have a lot of social anxiety," he contin-

ued. "I can come off as antagonistic without meaning to." The act of processing the phenomena of life and assuming "transitions

between modes of thought without logic can be difficult," and Mr. Gallop describes the internally "manual and not automatic

way" he has had to catch himself to react in ways that he is not familiar with. Learning to add vocal inflections to indicate a joke he's making, for example, and overcoming "expressing empathy with an almost robotic feel and the impulse to explain everything he's feeling to everyone."

Eventually he studied psychology in college with an aim to understand and to help, got his degree and now works for the Asperger/Autism Network. "Removing the mask in order to explain the mask" and provide a greater understanding. "I'm a rebel for not agreeing to other classifications" of what one might assume the life on this spectrum is all about. "It's not hard, it's not easy. It's how I process."

The human mind/body connection is a mysterious thing, and that is something that is deftly explored in Mark St. Germain's pithy and insightful play. The professor Ever Montgomery and dancer Senga Quinn "each teach each other and grow from characteristics the other lacked in the beginning," Ed Shea explained. How we perceive and process this world we live in is an

Dr. Munoz has the right medicine for Rhode Island's ills

ne of the great benefits of writing a column is that you get to meet interesting people. It is even more rewarding when you listen to somebody who is young and who has altruistic plans that can actually work.

One such person is Dr. Luis Daniel Munoz, an independent candidate for governor. Previously, I wrote a column about his candidacy, which focused on his innovative plans for economic development which would spur the creation of medical devices and the nanotechnology of the future. On May 30 he held a press conference to elaborate on his idea of a new type of community health initiatives as well as education of a new work force. Here are some of his ideas:

MEND-i (Mend and Innovate Community Health) represents a new type of community health centers which improves access to quality and timely health care. Participating community health systems would adopt the latest telemedicine and home monitoring technologies in order to provide accessible, affordable and higher quality care for all Rhode Island families.

Through Skype and other conferencing mechanisms, addiction services, mental health services, and care coordination for seniors and veterans would be available online. Being able to "dialup" professionals online not only would improve care delivery but also would reduce hospital costs by saving lives through better preventive measures.



DINO (Dynamic Intelligence for National Opportunity) — Doctor Munoz believes that investing in people by creating a nationally recognized tech-force that will power great industries has to be a laser focus on the state's educational efforts.

Starting in middle school, children have to be exposed to "idea creation" through after-school initiatives on creative and vocational training. By leveraging private and public technical universities and colleges by the time a student is in high school, these after school programs will produce a highly skilled and civically engaged talent force. Credits would be transferable to the universities and the older students would interact as mentors for younger students through programs at the YMCA, YWCA, and other community centers.

Given the expected rapid changes in technology, Dr. Munoz wants course offerings to be vetted by business metrics and real time work at businesses. Juniors and seniors would have the opportunity to be part of a work force as interns and, parenthetically, earn mon-

ey for college. Real life experience would count as credits toward graduation and also cut down on course redundancy.

RINO (Redefining Intelligence for National Opportunity) — Dr. Munoz sees the need to have frequent retraining programs for adults. This initiative would embody necessary language learning services, certification credits and business course work (e.g. business ethics, professional rhetoric, and finance).

In effect, RINO is the adult version of DINO and would be open to adult learners and non-traditional students. The education would try to anticipate the growth, for example, in database professions from medical coding to robotics with learning how to code and react to alert sensors, etc. This program would focus on intermediary and high demand technical and managerial jobs in healthcare, manufacturing, sensor diagnostics and database management.

Nobody would ever accuse Dr. Munoz of being a small thinker. His bottom line is undoubtedly correct: Educational excellence is about building people, not buildings. He is an asset in the debate over Rhode Island's future.

important issue for this playwright, who penned a play seen a while back at 2nd Story: "Freud's Last Session" in which Freud met C.S. Lewis and issues of faith and reason were much discussed.

With this play, the internal conflict between science and imagination is explored. There is a intersection between their concerns that does not exactly match up; much as music and mathematics are intrinsically linked, but an equation is not a sonata.

"Truth is more than data," Senga exclaims, to which Ever replies, "yes but it is only the chemistry of the brain that creates imagination." In the midst of the budding romantic relationship, we see a microcosm of the big questions that civilization has always wrestled with since Aristotle warned in his Poetics that the dramatic arts "are a lie that tells the truth."

In the course of this play, each character's train of thought operates on different schedules; Ever's makes a lot of stops to halt and process while Senga's takes a more direct route. The characters are lovingly and endearingly played by the talented young actors, Cam Torres and Rachel Tondreault. To watch their initial courtship dance is to fall in love. This is so wonderfully painful," Senga exclaims, and Ever notes that "I want my brain to stop it, but my body won't listen. I'm confused but not disturbed."

Watching these talented actors rehearse, Nick Gallop exclaimed about the play that "the dialogue that brings them together is amazing." These words ring true, and Mr. Gallop brought considerable verisimilitude to these proceedings, remarking and consulting exactitude of the reality presented here, right down the mechanical details of sensory issues such as the difficulty Ever might have in making eye contact while delivering a particular line.

Theatre is an art form both literal and figurative. Through very specific words and actions it can convey the ineffable and help us understand ourselves, and each other, in ways we didn't necessarily grasp before. Our daily conundrum is that while truth is stranger than fiction, we sometimes need a little fiction to explain that truth. Quirky, funny, engaging and just plain lovely, "Dancing Lessons" promises to help us all understand ourselves and each other a little bit more.

All sunscreens are NOT created equal

tology, 20% of Americans will develop skin cancer to 80 minutes in water but then re-application in their lifetime. Along with hats and protective clothing, sunscreen is one the most important tools used to prevent skin damage and skin cancers.

But how do you know you are picking the right sunscreen for you and your family? Knowing what the language written on the back of a sunscreen package means is half the battle.

Broad spectrum sunscreen protects us from both UVA and UVB sun rays. UVA rays penetrate deeper into the skin causing wrinkles and breaking down the structure of the skin. UVB rays are more superficial and cause sunburns. By protecting your skin from both UVA and UVB you are ultimately helping prevent skin damage that can end in skin cancer, premature skin aging, and sunburns.

Sun Protection Factor, or SPF, is defined as how well sunscreen protects you from sunburn. It is important to note there are no sunscreens that filter out 100% of sun's UVB rays. The AAD recommends using at least SPF 30 which filters out 97% of UVB rays.

What is waterproof sunscreen? THERE IS NO SUCH THING. Sweat and water wash sunscreen from our skin. However, the FDA does recognize water resistance and has broken down sunscreens into two categories:

• Water resistant: these sunscreens are effective for approximately 40 minutes in water. After that time, reapplication is needed.

· People with sensitive skin should also consider physical sunscreens that do not have fragrance, oil, PABA or chemicals






