

When can kids trick-or-treat without an adult?

Jack-o'-lanterns on front porches and crisp air are signs that Halloween is right around the corner. Costumes have likely been chosen and bags of candy are undoubtedly hidden in the back of pantries ready to delight trick-or-treaters.

Trick-or-treating is one of the most anticipated components of celebrating Halloween, and scores of kids venture door-to-door seeking the best chocolate bars and other candies. Children typically are chaperoned by their parents or other adults on trick-or-treating ventures. But some day kids will inevitably ask if they can go out alone with their friends. How can parents know when kids are mature enough to go it alone on Halloween?

There are no firm rules regarding when a child can go out trick-or-treating unsupervised. Each child is different, so there's no uniform answer as to when kids can trick-or-treat without mom and dad in tow. But parents on the fence can consider the following guidance as they try to determine when it's alright for kids to trick-or-treat alone.

- Find out who is going trick-or-treating.

Parents may feel more comfortable letting their children wander if they are reassured a group of friends is going en masse rather than the child going solo. There is safety in numbers, so trick-or-treating in large groups is a good sign.

- Judge the neighborhood critically. Neighborhoods also can be a factor to consider. What may be a safe environment during the day may no longer be so safe when darkness descends and children are unchaperoned. If parents recognize the neighborhood tows the line between being safe and dangerous, they may want to push off trick-or-treating alone until their children are older. But even the neighborhoods parents would characterize as "safe" are not invulnerable to safety issues. It pays to check where registered child predators live nearby, and that information is available to the public in most areas.

- How responsible is the child? Some kids mature faster than others. Parents need to factor in their children's dispositions when they consider if kids should be allowed out to trick-or-treat without adults.

- Check in about the game plan. When chil-

dren get older, trick-or-treating may be less about grabbing candy and more about spending time with friends, potentially causing mischief. Parents should recognize that kids left to their own devices may be more inclined to act foolishly. It helps to have an idea of what the group of kids will be doing when they go trick-or-treating and how long they plan to be out.

Three die at rail crossing

A collision with a train killed three siblings in Chapel Hill on Saturday. At approximately 1:30 p.m., the Toyota Corolla driven by Duvraska Coronado, 22, was crossing over the CSX tracks at Depot Street when it was struck by a southbound train. Killed in the accident were Duvraska, her sister Magyory Coronado, 26, and brother Welengang Coronado, 29. All three victims were residents of Nashville. Another train parked on the second track at the crossing apparently screened their view of the oncoming train. The accident revived discussions of the safety of that rail crossing which offers one lane access either under or over the tracks without gates or warning lights. CSX, in a statement, said that traffic warning devices at railroad crossings fell under the oversight of the Tennessee Department of Transportation. TDOT issued a statement that Depot Street and the crossing fell under the jurisdiction of the town of Chapel Hill. A GoFundMe account established for burial expenses and to fly the mother of the siblings to Nashville from their native Venezuela has, at press time, reached almost \$32,000 of a \$36,000 goal.

Unemployment rates drop across state

NASHVILLE – Every county in Tennessee experienced lower unemployment rates in August, according to new data released by the Department of Labor and Workforce Development. For the month, 89 counties recorded rates below 5%, while the remaining six counties came in with rates higher than 5%, but less than 10%.

Williamson County's

unemployment rate was the lowest in Tennessee during August. At 2.3%, the county's rate dropped by 0.3 of a percentage point from its July figure of 2.6%.

Cheatham County came in with the state's second-lowest rate for the month at 2.5%, a 0.3 of a percentage point drop when compared to the previous month. Moore County's rate was the third-lowest in August at 2.6%, also down 0.3 of a percentage point.

Marshall County finished the month with a rate of 3.4%, down from

3.8% in July.

Perry County recorded the state's highest jobless number for the month at 5.6%. Its new rate accounted for a 0.7 of a percentage point drop from its July rate of 6.3%.

Bledsoe County had the second-highest rate in August at 5.4% but its rate dropped by 0.7 of a percentage point for the month. With the third-highest rate, Shelby County's new figure of 5.3% was down 0.7 of a percentage point from its July rate.

STATEMENT FROM MAYOR JIM BINGHAM

This statement is in response to a news story which was published by Fox 17 news on September 14, 2022, titled “Lewisburg Mayor knew about bad checks written by city manager and treasurer, did nothing.”

The gist of the news coverage creates an implication that I had knowledge of potential mismanagement of public funds during my tenure as the elected Mayor of the City of Lewisburg or was somehow involved in a cover-up of public information to the detriment of the City which I am proud to serve.

Implicit in the Fox 17 news coverage was that I had knowledge of the overdrafts *while they were being written* and I was complicit in the issuing of those checks. **This implication is not true. I learned of the overdrafts the same day as the City Council which was 6 weeks after they were written.**

When informed, I proactively began taking steps to stop any unnecessary spending and I asked the City Council to enlarge the Budget committee that would include the Mayor and a council member along with other measures to expand oversight of the budget. The City Council also required the City Treasurer to report the bank balance every Friday. I then created and appointed a Charter Revision Committee to revise the Charter that led to the potential budget shortfall.

Those measures resulted a bank balance of \$3,143,039 as of Friday, September 16, 2022. A financial success story.

The Mayor or Council members are not allowed to write, nor do they review checks before they are written.

At my day job, we recently underwent a major upgrade of our security cameras.

Yes, shoplifting has gotten bad enough and technology has gotten good enough that we have made this major investment.

Retailers have come to the sad realization that they face losses both from the traditional lowlife thieves and the thrill-seeking youngsters who rationalize, “Hey, the store has insurance!”

I experienced an even earlier brush with surveillance (or faux surveillance) when I was in elementary school and desperately needed to use the restroom at my father’s office. Some comedian wannabe had placed a “Smile! You’re on ‘Candid Camera!’” sticker smackdab on the inside of the door. Luckily, I was later able to BUY a giant-size Ex-Lax instead of shoplifting one.

I’m not sure how much the presence of cameras as deterrents thieves, but the cameras can make employees self-conscious and inclined to repress normal habits. The Jaws of Life are often required to rescue workers who indulge their pent-up urges while driving home. (“You wouldn’t believe how much nose-picking and jock itch-scratching one human can do in the split-second after

the airbag activates!”) Surveillance plans vary widely in accessibility, storage capacity and resolution. (“Are you SURE the suspect didn’t bear a striking resemblance to your baby’s six-week sonogram?”)

You’ve probably seen stories about New York City grocers having to keep cans of SPAM (!) under lock and key. I understand that other items soon to be locked up nationwide are religious tracts, jury duty notices, “honey do” lists and kale fruitcake.

Of course, much of the shoplifting is caused by soft-on-crime DAs and judges. Granted, you can no longer refer to it as “revolving-door justice,” because the thieves usually take the revolving door as well!

Cities that decide not to prosecute thefts under \$1,000 also exacerbate the problem, although a few dummies still wind up serving jail time. (“Okay, my understanding of math in school made me think two \$650 flatscreen TVs would total less than \$1,000. But at least I grasped the important part, about the store once allowing a man to hold a door open for a woman!”)

I’m up late writing this, so I’m tempted to call in sick tomorrow. But then a little voice asks, “What? And give up SHOWBIZ?”

I’m sure my guardian angel will get me to work safely. Guardian angel? That opens another privacy can of worms! Talk about incriminating images stored in the cloud!

"And when they were come to the place, which is called Calvary, there they crucified Him, and the criminals, one on the right hand, and the other on the left. Then said Jesus, Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do. And they parted His raiment, and cast lots." - Luke 23:33,34

Our English word Calvary comes from the Latin and is a translation of the Hebrew "Golgotha", meaning "the place of the skull" (John 19:17). This place was not actually situated on a mount, as is popularly described from our Westernized

mindset, but it actually was a large rounded hill located somewhere outside at the North gate of Jerusalem. No one really knows the history of why this place was called "the skull." Some assume that looking at this rounded hill with its outcropping of rocks that from a distance it actually resembles a skull. Others say, that the site was the place of execution and since a skull is the universal symbol for death that is the reason for its name. The site, north of Jerusalem, where the Lord Jesus was crucified is not exactly known. The main reason is that over the centuries much of the geo-

graphical features have been moved, buried, and destroyed due to the many continued conflicts and wars that have taken place. For example the Lord Jesus Christ prophesied during the last days of His ministry that, "When ye shall see Jerusalem compassed with armies, then know that the desolation thereof is nigh" (Luke 21:20). Some forty years later the Roman army came and surrounded the city of Jerusalem in A.D. 70 destroying the whole city and the Temple by burning it down. After the fire, the Roman soldiers dismantled the large Temple stone blocks in search for the gold that

melted from the horrific fire. All of this fulfilled Christ's prophecy to His disciples that, "Verily I say unto you, There shall not be left here one stone upon another, that shall not be thrown down" (Matthew 24:1,2). Therefore, the exact sites are not clearly known. That is why archeological excavation is so popular in this ancient area.

We may not know the exact location of Calvary, but the "where" is not what is important as "what" took place there. In our verse, as the Lord Jesus is hanging there on the cross as the substitutional sacrifice, He cries out, "Father, forgive them for they

know not what they do."

Calvary is both a horrible and wonderful place. Calvary is horrible in the sense that it is a testimony of our sin crimes against God, and there the innocent Son of God willingly suffered and died upon the cross for all sin. Calvary is also a wonderful place because it is also a testimony of God's love, God's grace, and the eternal forgiveness God provided for the self-confessed sinner. There at Calvary, Jesus Christ took the sin penalty for all who will believe and receive Him as their Lord and Savior.

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

Rockets come up short in shootout vs. Marion Co.

CHAPEL HILL — It was an all out battle at The Rock Friday night between the Forrest Rockets (3-3, 1-1) and the Marion County Warriors (3-3, 1-1), with the Rockets falling just short, 42-35.

Too bad ‘almost’ doesn’t count.

Eli Stephenson’s Rockets left it all on the field, proving their strength and tenacity against setbacks.

“I’m very proud of the way we played,” Stephenson said. “We didn’t run away from the fight, we ran toward it.”

The Rockets didn’t waste any time, coming out on the first possession covering 76 yards over eight plays that resulted in a five-yard touchdown carry from senior Tayton Swift, who led the Rockets offensively with 138

yards.

After the extra point from Gavin Grissom, the Rockets took the lead, 7-0.

Quick to respond, Sam Pickett had a nice kickoff return, placing the Warriors at the 49, where running back E.J. Wilson took over, going the rest of the way on the next drive.

The extra point attempt failed, the Rockets hanging on to the lead at 7-6 with 8:05 left in the first quarter.

It was the Rockets’ turn again with Swift and Liam Bell both completing first downs.

Quarterback Ryan Hill then connected with Chris Davis on a 13-yard pass and on the next play, it was Davis again, taking off on a 31-yard gain to land the Rockets at the seven-yard line.

Bell grabbed another six yards, allowing Hill to dip into the end zone

from the one.

Grissom added the extra point, Forrest extending their lead to 14-6.

Marion County was forced to punt on their next possession thanks to big stops from Luke Swihart and Reggie Pearson.

Things started to really heat up in the second quarter. In five plays, the Warriors dig up their next touchdown, quarterback Tilton Pickett finding S. Pickett on a 38-yard pass.

Marion County successfully attempted the extra two, evening the score at 14-14.

After the Rockets were showered with flags, backing them up to their own 10-yard line, the punt was forced and Marion County took advantage.

With 4:53 left in the half, T. Pickett connected with S. Pickett in the end zone on a 16-yard

pass. The kick was good and the Warriors took a 21-14 lead.

The tussle continued, with a slew of Rockets coming together to keep moving the chains.

Freshman Antonio Marable came up with a 12-yard run, making it easy for Bell to carry out the first down.

Marion County was charged with targeting and encroachment, aiding the Rockets’ move into Warriors territory.

With less than two minutes to go in the half, Hill threw a perfect pass to Carson Yates, who worked his way to the one-yard line, allowing Hill to score with the quarterback keeper on the next play.

The extra point attempt failed, however, leaving the Rockets trailing by one.

Maintaining the status quo, Marion County executed with a handful of plays, finding them-

selves back in the end zone with 28 seconds left in the first half and a 28-20 lead.

Entering the second half, the Warriors consistently dug themselves out of third and fourth down holes, but Forrest did not make it easy, a multitude of Rockets making big stops.

Bryce Tankersley covered on an incomplete pass on third down, Marion County then making the decision to kick the field goal, which didn’t make it through the uprights.

Rockets gained possession and Hill came up with a critical first down on the drive and Swift picked up 34 yards to put the Rockets in Warriors terrain.

Hill connected with Tyler Ayers on a 19-yard pass and Eli Bell was able to convert on a 15-yard touchdown run. Thanks to big-time

blocking by Spence Tankersley, Swift added the extra two, leveling the score at 28 with 3:12 left in the third quarter.

The Rockets’ defense showed up and showed out to finish the quarter, Pearson, B. Tankersley, E. Bell, and Swift all making crucial stops, forcing a Warriors turnover on downs, where the Rockets took over at their own five yard line.

To start the fourth quarter, the Rockets just weren’t able to convert, being forced to punt after a pair of penalties and allowing Marion County to begin their drive on the Rockets 25 yard line. In only four plays, the Warriors once again crossed the goal line, taking the lead.

Making sure to respond, Hill threw a solid 42-yard pass to Yates, putting the Rockets on the Warriors 17 yard line. A couple minutes

Turnovers costly as Eagleville spoils Bulldogs’ Homecoming

CORNERSVILLE — Homecoming on the first Friday night of fall saw the Cornersville Bulldogs (2-3, 2-0), coming off a hard-fought victory over the Collinwood Trojans, welcome Rutherford County foe Eagleville Eagles (2-3, 0-1) under a cool evening sky.

Despite another stellar performance from junior running back/defensive end Ben Franklin, the Bulldogs could not overcome three turnovers that led to 21 points by the Eagles as Cornersville suffered its first Region 5-A loss, 28-14.

Franklin rushed for 165 yards on 27 carries with two touchdowns and with a new wrinkle in the Bulldog offense — a screen pass that he converted into 61 yards on three receptions.

Junior Blaine Woodward, beginning to find his rhythm in Coach Shelby Waddell’s offense, completed 11-of-34 passes for 151 yards and two interceptions.

The game featured two teams evenly matched, and both gave their respective crowds something to cheer about.

Eagleville won the coin toss, deferred to the second half and Cor-

nersville received the opening kick-off, a quibbler that Kale Adcox for Cornersville smothered at the 28-yard line.

Disaster struck on the second play for Cornersville as the ball popped free on the center exchange and the Eagles recovered at the Bulldog 28-yard line.

Two plays later from 16-yards out, Eagleville’s Jackson Zentz ramblled into the end zone for the touchdown, but the PAT was missed and with less than a minute gone in the game the Eagles led, 6-0.

The Bulldogs responded with a 14-play drive featuring Franklin running and pass catching that pushed the ball down field.

Franklin accounted for 25 yards on the ground and 22 yards through the air and scored the go-ahead touchdown on a 16-yard scamper, then, Joseth Palma’s PAT split the uprights and the Bulldogs led 7-6 at the 4:20 mark of the first quarter.

After the Cornersville kickoff the Bulldog defense stood up and forced the Eagles to punt on a three-and-out with the ball rolling out of bounds at the Bulldog 23-yard line.

Facing a third and one yard at the Bulldog

With the crowd still

buzzing from the electric Franklin run, the quarter ended with the Bulldogs threatening and leading 7-6.

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee Titans finally made a stand on their home field and got the ball to Derrick Henry along with the rest of their new playmakers to notch their first victory of the season.

Now the road literally gets tougher.

The two-time defending AFC South champs now face the toughest part of their schedule with four of the next five games on the road starting Sunday with a trip to division rival Indianapolis.

Luckily, their bye comes during this upcoming stretch after a much-needed first victory of the season after holding off the Raiders 24-22.

Henry, coming off his best game this season, tapped the cliché of “one game at a time.”

“That’s all you can do ... and be ready for each opponent,” Henry said. “It is just about getting better in all three phases, so we have to take it one game at a time.”

The Titans (1-2) have plenty to work on. Sure, they scored on their first three possessions against Las Vegas and squeezed in a field goal just as the first half expired. They needed every bit of that 24-10 halftime lead.

They were outgained 266-86 in the second half and got nothing from five possessions, including one that ended in a turnover on downs, two punts and then finally a kneel down for the victory.

“We came out and we played with an attitude, played with an edge and found a way to win at the end of the day,” quarterback Ryan

What’s working

The offense. Finally. For at least the first half. The Titans had opened their first two games driving for touchdowns only to bog down with just 13 points combined on 20 other drives.

Against the Raiders, they scored touchdowns on their first three possessions — all at least 75 yards or more.

The Titans also got a 48-yard field goal from Randy Bullock that provided the winning edge. The field goal came from almost the same spot where Bullock missed a 47-yarder wide left in a season-opening loss to the Giants.

What needs help

The Titans must improve on fourth down

and stop giving up so many big plays. Mack Hollins had a career-day with 158 yards receiving, including a 60-yard reception, taking away from being nearly perfect on third down, allowing 1 conversion on 12 attempts.

On fourth down, the Raiders were a perfect 3 of 3 — all on the final drive. Only linebacker Dylan Cole, then two-time All-Pro safety Kevin Byard getting a hand on Derek Carr’s 2-point conversion pass helped preserve this first victory. The Titans also gave up five plays of 20 yards or longer.

Stock up

Strange to say about a two-time NFL rushing champ, but Henry. He helped dig the Titans out of an early hole with a 23-yard gain on a screen. He also ran with power and speed, help-

ing dim talk that he’s lost something coming off a broken right foot and turning 28.

Henry had his best game yet this season with 85 yards rushing on 20 carries, and he had five catches for 58 yards receiving.

Stock down

Offensive lineman Dillon Radunz. In a week where the Titans placed two offensive linemen on injured reserve led by three-time Pro Bowl left tackle Taylor Lewan, Radunz wound up not playing even a single snap. That’s not a good sign for Radunz or the Titans who made him a second-round draft pick in April 2021.

LB Zach Cunningham hurt a knee in practice Thursday, then

went to the locker room with an injured elbow. Starting CB Kristian Fulton went down in the end zone defending a receiver late in the game.

Key number

70 — Henry joined exclusive company as only the third player for this franchise to score at least 70 TDs. He now trails Eddie George (74) and Pro Football Hall of Famer Earl Campbell (73).

Next steps

Become road warriors and try to climb back up the AFC South starting with a trip to Indianapolis. The Titans then visit Washington before their bye followed by trips to Houston and Kansas City. Their fourth home game this season comes Nov. 13 against Denver.

had the ball at their own 25-yard line. Woodard for Cornersville completed a first down pass to Austin Cooper for 8 yards, then Franklin burst up field for a 14-yard gain and a first down. Franklin ran for 110 more yards to the 46-yard line of Eagleville but on first down the Eagleville pass rush got to Woodard as he let the ball go and his pass was intercepted by Eagleville's Kolten Daniels, who raced toward the goal line and only Cornersville's Khi Canty prevented a touchdown by knocking Daniels out of bounds at the Bulldog 18-yard line.

From there the Eagles moved to the Bulldog five-yard line where Kaleb Snitzer for Eagleville roared in to the endzone, then completed a two-point conversion and the Eagles led 14-7 with 3:28 left until halftime. With time running down until halftime the Bulldogs fought back. This was when Franklin brought the Bulldog faithful to their feet again when from the Eagles 45-yard line the junior running back ran around the right side, shucking would be tacklers as he raced down the sidelines to the Eagleville 5-yard line.

Franklin then capped the drive with a five-yard touchdown run and Palma added the PAT to make the score 28-14 with 2:24 left in the game.

The Cornersville on-side kick was recovered by the Eagles at their own 49-yard line where despite being held by the Bulldog defense and forced to punt back to the Bulldogs with 1:00 left in the game the Bulldogs could not draw closer, and the game ended with Eagleville the winner 28-14.

Coach Shelby Waddell said after the game, "I can't doubt our kids' effort tonight. We have things to clean up and that falls on the coaches and to myself as head coach. Vols crack top 10 in latest poll

Tennessee and North Carolina State broke into the top 10 of The Associated Press college football poll Sunday, and Florida State is back in the rankings for the first time in four years.

Georgia remained No. 1 and received 55 of 63 first-place votes in the Top 25, presented by Regions Bank. No. 2 Alabama (four first-place votes), No. 3 Ohio State (four first-place votes), No. 4 Michigan and No. 5 Clemson all held their places.

Oklahoma's upset loss to Kansas State created room for teams to move up, like Southern California to No. 6 and Kentucky to No. 7.

Tennessee moved up three spots to No. 8, its best ranking since 2006 and first top-10 appearance since a few weeks at ninth in the first half of 2016. That was the last time the Volunteers started 4-0. The Vols knocked Florida out of the rankings by snapping a five-game losing streak in the rivalry.

Oklahoma State remained at nine and North Carolina State jumped two spots to No. 10. The Wolfpack have their best ranking since they were 10th in 2002.

Texas and Miami both dropped out of the rankings after being beaten by unranked teams to fall to 2-2. The Longhorns blew a 14-point lead second-half lead and lost in overtime at Texas Tech. while Miami, which started the season at No. 16, was upended by four-touchdown un-

derdog Middle Tennessee State.

While the Hurricanes and Gators slipping out, No. 23 Florida State (4-0) moved in. The Seminoles are off to their best start since 2015 and in the AP Top 25 for the first time since beginning the 2018 season No. 19, snapping a streak of 69 straight polls unranked.



Poll points

Florida State's poll drought was remarkable considering how the Seminoles have been a Top 25 staple since the late 1970s.

Florida State's streak of 211 straight weeks ranked from 1989-2001 is the third longest streak in the history of the poll and its streak of 42 straight seasons appearing in at least one poll from 1977-2018 is fourth all-time.

Before the current drought, Florida State had not gone consecutive seasons without being ranked for at least one poll since 1973-77, which was the late Bobby Bowden's first season as coach.

Two other teams are making their Top 25 debuts this week:

— No. 21 Minnesota enters the rankings after crushing Michigan State on the road. The Gophers are ranked for the first time since a short stay in 2020.

— No. 25 Kansas State upset a top-10 ranked Oklahoma team for the third time in the last four seasons. The Wildcats have been briefly ranked in each of the last three seasons, but never more than three weeks.

NCAA puts Memphis on 3 years' probation, no tourney ban

MEMPHIS — The NCAA put Memphis on three years of probation with a public reprimand and a fine Tuesday, but declined to punish Tigers coach Penny Hardaway or hand down an NCAA Tournament ban.

The NCAA had accused Memphis of four Level I and two Level II violations, considered the most serious infractions, and a total of seven alleged violations including lack of institutional control, head coach responsibility and failure to monitor.

The Independent Accountability Review Panel put the blame on Memphis failing to monitor Hardaway as an athletics booster or educate him better after hiring him as the Tigers' men's basketball coach. The panel also ruled Memphis provided impermissible benefits of meals to athletes and publicity benefits to recruits.

The panel also ruled Memphis failed to cooperate with the investigation by delaying handing over requested documents but decided these were Level II and III violations.

"There would have been no difficulty with this panel arriving at that conclusion if they had been satisfied that the evidence demonstrated that there was conduct that reached the Level I," IARP administrative officer Hugh Fraser said in a news conference. "But in this case, we did not find that."

Memphis will be fined \$5,000 plus 0.25% of its average men's basketball budget — based on the average of the program's last three total budgets. Probation starts Tues-

day and runs to Sept. 26, 2025. Memphis also must send at least one member of its Office of Legal Counsel to two NCAA Regional Rules Seminars and inform all prospect men's basketball recruits in writing that the Tigers are on probation.

Fraser said the panel did not want to punish current Memphis athletes.

"We respect and will fully comply with the IARP's decision," said Memphis president Bill Hardgrave, who was hired in November 2021.

The lack of a tournament ban or suspension for Hardaway is key for a program that just ended a long NCAA Tournament drought in March with its first berth since 2014. Hardaway said in a statement that brighter days are ahead and thanked the IARP for making its decision based on the facts.

"We have finally arrived at the end of an extremely challenging period, and I could not be more grateful," Hardaway said. "I would like to thank our players and their families, as well as our coaches and our support staff, for continuing to focus on what we could control as this process lingered."

The NCAA investigation started in May 2019 and continued into February 2021, with an amended notice of allegations sent to Memphis in July 2021. Fraser noted the pandemic was a contributing factor slowing down the investigation.

The probe began over the recruitment and the short time that James Wiseman spent at Memphis after receiving \$11,500 from Hardaway in 2017. That's when Hardaway was coach at East High

School in Memphis. He wasn't hired as Memphis' coach until March 2018, and Wiseman committed to the Tigers in November 2018.

The NCAA originally ruled the money wasn't allowed because Hardaway was a booster for the program. The former NBA All-Star gave \$1 million in 2008 to his alma mater for the university's sports hall of fame named for Hardaway. The IARP noted Hardaway had been helping people in Memphis since first going to the NBA in 1993.

Wiseman played the first game of the 2019-20 season before the NCAA ruled Wiseman ineligible. He played two more games after filing a restraining order against the NCAA.

The IARP says Memphis was informed Oct. 31 that Wiseman and two other athletes were not eligible because they received money from Hardaway after he became a booster. The IARP said Hardaway wasn't told until after the opening game Nov. 5.

The IARP also wants Memphis to vacate all wins and records of the three games Wiseman played with those reflected in Hardaway's career records.

On Nov. 20, 2019, the NCAA suspended Wiseman for 12 games and ordered him to repay \$11,500 in the form of a donation to the charity of choice. Wiseman withdrew from Memphis in December 2019

and now plays for the NBA's Golden State Warriors.

Memphis athletic director Laird Veatch, hired Oct. 1, 2019, thanked Tigers' fans for their patience and support through a "long and arduous process." Veatch also made clear Memphis has enhanced its athletic compliance structure.

"To that end, we are thankful to the IARP for recognizing and reflecting that in its decision," Veatch said. "As we prepare for a new season, we are all excited and ready to move forward, together."

The Tennessee Secondary Schools Athletic Association fined East High School nearly \$15,000 earlier this month and ordered the school to forfeit all games Wiseman played in for Hardaway, vacating its 2018 state championship and 2019 state runner-up trophy.

This was only the IARP's second decision Tuesday, with cases involving Louisiana State, Arizona, Kansas and Louisville still on the group's docket. North Carolina men's basketball also was put on probation in the IARP's first decision in December 2021.

Derrick Crawford, the NCAA vice president for hearing operations, said decisions on the remaining four cases will come by early summer 2023 at the latest, since the IARP is coming to a end.

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Hurricane forcing colleges to move games

GAINESVILLE, Fla. — Three Sunshine State universities took steps Tuesday to salvage home football games as Hurricane Ian approached.

Florida moved its game against Eastern Washington from Saturday to Sunday. Central Florida did the same with its game against SMU. South Florida relocated its Saturday game against East Carolina from Tampa, Florida, to Boca Raton.

Although South Carolina is a safer distance from the major storm, the Gamecocks didn't want to wait to make a decision regarding their game against South Carolina State. Those schools will now play Thursday night, two days earlier than previously scheduled and at least a day before Ian reaches the area.

Stetson canceled its home game against San Diego scheduled for Saturday in the Pioneer Football League.

No. 23 Florida State and 22nd-ranked Wake Forest, meanwhile, are "closely monitoring" the storm while expecting to play as planned in Tallahassee.

"We remain confident that we will be able to safely host Saturday's football game against Wake Forest at its scheduled kickoff time," FSU athletic director Michael Alford said Wednesday.

Wake Forest coach Dave Clawson was cautiously optimistic.

"It's one of those deals that you certainly hope that the ACC office makes the right decision," Clawson said. "And if they don't, we will. We're not going to travel down there and put anybody at risk. ... Obviously, this is in the league's hands and Florida State's hands. We would hope that they make the right decision. But if we feel there's any danger to our players going down there, we're not going to go."

The storm is expected to hit the state's southwest coast Wednesday. It tore into western Cuba on Tuesday as a major hurricane, with nothing to stop it from intensifying into a catastrophic Category 4 storm before it hits Florida, where officials ordered 2.5 million people to evacuate before it crashes ashore Wednesday.

Universities across the state closed campuses for the week. But football is big business and a much-needed revenue source for many. Playing the cross-country game at Florida guarantees Eastern Washington \$750,000, a significant payday for a school with an athletic budget around \$17.5 million.

South Carolina State also relies on its "pay-check game" from South Carolina.

"There's no perfect plan, but we're trying to put together the best thing for our team at this moment," South Carolina coach Shane Beamer said.

The Gamecocks last moved a game due to weather in 2016, playing a scheduled Saturday game on Sunday.

The NFL's Tampa Bay Buccaneers relocated their football operations to the Miami area Tuesday in preparation for Sunday night's game against the Kansas City Chiefs.

The Buccaneers are expected to practice at the Dolphins' training complex in Miami Gardens starting Wednesday. So far, there has been no change for the game, which is scheduled for Sunday night at Raymond James Stadium in Tampa.

"We are not discussing any potential (relocation) sites," the NFL said Wednesday in a statement. "We continue to monitor the storm and are in constant communication with the clubs and local authorities. Decision could be made as late as Friday."

The Dolphins play at Cincinnati on Thursday night. They changed their travel plans for Wednesday and are leaving a few hours earlier than originally scheduled, in anticipation of severe weather.

Also in Tampa, the Rays have other concerns besides clinching an AL wild card. As they opened a three-game series in Cleveland, players and coaches were keeping an eye on the impending hurricane. The Tampa Bay-St. Petersburg area was last directly hit by a hurricane in 1921.

"Watching the news, watching the computer," Rays manager Kevin Cash said. "I know the Bay area has been pretty fortunate over many, many years now, but just thinking about everybody there and hopefully people have done right to prepare and wherever it goes, it doesn't hit as hard as the speculation."

Meanwhile, the NHL's Tampa Bay Lightning postponed preseason games scheduled to be played at home Wednesday against Carolina and Thursday against Nashville.

The NBA's Orlando Magic called off practice on what would have been their second day of training camp Wednesday, and said their plans for Thursday were uncertain. Forecasters say Orlando — in the central part of the state — could see flooding and, at minimum, tropical storm conditions as Ian nears the coast.

Alabama faces 3-game stretch of ranked foes

Alabama has mostly breezed through the first month of the season, with one big scare and three games that were frightfully but predictably easy.

How good is 'Bama, really? Check back in a few weeks.

The second-ranked Crimson Tide (4-0, 1-0 Southeastern Conference) start a three-game stretch against ranked teams with Saturday's visit to No. 20 Arkansas (3-1, 1-1). Then comes No. 17 Texas A&M and a visit to red-hot eighth-ranked Tennessee.

"It's the SEC, that's why you come to Alabama to play in the SEC and in games like this," Alabama linebacker Will Anderson Jr. said. "It's not going to be our first time going on a stretch like this. We play good teams all the time out here in the (SEC) West."

But there's seldom such a stacked lineup of games in the division. Assuming the rankings hold up, it will be the first time since 2016 that Alabama has played three straight Top 25 opponents in the regular season.

That team brushed by No. 16 Arkansas (49-30), No. 9 Tennessee (49-10) and No. 6 Texas A&M (33-14) without breaking much of a sweat, and survived a stiffer test from No. 13 LSU (10-0).

Last season, the Tide went 6-1 in Top 25 games, including a national championship game loss to Georgia. Alabama did, however, lose to an unranked Texas A&M team.

The collective record of the Tide's seven remaining SEC opponents: 23-5, including unbeaten and 14th-ranked Mississippi on the road. But three of the toughest teams

come in the next three weeks.

By far Alabama's harder game to date this season was the 20-19 win over Texas on a late field goal by Will Reichard. The Longhorns just lost again, in overtime to Texas Tech.

The Tide's wins over Utah State, Louisiana-Monroe and Vanderbilt came by a combined score of 173-10.

Bryce Young and Alabama unleashed their best downfield passing performance of the season in a 55-3 win over the Commodores in the SEC opener. Tide coach Nick Saban said afterward his team has shown steady progress in the opening month.

"The challenges get greater as we go, so we have to continue to focus on moving forward, improving," Saban said. "I think the team played really well. I think the team sort of bought in to everybody trying to

play to a standard, and I think this is probably the closest we've come to it this year."

Alabama will likely have to continue that trend to navigate the next three games unscathed. The Tide are favored by 16.5 points over quarterback KJ Jefferson and the Razorbacks, according to FanDuel Sportsbook. Arkansas is coming off a 23-21 loss to Texas A&M.

Tennessee is fresh from a 38-33 win over Florida.

"It's a big stretch," Young said of the next few games. "We understand that whenever we get into SEC play, anything can happen. So this is why we're all here, SEC ball. This was a good start and we have to carry that momentum. ... We know it's going to be a big challenge (this) week. We know it's going to take everything."

With top QBs struggling, scoring is down across NFL

With some of the most accomplished quarterbacks in the NFL struggling to produce points it was no surprise the league had one of its lowest scoring weeks.

The 20.3 points per game by teams was the lowest for a Week 3 since 2009 and the fourth lowest for any week in the past five seasons.

Teams led by Patrick Mahomes, Tom Brady and Aaron Rodgers — the winners of four of the last five MVP awards — played a major role with their teams combining for 43 points Sunday. That's the fewest points scored in the 57 weeks all three of those stand-out QBs have started. The previous low was 55 in Week 15 of the 2018 season.

Brady and the banged-up Tampa Bay Buccaneers have had the biggest problems offensively early this season, failing to score more than 20 points in any of their three games. Tampa Bay is scoring 17 points per game, down from 30.1 last season.

That's just the fifth time that's ever happened in three straight games for a team quarterbacked by Brady and second in the past 11 seasons. It happened once in 2019 in New England.

The Bucs and the New York Giants are the only teams without a first-half touchdown as absences on the offensive line and receiver have taken a toll.

The beneficiaries of that poor production by Tampa Bay were Aaron Rodgers and the Green Bay Packers, who pulled out the 14-12 road win despite failing to score following the first two drives.

It marked just the fourth time in Rodgers' career that he ended up on the winning side in a game when Green Bay failed to score more than 14 points. The Packers are averaging 16 points per game, down from 26.5 last season.

Kansas City's offense was clicking to start the season with 44 points in the opener but has scored just 44 the last two weeks, including a 20-17 loss at India-

napolis in Week 3 that marked just the fifth time the Chiefs scored 17 points or fewer with Mahomes at quarterback.

Overall, the 21 point per game average for the NFL is the lowest through Week 3 since it was 20.2 points per game in 2010.

Rareties The Buffalo Bills somehow managed to lose a game to Miami despite outgaining the Dolphins by 285 yards.

In the Super Bowl era, teams that outgain the opposition by at least 285 yards had a 266-11-1 (.959) record in those games before Tua Tagovailoa and Miami's 21-19 win.

The last team to overcome that and win was also the Dolphins, in Tagovailoa's first career start on Nov. 1, 2020, when Miami was out-gained by 326 yards in a 28-17 win over the Rams.

The San Francisco-Denver game also was an outlier, with the Broncos win becoming just the second 11-10 game in NFL history. The Steelers beat the

Chargers by that score on Nov. 16, 2008.

It was also the second game in NFL history when the winning team had exactly one touchdown, one field goal and one safety. The other time it happened came Oct. 12, 2008, when Minnesota beat Detroit 12-10.

In an odd coincidence, the safety in that game came when Dan Orlovsky stepped over the end line in the end zone just like Jimmy Garoppolo did Sunday night.

Parity For the fifth time since the merger, only two teams remain winless after Week 3 with Las Vegas (0-3) and Houston (0-2-1) doing it.

That previously happened in 1988, '89, '90 and 2012, But this is just the first time since 1959 that only one team started a season 0-3, with the Lions doing it that year.

The Raiders managed to lose all three games despite their opponents failing to win any in their other games, joining the 2012 Saints and 1989 Cowboys as the only teams to do that since the merger.

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
