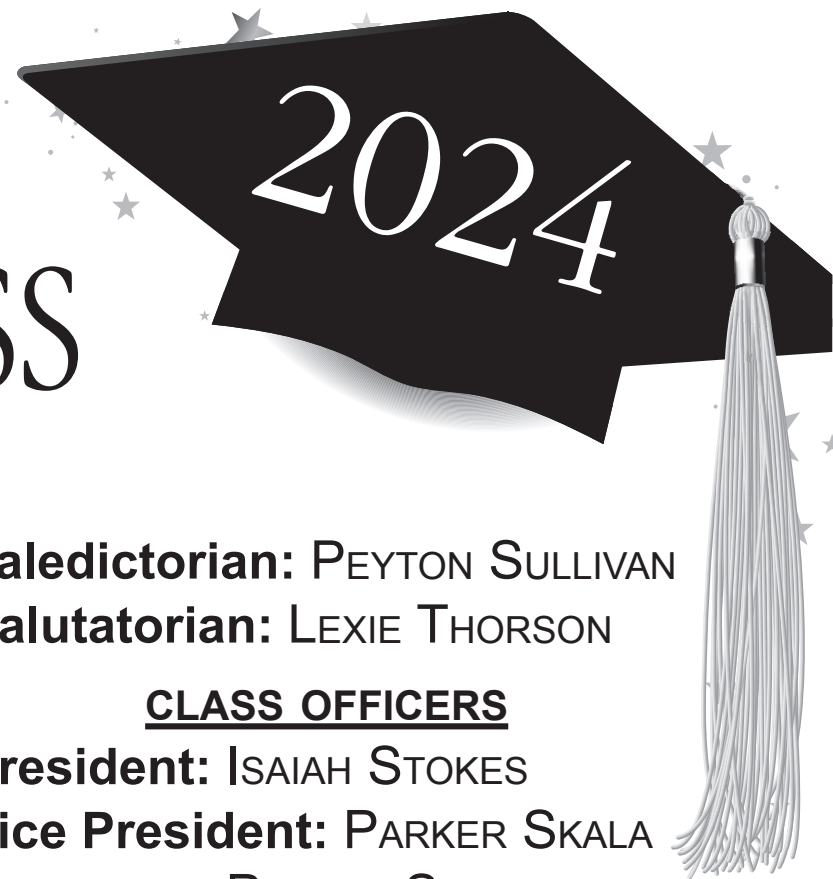
"Try everything. I know everyone says that, but that's how you meet people," says Graewin.
