# A celebration of a building, and the family connected to it

A handful of family members in Lewisburg and Lynnville have received some special recognitions at the University of Tennessee Institute of Agriculture in Knoxville, including on Monday this week.

The family members are all descendants of former UT agriculture leader and UT President Harcourt Morgan, who led the university from 1919 to 1934. This year, the building named in his honor, Morgan Hall, is being celebrated for marking 100 years of service as the home and headquarters of UT's statewide programs in agriculture.

On June 7, Lucy-Fay Morgan Hinds and Sarah Lanier Morgan Davis of Lewisburg were guests of honor at the building's Centennial Celebration. The two are granddaughters of Harcourt Morgan. Also in the special party were Morgan's great-grandson, Jason C. Hinds, with wife Brandy, and their daughters (and Morgan's two great-great-granddaughters), Jacy and Kaly Hinds, all of Lynnville. Davis' husband, Phil, also was a member of the party.

Some 120 faculty, staff and students took part in celebration on June 7, with another 1,700 alumni and friends watching a livecast on Facebook. Much excitement at the event surrounded the opening of a

time capsule that was installed in 1919, during Morgan Hall's construction. The capsule, the remains of its contents, and duplicates of the contents from UT archives were displayed at the celebration, alongside a new time capsule planned to be installed in 2021. Items in the original time capsule included photographs of Harcourt Morgan and the UT president who preceded him, Brown Ayres. Student agriculture magazines and a listing of university courses were also in the capsule.

On Monday of this week, descendants of Harcourt Morgan returned to Knoxville to be guests of honor again. This time they oversaw the installation of the new time capsule,

meant to be opened in 2121. They also joined university leaders, faculty, staff and students in recreating a photograph taken in 1919 when the first time capsule was installed. In that photo, a very young Harcourt Morgan Junior applied mortar to seal the building's cornerstone in place. The time capsule was installed behind that cornerstone.

In Monday's ceremony, Harcourt Morgan Junior's great granddaughters, Jacy and Kaly, did the honors. Three Knoxville television crews were on hand to record them doing so, as was a reporter and photographer from the Knoxville News Sentinel.

## Commission handles routine agenda

Despite a sizable agenda, the Marshall County Commission worked quickly through the fairly routine issues before it on Monday evening.

Six of the 14 items authorized County Mayor Mike Keny to apply for various grants available through the state on behalf of the Marshall County Office of Emergency Management.

Commissioner Mickey King said that time frames for grants were often very short, making it advisable to pre-approve the authorizations without having to wait for a monthly commission meeting.

Commissioners confirmed the nominations of Leon Finley to serve as chair of the civil service committee and of Kirk Kelso to the county planning commission.

The commission approved a resolution establishing adult entertainment regulations for the county. In the late 1990s, the commis-

sion adopted a general framework for such regulations, following a state law passed at the time, but had never finished the process by appointing a committee or adopting regulations.

In an interview later, Keny explained that the County Technical Assistance Service pointed out that it was better for the county to have regulations in place if such an establishment was proposed than to try and regulate after the fact.

He emphasized that passing the regulations was not indicative of any such business looking to locate in the county.

Commissioner Dean Delk celebrated several Forrest High School athletes for their accomplishments during the last school year.

The presentation had been delayed more than once, he noted.

The state champion softball team, the nationally competitive cheerleading squad, and two-time wrestling state champion Noah Hill were honored by the commission.

Ford, who received an honorable discharge from the US Army and is a retiree of the Tenn. National Guard, earned his VFW eligibility during his combat service in Op-

*"And of His fullness have all we received, and grace for grace." - John 1:16*

All believers have a relationship with God based upon grace. The world has redefined grace suggesting that it's ignoring our wrongs. But the Bible speaks of grace as the free gift of God's love and favor given to the unworthy (Romans 3:24; 5:15). In short, grace is God giving the sinner what he or she does not deserve. We experienced grace when we were first drawn to the Lord Jesus Christ as our Savior. However, grace extends beyond our salvation experience. Notice that John emphasized "grace for grace." Simply put, God has given the believer a super-abundance of grace. So much so, that grace impacts

our entire life whereby we walk in grace everyday. Yet religion puts us in bondage and smothers out grace by controlling our conscience and giving us a "works in order to please God" mentality.

A lady came to her pastor and confessed that she knew that she is supposed to read her Bible but she didn't want to. The pastor asked, "Does this happen often?" She replied, "All the time." The pastor said, "Okay, for the next two days don't read your Bible, and after that if you still don't want to read your Bible - don't!" She looked at him puzzled. 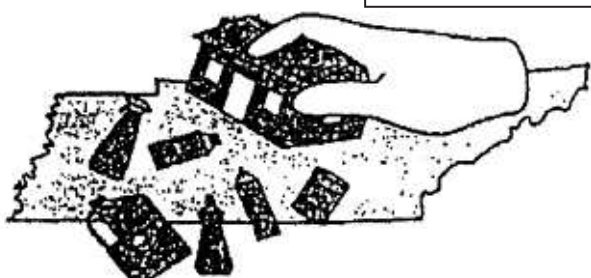

Gently divide lamb into four parts, 6 ounces each, and shape into rounds slightly larger than buns. Place covered in refrigerator, 1 hour.

To make yogurt sauce: In small bowl, mix yogurt, garlic, mayonnaise and Dijon mustard; refrigerate until ready to assemble burgers.

To make salad: In medium bowl, mix cucumber, onions, parsley, mint leaves, dill, microgreens, lemon juice, lemon zest and olive oil; refrigerate until ready to assemble burgers.

Preheat grill to medium-high heat with direct and indirect zones. Salt patties then add to grill, cooking about 6 minutes on each side until internal temperature reaches 150 F. As patties near this temperature, or start to brown, move to indirect zone to regulate doneness. Transfer to plate and let rest about 5 minutes.

To build burgers, add dollop of yogurt spread to bottom buns. Top each with tomato slice, lamb burger, herb salad and top bun.

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# Tigers outlast Columbia's comeback bid

COLUMBIA — Starting the season off with the win is every coach and team's goal, but for the Marshall County Tigers, the cost might have been high in Friday night's 30-23 win at Columbia.

"Winning is so tough. Any time you can start the year off with the win you're tickled to death. The only way to say it is we gutted out a win," Tigers' coach Thomas Osteen said.

In a bizarre second half, the Tigers saw not one, but two quarterbacks go down with injuries.

After Columbia tied the game at 23 apiece with less than seven minute to go, the Tigers recovered a fumble on the Lions' 39-yard line with just 4:25 left in regulation.

From there, Marshall County settled into its offense and was able to move the ball down field with chunk plays.

On a third and short, senior quarterback Bryson Hammons scrambled for 15 yards and picked up the first down, but was tackled along the sideline and went down with an injury.

He did not return to the game.

With Hammons' injury, Osteen turned to Devonte' Davis to lead the Tiger offense.

He did just that and promptly marched the ball deep into Columbia territory, highlighted by a 34-yard pass completion to Lamarion Pierce.

After pushing the ball down to the Columbia one-yard line, Davis was tackled in the backfield and went down with an injury.

He also did not return to the game.

"Two of our best players, Bryson Hammons and Devonte' (Davis) banged up. It's a long season and they're some of the best players in Middle Tennessee. We'll know more about them next week,"

Osteen said.

Even with two of the top Tiger playmakers sidelined, Marshall County kept its composure and with 1:04 left on the clock, Pierce was able to bounce to the outside and hit the corner pylon for the game-winning touchdown.

Wyatt Joyce connected on his fourth point after to secure the seven-point lead.

"We played three quarterbacks in a series of about four plays. Hats off to those kids for being ready to go when their time was called. We had enough composure there to put it in," Osteen said.

Prior to the second-half

drama, Marshall County looked to be in cruise control through much of the game.

Three plays into regulation, Davis picked off Lion quarterback Luke Uselton and returned it 25 yards for the first score of the night.

The Lions evened the score with a Christian Biggers two-yard run with one minute left in the first quarter, which capped off a nine-play drive.

Marshall County retook the lead at the 9:41 mark of the second quarter when Hammons connected with Davis for a 35-yard touchdown pass to put the Tigers up 14-7 after Joyce's successful kick.

The Tigers added a third touchdown of the night after a botched Lions' snap on fourth down set Marshall County up on the Columbia 11-yard line.

Marshall County pushed the ball to the one-yard line but after back-to-back goal line stands, Davis took a direct snap and was able to slice his way to the end zone to put the Tigers up 21-7 with 5:56 left in the third.

And that's when things began to go awry.

After forcing a Lion punt with 4:16 left in the third, Marshall County once again established some rhythm in

the offense and appeared to be in cruise control until Columbia came up with an interception on the Marshall County two-yard line.

The very next play, a bad snap allowed the Tigers to swarm Uselton in the end zone and come up with the safety, stretching the lead to 23-7 by the end of the third quarter.

That following drive, however, stalled out and Marshall County was forced to punt the ball back to Columbia.

The Lions took that possession 80 yards in less than two minutes to the end zone,

# Bulldogs outmuscle rival Richland in opener

CORNERVILLE — It became clear to Cornersville coach Gerard Randolph early on in Thursday night's Battle of Buford Station that Richland had sold out on stopping senior fullback Cason Warner.

With the Raiders keying on Warner, that opened up the playbook for Ben Franklin to have a breakout night—and did he ever.

The sophomore bulldozer rushed for 199 yards and three touchdowns in the Bulldogs' 31-7 romp over Richland.

"I'm very proud of that kid and the way he ran the ball tonight. He works hard in practice every day. I'm just glad he (Franklin) got the opportunity to showcase his talents tonight. We knew he could be a force and he stepped up big when we needed him tonight," Randolph said.

With torrential rains drowning the greater Cornersville area earlier in the afternoon, the field became a sloppy mud pit, creating all the more opportunities for miscues by both teams.

Having deteriorating field conditions, it took a while for the Bulldogs to gain momentum on the offensive side of the ball.

Cornersville's first drive of the night ended in a three and out punt barely 1:15 into the game.

The second drive, however, ended a 15-play drive with a 31-yard field goal by Mason Calahan with 11:40 left in the first half.

With both teams struggling to establish the run through the remainder of the quarter, Cornersville forced a Raider punt with 3:24 left in the

second quarter, giving the Bulldogs decent field position in the closing minutes of the half.

Two carries by Warner set the Bulldogs up first and 10 from the Raider 47-yard line.

He finished the run on a 47-yard dash up the middle for the first touchdown of the

night with 1:57 left in the first half.

"The offensive line did a really good job tonight. We faced some adversity early. They were keying in on Cason and didn't want him to beat them. When Ben got the opportunity, the offensive line opened up holes and made good for us," Randolph said.

While the kick attempt after failed, Richland looked poised on the first drive of the second half and promptly

picked up a first down on a scramble by Sam Edwards.

The very next play, Cornersville linebacker Riley Qualls picked off Richland quarterback Bryce Miller on the 43-yard line.

Three plays later, Franklin notched his second score of the night—a 36-yard trot to the end zone with 8:44 left.

Warner tacked on the successful two-point conversion to give the home team a 17-0 lead with 8:44 remaining in

the third.

The momentum from the second Bulldog touchdown of the night was short-lived as Richland's Ethan Workman took the ensuing kickoff 80 yards to the house to end the shutout bid.

Leading 17-7, the next Bulldog drive was plagued by several penalties that backed Cornersville up to a second and 55 to go from their own 14-yard line.

# Defense, run game sparks Forrest on opening night

It was the fourth straight win for the Rockets over the Eagles and only the second shutout in the series, dating back to 2003.

"It was not pretty, but our kids kept fighting and got the job done at the end and got a big win over one of our rivals," Forrest coach Eli Stephenson said. "It wasn't pretty and we have a lot of work to do on both sides of the ball."

Forrest also notched a road blanking over the Eagles by the same score in 2007.

The Rockets' defense gave up a measly 80 yards to an Eagleville offense that was without its best weapon in senior quarterback Marcus Collins, who was out due to illness.

## Dominant 'D'

The Chapel Hill defense was dominant as Eagleville had 10 offensive series in the game and went three-and-out

seven times, including the first three times they touched the rock.

"I'm really proud of our defense, they came out and got a big goose egg," Stephenson said. "When you can shut somebody out it makes the offense's job a lot easier."

Eagleville only had two first downs in the contest and never crossed the midfield stripe.

The Forrest offense did what they had to do and could have scored more than 14 points, but they had three turnovers that stalled some drives.

"We didn't meet our goal on that (turnovers)," Stephenson said. "We are going to have to focus a lot more on protecting the ball."

## On the gas

What they did do was score on their first offensive play of the game as junior tailback Brenton Burchell waited all spring and summer for his moment and when it happened he took full advantage, taking the handoff and sprinting to the outside where he outran the entire Eagleville secondary down the visitor's sideline for a 75-yard touchdown.

"That was pretty good, that was really sweet,"

Stephenson said. "We ran our bread and butter play and gotta big touchdown and that gave us a little momentum, but we let up a little bit after that, so you have to put the gas on them there and finish."

Gavin Grissom booted the first of his two successful extra-point kicks

and the Rockets led 7-0 nineteen seconds in to the game.

## Big calls

The Eagleville defense was stout as well and held the Rockets in check with two first half fumble recoveries and a big offensive pass interference call down in the red zone that killed the Rockets' final drive of the first half.

Liam Bell came up with a fumble recovery to derail Eagleville's second half opening

drive, but the Rockets couldn't take advantage of the turnover and had to punt.

Eagleville went three-and-out in its next series and an interception gave them the ball right back with 5:46 remaining in the third quarter.

The Rockets stopped them on three plays and finally got something going on its next series when Burchell came up with a third down run for a first down and 15 more yards were tacked on due a facemask penalty on the Eagles, mov-

ing the ball all the way to Eagleville's 25-yard line.

## Insurance from Swift, Bell sounds sweet for Rockets

Three Bell runs produced another first down and on the next play, Tayton Swift took the handoff and ran to the end zone as the Rockets led 14-0 with 3.4 seconds left in the third quarter.

"That man (Bell) is a beast, he is a sophomore

After punting, Cornersville's defense forced a turnover on downs after Richland attempted a fake punt that set the Bulldog offense up on the Richland 35-yard line. Warner finished off the following drive, finally breaking into the end zone on a six-yard outside run with 9:33 left in the game. He successfully ran in his second two-point conversion, putting Cornersville up 25-7. From there, it became a feast of riches as the Bulldog secondary recorded its third interception of the night, courtesy of Blaine Woodard. That following drive needed just three plays for Franklin to cap his hat trick with a 21-yard strike for the final

touchdown of the night. In total, Franklin was the spark plug for the offense and recorded 199 yards on 15 carries. Warner added 27 yards on 18 carries. Quarterback Caden White attempted just four passes, but connected with Rhett Woodard on a 34-yard gain in the first half. As a team, Cornersville piled up 292 yards of offense, with 258 coming on the ground. Defensively, Richland managed just 95 yards of total offense against the stingy Bulldog defense. That effort on the defensive side of the ball, according to Randolph, came from a perhaps overlooked secondary, which has been fuel to the fire. "We've been talking about the secondary all year. People

throw on us because they think we can't defend. We've taken it personally. We want to defend and get turnovers in the secondary. I'm very proud of how the secondary played tonight," he said. Miller completed just 5-of-19 tries for 49 yards with three interceptions. In addition to the three interceptions by the Bulldog defense, Warner recorded six solo tackles, including a tackle for loss, while Hunter Fitzgerald chipped in four. Logan Springer added the team's lone sack of the night. While there was plenty of positives to take away from Thursday night's opener, Randolph says there's still plenty to clean up before a Week 2 meeting against arch-rival Forrest. Cornersville was flagged eight times for 80 yards in the opener and had to work

around several botched snaps as well. "Those are things we can fix and we will definitely work on those this week. We can't keep going through the season and keep doing things like that," he said. Rivalry victory While any win is a good win, Thursday night's rivalry win over Richland meant just a little more to Randolph and his team. "This is a big win for us. Richland—it's a rivalry game. No love lost here. They came to play and we came to play. You never know what you're going to get out of a rivalry game like this. I'm definitely thrilled to come out with a win tonight," he said. With one rivalry game in the books, the Bulldogs now turn their attention to the north end of the county against arch-rival Forrest.

"I know they're coached up well. We'll have to bring our A-game, cut out a bunch of penalties we had tonight and do what Cornersville football does and that's play fast, physical and aggressive," Randolph said. The Bulldogs will kick off Friday night at Forrest.

# Who wins college football's biggest prizes in '21?

The last three Heisman Trophy winners include the first receiver to win the award in nearly three decades, a quarterback who was the 52nd-rated passer in the country the season before and a first-year starting QB. The days of the Heisman winner being a well-established star and/or preseason favorite are long gone. Heisman voters embrace the breakout player more than ever before, and in 2021 there is a good chance the winner will again be someone who enters the season without much of track record. The only player to finish in the top 10 of last season's Heisman voting to return to college football in '21 is Iowa State's Breece Hall. Considering recent Heisman trends, the seventh-ranked Cyclones' running back isn't even the favorite on his team. That would be quarterback Brock Purdy. No. 1 Alabama, No. 3 Clemson and No. 4 Ohio State all have new starting quarterbacks, with experience ranging from a couple of impressive starts (D.J. Uiagalelei of Clemson) to some mop-up work (Bryce Young of Alabama) to not one single college pass (C.J. Stroud of Ohio State). Even with that, some Heisman predictions have those three among the top seven favorites, led by Oklahoma's returning starter, Spencer Rattler. Makes sense. The last three starting

quarterbacks for coach Lincoln Riley's Sooners have been Heisman finalists and two — Baker Mayfield and Kyler Murray — have won it. Heisman Trophy (most outstanding player) Top contenders (in alphabetical order): JT Daniels, QB, Georgia; Spencer Rattler, QB, Oklahoma; Desmond Ridder, QB, Cincinnati; Kayvon Thibodeaux, DE, Oregon; D.J. Uiagalelei, QB, Clemson. And the winner is ... Uiagalelei. Trevor Lawrence's successor becomes the first Clemson player to win the Heisman. Bronko Nagurski Trophy (defensive player of the year) Top contenders: Will Anderson Jr., OLB, Alabama; Derek Stingley Jr., CB, LSU; Kayvon Thibodeaux, DE, Oregon. And the winner is ... Thibodeaux. The sack masters tend to win this award, The Ducks' junior is primed to follow recent winners Chase Young of Ohio State, Josh Allen of Kentucky and Bradley Chubb of North Carolina State. Outland Trophy (best interior lineman) Top contenders: Bryan Bresee, DT, Clemson; Evan Neal, OT, Alabama; Tyler Linderbaum, C, Iowa. And the winner is ... Neal. Alabama has dominated this award during the Nick Saban era with five winners, including three since 2016. Neal makes it two Crimson Tide offensive tackles in a row after Alex Leatherwood last season. Doak Walker Award (best

running back) Top contenders: Breece Hall, Iowa State; Bijan Robinson, Texas; Zamir White, Georgia. And the winner is ... Robinson. New Longhorns coach Steve Sarkisian will build the offense around the talented tailback, providing him plenty of opportunities in the running and passing game. Biletnikoff Award (best receiver) Top contenders: Drake London, Southern California; Marvin Mims, Oklahoma; Garrett Wilson, Ohio State. And the winner is ... London. The Trojans will throw it a lot and London's tackle-breaking yards after the catch will make him USC's first Biletnikoff winner since Marquise Lee in 2012. Jim Thorpe Award (best defensive back) Top contenders: Kaiir Elam, CB, Florida; Kyle Hamilton, S, Notre Dame; Derek Stingley Jr., CB, LSU. And the winner is ... Stingley. Last season's dysfunctional LSU defense overshadowed another solid season by Stingley. Tigers' opponents can only avoid him so much with talented sophomore Eli Ricks lining up on the other side. Extra points Butkus Award (best linebacker): Will Anderson Jr., Alabama. Mackey Award (best tight end): Jalen Wydermyer, Texas A&M. Groza Award (best kicker): Will Reichard, Alabama. Ray Guy (best punter): Lou Hedley, Miami.

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# ACC, Big Ten, Pac-12 ally to 'protect the collegiate model'

Facing a rapidly shifting landscape in college sports, the Atlantic Coast Conference, Big Ten and Pac-12 have agreed to work together to create stability during volatile times.

Less than a month after the Southeastern Conference made an expansion power play by inviting Texas and Oklahoma to the league, three of the SEC's Power Five peers countered with an alliance of 41 schools that span from Miami to Seattle.

The commissioners of the ACC, Big Ten and Pac-12 on Tuesday pledged broad collaboration on myriad issues and committed to league members playing more football and basketball games against each other.

They also suggested they wouldn't be poaching each other's schools.

"The history of college athletics, one expansion of a conference has usually led to another to another and to another," ACC Commissioner Jim Phillips said during a video conference. "And to the three of us, we felt the stabilization of the current environment, across Division I and FBS — in Power Five in particular — this was a chance for a new direction, a new initiative that I don't think has ever been done before."

After weeks of internal discussions, the alli-

ance is still mostly conceptual and collegial.

"There's no contract. There's no signed document," Pac-12 Commissioner George Kliavkoff said. "There's an agreement among three gentlemen and a commitment from 41 presidents and chancellors and 41 athletic directors to do what we say we're going to do."

The SEC sent shockwaves through college athletics in July when it was revealed that Texas and Oklahoma would be leaving the Big 12 to join the nation's most powerful football conference no later than 2025.

"I wouldn't say this is a reaction to Texas and Oklahoma joining the SEC, but to be totally candid you have to evaluate what's going on in the landscape of college athletics," Big Ten Commissioner Kevin Warren said.

In a statement, SEC Commissioner Greg Sankey said: "We have respect for each of our conference colleagues and look forward to our future collaborations. I believe we remain unified by our shared beliefs around the positive impact college sports has on the lives of student-athletes throughout our communities."

As for the Big 12, its future is murky at best as the eight remaining members plot their next moves and try to work out a divorce from the Longhorns and Sooners. The realignment of Texas and Oklahoma

could lead the Power Five to shrink to four.

"We want and need the Big 12 to do well," Phillips said. "The Big 12 matters in college athletics."

But it will not be part of the alliance.

The alliance also is being formed as the NCAA shakes off a Supreme Court loss and considers handing off more responsibility to conferences and schools to run college sports. The NCAA Board of Governors has called a special constitutional convention in November, the first step toward what could be sweeping reform and a decentralized governance model.

"We did the alliance to protect the collegiate model," said Kliavkoff, who is only in his second month on the job of leading the Pac-12 after serving as president of sports and entertainment for MGM Resorts International in Las Vegas.

There is also a proposal to expand the College Football Playoff from four to 12 teams currently in the pipeline. The proposal was crafted by Sankey, Big 12 Commissioner Bob Bowlsby, Mountain West Commissioner Craig Thompson and Notre Dame athletic director Jack Swarbrick, and unveiled publicly in June.

Kliavkoff and Warren both said their conferences support playoff expansion, while Phillips said the ACC had not landed on a final

position.

The commissioners and university presidents are scheduled to meet in late September in Chicago to discuss what comes next for the expansion proposal.

"This is not a voting bloc," Kliavkoff said of the alliance in a brief interview with AP. "We've not committed to voting together on anything. We've committed to discuss all of these issues, and to try to come up with solutions that are in the best interest of long-term college athletics."

"I'd be surprised if we come to different conclusions with respect to how we think about CFP expansion, but it's not a voting bloc."

The scheduling piece could lead to numerous nonconference football games each season and multiple team events in basketball involving ACC, Big Ten and Pac-12 teams, potentially creating new and valuable television inventory.

But that could take time to come together, especially in football.

Nonconference football schedules are typically made years in advance and many schools already have mostly full slates in the coming seasons. The commissioners said they did not expect their schools to break contracts to accommodate new agreements within the alliance nor would they prohibit members from scheduling schools from other leagues.

# LSU to require vaccine, recent test to enter stadium

LSU has become the third Power 5 school to announce that it will require fans attending games who are 12 or older to provide proof of vaccination from COVID-19 or a recent negative test.

The university said the decision, announced Tuesday, came after consultation with Gov. John Bel Edwards, LSU President William F. Tate IV, LSU's Board of Supervisors, the Tiger Athletic Foundation and Athletic director Scott Woodward.

"While we are aware of the diverse perspectives across the nation regarding masks and vaccinations, we must take all reasonable measures to protect our campus and community," Tate said. "The current threat to our lives, our health, and to our medical systems due to COVID-19 is overburdening our hospitals, and we must do our part to stop the spread."

Last week, Oregon and Oregon State became the first Power Five schools to announce those restrictions for fans attending football games.

LSU's policy, the first such announced by a Southeastern Conference school, will be in effect when the Tigers play their home opener on Sept. 11 against McNeese State.

Specifically, it requires proof of at least one dose of a vaccine that has received full or emergency use approval from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, or a negative COVID-19 PCR test within 72 hours of arrival at the stadium.

Masks will be required for children ages 5 to 11 and encouraged

for younger children.

LSU has not yet decided whether older fans who meet vaccination or testing requirements for admission to Tiger Stadium will be required to wear masks at the 102,000-seat, outdoor venue. The university plans to release COVID-19 protocol updates for athletic events starting Friday on its sports website, lsusports.net.

The policy is subject to change as circumstances in Louisiana change during the season. As of Tuesday afternoon, 3,814 new COVID-19 cases were being reported in Louisiana, while 2,856 people in the state were hospitalized with the virus, according to the Louisiana Department of Health.

Those not fully vaccinated accounted for 80% of COVID-19 deaths from Aug. 5-11, the department said.

"Our football team has reached 99.1% vaccination, and we are incredibly proud of them for doing their part to protect their team and their community," Woodward said. "We are confident our fans will do the same."

At Auburn, defensive coordinator Derek Mason said he has tested positive for COVID-19, like head coach Bryan Harsin. Mason said in a Twitter post that he is fully vaccinated and has recovered. He is urging others to get the shots.

Harsin has declined to reveal whether he has been vaccinated. Mason says he has lost two family members to COVID-19 and that he has a daughter who is immunocompromised.

# Blaney takes lead on final restart, holds on to win Michigan

BROOKLYN, Mich. — Ryan Blaney needed a push to pass William Byron on Sunday.

Kyle Busch provided the boost.

With Busch's help, Blaney took the lead on the final restart, then bobbed and weaved his way around Michigan International Speedway to beat Byron by 0.077 seconds. It was the narrowest victory margin in a Cup race at this track since electronic scoring began.

"I wouldn't say we had the best car," Blaney said. "We got pretty good, to a point where I thought we could run fourth or fifth and it just worked out to where he could give us a push and it just worked out."

Blaney won for the second time this season and sixth overall, capping a big weekend for Team Penske, which won Saturday's IndyCar race in

suburban St. Louis and then this victory, not far from Roger Penske's Detroit roots. Ford also has won seven straight at Michigan.

This one was unexpected.

With no practice and no qualifying race on a speedway race organizers added resin to the top of the track, Blaney started third and quickly found himself off the pace of Hendrick Motorsports teammates Chase Elliott, Larson and Byron.

Instead, Blaney kept his cool in the heat as his crew fine-tuned the No. 12 Ford. Blaney took care of the rest, methodically working way toward the front.

But Elliott lost track position after stalling in the pits and two late yellows bunched the field together, suddenly putting Blaney in the top five.

When the top three cars took the outside lane on the final restart,

Blaney chose the inside lane next to Byron and in front of Busch.

His decision — and Busch's push — changed the complexion of the race.

"It was fun, kind of like a superspeedway race," Byron said. "Unfortunately, he ran the bottom. You can only block so many lanes and I tried to block the top and cost myself the lead."

Larson and Byron took turns over the final seven laps trying to give one another a shot to pass Blaney. Nothing worked.

"Just made a couple of bad moves, I guess," Larson said. "A little too impatient behind the No. 12 and allowed William to get by me and then I was hoping they would get racing and I could get side-drafting."

And Blaney sped across the finish line barely ahead of Byron.

"Really the push was the whole thing," Blaney

said. "So thanks, Kyle."

Blaney also ended Kevin Harvick's winning streak at Michigan at three. But the consolation prize wasn't bad — clinching the 15th spot in the 16-car playoff that begins in two weeks.

Elliott beat Larson to the finish line to win the first stage, and Busch took the second stage over Joe Gibbs Racing teammate Christopher Bell.

## On the outside

Austin Dillon heads into the regular-season finale in 17th place after finishing third in the first stage but his day ended with a nasty crash as the second stage ended.

Dillon was trying to move up from below the white line when the No. 3 Chevrolet appeared to make contact with Brad Keselowski, sending Dillon hard into the outside wall and briefly airborne in the front straightaway.

# Etienne out for season following foot injury

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — Travis Etienne was supposed to be a game-changer for the Jacksonville Jaguars this season.

He might not have had the same impact as rookie quarterback Trevor Lawrence, but Clemson's other offensive star and the Atlantic Coast Conference's all-time leading rusher looked like he would be a prominent figure — maybe even the go-to guy — in coach Urban Meyer's offense.

Matchup nightmare? Versatile weapon? Big-play threat? Etienne was expected to provide all those and more af-

ter Jacksonville chose him with the 25th overall pick in April's NFL draft.

Now, though, Meyer and the Jaguars will have to wait a year to see what Etienne can do in the NFL. The team placed the running back on injured reserve Tuesday, one day after he suffered a Lisfranc injury to his left foot. Etienne sprained his foot during Monday night's loss at New Orleans.

Tests revealed the extent of the injury Tuesday. He is expected to have surgery as soon as possible. He may have been able to return late in the year, but the Jaguars opted to take a cautious approach and

give him plenty of time to recover before the 2022 season.

Since Etienne landed on IR before 53-man rosters get set next Tuesday, he can not return this season.

Losing Etienne is a significant setback for the Jaguars, who planned to use him to create mismatches as a receiver in the slot and as a change-of-pace back.

Etienne tallied 4,952 yards in four seasons at Clemson. He also set ACC records for rushing touchdowns (70), total touchdowns (78) and points scored (468). He scored at least one touchdown in 46 of 55 career games, and the Jaguars were counting

on him to have similar success as a rookie.

He was essentially uncoverable out of the backfield in training camp and one of Lawrence's favorite targets near the goal line.

Etienne also had been part of a three-back rushing attack for Jacksonville, sharing carries with starter James Robinson and backup Carlos Hyde. But Etienne has more speed and elusiveness than either of the other two and would have played a major role.

Replacing Etienne won't be easy, if even possible. Jacksonville has no one on its roster with his skillset.

# Falcons sign Rosen to bolster QB roster

FLOWERYBRANCH, Ga. (AP) — Former Arizona Cardinals first-round pick Josh Rosen has signed with the Atlanta Falcons and will compete to open the season as the backup quarterback.

Rosen replaces AJ McCarron, who was placed on injured reserve on Tuesday. The Falcons said Sunday an MRI showed McCarron suffered an ACL injury to his right knee in Saturday night's 37-17 preseason loss to the Miami Dolphins.

Rosen, 24, was the No. 10 overall pick by Arizona in the 2018 (backslash)draft. Rosen lasted only one season with the Cardinals, starting 13 games in 2018 and throwing 11 touchdowns with 14 interceptions.

Rosen was traded to Miami, where he started three games in 2019, throwing five interceptions and one touchdown pass. He was waived by the San Francisco 49ers on Aug. 17 and also spent time with Tampa Bay, making the Falcons his fifth team in four seasons.

Rosen completed a combined 54.8 percent

of his passes for 2,845 yards with 12 touchdowns and 19 interceptions in his two seasons with Arizona and Miami.

McCarron shared time with rookie Feleipe Franks in the Falcons' first two preseason games. Starter Matt Ryan has not played.

The Falcons were off Tuesday. Rosen is expected to join practice on Wednesday and play in Sunday's final preseason game against Cleveland.

"Depending on who we sign, they'll be ready to go, depending on what we want to do," coach Arthur Smith said on Monday of plans for the quarterbacks against the Browns.

Smith said he could add another quarterback next week, when teams will be making their final roster cuts.

The Falcons on Tuesday also cut running back Javian Hawkins, outside linebacker Sha'reef Miller, defensive lineman Olive Sagapolu, wide receiver Austin Trammell and offensive lineman Willie Wright. The moves left the roster at 80 players.
