Next Thursday's ballot, which is printed inside the A section of today's Marshall County Tribune, is a long one. All of the county's elect-

ed positions, except for property assessor, are on the ballot along with municipal seats in Lewisburg and Chapel Hill.

Most of the county commission seats are contested, with multiple candidates vying for the two seats representing each of the county's nine districts.

Cornersville alderman elections are on the November ballot.

Primary elections for statewide and federal positions also feature, especially the crowded Republican field for the new 5th Congressional District in the House of Representatives and a three man race for the Republican nomination in the redrawn 92nd District of the General Assembly, currently held by Marshall County's Todd Warner.
