

Lions roar once more

Storms forecast for last Friday held off, not wanting to spoil the celebration and dedication of a state historical marker at the former Jones School.

The building, which currently houses the Marshall County Board of Education offices, was dedicated in 1951 as Jones Training School, serving as the county's high school for African American students as well as an elementary school.

Named after Professor Jacob "Jake" Jones, a long-time African American educator in the county who, prior to his death in 1942, privately taught high school classes in his home to African American students by request.

In 1967 with school desegregation, the final class graduated from the then Jones High School, after which the building was used as an integrated elementary school until closing in 1981.

Alumni from Jones

joined with the broader community to celebrate their memories of the school which once served as the center of the county's African American community.

In his remarks, Mitchell Johnson of the Altru-

ist Club of Lewisburg and Marshall County said that the project had been driven by the desire to see "the contributions and legacy of Jones" preserved.

Johnson thanked the many people who had

assisted in the process of applying to the Tennessee Historical Commission for approval of the marker, a process only complicated by delays over the last two years due to the pandemic.

The Altruist Club of

Lewisburg and the Jones Class of 1967 sponsored a reunion of alumni of the county's segregated schools in February of 2019, which served to start the fundraising and awareness for the placement of the marker.

Touching on the closing line of the Jones alma mater, "we'll go on to greater heights," Roy Dukes said that Jones would be "a height that will be forever remembered."

Lewisburg slows part of Mooresville Hwy

Proof of the growth coming to Lewisburg was evident based on the agenda for last Tuesday's meeting of the City Council.

The agenda ran for two and a half pages, most of which, in the public hearing prior to the meeting, old business, and new business, concerned zoning, rezoning, or annexation requests.

Based on the number of requests, residential construction appears poised to continue unabated for the foreseeable future.

Among the development requests, the council approved several other measures as well.

Notably, the council approved a resolution extending the 30 mile per hour speed limit further out

Mooresville Highway.

After a request from Councilman Jack Cathey the 30 mph zone will begin at White Drive and extend to the entrance of Ridgetop Apartments at the crest of the hill.

The change is intended to anticipate the installation of stop lights at the intersection of Mooresville Highway and West Ellington Parkway.

Mayor Jim Bingham noted that the Tennessee Department of Transportation had not yet released the city to begin construction on the light and that he anticipated another year before the approval was granted.

Lewisburg Public Works will begin relocating the speed limit signs to meet the new standard within the next week or two.

The council approved on first

reading the city's proposed budget and tax rate for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

After this year's property reappraisal, the city property tax will fall to \$1.28 per \$100 of assessed value, down from the previous rate of \$1.84 per \$100.

Councilmen also approved a resolution setting the third weekend of September as a permit-free yard sale weekend with the hope that such an event will spur additional community economic development.

The council voted to defer the final reading of a resolution establishing an additional two percent hotel/motel tax, proceeds of which would be earmarked for the tourism fund.

- Do not dilute formula because this can lead to chemical imbalances that can be dangerous for an infant.

- The FDA and American Association of Pediatricians strongly discourage using homemade formula. It could cause additional health concerns such as chemical imbalances, gastrointestinal distress, or allergic reactions.
- Parents should consult with their pediatrician about introducing cow's milk if their baby

is close to one year of age. It may be a good option for a limited time depending on your baby's age and other conditions.

Parents can begin to introduce solid foods beginning at 4 months of age for healthy infants for additional nutritional support. 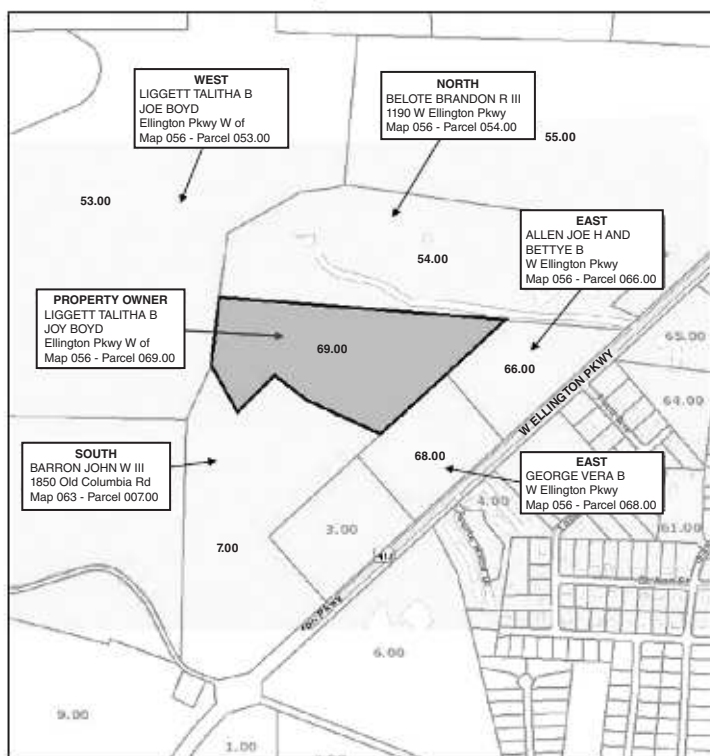

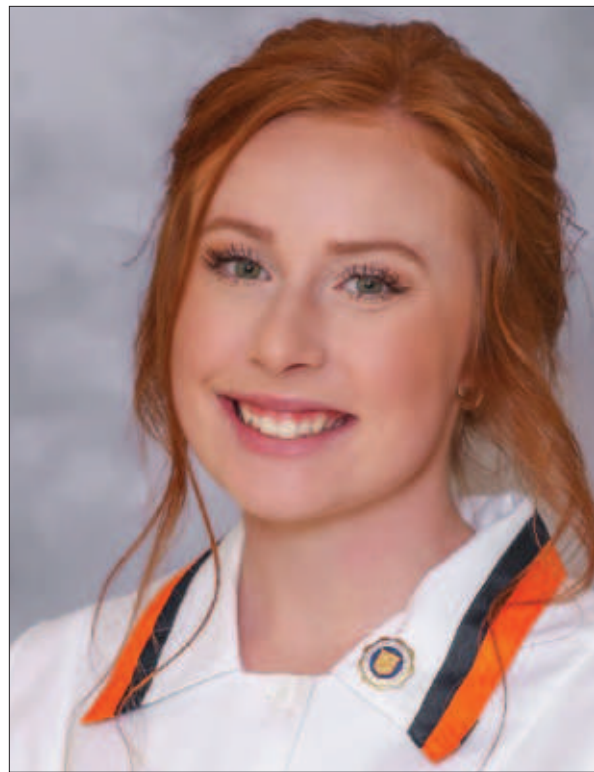

Hunter Bennett has been playing basketball ever since he was big enough to pick up a ball.

With plenty of hours in the gym, his life-long dream was being able to play at the next level.

He finally made that dream a reality as he signed his letter of intent to continue his basketball career at Montreat College, in Montreat, N.C.

"I'm just super stoked. I've been playing basketball since I could pick up a ball. I've always wanted to take it to the next level. The fact I can do that now is mind blowing," Bennett said.

In front of a packed crowd of family, friends, teammates and coaches, Bennett made his commitment official to play for the Cavaliers next season.

Bennett is the second member of the 2021-2022 Rocket basketball team to sign a letter of intent, joining teammate Deason Jones, who signed with Bethel University.

"Hunter's coached reached out to me for some film. I was just a facilitator for those two guys," Forrest coach Shane Chapman said.

"It's a huge boost for our program knowing we have kids that at least have the opportunity to play at the next level. Hopefully that will spur some of these younger kids into working so when these guys come back and talk to kids, they can give them first-hand experience what it's like at the next level."

Chapman also feels that Bennett can be an immediate impact for the Cavaliers.

"I look for him to be a three-four guy. We talked to their coach about playing in the mid-range, and that's what he really wanted to see in some film on him," he said.

"What Hunter did really well was get the ball in the high post, dump it low, or if he

was playing in the short corner, getting it to the high post or attacking and getting to the rim. I feel like he's got that kind of physicality about him to finish at the rim, but he also has enough touch to finish short jumpers, too."

For now, the work shifts to summer preparation and conditioning for his freshman season with Montreat.

"It's going to be a lot of weight lifting and lot of shooting and finishing. I've also got a coach that coaches D-I prospects I'm going to and working with him over the summer four days a week," Bennett said.

Bennett plans to pursue a degree in education.

"I want to be a teacher and go into secondary education and teach freshman math," he said.

Montreat is located in Western North Carolina, nestled in the Appalachian Mountains just 19 miles from Asheville, N.C.

The Cavaliers are a NAIA school that competes in the Appalachian Athletic Conference.

Montreat finished second in the AAC tournament last season and qualified for the NAIA national tournament.

My teams let me down...again

I'm beginning to think I may never get to experience a championship as a fan of any of my teams.
