3 probable cases of monkeypox reported in Tennessee

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Three probable cases of monkeypox have been announced in Tennessee.

The first case was reported last week in a Nashville resident and two more cases in Davidson County have been identified since then, the Metro Nashville Public Health Department told news outlets.

None of the patients are close contacts, health officials said.

Monkeypox belongs to the same virus family as smallpox, but its symptoms are milder. Most patients experience only fever, body aches, chills and fatigue. People usually recover within two to four weeks without needing to be hospitalized, but the disease oc-

casionally is deadly.

People with more serious illness may develop a rash and lesions on the face and hands that can spread to other parts of the body.

Monkeypox cases began emerging in Europe and the United States in May, according to the World Health Organization.

Chapel Hill looks to the tractor pull

The Chapel Hill Board of Mayor and Aldermen breezed through a light agenda on Monday evening. The board expressed pleasure with the town's 4th of July celebrations.

"It went really well," said Mayor Mike Faulkenberry. "We had a real good one this year and hope to expand on it next year."

Aldermen looked ahead to the big event in town every year, the tractor pull happening the weekend of July 22.

The board approved a courtesy permit for the event and Alderman

Jonathan Gilbert emphasized the need for more volunteers.

Otherwise, aldermen approved rezoning a parcel on Highway 99 and a utility easement agreement running between Caney Spring Road and Highway 99.

Town Attorney Todd Moore briefed the board on the settlement terms with the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation regarding violations at the town sewage treatment facility, by which the town should avoid a fine.

The means by which developers could place surety funds for project completion was also discussed, allowing developers to post cash as well as letters of credit.

What About?

With regard to the recent Supreme Court decision with regard to Roe v. Wade and Tennessee's trigger law that bans abortion starting next month:

What about my 14 year-old severely intellectually disabled student who was impregnated by one of the night staff at her residential program? What about my college friend who was brutally raped and was left with a traumatic brain injury and found out she was pregnant from that rape? What about the sister of one of my students who was pregnant at 13 by an uncle following years of sexual abuse? What about the 15 year old who was kicked out of the house when the mom's boyfriend impregnated her? What about the mom joyful about a second child finds out there are severe fetal anomalies that will result in a short, painful life that will be spent entirely in the hospital? What about the family who finds out the wanted child will be born without a brain? What about the mom who finds out one of the twins she is carrying won't survive to birth but will cause the demise the other

twin because they share a placenta unless they terminate the first twin in-utero to save the second? What about the mom who skips an early ultrasound because she can't afford it and suddenly is in a medical crisis because it is an ectopic pregnancy which will kill her but her doctors might be afraid they will be convicted if they provide an abortion? What about the mom who is having a miscarriage (10-15% of all pregnancies) and needs a D&C or mifepristone to prevent deadly septicemia but doctors are afraid it may be considered an abortion? What about the parents who have a child with Lesch-Nyhan syndrome, a genetic disorder that causes severe physical and medical disability and self mutilation such as biting off lips, fingers, toes and other severe self injurious behavior and find out the second pregnancy would suf-

fer the same fate? What about the couple that has 3 frozen embryos but already has two children? What about my friend who was joyfully pregnant and then found out she had cancer that required chemotherapy that would be more successful without a pregnancy? These are not hypothetical; these are all people I have known.

Here's the real question - why is resolution of these tragedies other people's business? It is a private matter. Would you accept the government imposing restrictions on your health care that impact you for the rest of your life and maybe kill you? You don't want the government telling you must wear a mask or get a vaccine but you are willing to let the government tell women they must have a child? Makes no sense.

Bulldogs working through summer

All through the month of June, the Cornersville Bulldogs had a crash course on getting to know new head coach Shelby Waddell.

While Waddell takes over the Bulldog program, it's not been a complete overhaul, but rather a "get-to-know-you" period for the players and coaching staff.

Preds ink Forsberg to 8-year deal

NASHVILLE (AP) — The Nashville Predators have re-signed Filip Forsberg to a \$68 million, eight-year contract with an \$8.5 million annual salary cap hit.

The team announced the deal Saturday, getting Forsberg locked up before he could hit the open market when NHL free agency opens next week. He's now under contract through 2030.

Forsberg, who turns 28 in August, is coming off the best season of his career. The native of Ostervala, Sweden, set career highs with 42 goals, 42 assists and 84 points in just 69 games. Forsberg had eight game-winning goals, one shy of the nine he had in the 2016-17 season.

He ranked third in scoring for the Predators, trailing captain Roman Josi and Matt Duchene, who set the franchise record for

goals in a season with 43.

The Predators felt close enough to an extension with Forsberg that general manager David Poile chose to keep him rather than looking to trade him.

Poile in June said he and Forsberg's camp continued negotiations, though the GM also had several backup plans. That included Forsberg possibly testing free agency, knowing Nashville could offer him an eighth year compared to seven by other teams if a contract got done before July 13.

The 10-year veteran has played 566 games with Nashville after being acquired April 3, 2013, in a trade that sent Martin Erat and Michael Latta to the Washington Capitals for the 11th pick overall in the 2012 draft.

Forsberg has 220 career goals and 249 assists for 469 points. He is coming off a season where

he played his most games since 2016-17 when he played all 82 for a third consecutive season. Forsberg previously signed a six-year, \$36 million extension in June 2016.

He was fourth in voting for the Calder Trophy in 2014-15 and was named to the NHL All-Rookie Team after leading Nashville with 26 goals and 63 points. He became the first Nashville player to score in the NHL All-Star Game in 2015 and had the franchise's first hat trick in that season's playoffs in Game 5 against Chicago in the first round.

Forsberg had two natural hat tricks in the span of three games between Feb. 23 and Feb. 27 in 2016 against Toronto and St. Louis. He was the first to do so in three or fewer games since Petri Skriko in consecutive games in 1986 with Vancouver.

One year of NIL: How much have athletes made?

After the first year of college sports' name, image and likeness era, football and men's basketball still claim the throne for the number of deals and average compensation, and social media remains the most popular way to get that NIL money.

The total amount spent was about \$917 million, NIL platform Opendorse estimated.

An average football deal comes out to nearly \$3,400 on two platforms. And while softball and women's basketball generally landed in the top five overall, when you

subtract football, women's sports are getting more deals than men's sports, Opendorse said. Female gymnasts make big bucks, too: about \$7,000 on average per deal, according to NIL platform INFLCR.

A full accounting of the first year of NIL, from July 1, 2021, to June 30 is hard to come by, for numerous reasons. The majority of schools don't make public the number of deals and amounts their athletes have received (though a couple have divulged some information in what could be considered recruiting or marketing strategy).

There also is no central framework for how and when deals should be reported.

"You have all of these different stakeholders involved in this ecosystem and a lack of consistency, not just in platform where information is being reported, but in requirements relative to what information is necessary," said Andrew Donovan, the executive vice president of collegiate partnerships at Altius Sports.

So it's up to major NIL tech platforms — some of which facilitate deals and disclosures, and others disclosures only — to fill in the gaps. Sort of.

"I know that what's being reported is not a full picture," said Donovan, whose organization works with 30 schools on education and strategic guidance and talks with donors, boosters, corporate partners and others. "... Athletes are regularly acknowledging to us that they're not disclosing. Schools are regularly communicating the struggles that they're having getting athletes to disclose ... It's very clear that this is not a full, complete picture of what's going on in the NIL space."

What lies ahead for Year 2, beyond maybe new laws or group licensing? Opendorse thinks it's the potential of NIL spending topping more than \$1 billion.

An estimated \$607.4 million could go to Power Five schools, with an average annual compensation of \$16,074 per athlete, Opendorse said. Already, about three-fourths of the known or forming collectives, which are third-party NIL kingmakers made up of school donors and boosters, are connected to Power Five schools.

Athletes' deals with brands — from financial businesses to apps to fashion — will likely rise, too. Opendorse projects that brand deals will encompass 64% of all NIL compensation in Year 2 and bring in about \$730.4 million.

Donovan, a former president of the National Association for Athletics Compliance, also believes there will be more importance placed on helping athletes understand tax implications of NIL deals: "There's several schools across the country that are doing a good job there, but that needs to be built out as we see these large financial figures."

Athletes Make How Much?

It's a broad range. IN-

FLCR's overall average NIL transaction value is \$1,815 through June 30. Athliance, another disclosure platform, has an average value of \$1,524.58. Though the true picture may lie in INFLCR's median NIL transaction value of \$53.

The Opendorse platform said average annual compensation for an athlete in NCAA Divisions I-III combined is \$3,438 (through May 31). By division, DI athletes saw an average of \$3,711, \$204 in DII and \$309 in DIII.

Football NIL deals tend to be hefty, with an average of \$3,390.95 on Athliance and \$3,396 on INFLCR. Opendorse broke down average compensation per football position, ranging from \$403 for a specialist, \$758 for the defensive line and \$2,128 for quarterback.

Women's sports overall received \$1,084 on average for an NIL deal, per INFLCR, with women's gymnastics soaring to a \$7,054 average.

Some of the average transaction figures for nonrevenue sports through May 31 on INFLCR were surprising: \$8,967 for swimming and diving, \$6,087 for rifle and \$4,813 for men's golf — all higher than football and in the platform's top five. Athliance cited an average of \$1,850 for hockey, \$1,400 for waterskiing and \$1,026.67 for indoor track and field.

Men's vs. women's

As of June 20, men's sports received 62.7% of total compensation in the NCAA and NAIA combined, compared with 37.3% for women's sports, Opendorse said. Remove football and women flip it to 52.8% vs. 47.2% for men. The difference in Division III was stark through May 31: 82.9% men vs. 17.1% women.

Football (49.9%) and men's basketball (17%) dominated total NIL compensation by sport in Opendorse's platform through June 20, with women's basketball (15.7%), women's volleyball (2.3%) and softball (2.1%) rounding out the top five. Football also took the top spot in INFLCR's number of NIL transactions through May 31 with 23.7%, followed by men's basketball (22.3%), softball (8.2%), baseball (6%) and women's basketball (4.7%).

When it comes to total NIL activities, Opendorse says football (29.3%) is the leader, then baseball (8%), men's basketball (7.6%), women's track and field (5.6%) and women's volleyball (5.5%).

UK Olympic great says he was trafficked as a child

LONDON — Olympic great Mo Farah -- the winner of four gold medals and one of Britain's greatest and best-loved athletes -- has been carrying a secret burden all these years: He was illegally brought to the U.K. as a youth and forced to care for other children before he escaped a life of servitude through running.

In a new documentary, Farah says his real name is Hussein Abdi Kahin and that he was from taken from the East African nation of Djibouti when he was about 8 or 9. He says a woman he didn't know brought him to Britain using fake travel documents that included his picture alongside the name Mohammed Farah.

The revelations come as Britain struggles to deal with a surge of people fleeing conflict and hunger in Africa, the Middle East and Asia on flimsy boats organized by human traffickers who assist the desperate to cross the English Channel. Criminal gangs are also smuggling people into the country and forcing them into sex work, criminal activities and unpaid labor.

In the documentary, produced by the BBC and Red Bull Studios, Farah said he thought he was going to Europe to live with relatives and had piece of paper with the contact details.

"The lady took it off me and right in front of me ripped them up and put it in the bin," Farah

said in the film, to be broadcast Wednesday. "And at that moment I knew I was in trouble."

The woman took him to an apartment in west London where he was forced to care for her children, Farah said. He wasn't allowed to go to school until he was 12.

"I wasn't treated as part of the family," Farah said. "If I wanted food in my mouth, my job was to look after those kids — shower them, cook for them, clean for them."

Farah was granted U.K. citizenship in 2000 and represented Britain at three straight Summer Olympics starting in 2008. He captured hearts in Britain and elsewhere with the look of joy and astonishment after his triumph in the 5,000 meters at the 2012 London Games after earlier winning the 10,000-meter title. He won the same races at the 2016 Games in Rio de Janeiro.

He was knighted by Queen Elizabeth II in 2017.

Farah previously said he had moved to Britain with his parents as a refugee from Somalia. But in the documentary, he says his parents never were in the U.K. His father was killed by gunfire during unrest in Somalia when Farah was 4, according to the film. His mother and two brothers live on the family farm in Somaliland, a breakaway region of Somalia that is not internationally recognized.

Farah says his fortunes changed when he was finally allowed to attend school. A teach-

er who was interviewed for the documentary recalled a 12-year-old boy who appeared "unkempt and uncared for," was "emotionally and culturally alienated" and spoke little English.

But he began to blossom on the track and eventually told his story to a physical education instructor. The teacher contacted local officials, who arranged for a Somali family to take him in as a foster child.

"I still missed my real family, but from that moment everything got better," Farah said. "I felt like a lot of stuff was lifted off my shoulders, and I felt like me."

Farah said he had feared he would be deported if he spoke about his childhood experiences. He decided to tell his story to publicize and challenge people's perceptions of human trafficking, he said.

"I had no idea there was so many people who are going through exactly the same thing that I did," he said. "It just shows how lucky I was."

In 2020, more than 10,000 people were referred to authorities in Britain as potential victims of modern slavery, up from 2,340 in 2014, according to the Home Office, the government agency responsible for border enforcement.

Immigration authorities are also under pressure as the number of people entering the country on small boats jumped to 28,526 last year from 299 in 2018, government statistics show.

Mayfield: 'No animosity' toward Browns, awaits fresh start

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Baker Mayfield said he was "shocked" to learn that he was not included in the Cleveland Browns' future plans earlier this off-season.

But the No. 1 overall NFL draft pick in 2018 has had a few months now to digest the Browns' decision to replace him with Deshaun Watson and is eager to take advantage of a fresh start with his new team, the Carolina Panthers.

"Shocked, I would say, is pretty much the only way to describe it," Mayfield said Tuesday. "But you roll with the punches and you've got to move forward. This is a test of adversity and how I'm going to handle it and how I can move forward and be the best teammate possible."

Mayfield said he has no animosity toward the Browns, although he admits Carolina's home opener against Cleveland on Sept. 11 will be a "special" game.

Often viewed as fiery

and outspoken, Mayfield was humble and introspective in his first interview since the Browns dealt him to Carolina for a 2024 conditional fifth-round draft pick.

To help facilitate the deal, Mayfield agreed to take a \$3.5 million pay cut. He'll still make a combined \$15.5 million from the Browns and Panthers.

In taking the pay cut, Mayfield is essentially betting on himself with free agency lingering after this upcoming season.

But first he has to win the starting job.

Mayfield joins Sam Darnold in the quarterback room, giving the Panthers the top two QBs from the '18 draft — but no clear starter heading into training camp.

Panthers general manager Scott Fitterer called it an "open competition" and predicts both will get equal reps in practice.

"The reason we have Baker here is to make the whole group better as a whole," Fitterer said. "Our philosophy is

that we want competition, not just in the quarterback room but at every position."

But past success suggests Mayfield has a better chance of winning the job. He's 29-30 as an NFL starter, while Darnold is 17-32. Mayfield has thrown 92 touchdown passes and 56 interceptions compared to Darnold's 54 TD passes and 52 INTs.

Mayfield has also shown he can lead a team to the playoffs, helping the Browns go 11-5 in 2020.

Mayfield avoided questions on whether he expects to be the team's starter, only saying he wants to be the best quarterback he can be and help the Panthers win games regardless of his role. He said he likes and respects Darnold, who called him shortly after the trade to Carolina was announced.

He doesn't want a quarterback controversy disrupting the team.

"If there is drama within that room it's going to permeate through the building and that's not going to

be the case," Mayfield said. "We're not going to let that happen."

Fitterer said the Panthers did plenty of background checks on Mayfield before the trade.

He said he's comfortable, and even excited, with Mayfield's approach to the game.

"This is a fiery, competitive guy," Fitterer said. "He wants to win. He wants to be great. I think as an organization we embrace that attitude. We like guys that are like that. This is a fresh start for him and it doesn't matter what he's done in the past."

Just how long Mayfield — or Darnold — will be in Carolina remains to be seen.

Both QBs are in the final years of their rookie deals and Fitterer said the team is not looking to sign either to a contract extension until they see how they perform on the field.

"We'll let it play out throughout the season and we will make decisions based on that later in the season, whether that is November or December," Fitterer said.

LeBron remains critical of US efforts to get Griner home

LeBron James is publicly criticizing the United States' handling of WNBA All-Star Brittney Griner's case in a trailer for an upcoming episode of his television show: "The Shop: Uninterrupted."

Griner is on trial in Russia for drug possession. She pleaded guilty last week and will appear again in court on Thursday.

"Now, how can she feel like America has her back?" James said in the trailer. "I would be feeling like, 'Do I even wanna go back to America?'"

James tweeted Tues-

day night that his comments in the trailer weren't intended to be critical of the U.S. efforts to get Griner back.

"My comments on 'The Shop' regarding Brittney Griner wasn't knocking our beautiful country," he said. "I was simply saying how she's probably feeling emotionally along with so many other emotions, thoughts, etc inside that cage she's been in for over 100+ days! Long story short #BringHerHome"

It's unclear when the show was filmed, although in the trailer it is mentioned that Griner had been in Russia for more than 110 days, which would have been

nearly five weeks ago as she was detained on Feb. 17.

During the weeks since day 110, in addition to the trial beginning and the guilty plea, Griner's wife Cherelle has had a phone conversation with President Joe Biden. Biden also received a letter from Brittney Griner on July 4 and sent a letter back to her, which she was given in court last week.

There is also no mention of other detained Americans in the trailer.

NBA Commissioner Adam Silver, speaking later Tuesday after his league's board of governors meeting in Las

Vegas, reiterated that the NBA and WNBA are "doing everything in our power" to bring Griner home.

"I'm accepting that the administration is doing everything they can right now," Silver said. "There are some seriously complex geopolitical issues here. And I'm sure as invariably as they are more focused on Brittney, there are other families who are of course concerned about their loved ones who are being held against their will in Russia right now. ... There are very difficult issues that the Biden administration has to face in terms of what's appropriate."
