## Two grand openings in one week

Last week saw the official openings of two important Marshall County projects which have both been in the works for years.

On Wednesday, local and state officials celebrated the opening of the new visitor center and restaurant at Henry Horton State Park.

The new restaurant features more than 6,000 square feet with options for indoor, outdoor, private, and lounge dining.

The visitors center features exhibits on the history and importance of the Duck River, funded by a \$350,000 grant from the Duck River Agency, conference and office space, and a new gift shop for the park.

Funding for the project was approved in 2016 under then-Governor Bill Haslam but only after an outcry from county leaders and residents to a report that originally suggested closure of some amenities at the park.

These two projects represent \$8.25 million in capital

improvements in the park.

Furthermore, these represent a Phase I of improvements with the conversion of the old restaurant building to conference space already out to bid and a complete renovation of the current lodge planned.

Thursday, the county celebrated the conclusion of a project which has been in the works even longer, the construction of a new county health department building.

"I'm sure there are many of us who never thought we'd get here," said Marshall County

Mayor Mike Keny.

The need for a replacement of the health department building was first raised roughly 14 years ago said Keny.

Various factors, including age, space, maintenance needs, and new technologies had combined to leave the Legion Avenue location a poor fit to serve the needs of a growing county.

About eight years ago, the discussion ramped up again but moved slowly as county leadership, architects, plans, and locations all changed

over the years and the pandemic further delayed construction.

The former Legion Avenue location served the county for 50 years, said Keny, and he expected the new location to serve the citizens of the county as long if not longer.

County Health Director Angie Faulkner thanked all of those who have helped make the project possible and said that her staff looked forward to serving the residents of the county for many years to come.

## Cornersville adjusts fire pay

The Cornersville Board of Mayor and Aldermen streamlined fire department pay and opened discussions on the town's liquor ordinance at last Thursday's monthly meeting.

The board approved simplifying the fire department pay structure from the current eight different categories of response to two differing categories. The volunteer fire fighters serving the town will now be paid \$25 for responding to structure fires and \$15 for other responses, monthly meetings, or training days.

Also approved was a \$500 bonus payment for each of the departments seven currently

active members.

Both measures will go into effect July 1 with the start of the 2022-23 fiscal year budget.

Aldermen scheduled a special called meeting for the end of June for the final vote on the proposed budget.

An amendment to the current budget was also approved to allow for additional American Recovery Plan funds from the federal government. Those funds, for which initial restrictions on use have been greatly relaxed, will be used for infrastructure projects around town, including a new roof and central unit for town hall, a new roof on the town park gazebo, and the fire department bonuses among other projects.

Aldermen also began a dis-

cussion on the town's current liquor by the drink ordinance for future considerations at the request of Town Administrator Taylor Brandon.

Voters approved liquor by the drink in a 2014 referendum although the resulting ordinance has been little, if ever, used.

Two issues which Brandon wanted the board to consider were the scope of and distance requirements contained in the ordinance.

As written, the ordinance focusses more on liquor stores than restaurants, due to the request which originally spurred the referendum.

Secondly, the requirement that, while such establishments

A swarm of bees created quite a buzz Friday morning. Vickie Hay, owner of Marshall County Title & Escrow, Inc., noticed a swarm of bees on the side of the building by her office. She immediately contacted Gene Parsons, owner of the building, and informed her of the "bee" problem. Gene knew just who to call. Derrick Crump, a 12 year beekeeper, came to the rescue!

Honey bees swarm if their hive becomes too crowded. When this occurs, they split into two groups; or, there is a lack of resources or perhaps some kind of disturbance. For whatever reason, these bees were looking for a new home.

The bees were flying in and out of a partition that's located in the brick wall. Derrick smoked the bees out and within a few minutes, the bees balled up on the wall again. Several were flying around erratically until he sprayed them with water mixed with sugar and essential oils which calmed them. Derrick then maneuvered them into the hive, using his bee brush.

The most important bee in a swarm is the queen and Derrick had to locate her. Without the queen, the hive's population would dwindle quickly. After looking over the bees, he finally found her. It's a bit tedious looking at hundreds of bees that look just alike. Several of the spectators, all women, asked how could he tell the queen from the other bees. Derrick hesitated, then said, "The queen has a bigger rear than the other bees." Of course, everyone laughed at that!

Derrick was more at ease after he placed the queen in the hive. He knew the remaining bees that were in the swarm on the wall would eventu-

would be restricted to commercially zoned areas, the requirement of a 50 foot distance between any establishment with a liquor license from parks, churches, or schools greatly narrows

the amount of available commercial spaces.

"Anywhere you go in town, you are going to be close to a school, church, or park," said Alderwoman Mary Johnson.

"I think it's unduly burdensome to have that many restrictions," Brandon said.

Specifically, as writ-

ten, the ordinance would preclude a restaurant able to serve alcohol in the former Spencers due to the close proximity of the town park, potentially stifling development in town.

The board began a discussion on such issues to continue at future meetings.

**Notice of Marshall County Election Office Location, Dates and Hours Open, Disabled & Elderly Voters with an Inaccessible Polling Place**

Notice is hereby given to any elderly voter or voter with a disability that if such voter's Polling Place is inaccessible, such voter has the right to vote early by absentee ballot or at the Marshall County Election Commission Office on Election Day. Such voter shall complete an affidavit at the Election Commission Office stating that such voter's designated voting location, to the best of the voter's knowledge, does not comply with the provisions of the Public Law 98-435 of the 98th Congress. The affidavit must be received by the Marshall County Election Commission Office by July 25, 2022.

As an alternative to voting at the Marshall County Election Commission Office on Election Day, an elderly voter or voter with a disability assigned to vote in a precinct where the polling place is inaccessible may vote by absentee ballot or during the Early Voting period. The last day a written request for an absentee ballot application may be received by the Marshall County Election Commission Office is July 28, 2022.

The last day to register to vote in order to be eligible to vote in the August 4, 2022 Election is Tuesday, July 5, 2022. Voter registrations postmarked by this date will be processed.

The Marshall County Election Commission is located at the Hardison Office Annex, 230 College Street, Suite 120, Lewisburg, TN 37091. The office is open 8 a.m. - 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. Office telephone is (931) 359-4894.

The Marshall County Election Commission office will be closed July 4, 2022 in observance of Independence Day.

"Thomas said unto Him, Lord, we know not where You are going; and how can we know the way? Jesus said unto him, I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by Me." - **John 14:5,6**

## Forrest's 'no-quit' mentality guides Rockets on state run

Nearly two weeks ago, the Forrest Rockets took off in what was a loaded Class 2A state tournament and even though Forrest was knocked out of the tournament with back-to-back losses to Pigeon Forge and White House Heritage, the comeback kids from Chapel Hill put forth an effort in the state tournament that was pretty representative of their season—they were never out of any game.

“I think I would sum it up to resilience and fight. They fought to the very end. We came from eight runs down against York to punch a ticket to the state tournament and we never looked back after that. The Riverside game was highly competitive. We knocked out the No. 1 pitcher in the state and we fought hard in extra innings against a very good White House Heritage team. I think that’s the definition of resilience and fight,” Rocket coach Andy Burkett said.

After locking up the regular season title and the No. 1 seed in the District 7-AA tournament, the Rockets posted three postseason come-from-behind victories, including the thrilling 10-9 win over York Institute in the Class 2A sectional.

It’s been an outstanding year for the Rockets, highlighted by a 12-game win-streak at one point and included a district and region title as well.

For Burkett, the special sauce for the Rockets to come together was the sheer chemistry of the team and players stepping up at key points in the season.

“I think for us the difference was just believing in each other and doing it for one another. We had a great team

filled with many talented players, but in addition to that, we had some great role guys step in and accomplish their respective jobs for their team,” he said.

“When you have a core group of players who are doing whatever it takes to win, you have something special in the mix. I was very proud of everything we accomplished this year.”

Having made the run to the state tournament with a veteran-laden team, Burkett says the experience gained by the returning underclassmen can’t be overvalued.

“My hope is that it keeps them hungry. They got a taste of it this year. Playing baseball in the month of May just means more, and I think they are beginning to understand that. We return a ton of talent for next year’s team. We know the coaching staff is going to be eager to get going with this new crop, but it’s going to be up to the players to

pick up that baton and continue to run with it,” Burkett said.

The 2022 run to the state tournament wasn’t uncharted waters for the Rockets, who played for a state championship in 2019.

This season did, however, mark the first 20-win season for Forrest since 2018.

“I think it means everything to us. It was our first 20-win season since 2018. It was our first regular season district title since 2017. It was our first district championship since 2017. It was our first Region championship since 2018. And it was our first sectional win and state tournament berth since 2019. I think these players laid the precedent and the expectation for what it means for Forrest baseball for this next group of players to come over the next several years,” Burkett said.

While the Rockets return plenty of talent for the 2023 season,

the state tournament run would never have been possible without its core senior class of Cam Vaughn, Kain Moses, Andrew Timmons, Braden Bowyer and Austin Lampley.

“I don’t think you ever really replace guys like Vaughn, Moses, Timmons, Bowyer, and Lampley. What they meant to our program is beyond significant,” Burkett said.

Each of the five seniors brought a different set of skills, from the reliable backstop play of and sky high on-base percentage as the Rockets leadoff batter, to the consistency in the field of Moses and Timmons, each of the seniors brought an invaluable amount of talent and reliability to the team.

“Vaughn was our table-setter and our energy from the time he arrived at Forrest his sophomore year. Moses has seen significant innings at both shortstop and on the mound since

he was a freshman,” Burkett said.

“Bowyer pitched some of the biggest innings all year and really became a huge source of power for our lineup. Timmons is one of the best defensive centerfielders and handlers of the bat that I’ve ever coached, and Lampley was huge on the mound for us picking up some huge innings for us all year. Those boys mean the world to me, and I think their impact will resonate with our future players for years to come.”

With the close of the 2022 season, now the onus falls on the returning players to put in the off-season work to defend their district and region titles, as well as make a push to the state tournament next season.

“We will host tryouts

for next year’s team a little later into June and then we will be done until September. We will begin offseason workouts and conditioning at that time. With our experience with the weight room from the football team, we look to get stronger as team both physically and mentally and begin our push toward success in 2023,” Burkett said.

Forrest closed the season as the District 7-AA and Region 4-AA champions, as well as a state sectional champion and state tournament qualifier.

The Rockets’ season included a state tournament opener win over Riverside, before the Rockets’ season came to a close with hard-fought losses to Pigeon Forge and White House Heritage.

## Titans using yellow jerseys to protect rehabbing players

NASHVILLE — Wide receiver Robert Woods ran over to the sideline to grab a yellow jersey he quickly pulled over his new Titans’ No. 2 jersey.

Tuesday wasn’t the first time he’s forgotten the jersey signaling his new Tennessee teammates to avoid contact during team and passing drills. He’s also not the only one wearing the no-contact jersey this offseason working back from injuries.

Cornerback Caleb Farley, Woods, wide receiver Racey McMath and cornerback Kristian Fulton all wore the

yellow jerseys Tuesday. For Farley, Tennessee’s first-round draft pick last year is just happy to be on the field again no matter what he has to wear after being one of 26 to land on injured reserve last season.

“It feels amazing,” Farley said Tuesday. “It’s truly a blessing, and I’m grateful every day I wake up.”

The yellow jerseys help the Titans get players still rehabilitating from injuries on the field safely.

Coach Mike Vrabel has made clear that the training staff monitor players closely with each having a different plan in their recovery. Teammates know the yellow

jerseys mean to avoid contact with someone working back from an injury to make sure those players are able to step up their rehab work on the field.

Tennessee benefited greatly in 2021 from the NFL allowing teams to recall an unlimited number of players from injured reserve, bringing 15 off injured reserve with Derrick Henry the last on Jan. 21. NFL teams will only be able to bring eight players off injured reserve this upcoming season.

That puts a premium on getting, and staying, as healthy as possible.

Farley was limited to three games as a rookie. First he

fought through a shoulder injury, then Farley tore his left ACL on Oct. 18 in the first start of his career. He wound up among 26 players placed on injured reserve in 2021 by the Titans, who finished the season using an NFL-record 91 players for a non-strike year.

Woods is a veteran going into his 10th season. But he tore his left ACL on Nov. 12 and is in Nashville after the Rams traded him to the Titans in March. Being on the field, even wearing the yellow jersey at times, allows him to become familiar with a new offense and new teammates while working on his recovery.

The veteran receiver is expected to be the Titans’ top wide receiver this season. Farley, the No. 22 selection overall last year, has a chance to earn the starting cornerback spot opposite Fulton. They’re helping push each other through rehab and talk a lot.

“Being able to just pick each other’s brains of why I do a certain release or what he prefers as a corner in press,” Woods said recently. “What’s the range, but like really just being able to get reps, being on the side and being off the field. But it goes hand in hand. I’m learning from him. He learned from me.”

Farley was considered possibly the top cornerback prospect in 2021 until a second back surgery in March dropped him to No. 22 where the Titans drafted him. That is not an issue anymore. Farley said he had forgotten all about his back issue until asked about it Tuesday.

The cornerback has no timetable for when he's fully cleared by the Titans, trusting the training staff and coaches to make the

right decision. When he is back on the field, Farley's goals remain unchanged.

"I want to win. I want to dominate," he said. "That's my mentality."

## Super regional matchups set for Friday

Matchups for the NCAA baseball super regionals were set Monday night after No. 2 national seed Stanford, No. 3 Oregon State, No. 8 East Carolina and eight other teams won regionals.

The best-of-three super regionals begin Friday and Saturday and will determine the field for the College World Series in Omaha, Nebraska, beginning June 17.

The matchups: Notre Dame (38-14) at No. 1 national seed Tennessee (56-7), Connecticut (49-14) at Stanford (45-15), Auburn (40-19) at Oregon State (47-16), Oklahoma (40-21) at No. 4 Virginia Tech (44-12), Louisville (41-19-1) at No. 5 Texas A&M (40-18), Texas (45-19) at East Carolina (45-19), Mississippi (35-22) at Southern Mississippi (47-17) and Arkansas (41-19) at North Carolina (42-20).

Stanford will play in a third straight super regional after coming from two runs down in the ninth inning to post a 4-3 walk-off win over Texas State. Drew Bowser and Tommy Troy hit back-to-back homers to tie it, and freshman pinch-hitter Trevor Haskins singled in the winning run.

Matthew Gretler hit a tiebreaking homer for Oregon State in the seventh inning, and No. 1 starter Cooper Hjerpe pitched the last two innings in his first relief appearance to secure a 7-6 victory over Vanderbilt.

"I felt good, and I told them if you need me, I'm ready," said Hjerpe, who was working on two days' rest after throwing 100 pitches over 6 2/3 innings Friday.

East Carolina's eight-run seventh inning broke open a 13-2 victory over Coastal Carolina.

Auburn won a regional on its home field for the first time since 1999, beating UCLA 11-4 in the completion of a game suspended Sunday night because of rain.

Cameron Masterman's tiebreaking homer in the eighth inning sent Louisville to an 11-9 victory over Michigan and into the super regionals for the seventh time since 2013.

Southern Mississippi is back in the super regionals for the first time since 2009 after taking the lead in the ninth on a sacrifice fly to beat LSU 8-7.

Tim Elko homered three times and Kemp Alderman hit a grand slam in Mississippi's 22-6 rout of Arizona.

Gage Gillian and Davis Palermo combined to pitch 5 1/3 innings of one-hit shutout relief to help send North Carolina to a third straight super regional with a 7-3 win over VCU.

## Tiger to miss US Open

Tiger Woods withdrew from the U.S. Open on Tuesday, saying that his damaged right leg needs more time to get stronger to contend in the majors.

Woods made a surprise return at the Masters, just 14 months after he broke bones in his right leg and ankle in a February 2021 car crash outside Los Angeles. He made the cut at Augusta National, then played the PGA Championship at Southern Hills.

Even though he made another cut, Woods was limping badly on Saturday and withdrew after the third round, the first time he had withdrawn on the weekend at a major.

Woods posted Tuesday on social media, "My body needs more time to get stronger for major championship golf."

He said he hopes to be ready to play in a charity pro-am event in Ireland ahead of the British Open at St. Andrews, where he won two of his three claret jugs.

This will be the sixth time in the last 12 years Woods does not play the U.S. Open, which he has won three times, most recently at Torrey Pines in 2008 when he had a double stress fracture in his left leg and shredded knee ligaments that required reconstructive surgery when the event was over.

He last played in 2020 at Winged Foot and missed the cut.

Before the previous two majors, Woods sent the internet buzzing, with private plane tracking sites indicating he was at Augusta National and Southern Hills a week or so early for a scouting trip, a clear sign he was thinking about playing.

There was no such flight to Boston this time. Woods last competed at The Country Club at Brookline in 1999, when he won his singles match against Andrew Coltart as part of an amazing American rally to win the Ryder Cup.

"We're disappointed we won't see him in Boston," said Mike Whan, the CEO of the USGA. "But personally, I'm happy for him that he's looking after his health. I'd rather see Tiger long-term than just in the 2022 U.S. Open."

# Fish and Wildlife Commission set hunting and trapping regulations

**NASHVILLE** — The Tennessee Fish and Wildlife Commissions have set the state's hunting and trapping seasons for 2022-23. The Commission established the regulations at its June 2-3 meeting held at the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency's Region II Ray Bell Building.

Complete hunting seasons dates and regulations will be available on the website ([www.twra.org](http://www.twra.org)), TWRA App, and in the printed 2022-23 Tennessee Hunting Guide, which will be mailed to Lifetime and Sportsman's license holders and available for free at TWRA license vendor locations in mid-July.

After hearing growing reports of decreasing turkey populations, the Commission voted to delay the statewide turkey season to improve reproduction and nesting success.

The bag limit will also be decreased from three birds to two birds, and only one bird can be a juvenile or jake.

Statewide, 2022 spring turkey harvest came in at 29,940 birds, down roughly 10 percent from the 5-year average. However, the number of successful hunters was 21,209 which continues to be in line with the 5-year average of 21,259. To reduce predator pressure on turkey nests and poults, the Commission voted to extend racoon and opossum hunting season to March 15 and double the bag limit. The TFWC approved bobcat hunting during the statewide deer archery, muzzleloader, and gun seasons.

The controversial practice of fanning or reaping turkey was also banned on wildlife management areas (WMAs) to ensure public safety. It is still allowed on private land.

To simplify regulations, hunters will no longer need the Type 94 licenses to hunt ant-

lerless deer on private land, but it will still be required on WMAs. Changes to deer season dates will be calendar year changes only.

To make progress reducing the number of chronic wasting disease (CWD) positive deer, the Commission voted to extend the rifle season in the CWD zone by two weeks, to increase the buck limit to three, and to adjust the "Earn-A-Buck" program to be one doe, instead of two that earns one buck tag.

Since the beginning of the program, hunters have harvested nearly 8,700 antlerless deer, with just more than 2,000 does entered in the "Earn-A-Buck" program. TWRA has also been developing a new strategic plan over the last year, which includes more targeted deer management zones to ensure the best science is used to address CWD rates.

TWRA staff did not recommend any changes to elk regulations. There are currently elk in five counties, with elk hunting allowed in public zones. Each winter, TWRA completes a ground survey of elk populations and has seen an increasing trend in elk populations. Currently, 15 elk tags are issued annually.

Based on feedback from bear hunters and biologists, bear hunt zones will be slightly adjusted, and the Kettlefoot and Laurel Fork bear reserve season expanded. Moving forward, bear tooth submission will be mandatory by hunters to allow for better population management and data collection on wildlife health.

Finally, the Commission voted to add a total of four Tier One duck blinds at the Big Sandy, West Sandy, and Camden Unit 1 WMAs for the upcoming duck season.

An additional proposal will be considered at a later Commission meet-

**NASHVILLE** — Tennessee's 2022 Free Fishing Day is set for Saturday, June 11 when anyone may fish free without a license in Tennessee's public waters.

The Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency provides the annual free day in hopes of increasing interest in fishing.

The day allows anyone the opportunity to try this great outdoor sport to celebrate fishing as a wholesome and healthy recreational opportunity.

In addition, children ages 15 and younger may fish without a license beginning on Free Fishing Day through the following Friday (June 17).

The day and week are annual events in Tennessee and are great opportunities to introduce children to the enjoyment and excitement of a day on the water catching fish. The TWRA is among several organizations planning special fishing events, primarily for youngsters. The TWRA annually stocks several thousand pounds of fish for various events.

For a list of the events, visit the TWRA website at [www.tnwildlife.org](http://www.tnwildlife.org) and the fishing page.

Anglers and potential anglers should check the events list often since special events are frequently added.

Free Fishing Day and Week apply to Tennessee's public waters, TWRA owned and operated lakes, and state park facilities. Some privately owned pay lakes and ponds continue to charge during this special day and week.

Anglers will need to consult with those operators if there are any questions about a facility.

ing to create a 900-acre waterfowl refuge at the WMA to support the duck population. The area under consideration is difficult for hunters to access and the Commission believes it would be better served for conservation efforts. TWRA will seek public comments on the proposal before the vote.

Additional updates were made for TWRA's 110 WMAs encompassing more than 1.5 million acres of natural resources.

Notably, a quota hunt for turkeys was established on Chickasaw and Natchez state parks, slight adjustments were made to the deer hunts on Cheatham WMA, and generally opening more hunt units on various WMAs across the state.

A list of WMA regulations is available on the TWRA website.

TWRA completes a nine-month season setting process, which includes wildlife popu-

lation surveys, data collection from partner organizations and research institutions, a public comment period on recommendations, and finally discussion and approval by the Tennessee Fish and Wildlife Commission.

"Our goal for the 2023 hunting season setting process was to find the right balance between healthy wildlife populations and hunter satisfaction," said Wildlife and Forestry Division Chief Joe Benedict.

"We feel confident we have met this goal with the help of the incredible volume of public input we received this year."

This year, TWRA received more than 1,600 public comments on hunting dates and regulations. Sportsmen can continue to submit comments on hunting seasons regulations to [TWRA.huntingcomments@tn.gov](mailto:TWRA.huntingcomments@tn.gov).

## Broncos sell to Walmart heir in record deal

**ENGLEWOOD, Colo.** — The Waltons, heirs to the Walmart fortune and America's richest family, have won the bidding to purchase the Denver Broncos in the most expensive deal for a sports franchise anywhere in the world.

The Broncos announced late Tuesday night they had entered into a sale agreement with the Walton-Penner ownership group led by Rob Walton, his daughter, Carrie Walton Penner, and her husband, Greg Penner.

Terms of the sale weren't disclosed, but KUSA-TV in Denver reported it was for \$4.65 billion.

The price tag far surpasses the \$3.1 billion sale last month of Chelsea, one of European soccer's blue ribbon teams, to an American-led consortium fronted by Los Angeles Dodgers part-owner Todd Boehly.

Boehly reportedly was among the investors with one of the five finalists who were invited to make bids for the Broncos by Monday's deadline.

The agreement for the Walmart-Penner group to buy the franchise from the Pat Bowlen Trust must be approved by the NFL, but that is

considered a formality.

"While this purchase and sale agreement is pending approval from the NFL's finance committee and league ownership, today marks a significant step on the path to an exciting new chapter in Broncos history," team president and CEO Joe Ellis said in a statement.

"I have enjoyed getting to know Rob Walton, Carrie Walton Penner and Greg Penner throughout this process," Ellis said. "Learning more about their background and vision for the Denver Broncos, I am confident that their leadership and support will help this team achieve great things on and off the field."

Rob Walton said in a statement, "We are thrilled to be selected to move forward with the purchase of the Denver Broncos! Carrie, Greg and I are inspired by the opportunity to steward this great organization in a vibrant community and passionate fans."

"Having lived and worked in Colorado, we've always admired the Broncos. Our enthusiasm has only grown as we've learned more about the team, staff and Broncos Country over the last few months," Walton added.

Walton said Mellody Hobson, co-CEO of Ariel Investments and chairwoman of Starbucks, has agreed to join the ownership group.

Hobson is Black. NFL commissioner Roger Goodell has made minority ownership a point of emphasis in the league.

"Mellody currently serves as Chair of the Board of Starbucks Corporation and is also a director of JPMorgan Chase. We know she will bring her strategic acumen and leadership perspective to our team," Walton said.

"We look forward to earning the confidence and support of the NFL as we take the next step in this process. When the necessary approval procedures are met, our family is excited to share more with Broncos fans, the organization and the community."

Walton, 77, was chairman of Walmart, the world's largest retailer, from 1992-2015, when he retired. He is the eldest son of founder Sam Walton and Helen Walton and has an estimated net worth of nearly \$60 billion.

First-year coach Nathaniel Hackett demurred when asked Monday during offseason workouts if he's kept up with the sale process.

"My job is to get the team ready and teach systems and teach them to come together as a team and get them better at football," Hackett said. "I know that's obviously a huge, huge deal. But for us it's about winning no matter who is going to own the team, so I'm excited."

After a first round of bids, five finalists were invited to tour the team's facilities and take a deeper dive into the franchise's finances. Hackett said he met with most of the billionaire bidders.

"After talking with everybody, I think they all have an amazing passion and want to be part of this league, and they want to be part of a team — and I think that's something that's really beautiful," Hackett said.

"They want to come to win, and they want to do something great here. And so wherever it is, I think we're going to be very grateful."

The Pat Bowlen Trust has run the franchise for several years and last year put the club up for sale after Hall of Famer Pat Bowlen's children couldn't concur on a successor to their father.

Bowlen died in 2019, a month shy of his induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

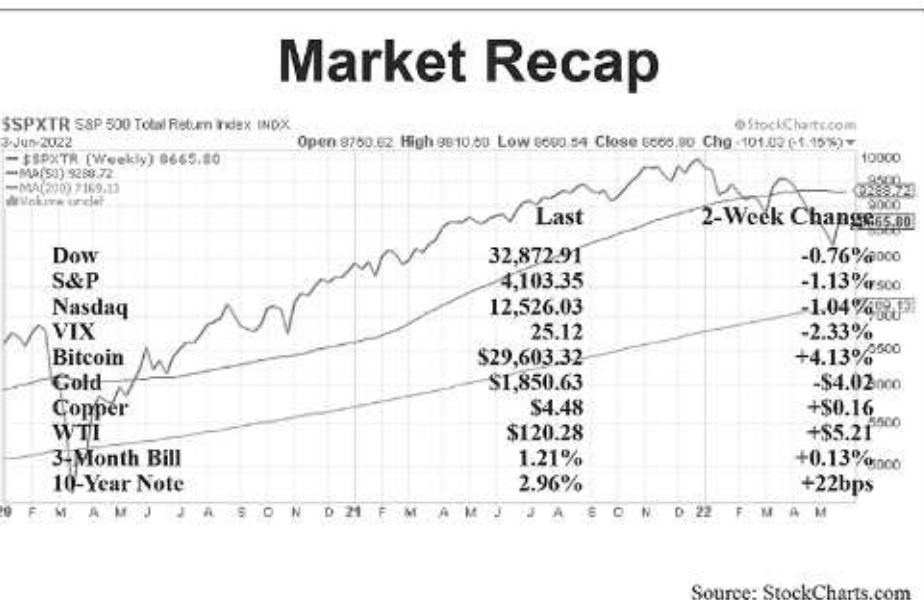
