County elections quiet, turnout low

The Marshall County general election last Thursday passed without too many sparks, despite a 13 page ballot.

Voters didn't appear particularly energized either with a disappointing turnout, lower than the last two elections.

Overall, 5,799 voters went to the polls out of just under 21,000 registered, a 28% turnout.

Less than 2,500 votes were cast on the day of the election, compared to 3,200 cast during the early vote.

Only two of the county-wide races were contested.

Incumbent Register of Deeds Dorris Wayne Weaver fought off two challengers in Joey Young and Robbie Russell. Weaver garnered just under 55% of the vote, receiving 2927 votes to Young's 30% (1605 votes) and Russell's 15% (801).

Trustee Scottie Poarch held on to his seat after a chal-

lenge from Curtis Johnson, winning with 3,107 votes to Johnson's 2,425.

County Mayor Mike Keny, running unopposed for a second term, received 4,554 courtesy votes.

Other incumbents elected to an additional term are: Sheriff Billy Lamb, 4,922 votes; Circuit Court Clerk Mike Wiles, 4,404 votes; County Clerk Daphne Girts, 4,810; and Superintendent of Roads Jerry Williams, 4,555.

The County Commission races generated more interest from candidates.

The only uncontested commission races were in the two northernmost districts. First District Commissioners Dead Delk and Craig Blackwell return with 391 and 399 courtesy votes, respectively. Likewise, 2nd District Commissioners Joseph Warner and Debbie Hill return with 358 and 302 votes cast.

The six-way race for the two 3rd District seats saw very tight margins.

Incumbent Anna Childress



holds on to a seat with 241 votes. John McCullough edged out incumbent Tony Nichols for the second seat, 235 to 228 votes.

Shawn Hawkins received 165 votes, former Commissioner R.L. Williams 132 votes, and Anthony Parker received 86 votes.

The 4th District also saw an incumbent lose.

Commissioner Roger Murphree finished third in the contest with 198 votes. Ken Lee will take the seat after receiving 410 votes, along with incumbent Commissioner Mickey King with 396 votes.

Curtis Denton ended up with 131 votes in the district.

District 5 saw the closest margin of the night with Commissioner Tony Beyer retaining a seat over challenger Mary Cedenio by six votes, 327 to 321. Terry Dunnivant topped the district with 420 votes.

Sheldon Davis and Cannon Allen both retain their seats in District 6 with 210 and 162 votes each. Shaun Arndt with 143 votes and Toby Adams with 122 round out the field.

Keith Hollingsworth and Seth Warf will represent District 7, receiving 189 and 162 votes. Danny Morgan finished third with 129.

One seat in District 8 remains unsettled. Jeff Poarch was reelected with 241 votes. Current 5th District Commissioner Lynn Stocstill finished second with 176 votes. However, Stocstill was unable to complete her planned move between the districts by election day, leaving her unable to take up the seat.

According to Election Administrator Andrew Robertson, the vacant seat will probably be included as a special election on the November ballot.

James Hopkins, who recently appointed to the commission to fill a vacancy, finished with 153 votes and Joey King finished with 143.

Ninth District incumbent Glen White holds his District 9 seat with 417 votes and will be joined by newcomer Nathan Johnson with 357.

Trailing in the district were Andy Reed with 236 votes and Walt Redding with 153.

None of the county or district-wide judicial races were contested with every incumbent returning to office.

Circuit Court Judges Forest Durard and Wyatt Burk, Chancellor J.B. Cox, District Attorney Robert Carter and Public Defender Donna Hargrove will all serve another term.

General Sessions Judge Lee Bussart retains her seat as well with 4,658 courtesy votes.

Cornersville revises liquor laws

The Cornersville Board of Mayor and Aldermen approved amendments to the town's liquor by the drink ordinance at their monthly meeting last Thursday.

The amendments to the ordinance, which was approved by referendum years ago and has been dormant since then, are aimed at providing better definitions and more guidance, especially for package stores.

The amendment eliminates distance requirements from certain locations, as well as the residency requirement

for owning such an establishment.

The new language sets a maximum of two liquor stores within the town limits. Previously, no limit for the number of retail stores was included.

The board also discussed excluding package liquor stores from areas zoned as C-1, which could be done by limiting the acceptable use table in the zoning guidelines to C-2 zoned areas.

As originally written, the ordinance had no location restrictions.

The board tabled discussion of membership for the town's Industrial Development Board until next month.

Aldermen wanted to check the IDB bylaws for membership requirements. The town IDB, which does not meet regularly, has vacancies which must be filled and Mayor John Luna would like to see the board meet annually at least.

An engineer briefed aldermen on the widening project for East Hill, Underwood, and Polk Streets.

A handful of right of way issues need to be resolved but the project is close to bid.

He estimated a mid-summer completion next year, barring any unforeseen delays.

Lewisburg sees two council changes

Municipal election recap

The Lewisburg City Council will see some new faces in the future as two of the three incumbent councilmen lost their bids for reelection.

Vickie Michael unseated Ward 2 Councilman Jack Cathey with 344 votes to Cathey's 288.

Cathey had been appointed by the council to fill the remaining term of Artie Allen.

Two-term Councilman Jerry Gordon lost in Ward 4 to challenger Tommy Burns. Burns received 213 votes to Gordon's 155.

The only council member to retain their seat was Ward 3's Peggy Harwell.

She defeated challenger Harry Lee Douglas, Jr. by 13 votes, 81 to 68.

Harwell was appointed to the seat to fill the unexpired term of her late husband, C.H. Harwell.

Incumbent Lewisburg Mayor Jim Bingham was challenged by current

Ward 5 Councilman Joe Bradford for the seat.

Voters reelected Bingham to another term as mayor with a 966 to 712 vote total over Bradford.

Barbara Medley, running unopposed, was reelected as Lewisburg city judge with 1,460 courtesy votes.

Chapel Hill Mayor Mike Faulkenberry was returned to office with 209 courtesy votes. Faulkenberry served as an alderman before being appointed by the board to finish the term of Jackie King who resigned from the

position.

Despite having three candidates for three open positions, the town will see one new face on the Board. Benjamin Piper Sr., with 180 votes, fills the seat of Alderman Brian Williams, who chose not to run for reelection. Incumbents Jonathan Gilbert and Dale Brown also return to the board with 191 and 166 courtesy votes respectively.

Cornersville alderman races appear on the November ballot.

Chapel Hill paves the way for food trucks

Chapel Hill began easing the road into town for food trucks at the monthly meeting on Monday night.

Aldermen approved on first reading a draft amendment to the municipal code, reintroduced from early 2021, which would establish regulations for food trucks in town.

The owners of Mother's Subs spoke on their experience with current rules, noting that Chapel Hill charged \$50 every two weeks for a transient vendors license, compared to other municipalities like Lewisburg, Murfrees-

boro, and Nashville which charge the same amount per year.

Town Attorney Todd Moore explained that the only ordinance currently on the books that would cover food trucks is the transient vendor licensing, intended for very seasonal vendors, such as fireworks tents.

The 2021 amendment would establish guidelines specifically for food trucks and lower the license fee. One hundred twenty dollars per year, in line with Brentwood or Franklin, was proposed for an annual license.

The measure will return next month for a final vote.

Aldermen agreed to allow staff

more flexibility in adjusting water bills for customers faced with leaks or other one-time issues.

As written, policy only allows adjustments to be made on sewer bills, which did not serve as the best remedy.

The board will be presented next month with a resolution allowing the change to address water bill adjustments on a case by case basis.

Aldermen voted unanimously to add annual membership with AirMedCare to the benefits package for town employees.

Town Administrator Danny Bingham said that, considering the low

cost to the town compared to the very high cost of air ambulance services, the addition was a very cost effective way of improving the town's benefit package.

Aldermen passed on first reading a measure, deferred since January, that would set guidelines for food providers in town to prevent fats, oils, and grease for cooking into the town sewer system.

Non-water soluble fats clog pipes and can damage water treatment equipment. Additional detail and engineering will be presented next month prior to the second vote.

NFL teams tapping USFL veterans for help in training camp

NASHVILLE — Cornerback Terrell Bonds has talked about being a member of the NFL’s Tennessee Titans since he played in college at Tennessee State.

Five years after his college days ended, he’s finally on the Titans’ roster as a training camp signee.

“For it to actually come true now, it’s crazy and I’m thankful for it,” Bonds said.

Bonds owes his latest football opportunity to the revived USFL where he played 10 games this spring with the Pittsburgh Maulers, and he’s got lots of company as the NFL starts its first week of preseason games Thursday night. Bonds is among 42 players from the USFL’s inaugural season signed through Tuesday by 26 of the NFL’s 32 teams.

USFL MVP KaVontae Turpin now is with Dallas, while All-USFL offensive lineman Cameron Hunt signed with the Chargers and All-USFL tight end Sal Cannella joined the Green Bay Packers. Wide receiver (12) has been the most popular position for NFL teams followed by cornerback (nine) as NFL teams look for help in training camps.

Like Bonds, Turpin has been scrambling to keep his dreams of professional football alive since his college career at TCU ended during the 2018 season. Turpin has bounced from the Fan Controlled Football League, Spring League and finally the USFL before being signed by Dallas for camp.

“Man, it’s like a dream come true. It’s a blessing,” Turpin said. “I’ve been in four leagues before I came here. So, it’s a blessing to be here and know the Cowboys gave me a wonderful opportunity to come here and prove myself. I’m just happy to be here.”

Many of these USFL players have been in the NFL before.

Hunt played with both Denver and the Raiders. Bonds played four games with Baltimore in 2020 and spent last offseason with Miami before being waived last August. Darrius Shepherd caught six passes over 2019-20 with Green Bay and signed with Denver after reviving his career with the New Jersey Generals.

“It was really beneficial,” Shepherd said of the USFL. “I’m really happy that they put that league on. They did a great job and provided a lot of opportunities for guys as you see people get signed all over the league.”

NFL teams certainly were watching. Not only did 32 officials from the NFL Development Pipeline work USFL games, NFL teams had no issues quickly accessing USFL game tapes so pro scouts could watch breakdowns for any players they liked.

Tennessee general manager Jon Robinson said their pro staff had specific teams to evaluate and grade and met to rank those players just before the USFL’s championship.

The Titans previously had worked out both Bonds and cornerback Shakur Brown, Bonds’ teammate with Pittsburgh who signed with Tennessee a few days before Bonds.

“But then certainly watching the USFL and seeing how they performed or things they needed to work on, it gave us more, I’d guess, comfort knowing that we’re bringing a guy in that’s played football recently,” Robinson said.

Having practiced and played this spring gave USFL players a couple of big advantages over those working out on their own hoping for an NFL team to call. First, they’re physically ready for the grind of training camp.

“I just got finished with a whole season so I’m definitely like midseason for me,” Brown said.

For the USFL players who spent three months practicing in pads, a full preseason will take a physical toll that will only grow.

“You just got to be a pro about it,” said Cannella, who was in camp last year with the Miami Dolphins before playing with the New Orleans Breakers this spring. “We all went into that season trying to get to this point right here so we all knew what we signed up for.”

Secondly, these USFL veterans also have recent game tape. Robinson said he had to pull up tape from the 2021 NFL preseason Sunday when he wanted to check out players on his emergency list who didn’t compete in the USFL. Robinson knows only too well the value of that list after his Titans used an NFL-record 91 players last season because of injuries.

“I love it when those guys come in, and they just want an opportunity,” Robinson said. “We saw that last year ... Hopefully we don’t got to go down that road again this year, but guys were looking for an opportunity. Hopefully these two guys will come in here and seize it, and we’ll see kind of where it goes from there.”

For now, these USFL players are focused on one practice and day at a time trying to make the most of this latest NFL opportunity. They also want to see the USFL continue.

PGA Tour says players knew consequences of joining LIV Golf

The PGA Tour asked a federal judge in San Francisco to deny the appeal of three suspended players who joined Saudi-backed LIV Golf and now want to compete in the tour’s lucrative postseason, arguing the players knew the consequences two months ago.

Talor Gooch, Matt Jones and Hudson Swafford are seeking a temporary restraining order. They are among 10 players who filed an antitrust lawsuit against the PGA Tour last week.

The hearing is scheduled for 1 p.m. PDT Tuesday in San Jose, California, two days before the first of three FedEx Cup playoff events in the chase for the \$18 million top prize.

The FedEx St. Jude Championship in Memphis, Tennessee, has a \$15 million purse, and the top 70 players advance to the second postseason event in Wilmington, Delaware.

Gooch (No. 20), Jones (No. 65) and Swafford (No. 67) are among nine players who have joined LIV Golf and finished the regular season among the top 125 in the FedEx Cup standings. The other six who joined LIV Golf are not asking to play in the tour’s postseason.

In a court filing Monday to oppose the

temporary restraining order, the tour argued antitrust laws do not allow the three players “to have their cake and eat it, too.”

Gooch, Swafford and Jones used the same phrase in separate, legal-heavy letters to tour officials last month in protesting their suspensions and claiming the regulations were onerous and kept them from playing elsewhere.

“I am a free agent and independent contractor. The Tour cannot have its cake and eat it too by trying to control me as one might an employee, while not providing me the rights and benefits an employee would receive,” each letter said.

The PGA Tour argued in its opposing motion, “Despite knowing full well that they would breach TOUR Regulations and be suspended for doing so, Plaintiffs have joined competing golf league LIV Golf, which has paid them tens and hundreds of millions of dollars in guaranteed money supplied by Saudi Arabia’s sovereign wealth fund.”

LIV Golf CEO Greg Norman said in a statement, “I believe players have the right to play when and where they choose so their talents can take them as far and high as possible.”

“I believe all players — whether they choose to play with LIV or the PGA Tour — understand and appreciate

the purpose and importance of the players’ legal actions, across the globe,” Norman said. “The PGA Tour is trying to cast this as ‘us’ against ‘them.’ The players know better.”

The three players were not among the highest-sought players for Norman’s rival league, though they were among the initial group of players who signed with LIV Golf. Gooch was the only one among the top 50 in the world, mainly from his only PGA Tour win last November.

“Plaintiffs have waited nearly two months to seek relief from the Court, fabricating an ‘emergency’ they now maintain requires immediate action,” the filing said. “It doesn’t.”

The tour contends player knew they would be ineligible for the FedEx Cup playoffs “when they accepted millions from LIV to breach their agreements” with the tour.

Players were not suspended until they actually teed off in a LIV Golf event.

The LIV Golf events, with a 48-man field, consist of 54 holes and offer \$25 million in total prize money for each event. Seventeen players already have earned \$1 million or more in three or fewer events. Five more events remain on this year’s schedule, and LIV Golf already has announced a 14-tourna-

ment schedule for 2023.

The next LIV event does not start until after the PGA Tour’s season ends at East Lake in Atlanta with the FedEx Cup, which pays \$18 million to the champion.

Even though LIV Golf players have been suspended, they remain eligible for the FedEx Cup bonus package. Anyone finishing in the top 125 gets \$120,000. Those who finish inside the top 150, such as Pat Perez and Paul Casey, would get \$85,000.

Dustin Johnson, Patrick Reed and Sergio Garcia are among LIV Golf players who chose to resign their PGA Tour membership. Reed is playing two Asian Tour-International Series tournaments this month.

The lawsuit was filed Aug. 3 by 11 players. The manager for Carlos Ortiz told The Associated Press that Ortiz is no longer part of the lawsuit, though it has not been reflected in court documents yet.

“Carlos does not want to be involved in any legal battles,” his manager, Carlos Rodriguez, said in a text message. “He is thankful for the opportunity he had to play on the PGA Tour and Korn Ferry Tour the last few years.”

Ortiz in two LIV events has made nearly \$3.5 million, about 44% of his career PGA Tour earnings from 160 tournaments.

ESPN out of Big Ten TV rights negotiations

As the Big Ten prepares to become a 16-team, coast-to-coast superconference with the additions of USC and UCLA in 2024, it is ending a 40-year relationship with ESPN and moving toward partnerships with two new networks.

Two people familiar with the negotiations told The Associated Press on Tuesday that the Big Ten was looking for a seven-year deal worth \$380 million per year to broadcast its football and basketball games from ESPN, and the network declined.

Both spoke to The AP on condition of anonymity because the negotiations were

not being made public.

The deal would not have given ESPN first choice of Big Ten football games in a given week at any point and would have reduced the number of Big Ten games the network could broadcast from the current 27 to about half that number, one of the people familiar with the talks said.

ESPN has held television rights for Big Ten football since 1982. The network shares Big Ten football and basketball rights with Fox in the current contract, which expires in 2023.

Fox, which owns 61% of the Big Ten Network, will remain the conference's primary rights holder, with CBS and NBC set to join as partners, one of the people told The AP.

CBS' long-term deal with the Southeastern Conference is set to expire after the 2023 season. That deal gave CBS the rights to the SEC's football game of the week, usually slotted in the 3:30 p.m. Eastern time window on fall Saturdays.

ESPN secured that SEC package to go with the rights it already owned from the powerhouse conference for \$300 million per year. Starting in 2024, ESPN will be the exclusive network home of the SEC.

It appears CBS will replace SEC football with the Big Ten on Saturday afternoons, though the network is not likely to have the exclusive first choice of games the way it did with the SEC.

The Big Ten said Tuesday

in a statement its new television contracts are still being finalized.

"The conference continues to have productive meetings with both linear and direct-to-consumer media partners," the conference said.

An announcement on a new set of deals that is expected to be worth more than \$1 billion annually to the Big Ten is expected soon.

Sports Business Journal first reported ESPN was out of the Big Ten negotiations and CBS and NBC were each positioned to land a piece of the conference's rights for upward of \$300 million per year.

In June, the Big Ten announced it was expanding West with the additions of the Pac-12's two flagship Los Angeles-based schools: Southern

California and UCLA.

The move came a little less than a year after it was revealed Texas and Oklahoma would be leaving the Big 12 and joining the SEC in 2025, when the Big 12's TV contract runs out.

The Pac-12 is next up to the negotiating table among the Power Five conferences, with deals set to expire after the 2023-24 season. The Big 12's current deals run out after the 2024-25 academic year.

While neither conference is expected to come anywhere close to landing deals that rival in value the Big Ten's and SEC's, not having the Big Ten creates more space for ESPN to fill on its family of networks.

Goodell: NFL appeal of Watson suspension 'right thing to do'

BEREA, Ohio — NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell said he feels the league needed to keep pushing for a year-long suspension for Cleveland Browns quarterback Deshaun Watson because of his "egregious" and "predatory behavior" toward women.

Speaking at the owners' meetings Tuesday in Bloomington, Minnesota, Goodell addressed the league's decision to appeal a six-game suspension given to Watson by Sue L. Robinson, a former federal judge appointed by the NFL and NFL Players Association as an independent league disciplinary officer.

Robinson found Watson violated the league's conduct policy after he was accused by two dozen women of sexual assault or harassment while he played for Houston. Watson has settled 23 of the 24 lawsuits filed by the women, though he has denied any wrongdoing.

The league has been seeking an indefinite suspension and fine for Watson, and felt Robinson's six-game ban wasn't enough. Goodell cited the collective bargaining agreement for empowering the league to seek further discipline.

"Either party could certainly challenge and appeal that and that was something that we felt was our right to do as well as NFLPA," Goodell said. "So we decided it was the right thing to do."

Watson's fate now rests with Peter C. Harvey, a former New Jersey attorney general handpicked by Goodell to handle the appeal. Harvey has previously worked as an arbiter in league cases.

Goodell said the league is pushing for a full-year penalty for Watson because of the evidence against the 26-year-old, who was accused of being sexually inappropriate with the women during massage therapy sessions while with the Texans in 2020 and 2021.

In her 16-page ruling, Robinson concluded Watson violated the league's personal conduct policy with his behavior, using both "egregious" and "predatory" to describe his actions

Goodell was asked why the league is seeking a harsher punishment.

"Because we've seen the evidence," he said. "She (Robinson) was very clear about the evidence. She reinforced the evidence, that there was multiple violations here and they were egregious, and that it was predatory behavior."

"Those were always things we felt was really important for us to address and in a way that's responsible."

Goodell doesn't have a sense of when Harvey will issue a decision. There's no specific deadline for Harvey, but the appeal policy requires that it be "expedited."

There also remains the possibility the sides could reach a settlement.

While attending the meetings in Minnesota, Cleveland owner Jimmy Haslam had little to say about the ongoing appeal.

"We'll respect and honor the process," he told reporters

Meanwhile, Watson's playing status for the Browns' exhibition opener is unknown.

Browns coach Kevin Stefanski didn't reveal whether Watson will play in Friday's game in Jacksonville. Stefanski said the team has a plan but he won't make it public until he tells his players.

"We have a framework for how we are going to handle this preseason," he said. "As you know, you always reserve the right to change your mind based on how practice goes and those type of things, but we are pretty confident in the plan we have."

Stefanski said Watson will make the trip to Florida. The three-time Pro Bowler has not played since 2020. He sat out last season after demanding a trade and before the allegations came to light.

Cleveland's plan has been to start Jacoby Brissett while Watson serves his suspension. But now that it's possible that it will encompass most, if not all of the season, there's a chance the team could look outside for another quarterback.

Josh Rosen and Josh Dobbs are also on Cleveland's roster and are expected to get the bulk of the playing time during the exhibition season.

Harvick's win complicates NASCAR playoff spots in final weeks

BROOKLYN, Mich. — NASCAR just got more interesting down the stretch.

Kevin Harvick won his first Cup race in nearly two years at Michigan International Speedway over the weekend — a result that could mean a driver who has a win getting knocked out of the playoffs. "It creates a big bubble," Harvick said Sunday. "I think some of those guys that have won races that hadn't been doing very good, it creates a real scenario to where there could be at least 16 winners. There's a lot of things that can still happen."

Just three races remain in the regular season—the next being Sunday at Richmond Raceway in Virginia, and time is running out to secure a spot in the

16-driver postseason.

Fifteen different drivers have won races this year. If there are two new winners in the final weeks at Richmond, Watkins Glen or Daytona, someone with one win will be eliminated from the playoff based on a tiebreaker on points.

Martin Truex Jr. is No. 4 in points, but he does not have a win and desperately needs one to earn a spot in the round of 16 at Darlington Raceway in South Carolina. Ryan Blaney is second in points, but he, too, is without a victory.

Should they both land a first-place finish at a race, someone like Austin Cindric or Chase Briscoe could be staying at home next month.

"We're racing 19 (Cindric) — obviously for points — and try to win the race," Blaney said after making a late pass to finish fifth.

No one could catch

Harvick in his No. 4 Ford following a restart with 35 laps to go at the FireKeepers Casino 400. Bubba Wallace had maybe the best chance to compete with Harvick, but he choose a path for the No. 23 Toyota that he later lamented.

"I want to win so bad, and this was the best opportunity," Wallace said after finishing second following his first career pole.

Harvick, meanwhile, won his 59th career Cup event and ended a 65-race drought that started after winning his ninth race during the 2020 playoffs at Bristol Motor Speedway.

"I've been through longer winless streaks," he said with a shrug.

That's a fact: Harvick's longest streak is 115 races from 2007 to 2010.

The Stewart-Haas Racing driver went to Michigan sitting at No. 17 in points and left in ninth

place. It was his sixth win overall at the two-mile oval. The 46-year-old insisted he didn't need the latest result to boost his confidence.

"Maybe I'm overconfident," he said. "I expect to win until the door closes."

Ford certainly needed assurances it could win with the Next Gen car, considering Chevrolet has dominated the series with 13 victories, including four for points leader Chase Elliott.

Harvick gave Ford its first Cup win in two months and fifth of the season to pull into a second-place tie with Toyota.

"We just have to keep pushing and try to run with those (top) guys and we have," Harvick crew chief Rodney Childers said. "If we can do that in the playoffs and be consistent and get through a round or two, we can make some noise."

Serena Williams calling it a career

Saying "the countdown has begun," 23-time Grand Slam champion Serena Williams announced Tuesday she is ready to step away from tennis so she can turn her focus to having another child and her business interests, presaging the end of a career that transcended sports.

In an essay released Tuesday by Vogue magazine, and a post on Instagram — the sorts of direct-to-fans communication favored these days by celebrities, a category she most definitely fits — Williams was not completely clear on the timeline for her last match, but she made it sound as if that could be at the U.S. Open, which begins Aug. 29 in New

York.

"There comes a time in life when we have to decide to move in a different direction. That time is always hard when you love something so much. My goodness do I enjoy tennis. But now, the countdown has begun," Williams, who turns 41 next month, wrote on Instagram. "I have to focus on being a mom, my spiritual goals and finally discovering a different, but just (as) exciting Serena. I'm gonna relish these next few weeks."

Williams, one of the greatest and most accomplished athletes in the history of her — or any other — sport, wrote in the essay that she does not like the word "retirement" and prefers to think of this stage of her life as "evolving away from tennis, to-

ward other things that are important to me."

"I feel a great deal of pain. It's the hardest thing that I could ever imagine. I hate it. I hate that I have to be at this crossroads," she wrote. "I keep saying to myself, I wish it could be easy for me, but it's not. I'm torn: I don't want it to be over, but at the same time I'm ready for what's next."

That she would be publicly contemplating the end of her playing days is not all that surprising, given her age — her 10 Grand Slam titles after turning 30 are unsurpassed — her history of injuries and her recent record: one victory in a singles match in the past 12 months (that win arrived Monday in Toronto; she is scheduled to play again on Wednesday).

"Serena Williams is a generational, if not multigenerational, talent who had a profound impact on the game of tennis, but an even greater influence on women in sports, business and society. At a time when our nation and the world have wrestled with essential issues of identity, Serena has stood as a singular exemplar of the best of humanity after breaking through countless barriers to her participation and ultimate success," U.S. Open tournament director Stacey Allaster said. "She leaves an indelible legacy of grace and grit that will inspire athletes, female and male, for many generations to come. We can't thank her enough for all she has done for our sport."

Whether you’re a vacationer, traveling businessperson, truck driver or zip-across-the-state-line shopper, wel-come centers are a great place to “stretch your legs,” “wet your whistle,” “get the lay of the land” and discover other activities that keep the quotation-marks indus-try trouncing the brack-ets industry.

Some travelers are truly overjoyed to reach the welcome centers and their facilities. (“State with the world’s largest ball of bellybut-ton lint, meet the family with the world’s small-est bladders!”)

My son is a brochure collector, so he invari-ably makes a bee line for the Wall o’ Bro-chures. These pam-phlets can bring you up to speed on regional museums, stage shows, lakes, eateries and shopping destinations. Brochures for state for-ests are becoming a lit-tle scarcer because of printing all the...well, you know. (“Maybe if Charlie Brown’s friends would furiously wave their hands over the re-maining trees...”)

If you do a lot of trav-eling, you may have no-ticed that some welcome

centers are more up to date than others. Here are the three most com-mon signs you’ll find posted at a welcome



center that is overdue for refurbishing:

1. “Yes, we are a proud sanc-tu-ary state for dodo birds.”

2. “We are not respon-sible for any items left unattended in your con-veyance, but we cheer-fully offer free access to our dueling grounds if pilferage does occur.”

3. “If you enjoy your visit, be sure to tell all your friends – unless it’s still just you and Eve. Oh, and check out our fig-leaf emporium.”

Modern welcome centers offer more and more amenities: phone charging stations; free Wi-Fi; short tourism films, etcetera. 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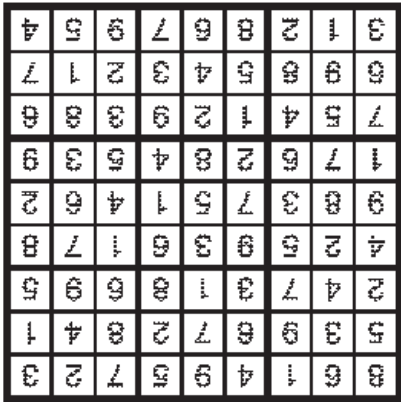
