

A shade that resonates with compassion, offers a tactile embrace, and effortlessly bridges the youthful with the timeless."

The wedding party can be dressed in varying hues and prints of peach and earth tones with the men suited in grey, blue or shades of brown with peach bowties.

Peach Fuzz can complement the greens and earth tones that have been popular with couples in recent years, as well as cream, a dark pewter grey, or light slate blue, according to wedding planners. Suggested color combinations with Peach Fuzz include:

forest green and white

sage green and fuchsia

butter yellow and plum or lavender coral and taupe


Diamonds? Not always. Couples seek alternatives

Iowa is one of only eight states in which people searching for information on gemstones prefer moisssanite, not diamonds. New data from the diamond engagement ring and fine jewelry experts Mark Broumand used Google search data for over 45 gemstones and nearly 500 keywords to pinpoint the most-searched gemstones across Iowa during 2023. Moissanite is a more affordable alternative to the diamond, and has overtaken diamonds as

the most popular gemstone in searches taking place at Iowa locations. Rounding out the top five are pearls, opals and gemstones.

Moissanite has grown in favor, with a 131% surge in online search popularity over the last

five years. The rare gem is now simulated in a lab, but the original version was found in fallout from a meteorite, making it possibly a great fit for area couples wanting to create a custom, unique engagement or wedding ring.


The colors for the wedding revolved around ocean blue as the party got started in the aquarium.



Can anyone be a wedding officiant?

Though it's been awhile since the poll was conducted, in 2017 the data-tracking firm Wedding Report surveyed couples who had recently tied the knot, and one of the questions participants answered concerned who officiated their weddings. Roughly 25 percent of couples indicated a friend or family member had served as their wedding officiant, and that figure pales in comparison to older studies, one of which determined the number was around 40 percent.

But anyone who has attended more than one wedding in recent years has likely noticed that it's no longer unique to see laypersons officiate a wedding instead of more traditional officiants, which historically has meant clergy or other individuals with some formal affiliation with a house of worship.

Though local or provincial governments may have their own unique rules and restrictions, in many places it's easy and open to anyone to become a licensed officiant. Couples who want a friend or family member to officiate their wedding are urged to make that request well in advance of their wedding, which can assure the person has ample time to complete the licensing process

Time management tips for your wedding day

As any married couple can attest, a wedding day has a tendency to fly by. Couples have much to do on the day they tie the knot, which can make the day feel like a whirlwind.

Certain skills can come in especially handy on a wedding day, and the ability to manage time is certainly one of them. As their big day draws closer, couples can employ these time management tips to slow the day down a little bit.

• Create and distribute a schedule. A schedule can ensure the happy couple and all members of the bridal party know when and where they need to be at certain times during the day. Include all pertinent information on the schedule, including when and where hair and makeup appointments begin, when transportation to and from the ceremony and reception site will arrive and, of course, the start time for the ceremony. A printed copy can help, but a digital copy sent via text or email can guarantee the schedule is accessible

via smartphone at all times during the day.

• Collaborate with your photographer in advance of your wedding day. Couples can streamline wedding day photography sessions by collaborating with their photographer in advance. During these sessions, identify the bridal party shots you want to take and then create a schedule of photos so all party members know where they need to be and when. Some couples choose to schedule bridal party photoshoots before the ceremony, while others prefer theirs after the couple has made it official. Regardless of which option couples prefer, schedule these photos so no time is wasted finding bridal party members.

• Don't forget to set aside time to eat. Anything can derail a wedding day schedule if it's forgotten when couples devise their initial plan for how the day will unfold. Couples might be less inclined to forget hair and makeup appointments and photo sessions because such components are integral to wedding planning. But couples

should not forget to leave time for themselves and their bridal party to eat. Schedule a breakfast for all bridal party members (separate ones if couples insist on avoiding each other until the ceremony) to ensure no one sleeps in and throws off the day's timeline. Include time to eat lunch if the ceremony is in late afternoon or early evening. If you forget to schedule time to eat, the timeline will almost certainly be thrown off when everyone gets hungry and requires some sustenance.

• Go over schedules with your vendors. In the weeks prior to your wedding, reach out to your vendors to confirm the day's timeline. Do this prior to handing out a schedule to your bridal party so no one is confused if any last-minute changes are made.

Couples have much to manage on their wedding days. Perhaps no component is more important to manage effectively than time.











Ruth and Marvin Duhn to celebrate 75 years of marriage

Ruth was 16 years old and Marvin was 18 years old when they first encountered each

other. It wasn't the most pleasant introduction. Ruth was riding her bicycle and Marvin jumped on the back of her bike and said he wanted a ride. Ruth said no.

Eventually they started conversing and seeing each other at the skating pond. This was in part of a field that was converted to an ice rink during the winter months. Both of them grew up on a farm and they learned they had other things in common that drew them together.

It was a stormy snowy Saturday night on February 12, 1949 when the couple exchanged vows.

Despite the weather relatives and friends made it to the wedding. The bride wore a white wedding dress that years later was worn by her daughter when she married. The groom was dressed in a striped brown suit.



Today's wedding receptions feature a variety of items that include guests and families of the couple. All in attendance learn more about the partner each has chosen.

Often the DJ will lead the crowd into a fun contest. One of these is asking married couples to come to the dance floor. They start eliminating couples until the two people who have been married the longest are left on the dance floor. It is a way for the crowd to get to know others in attendance.

The Shoe Game is basically an introduction of the couple. The

bride and groom sit on chairs that are back-to-back. Each takes one of their shoes off and gives it to the other person. They are ready for the game to start when each has one of their shoes and one of their partners. A member of the bridal party or a family member then proceeds to ask a series of questions. The couple raises the shoe of the person that fits the answer to the question. Sample questions are:

Who is the better driver? Who said, "I love you" first? Who is smarter?

Who is better at keeping secrets? Who spends more money? Who takes more time to get

Who spends more money? This game is a way for guests and family members to get to know the couple.

The reception dinner is still very traditional. It is usually a buffet that includes a salad, protein and vegetable. Wedding cakes are not always a part of the reception. Platters of cupcakes and/or cookies are now in vogue.

Along with the meal there is usually a bar. Sometimes a certain amount is paid for an open bar. Sometimes a bar features a signature drink from both the bride and the groom. Often a keg is included.

It is becoming more common for all of the guests to receive a bracelet towards the end of the evening that lights up.

Instead of a guest book, now an old type telephone is outfitted with a device that records a message to the bride and groom from guests at the reception. This can be listened to after the wedding and for years to come. A memory table has also become part of the day. It is a way to honor those who have passed.

Alissa Kliegl, community Center Manager at The Shores in Emmetsburg, Iowa provided information regarding wedding trends. She estimated that

50% of the weddings are still the traditional church wedding. The other 50% choose different venues such as The Shores. The lake front view is an attraction for many.

Alissa recalled a winter wedding that was held at The Shores. The couple was married in front of the east sliding doors. As the vows were being said someone was ice skating on the lake.

This year The Shores is booked for 12 weddings. Alissa said that if someone contacts her about a wedding, she will do what she can to get them the date they want.

Hailey Banwart, owner of Hailey B's located at 401 2nd Ave. NE, West Bend, has been baking cakes for as long as she can remember. Her mother made cakes while she was growing up and Hailey started making cakes after high school as a side hobby, so it is no surprise that she continues to make delectable pastries for wedding and parties.

Hailey B's Bakery really took off in 2020 during the pandemic. She and her husband Trent discussed the idea of putting a second kitchen in their basement and that Hailey expand her business. At that time, she was creating cakes for friends and family. She started posting on Facebook and, like so many home based businesses that began in the pandemic, it took off. When the present location became available, they decided to move the business due to the larger space.

At the time of this publishing, Hailey B's Bakery is open on Friday and Saturdays and although not full scale bakery in the sense that it will be loaded with different kinds of pastries, she does have cupcakes and hand decorated sugar cookies. "I do plan on expanding however at this time, there is not enough time or me to go around," Banwart replied when asked about it. She can also make gluten free cookies and cakes. "They take a bit longer and require a certain amount of finesse, but they are doable." Banwart wants to clarify that she is NOT a gluten-free facility. She has a facility that can produce gluten-free cakes and cookies.

Banwart does custom wedding cakes* and can do a one tier, two tier, three tier and on up. The last few years the cakes Banwart has been doing range from one to two tier white cakes, maybe some floral wrapped around it with cupcakes. "The trend the last couple of

gets harder every year. It is so hard to predict. Even with the RSVP's. I have made an exact number and ran out and then turned around the next time with the exact number that had a bit left. I figure one slice of cake or 2.5 cookies per guest.'

Banwart likes about a six month timeline when ordering a wedding cake. There is so much that goes into baking and decorating a wedding cake. It has to be perfect. Next to the bride, the wedding cake is most likely the next important thing. "I do my best to make the bride's vision come to life," Banwart says. Here are the steps that Hailey goes through to ensure your cake is exactly what you ordered. First she gets her scheduling book out and checks the date. General information is gathered like the number of servings for guests, time of year, venue, date of wedding, indoor/outdoor, wedding colors and other general information. If they have inspirational photos, these are very useful if there something specific in mind. If they want floral and have it, bring it along. Over the next few months there are meetings to ensure that the cake is what the couple is wanting. One month before the wedding, the client is contacted and all the details are finalized. This is the crunch time. The point of no return if you will. Hailey states, "Make sure that the cake is what you want, because once the cake is started there is little possibility of switching in mid stream". If the cake is over two tiers, Hailey delivers and sets up.


Some tips that Hailey has for the new bride is: Have an idea of what you want, have flavors in mind. Minds get changed and if that happens, notify your baker ASAP. Another point to remember, is that not everything you see on Pinterist or any of those other sites, can be replicated, so the baker may have to improvise.
