### RIVALRY RENEWED

#### Rockets race past Bulldogs in battle of North and South

CORNERSVILLE All last year, the Cornersville Bulldogs had bragging rights after downing the Forrest Rockets for the first time in 25 years.

Although the Bulldogs (0-2) played an inspired second half, the Forrest Rockets (2-0) had a little too much in the tank for the Bulldogs to corral and Forrest bounced back in the win column against its rival to the south on Friday night with a 23-6 win over Cornersville.

"It's an in-county rival. They had bragging rights all last year and it feels good to bring it back home to us," Rocket coach Eli Stephenson said.

The Rockets took home bragging rights, largely in part to the efforts of Gavin Grissom, who connected on field goals of 30, 26 and 40 yards to help the Rockets put away Corners-

While the first Forrest drive of the night ended with a punt, and took barely 1:45 off the clock, Forrest took full advantage of its second drive of the night after holding the Bulldogs to a three-and-out.

After taking possession on their own 38-yard line, a steady mix of Chris Davis and Tayton Swift pushed the Rockets into the red zone before Davis capped the drive on a six-yard run with 4:31 left in the quarter to put Forrest up, 7-0, after Grissom's successful

The Bulldogs responded and move the ball well into Rocket territory before the drive stalled near the 28-yard line and Cornersville turned the ball over on downs following an incomplete fourthdown pass.

Forrest played the clock control game on its next possession and milked nearly seven minutes of the second quarter off the clock.

While the Bulldog defense kept the Rockets out of the end zone, Grissom hit his first of three field goals on the night, coming on a 30-yard boot with 5:06.

After the score, the Rocket defense held the Bulldogs to their second three-and-out of the night, giving Forrest the ball back with just under four minutes left to pad their lead.

They did just that as Grissom split the uprights on a 26-yard field goal as time expired,

giving Forrest a 13-0 lead at the half.

While the Bulldogs struggled to get the chains moving in the first half, mustering up just 52 first-half yards, Cornersville took full advantage of a Rocket turnover in the third quarter and bruising junior running back Ben Franklin cashed in on the opportunity.

With the Rockets driving into Bulldog territory, the Rockets coughed the ball up on the 15-yard line with 6:33 left in the third.

The first play following the turnover, Franklin bounced to the outside and raced 85 yards to the end zone to put the Bulldogs on the board.

Following Franklin's jaunt, Cornersville got exactly what it needed and forced a Rocket punt with 3:42 left in the third, but fumbled the ball back to the Rockets on the first play after the punt.

Taking over on the Bulldog 30-yard line, Forrest needed just four plays to cash in on the turnover when Liam Bell punched it in the end zone from six yards out with just over a minute to go in the third.

While Cornersville played an inspired brand of defense in the second half, the Rockets added to their lead in the fourth quarter, coming on Grissom's 40-yard field goal with 6:28 left in the game.

Even though it went down as a loss, Bulldog head coach Shelby Waddell was pleased with his team's effort in the four-quarter battle.

"Our kids are a group of fighters. They're tough kids. I knew we would come out and play inspired in the second half. I thought our defense played their tails off tonight. It was a lot of the same kids going both ways and special teams. They're playing

SHELBYVILLE Last week in the Marshall County Tigers' season opener, head coach Thomas Osteen was pleased with his team's win, but knew his offense was capable of more effectively pushing the ball downfield via the pass game.

In Week 2 against Shelbyville Central (0-2), that was a key focus of the offensive scheme and the Tigers (2-0) showcased just what they're capable of in a 36-14 win over the Golden' Eagles.

"It was definitely in the game plan. They pretty much keep seven
