Supervisors Address Insurance and DD 180

Following the approval of the agenda and last week's minutes Dave Walters from Hughes Brennan and Wirtz reviewed the county's insurance package. He reminded the Board that he told them last June during the review that property insurance premiums were on the rise. There was an 18% increase in the property insurance. He stated that it was offset by the 22% decrease that occurred earlier this year in Workman's Compensation.

Walters asked the Board about cyber insurance. Auditor Carmen Moser stated that the county has put into place cyber security systems. The Board inquired if the premium would be lowered because there is currently no jail in the county. Walters responded that it would not make a difference because there have been too many natural disasters and storms like the derecho. After the discussion the Board decided to stay with the same package.

Mark Hunefeld visited with the Board at their request. They asked him about the county's Hazardous Mitigation plan and

what that says about the flood plain & pipelines. He responded that there are different rules where flood plains are located and the policy defers to the Iowa Department of Natural Resources. The DNR makes those rules and regulations. Hunefeld stated that the Mitigation plan does not address the flood plain.

Jan Morey sells flood insurance and she commented about the flood plain. She had the US Flood Plain Plan which is a resource for flood plains. It might be helpful for the draft of the county ordinance concerning the CO2 pipeline project.

County engineer Walter Davis-Oeth asked for approval to move forward on the purchase of four dump trucks with boxes. He reminded the Board that the fleet is old and it takes time to get what is needed. He proposed to order four Volvo dump truck models with a side mount, snow plow and under belly scrape. Each truck will cost \$300,069. He estimated that it would be about two years before the chassis & add-ons arrive. The Board approved the purchase.

The completion hearing on Drainage Ditch No 180 Lateral 1 Tile ensued with several landowners present. Jon Rosengren from Bolton & Menk conducted the hearing. He explained that the hearing was to consider crop damages, answer questions about the project and to review several damages and completions that needed to be addressed.

After a summary of the project and discussion about crop damages the landowners and the Supervisors agreed to the following compensations. Corn will be figured at 200 bushels per acre at a price of \$8.32 per bushel. Beans will be figured at 80 bushels per acre at a price of \$15 per bushel.

Three landowners Mike Hermansen, Mike Frederick & Vincent Lammers had issues with portions of the project on their land. One was an intake that was cut off too high. Another was some concerns about whether intakes were properly reconnected. The last was a claim for picking up rock & repairing a fence. Rosengren assured the landowners that these items would be taken care of.

Zero Suicide Awareness

Around 300 people attended the fourth annual Palo Alto County Zero Suicide Coalition event in Soper Park last Saturday afternoon and evening. There were jumbo inflatables, information tables, food, crafts and the very popular One Layne Band.

Michelle Theesfeld who serves as LMHC Director of School Based Services and Therapy Specialist was one of the organizers for the event. She shared that, "When we created the coalition Palo Alto

County was in the top 10 per capita in Iowa for the rate of suicide." That is the premise for the yearly event. "We have resource tables available to provide insights into the supports that are available, to answer questions and to provide education. Aside from that, we want families to come out and enjoy the day and experience a sense of community," stated Michelle.

As the sun started setting the glow sticks came out. A prayer service was held and luminaries were lit in remembrance of

loved ones. At dark there was a glow run and walk. All of this Michelle referred to as bringing light to the darkness.

There were multiple agencies involved in the afternoon. Some of those named were Seasons Center, PACHS, Plains Area Mental Health, Palo Alto County Sheriff's Office, 10 area school districts, AEA, Public Library, United Methodist Church and ISU Extension.

There are costs to putting on any event. For this one, grants were received from four sources including Seasons,

PACHS, CCNIA and Plains Area Mental Health. One Layne Band played for no fee. There were area businesses that contributed door prizes and Dollar Fresh provided a donation.

The overall goals for the event were to provide awareness, partnering with other organizations, providing information about mental health resources and giving families the opportunity to be together for fun.

For Michelle the events take-away included hope, resilience, family and community.

Projects Underway In Emmetsburg

The Emmetsburg City Council members met on Monday, October 10 to discuss and move forward with decisions for the improvement of the City of Emmetsburg.

Police Chief Ryan Veldboom reported that the stop sign at the intersection of 11th and Grand is working well in the midst of the Public Safety Center construction. The stop sign is currently temporary, and will continue to be evaluated by the police department.

Public Properties Director Frank Kliegl explained that he and his team have been busy completing fall maintenance

tasks in the community. The new crosswalk signs at the intersection of Main Street and Call Street are a recent addition made possible by a Community Visioning Committee grant through the Gaming Development Corporation.

The council then discussed that there would be several locations where crosswalk signs would be beneficial. For example, a sign is turned every day at the school twice a day, but it is not made as clear as signs with lights similar to those installed at Main and Call. With the changing of seasons, it is often recommended that lights are involved to capture the at-

tenation of drivers in order to promote safety and extra visibility in the darker months.

Due to the expense of the crosswalk signs, grant funding is extremely helpful in making them possible. The goal is to get funding for more crosswalk signs in the future. As a member of the Community Visioning Committee, City Administrator Kim Kibbie expressed her thankfulness for outside donations that make these signs possible. "We hope to apply for grants and get funding for these projects," she said on behalf of the Community Visioning Committee.

Marketing and Retail Coordi-

nator Gretchen Reichter was also thankful for the work that Frank Kliegl and his crew have done with recent community projects.

Reichter went on to explain that Downtown Housing Grant work is officially underway. New windows are now installed in the front of the building and can be seen from Broadway Street. Recently, Lieutenant Governor Adam Gregg came through Emmetsburg as part of his 99 county tour, and the chosen tour spot was the Downtown Housing Project. "It was nice to get some publicity with the project," commented Reichter.

Similar to the Downtown Housing Grant is the Catalyst Grant. The Catalyst Grant was to be implemented a couple years ago, but due to Covid and price changes, was postponed. Reichter is now refining paperwork in order to open up applications to property owners who may be interested in the 1017 Broadway project. From there, potential project applications would be sifted through and

brought before the council to move forward with an application to the state.

In new business, the city council approved the Annual Urban Renewal Report with no further discussion. The council also discussed the City of Pocahontas' offer to purchase a SnoGo snowblower, which was also approved.

A stage that will no longer be utilized at The Shores due to concerns for the time and labor it takes to put it together for events was approved to be donated to Main Street Community Theatre.

The council also accepted the Park Board's recommendation to increase cabin rental rates in Emmetsburg by 10%. The Park Board felt that the price needed to be increased when it was compared to other rates.

Additionally, Thea Schmah was approved as a bartender for The Shores, and Andrew Matheson was approved as a cook for The Shores.

Treasurer Fitzgerald Celebrates Working Individuals with Disabilities

Des Moines, Iowa – October is National Disability Employment Awareness Month (NDEAM), and to State Treasurer Michael Fitzgerald, this means celebrating the contributions of working individuals with a disability and their employers. "I recognize the abundance of valuable impacts people with disabilities have on the workplace," said Fitzgerald. "Historically, it was difficult for an individual with a disability to maintain their benefits if they worked. This is where IABLE

comes in." Administered by Fitzgerald, IABLE is Iowa's Achieving a Better Life Experience (ABLE) plan and allows individuals with disabilities and their support systems to save up to \$16,000 per year without compromising their eligibility for federal means-tested programs. However, if an IABLE account owner is earning income, they can contribute an additional \$12,880 to their account in 2022. "We've created an Employment Toolkit to spread the

word about the extra IABLE benefits for working account owners," said Fitzgerald. "Whether you're the employee or the employer, I encourage you to check it out today!" Employers can utilize the toolkit to familiarize themselves with IABLE and the ways they can support their employees living with disabilities. Current and prospective account owners will also be able to find beneficial information in the toolkit, including directions on

THE HISTORY CHANNEL

* On Oct. 30, 1864, the town of Helena, Montana, is founded by four gold miners at a location they called Last Chance Gulch. Miners flooded to the area by the thousands, finding \$19 million in gold in four years. By 1894, Helena was the capital of Montana.

* On Oct. 26, 1881, the Earp brothers battle the Clanton-McLaury gang in a shootout in a vacant lot behind the O.K. Corral in Tombstone, Arizona. The gunfight only took 30 seconds, but 30 shots were fired and several were killed. Two were charged with murder, but a judge later found them not guilty.

* On Oct. 27, 1904, the New York City subway opens. The line traveled 9.1 miles through 28 stations. More than 100,000 people paid a nickel each to take their first ride. Today there are 26 lines, the longest running 32 miles.

* On Oct. 24, 1921, from among 77,000 United States servicemen killed on the Western Front during World War I, the body of the first soldier to be honored is selected in the French town of Chalons-sur-Marne. Four bodies were selected to become the Unknown Soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery in Washington, D.C.

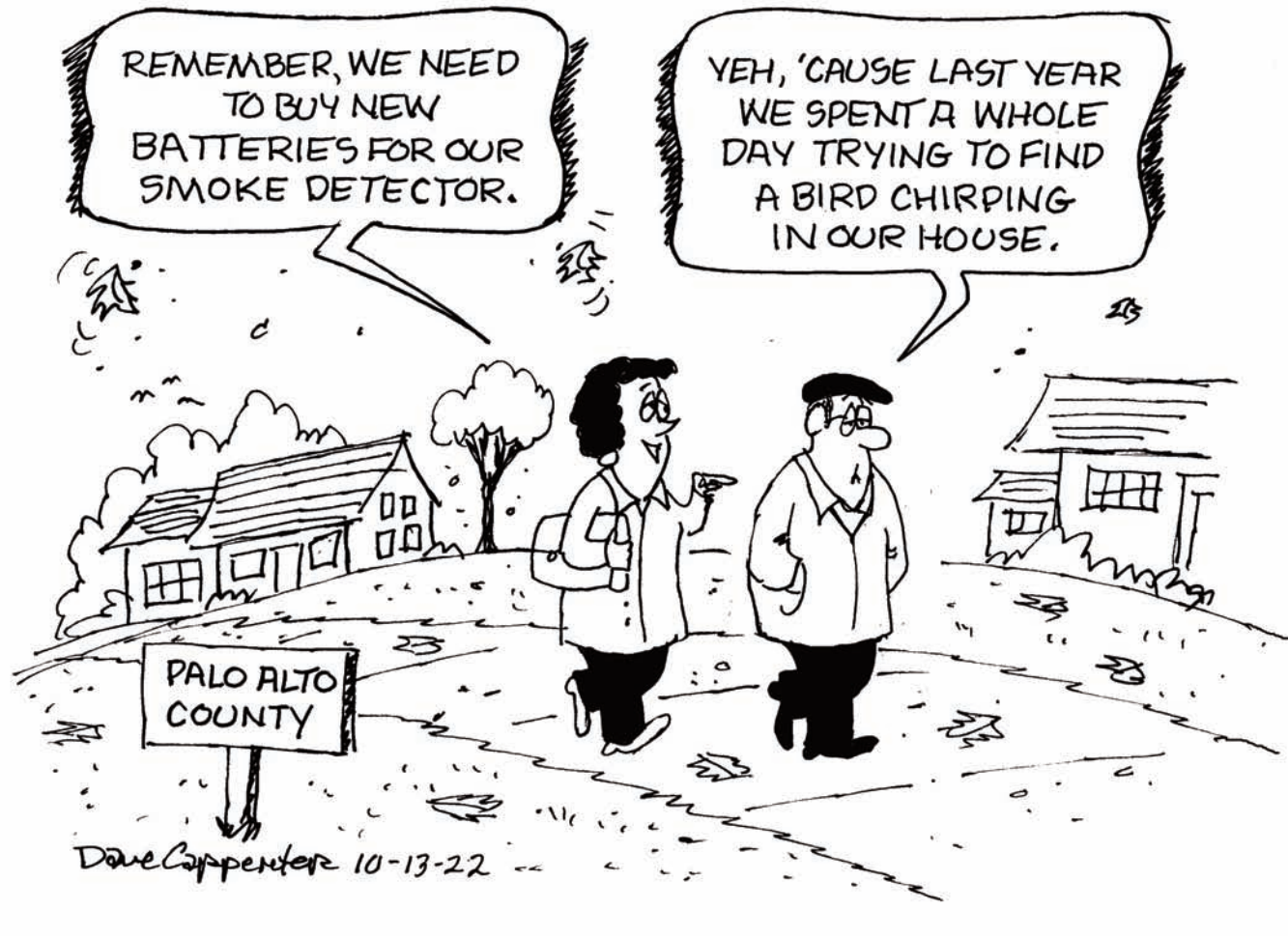
* On Oct. 29, 1969, Bobby Seale, a member of the "Chicago Eight," is gagged during his murder trial on orders of the judge to stop Seale's outbursts. The "Chicago Eight" were charged with crossing state lines to cause anti-war demonstrations in Chicago. Seale was eventually sentenced to 48 months in prison for the outbursts alone, but the murder portion of his trial ended with a hung jury and the contempt charges were dropped.

* On Oct. 25, 1983, President Ronald Reagan orders 2,000 Marines to invade Grenada to protect the 1,000 Americans there at the time, many of them students at the island's medical school. Codenamed "Operation Urgent Fury," the fighting was over in four days.

* On Oct. 28, 1998, the Digital Millennium Copyright Act is signed into law. The act strengthened copyright protections and allowed copyright holders to issue "takedown" notices to individuals or companies who engaged in infringing use of a copyrighted work.

Q & A: Medicare Open Enrollment With U.S. Senator Chuck Grassley

Q: What do Iowans need to know about Medicare open enrollment?

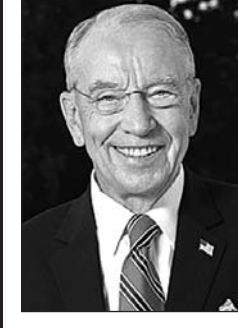
A: The open enrollment period for joining a Medicare health or drug plan for the upcoming year starts Oct. 15. The deadline to join, switch or drop a plan is Dec. 7. Coverage begins on Jan. 1, 2023.

In Iowa, 653,534 individuals currently are enrolled in Medicare. During this window, Iowans may change from original Medicare to a Medicare Advantage Plan, or vice versa. From year to year, health needs vary and it's prudent to examine different costs and benefits. Taking the time to comparison shop is a smart idea to look for coverage and benefits that suits your health care needs and budget.

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) recently announced 2023 premiums and deductibles for Medicare Advantage and Medicare Part D prescription drug plans.

In Iowa, CMS estimates the average monthly Medicare Advantage plan premium will be \$9.13 in 2023. Our state has 70 Medicare Advantage plans available next year, compared to 61 in 2022. Access to Medicare Advantage plans vary by county. CMS expects enrollment in Medicare Advantage plans will continue to grow. Iowans who choose Medicare Advantage plans have a range of supplemental benefits, including eyewear, hearing aids, dental and other benefits.

Iowans also may choose to join a Medicare drug plan, known as Part D. In 2023, the average basic monthly premium for standard Part D is estimated to be \$31.50. In Iowa, 24 stand-alone Medicare prescription drug plans are available in 2023.

When I chaired the Senate Finance Committee, I worked with then-ranking member Sen. Max Baucus to write the first-ever Medicare prescription drug benefit. In fact, Part D was the first major expansion of Medicare since the nation's health insurance program for seniors and Americans with disabilities was enacted in 1965.

Most recently, I wrote comprehensive bipartisan reforms with Sen. Ron Wyden to help lower the cost of prescription drugs. Unfortunately, my effort to replace the reckless tax and spending spree with our Prescription Drug Pricing Reduction Act in August was blocked. We could have passed drug pricing reform on a bipartisan basis if the majority was less interested in scoring political points. According to the Congressional Budget Office, our bill would save taxpayers \$95 billion, reduce out-of-pocket spending by \$72 billion and reduce premiums by \$1 billion.

For first-time Medicare enrollees, it's important to be aware of the Part D late enrollment penalty. If you don't join a Medicare drug coverage plan (or have prescription drug coverage elsewhere) for more than 63 days after first enrolling in Medicare Part A or Part B, the late enrollment penalty is calculated by multiplying 1 percent of the "national base beneficiary premium" (\$32.74 in 2023)

by the number of full, uncovered months you were eligible and didn't enroll. That amount is added to your monthly premium every year. So, be sure to keep records showing you had drug coverage to avoid the late enrollment penalty down the road. More importantly, even if you don't need prescription drug medicines today, it may save your pocketbook in the years ahead to sign up for Medicare drug coverage now.

I'll continue working to fight inflation and lower costs for seniors. Recently, the FDA finalized rules for my bipartisan 2017 Over-the-Counter Hearing Aid law that will enable certain types of hearing aids to be available over-the-counter for those with mild to moderate hearing loss. Rules for this will go into effect on October 17, 2022. This is good news. Consumers will be able to access more affordable hearing aids that are safe and effective. I'll also continue working to lower prescription drug costs. Recent reforms I've championed into law will save \$9.6 billion over the next decade. I'm also committed to making insulin more affordable and passing bipartisan reforms to hold Big Pharma and powerful pharmacy benefit managers accountable.

Q: What if Iowans need help to navigate choices?

A: During open enrollment, Iowans who are eligible for

Medicare can find information about getting started with Medicare at Medicare.gov. Use the Medicare Plan Finder to explore Medicare coverage options tailored to your needs by comparing coverage and cost options.

As a reminder, if you choose a Medicare Advantage Plan or other Medicare health plan, you have the same basic benefits as people who have Original Medicare. Be sure to compare monthly premiums, deductibles, coinsurance and copayments to enroll in the plan that best fits your needs.

Iowans who are satisfied with their current coverage can roll over their current plan and do not need to re-enroll.

Medicare enrollees also may reach out to the local State Health Insurance Information Program (SHIP) for one-on-one help. Iowans may call (800) 351-4664, send an email to shipp@iid.iowa.gov or go online to <https://shipp.iowa.gov/>. Lower-income Iowans who meet certain requirements may qualify for programs to help afford the cost of coverage.

Kovels Antiques and Collecting

Antique Stoneware

Antique stoneware was often used in small local potteries in 19th-century New England. They made useful objects in molds and fanciful figurines and vases that could be decorated by hand. Bristol-slip glaze was popular because it was scratch-resistant and added color. One amateur artist made a resting ram to be used as a doorstop. The 9-inch hand-molded animal sold for \$144, probably because it was missing part of his horn and an ear.

Q: I was left a Lane Cedar Chest that has an aroma tightness feature. The size of the chest is 17 1/2 inches high, 19 inches deep and 44 inches wide. The inside of the chest is in excellent condition, but the outside does have some wear on it. I'm not sure if

it's worth holding on to. Is it worth anything?

A: Lane started in 1912 as the Standard Red Cedar Chest Company in Altavista, Virginia. John Lane was president and his son, Ed, was vice president and general manager. It became The Lane Company in 1922.

The company was known for its cedar chests, which were often used as "hope chests" by brides-to-be. Lane began mak-

ing occasional tables in 1951 and expanded to include lines of bedroom, living room and dining room furniture in the 1960s and '70s.

You can find the age of your Lane chest by looking for the serial number on the bottom. If you read the number backward, you will find the production date. For example, serial number 753150 indicates the chest was produced on 05/13/57. An extra digit at the end of the serial number is the plant number.

Lane cedar chests made before 1987 have the old-style locks that can latch shut and trap a child inside. Those locks should be removed or replaced. Value depends on style and condition. Some Lane chests sell for less than \$50, others for over \$100.

Rounding out the offense were Carson Baak with 31 yards, and 26 yards from Jace Nelson-Brown. Seventy-four yards came from passing and 258 from rushing.

Ridge View's offense only managed 90 yards. The E-Hawks dominated the line that resulted in the Raptors earning only four first downs. The E-hawks had 24.

The intense play of the defense resulted in more assists than solo tackles for the E-Hawks. A swarm of E-Hawks were in on almost every tackle. Quentin Ort was credited with nine takedowns, Carson Baak

had six. It was four each for Ryan Brennan, Joshua Van Huevelen and Ben Saxton. Jacob Fiene and Gavin Swanson tallied three each. Good for two or one of the tackles were Clayton Rubel, Cade Shirk, Cameron Madden, Jace Nelson-Brown, Gage Jorgenson, Keegan Hamerlinck and Tattum Fries.

Towards the end of the game Jace Nelson-Brown was injured and had to be helped off the field. Early speculation was that he suffered a knee injury.

The regular season closes out Friday when the E-Hawks travel to Hull to face Western Christian. The Jets stand at 5-2 for the season. "We can't be complacent this week," said Thomsen. "We have to have a great week of practices. Western Christian has good team dynamics. They run and throw the ball fast and are physical up front."

Thomsen added that it has been tough for the E-hawks on the road. "It will be a great challenge for us Friday but it is doable," he said.

However, the E-Hawk Cheer Team has proven that they are multifaceted as they adapt to fit the roles needed in any given moment. Being willing to try new things is this squad's specialty, and the "someone teach me" mentality is how the team manages to achieve new stunts with success.

Gloede also explained that the team is especially tight-knit. Not only do the team members

individually contribute their fair share to making progress in practice, but the team has a fun time together all the while as they build upon their skills.

Gloede explained that parents are a huge key to the students' accomplishments as a team. "I really have a group of strong parents who want to support and be there for their child," said Gloede with gratitude.

Today, October 13 is National M & M Day. Who doesn't like this candy that has been around since 1941?

This iconic candy has been around for 81 years. It was started by Forrest Mars in a factory in New Jersey. He had seen World War II soldiers eating chocolate candy that had a hard cover and he thought it would be good to start a business making a similar candy in the United States. The Ms imprinted on the candy stand for the owners who began the enterprise. Forrest struck a deal with Bruce Murrie, son of Hershey president William Murrie to develop a hard-shelled candy with a chocolate center. It was a successful venture from the start. In 1949 the message "Melts in your mouth not in your hand." was released. It is

still in use today and rightly describes the small chocolate.

In 1950 a black M was stamped on each candy. It provided a unique look for the confection. Four years later in 1954 the company changed the lettering to white. By 1980 M&Ms were not only sold in the United States but also in Canada, Europe, Australia, Japan, Malaysia, the United Kingdom and Hong Kong. In 1921 M&Ms were named the most popular Halloween candy. Of the top three candies M&Ms in number 3. The first is Reeses Cups and the second is skittles. The most consumed candy is a tie between Reeses and M&Ms.

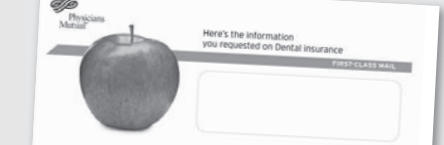

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am a 66-year-old male who was diagnosed about 15 years ago with mild coronary artery disease, with some blockages in my peripheral arteries. I was taking the maximum recommended dosage of pravastatin to maintain a low cholesterol, but I experienced complete ruptures of both Achilles tendons. These incidences occurred five years apart, but after the second rupture, my doctor discontinued the pravastatin.

My primary care doctor doesn't like it that low, but two different cardiologists I have seen agree that the lower it is, the better. What do you think? -- J.W. ANSWER: The first issue is whether statins increase the risk of an Achilles tendon rupture, and I can't answer that with certainty, because there is some evidence it does. (Some studies have reported anywhere from an 80% relative risk increase to triple the risk, but the risk is still very, very low. Even if they triple the risk, the risk would be only three people per 10,000.) The studies that have shown there is risk suggest that the risk is only in the first year of taking statins, but other studies have shown no risk at all from statins.

with. The lower the LDL, the lower the risk of heart disease, and levels under 30 are not at all unusual in a person taking all modern drug in that class (called PCSK9 inhibitors), and alcohol. Some other related medical illnesses can also predispose a person to Dupuytren's contracture. Potential treatments include surgery and enzyme injection.

There is no known person-to-person transmissibility of Dupuytren's contracture. It's not an infectious disease. The risk factors include previous family history, being over 50, repetitive trauma, diabetes, smoking, and alcohol. Some other related medical illnesses can also predispose a person to Dupuytren's contracture. Potential treatments include surgery and enzyme injection. The word "theory" means a well-thought-out explanation based on the scientific method that helps explain why certain observed phenomena occur. Your question about Dupuytren's contracture being transmissible by plasma donation is a hypothesis for which I could find no support.
