## Hix Bridge dredging decision nears

Town Administrator Tim King reported last month that the Army Corps of Engineers is only a couple of months away from submitting the feasibility report on a long-anticipated project to dredge the Westport River's East Branch in the vicinity of Hix Bridge.

William Bartlett, project manager for the Army Corps' Greater Boston area, said that the study is substantially complete and is undergoing review.

The effort began when it was discovered that concrete debris from previous Hix Bridge projects had been dumped onto the river, reducing depths in places from 30 feet to just a few feet. That, in turn, has disturbed tidal flow in the area,

## Trouble in the treasury

Rare public discipline hearing leads to suspension

Town officials said Assistant Town Treasurer Mary Sullivan did not do the work she was paid and trained to do, but her lawyer described her as a "scapegoat" for deeper problems in the treasurer's department.


After a highly unusual open session public employee discipline hearing on Tuesday, Sept. 4, the Board of Selectmen voted unanimously that Ms. Sullivan be suspended five days without pay. The motion also requires Town Administrator Tim King to enter into a new performance improvement plan with Ms. Sullivan that includes additional training.

Ms. Sullivan, who was already out on paid administrative leave for "certain failures in her performance," appeared before selectmen with her attorney, Philip N. Beauregard. Seated behind her were some Town Hall employees, several of whom would speak on her behalf.

Before public proceedings began, the board twice went into closed session with Ms. Sullivan, once to discuss possible settlement terms. When no agreement was reached, the public hearing she had requested began.

Town Counsel David Jenkins described what he said were thoroughly documented "failures in performance that had extended

some believe, and impacted oysters populations upriver.

Discussions a half dozen years ago indicated that the project might cost \$1 million with the Army Corps paying around \$600,000 and the state contributing \$400,000.

The Corps was said at that

time to be an "enthusiastic partner" in the project.

#### Treasurer's office update

Good news, for a change, was reported from the town Treasurer's Department when the Board of Selectmen met early last month.

Selectmen Richard Brewer, who had met with a committee that is dealing with issues in the Treasurer's Department, said he is "seeing real progress ... clear evidence that we are gaining ground on the reconciliation" of town accounts.

"This is real progress the likes of which we haven't seen."

That said, he added that there remain some long-term concerns and uncertainty regarding the makeup of the department which continues to rely on the help of a consultant to stay caught up.

Town Administrator Tim King said that those account reconciliations, which had once some 17 months behind, are now caught up through the end of May.

At the same meeting, selectmen extended the town's contract with consultant CPA Eric A. Kinsherf who was brought in when the extent of problems within the department was first revealed.

Selectmen are also continuing to negotiate an exit plan with elected Treasurer Brad Brightman. Town Meeting voters have approved a change from the past practice of electing treasurers to one in which treasurers will be appointed by and answer to selectmen. That change begins at the conclusion of Mr. Brightman's term.

#### **Head of Westport**

Selectmen completed an arduous process that began in 2013 when they approved the Westport River Watershed Alliance's lease for property at the Head of Westport where the WRWA's conversion of the old Head garage to its new head-quarters is nearly complete.

WRWA Director Deborah Weaver said that the organization hopes to move in to the completely renovated building in September and to hold a dedication sometime in October.

WRWA Chairman Tom Schmitt expressed appreciation to the town for its assistance through the long project.

"The relationship with the town has been great," he said.

Town Meeting voters have Throughout what has been a pproved a change from the complex project, "the town did a great job of stepping up."

#### **Appointments**

Selectmen voted to:

- Hire Diana A. Venafro to the position of senior clerk in the Tax Assessor's Department. The board was told that the job had received a large number of applicants, ten of whom were interviewed.
- Appoint Joseph C. Reis Jr. to serve as a full-time health agent for the Board of Health (he held a similar job in Fall River and is also a registered nurse).
- Agreed to hire Daniel Ledoux as a seasonal employee for the Highway Department he brought strong reviews from his previous service to the department.
- Appointed Henry Lanier to the Affordable Housing Trust.
- Accepted with appreciation for his service the retirement of Maintenance Specialist John Medeiros, effective September 15.

over a long period of time." He said the accusations involved nothing criminal or

As assistant treasurer, the "two most crucial duties" for which she was hired, Mr. Jenkins said, are maintaining the town 'cash book,' and handling the monthly reconciliation (assuring that all town bank accounts are accurate and up to date.

He also said that, in her resume that she provided when hired in 2017, she claimed to have "strong knowledge" of Microsoft Excel, Word and Outlook.

"It's no secret for me to say that the treasurer's office in town had problems, pretty severe," Mr. Jenkins said, and "certainly Ms. Sullivan is not the cause of those problems."

Mr. Jenkins said that when problems were discovered in that office, Eric Kinsherf, CPA/consultant was brought in to straighten things out. Among other things, he prescribed and arranged training for both Treasurer Brad Brightman and Ms. Sullivan.

At a long series of meetings, he said, "it was repeatedly emphasized to Ms. Sullivan that the cash book had to be maintained on

But, "from December, 2018, through April, 2019, Ms. Sullivan did nothing with the cash books ... failed to make entries as instructed." Members of a treasurer's office review board were "astonished" that after six months of training and dozens of meetings, the work was not getting done.

In one email, a consultant described and spreadsheet she had created as "un-useable. I have no idea what she did to arrive at

"All of this shows," Mr. Jenkins said, "that Ms. Sullivan is a good person, she is easy to get along with and has many friends in Town Hall but after substantial efforts to train, supervise and instruct, Ms. Sullivan is just not able, for whatever reasons, to handle these two major functions of her posi-

Karen Raus of the town Finance Committee said she believes that Mr. Kinsherf had clearly assigned tasks and that these were regularly discussed with Ms. Sullivan at meetings. He said that Mr. Kinsherf said he had been trying to train the assistant treasurer but she does not have the Excel skills to manage the cash book.

Mr. Beauregard, however, argued that Ms. Sullivan Ms. Sullivan's skills and background were known to those who hired her but that she was thrust into a bad situation — "difficulties that had arisen from the fact that the elected treasurer (Brad Brightman) was not able to to perform all of the duties of a town treasurer." She was forced, he said, to "play catch up" and do work beyond that for which she was hired.

"There is nothing short of the meaning of the word scapegoat at this point," Mr. Beauregard said.

Her job description mentioned "assisting the town treasurer, not running the town know the job."

Mr. Beauregard produced an e-mail that he said Ms. Sullivan had written to Town Administrator Tim King in February of 2018

in which she expressed concern about the cash books not being updated. "Brad has asked me to update all of these accounts," by "backing-in" data, the e-mail stated. "Complying with that request" would compromise the integrity of the documents and

"Mary is absolutely willing to continue and take whatever training is needed," he

Mr. Beauregard called several audience members to the microphone.

Town Clerk Marline Samson said that Ms. Sullivan was "enthusiastic" when she started but later confided in me "that she was very concerned about the cash books and reconciliations that were not done before she got here.

"She wanted the training, she wanted to do the job, unfortunately the treasurer was not able to help her because Brad did not

Former Town Clerk Carol Borden said that Ms. Sullivan also confided with her "about the work that was going on in there, or wasn't going on in there.. I think that with the proper training, Mary will do an excellent job."

Ms. Sullivan said she is now confident that she has the ability to do a job that she admitted has "been overwhelming at times ... Yes, I need additional training," she added, but the cash book was perfect when I left in August.

She said that cash book responsibility was initially unclear — went back and forth between her and Mr. Brightman.

Not so, Ms. Raus replied.

"In regards to the cash book, that task was tasked to Mary right at the onset ... and it has never changed. That has always been her responsibility."

#### Selectmen's decision

Board Chairwoman Shana Shufelt said selectmen had several options:

- No action, in which case Ms. Sullivan's could return from administrative leave and resume work as usual.
- Continue the hearing to give all on the board the opportunity to read the lengthy backup material presented by Mr. Jenkins (an option she supported).
- Consider disciplinary action of some sort, ranging from something minor to termination.

"After the thousands and thousand of dollars we spent on Eric the consultant doing all of the training, we are hearing that there should be more training," selectman Steven Ouellette said. "We offered those options before to Mary. What are we saying is missing now because we had one of the best CPAs round helping this department action, it will just continue, not improve.

"I don't think anything is missing," Town Administrator Tim King replied.

we appoint another treasurer, we need someone in there with their feet on the ground, ready to get going before we run into a mess. We are paying extra money now for a consultant."

The notes of the oversight committee and consultants "are very detailed and you can see frustration building over time, lots of frustration," Ms. Shufelt said. My biggest concern is that if we don't take some sort of

## **Underclassmen lead Wildcats to 2-1 victory**

Stout defense holds in opener despite Diman's physical play (and Dorian)

Eighth grade forward Korynne Holden and sophomore striker Jesse Skov lead the Wildcats to a 2-1 victory over Diman in the girls soccer season opener at Westport High School in spotty rain on Friday afternoon.

"It was a very good game. A tough game. It's always a battle between us and Diman," said Head Coach Gary Muello.

The game became physical from the start. Players crashing into each other, bodies tumbled to the ground.

Diman's sophomore defenders Esmaralda Coutinho and Gwen Banville carried the physical play between bouts of rain brought by offshore hurricane Dorian. But they couldn't stop Holden, Skov and the team's pass-first offense.

"It was a hard fought battle," said coach Muello. "Our possession game is really improving and that's where I'm hoping that we start to move forward. I was really proud of them. We have such a young team and we only had two subs."

At the 13 minute mark, Skov blocked a pass in Westport territory and immediately dribbled upfield. The compact freshman spotted an opening for Holden and skillfully passed the ball through Diman defenders. The speedy Holden gathered the pass amid contact and burst for the net with defenders in tow. Diman goalkeeper Jess Costa met Holden halfway and threw her body at the ball and blocked it. But that didn't stop Holden. She hurdled over the keeper, and tapped the ball into the open net to give the Wildcats a 1-0 lead.

"I jumped because I thought she was going to tackle me," Holden said. She ended up deflecting the ball.and I went to

"She tapped it in the net. Easy peasy," said Skov.

"Korynne got knocked down quite a few times," said coach Gary Muello. She's just relentless and that's her work ethic."

The goal spirited the Wildcat offense as they put more shots on Costa, but Diman defenders didn't fold.

At one point, Wildcats eighth grade forward Leah Butter raced neck and neck toward the left corner with Diman's Banville. The larger Banville flattened Butter with a shoulder check.

Butter shakily picked herself up off the ground but left the field to get checked out.

She later returned to the game.

In the second half with Westport dominating play, Diman senior Samantha Gehan tied the game 1-1 at the 7 minute mark. The Bengals brought the ball down to the Westport box and the forward gathered a loose ball in front of the net and booted it by Wildcats junior goal keeper Sophia Reed.

"The worst one are the ones that are loose and there's a big scramble. You don't know who it's going to bounce off of ... But she kept us in the game," said coach Muel-

"They didn't quit," said coach Muello. "They didn't let it get to them. They didn't get down. They just kept plugging away."

Freshman midfielder Peyton Mahjoory squashed several Diman rallies before they got started. She put several shots on Costa but none found the back of the net. With the score still tied 1-1, she jumped in front of a Diman pass, dribbled into Diman territory and passed to Holden. Diman defender Aubree Thibeault rode Holden off the ball but the eighth grader collected the ball

## Elevator mishap claims life of Westport man

An elevator worker from Westport died Tuesday morning in what Needham, Mass., police say was an elevator related incident at the headquarters of the TripAdvisor company in Needham.

The victim was identified as James Jacobs, 52 (no address provided), an employee of Otis Elevator Company.

Needham police and firefighters rushed to the scene at the travel website's 400 1st Ave. offices at around 8:30 a.m., said Police Chief John Schlitter.

"Unfortunately, this morning there was an incident with a maintenance crew member employed by Otis Elevator Co. that is being addressed and investigated today by the Needham Police and Massachusetts State Police," TripAdvisor said in a statement. "No TripAdvisor employees were harmed, and our thoughts are with the worker's family and colleagues during this time."

In a statement, Otis Elevator said the

company is "deeply saddened to learn that we lost a team member at a jobsite this morning."

"Our most sincere and heartfelt condolences go out to the family of the deceased," the statement says. "We are working to gather more information about this incident as quickly as possible. There is nothing more important to Otis than the safety of our employees, customers and the people who rely on our products and services every day."

The incident remained under investigation later Tuesday afternoon by the U.S. Occupational Safety and Health Administration, Needham police, and Massachusetts State Police assigned to the Norfolk County District Attorney's Office, Baker said in an email to reporters.

No TripAdvisor employees were involved or injured in the incident, Chief Schlitter said.

## Police charge man with lewd conduct, gun offenses

His alleged lewd behavior with a child along with unsafe handling of a large number of firearms landed a Westport man under arrest this week.

During the week of September 2, Detective Jeffrey Majewski conducted an investigation regarding Logan Riley, 34, who police accuse of repeatedly exposing himself to a child under 14 years of age.

"During the course of this investigation it was revealed these were not random acts to strangers," said Westport Detective Sergeant Christopher Dunn. "Also it was learned Mr. Riley had discharged his firearm within his residence."

While traveling to Mr. Riley's residence at 34 Hemlock Street, Westport, Det. Majewski learned Mr. Riley was visiting his ex-wife's home in Easton, Mass.

Officers from Westport and Easton police departments went to that address and arrested Mr. Riley at her residence. There Mr. Riley admitted he had a Ruger 9mm pistol inside his car's unlocked glove com-

partment. The gun was loaded with six rounds of ammunition. Mr. Riley said he had an active license to carry firearms out of Rockland, Mass.

As a result of interviews conducted earlier in the week, members of the Westport Police Department executed a search warrant at Mr.

Riley's 39 Hemlock Street home. During that search, officers located two gun lockers, the keys to which were found on top of one of the lockers.

Officers also found and later seized 10 rifles and locked boxes of ammunition.

Mr. Riley is being charged with two counts of lewd and lascivious conduct, two counts of reckless endangerment of a child, and nine counts of Improper storage of a firearm.

### Animals: Time to step up

or those truly interested in what Westport's proposed Keeping of Animals rules actually say, they are spelled out on the town's website.

For versions unmoored from reality, check one of several

For versions unmoored from reality, check one of several chatrooms where some are doing their utmost to stretch the truth and terrify townspeople.

The fact is, if ever a town needed a Keeping of Animals regulation, it is Westport.

This is the town where animals — horses, sheep, cows, ducks, alpacas, you name it — suffered and died for years out of sight back in the woods beyond American Legion Highway. The horrors were uncovered once, quickly forgotten, then resumed before becoming the focus of worldwide disgust.

The ASPCA, whose rescue mission here lasted many months, called it the northeast's worst ever animal cruelty case.

It all happened, and managed to lure animal bad-actors from far and wide, because nobody was paying the slightest attention. Those entrusted by Westport to watch over animals had to know but, for reasons unclear and suspicious, looked the other way.

The property owner is now dead; guilty findings produced nothing in the way of penalties for the tenants. Clearly those who treat animals terribly are biding their time until Westport forgets again, just as it always does

The Keeping of Animals rules do nothing but declare what would should be obvious — any town should know who is keeping farm animals, how many they own, and where.

And a community owes it to those animals, and to its own reputation, to make sure that those creatures receive proper care. That can't be done without inspections — and the possibility that those inspections might be unannounced.

It is essentially the same treatment as any business (home businesses included) expects. Restaurants, retail stores, groceries, bars, legitimate farms — they all get spot checks and nobody squawks about privacy.

Much of the outcry is not merely untrue (cats and dogs aren't included, nobody is going to burst into homes), it is strange and it raises questions

Wouldn't anyone who raises farm animals want it known that they operate in a town where animals are kept humanely, provided veterinary care, and fed real food, not sawdust or rotten sweetbread?

And what is it exactly that so frightens some people about inspections that they would spread nonsense to keep it from happening?

One often hears in Westport that the Route 177 'farm of horrors' was some sort of aberration, that this is a changed town where such behavior could never happen again.

Yet when the Board of Health puts many months of study and hearings into a document modeled on state rules, some shriek that their very way of life (and ability to treat animals any way they choose) is at peril.

Existing rules (town and state), and lax enforcement have failed Westport and its animals.

This Keeping of Animals regulation is simple common sense and the Board of Health should stick to its guns. Otherwise, that on-line noise about Westport's good old days when what happened to your animals was nobody's business, is fair warning that the Medeiros 'farm' spirit is alive and well.

## New school back on budget without sacrificing student programs

#### To the editor:

I would like to take the opportunity provided by Marilyn Pease's recent letter to the editor to try to undo any confusion that may exist regarding what is presently happening with the middle/high school project that Westport voters approved by nearly a two to one margin last year.

Having endured a bid process in April where bids came in \$10 million over budget, we hired a local construction management firm (Agostini Bacon Construction) with a long history of analyzing and turning such situations around and setting them up to be completed on time and at or under budget.

Our project manager (Daedalus) and our architects (Jonathan Levi Architects) have contributed their time at no cost to the town since May as they have worked with Agostini to simplify the design of the school and to find cost savings. Our latest cost estimates now put us below our budgeted construction amount of \$75 million. Our first bids for concrete work are under budget.

The cost reduction process has been extensive. It has been overseen by the Design Subcommittee of the School Building Committee, which painstakingly reviewed hundreds of suggested design changes and then brought them to the full building committee for approval. The value management changes made do not impact school programming nor cheapen the materials used. The building area has not been reduced at all.

Some of the more significant changes simplified the façade of the building, made changes to the roof and auditorium design, redesigned the HVAC system, simplified custom millwork, and redesigned the gym exterior from metal to masonry. By making these changes, among others, we have been able to bring the project back into budget, and create a more efficient and cost-effective design.

Under our agreement with the MSBA, we receive funding that pays for 49% of eligible costs and will result in net reimbursement of approximately 40% of the entire project. We are extremely fortunate to have this grant; we were one of 13 schools chosen for the grant out of more than 100 applicants the year we applied. To date, we have spent \$10,531,406 on the project and received \$4,707,568 in reimbursement from the MSBA.

Every town that partners with the MSBA must use the same language formula in voting at Town Meeting and at the ballot box and must follow MSBA guidelines. The payoff for that, as we know, is considerable -- a grant of \$38 million that saves our taxpayers from having to borrow to pay the whole of the cost of the school on their own. (On the subject of borrowing, we should add that, with borrowing rates going down, we now believe that we will save on what we had originally projected for borrowing costs when we go for final bond funding in May, 2020.)

All of our meetings are posted, open to the public, and available for viewing on the town's website. Please attend and ask questions if you have them. Our next scheduled meeting is Wednesday, September 18, at 6 p.m. in the Media Center at Westport Jr/Sr High School.



ing World War II, he enlisted in the Navy and attended Williams College under its V-12 program. When the program was discontinued in 1945, Bob chose to attend Yale University so as to graduate with a USMCR commission in 1947.

The following year he and his beloved Patricia Perrin were married. Bob was recalled by the Marines to serve in the Korean War and was honored to receive the Bronze Star. Upon returning to the U.S., he worked over the years for several investment firms, including Estabrook & Co., Loomis Sayles, Saltonstall & Co., and State Street Research and Management, where he became one of six managing partners. His other business activities included serving on the boards of State Street Bank, the Boston Globe, the New York Times, and McCaw Cellular Communications.

Supporting the work of non-profits represented a significant passion in Bob's life. One of his lifelong commitments involved his alma mater, Nobles, where he served on the Board for nearly two decades. His strategic thinking and leadership skills were exemplary: he led the Board's decision-making process regarding co-education and the search committee for a new Head of School, ultimately becoming Head of the Board of Trustees. Under his leadership, guidance, and partnership with Ted Gleason, Head of School, he helped Nobles navigate its challenging

transition to co-education.

Bob's commitment to education also included Yale, where he served as Chairman of the Library Committee and was a member of the Yale University Council. He was regional chair of two Yale campaigns in New England, each of which exceeded its campaign goal. Bob also served on the Yale Development Board, Yale Honorary Degree Committee, and was privileged to receive the Yale Medal in 1996. Bob also served on the boards of a variety of other non-profits in the Boston area, including Wellesley College, where he served for 18 years (nine as vice-chair); the New England Aquarium as one of its earliest trustees; Judge Baker Guidance Center, Mount Auburn Cemetery; and the Congregational Church in Little Compton, RI.

One of Bob's loves was the ocean, and all the ways in which it could be enjoyed. He loved to fish for striped bass and bluefish around Cape Cod and the Islands. Somewhat late in life he "switched" to sailing, and cruised to Maine and the Canadian Maritimes "in search of icebergs." He captained three Marion-Bermuda Races on board his beloved "Sea Witch," a Hinckley Southwest 42. The highlight of his extensive sailing endeavors was a 22-day transatlantic crossing in 1989, with Patsy and a crew of four; the following summer Bob and Patsy cruised Scotland, Norway and Sweden. He was a member of the Cruising Club of America, and served as Rear Commodore leading the Boston Station for two years, after which he led the Station's nominating committee for an additional two years.

Throughout his life, Bob was known for his integrity, insight, compassion, graciousness and generosity. He was the con-



summate gentlemen, generous in spirit and time, committed to the betterment of his community. His marriage to Patsy was a true partnership; together they lived life to its fullest—balancing

work, family, philanthropy and pleasure. Despite their numerous accomplishments, they viewed their family as their most notable.

#### To the editor:

The release of the draft Keeping of Animals regulation for public comment has caused concerns among the farming community about how the regulation would affect their privacy and the operation of their farms. Unfortunately, some of the statements being circulated that sparked those concerns are mistaken or misinterpret the regulation's intent. I am writing to correct some of these misperceptions with the goal that it will lead to further constructive discussions and a revised draft.

Let me address some specific concerns. The regulation applies only to agricultural livestock, not to dogs, cats or other pets normally kept in

the home or non-domesticated animals. Cats and dogs in particular are subject to a wholly different set of regulations under the authority of the Animal Control Officer. There will be no inspections inside anyone's home.

The is no requirement for a permit, notification of abutters or a hearing before a person can maintain or bring animals onto their property. The only obligation is to file a registration form that states the location, the number and type of livestock and how to get in touch with owner.

The parts of the draft regarding inspections and access were taken directly from the existing Westport 2018 Pig and 2019 Tenant Farm Reg-

ulations. Those regulations were adopted by a unanimous vote of the prior Board of Health and only after extensive consultation with the Agricultural Commission. The section of the regulation on access to buildings and animals is taken directly from the state law that governs animal inspectors' duties. At no point during the public review and adoption of those regulations were concerns raised about violating farmers' rights.

The regulation does not authorize and neither does the Board of Health allow an agent to trespass on anyone's property to conduct an inspection. Filing a registration is not intended to waive a property owner's rights in this regard. It has always been the Board's practice to either schedule an inspection or leave a notice if an owner is not present and arrange for a follow up inspection. That will continue to be the case.

The process to develop the draft was designed and carried out to solicit and incorporate the farm community's interests. I spent many evenings this summer with representatives of the farm community and animal welfare advocates to jointly hammer out a draft that reflected good faith compromises from all parties. The draft was reviewed at a public meeting of the Agricultural Commission on August 14 where it was approved to go out for further public comment. (See the video at https://vimeo.

This statement does not attempt to acknowledge all the objections and fears that been expressed through the letters the board has received, in social media and in conversations. What I hope it can contribute to is the next round of factbased, good faith discussions that will work through these concerns and garner the broad support necessary to achieve the public health and safety and animal welfare goals that Board of Health, the Selectmen, and the public, through its Town Meeting votes, have consistently expressed.

#### Enforce existing animal rules, don't add new ones

#### To the editor:

The Division of Animal Health in the Massachusetts Department of Agricultural Resources handles and regulates the keeping of animals. Local BOH offices don't need more regulations to duplicate that function. The so-called barn books are used for that purpose. Local inspectors of animals in each community get head counts of animals, the types of animals, and review the conditions on how the animals are kept.

No additional BOH regulation to duplicate that data is needed. Perhaps coordination and administrative direction to gather that information would help. Reports on numbers and locations for housing of animals are and always have been part of the local inspector of animals' responsibilities. Many local residents, include my dad and uncle, had that responsibility years ago.

Somehow that does not seem to matter and local officials seem to

want to add more regulations, duplicate functions, and further grow local budget expenses.

Enforcement of existing permit requirements for horses, pigs, dogs, kennels, stables, and barn book referrals can get the job done. MDAR, federal and state regulations, local public health regulations, local public safety regulations, state and local environmental requirements are all enacted to guide our Right to Farm Community now.

Tenant farm regulations further deal with non-resident would-be keepers of animals now in Westport as well. The tenant farm problems experience in Westport happened not because we didn't have regulations in place. Piggery regulations, stable regulations, kennel regulations, barn books, public health and safety regulation, environmental regulations, and best practice models were just not monitored as they should have been.

It is time to administratively get

the job done properly. Enacting even more government regulations isn't answer. Westport can come together on this and get the job done. Farmers, residents who keep a pet or a few chickens, neighbors with concerns of harm to animals or public health and safety, and residents who support Westport's Right to Farm can work with the BOH and other local authorities to keep Westport the community we all love!

The event offers several food options including jonnycakes by Gray's Gristmill and ice cream and









## PorchFest performs its first encore

Wildly popular event that debuted last September is staged for a repeat performance with more bands, on more porches

The triumphant organizers of last year's breakout PorchFest have been calling it Bristol's newest holiday, and if you were there, you know that's not hyperbole. Bolstered by great weather and a great lineup of musicians, last year's inaugural Porch-Fest was such a success, before the sun set on the 2018 event, people were already making plans for 2019.

It's already here — Bristol PorchFest 2019 will be hosting local bands and offering an afternoon of music free to the community, this Sunday, Sept. 15, from 3 to 6 p.m. All participating porches are located on High Street, between Walley and Constitution

The event is sponsored by Arts In Common, in partnership with Roger Williams University and community friends and neighbors who love music. "We have beautiful porches and great local musicians - combining the two are the perfect way to bring together friends and neighbors for an afternoon in Bristol," said MaryKae Wright, PorchFest co-chair and member of Arts In Common, a local organization that promotes local arts and culture in Bristol.

Bristol PorchFest 2019 is significantly expanded over the 2018 iteration, and will feature nine porches and 18 bands — solo, duos, trios and small groups — who will be performing acoustically or minimally amplified to entertain porch hosts and strolling spectators.

"PorchFest is another exciting opportunity for Roger Williams University to give back to the Bristol community and continue to support the arts locally. We're thrilled to have RWU's talented student musicians participate in this great community event," said Dr. John J. King, vice president for stu-

Last year's event, originally organized around four porches and bands, saw two "pop-up" porches, and drew hundreds of people of all ages strolling, listening, and even dancing. "This year we have nine porches and 18 local bands scheduled ... Classical Portuguese guitar to Dixieland jazz, folk to rock, opera to acapella, it's so exciting!" said PorchFest co-chair Nancy

#### Cilantro Lime Shrimp

Servings: 2

- 3 cloves garlic
- 1 tablespoon sliced almonds
- 1 bunch of cilantro, steams discarded
- 4 tablespoons of olive oil
- Juice from 1 lime
- salt and pepper
- 12 jumbo shrimp, peeled



- 1. In a food processor, add in the garlic and almonds. Pulse until finely chopped.
- 2. Add in the cilantro leaves and half the amount of olive oil.
- 3. Stir in half the lime juice and a small amount of the leftover olive oil.

## Larger lessons in the story of Antonio Brown

ntil last week, I had never heard of Antonio Brown. Then, out of nowhere, his name was everywhere I turned. My family — three sons and a husband — watches a good amount of

 watches a good amount of football, but I would not call myself a fan.

Sure I root for the Patriots, but I do not have enough knowledge or interest to say whether Bill Belichick's decision to sign Brown was or was not the right thing to do. I do know that behavior and attitude can change dras-

tically when expectations are higher, structure is stepped up, and discipline is a top priority.

There is a reason why "problem students" sometimes cease to be so when they are able to move to a different school or even into a different classroom. Environment matters. Culture is everything.

Antonio Brown's behavior on his previous NFL teams has been indefensible — sports writer Dan Shaugnnessy of the Boston Globe describes him as "the best receiver in the NFL and an egomaniacal misfit who acted his way out of Pittsburgh and Oakland in the last six months."

There have been a lot of brilliant and massively talented kids who have acted their way out of schools and off teams only to see themselves transformed by the right leader in a new and different environment. Some have found it in the military, others in a new school, and still others on the field with a new coach.

I don't have much of a dog in the fight over whether or not the Patriots should or should not have signed Antonio Brown to a one-year deal. But I do find the chatter surrounding it reflective of where the larger culture seems to be these days.

America appears to be wrestling with the concept of writing people off versus believing in second chances. It is a common refrain that "Americans love a comeback story," and that was certainly on display recently when, after a very public fall from grace, Tiger Woods won The Masters in what many characterized as a "comeback for the ages."

But as polarization increases its reach, it sometimes feels like we are losing our footing when it comes to the possibility for redemption.

Instead of believing in the principle of second—or even third—chances, we seem to be falling into a tribalism that causes us to have different standards for people based on which side or whose team they're on. We are quick to overlook and forgive the people we consider to be in our tribe and equally quick to lower the boom on those we see as being outside of our tribe.

Patriots Nation will gloat, Patriots haters will hate even harder. But in the story of Antonio Brown I see a bigger story, a story about all the brilliance and talent inside of countless young people who just need to find their way to the people and places who will help them shine.

Antonio Brown is not a kid. He is a grown man being paid millions of dollars to perform on a football team. There is no excuse for his antics in Oakland and Pittsburgh. Maybe he will fall in line with the Patriots and maybe he won't.

What I do know is that it is possible.
