Chapel Hill delays food measures

Two ordinances on the Chapel Hill Mayor and Board of Aldermen agenda Monday night were both deferred to future meetings after opposition from local restaurant owners.

Both ordinances were facing a final vote after previous approvals at earlier meetings.

A proposed fats, oils, and grease policy brought the most opposition.

The measure was initially proposed months ago by the town's consulting engineer, particularly in light of plans to construct a new waste water treatment facility.

Non water soluble fats and oils introduced into the waste water system create maintenance issues by clogging pipes.

Hugo Lopez, owner of Amigo's Restaurant, expressed concerns about the impact that the ordinance, as currently

written, would have on food service establishments in town.

Lopez argued that restaurants already had grease traps and

similar devices and that some of the proposed requirements could cost upwards of \$15,000.

He suggested a meeting in which both engi-

neers and restaurateurs were present to discuss the issue so that the aldermen could understand the full impact
