Military honors given at Kendall's Glendale Cemetery

On Sunday, October 18, 2020, Major General James G. Blaney passed away with his beloved wife Ramona at his side. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, funeral and memorial services were held off until a later date, which was able to be Friday, June 4.

Major General Blaney, a Canadian native, moved with his family to the Kendall area as a child and attended school in Kendall until his high school graduation in 1957. He pursued a Bachelor of Science degree at the University of Wisconsin - La Crosse, graduating in 1964, and completed his Master's five years later in 1969.

Blaney graduated from the Wisconsin Military Academy in 1963, from Command and General Staff College in 1979, and from the

United States Army War College in 1984. He first enlisted in the Wisconsin Army National Guard in 1960, setting him on the path for a lifelong military career.

He mobilized in 1961 with the 32nd Infantry Division at Fort Lewis in Washington in response to the Berlin Crisis. In 1963, he was commissioned as a second lieutenant and was assigned as a platoon leader, Headquarters Troop, 1st Squadron, 105th Cavalry. Throughout his career, Blaney's assignments included command of the 2nd Battalion, 128th Infantry; the Wisconsin Military Academy; the Wisconsin Army National Guard's Troop Command; and the 32nd Separate Infantry Brigade.

In 1995, Blaney was named assistant Adjutant General for special operations, and in January

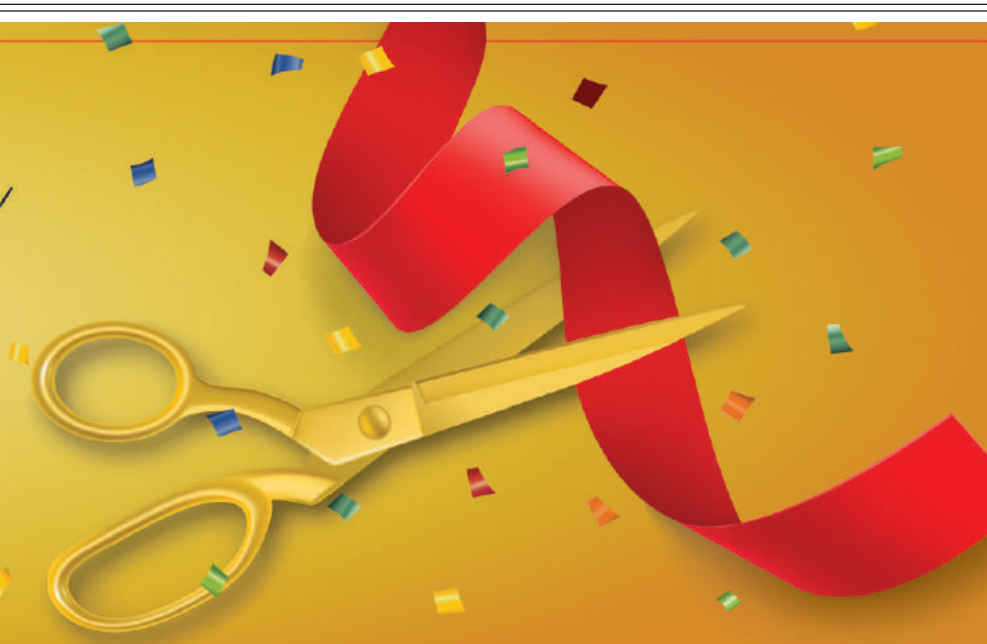

of 1996 he became Deputy Adjutant General for the Army, Commander of the Wisconsin Army National Guard. This appointment came from then-Governor Tommy Thompson. Blaney's appointment to this position made him responsible for both federal and state missions involving the Wisconsin Army and Art National Guard as well as the Wisconsin Division of Emergency Management.

Throughout his career, Blaney earned the Distinguished Service Medal, the Legion of Merit, the Meritorious Service Medal with two oak leaf clusters, the Army Commendation Medal, the Army Reserve Components Achievement Medal (5th Award), the Army Reserve Components Overseas Training Ribbon, the Wisconsin Distinguished Service Medal, and the Wisconsin National Guard Berlin Crisis Ribbon, among others.

His military service impacted more than a few aspects of his life outside of uniform, and his dedication to those under his command inspired his son, Scott, to pursue a military career as well. During the memorial service for his father, Lieutenant Colonel Scott Blaney spoke on behalf of his family, describing the impact his father had on him as he grew up.

One such impact came when a young soldier under Blaney's

command was involved in a farming accident that left him severely injured and hospitalized. According to his son's account, Blaney wasted no time heading over to the hospital in question to visit the young man. At the time, Scott Blaney didn't understand why his father would drop everything to visit someone he barely knew. Blaney's response was that, as a commanding officer, those under his command were expected to trust him—and if they knew they could rely on him, knew that he cared enough to visit them in the hospital, it would go a long way to building and earning that trust. Scott went on to say that he hadn't fully understood, not until he became a commanding officer himself.

Following LTC Blaney's comments, as well as a eulogy by retired Colonel Vincent Pintarro and the reading of a letter submitted by Tommy Thompson, who was unable to attend the service in person due to prior commitments with the University of Wisconsin, military honors were given by the Wisconsin Army National Guard, the Wisconsin Air National Guard, and the Kendall American Legion Post #309. Major General Paul Knapp presented Blaney's widow and sons with the U.S. flag, and the Kendall Legion fired off a 21-gun salute.

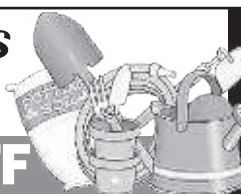

Union Center welcomes new Police Chief

The Village of Union Center has welcomed a new police officer to town, one who will be taking over the role of Chief of Police for the village.

Originally from Janesville, Eli Schroeder traveled to the area numerous times as a child for family gatherings as well as for hunting season. Growing up, Schroeder developed an interest in conservation law enforcement and had originally planned to enter into the field with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

Schroeder's life-long enjoyment

of the Great Outdoors was something he aimed to translate into his future career, and when he discovered that entering into conservation law enforcement wouldn't be in the cards for him at this point in his career, he decided to enter into local law enforcement.

As a member of law enforcement, not only is Schroeder able to continue working beyond the desk, but he is able to put his time and efforts to use helping out local communities and the people who inhabit them. Currently, Schroeder works with the Juneau County Sheriff's Department and has been in the field for going on four years.

Schroeder originally planned to look for part-time work to go along

with his current job, and at the time that he applied to join Union Center's police force, he found that the previous chief, Chad Rick, was leaving and the position was available. As this meant Schroeder would serve as the village's sole law enforcement officer, he was given the choice to take on the position.

Schroeder decided to accept the open position, and will be serving the Village of Union Center as their Chief of Police.

Hillsboro resident awarded Teacher Of The Year

Hillsboro resident Robin Haugh's interest in healthcare has been a life-long one. Haugh has worked in the field since high school, starting out as an emergency medical technician (EMT) and going on to graduate and work as a medical assistant (MA) in 1986. Early on in her career, Haugh had expressed that she had no desire to become a nurse, wanting instead to work as a paramedic. However, at the time, Haugh would have to travel

to Iowa in order to take the required classes to become a paramedic.

In 2003, Haugh attended a nurse pinning ceremony in which the daughter of a friend would be receiving her own pin and entering into the nursing field. Haugh found the experience to be so moving that she decided to embark on the process of becoming a nurse herself.

Haugh earned her two-year Associate's Degree in nursing from Western Technical College, going on to complete her Bachelor's program at Viterbo. At the time in which she entered the program, Haugh was part of the last cohort for the nurse educator track. She then decided to remain at the university to take on her Master's program, and is currently working to complete her Doctorate, which she expects to finish in December of this year.

While working to further her education, Haugh has been working at Viterbo since 2016 as a professor, a job which she greatly enjoys. Her decision to remain affiliated with the university comes from her wealth of positive experiences with the campus, which she describes as "compassionate" and "kind."

"Not everyone can say they get up every morning and love going to their job," says Haugh, "but I can. I feel like I'm blessed, being here."

On Thursday, May 6, Haugh's love for her work and dedication to her students resulted in her being named as the 2021 Teacher of the Year. Friends, family, and colleagues made sure to keep the award a total secret

from Haugh, with one colleague asking her to attend to accept an award on behalf of the nursing school.

Originally, Haugh had no plans to even attend the ceremony, as Thursdays were not usually days on which she made the trip to campus from her home here in Hillsboro. However, after agreeing to accept an award that night on behalf of the nursing school, and with plans to meet with her daughter in order to pick up an item, Haugh went to the ceremony—only to be surprised to find that award in question was for her!

Teachers at Viterbo are nominated for the award by their students, and Haugh's students all had plenty to say about why they thought she had certainly earned the designation, describing her as an "amazing professor" and a "positive role model." Students praised her teaching methods and her dedication to helping her students learn and succeed.

As it turns out, this is not the first year that Haugh's students have nominated her for the award. For the past three years, Haugh's students have nominated her in order to give their teacher some recognition for all she's done to help them in their education. Haugh had even been nominated for an Advisor of the Year award.

Haugh plans to remain at Viterbo and to continue teaching after completing her doctorate in Ethical Leadership.

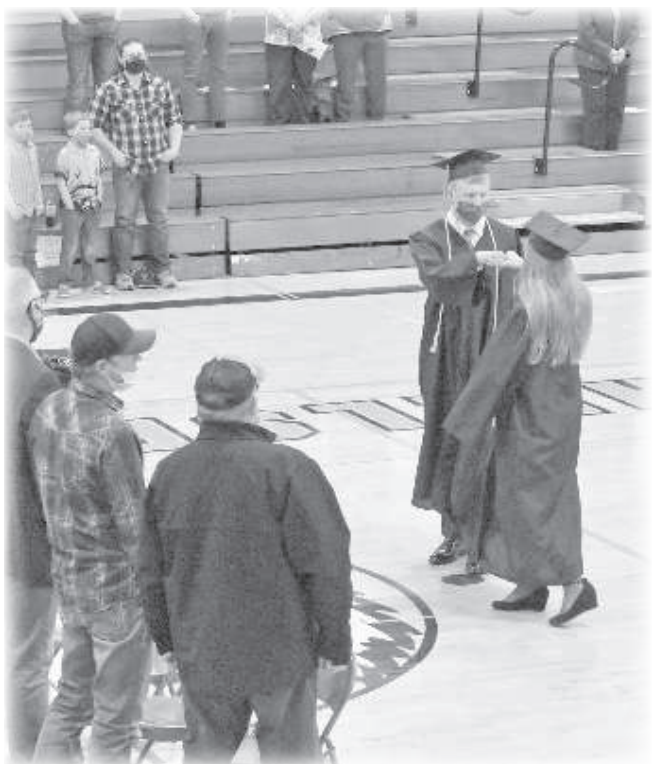

Royall and Wonewoc-Center to partner for 2022-23 wrestling season

The Wonewoc-Center School District and the Royall School District are looking to establish a partnership in their sports programs.

Parents in the Royall School District contacted the district's superintendent, Mark Gruen, regarding the possibility of co-oping with Wonewoc-Center for the school's wrestling team. Royall already has a wrestling team, but Wonewoc-Center has never had one of their own.

Gruen contacted Wonewoc-Center officials regarding the inquiry, and district officials set about taking a survey of potential interest within the school for a wrestling program. Seven students at Wonewoc-Center readily voiced their support and interest in the sport, while an additional seven indicated that they were interested but did not express immediate commitment. A staff member at the school also indicated that he would be interested in coaching should the

merger go through.

District administrators brought the potential co-op to the Wonewoc-Center School Board, and board members voted to approve the development. The Royall School Board also gave their approval, giving both districts the green light to begin the process.

While it is currently too late in the year for a co-op between Royall and Wonewoc-Center to qualify for the 2021-2022 wrestling season, school officials have stated that a full co-op between the schools will begin the following year. However, officials at Wonewoc-Center have indicated that the co-op may begin yet this year, though wrestlers would not be able to compete at a tournament level until the 2022-2023 season.

Gruen has been handling the majority of the co-op's development as it pertains to the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA). Details regarding the co-op are still being discussed and will be announced as the process continues.

During Memorial Day, Americans across the country gathered together to remember those who paid the ultimate price to preserve and protect our freedoms. While many who went off to war were able to make it back home, many more did not.

Every year, since the end of the Civil War, communities have taken it upon themselves to devote some time to tidying up and decorating the graves of fallen soldiers. Records indicate that one of the earliest Memorial Day commemorations was organized by a group of freed slaves in Charleston, South Carolina, less than a month after the Confederacy surrendered.

But while we have dedicated the last Monday in May to remembering the fallen, it stands to reason that such a day should not be the only time when we stop to reflect on the cost of remaining free.

Last fall, the Wonewoc American Legion reached out to Wonewoc-Center art teacher Megan Danahy to inquire about possibly creating a mural at the Legion. Danahy drew up a preliminary design for the Legionnaires, though concerns regarding COVID-19 held off the project until the end of May. She describes the mural's design and purpose thusly:

"With each brush stroke, we want to honor our Veterans! To those in uniform serving today and to those who have served in the past, we honor you today and every day. Home of the free because of the brave! To all veterans of all branches: Thank you for your sacrifice, your bravery, and the example you set for us all. To our men and women in uniform, past, present, and future, we dedicate this mural to you. God bless you and thank you."

Danahy and members of the Wonewoc-Center Art Club spent their last day of school at work in the Legion Hall, beginning to outline the finalized design for both the main mural, located in the entryway, and a second one elsewhere in the building. The design features images from various aspects of American patriotism, including poppies, the U.S. flag, planes, tanks, and a silhouette of the famed moment from Iwo Jima where U.S. soldiers raised a flag above the battlefield. Beginning on Monday, June 14, summer school students will join in on the work under Danahy's instruction.

As Danahy and her students lay the groundwork for the murals, they discuss topics such as their thankfulness and gratitude to our veterans as well as reflect on the tragedy and horrors of war and what our veterans experienced in serving our country. Danahy holds that such discussions are necessary, especially with young students, as it can be easy to forget the truth behind the phrase "Freedom isn't free."

America will observe Flag Day this year on Monday, June 14, which commemorates the adoption of the U.S. flag on June 14, 1777. In the spirit of community engagement, Danahy has helped to arrange a Community Paint Day. Members of the local community are welcome to stop by between 2:00P.M. and 4:00P.M. to help paint the mural.

No artistic talent is needed to pick up a brush and join in, and free refreshments will be provided. Young children are asked to be accompanied at all times by an adult. High school students participating in the mural's creation can also count the time towards their community service hours.
