CHPD recognized for excellence



Chapel Hill Police Chief Andrew Kon (right) and Officer Todd Knois were recipients of the 2022 Award for Excellence in Law Enforcement presented by the Department of Justice, Office of the US Attorney, Middle District of Tennessee. The award was presented by US Attorney Mark Wildasin in recognition for their successful federal prosecution of Laqueston Goff in the 2017 Depot Street shooting case. Goff was arrested in July of that year after a June incident in which he fired into a home of Depot Street after a domestic dispute. At the time of his arrest, he was charged with aggravated domestic assault, reckless endangerment, and unlawful possession of a firearm. The officers were nominated by Assistant US Attorney Rob McGuire who prosecuted the case which ultimately resulted in Goff receiving a 15 year prison sentence.

Henry Horton wins excellence award

NASHVILLE – The Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) has honored Henry Horton State Park in Chapel Hill with the Excellence in Interpretation Award among the 56 Tennessee State Parks. The award is part of the annual Tennessee State Parks Awards of Excellence.

“Henry Horton State Park does a great job of capitalizing on the natural assets of the Duck River,” TDEC Commissioner David Salyers said. “The park enhances the visitor experience with content involving

all ages, and we are proud to announce this award for the park.”

The Interpretation category of the awards is for parks that have demonstrated the ability to provide high quality and varied interpretive activities, which may include guided hikes, workshops, living history, games, special events, interpretive panels, exhibits, interpretive trail guides, and video presentations.

The park unveiled a new visitors center and restaurant last year. Interpretive themes at the park focused on the Duck River that runs

through the middle of the park. A Duck River Education Room provides inspirational and educational content on the historical, ecological, and recreational value of the river.

Visitors can learn more about wetlands and aquatic species in a variety of ways – a path circumnavigating the wetland, a quiet observation platform, and another trail and viewing tower to see how the wetland connects to the river. Visitors with children can enjoy the content in fun, engaging ways.

Notice of Marshall County Election Office Location, Dates and Hours Open, Disabled & Elderly Voters with an Inaccessible Polling Place

Notice is hereby given to any elderly voter or voter with a disability that if such voter's Polling Place is inaccessible, such voter has the right to vote early by absentee ballot or at the Marshall County Election Commission Office on Election Day. Such voter shall complete an affidavit at the Election Commission Office stating that such voter's designated voting location, to the best of the voter's knowledge, does not comply with the provisions of the Public Law 98-435 of the 98th Congress. The affidavit must be received by the Marshall County Election Commission Office by October 29, 2022.

As an alternative to voting at the Marshall County Election Commission Office on Election Day, an elderly voter or voter with a disability assigned to vote in a precinct where the polling place is inaccessible may vote by absentee ballot or during the Early Voting period. The last day a written request for an absentee ballot application may be received by the Marshall County Election Commission Office is November 1, 2022.

The last day to register to vote in order to be eligible to vote in the November 8, 2022 Election is Tuesday, October 11, 2022. Voter registrations postmarked by this date will be processed.

The Marshall County Election Commission is located at the Hardison Office Annex, 230 College Street, Suite 120, Lewisburg, TN 37091. The office is open 8 a.m. - 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. Office telephone is (931) 359-4894.

The Marshall County Election Commission office will be closed October 10, 2022 in observance of Columbus Day.

Federal or TN State government issued photo ID is required to vote, unless an exception applies. To learn more about the law and its exceptions, please call Marshall County Election Commission or visit GoVoteTN.gov.

Shall we toast the 40th anniversary of "Cheers"?

My brother and I rarely saw eye-to-eye about TV viewing choices in our teens and twenties, but we were both among the handful of people who imbibed the hilarity of a sitcom that NBC unleashed upon an unresponsive world on September 30, 1982.



You may remember "Cheers" as the hit show (set in a Boston pub) that ran for 11 seasons, won 28 Emmy awards, drew 93 million viewers for its finale and spawned the equally long-running spin-off "Frasier"; but "last call" almost came early, as the show ranked #74 out of 77 programs in the Nielsen ratings its first season. Belly up to the bar? More like go belly-up!

NBC executives stuck with the underappreciated freshman show because they lacked a viable replacement and because they had faith that the adult, sophisticated humor would eventually catch on with audiences more accustomed to "CHiPs" and "Diff'rent Strokes."

They were quite the optimists. Some folks in my neighborhood took several months to decide that "Cheers"

wasn't an infomercial for a furniture store. ("We ain't spendin' no more money on tables an' cheers! Just pull up a box if you need it.")

I don't drink, but that didn't matter, because as the theme song pointed out, "people are all the same." Of course, that line became a little awkward in later years when Ted Danson was pulling in \$250,000 per episode and the others...weren't.

I must confess that when my wife and I were newlyweds, we missed the penultimate season of "Cheers" in favor of the short-lived ABC soap opera "Homefront"; but that was my only straying. My viewing was as reliable as "the little pop thing" on Norm's Thanksgiving turkey.

I keep hearing about a "Frasier" reboot; but so far, the existing 275 episodes of "Cheers" have been allowed to speak for themselves (perhaps with slurred speech, but still for themselves).

In the Reagan-Bush era, Americans longed to congregate "where everybody knows your name." I'm not so sure that citizens today want everyone knowing their name, especially if by "everyone" you mean the 87,000 new IRS agents in the Inflation Reduction Act.

We used to be able to

enjoy our catchphrases such as "NORM!" But in an era of supply-chain issues, rising interest rates and lingering pandemic protocols, I just don't think "NEW norm!" has the same appeal.

Earlier comedies had kept viewers wondering about romance, but the creative minds behind "Cheers" brought near-perfection to the Sam and Diane "will they or won't they?" paradigm during the show's first five seasons. Today's artsy streaming shows would never be able to pull it off. ("Will they or won't they? Maybe they already did! It's so &^%\$# dark! Wait...we've been seeing the events in backwards chronological order? Here come the subtitles about the vampire ex-beau with the heroin addiction...")

If know-it-all mail carrier Cliff Clavin were around today spewing trivia, a new cottage industry would spring up. We already have oodles of fact-checkers, but newspapers and networks would begin relying on certified "who-gives-a-crap-ers."

Most viewers today raise a glass to live sporting events instead of sitcoms; but "Cheers" spoke to the Human Condition, and reruns featuring its lovable losers will spread a message of common humanity no matter where humankind goes.

"Making your way on Mars soil today/Takes everything you've got/Taking a break from death-ray punctures/Sure would help a lot..."

POLICE BLOTTER

Two concession stands at the Lewisburg youth sports complex on Springplace Road were entered last week, police reports said.

A large amount of change was stolen Monday, Sept. 12, or Tuesday, Sept. 13, from the concession stand at Bobby Hurt Football Field.

The money had been in a change bucket which a youth football league representative said normally contains much more than remained. The official estimated around half the contents were missing, Merchandise and more change was scattered around the floor, police said.

An unused cash register, containing no money, was destroyed. No attempt was made to open the main cash register, the report said.

Entry appeared to have been made by forcing two rolling doors.

The concession stand at a baseball field was also entered, with nothing reported taken, and an unsuccessful attempt made to enter a storage garage.

The catalytic converter was cut off First Baptist Church of Cornersville's bus before Sunday morning's service, according to a Marshall County Sheriff's Office report.

Security video showed the device being taken around 6:40 a.m.

Healthy Halloween snack options

Then place thin vertical slices of mozzarella cheese in a haphazard pattern to replicate the look of gauze on a mummy. Two pieces of sliced black olives serve as the eyes.

- **White, orange and yellow platter:** Simulate the look of candy corns' white, orange and yellow color palette with healthier offerings. Stack cauliflower, or another white food like monterey jack cheese, baby carrots and yellow bell peppers on a platter. Serve with your favorite dip.

- **Deviled brains:** Turn regular deviled eggs into something more sinister for Halloween buffet tables. Simply add food coloring to the filling to create a pinkish-brown hue that resembles a human brain. Then use a piping bag fitted with a thin icing tip to pipe the shape of brains onto the hardboiled egg halves.

- **Veggie skeleton:** Use assorted vegetable slices, cheese sticks, fruits, nuts, and more to inspire a Halloween-inspired charcuterie board. Arrange everything to resemble a skeleton on the platter.

- **Ghostly bananas:** Insert popsicle sticks into the bot-

oms of bananas and freeze until solid. Prepare white melting chocolate according to directions, then dip the frozen bananas into it. While wet, stick on two mini chocolate chips to make the eyes of the ghosts. Place in the refrigerator to harden.

- **Spider crackers:** Use buttery Ritz® crackers or something similar for this recipe. Spread a relatively thick layer of cream cheese (or peanut butter if allergies are not a concern) on one cracker. Cut thin pretzel sticks in half and use four on each side to make spider legs, sticking them into the cream cheese. Top with another cracker and secure to the cream cheese. "And Peter followed Him (Jesus) afar off, even into the palace of the high priest: and he sat with the servants, and warmed himself at the fire." - Mark 14:55

In Mark 14, as the Lord Jesus leaves the upper room, He told His disciples that they all would deny Him. Peter refused to believe he would. In fact Peter speaks up in verse 29, "Although all shall be offended, yet not I." Then Jesus tells Peter that he would deny Him three times before the rooster crows twice.

As they come to the Garden of Gethsemane, the Lord warned Peter and the

other disciples to "Watch ye and pray lest you enter into temptation." In other words, have spiritual discernment and be engaged in preemptive prayer. Pray beforehand. Peter, like so many of us, was not prepared to face what came upon him. Once the Lord Jesus was arrested, He went through a kangaroo court. It was the high priest and the Jewish council under the cover of darkness that conducted this unofficial trial. Meanwhile Peter would go through his own unofficial trial conducted by the servants of the high priest.

As Peter warmed himself with the crowd, a maid ser-

vant of the high priest took on the role of the prosecuting attorney, and in verse 67, she looks at him and asks Peter if he was with Jesus of Nazareth, who was just condemned to die. But Peter lies in verse 68, "I know not, nor understand what you are saying." Then Peter, trying to avoid her questions goes out into the porch, and the rooster crows the first time. In verse 69 the maid saw Peter again and shouted out her accusation against him, "This is one of them." Peter once again denies the accusation. A little while later, all the servants get involved as witnesses accusing Peter, and he reacts by cursing and

swearing saying, "I know not this man who you are talking about." Immediately after Peter's third denial the official verdict in this unofficial trial was declared by the acting judge. When that rooster, the judge of Peter's trial, crows the second time he declared the guilty verdict against Peter. It says, Peter "thought thereon and wept."

Dear child of God when we, like Peter, "follow Jesus afar off" we can find ourselves warming up to the enemies of our Master. When we "follow Jesus afar off" we find ourselves lying to others and to ourselves. When we "follow Jesus afar off"

we make excuses of why we can't. When we "follow Jesus afar off" we find ourselves using foul language. When we "follow Jesus afar off" we find ourselves eventually denying the One we love most.

Many Christians find themselves "following Jesus afar off," afraid like Peter. How can this be avoided? Draw near to God watching and praying (Hebrews 10:22). Come close to your Heavenly Father and confess whatever has pulled you away (1 John 1:9), and He will lovingly restore you by His sovereign grace.



Tigers thump Hillwood on Homecoming

LEWISBURG — All Homecoming week, Marshall County coach Thomas Osteen preached to his team about playing up to its standard, regardless of the opponent.

The No. 5 ranked Tigers delivered as Marshall County piled up big numbers in the first half en route to a 45-7 win on Homecoming night.

“Really happy with the way we handled the week. We wanted the kids to have good memories and a good time throughout the week, but that being said, the most important thing is to play well on Friday night,” Osteen said.

“We talked about no matter who the opponent was to play to our standard all night. From the very start, I feel like we did that.”

Marshall County (5-0, 3-0) exerted its will against Hillwood (1-4, 1-2), building a huge 42-0 lead by halftime.

The Tiger offense was clicking on all cylinders and utilized a balanced attack against the Hilltoppers.

The Tigers rushed for 200 yards and were led by Antomme Cowthorn’s 50-yard effort.

He found the end zone twice in the first half, highlighted by a 43-yard score on the game’s opening drive.

Kamariq Perryman and Jakavan Curry also found the end zone on rushing touchdowns as well.

The running back by committee saw eight different ball carriers for the Tigers average over nine yards per carry.

With senior tailback Demari Braden nursing an ankle injury, Osteen was pleased with the effort the Tigers gave on the ground in his absence.

“We want to get De-

Antomme Cowthorn had a good night. Jakavan Curry, Kamariq Perryman — really had a running back by committee tonight. Those guys did a good job,” Osteen said.

The Tigers also were efficient through the air with junior quarterback Silas Teat connecting on 11-of-16 attempts for 13 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

Junior Jayden Randolph was the top target of the night, hauling in six catches for 88 yards.

Tight end John Morgan Thomas caught a 12-yard touchdown pass and sophomore Aja Jones added a nine-yard touchdown reception.

“I feel like we protected the quarterback and we were pretty clean for the most part. Silas had a good game. Happy with how efficient we were on offense and how

efficient we were on defense as well,” Osteen said.

Hillwood’s best starting field position came late in the first quarter after a 55-yard kickoff return put the Hilltoppers in Tiger territory.

But playing a bend-don’t-break style of defense, Marshall County forced a 24-yard field goal try that was blocked with 21 seconds left in the frame.

Of 118 first-half yards by Hillwood, 59 came on screen pass to Zay Sanders.

Other than that, the Tigers played a lockdown defense that didn’t budge against the Hilltoppers.

Curry, along with Marquay Allen and Thomas Beech led the team with five tackles apiece.

Perryman and Brock Anderson also recorded a tackle for loss, while Isaiah Stewart added a

Titans coach Mike Vrabel doubling down after 0-2 start, rout

NASHVILLE — Tennessee coach Mike Vrabel has two-time NFL rushing champ Derrick Henry, and the reigning AP NFL Coach of the Year is doubling down.

Yes, despite the Titans' first 0-2 start in a decade and coming off the ugliest loss of his tenure in a 41-7 loss to Buffalo on Monday night.

Vrabel is focusing on what his Titans can do rather than listening to the rising chorus of fans eager to fire second-year offensive coordinator Todd Downing or even general manager Jon Robinson's recent draft failures after six straight winning seasons and three straight playoff berths.

"This isn't all of a sudden the time for wholesale changes," Vrabel said Tuesday. "This is about getting back to the basics and what we believe in, what we've

had success in, and making sure that that everybody sees it the same way that I do."

That means trimming what the Titans are trying to do and do it better. Vrabel said he wants to get back to fundamentals and technique, making sure everyone understands what they're being asked to do.

The Titans have gone from being the AFC's No. 1 seed with a 12-5 record last season to being among the NFL's five remaining 0-2 teams. That number will decrease with the Titans hosting the Las Vegas Raiders (0-2) on Sunday.

Henry was on his way to leading the NFL in rushing a third straight season when he broke his right foot last October. Now he has just 107 yards rushing through two games and was held to 25 yards on 13 carries by Buffalo. Henry said he prides himself on being a playmaker

for Tennessee, which he didn't do.

"We just weren't good enough. At all," Henry said.

What's working

The opening drive of the game. The Titans have scored on each drive of their first two games, showing the type of offense that Vrabel wants and Tennessee needs much more of as the two-time defending AFC South champs.

What needs help

The offense. Since scoring 13 points in the first 30 minutes of the season, the Titans have managed just 14 points in the past six quarters. Worse, the man they've built their offense around in Henry has an offensive line struggling to open holes. Sticking with the same approach doesn't mean no changes.

"I think we would consider everything at this point in time with every

position group," Vrabel said.

Stock up

Ryan Stonehouse. The undrafted rookie punter from Colorado State leads the NFL with an average of 56.2 yards per punt, and he's tied for the league lead with 12 punts already this season.

Stonehouse ranks sixth in net average, and only three other punters have landed more than his five punts inside the opponents 20-yard line.

Stock down

Kyle Philips. The rookie had a 46-yard return early in his NFL debut, but now the fifth-round pick out of UCLA has fumbled a punt in each of the first two games near his own goal line. Even when the Titans went to safety Amani Hooker for a punt return, the safety also fumbled a punt though Tennessee recovered that one.

Injured

The Titans' thin offensive line depth took a major hit when three-time Pro Bowl left tackle Taylor Lewan hurt his right knee on Tennessee's opening offensive play and was carted off the sideline.

Vrabel said Lewan still was being evaluated Tuesday. That was the same knee Lewan tore his ACL in October 2020.

They may have gotten better news with starting outside linebacker Bud Dupree. He hurt a hip after 11 snaps, but Vrabel said he didn't think it would be anything long term.

Key number

A total of 30 teams have started 0-2 since 1990 in the NFL and

still reached the playoffs out of 265 teams. The Titans started 1-4 in 2002 and made the AFC championship game in Oakland — losing to the Raiders.

Next steps

Try to avoid the first 0-3 start for this franchise since 2009 when the Titans lost their first six. After hosting the Raiders, the Titans will play four of the next five on the road. Two of the next three are wrapped around their bye.

After the Raiders, two of the next three games are against Indy, the popular pick to win the AFC South, with the Colts slightly ahead of the Titans with an 0-1-1 start this season.

Bills OL Hart suspended 1 game for swing at Titans player

ORCHARD PARK, N.Y. (AP) — The NFL suspended Buffalo Bills backup offensive lineman Bobby Hart for one game on Tuesday, a day after he took a swing at a Titans player and instead struck a Tennessee coach in the head following a 41-7 win.

Hart was suspended without pay for unsportsmanlike conduct and won't be eligible to rejoin the team until after Buffalo plays at Miami on Sunday.

Hart has the right to appeal the decision reached by the league's

VP of football operations Jon Runyan.

In a letter sent to Hart, Runyan said the altercation happened near the end zone as both teams were leaving the field. Runyan said Hart sought out a Titans player, whose identity was not revealed, and had to be held back by a coach as other players shook hands in the end zone near the stadium tunnel leading to the teams' locker rooms.

Hart is then accused of closing his fist and throwing a punch which struck a Titans' coach, whose identity was also not revealed.

"Your aggressive conduct could have caused serious injury, and clearly does not reflect the high standards of sportsmanship expected of a professional," Runyan wrote.

Hart played 17 snaps on Monday, including seven on special teams, and is the primary

backup to left guard Rodger Saffold.

He's an eighth-year player who is familiar with the Titans after appearing in three games with Tennessee last season. He was waived by Tennessee in November and then claimed by the Bills.

Bulldogs charge into lead, hold off Collinwood

On a beautiful late summer evening the Cornersville Bulldogs (1-3, 1-0 Region 5-1A), needing to keep their Region 5 record spotless, made the long trip to southern Wayne County to face the Collinwood Trojans (0-3, 0-0 Region 5-1A).

Coach Shelby Waddell's Bulldogs built a 20-0 halftime lead, then had to fight tooth and nail as the hometown Trojans came out in the third quarter with flames in their eyes, pulling to within a touchdown and extra point of taking the lead. The Bulldog defense hunkered down, swatted down and beat back Collinwood's attempt to come back and in the end, the Bulldogs left the sunken bowl field with a 20-14 win.

Cornersville junior Ben Franklin led the Bulldogs offensively with three touchdown runs, but Franklin's defensive play along with Mason Calahan, Riley Qualls, Blaine Woodard, Blake Estes, and Beau Schilieg led the way with their backs against the wall. Despite the hometown crowd urging Collinwood on, the Bulldogs stopped the Trojans in a hard-fought slobberknocker fourth quarter.

As is the case when these teams meet, penalty flags flew often on both sides.

"Hats off to our kids, with the adversity we faced in the second half, we found a way, we played the next play, and I am so proud of them for that," Coach Shelby Waddell said. "We have a lot of kids with a lot of heart and a lot of pride in Cornersville. We had some kids that stood up, we found a way and that's what good teams do, and it was on display tonight. Our defense stood the test. I am so proud of them."

The Collinwood elev-

en won the coin toss and deferred to the second half, so the Trojans kicked off to the Bulldogs and after a nice return by Austin Cooper, Cornersville began play at the Collinwood 49-yard line.

Qualls rambled for eight yards and Franklin ran for a first down to the Trojan 39-yard line.

Franklin then burst through the Collinwood end zone for the touchdown, but a holding call negated the score.

Calahan then rushed for 8 yards and, on the next play, Franklin got loose. This time, no flag littered the field and when Joseth Plama's extra point split the uprights, the Bulldogs led 7-0 with 10:08 left in the first quarter.

Collinwood then went on a long drive, stymied by penalty flags, and boosted by hard knock running with quarterback Fletcher Thompson and running back Nick Sanderson supplying the energy.

The drive fizzled at the Bulldog 25-yard line as Thompson coughed up the ball and a host of Bulldogs pounced on the loose pigskin.

The Bulldogs maintained possession and a 7-0 lead as the first quarter.

Cornersville began the second quarter pounding the ball with

Calahan, Qualls, and Franklin, who broke loose off the left side and ran for a 38-yard touchdown. Plama split the uprights with 9:32 left in the first half, Cornersville now led 14-0.

The Cornersville defense was led in the first half by a sack and steady pressure by defensive lineman senior David Metcalf.

The Bulldogs would again strike paydirt after a Trojan turnover on downs and a 29-yard run by Franklin, who on a wide pitch from quarterback Woodard ran untouched into the end zone from the four-yard line. This time the PAT was wide right and with 2 seconds left in the first half Cornersville led 20-0.

The second half began with Collinwood receiving the ball and on first down Thompson found wide-out Cayden Lee on a 38-yard pass play down the right sideline.

Khi Canty and Qualls saved the touchdown for the Bulldogs but on second down Blake Whitten for the Trojans scampered through the line for a 10-yard touchdown and Whitten added the PAT with less than two minutes gone in the third quarter, cutting the Cornersville lead to 20-7.

Cornersville received the ball and on first down from their own 22-yard line Franklin

found daylight and outran the entire Trojan defense for a 78-yard touchdown, but a holding penalty negated the score.

The Bulldogs could not muster a first down and punted to the Trojans who promptly moved downfield and climaxed the drive with a 13-yard touchdown run by Nick Sanderson. Whitten again booting the PAT with 6:37 left in the third quarter and the Trojans were within 20-14.

By the fourth quarter, tempers flared and penalty flags flew as

almost every play was hampered by a flag.

Collinwood, with possession and the clock running, knocked at the Cornersville door but an unsportsmanlike penalty pushed them back to the Bulldog 22-yard line.

The Cornersville defense just may have taken a big step together as they bent but didn't break, played tough on a hostile field, and withstood numerous penalties to bring home a "W."

Bulldog defenders Metcalf, who got a couple of more sacks, Woodard, Qualls, Calahan,

Schilieg, and Franklin showed their ability on defense that can only aid Cornersville as the second half of the season begins.

The Bulldogs entertain the Eagleville Eagles on a Homecoming Friday night in another important Region 5 contest.
