# Lewisburg swears in two for council

The Lewisburg City Council returned to full strength at Tuesday's work session.

Jack Cathey and Peggy Harwell were sworn in to fill the vacant 2nd and 3rd Ward seats.

The council voted, in a special called meeting on August 17, to appoint Cathey to the 2nd Ward seat vacated by the death of Councilman Artie Allen in June.

Cathey was unanimously approved by the three sitting councilmen after interviewing six residents of the ward who had submitted letters of interest in the position.

The council appointed Harwell to the 3rd Ward seat in a special called meeting immediately preceding Tuesday's work session.

Harwell is the widow of Councilman C.H. Harwell, who served in the seat until his death in July.

Both will serve the unexpired term for each seat, until the August, 2022, local election.

The second and final vote on an annexation request for a parcel adjoining city limits along Mooresville Highway at the I-65 exit will not appear on next Tuesday's agenda.

A bottleneck created in the Joyce Avenue area, where a 15 inch sewage line running west to the interstate feeds into an 11 inch line, causes overflow issues during heavy rains and has led to a moratorium on additional sewer taps along the route.

Projects already underway can continue but the

## Cornersville focuses on street issues

The Cornersville Mayor and Board of Aldermen moved forward on several traffic related issues at their monthly meeting last Thursday.

Aldermen moved closer to setting a new weight limit for town-administered streets, closing in on a 10,000 pound limit compared to the 4,000 pound limit initially adopted years ago.

Targeted at tractor trailers, the weight of which cause damage to the town's side streets, the higher weight limit,

unloaded, covers the majority of common private vehicles.

Delivery vehicles, school buses, emergency vehicles, and the like are not included under the weight guidelines, which only effect town roads, not state highways like Main Street.

The board discussed installation of speed humps on Tarpley Avenue to control speeding in the neighborhood. The majority of residents submitted a petition favoring the humps in order to control what has been a long-term complaint.

Considering the cost

of manufactured speed control humps, the board decided to proceed with asphalt humps in order to control costs, especially since at least one other neighborhood has requested installation as well, said Town Administrator Scotty Brock. An estimate for the manufactured speed humps came to \$6,700 for ten, compared to less than \$250 for a load of asphalt.

Cost control also figured into the board's decision to use concrete bollards, like those at town hall, to close off the gate area at the end of Tarpley as opposed to

constructing fencing to deter through traffic.

Cornersville is in line for substantial relief funds from the federal government, Brock told the board, but might not have any projects on which to spend them.

The town is in line for just under \$400,000 in relief funds, although pending final guidelines on how they can be used, those funds are targeted toward water and sewer projects and broadband expansion.

Brock said that he had asked about a variety of possible uses--police vehicles, fire trucks, roof

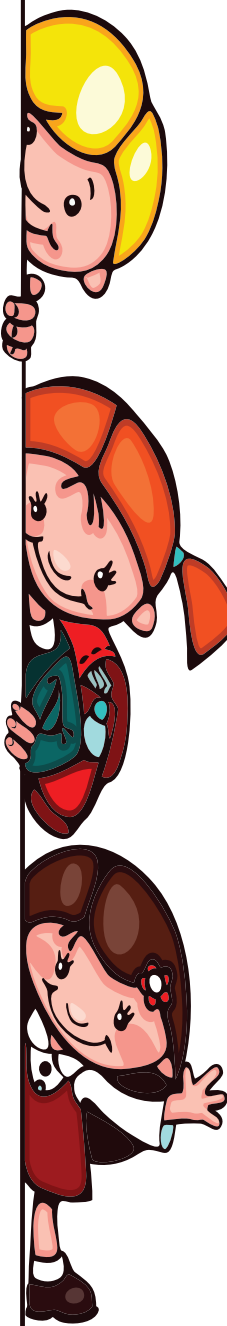

line must be expanded before other projects, like the proposed development, can be approved.

Approximately one mile of line would need to be replaced to repair the issue, at an estimated cost of \$1.7 million.

The city is hopeful that federal recovery and relief funds can be used to pay for the project, once final guidelines for spending those grants are released.

Lewisburg Water and

Wastewater Director Trigg Cathey said that preliminary steps are being taken to get the project ready and that once ground is broken, the state will relax the moratorium.

Councilman Joe Bradford asked about the possibility of traffic lights being installed at the intersections of West Ellington Parkway and Mooresville Highway and at South Ellington Parkway and Cornersville Road.

With both intersections on state highways, the mayor must make a request to the Tennessee Department of

Transportation to conduct a traffic study of each location.

Bingham said that he had already made a request that the intersection of Spring Place Road and South Ellington Parkway be assessed and would do the same for these additional intersections.

The ultimate decision on whether to install lights rests with TDOT.

Cathey asked for an update on the status of a dog park, for which the city received a grant almost three years ago.

City Manager Buck Beard said that the grant funds, \$25,000,

were still in reserve but that designs for the park, suggested by the grantor, came with an estimated cost between \$50,000 and \$60,000.

After the grant was awarded, the city experienced cash flow issues, forcing a temporary pause in capital spending.

The city will request an extension for the period to expend the grant funds.

The council agreed to consider moving the citizen comment period at council meetings from the end of the agenda to the beginning.

Councilman Jerry

Gordon introduced the idea following questions from a constituent, asking why the period came following any council votes instead of before.

Citizen's comments

have come at the end of the agenda for years. Cornersville also closes meetings with citizen comment. Chapel Hill agendas place the item at the start of meetings.

## Do you remember the rural purge of '71?

In mid-1971, I experienced a most distressing visit to the dentist.

A TV fan magazine in the waiting room divulged life-changing news. Irene Ryan (who portrayed Granny on “The Beverly Hillbillies”) told an interviewer she was madder than a wet hen -- because CBS had canceled the beloved sitcom after nine seasons!

TV historians regard this as part of the “rural purge” of the early 70s. “Petticoat Junction” and “The Jackie Gleason” show had disappeared a year earlier, and “Bonanza” and “Gunsmoke” would hang on until

1973 and 1975 respectively; but fall 1971 was the epicenter of a major upheaval in programming.

“Green Acres,” “Hee Haw,” “Lassie” and “Mayberry R.F.D.,” as well as variety shows hosted by Red Skelton, Lawrence Welk, Ed Sullivan, Johnny Cash, Jim Nabors and Andy Williams all got the network heave-ho.

Part of the change arose because networks were ceding the first half-hour of prime time to local affiliates. Veteran stars pricing themselves out of a job also played a part. But mostly, after two decades of indiscriminately pursuing the largest possible audience, the TV networks decided to cater to the most affluent demographic groups.

Yes, the programmers and Madison Avenue would tickle the fancy of trendy, malleable audiences, not the world-weary, tradition-bound consumers who recognized a snake-oil salesman when they saw one.

This emphasis on being edgy, hip and relevant to urban young adults spelled bad news for programs that attracted too many children, seniors and country folks.

I will grudgingly admit that this network disdain for kids, codgers and Cletuses – while producing only a handful of “city slicker” hits in the autumn of 1971 – would eventually make room for crowd-pleasers such as “M\*A\*S\*H,” “Maude,” “The Bob Newhart Show,” “Sanford and Son,” “Rhoda” and “Barney Miller.”

Still, as a former youngster, a current senior, a lifelong small-town resident and a father apologizing that all the DVDs chronicling the porcine misadventures of Arnold Ziffel have been exhausted, part of me resents the elitism of the bicoastal TV executives.

True, over the years they have occasionally tossed the hicks in “flyover country” a bone (“Dukes of Hazzard,” “Sheriff Lobo,” “Lonesome Dove,” etc.); but they’ve never really apologized for five decades of forgettable “sophisticated” shows that fizzled with critics and Nielsen ratings families alike.

Sure, I have enjoyed my share of risqué programs in recent years; but I still yearn for the corny values of TV seasons past, such as Red Skelton ending his show with “Good night and may God bless.” The snooty network execs who cringed at the Clampetts taking a dip in the “ce-ment pond” have no qualms about doing the backstroke in a cesspool.

Sure, the last half-century has produced an embarrassment of riches with upscale sitcoms and dramas; but I can’t help but think that a little dash of the bucolic life would make them even better.

All those police forensics shows could be trimmed to the length of TikTok videos if Opie Taylor would confess to having accidentally killed the victim with his slingshot.

Emmett’s Fix-It Shop could have had that “Lost” plane going in mere weeks.

Ever imagine Hooterville’s Mr. Haney peddling genuine imitation transplant organs on “Grey’s Anatomy”?

Oh, and what about Grandpa Jones turning the tables and asking, “Hey, Soup Nazi – what’s for supper?”

The possibilities are endless – if you don’t look down on half your audience.

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# Rockets ride strong defense to 5-AA win

CHAPEL HILL — After a disappointing loss to intra-county rival Cornersville last week, the Forrest Rockets opened up Region 5-AA play at the Murrey E. Holton Memorial Field in Chapel Hill where they gutted out a 13-7 win over Loretto.

“Loretto came in with a great game plan and we came out slow and sluggish in the first quarter,” Forrest coach Eli Stephenson said.

“We picked it up right before the half when we got a good drive going and mixed it up a little bit.”

The Rockets (2-1, 1-0) extended their winning streak over the Mustangs to five games, but Friday night’s win was the closest margin in the series.

The Forrest defense continued its fine play on the season as they allowed just 140 yards of total offense in the game with the only Loretto touchdown coming in the third quarter on a Carter Daniels 30-yard touchdown pass to Jackson Traglia.

The Rockets put up 260 yards of total offense with 140 coming in the ground game led by Tayton Swift, who rushed for 61 yards on seven carries, including a

23-yard touchdown run in the third quarter that gave Forrest a 13-0 lead.

Brenton Burchell carried the rock eight times for 53 yards and Chris Davis had 10 touches for 35 yards and a one-yard touchdown run that opened the scoring in the first quarter.

Liam Bell had 14 yards on five carries and McCalister Wilson rushed twice for seven yards.

Quarterback Hunter Bennett turned in a solid effort behind center for the Rockets, rushing for 24 yards on five carries and the senior completed 6-of-9 passes for 68 yards.

The Rockets left four points off the board on a blocked extra point and a missed field goal, but did not turn the ball over in the turnover free game.

“That is one thing we

preach to them is the team with the less turnovers and fewer mistakes will win the game,” Stephenson said.

“We had some penalties, but we didn’t have any of those big 15-yarders, so our kids are really buying in to that concept.”

In the first six possessions of the game, Forrest had the missed field goal and punted twice and the Mustangs had to punt all three times with

Layne Strasser coming up with a big sack on the third possession.

After the Strasser sack, the Rockets marched 70 yards on 13 plays, capped off by Davis’ one-yard touchdown plunge with 1:40 remaining in the first half.

The extra point try was blocked and the Rockets took the six-point lead to halftime.

Loretto took the second half kickoff and started to move the ball, but a holding penalty set them back and they had to punt again.

Forrest added its final touchdown of the game and they only needed six plays to cash in with Swift finishing off the scoring drive with a 23-yard touchdown run.

“We came out firing in the third quarter and got a nice drive together and our kids began to out-physical them,” Stephenson said.

Gavin Grissom’s extra point boot was true and Forrest led 13-0 with 4:20 remaining in the third quarter.

Loretto bounced back, going on an eight-play scoring drive that was capped off on the Daniels touchdown pass.

The extra point was good and the Rockets’ lead was cut to six points with 1:09 left in the third quarter.

Cornersville began to crash through the Huntland defense and at the 10:53 mark of the second quarter Cason Warner banged over from the 5 for a touchdown, then scored a two-point conversion for an 8-0 lead.

A Hornet pass was intercepted by Calahan to put the Bulldogs in business at the Hornet 32-yard line with 7:03 left in the first half.

"I think we were a little nervous, a little rusty from not playing on Fayetteville's first drive, but we settled in and did our jobs," Johnson said. "We set the tone and once we put our foot on that gas, we didn't let up at all."

Antonio Marable led the way with 72 yards on three carries and two of the attempts were touchdown runs of 41 and 31 yards.

Fletcher Fields had 10 carries for 53 yards, Eli Bell had five touches for 45 yards while Cohen Grissom had six rushes for 39 yards and all three ran for touchdowns in the contest.

"Antonio was itching the whole first half... coach let me run the ball, let me run the ball...I said just wait, we are going to have fresh legs," Johnson said. "Grissom was running hard, he had the big truck in the end zone and Bell and Fletcher ran the ball really hard tonight, so I can't ask more from those guys."

Ryan Hill completed one pass for 35 yards, but it was big one and probably the one play that changed the game and gave FMS all the momentum they needed.

The Forrest defense would have none of it as they bowed up and stopped the Tigers on a fourth down play at the FMS 31-yard line with 2:25 remaining in the third quarter.

Fields picked up a first down on an end-around and 15 more yards were tacked on via a Fayetteville personal foul on the Fields tackle.

Marable took the next snap from Hill and busted up the middle, breaking tackle after tackle before running in the clear for a touchdown and Marable added the two-point conversion run to make it a 30-0 contest with 27 seconds remaining in the third quarter.

The FMS defense made one final stand with another three-and-out before Marable put the icing on the road trip cake as he scored again, this time taking a pitch and outrunning the Fayetteville defense for his second touchdown of the game and the 38-0 final score.

The win put FMS one Duck River Valley Conference win away from a spot in the title game.

FMS (3-0) can clinch the spot in the DRVC title game with a win at Cascade this week.

The Rockets return home for a middle school homecoming non-conference game versus Cannon County on September 16 and finish up the regular season slate when the host the Community Vikings (DRVC) on September 23.

"We are on to the next one after tonight, our focus is on Cascade, we will focus on those other two when we get to it, but we are ready to work and we are ready

to get after it," Johnson said.

If the Rockets win versus Cascade and Community, FMS will host the conference title game.

"That would be awesome, I know the crowd would be huge, the fans were big here tonight in Fayetteville with their support, so I would love to have the championship game at home for sure," Johnson said.

# Georgia jumps to No. 2 behind Tide

Georgia jumped three spots to No. 2 behind Alabama in The Associated Press Top 25 released Tuesday, giving the Southeastern Conference the top two teams in the country for the 30th time in the 85-year history of the college football poll.

It is the second time in the last three seasons and the third in the last five that the SEC is sitting 1-2 in the AP Top 25, which is presented by Regions Bank. Alabama and LSU had a four-week run as Nos. 1 and 2 in the 2019 season before they played each other.

The Crimson Tide strengthened its hold on No. 1 after it throttled Miami in the first full week of the regular season. Alabama received 59 first-place votes, up from the 47 it had in the preseason poll.

Georgia received four first-place votes after beating Clemson 10-3 in the opening weekend's biggest game.

Ohio State moved up to No. 3 and Oklahoma dropped two spots to No. 4. Texas A&M is fifth, giving the SEC three teams in the top five.

Clemson fell three spots to sixth, marking the first time the Tigers have been out of the top four since 2017. Clemson dropped as low as No. 7 that season before finishing fourth.

No. 7 Cincinnati and No. 8 Notre Dame moved up one spot each. Iowa State dropped two places to No. 9, one spot ahead of No. 10 Iowa, heading into their rivalry game on Saturday.

## Poll points

Alabama and Georgia finished 1-2 in the Top 25 in 2017, when the Tide beat the Bulldogs in overtime in the an all-SEC College Football Playoff game. Alabama and Georgia also spent two weeks in that regular season at Nos. 1-2.

One conference has held the top two spots 76 times since the AP poll started in 1936, none more than the SEC. The now-defunct Big Eight is next with 23.

## In

— No. 16 UCLA is ranked for the first time since a brief stay at No. 25 in 2017, Jim Mora's last season as coach of the Bruins. It has been a slow climb back for UCLA under Chip Kelly, but a 2-0 start and a 38-27 victory against LSU pushed the Bruins into the rankings. LSU dropped out of the rankings from No. 16.

- No. 19 Virginia Tech moved into the rankings after beating Atlantic Coast Conference rival North Carolina. This is the sixth straight season the Hokies have been ranked for at least one week, though Virginia Tech has not finished in the Top 25 since 2017. The Tar Heels fell 14 spots to No. 24.

- No. 20 Mississippi was not far outside of the rankings to start the season and earned their first poll appearance since early in the 2016 season by beating Louisville.

- No. 25 Auburn grabbed the final spot and has now been ranked for at least one week in nine straight seasons.

## Out

Eight Top 25 teams lost over the holiday weekend, though five were beaten by another ranked team.

— Indiana, ranked in the preseason for the first time since 1969, is unranked after getting blown out at Iowa.

— Washington dropped out after a 13-7 loss to FCS power Montana. The Huskies became just the fifth ranked team to lose to an FCS team in the history of the AP Top 25.

— Louisiana-Lafayette received its first preseason ranking in school history, but dropped out after losing decisively at Texas.

# Even with blowout win, Vols have plenty to work on

It's hard to knock a 38-6 victory, but even with the blowout victory in Josh Heupel's debut as head coach for the Volunteers, there's still plenty Tennessee has to work on in order to remain competitive throughout the remainder of the 2021 schedule.

There was plenty of preseason talk about the type offense Heupel wants to run with this Tennessee team and fans were delighted to see Joe Milton orchestrate a warp-speed offense in the first quarter.

After forcing a three and out on the Falcons' first drive, Tennessee orchestrated a 66-yard scoring drive that spanned just 2:59 before Milton capped the drive with a four-yard touchdown run.

Another defensive stand on the following Bowling Green drive set up another light-speed drive by the Tennessee offense, this time spanning just 2:01 of game clock before Jabari Small burst into the end zone for a one-yard score.

But after the first two drives, the Tennessee offense was sidelined for the majority of the second quarter as Bowling Green played keep away with a clock control game that allowed the Falcons to cut the Tennessee lead to eight points by halftime.

Nate Needham drilled a pair of field goals in the second quarter from 46 and 50 yards to pull within one score.

After the half, however, Tennessee's athleticism just took over the game and the Volunteers were able to tack on three more touchdowns and a field goal.

Milton added a one-yard touchdown run to start the third quarter and Tiyon Evans added a 19-yard scamper with 7:51 left in the frame.

Milton went to the air and connected with Cedric Tillman for a final touchdown on a 40-yard strike in the closing minutes of the game.

Chase McGrath added a 43-yard field goal as well.

With Heupel wanting to instill a break-neck speed offense, fans were delighted to see flashes of what the team is capable of, but never with any regularity or consistency in the pass game.

Out of the backfield, the Vols looked as good as they have in years, with Evans and Small both rushing for 116 yards.

Milton added 44 yards on 14 carries as well.

Where the offense showed inconsistency was with Milton in the pass game.

In several instances, Milton struggled to connect with his targets downfield.

He managed just 11-of-23 pass attempts for 140 yards.

Whether the lack of production in the pass game was a reflection on Milton's limitations or just Heupel wanting to not showcase as much of the playbook as possible remains to be seen.

In total, the Vols racked up 471 offensive yards, with just 145 coming through the air.

Defensively, Tennessee allowed just 219 total yards to the Falcons and limited Bowling Green to just 32 yards on the ground.

Tennessee's longest scoring drive of the night took up just 3:28 of game clock, which ended on McGrath's 43-yard field goal in the third quarter.

The Vols had three additional scoring drives that took less than two minutes each, with a fourth clocking in at 2:01.

Tennessee will get a truer litmus test in Week 2 against the Pittsburgh Panthers.

Kickoff against Pitt will be at 11 a.m. Saturday in Neyland Stadium.

# Alabama transfers making early impact

Alabama answered the question of what to get a team that has everything.

A speedy wide receiver and a new middle linebacker and defensive playcaller are welcome gifts for any football team.

The top-ranked Crimson Tide's offseason transfer pickups, receiver Jameson Williams and linebacker Henry To'oTo'o, have already given Alabama fans a glimpse of what they hope to expect through the season.

The Ohio State transfer Williams had a 94-yard touchdown catch in the opening 44-13 win over Miami and ex-Tennessee starter To'oTo'o (TOE-oh-TOE-oh) made seven tackles.

It's no wonder Alabama defensive back Brian Branch is much happier having Williams as a teammate than preparing to face him in the national championship game against the Buckeyes.

"It was very tough," Branch said. "I was watching film of him every night."

Williams and To'oTo'o make their Bryant-Denny Stadium debuts for Alabama Saturday against Mercer. But they've already made a

splash as instant starters.

It's no easy feat at a program loaded with other top recruits. But a team that was already defending national champs and a favorite to win again filled a couple of potential voids.

Williams gave the Tide an experienced receiver along with John Metchie III. He helped fill the hole left by two first-round NFL draft picks, Heisman Trophy winner DeVonta Smith and Jaylen Waddle, in a mostly young group.

Williams had four catches for 126 yards, most of it coming on the 94-yarder from Bryce Young that tied for the second longest touchdown pass in Alabama's history. He did it with Smith, Waddle and Henry Ruggs III — all first-round receivers — on the sidelines.

"The guys who were on the sideline, we talked during the game, before the game, just chopping it up," Williams said Tuesday. "I feel like I am part of those guys. I was a part of those guys when I committed to Alabama out of the transfer portal. Once you're Bama family, you're family."

But in January, Williams was preparing to face the Tide in the national championship game. He had just one

catch for 14 yards.

Williams said he wasn't considering a move to Alabama in January when the two teams faced off, but the transition has gone smoothly.

While 'Bama was reloading at receiver, the Buckeyes were just plain loaded.

"I was real comfortable coming to Alabama. It's a great environment," said Williams, who had 15 catches for 266 yards in two seasons at Ohio State. "I love the environment and everything."

"I feel like I fit in well with my mindset and these guys' mindset, playing with my brothers. I feel real comfortable."

He said Alabama was his second choice coming out of high school.

For To'oTo'o, two schools were ahead of the Tide. He wound up starting in each of his two years at Tennessee.

His arrival allowed Tide star Christian Harris to play his more natural position while To'oTo'o took over play-calling duties as the Mike linebacker. He had seven tackles in his Alabama debut.

But in some ways, it was a delicate balancing act coming in as the newcomer, albeit an experienced one.

"You come in here

with a group, a team that's been together and you're the new guy, so I didn't really come in with the mindset to be the defensive caller, to be the signal-caller," To'oTo'o said.

"I wanted to be that guy that they could trust, that they could call at night, in the morning, whenever they needed me. So that was kind of my approach, to be able to just build relationships with the guys so that it could translate on the field."

He entered the transfer portal in January, two days after Tennessee fired coach Jeremy Pruitt. He chose Alabama, one of the Volunteers' biggest rivals, in May over Ohio State.

To'oTo'o said it wasn't a huge adjustment since Pruitt was a former Tide defensive coordinator and there were similarities in the systems.

Playing for Alabama coach Nick Saban was a big part of the allure.

"Who doesn't wanna play for Coach Saban?" To'oTo'o said. "And the culture, the guys around here, how they are so eager to win. It's just a blessing for me to be here."

And it's a boost for Alabama too.

# Big 12 quickly working to expand

The Big 12 survived college football's last significant conference realignment a decade ago because the league still had Texas and Oklahoma.

With the pending move of its only national championship winners to the Southeastern Conference creating another seismic shift, the Big 12 this time quickly moved into expansion mode. The league could add to its remaining eight members even before the Longhorns and Sooners are gone.

There will be no perfect replacements for Texas, the nation's richest athletic program, or Oklahoma, the six-time de-

fending conference champion that is still the only Big 12 team to make the four-team College Football Playoff. And as of now there won't be any other teams coming in from other Power Five leagues with the Longhorns and Sooners starting SEC play no later than the 2025 season.

Four potential candidates for Big 12 membership include a current top 10 team (No. 7 Cincinnati), a school with more than 70,000 students now far removed from a 13-0 season (Central Florida), an independent with a nationwide fan base (BYU) and a Texas school in the nation's fourth-largest city (Houston).

Oklahoma State coach Mike Gundy, who expects to

meet with his school leaders Wednesday, said he didn't know anything about any conversations between the league and those schools, or even the level of interest between them. But he did indicate that they were good candidates.

"People see BYU as a Power Five team. ... See that logo, they don't really know they're an independent, and think they're tied into a Power Five conference. Central Florida has 71,000 students and they're in a heck of a television market, and they have a heck of a recruiting base and they've played good football now," Gundy said. "Then you have Cincinnati, who has a big television market. There's a lot of people that live in that

part of the country. And that logo has grown in popularity in the last few years, and they're winning."

Houston has become more of an SEC market since former Big 12 member Texas A&M's debut in that league in 2012. There is also the proximity to the LSU campus in Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

But having a team there, roughly 165 miles east of the Texas campus in Austin, could help Big 12 teams in recruiting. University of Houston regents voted unanimously Tuesday to delegate authority to the school chancellor to pursue membership in the Big 12.

Longtime BYU athletic director Tom Holmoe, while not

commenting about the Big 12 possibility, has said his school's goal remains to be in position to play the country's best teams and athletes.

"When we were in the Mountain West Conference, we tried everything we could to play non-conference games and the really good teams in the conference. When we went independent, we expanded that quest, and we've continued to grow," Holmoe said before BYU's season-opening win over Arizona. "We're at a spot right now where we just keep trying to keep that quest alive."

The Big 12 already had a head start on vetting the current expansion candidates.



## Tennessee’s landscape changed with the interstate highway system

Most of us, I suspect, don’t think much about what life would have been like without the interstate highway system. But if it weren’t for the interstates, most of us wouldn’t live where we live and vacation the way we vacation.

The U.S. government began funding the interstate highway system in 1956. The idea was to make it easier to get from one part of the country to another in case of a national military emergency. Designed for speed and with limited access, American interstates

were modeled after a German superhighway called the autobahn.

The way the interstate system was paid for is a bit complicated and has changed over the years. Suffice it to say that its main funding mechanism was, and is, gas taxes.

The plan for the interstate system closely followed a U.S. government publication that became known as the “yellow book” (which you can still see on the Internet.) The “yellow book” laid out the general routes of the national interstate system and showed where superhighway corridors would be built in every

American city.

It took a long time for the interstates to be built. Bridges had to be constructed and routes cleared through mountainous areas such as the Cumberland Plateau. The first stretches of interstate through Tennessee were opened in 1958, with most of Interstates 40 and 65 through the state completed during the 1960s. The superhighways weren’t opened all at once, but one stretch at a time; for many years a driver had to get an updated road map to find out which stretches of new shiny interstate were opened.

Today there are more

than 1,100 miles of interstate highway in Tennessee. These highways have dramatically shrunk the time needed to travel from one part of the state to another. Prior to the creation of Interstate 40, for instance, it might have taken ten hours to drive from Nashville to Knoxville, through towns such as Lebanon, Sparta, Crossville, Rockwood and Kingston. Now it only takes about three.

Today the interstates make it possible to live in one county and work in another and have turned once-small towns such as Franklin, Faragut and Bartlett into bedroom suburbs. The freeways also made day trips across the state possible. Before the advent of interstate super-

highways, it is hard to imagine 100,000 people going all the way to Knoxville just for a Saturday afternoon event. Now this happens about half a dozen times every fall.

Interstates have also made travel by car much safer than it had been because they were wider and better designed.

Most people view the interstates as positive changes. But commercial activity in towns like Cookeville, Manchester, and Jackson has completely shifted from the town center to the nearest interstate exit. If you drive to these town squares today you can see definite signs that there used to be a lot more happening then than there is now.

Interstate construction has also proven to be very controversial in Tennessee’s cities. To this day, some members of the African-American community in Nashville say that the route chosen by Interstate 40, just west of town, split black Nashville in half. In Memphis, fans of the Overton Park organized against the construction of Interstate 40 through that park in the 1960s. Eventually this case went to the U.S. Supreme Court, which, in the case of Citizens to Preserve Overton Park v. Volpe ruled in favor of the group fighting Interstate 40. That’s why the interstate loops around Memphis, rather than going through it.

## Okra: A true southern beauty

### UT Gardens’ September 2021 Plant of the Month

Okra (*Abelmoschus esculentus*) is a summertime staple for many Tennessee farmers and home gardeners. Drive down any local country road in late June through early September and you will probably spot a long row of tall, green branching plants with palmate leaves, creamy yellow flowers and seed pods shaped like thick, pointy fingers, thriving in the blazing summer sunshine. Likely originating from modern day Ethiopia, this close relative of hibiscus and hollyhocks prefers hot weather, high humidity and a relatively long growing season, which makes it a perfect fit for our summertime climate.

The seeds can be sown directly in a prepared garden bed once all danger of frost has passed and the soil temperature has reached 65 degrees F or more. This warm-season annual can also be transplanted after starting indoors, just be sure to hold off on planting out until the air and soil are warm enough. Lean, dry soil conditions may be tolerated once plants are established, but providing a moist, well-drained, fertile growing medium will lead to a bigger harvest. Provide 6-8 hours of direct sunlight and good air circulation to ensure healthy growth and to help prevent powdery mildew, which is a common late season affliction.

Although delicious fried, roasted, grilled, sautéed or pickled, the tender pods are also delicious raw, with hummus or other dip, and sliced in salads. To catch the pods before they become tough, check often and harvest them young. The exact size will vary depending on the variety, but they are generally best harvested when they are between 2-4 inches long. If they have become too mature, the seeds can be cooked like peas.

During harvest season, it’s best to pick every other day because allowing the pods to mature on the plant will slow production. The plants can also be cut back midsummer to between 6-12 inches and side dressed with an all-purpose, balanced fertilizer to rejuvenate them for an extended harvest through fall.

Once you have had your fill of eating okra from these high-yielding plants, allow some pods to mature and dry completely on the plant to use as an art supply for elegant and seasonal decorations or cute crafts for your kids. Imagine them as Santa Claus, an angel, a gnome or an accent for wreaths, or other creative decorations. The flowers are also attractive enough to be grown solely for their ornamental value. Varieties like the All-America Selections winner ‘Candle Fire’ can add beauty and interest to the garden with red stems that can reach to between 4-6 feet tall with abundant seed pods that are also an enticing red color. Although these cylindrical pods with smooth sides take longer than other varieties to become tough, they are best harvested at about 3-4 inches long and with a diameter of about half an inch. This year Candle Fire is on display at both the UT Gardens, Jackson, and the UT Gardens, Knoxville.

‘Jambalaya’ is a choice selection for the culinary garden due to disease resistance, a stocky growth habit and tender green spineless pods. The pods begin appearing a week or so earlier than other varieties at the Helping Hands Kitchen Garden at the UT Gardens, Knoxville. Compact cultivars suited for smaller spaces or raised beds are also available.
