CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT # 1

Summary:

This amendment would add a new section to article XI of the Tennessee Constitution to make it illegal for any person, corporation, association, or the State of Tennessee or its political subdivisions to deny or attempt to deny employment to any person because of the person's membership in, affiliation with, resignation from, or refusal to join or affiliate with any labor union or employee organization.

Question:

Shall Article XI of the Constitution of Tennessee be amended by adding the following language as a new section?

It is unlawful for any person, corporation, association, or this state or its political subdivisions to deny or attempt to deny employment to any person by reason of the person's membership in, affiliation with, resignation from, or refusal to join or affiliate with any labor union or employee organization.

Constitutional Amendment # 2

Vote For One (1)

Summary:

This amendment would add to article III, section 12 of the Tennessee Constitution a process for the temporary exercise of the powers and duties of the governor by the Speaker of the Senate-or the Speaker of the House if there is no Speaker of the Senate in office-when the governor is unable to discharge the powers and duties of the office of governor. While a Speaker is temporarily discharging the powers and duties of the governor, the Speaker would not be required to resign as Speaker or to resign as a member of the legislature; but the Speaker would not be able to preside as Speaker or vote as a member of the legislature. A Speaker who is temporarily discharging the powers and duties of the governor would not get the governor's salary but would get the Speaker's salary. The amendment would also exempt a Speaker who is temporarily discharging the powers and duties of the governor from provisions in the Constitution that would otherwise prohibit the Speaker from exercising the powers of the governor and from simultaneously holding more than one state office.

Question:

Shall Article III, Section 12 of the Constitution of Tennessee be amended by adding the following language immediately following the current language in the Section?

Whenever the Governor transmits to the Secretary of State, the Speaker of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, a written, signed declaration that the Governor is unable to discharge the powers and duties of the office, the powers and duties of the office of Governor shall be temporarily discharged by the Speaker of the Senate as Acting Governor, or if that office is unoccupied, then by the Speaker of the House of Representatives as Acting Governor, until the Governor transmits to the same officials a written, signed declaration that the Governor is able to discharge the powers and duties of the office.

Whenever a majority of the commissioners of administrative departments of the Executive Department transmits to the Secretary of State, the Speaker of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives their written, signed declaration that the Governor is unable to discharge the powers and duties of the office, the Speaker of the Senate shall immediately assume the powers and duties of the office as Acting Governor, or if that office is unoccupied, then the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall immediately assume the powers and duties of the office as Acting Governor, until the Governor transmits to the same officials a written, signed declaration that the Governor is able to discharge the powers and duties of the office. Whenever a Speaker is temporarily discharging the powers and duties of the office of Governor as Acting Governor, such Speaker shall not be required to resign the Speaker's position as the Speaker or to resign as a member of the general assembly and shall retain the Speaker's salary and not receive the Governor's salary, but such Speaker shall not preside as Speaker or vote as a member of the general assembly during the time the Speaker is Acting Governor.

# Rockets season ends on the road in Mt. Pleasant

Mt. PLEASANT — It's no secret the Forrest Rockets (3-7, 1-4) had a tough season, the onslaught of injuries only adding to the hardship.

The Rockets' season ended Friday night in Mt. Pleasant, where they took on the Tigers (8-1, 5-0) in a region matchup and fell in a 41-0 shutout.

Although the Rockets had a few good plays scattered throughout the game, most of the night did not go their way, unable to execute in Tigers territory.

On the first drive of the game in a third down situation, freshman quarterback Ryan Hill completed a 45-yard pass to senior Chris Davis, putting Forrest on Mt. Pleasant grounds early on.

Two penalties and a sack gave possession to the Tigers.

Covering 50 yards in nine plays, Mt. Pleasant scored the only touchdown of the quarter, Austin Hicks diving in from the one-yard line.

The Rockets started the second quarter with a punt, and on the next play for the Tigers, Hicks went on an 82-yard trek to the opposite end of the field, bringing the score to 14-0 after the extra point kick from Jackson Collier.

It took only four plays before the Rockets punted the ball away again, catching somewhat of a lucky break when Darien Meza's lengthy run was called back due to a penalty against Mt. Pleasant, starting them on their own six-yard line.

But the Tigers clawed themselves out of a third down hole from their own one-yard line, with quarterback Nick Brown getting the first down on a 16-yard run.

Four plays later Brown connected with Meza on a 47-yard pass to put the Tigers in Rockets territory.

It was Hicks again who went on a 21-yard run to score his third touchdown of the evening. Collier's kick was good, and Mt. Pleasant found themselves with a strong lead of 21-0 with 5:03 left in the half.

Forrest just couldn't find their footing, turning the ball over on downs on the next possession, the Tigers taking over on the Rockets 29-yard line.

Within a handful of plays, Mt. Pleasant's Xavier Davidson crossed the goal line, putting the Tigers up 28-0 after Collier's kick.

The score held for the rest of the half.

In just over a minute

into the third quarter, Davidson found the end zone yet again. Collier remained on point, giving the Tigers a death grip on the lead, 35-0.

Another Rockets turnover resulted in a 29-yard touchdown run from Brown with 7:04 left in the third quarter. The extra point was no good, making the final score 41-0.

Hill, Levi Van Patten, and Antonio Marable came together in the quick-moving fourth quarter, including a Tigers fumble recovery by Senior Jordan Bishop, with a solid attempt to put some numbers on the board, but fell short.

"They kept fighting all season," Forrest head coach Eli Stephen-

son said.

"They never gave up, and that means a lot. That's one reason Chapel Hill is so special. We have great kids that love to come to work. I got to watch these seniors grow up and become great young men. That's the reason why I coach. They made coaching enjoyable for me, and I tried to teach them something besides football these years I've had them."

## Tennessee sheriffs Society subject

The Marshall County Historical Society will meet Sunday afternoon, November 6, at 2 p.m. in the Marshall County Historical Museum, Hardison Annex, 230 College Street. An interesting program is planned with Ronnie Erwin of Maury County presenting excerpts from his publication entitled "Stars Over Tennessee". Produced by Erwin and his late wife, Lynn McKee Erwin, the book is massive and covers the sheriffs who served all 95 Tennessee counties from the late 1800's forward. Reflecting on the gold star worn by law enforcement officers, the Erwins collected wonderful documentation about the lives of these public servants. Erwin will have a Power Point presentation with pictures to enhance his talk.

Erwin holds a Bachelor of Sci-

ence degree from Tennessee Tech and a Master of Science and a Doctor of Philosophy from Texas A & M. While at TAMU, Erwin was a member of the famous Fightin' Texas Aggie Cadet Corps. He was later commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the U. S. Army. After serving as a Medical Corps officer, he began a career in the food industry. His experiences in the industry led him to become a business diagnostics specialist and leadership coach. Many local readers will remember Erwin from his days as Executive Vice-President of Moon Pencil Company. Lynn Erwin was a graduate of Middle Tennessee State University and taught elementary school for many years. The Erwins enjoyed traveling and spending time on their Maury County Cen-

tury Farm called Rebel Springs at Pleasant Valley Farm. As life-long Christians, they always saw their marriage as God-centered.

Remembered by her husband with a deep love, Lynn is memorialized with "The Lynn M. Erwin Education and Training Memorial Fund for the Tennessee Sheriffs' Association. Each year this perpetual program will distribute monies to one of the 95 sheriffs to support additional education and training for their department. All proceeds of the book go into this fund. The book can be purchased at a discounted price of \$125 the day of the meeting.

The early intervention and behavioral therapy programs at the Child Development Center in Marshall County provide a strong start toward a successful future for children and their families. The Annual Helping Hands Golf Tournament and silent auction sponsored by local businesses, corporations, and individuals, helps to support these programs for children. Executive Director Anita Teague was joined by families, friends, and supporters in this joyful celebration. Founder Sarah Hunt recounted the agency's humble beginning and growth over the past 50 years. Carol Jean and her daughter Mandy recounted the tremendous support, training, and hope they received through early intervention, and continue to receive through the CDC. Teague reflected on the many successes of the organization which in the past year served over 1,300 children and adults throughout 17 counties. ## Early vote end today; election Tuesday

Today, Thursday, Nov. 3, is the last day for early voting in next week's federal and state election.

Voters have until 6 p.m. today to get their vote in at the Election Office in the Hardison Annex.

Otherwise, polls will be open on Tuesday, Nov. 8, from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

On Tuesday, votes must be cast at one of the nine assigned polling sites throughout the county.

A list of polling locations is printed on Page 2 in today's Marshall County Tribune.

On the ballot is the race for Tennessee Governor between incumbent Bill Lee and challenger Dr. Jason Martin.

Representatives for the new 5th District for the US House of Representatives will be chosen between Heidi Campbell and Andy Ogles and the state house 92nd District between incumbent Todd Warner and challenger Angela Hughes.

Residents of District 8 will be

voting for either Tara Ewing and James Hopkins to fill a seat on the County Commission.

In Cornersville, incumbents Mary Johnson, Doris Arthur, and Sheryl McCormick are unopposed to retain their seats on the Board of Aldermen.

Beth Vick appears on the ballot but has withdrawn from the race after her part-time employment with the town due to conflict of interest.

That seat will instead be filled by appointment of the sitting board members.

Four proposed amendments to the state constitution are included as well.

One would add the state's anti-union "right to work" language to the constitution.

The others establish a succession plan in case the governor becomes incapacitated, remove a remaining allowance for slavery, and an un-enforced prohibition against clergy serving in the legislature.

## Walter Woods Bussart

**April 16, 1942 – October 25, 2022**

Walter Woods Bussart passed away peacefully at his home in Nashville, TN, on Tuesday, October 25, 2022. Walter received many honors throughout his life, but his proudest distinction was attorney-at-law. After graduating from the University of Tennessee College of Law in 1966, Walter clerked for Justice Thomas Dyer of the Tennessee Supreme Court. He then began his law practice in Lewisburg, Tennessee, under the tutelage of Bill Lloyd. He later founded his own practice, Bussart Law Firm. Over his distinguished career, he partnered in law practice with notable lawyers, including Fred Thompson, Barbara Medley, and his daughter, Lee Bussart. He was recognized as a Fellow in the American College of Trial Lawyers, a preeminent honor reserved for 1% of the state's attorneys. His passion for service to the profession led him to serve as Speaker of the House of Delegates for the Tennessee Bar Association. Walter was elected to the Tennessee House of Representatives and served in the 90th General Assembly. He was also chosen as the Marshall County General Sessions Judge in 1972 and later appointed to the Tennessee Court of Appeals in 1997. Even with all these accolades to his name, no position was higher or more satisfying to him than the practice of law to which he dedicated himself for 56 years.

He joined the Tennessee National Guard and claimed the Erickson Trophy for the State of Tennessee, presented annually to the Distinguished Graduates of each State National Guard Officer Candidate School. Over 32 years of service, he de-



veloped lifelong friendships with other Judge Advocate Generals and rose to the rank of Colonel.

Walter was born in Belfast, Tennessee, on April 16, 1942, to Mary Gertrude Woods Bussart and Christopher Leo Bussart. He is preceded in death by his parents and his younger brother, Christopher "Christy" Leo Bussart, Jr. Walter graduated from Marshall County High School in 1960 with the finest classmates ever known.

Walter attended the University of Tennessee at Knoxville, where he joined the Alpha Tau Omega Fraternity. He served as Worthy Master and created lasting friendships with his ATO brothers. He was invited into the Scarabean Senior Society and served as President of the Student Body of UTK. Outside the courtroom, he was happiest in Knoxville singing Rocky Top in Neyland Stadium.

Walter served two terms as President of Richland Country Club, enjoying the members' fellowship and the staff's friendship.

Walter is survived by his two daughters, Brittain Anne Bussart of Chattanooga and Catherine Lee Bussart (Sam Smith) of Cornersville; his grandchildren, Mary Adella Youmans (Addie), currently attending college in Bloomington, Indiana, Kate Dorothy Youmans currently attending college in

Savannah, Georgia, and Samuel Walter Smith of Cornersville, Tennessee. He is also survived by his companion, Barbara Kellett.

Visitation was held Friday, October 28, 2022, from 11-2 at Bills-McGaugh Hamilton Funeral Home in Lewisburg, Tennessee, with funeral services beginning at 2:00 p.m. Interment took place at Round Hill Cemetery in Belfast, Tennessee, following the funeral. A suspect was charged with resisting arrest last Thursday after Marshall County deputies and Cornersville police forcibly entered her home, according to a Sheriff's Office report.

Officers were attempting to serve a warrant on Amy C. Lerma at her home on North Main Street in Cornersville.

The property owner gave officers permission to enter and a key. Officers began prying the door after discovering the locks had been changed.

Lerma allegedly opened blinds and "flipped us off" after being told that officers had a writ of possession, Deputy Clyde Ragsdale's report said.

Officers eventually gained entry and ordered Lerma to come out with her hands in the air. Lerma allegedly refused and locked herself in a bathroom.

Ragsdale cautioned Lerma to move back as officers kicked a hole in the door. Lerma allegedly fell partially through the hole into a hallway and was arrested without further incident.

ANIMAL CRUELTY

A man upset about

the condition of a newborn calf was charged with animal cruelty and resisting arrest last Wednesday, Oct. 26.

Fred Penick, 40, of Friendship Lane in the Chapel Hill area allegedly attempted to avoid being handcuffed by "pushing off" and "passively resisting," then refusing to get into a patrol unit, Deputy Clint Newbill's report said.

Penick called 911 reporting a newborn calf was having trouble breathing. Newbill arrived shortly after 6 p.m. to discover Penick atop the calf with one arm down its throat and another around its neck.

Newbill ordered Penick to get off the calf. Penick allegedly "panicked" as he walked away, then repeated his previous actions until told again to stop, saying he needed to clear its airway.

The calf appeared to be breathing okay on its own but its tongue was cut in several places due to Penick's actions, the report said.

Family members told Newbill the calf had been "professionally delivered" earlier in the day and was being cared for by its mother. They said Penick had been acting "erratically" for about a week and wandering fields and yards day and night.

Newbill noted in his report Penick appeared to be under the influence of a stimulant. No drug-related charges were filed.

**THREATS MADE**

A notebook containing possible threats was found Monday, Oct. 24, outside Columbia State Community College's classroom facility on South Ellington Parkway.

Comments (in the writer's own words and punctuation) including "People just don't know what I do," "To kill or not to kill that what I ask myself every Day!!" and "This is getting to the point I will KILL THEM ALL!" were within the notebook, found by a custodian.

No names of individuals — writer or intended victims — were mentioned in the Lewisburg Police Department report.

**DOMESTIC ASSAULTS**

•The husband of a Chapel Hill woman was charged with aggravated domestic assault after he allegedly flipped her recliner backwards — leaving her pinned on her back between the chair and a wall — Monday night at their Warner's Ridge Drive home.

Albert Pachucki allegedly became enraged during an argument, a Marshall County Sheriff's Office report said.

His wife told Deputy Sam Shelby she screamed at him to "stop" and he left the room, but returned moments later and pointed a loaded .40 caliber semi-automatic handgun at her while she was still unable to

move.

She was eventually able to call 911. Pachucki allegedly placed his hand over her mouth and pulled her hair several times before Shelby arrived, then ran from the residence yelling, "I did it!"

•Charges of aggravated assault and resisting arrest were filed against a Lewisburg man following an alleged attack on his wife Sunday.

Bruce Carriveau, 49, of East Commerce Street, was found hiding under a bed in their home after allegedly refusing repeated attempts to come out, Lewisburg police said.

Carriveau showed his empty hands after an officer noticed a foot sticking out from under a bed, the report said.

Afraid of missing out on Veterans Day?

Murphy's Law being what it is, whether you're talking about a surprise party, a romantic getaway or visiting an acquaintance in the hospital, good intentions don't always pan out.

The same goes for the intention to carry out a proper observation of Veterans Day.

Sometimes work/family obligations, ill health or inclement weather stand in the way of attending a public ceremony honoring our nation's veterans. "Maybe next year" is the lament of too many of us.

Imagine my delight when a Google search revealed "Suggested Speech for Veterans Day 2022" from The American Legion. (I did not find a corresponding speech from the VFW, but I want to tip my hat to that organization as well.) The downloadable speech can be found at <https://www.legion.org/publications/257163/veterans-day-speech-2022>.

My mention of this speech is not at all intended to offer it as a "get out of jail free" card for skipping public commemorations and melding with your recliner. But it is invaluable as a substitute for those who truly can't participate. It is also a supplement and keepsake for those who do manage to attend a parade or other ceremony.

Perhaps the unassuming title of the document flies under your radar, but I am struck by the term "suggested."

The speech is a template, a guideline, a resource for the dignitaries directing local commemorations across the country. Thanks to the men and women defending our shores and airspace, this republic has stood for nearly 250 years. We do not have some conquering foreign tyrant dictating the contents of public communications or enforcing mandatory attendance at "pep rallies."

Besides telling about the military and post-military contributions of our veterans, the speech advocates for the hiring of veterans, calls attention to the plight of homeless vets and publicizes the Suicide and Crisis Lifeline (9-8-8, extension 1 for veterans).

I hope the speech will be widely heard/circulated, to stir up our appreciation of veterans.

Sure, society still gives a nod to the dwindling members of the Greatest Generation who fought in World War II and Korea. We have learned to exhibit a certain degree of respect for the draftees who were trapped in the quagmire of the Vietnam War. But sometimes it seems that the advent of the all-volunteer military has made us more complacent.

"Hey, they knew what they were signing up for" is the attitude of many who think that our national security comes from pixie dust.

But do any of us ever know exactly what we're getting into? Referring back to good intentions, no marriage, no job, no infrastructure project ever turns out exactly like we expected.

We complain about politicians lying, but to a considerable extent, they are genuinely flummoxed when they get elected and their sincere (naïve) promises prove to be impossible to implement.

No matter how brave, athletic and resourceful an enlistee is, the military is an unenviable challenge. Regulations, culture clashes, inhospitable climates, separation from loved ones and physical danger all make honorable military service something worth celebrating.

Those who speak dismissively of our veterans are guilty of a dishonorable discharge from their mouths.

Try your best to mark Veterans Day by thanking a vet one-on-one and/or attending a community ceremony.

But download the speech as well. And pass a copy along to everyone whom you think could benefit from its inspirational message.

Turn "good intentions" into "mission accomplished."

After this manner therefore pray ye: Our Father which art in heaven, Hallowed be Thy name. Thy Kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven.” – **Matthew 6:9,10**

Many times we hear, “Prayer changes things.” Actually, “prayer” does not change anything. Only the God we pray to changes things. # Tigers battle adversity to down Greenbrier on Senior Night

LEWISBURG — In their regular season finale, the Marshall County Tigers (9-1, 7-1) had to overcome a stingy Greenbrier (5-5, 5-3) defense, as well as plenty of adversity, but in the end, the home team was able to put a win together on Senior Night and defeat the Bobcats, 28-7.

“It definitely wasn’t the cleanest of games, but Greenbrier is a good football team and is really good on defense. They’re probably one of the best defenses in 4A this year. Our guys took that as a big challenge. We knew we would probably have fewer possessions tonight, so we had to maximize the ones we had and I feel like we did a good job of that,” Tiger coach Thomas Osteen said.

From a blocked extra point, to a botched snap on a punt to 80 penalty yards in the first half, the Tigers had plenty to overcome.

That’s just what they did.

Marshall County built a two-touchdown lead in the first half and played add on in the second half to coast to the win and secure home-field advantage in the opening round of the Class 4A playoffs.

On the stats sheet, it was more of the same for the Tiger offense.

Junior quarterback Silas Teat completed 15-of-21 attempts for

173 yards and a pair of touchdowns, while senior tailback Demari Braden carried it 24 times for 116 yards and a touchdown as well.

Braden put the Tigers on the board with an eight-yard touchdown to cap the game’s opening drive, but a blocked extra point left the Tigers with a 6-0 lead.

Later in the quarter, Marshall County’s drive stalled near its own 42-yard line and on a punt attempt, a mishandled snap set the Bobcats up with the first down on the Tiger 23-yard line.

Three plays later, Greenbrier quarterback Nolan Carson faked a handoff and dove into the end zone to finish off a 13-yard touchdown run.

The kick after put the visitors up 7-6, marking the first points the Tigers have allowed in three weeks.

After the Bobcats took the slim lead barely 58 seconds into the second quarter, Teat went to work through the air and found tight end John Morgan Thomas on a 27-yard touchdown pass and a three-yard pass to Jayden Randolph to bump the Tigers’ lead to 21-7 by the end of the half.

With the clock-draining offense the Bobcats ran, the Tigers were able to run just six plays in the third quarter and after forcing a turnover on downs with 13 seconds left in the quarter, Marshall County took

over on its own 30-yard line and orchestrated a 14-play scoring drive that Randolph finished

# Tennessee tops 1st CFP poll

Tennessee, Ohio State, Georgia, and Clemson were the top four teams in the first College Football Playoff rankings of the season released Tuesday night, four days before the Volunteers and Bulldogs square off on the field.

Michigan was fifth, followed by Alabama and unbeaten TCU.

Tennessee is No. 1 in the CFP rankings for the first time, starting ahead of a group of teams that have become regulars at the top of the selection committee's top 25. The Volunteers have already beaten the Crimson Tide and LSU, which was ranked 10th.

Tennessee has been one of the season's biggest surprises, starting the season unranked in the AP poll and jumping out to an 8-0 start for the first time since the Vols won their last national title in 1998.

"We've tried to enjoy the journey," second-year Tennessee coach Josh Heupel told ESPN. "Three years ago, it didn't look like this."

Heupel took over after Jeremy Pruitt was fired following a 3-7 season.

Only one team that has been No. 1 in the committee's initial rankings has not made the playoff, but only about half the teams in first top four managed to finish there.

The committee began its weekly in-person meetings at hotel in Grapevine, Texas, on Monday and revealed the first of six weekly rankings.

The final rankings that set the CFP field of four are set for Dec. 4. The 13-person panel is led by a first-time chairman Boo Corrigan, the athletic director of North Carolina State.

Corrigan said there was some consideration for Ohio State and Georgia as No. 1, but Tennessee's victories against Alabama and at

LSU won the day.

The Buckeyes' explosive offense and overall dominance gave them a slight edge on Georgia.

He said Michigan's weak nonconference schedule (Hawaii, Colorado State and Connecticut) and Clemson's 5-0 record against teams with winning records gave the Tigers the nod for the fourth spot.

"The wins at Wake (Forest), at Florida State, over N.C. State, over Syracuse, really did push (Clemson) over the top," Corrigan said.

Oregon was eighth followed by Pac-12 rival Southern California at ninth.

The highest ranked team from outside the Power Five conferences was Tulane at No. 19. The highest ranked champion from the Group of Five conferences earns a spot in New Year's Six bowl.

The CFP semifinals are scheduled to be played at the Fiesta and Peach Bowls on Dec. 31, with the championship

game set for Jan. 9 in Inglewood, California.

## Analysis

Even before the rankings were unveiled Tuesday night, it was clear which teams still have a chance to play for a national championship.

A glance at the conference standings reveals 14 contenders, all in the Power Five. Sorry, there will be no Cincinnati-style interloper from the Group of Five this season for the selection committee to consider.

A conference-by-conference assessment of who is in the race and the paths to the CFP, with AP Top 25 rankings.

## Atlantic Coast Conference

Clemson (8-0, AP No. 5)

The Tigers had their streak of six straight playoff appearances snapped last year, but are well positioned to get back, with no ranked opponents left before a

likely ACC title game against North Carolina.

No unbeaten Power Five champion has ever missed the playoff. A glance at the Big Ten and SEC suggests getting in as a one-loss conference champion could be dicey for the Tigers.

**No. 17 North Carolina (7-1, AP No. 17)**

Run the table, beating unbeaten Clemson in the ACC title game, gets the Tar Heels in the conversation, but they'll need some upsets in other leagues to clear the way.

## Big 12

**No. 7 TCU (8-0, AP No. 7)**

See above, re: unbeaten Power Five champions. The Horned Frogs flirt with disaster weekly and have some defensive issues. That's a profile the selection committee tends to look upon skeptically.

They'll probably need to stay unbeaten to get in and it's going to be really tough for them to stay unbeaten with

the way they have been playing.

## Big Ten

**Ohio State (8-0, AP No. 2) and Michigan (8-0, AP No. 4)**

Both have been dominant. Neither has played a particularly strenuous schedule and that won't change much before they meet Thanksgiving weekend. Still, either is lock by winning out.

Either would stay in the mix by being a 12-1 conference champion. And the loser of the rivalry game at 11-1 probably still holds out hope to get in.

**Illinois (7-1, AP No. 14)**

The Illini have a game against Michigan the week before the Wolverines play Ohio State. That means Illinois could finish 12-1 with either two victories against Michigan or one against Michigan and one against Ohio State.

It's not likely to happen, but that would put

the Illini in the playoff.

## Pac-12

**Oregon (7-1, AP No. 8), USC (7-1, AP No. 9) and UCLA (7-1, No. 10)**

They all need to run the table to have a chance and even then that might not be enough. The Ducks will have to overcome a 49-3 loss to Georgia in their opener. The Trojans have a bad defense and won't get much of a bump by beating Notre Dame. UCLA played one of the weakest non-conference schedules in the country.

What's the best option for the Pac-12? The guess here is a 12-1 USC with victories against UCLA and Oregon and one-point loss to a good Utah team.

## Southeastern conference

**Georgia (8-0, AP No. 1) and Tennessee (8-0, AP No. 2)**

The loser of Saturday's showdown in Athens is not eliminated, especially if its the Volunteers, with a victory over Alabama already in hand.

**Alabama (6-1, AP No. 6) and Mississippi (8-1, AP No. 11)**

The Crimson Tide and Rebels can't afford another loss — they play each other in two weeks — but either would breeze into the CFP by winning out.

The most SEC-centric scenario the rest of the country needs to root against is Alabama winning out, beating Georgia in the SEC championship game, and leaving the Tide and Bulldogs at 12-1 and Tennessee at 11-1 with a close loss to Georgia.

**LSU (6-2, AP No. 15)**

A two-loss team has never made the playoff, but the SEC champion has never missed the playoff. If the Tigers beat Alabama and avenge a loss to Tennessee on the way to a conference title they could break precedent.

# Vols travel to Athens after best defensive game yet

Tennessee scores so many points so fast that the defense tends to be overshadowed, ignored until someone wonders how the Volunteers can play so many minutes a game.

Turns out the second-ranked Vols actually can play some defense too, despite being on the field more than all but five other FBS teams.

As Tennessee prepares to visit defending national champ Georgia (8-0, 5-0 SEC), the Volunteers are coming off arguably their best defensive performance this season. They smothered Will Levis, a projected first-round pick in the 2023 NFL draft, allowing 98 yards passing while picking him off three times.

Coach Josh Heupel said Monday that good teams get better during a season, and he sees a defense that keeps improving thanks to coordinator Tim Banks and secondary coach Willie Martinez with last week's 44-6 rout of Kentucky the latest example. Being healthy also helps.

"Last week, we were healthier than we were the week before," Heupel said. "I feel like this week will be the healthiest that we've been in a while."

The Vols (8-0, 4-0) rank first in the Southeastern Conference with a plus-8 margin in turnovers and have forced a league-best 16 turnovers.

They also are allowing just 92.9 yards rushing, which is second-stingiest in the SEC and ninth among Football Bowl Subdivision teams. They held LSU to 55 yards rushing, Alabama to 114 and Kentucky had just 107.

Worse, the Wildcats managed just 3.25 yards per play and 205 total yards against Tennessee, the fewest the Vols had allowed since Kentucky had 193 yards against them Nov. 29, 2008. The six points allowed was the fewest by an SEC opponent against the Vols since Mississippi State was routed 34-3 on Oct. 18, 2008.

Tennessee's defensive line is anchored by senior Byron Young, who has five sacks, and Georgia coach Kirby Smart knows Rodney Garner, now coaching Tennessee's defensive line, very well.

Garner was in his first year coaching Georgia's defensive line and working as recruiting coordinator when Smart was finishing up his playing career with the Bulldogs. Garner was still there when Smart was a graduate assistant. When Smart coached running backs in 2005, Garner was Georgia's assistant head coach.

Smart said Garner brings toughness and an old school approach about hitting people and playing physically. Garner also coaches hard, something that hasn't changed in all his years of coaching. "They're not going to run

from contact," Smart said of the Vols. "They're not going to shy from contact. They're not going to back down from a challenge. And it's not because of what they're going to do this week, it's because of the way he's molded them and the way he's coached them."

The secondary has been Tennessee's biggest challenge where they were so banged-up that walk-on William

Wright played late in the upset of Alabama. That unit was bolstered last week by the return of four-year starting Jaylen McCollough after missing two games following his arrest for felony aggravated assault.

Attorney Chloe Akers declined to comment to The Associated Press. A motion filed in McCollough's case last week argues the safety defended himself punching

someone who refused to leave after walking into an apartment in the wrong building. A preliminary hearing is scheduled for Nov. 10.

Junior defensive lineman Omari Thomas says the Tennessee defense just works every day trying to improve.

"It all works hand in hand that we all are just continuing to pull our end of the bargain and do what we have to do to get better," Thomas said.

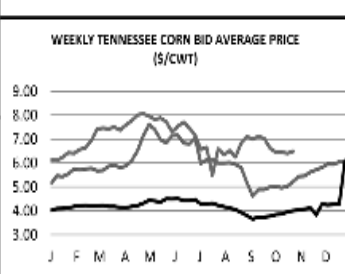
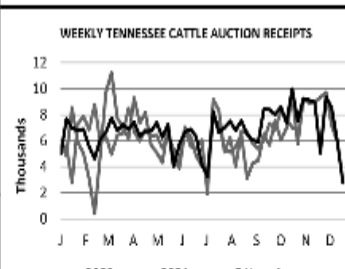
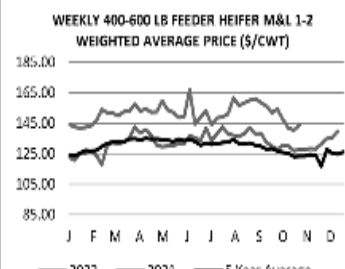
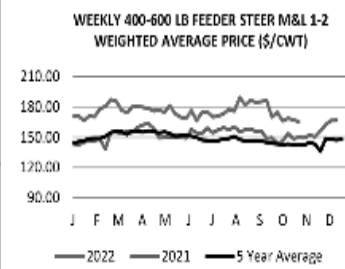

# Titans again pound opponents with Derrick Henry, defense

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee Titans have two-time rushing champ Derrick Henry and a punishing defense, so the two-time AFC South division winners are leaning into their strengths right now.

Pound opponents into submission.

Ryan Tannehill snapped his start streak because of a sprained right ankle and illness.

The Titans (5-2) went ahead and won their fifth straight by putting the ball in Henry's hands as much as possible and leaning on a defense that has been among the NFL's stingiest after an 0-2 start.

"There's a physical style of brand that we want to play with," coach Mike Vrabel said Monday.

Vrabel made clear the Titans will do whatever it takes week to week. Right now, Henry is the key to the Tennessee offense with four straight 100-yard games, and he had a season-high 219 yards in a 17-10 win in Houston. Only the Giants' Saquon Barkley has 24 more yards rushing having played eight games already.

Henry also ranks third with seven touchdowns and became the Titans' franchise TD leader with his two against the

Texans. That pushed him past Eddie George, who started his career when this franchise called Houston home as the Oilers.

Tennessee takes this winning streak to Kansas City (5-2) for a prime-time game Sunday night with the Chiefs.

What's working

That defense. Despite losing Pro Bowl linebacker Harold Landry III to a torn ACL just before the season, the Titans have held three opponents under 50 yards rushing and now rank second entering Monday in allowing just 89.2 yards per game.

They also are the league's best on third down, limiting opponents to 25.5% conversions entering Monday.

Now they rank 10th in fewest points allowed entering Monday. The Titans simply dominated Houston, allowing 161 yards only because of a late 90-yard drive with the game decided.

## What needs help

The passing game. With Ryan Tannehill sidelined by both a sprained right ankle and an illness, the Titans completed only two passes to a wide receiver. Veteran Robert Woods led the Titans with 26 yards receiving on his two catches.

The Titans currently have

three wide receivers on injured reserve in Racey McMath, Treyton Burks and Kyle Philips. Burks, the first-round pick at No. 18 overall, isn't eligible to return at the earliest until after Tennessee's trip to Kansas City.

## Stock up

The offensive line. This beleaguered group started with two new starters with rookie Nicholas Petit-Frere at right tackle and undrafted veteran Aaron Brewer at left guard.

Then Dennis Daley replaced three-time Pro Bowl left tackle Taylor Lewan in September after a season-ending injury.

But Nate Davis returned at right guard in Houston after missing two games. The Titans line opened some big holes for Henry against the NFL's worst run defense.

## Stock down

QB Malik Willis. The rookie had some people thinking he could push Tannehill for the starting job by 2023. Willis's best stat was winning his first NFL start. He was 6 of 10 for 55 yards, intercepted once and sacked three times. Willis showed how much he still has left to learn after finishing his college career at Liberty.

## Injured

Both Tannehill's ankle and the illness that kept him in Nashville over the weekend should be feeling better. But Vrabel declined to update Tannehill's status, referring to the injury report that will come out Wednesday. Starting safety Amani Hooker hurt his left shoulder and couldn't finish against Houston.

## Key number

6 — The Titans are the NFL's only team to win at least four straight games in six consecutive seasons. Pittsburgh (2-6) and Kansas City are the only other teams to win at least four games straight each of the past five seasons.

It's the longest such streak in franchise history, easily topping the three straight seasons between 1978 and 1980 with Earl Campbell and the 1991-1993 Oilers with Warren Moon.

## Next steps

Pack up for the road once again for the fifth time this season. If the Titans can find a way to win in Kansas City, then it's back to Music City for five of the final nine games.

"It's a class that represented our school well in the classroom and in the community. I don't know if there are a bunch of NFL players in that class, but there's a bunch of winners that are good high school players that show being high-character people matters on the scoreboard too. I think that's one of the biggest reasons we're a 9-1 football team," Osteen said.

The Tigers will begin their postseason trek against Chester County (6-4) on Friday night at Preston Hopkins Field.
