

Crowded election year for the county

2022 will be a busy election year for Marshall County with the county general election, as well as a host of municipal, state, and federal seats up for grabs.

Voters will have two opportunities in the fall to choose their representatives in government at all levels.

The August 4 ballot will feature state and federal primaries as well as the county general election and municipal elections for Lewisburg and Chapel Hill.

The final day to register to vote in August will be July 5. Early voting will take place between Friday, July 15, and Saturday, July 30.

All county offices, other than property assessor, will

appear on the August ballot.

Seven of the nine commission districts are contested, with crowded races in several of them for the two seats.

Only in District 1 and District 2 are incumbents Dean Delk and Craig Blackwell and Debbie Hill and Joseph Warner, respectively, not facing challengers.

District 3 boasts six candidates vying for the two commission seats. Incumbents Anna Childress and Tony Nichols are contending with former Commissioner R.L. Williams, and Shawn Hawkins, John McCullough, and Anthony Parker.

For District 4, incumbents Mickey King and Roger Murphree are challenged by Curtis Denton and Ken Lee.

District 5 will see a new commissioner with Tony Bey-



er running as the sole incumbent against Terry Dunnivant and Mary Cedeno.

Incumbents Sheldon Davis and Cannon Allen are joined in the District 6 race by Toby Adams and Shaun Arndt.

Seth Warf and Keith Hollingsworth are the incumbents for District 7, with Danny Morgan challenging for a seat.

District 8 voters will choose

between incumbent Jeff Poarch, Commissioner Lynn Stocstill, who currently represents District 5 but will have moved into the new district by the election, and James Hopkins and Joey King.

District 9 will also have a new representative. Incumbent Glen White is running along with Nathan Johnson III, Andy Reed, and Walt Redding for the two seats.

In the county-wide races, two incumbents face challenges.

Curtis Johnson is contesting Marshall County Trustee Scottie Poarch for his seat, and incumbent Register of Deeds Dorris Wayne Weaver faces Joey Young and Roger Russell.

Marshall County Mayor Mike Keny, Sheriff Billy Lamb, Superintendent of

Roads Jerry Williams, Circuit Court Clerk Mike Wiles, and County Clerk Daphne Girts are all unopposed for reelection.

None of the judicial elections on the ballot are contested. Incumbents Barbara Medley, as Lewisburg City Judge, Lee Bussart, as Marshall County General Sessions and Juvenile Court Judge, and Forest Durard and Wyatt Burk, as 17th District Circuit Court Judges, will all return. Also unopposed for reelection are 17th District Chancellor J.B. Cox, 17th District Public Defender Donna Hargrove, and 17th District District Attorney Robert Carter.

Lewisburg voters will go to the polls to elect the mayor and three councilmen for the next four years, all in contested races.

Mark Tolley, the speaker for the morning, who is the past president of the Tennessee Ancient Sites Conservancy, Inc. The Tennessee Ancient Sites Conservancy was founded in 2001 to protect and educate about prehistoric and Native American sites in Tennessee. The organization's objectives include educating the public about Tennessee's early cultural history with emphasis on Native American and prehistoric sites; protecting and physically caring for important Native American sites in Tennessee; and sponsoring preservation efforts to protect and physically care for such important ancient historical sites. It has been long believed

that the earliest Native Americans known as the Clovis culture during the Paleoindian Period (12,000-10,000 BC) migrated to North America from Asia by crossing the Bering Land Bridge; however, recent archeological studies indicate that these early people may have actually first migrated here from Europe.

The first inhabitants of Middle Tennessee belonged to a race of people called Mound Builders, because of the mounds or monuments they erected and left behind. Mr. Tolley stated that Tennessee may have more burial mounds than anywhere else in the country. We know that at least 800-1000 years ago, many Native American villages existed in what is now Williamson and Davidson Counties be-

cause many burial sites have been uncovered and moved to accommodate both industrial and residential buildings. Many large corporations have archeologists on staff; however, they are not required to dig deeply before building. Fifty years ago, huge bones were unearthed near a building site in Williamson County. Genetic testing revealed the bones to be those of a 14,000-year-old mastodon. Marks on the bones indicated that the animal had been butchered for food.

Mr. Tolley also shared information about sites in Middle Tennessee that have been preserved and are open to the public: Mound Bottom in Cheatham County; Old Stone Fort Archeological Park in Franklin County; and Pinson Mounds just

to name a few. Hunting for "arrow heads" or "points" is a popular hobby for many people. These Native American artifacts are recognized as "bird" points, "hunting" points, or "war" points among others, depending on their size. Lewisburg resident Patty Clark was digging holes to plant grape vines when she unearthed a perfectly preserved "dovetail" point. Mr. Tolley estimates that it is 8,000-9,000 years old!

The April meeting is normally the final meeting of the year for the study club; however, because the January meeting was postponed due to Covid, it is rescheduled for May at the Marshall County Memorial Library. Author Peggy Peden will be the guest speaker.

Incumbent Mayor Jim Bingham is being challenged by Councilman Joe Bradford for the position.

Incumbent Jerry Gordon in Ward 4 is being challenged by Tommy Burns. Jack Cathey, in Ward 2, and Peggy Harwell, in Ward

3, face challenges for their seats from Vickie Michael and Harry Lee Gordon Jr., respectively. Both Cathey and Harwell were appointed to the city council to fill remaining vacancies.

Chapel Hill will see one new alderman after August. Incumbents Dale Brown and Jonathan Gilbert are joined by Benjamin Piper Sr. in the race for the three open seats.

Brian Williams chose not to run for reelection.

Mike Faulkenberry is unopposed to continue as Chapel Hill mayor.

Cornersville will have seats on the board of aldermen up for election as well, although those will be on the November ballot and the field is not yet set.

Only one of three seats on the Marshall County School Board is contested. Incumbent Kristen Gold is challenged by Terri Argo for the District 3 seat.

Julie Keny Cathey and Heidi McElhaney are unopposed for reelection from Districts 5 and 9, respectively.

Incumbent State Rep. Todd Warner will face two challengers in the Republican primary for the 92nd District in Matt Fitterer and Jeff Ford.

Both Fitterer and Ford serve currently as elected officials in Williamson County, part of which replaced the sec-

tions of Lincoln, Franklin, and Marion Counties in the district after this year's redistricting done by the legislature in response to the 2020 Census count.

Angela Hughes is unopposed in the Democratic primary for the 92nd District seat.

Marshall County will choose a new Congressional Rep. after moving from the 4th District to the newly redesigned 5th District. The primary field is expected to be large but is still in turmoil after the state GOP removed three candidates from the ballot, including one endorsed by former President Donald Trump.

Those races will be decided on November 8.

As always, and especially with redistricting this year, it is recommended that voters verify, if there is any doubt, their polling location and districts prior to election days.




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

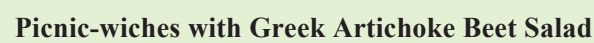

Williams perfect as Forrest routs Viqueens

CHAPEL HILL — Forrest junior pitcher Julie Williams was in the zone Tuesday night at the Field of Dreams in Chapel Hill as the junior tossed a perfect game in the circle, retiring all 15 Community batters she faced in the circle.

“At the beginning of the year, Julie was throwing great, but we feel like she lost it a little bit,” Forrest coach Shelby Lightfoot said. “Not tonight. I felt like she honed in and hit her spots well.

“When we are hitting our spots we can play well defensively behind her because we know where it’s going, so we thought she did a fabulous job of hitting her spots and going after batters and also going off pitches to make batters chase.”

The Lady Rockets’ offense responded in kind, banging out 14 hits in the 12-0 five-inning, run-rule win.

Carli Warner and Parker Wales led the onslaught with perfect 3-for-3 nights at the plate with Warner driving home two runs and scoring a pair of runs while Wales knocked in a run.

“Carli and Parker had a good night as far as hitting in the 5-6 hole. They hit them very hard,” Lightfoot said. “We call those fly balls pretty outs. You know you can hit that pretty ball but still be out, so finding a way to get those ugly hits with runners on was good. They worked really hard on that tonight.”

Leadoff hitter Macyn Kirby got on base every time she was up to bat with a single and a pair of bases on balls that turned in to three stolen bases and two runs scored.

“As far as our slappers, we just ask them to put on pressure,” Lightfoot said. “I think we have a pretty fast lineup all the way through. So as far as our speed, just getting on and putting on pressure at the top of the lineup and finding a way to score one or two every time they are up.”

Abby Ferguson also reached base all three times she was up, banging a run-scoring double and a single. Ferguson was also hit by a pitch, scored three runs, and stole a base.

Forrest’s lone senior on the defending Class 2A back-to-back state champions Addison Bunty went 2-for-3 with an RBI and a run scored.

Williams found the strike zone early in the contest, setting down the Viqueens 1-2-3 in the top of the first inning before her teammates staked her to a pair runs on an RBI single by Warner and a

fielder’s choice RBI by Jenna Goodman.

Community went down in order in the second inning and the Lady Rockets exploded for six runs in the home half of the frame, sending 10 batters to the plate.

Ferguson, Warren, Goodman, and Bunty all had RBIs in the inning and Burnham scored on a passed ball and Daugherty scooted to the plate on a wild pitch.

There was no scoring in the third inning and Williams coaxed three consecutive ground ball outs in the top of the fourth.

Forrest topped off the scoring with four runs in the bottom of the fourth inning and Williams went to the circle in the top of the fifth in search of perfection.

CHAPEL HILL — The Community Vikings struck the first blow but it was the Forrest Rockets that had the last laugh in a Distric 7-AA clash on Tuesday night.

The Viking scored in the top of the first inning, but the Rockets closed the game on an 8-1 run to take the 9-2 win over the Vikings.

“Proud of the way our guys played tonight. We stayed competitive all night, battled through some adversity and found a way to get the job and come out on top with a win,” Rocket coach Andy Burkett said.

Things got off to an inauspicious start for the Rockets in the top of the first inning as the Vikings were able to load the bases with the first three batters of the game on a pair of walks and a base hit.

The Vikings knocked in the game’s first run on a RBI single to right, but starting pitcher Brennan Mealer knuckled down with a strike out and the Rockets flashed the leather behind him and turned a double play to prevent a major inning by the Vikings.

The Rockets answered the early Viking score when Mealer scored on a passed ball to even the game at one run apiece.

Community again loaded the bases in the top of the third inning, with two outs, and it was Gage Underwood who was hit by a pitch to plate the second Viking run of the night.

Needing one out, Riley Durbin took over on the mound for Forrest and forced a fly out for the final out of the inning, once again ending the Community threat with the bases loaded.

Once again, Forrest answered, but with a five-spot in the bottom of the inning.

The Rockets put their first three batters of the inning on base with three-straight singles by Preston Gentry, Cam Vaughn and Durbin.

A hit batter with the bases loaded, a fielder’s choice and three RBI singles in the inning helped the Rockets break the game out to a 6-2 Rocket lead.

Durbin followed the third by sitting down six consecutive Viking batters.

It wasn’t until the sixth inning that Community put another runner on base and with a lead off walk by Drew Harris and a single by Gage Underwood, it was the Rocket defense again answering the call with a 4-6-3 double play and a Durbin strikeout to end the threat for Community.

Riding off the defensive energy that ended the Viking half inning, Forrest went back to work in the bottom of the inning.

Two walks and a hit batter loaded the bases before Durbin and Mealer connected on back-to-back singles to drive in three more runs for Forrest.

Mealer, Kason Fuller and Carter Walk all finished the game with two RBIs to their credit, while Durbin was the only Rocket to record multiple hits in the game.

On the mound, Mealer got the start and went 2 2/3 innings, allowing one earned run on three hits while striking out two.

With expansion on hold, College Football Playoff settles in

INGLEWOOD, Calif. — As college football tries to navigate unprecedented upheaval, the status quo holds with the College Football Playoff that crowns its national champion.

The playoff is likely to stick with the current four-team format through the end of its contract. It has no plans to engage players on name, image and likeness rights. And its leaders do not expect the Rose Bowl will be dislodged from its traditional early-afternoon time slot on New Year’s Day should expansion happen.

Bill Hancock, executive director of the CFP, said he does not believe major changes are coming any time soon after a proposal to expand to a 12-team playoff was abandoned in February.

“We knew it was a long shot to expand in this 12-year contract because everybody had a veto. But we thought we would take a look at it and make an effort. So now we’re going to be focused on a new format starting in ‘26-’27, whatever that may be. But in the meantime, we

have four more years of this, what’s really been a great event,” Hancock said at an event marking the countdown to the 2023 national championship game.

The plan introduced in June 2021 would have featured the six highest-ranked conference champions and six at-large teams chosen by a selection committee. But it quickly became clear getting the unanimous support needed to change the current contract would be difficult.

There were doubts if 12 teams was the right number, if Power Five conference champions should be guaranteed spots in the field, and if it made financial sense to expand without waiting for an open bidding process in a competitive landscape for broadcast and streaming rights, all against the backdrop of the July 2021 announcement that Texas and Oklahoma would leave the Big 12 to join the Southeastern Conference.

Hancock does not believe the decisions of the Longhorns and Sooners played a significant role in scuttling the proposal.

about that in the meetings of the commissioners. We all knew it happened, of course, but I can’t speculate about how important that was in the process,” Hancock said. “I will say this, I think, but for the pandemic, we would have an expanded field now. If we had been able to get this done in the summer of 2019, 2020, I think we’d have an expansion before the end of the contract.”

Realignment wasn’t the only shakeup to the sport. Another is the newfound ability of college players and high school recruits to profit on their visibility.

Given the increased number of players choosing to sit out bowl games to avoid injury ahead of the NFL draft, the prospect of organizers paying players to ensure participation has been floated as a potential avenue to protect ticket sales, sponsorships and ratings.

Hancock said the CFP will not pursue that route.

“There was some talk at bowls about it, but none of it came to fruition,” he said. “I think the jury’s out. Jury’s out on everything about NIL.”

As for the Granddaddy of Them All, its hold on a prime viewing window on Jan. 1 would not have been changed by expansion.

“We didn’t really get that far, but the working group proposal was for every bowl to have two quarterfinals and then a semifinal, so you have a three-year cycle. And I thought that one made a lot of sense,” Hancock said. “But we didn’t get far enough to be talking turkey with any bowls or conferences about the actual format.”

The Rose Bowl provided the CFP and its predecessor, the Bowl Championship Series, with several memorable games, including Vince Young’s legendary performance to lead Texas over Southern California in 2006, Jameis Winston’s last-second touchdown pass to give Florida State a title in 2014, and Georgia’s thrilling double-overtime win over Oklahoma in a 2018 CFP semifinal.

Hancock hopes for more of the same at SoFi Stadium next year.

“Postseason football started in LA,” Hancock said. “And here we are, kind of full circle, so we’re delighted to be here.”

Titans confident they can compete with AFC’s best

The Tennessee Titans have noticed the influx of talent from the NFC into the AFC. After posting the conference’s best record to earn the No. 1 seed last season with a string of six straight winning seasons, they like what they have.

The Titans started their offseason program Monday, and All-Pro safety Kevin Byard said adding talent to win championships is more prevalent in basketball.

“In football, you can’t really buy championships like that,” Byard said. “You have to have the foundation first. Then you bring pieces into that foundation. And then that’s when you talk about winning championships. So we have the foundation.”

The Titans tried to add pieces themselves last year. The biggest move was a trade for seven-time Pro Bowl wide receiver Julio Jones, and that didn’t work out with the Titans releasing Jones in March. That’s why they traded for receiver Robert Woods last month, trying to find someone to pair with A.J. Brown.

Center Ben Jones, who signed his own extension to stick with the Titans in March, said he thinks Tennessee did a good job of adding talent too. He says the Titans are building something special over the past four seasons with AP NFL Coach of the Year Mike Vrabel.

“We don’t need just one year to go and get talent,” Jones said. “It’s a process you have to trust the guys who they put in the room. You’re here for a reason. ... You just don’t need one player to win a championship. It takes a team to win a championship.”

Tennessee also signed two-time Pro Bowl tight end Austin Hooper after he was released by Cleveland. Hooper has been busy learning his way around the Titans’ headquarters, which has gone through a major expansion and renovation over the past two years. He’s also using Google maps to find his way around Nashville.

One thing he’s noticed quickly is how close-knit the Titans are.

“That’s not something that shows up on the stat sheet, but that’s something that really matters.”

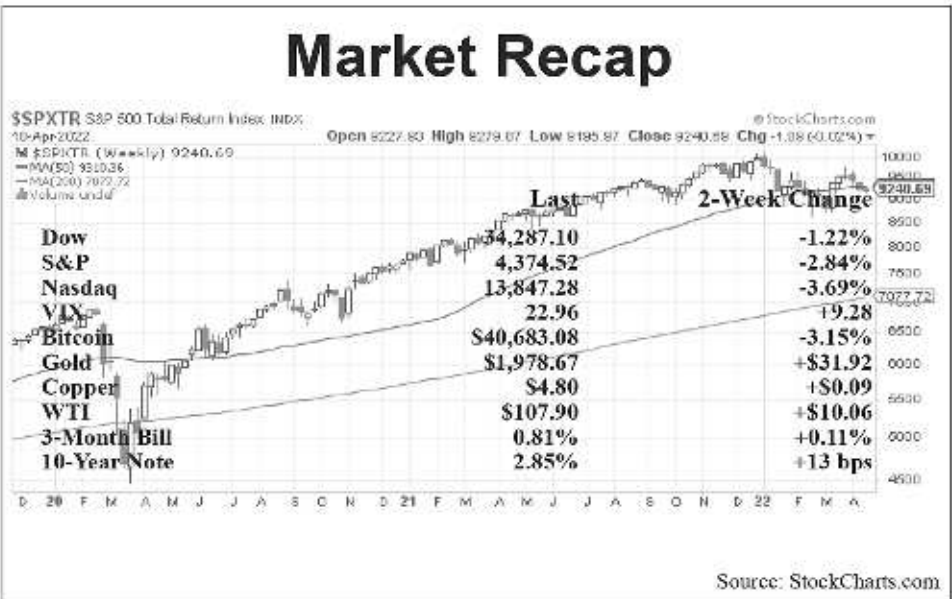

Padres 1st MLB team to reach uniform ad deal

NEW YORK — There will be a new pitch on Major League Baseball fields next season.

The San Diego Padres became the first team to announce a deal for ads on their uniforms, saying Tuesday that patches with a Motorola logo will be worn on the sleeves of their jerseys.

The March 10 memorandum of understanding for a new collective bargaining agreement between MLB and the players' association gave the 30 teams the right to sell patch ads on uniforms and sticker ads on helmets. The sides adopted an Aug. 6, 2021, proposal by MLB to amend a section of the Official Baseball Rules which states: "No part of the uniform shall include patches or designs relating to commercial advertisement."

MLB's proposal read: "Notwithstanding the foregoing or anything else in these rules, a club may license to third-party commercial sponsors the right to place their name, logos and/or marks on the uniform, provided that the patch or design is approved in advance by the Office of the Commissioner after consultation with the players' association."

MLB decided to launch the uniform ads with the 2023 season and says it may start the helmet ads with this year's postseason.

The Padres will have the ads on the right sleeves of left-handed hitters and pitchers, and the left sleeves of righties — so as to face cameras more often.

"Motorola's iconic logo on our jersey is a perfect alignment with our Padres brand," Padres CEO Erik Greupner said in a statement Tuesday.

MLB and the union agreed that player commercial deals in place as of the start of the 2022 season cannot be challenged by the league or its teams.

Baseball has had ads in the past for special events. For the opening series in Tokyo, the New York Mets and Chicago Cubs wore sleeve patch-

es in 2000 for the insurance company AIU and helmet decals for the am/pm convenience store chain, according to uni-watch.com. The New York Yankees and Tampa Bay Rays had sleeve ads and helmet decals for the Japanese electronics company Ricoh in 2004; the Oakland Athletics had Pepsi ads on their sleeves and the Boston Red Sox EMC in 2008, when Ricoh was on both teams helmets; the Seattle Mariners had Boeing on sleeves and Oakland Athletics had the social app company Gloops in 2012, when Gloops was on both sleeves; and Oakland had MGM Resorts on sleeves and Seattle had the petroleum company Eneos in 2019, when there were no helmet ads.

Eintracht Braunschweig, then in the Bundesliga, became the first German club with advertising in March 1973 under an agreement with Jägermeister.

Jersey ads in Britain's professional leagues started with Scotland's Hibernian during the 1977-78 season and Bukta, a sportswear company, and extended to English League fields when Liverpool reached an agreement with Hitachi ahead of the 1979-80 season.

Juventus began shirt advertising in Serie A under a deal with Ariston in 1979, and Real Madrid started in Spain's La Liga with Zanussi in 1982, according to footballpink.net.

Major League Soccer became the first of the major North American leagues to allow jersey ads in 2007. Real Salt Lake was the first to announce a deal, with the dietary supplement juice company XanGo.

Among other North American leagues, the NBA started selling sponsorship logos for the 2017-18 season. The NHL launched helmet ads for the 2020-21 season and began jersey advertising this season.

ters in a team environment, in team settings," Hooper said.

The Titans return 10 of 11 starters on defense with cornerback Jack-rabbit Jenkins, released in March to create salary cap space, the only starter not returning. Shane Bowen is going into his third straight season with the defense and second with the title of defensive coordinator.

Vrabel missed the start of the offseason program, but the Titans were expecting a team meeting Tuesday.

Among those not attending the start of the voluntary program

were quarterback Ryan Tannehill, who has not talked to reporters since the 19-16 divisional loss to Cincinnati in January, and Brown looking for a new contract going into the fourth and final year of his rookie deal.

General manager Jon Robinson has made clear that keeping Brown is a priority for the Titans, but the franchise has only about \$2 million in salary cap space until getting credit for releasing Jones on June 1.

"These things they all work themselves out, and obviously if you're talking about A.J., A.J. is one of the best receivers in the league and obviously Vrabel and Jon, they've talked about him being here," Byard said. "So I have no concerns about A.J."

D-II star emerges among small-school prospects

INDIANAPOLIS — Fayetteville State cornerback Joshua Williams recites the Kyle Dugger story as if he wrote the book.

He talks about how the late-blooming safety chose to play Division II football in small town North Carolina after receiving just three scholarship offers. And how Dugger went from being an overlooked prep recruit to a second-round draft pick in just a few years.

So as Williams watched Dugger's journey from less than 200 miles away in Fayetteville, North Carolina, the budding cornerback figured he would follow Dugger's lead. Next week, it could become a reality.

"He ended up in New England and is doing great things now," Williams said during the NFL's annual scouting combine in March. "He went to the Senior Bowl like me, he went to the combine like me, and I'm hoping maybe I can follow in his footsteps and showcase my talents the same way he did."

There are many similarities between Williams and Dugger.

Both have the long, lanky body frames scouts want in defensive backs, possess top-end speed, and needed to prove they could outplay the more familiar big-time college names.

Dugger convinced the Patriots he was good enough in 2020. Now, it's Williams' turn.

NFL.com gives the 6-foot-3, 197-pound Williams a grade of 6.18 — an above-average backup who may eventually become a starter — though it's unclear where that puts him in next week's draft.

Still, Williams has already achieved more than most people ever expected.

The son of a track coach, he grew up in Fayetteville, a military town where nearly 20% of residents live in poverty. Locals follow basketball more than football and while Williams certainly looks as if he might

have succeeded on the court, his dream always was to play in the NFL.

So after moving from receiver to defensive back as a high school senior, Williams went to a South Carolina prep school for one season before returning home.

It's a 10-minute drive from Fort Bragg Army Base to the Broncos' campus. The 5,000-seat Luther "Nick" Jeralds Stadium seems more suited to hosting a large high school game than college stars. But it was this turf that helped Williams emerge as a legitimate draft prospect and possibly the league's next big star from a historically Black college or university.

The list includes Hall of Famers such as the late Walter Payton of Jackson State, Jerry Rice of Mississippi Valley State, and Donnie Shell of South Carolina State, along with Super Bowl champs such as Ed "Too Tall" Jones of Tennessee State and Doug Williams of Grambling.

Last year, though, no players from HBCU schools were taken in the draft. The shut-out prompted league officials to put a higher emphasis on those players at the Senior Bowl and the HBCU All-Star game in New Orleans.

This year, four players made the combine cut: Williams, defensive backs Markquese Bell of Florida A&M and Decobie Durant of South Carolina State, and offensive lineman Ja'Tyre Carter of Southern. Each understands the long odds they overcame to reach this point and the even longer odds they face in trying to replicate the success of Indianapolis Colts linebacker and South Carolina State grad Darius Leonard, a three-time All-Pro.

"Me and Darius, we always talk," said Durant, a high school quarterback. "He talks about keeping your mindset and going in and having that dog mentality, no matter the school, no matter the size, no matter the speed. Everybody's always got something bad to say, so just overcome the critics."

Even after getting noticed

by the league's scouts, it hasn't been easy.

Durant traveled to the University of South Carolina for his pro day workout. Williams, who ran the 40-yard dash in 4.53 seconds at Indianapolis, then wound up at North Carolina State where he performed drills against the Wolfpack's top players. One of those, offensive tackle Ikem Ekwonu, is a top-five talent who some have discussed going No. 1 overall. Williams didn't flinch.

"I'm just appreciative they let me utilize their facilities," he said.

This year's list of small-school talent doesn't begin or end with the HBCU prospects.

Offensive lineman Trevor Penning of Northern Iowa and receiver Christian Watson of North Dakota State, two FCS schools, could be first-rounders. Tyler Smith of Tulsa and Cole Strange of Chattanooga, FCS offensive linemen, could go in Round 2.

Pierre Strong of South Dakota State, Adam Vinatieri's alma mater, impressed the league's decision-makers by completing the 40-yard dash in 4.37 seconds at the combine. He tied Isaih Pacheco of Rutgers for the fastest time among running backs.

Then there's Williams, who saw former college teammate Kion Smith sign with the Miami Dolphins as an undrafted rookie last year. Williams knows it could happen to him, too.

But after seeing Dugger's blueprint, Williams believes he will become the first Fayetteville State draftee since the New York Jets took running back James Godwin in Round 16 in 1976.

"I want to put my best foot forward coming from Division II, a smaller school, showing what I have to offer, that there's no knock against D-II football," he said. "I want to show everyone I'm just as talented, if not more talented, than these other guys."

Commanders deny financial impropriety

WASHINGTON — The NFL's Washington Commanders denied several allegations of financial impropriety in a letter sent Monday to the U.S. Federal Trade Commission.

The 19-page letter — including testimony, emails and other documents — came as a response to the U.S. House Committee on Oversight and Reform asking the FTC to look into the team's business practices. There are more than 80 pages of signed affidavits, emails and text message exchanges laid out as the team's evidence.

The committee last week told the FTC it found evidence of deceptive business practices over the span of more than a decade, including withholding ticket revenue from visiting teams and refundable deposits from fans. The NFL said it engaged Securities and Exchange Commission chair Mary Jo White "to review the most serious matters raised by the committee."

The letter, signed by Jordan W. Siev from the law firm Reed Smith, denies all of those allegations and takes aim at the motives and character of former team VP of sales and customer service Jason Friedman, whose testimony against the team framed the committee's recommendation.

Siev argues no financial investigation is warranted, saying the committee never requested information about the allegations made, which the Commanders believe would clear them of any wrongdoing.

"The committee did not request a single document from the team; the committee did not invite a single representative of the team to address the truth

of the matters contained in the committee's letter; and the committee did not pose questions to the team to answer in writing about its allegations, or provide any mechanism whatsoever for the team to address the truth of the allegations," the letter said. "Had the committee posed any of these questions or requests to the team, the team could — and would — easily and fully have rebutted each allegation."

Congress began looking into the team's workplace misconduct after the league did not release a report detailing the findings of an independent investigation into the matter, which led to a \$10 million fine but no other discipline. The committee said the NFL and the team "have taken steps to withhold key documents and information."

In response to the team's letter, the House Oversight Committee said Monday its focus was on the toxic workplace, which is why it passed documents and statements to the FTC about potential financial misconduct to see whether an additional investigation is warranted.

"The team has failed to fully address the issues raised in the committee's letter," the committee said in a statement. "If the team maintains that it has nothing to hide, it should welcome an independent review by the FTC, or the NFL."

Friedman testified before Congress saying the team had two separate financial books: one with underreported ticket revenue that went to the NFL and one with the full, complete picture. According to testimony, owner Dan Snyder was aware of the numbers shared with the league while also being privy to the actual data.

In the team's letter to the FTC, former director of finance Paul

Szczenski is quoted as saying, "I can state unequivocally that I never helped maintain, or saw anyone else maintain, a 'second set' of books." The team also cites declarations from former chief operating officer Mitch Gershman and former general counsel David Donovan, along with emails and other documents to refute allegations cited by the oversight committee.

The team called Friedman's accusations baseless, false and reckless and painted him as a disgruntled former employee. Lawyers Lisa Banks and Debra Katz, who represent Friedman, said in a statement to The Associated Press their client is prepared to defend himself publicly if Snyder allows him to do so, but in the meantime would communicate directly with the team about what they called "demonstrably false allegations."

"Mr. Friedman stands by his testimony, which was truthful and based on his experiences with the team," Banks and Katz said. "He is happy to answer follow-up questions from Congress, the FTC, or any government agency."

In a statement posted on social media, eight women who were former employees said the team started a "smear campaign" to ruin Friedman's career.

"We are hurt and disgusted at the clear attempt by the Snyders and the Washington Commanders staff to attack Jason and his character, while completely deflecting and distracting the public from the truth: that the Snyders built a franchise on corrupt and toxic behavior," said the statement, which was signed by Ana Nuñez, Brittany Pareti, Dominique Dupras, Emily Applegate, Megan Imbert, Melanie Coburn, Monica Elliott and Tiffani Johnston.
