baby Jesus, as it's depicted in the Nativity story of Christian tradition.

Jose has his own winter miracle. In 2022, he fell ill. Due to the cold, Allen had moved Jose into the heated garage and then brought Max, the pony, in for fellowship, which helped in his healing as donkeys need that connection.

"They need that camaraderie," Allen said.

He was very ill and Allen had decided to put him to rest, so he wouldn't experience the pain that had kept building in his hooves. A blizzard wound through rural Jackson County that night and Allen decided not to have the vet come out

in the weather. That saved Jose's life.

"Two times I was going to put him to rest, and two blizzards happened. Each one provided another chance for him to survive. Then I decided I'm just going to give it to my sweet Lord Jesus and stop worrying." Allen said.

Allen let Jose rest for six to eight hours at a time, and he healed.

"It was a miracle. Thank God those two blizzards came. It taught me to never give up," Allen said.

The community gathered recently for Jose's 40th birthday – a tea party with cake and more.





August falls right in the heart of the Dog Days of Summer. A number of local dogs participated with their humans in an Estherville News photoshoot to ring in the Days. The Old Farmer's Almanac provided this rhyme to mark the occasion:

The image of the dog came into play because the period of sweltering temperatures coincides with the rising of Sirius, the dog star. Sirius is the brightest star in the sky, not including our galaxy's sun.







The Condon family of Estherville has three dogs: Atticus, Jem, and Scout, their names inspired by characters from the novel "To Kill a Mockingbird" by Harper Lee. Atticus is a purebred Golden Retriever who was the runt of the litter. The breeder in Montezuma, Iowa, had bottle fed her and took care of her until she started on soft food. Atticus began having seizures several years ago. The Condons and their veterinarian treated her for epilepsy, with medication keeping the seizures under control. However, Attie was recently diagnosed with os-







teosacroma (bone cancer). Tumors have grown on her leg, on her ribcage, and in her brain. Jody Condon said, "She is living a regular life and isn't currently in pain, but our time is limited with her." Attie has a special relationship with Condon's mother, who lives with the family on hospice. When Josie Condon was playing basketball for Briar Cliff, Attie traveled with the family to her games.

Atticus has a younger half-sister, Scout. Scout makes a sound like Chewbacca from Star Wars when

she's excited, and rings a bell on the door when she's ready to go outside.

Two-year-old Jem came to the Condons from a shelter in Mason City. She's mostly husky and lab along with Great Pyrenees and Greyhound. Jem doesn't go to the dog park unless the Condons are the only family there as she's not fond of new dogs. At home, Jem is affectionate, comforting people when they are sad and protecting the family's home and yard.



MY RINGSTED ROOTS

As Ringsted celebrates its quasquicentennial this year, that's 125 years for those unfamiliar with the word, it's time to tale some tells of my experiences with the southeast Emmet County community.

With my father Leonard Swartz marrying one of the Danish gals from the Ringsted area, Darlene Paulsen, much of my youth was spent traveling to Ringsted for church.

While my mother spent most of her schooling years at the neighboring school in Halfa, her final high school years were spent in Ringsted where she graduated in 1951. My folks were married at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in 1963.

I attended St. Paul's in the 1970s and 1980s before the church merged with St. John's Lutheran Church to form the current United Lutheran Church.

An interesting note—I didn't know that those from St. John's were often called the "Happy Danes" while those at St. Paul's were the "Sad Danes" due to St. Paul's being more strict in their worship.

As with most youth, I regularly attended Sunday School and church.

During the Lenten sea-



son, the two Lutheran churches and the First Presbyterian Church rotated the location of Wednesday services. It was always interesting to visit the other church.

Another joint venture of the three churches was Bible School.

I especially recall attending Bible School in the former Ringsted elementary building. School lasted through lunch

from early morning to after lunch. Discovering who could eat sandwiches the quickest between myself and Scott Manson was a daily routine. Hint: the key to success is small bites, not big bites.

From Sunday School, some of my teachers are still around and some are not. Those I remember are Lynn Ries, Evelyn Hansen, Delores Weisbrod, Faith Nielsen,

and Roger and Betty Christensen.

Pastor Fred Boyce and his wife Mardene were responsible for my confirmation teaching.

More recently, the former Ringsted Middle School was home to an area adult basketball league. When Armstrong-Ringsted merged with North Kossuth and Sentral of Fenton, that facility was

torn down as well.

The town of Ringsted still has a key corp of residents dedicated to serving the community and hosting events.

I attended the town's Diamond Jubilee (75th birthday) when I was very young. I was at the town's 100th year celebration in 1999. I plan to attend this year's 125th as well to pay homage to my youth.

SOME RINGSTED HISTORY

The southeast town of Ringsted celebrates its 125th birthday this year. As with many small towns in Iowa, Ringsted owes existence to a time when railroads were the quickest means of travel.

Ringsted The Post Office preceded the town when John Larsen applied for a post office for the area. He received approval for the post office Feb. 14. 1884. Mr. Larsen chose the name Ringsted because his wife was a name of Ringsted, Denmark. The location of the postoffice shifted five times before it was located in the town of Ringsted. after it was platted April 6, 1899. With the coming of the railroad, Ringsted moved for incorporation which came about on March 19, 1900.

The town owes its diagonal streets to the railroad, as many point northwest to southeast and northeast to southwest.

The store and post office located northeast of Ringsted, as well as most of the business places made up the town of Forsysth (which was southeast of Ringsted), were moved to the new town site and became a part of the community established on the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad. Some dwelling places were also relocated but the creamery northeast of Ringsted continued to operate at its original location until 1915 when a new building was constructed in the town.

The Danish Lutheran Church was formed in 1884. However in 1897, the congregation became divided and split into two congregations which became known as St. John's and St. Paul's.

While St. John's sat outside the town limits to the east, St. Paul's built a church in town. The church St. Paul's built in town now is home to United Lutheran Church—a merger of St. John's and St. Paul's in the 1990s.

The First Presbyterian Church was incorporated June 23,1903.

The Ringsted Dispatch still serves as the town's newspaper, but it is printed in Armstrong.

The Ringsted Telephone Company is one of the town's oldest businesses. Telephones were in use in the area starting in 1907. The name was changed to Ringtel Communications in 2009.




