A quick stop at a North Ellington Parkway convenience store was costly for a Lewisburg man Saturday.

He left the store to find his red 2012 Chevrolet Camaro — containing a backpack filled with \$15,000 cash gone, along with a woman passenger he admitted he hardly knows.

Video footage from the store shows the woman leaving the store northbound on Nashville Highway.

The victim told Lewisburg police he'd picked up the woman a short time earlier in the Chapel Hill area. He'd met her "a few weeks" ago and didn't know her age or address, but thought

she was from Lewisburg. The money in the backpack was going to be used to purchase another vehicle, and the woman was aware of its contents, the victim said. Other thefts reported to area authorities:

•A blue 1997 Harley Davidson Road King motorcycle was stolen Sunday from a Nashville Highway parking lot, police were told.

The bike had been parked next to Big Wash Tub several days earlier when the rider was arrested by Lewisburg police during a traffic stop.

•A cell phone was taken from a Verona Canev Road home between 3-11 p.m. Monday, according to a Marshall County Sheriff's Office report. A suspect was named.

A man was charged with kidnapping Thursday after allegedly blocking his girlfriend from leaving their Franklin Road home.

Michael Lee Morris, 39, allegedly held the woman against her will from 10 a.m.-1:15 p.m. when she was able to call 911. During that period, she told police, Morris

struck her when she attempted to leave or get her phone.

The victim was able to briefly access the phone, but Morris allegedly grabbed it and cut off the call when he realized she'd called for help. An officer responding to an "open line" 911 call spotted Morris running into a wooded area. LPD Officer Gunnar Southerland found and arrested Morris moments later. Morris was also

charged with domestic assault and interference with 911 calls.

An Alabama woman accused of joyriding and possession of methamphetamine told Lewisburg police a truck she allegedly took without permission Thursday was "a gift from God" and she didn't consider her drive stealing.

Jessica Baca, of Geraldine, Alabama, who has relatives in Marshall County, said she needed a house and vehicle. She saw a "for sale" sign outside a Cornersville Road home, knocked on the door, and no one answered. She told Officer Dustin

Turner a truck was in the yard with keys on its dashboard. "She stated she be-

lieved this was a gift from God, so she took the vehicle, but did not believe she stole it," Turner said in his report. Baca told Turner she

drove around the area looking for a place to live, and picked up what she said was a "free couch on the side of the road." Eventually, Baca returned the truck to the Cornersville Road home and was driven by a relative to a motel. A bag containing 0.66

grams of meth and two glass pipes were confiscated as Baca was being arrested, Turner's report said. The meth charge and a charge of possession of drug paraphernalia were added.

"It's my son's birthday," a woman accused of shoplifting more than \$500 worth of items from the Lewisburg Walmart cried as she spoke to police Monday.

Advance warning by Walmart loss prevention personnel didn't deter Hailey Whitehead of Shelbyville from attempting to leave without paying, police said. Security personnel told LPD Col. Jenny Frost they watched Whitehead place items in her buggy and go through the selfcheckout area.

She was stopped, told to pay for the 55 items, and left anyway, police said. Many of the listed items, which took up multiple pages of a printed police report, were women's makeup items. Whitehead, who al-

legedly denied taking some of the items, was cited for shoplifting and banned from the store. Records show Whitehead has also been previously charged with shoplifting in Shelbyville.

("They filmed the whole journey out in the desert somewhere. I'll bet Magellan had Neil Armstrong on speed-dial.")




