

Cornersville examines annexation

Cornersville could be growing in size in the near future.

The Cornersville Board of Mayor and Aldermen began consideration of a pair of annexation requests at their monthly meeting last Thursday.

A pair of property owners have requested annexation into the town limits.

Owner Brenda Hasting has requested annexation for two parcels totaling approximately 150 acres on McConnell Road.

Cameron Coble has requested that the town annex the portion of a parcel he owns facing McConnell Road that is outside of the town limits, in order to bring the entire parcel into Cornersville.

Town Administrator Taylor Brandon said that Coble had indicated an intention to develop the parcel beginning next year.

Brandon added that no indication for future plans had been given for the Hasting property.

Aldermen approved a resolution to begin the process of annexation, estimated to require 60 days after details are resolved.

No vote has yet been taken on whether or not to add the parcels.

Aldermen approved advertising for vacancies both on the board of aldermen and on the town's planning commission.

Alderwoman Beth Vick stepped down from the board prior to the deadline to be removed from Tuesday's ballot. After taking a part-time position with the town, the board has the understanding that Vick will not serve on the board due to the conflict of interest.

Aldermen also approved application for a grant from the South Central Tennessee Development District which would help fund potential traffic lights at Coleman Road and New Town Road for better control of school traffic on Main Street.

GOP prevails in county, state

Tuesday's election brought few, if any, surprises to Marshall County or statewide.

Gov. Bill Lee easily won a second term in office against Democratic challenger Dr. Jason Martin.

Lee received just under 65% of the votes, 1,128,097 in total, to Martin's 572,153 votes.

Former Maury County Mayor Andy Ogles prevailed in the race for the redrawn 5th District House of Representatives seat.

Ogles got 6,488 votes in Marshall County to Democratic State Senator Heidi Campbell's 2012 votes.

Campbell won by a large margin in the Davidson County part of the district but Ogles' strength in Williamson County in particular, as well as the other more rural counties was too much.

Ogles finished with 123,358 votes in the new six county district to Campbell's 93,375.

Todd Warner, after defeating two Williamson County challengers in the Republican primary, earned 77% of Marshall County's vote in defeating Democratic challenger Angela Hughes.

Warner received 6,224 votes in



the county, 13,527 votes overall, to Hughes' 1,793 county votes and 4,771 votes in total.

In the lone county election, James Hopkins retained the 8th District seat on the county commission to which he was appointed earlier this year.

He defeated challenger Tara Ewing 397 votes to 263.

Hopkins finished third in the August balloting but Lynn Stocstill was unable to complete a move into the district by the deadline and could not be seated.

Three incumbent aldermen in Cornersville retained their seats without opposition.

Doris Arthur, Mary Johnson, and Sheryl McCormick received 233, 227, and 222 courtesy votes, respectively.

Beth Vick, on the ballot for the remainder of the term to which she was appointed, received 253

votes but has indicated that she will not serve after taking a position in town hall. The board will advertise the vacancy for interest and appoint a replacement at a future meeting.

Election officials were positively surprised by the turnout on election day, when 4,981 ballots were cast compared to just under 4,000 in early voting.

In past November elections, early turnout has surpassed election day turnout.

Some polling places had voters still in line at 7 p.m. Poll workers noted that voting took longer at several precincts due to the length of the constitutional amendments and voters reading them for the first time in the voting booth.

In total, 42 percent of registered voters went to the polls.

Each of the four constitutional amendments passed with ease in the county. Amendments 1 and 3, right to work and the removal of slavery from the state constitution, both garnered more than 70 percent of the vote. Amendments 2 and 4, setting up a succession plan if the governor is incapacitated and removing a prohibition on ministers serving in the legislature, both received more than 60 percent of the vote.

Leadership Marshall returns

The 2022-2023 Leadership Marshall Class came together for orientation on September 22 with seventeen members in attendance. Lynda Potts, volunteer coordinator of the program since 1995, conducted a full day of activities for the group in the large meeting room at the Lewisburg Gas Department. The program involves nine sessions, one session per month from September through May, and includes Orientation, History Day, Health Services Day, County Government Day, Industry Day, Education Day, State Government Day, City Government Day, and Graduation. Other than these scheduled days participants are asked to do four extra curricula activities, which may involve attending a city or county meeting, a performance at the Dixie, a church service outside their own denomination, or any committee meeting that would help them understand the workings of a community. Applications are received year-round at the Marshall County Chamber of Commerce, the sponsoring agent of Leadership Marshall. This year's participants include representatives from banks, small businesses, utilities, communications, county government, social services,

After almost 23 years of business, Lewisburg's favorite florist, 4-Ever Flowers, is closing on November 19. The owner, Angie Binkley, has owned the shop for almost 28 years, though has been operating out of the Lewisburg location since 2011. Though she has enjoyed owning the business for so long, Binkley has decided that it's time to step away from the demands of being a florist. According to Binkley, the decision to close the shop after all this time has come about because of her coming to terms with the very human reality of aging as well as acknowledging that time is the one truly nonrenewable resource of one's life.

"I'm ready to slow down and spend time with my grand babies. I never got to go on field trips or go eat school lunches with them. I'm ready to do that," said Binkley on retiring from 4-Ever Flowers.

The death of her ex-husband, David, in June 2022, was a wakeup call for Angie Binkley. It didn't take long for her to realize that she wanted to take a more active role in her own family member's lives.

"You know, I realized then that we don't have much time left," said Binkley.

According to Binkley, the decision was difficult in that returning her time to her grandchildren and children meant ending her time with the family that she had found in the community throughout her years of owning 4-Ever Flowers. For Binkley, being a florist wasn't just a job.

"I've helped girls get married and I've helped those same girls bury

their babies," said Binkley.

As she steps away from the business, she'll miss the opportunity to be involved in people's most memorable occasions. Binkley first opened the business in January 2002, in the Columbia strip mall, a location chosen because of her father-in-law's previous law offices. From the beginning, the business was centered around family. Though she moved the business to several different locations before landing in the current Lewisburg location on 3rd Avenue, for Angie Binkley, 4-Ever Flowers was a hub for integrating her family with the community. Over the years, her daughter, Chelsea, son, Devin, past husband, David, and her new husband have all worked at 4-Ever Flowers to achieve Binkley's dreams of having a hand in people's unforgettable events. In that time, she has been part of innumerable moments.

"It's a part of being a florist that maybe people don't think about," said Binkley.

When asked what Binkley's favorite memory of the past 28 years of business has been, she couldn't think of one, but she did admit that the community has made her feel like she is a part of their family, no matter for how short of a time.

Binkley's business 4-Ever Flowers will celebrate its last day of business on November 19. Until then, they are celebrating with sales on the remaining inventory. Customers are welcome to stop by the business in Lewisburg to get a head start on their holiday decorations or simply to express their gratitude to Binkley and her family's dedication to the community over the years.

"And as He (Jesus) prayed, the fashion of His countenance was altered, and His robe became white and glistening. And, behold, there talked with Him two men, which were Moses and Elias: Who appeared in glory, and spake of His decease which He should accomplish at Jerusalem." - Luke 9:29-31

Many non-believers get their perception of Christianity from what they see on television and the internet believing that Christ as nothing more than a commodity that preachers are trying to sell off to the people. Add to that, the gospel of Jesus Christ has been reduced down to basically a

conscientious vote. This 21st century Jesus is not much more than a beggar who is hoping someone would make a decision for Him. However, the Bible presents Jesus Christ as Lord, God, King and Redeemer. Christ alone is the Sovereign Savior and what Christ accomplished has fallen into the shadows of the psychological gospel that prevails in pulpits today.

When we think of accomplishments we think of awards, recognition, completing an education, inventions, problem solving, or victories. Ask anyone - and no one would ever consider death as an accomplishment. The reason is because there is an instinctive desire in all of

us to naturally avoid death. However, Christ spoke with Moses and Elijah about His aspiration to accomplish His death. This teaches us that Christ purposely was born to die! This He knew and willingly embraced as His goal to accomplish.

What all did Christ accomplish? The overarching desire of Christ was first and foremost the accomplishing of glorifying God His Father (John 12:28; 17:4). From that we see Christ glorifying His Father by accomplishing eternal salvation for God's elect as the one and only obedient man who bled and died upon the cross (1 Peter 1:2,18,19; Hebrews 5:8,9; Philippians 2:6-11). Next, Christ accom-

plished the fulfilling of the Old Covenant and then established the New Covenant (Matthew 5:17,18; Hebrews 9:14,15; 10:8-10; 13:20,21). Next, Christ accomplished the destruction of the works of the devil (1 John 3:8). Next, Christ accomplished the glorifying God His Father by defeating death at death's own game - by dying and rising from the dead (1 Corinthians 15:54-57). Next, Christ accomplished His royal rights as the King of kings, the only Potentate (Hebrews 1:1-8; 1 Timothy 6:14-16). Next, Christ became High Priest and at the same time brought together the office of both King and High Priest in Himself. It was forbidden in the

Old Covenant for one man to be both king and priest, but it was prophesied that Christ the Mediator of the New Covenant would accomplish that (Hebrews 4:14-16; Zechariah 6:12,13; Hebrews 12:24). Next, Christ accomplished the way for the Spirit to come and dwell with us bringing both gifts and fruit (John 14:26; 1 Corinthians 12:4; Galatians 5:22,23). Next, Christ accomplished purchasing His Bride, the Church (Hosea 3:1-3; Revelation 21:2,3,9-11). All these, and infinitely more, did Christ accomplish as we hear Him say upon the cross "It is finished" (John 19:28-30).

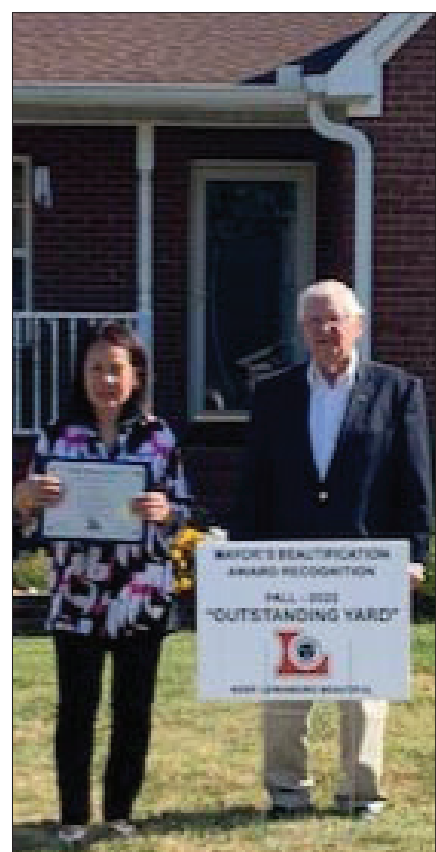

Tigers score 21 points off turnovers to advance

LEWISBURG — To win playoff football games, teams have to win the turnover margin and be able to establish the run.

Marshall County (10-1) checked both those boxes on Friday night against three-seed Chester County (6-5) in the 49-17 win over the Eagles.

“I feel like they’re much better than a lot of people thought a three-seed would be. Hats off to them for giving us a ton of trouble for two and a half quarters, but we’re even more proud of the way our guys responded to a tight game and feeling the heat in the second half,” Marshall County coach Thomas Osteen said.

Senior tailback Demari Braden was the key cog in the Tigers’ offense, rushing for three touchdowns and 157 yards on 28 carries.

“He (Braden) makes us go. He keeps us on schedule. Everybody likes to look at the fun stuff when we’re throwing it around, but to win in playoff football, you’ve got to be able to stop the run and run the ball. We’ve got a really good one to hand it off to. Couldn’t be more proud of Demari,” Osteen said.

The Tigers also won the turnover battle, recovering two fumbles and picking off Eagle quarterback Evan Schippers—which led to a combined 21 points for Marshall County.

“Turnovers are always important. In playoff football, who wins the turnover margin usually wins. That was a key tonight—defense getting the turnovers and then offense punching it in when we got them,” Osteen said.

While the final score turned out to be a 32-point win for the Tigers, the first half was a struggle against a pesky Chester County team that just wouldn’t go away.

The visitors marched the game’s opening drive 72 yards and took nearly four minutes off the clock, before taking the 3-0 lead on a 25-yard field goal by Colston Callis.

Marshall County answered in short order with a six-play drive capped by Braden’s first score of the night—a 23-yard scamper to the end zone.

Junior quarterback Silas Teat heated up in the second frame and

tossed a pair of touchdown passes to his top two targets, Aja Jones and Jayden Randolph, of 10 and 28 yards, respectively.

Two of those touchdowns came via two Eagle turnovers, including a fumble recovered on the Chester County 32-yard line and an interception by sophomore Jamal Gentry.

After Randolph’s touchdown reception, the Eagles once again orchestrated a clock-draining drive that was capped by a four-yard run by Landon Rushing with 38 seconds left to pull the score to 21-10 by halftime.

Things took an interesting turn in the third quarter as the Eagles were able to hold the Tigers to a three and out on the first drive of the second half and two plays later, Schippers connected with Peyton Barham on a 54-yard pitch and catch touchdown to pull within four points of the Marshall County lead after the successful kick after.

Chester County went on to intercept Teat on its own four-yard line, but even facing the adversity in a potential tipping point of the game, the Tiger defense forced a punt after the Eagles were backed up to their own 12-yard line and Jones returned the punt to the two-yard line.

Teat finished the

short drive on a quarterback sneak to bump the Tigers’ lead back to two scores at 28-17.

“We could have pointed fingers there when it got tight, but the guys didn’t do that. We just kept playing. We’ve done a good job of that all year,” Osteen said.

After Teat’s touchdown, the Tigers added three more touchdowns to close the game, two coming from Braden and an 18-yard capper by Marcus O’Neal for the final score of the night.

Teat completed 8-of-17 passes for 135 yards and a pair of scores, while Braden totaled 157 of the Tigers’ total 222 rushing yards.

Jones made three grabs for 76 yards and a score, while Randolph also added three catches for 39 yards and a touchdown as well.

Senior kicker Wyatt Joyce was also a perfect 7-of-7 attempts on PATs.

On the defensive side of the ball, Jakavan Curry led the team with 17 total tackles, while Grayson Miller chipped in 13.

Darian Crenshaw added nine tackles, including two tackles for loss.

Friday night’s win marked the 10th win of the season, which makes the 2022 campaign the first 10-win season since 2017’s state quarterfinal team.

While locking up the No. 2 seed in Region 5-AAAA guaranteed the Tigers a home playoff game, now Marshall County will have its mettle tested, facing Region 6-AAAA champion Lexington on the road on Friday night.

Lexington (8-3) enters Friday night’s second-round playoff game against Marshall County after defeating Greenbrier, 40-6.

“Going on the road and winning in playoff football is so tough. We’re going to be playing a region champion in Lexington. We’re going to enjoy this one this weekend, but we’ll need to play our best game of the year to win next week,” Osteen said.

Kickoff is set for 7 p.m. in Lexington.

Titans sit atop AFC South again despite struggles, injuries

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee Titans have a stingy defense and two-time NFL rushing champ Derrick Henry on his way toward leading the league for the third time in four seasons.

They also have a comfortable lead at the halfway point of the season, looking for a third straight AFC South title.

"There's no room for cushions," coach Mike Vrabel said Monday.

Well, they have one despite snapping a five-game winning streak with a 20-17 overtime loss in Kansas City on Sunday night. The Titans (5-3) still control their division with Indianapolis (3-5-1) the closest team having just fired its coach Monday.

That's despite serious second-half offensive issues and a quarterback in Ryan Tannehill who has missed two straight games with a sprained right ankle. That's just part of the injury woes that have hit this franchise hard for a second straight season.

Yet the Titans already have swept Indianapolis and are 3-0 in the division. They've already won at Houston (1-6-1) with two left against the Jaguars (3-6), including the regular-season finale in Jacksonville. Tennessee also is 4-2 in the AFC.

What's working

The defense. Losing Pro Bowl outside linebacker Harold Landry

III just before the season didn't help with him coming off a career-best 12-sack performance. They're the NFL's stingiest unit on third down, allowing a mere 28.5% conversions and have the second-best run defense, allowing 87.6 yards per game.

They've allowed more than 22 points only once all season.

What needs help

The offense. More specifically after halftime where Tennessee has been outscored 96-33, not counting the game-winning field goal in overtime to Kansas City. The Titans are still

looking for their first touchdown in the fourth quarter where they've been outscored 35-9.

Tennessee has only 51 catches for 658 yards with one touchdown combined from its receivers after trading A.J. Brown to Philadelphia during the April draft. Treylon Burks, drafted with the selection received in that deal, ranks fifth on the Titans with 10 catches for 129 yards. He's missed four games on injured reserve.

Stock up

Henry has proven he's healthy and recovered from the broken foot

that kept him from a chance at threepeating last season. He leads the NFL once again with 870 yards rushing and is second with nine rushing touchdowns entering Monday. But he had only seven carries for 22 yards in the second half in Kansas City.

He has become the franchise's top scorer in rushing TDs, passing Earl Campbell with two TDs in Kansas City, giving him 74 in 94 games. Henry set the franchise mark for combined TDs rushing and receiving a week ago in Houston, topping the mark previously held by Eddie George.

Henry is just the fifth

NFL running back since 1950 with 17 or more games with at least 100 yards rushing and two or more rushing TDs in his first seven seasons, joining LaDainian Tomlinson, Jim Brown, Emmitt Smith and Shaun Alexander.

Stock down

CB Caleb Farley. The first-round pick of 2021 appeared recovered from the ACL injury that ended his rookie season after three games, but the starting job that was his for the taking belongs to rookie Roger McCreary. What appeared to be a surprise draft pick at No.

35 overall in the second round wound up filling a big need.

Injured

Tannehill's sprained right ankle has cost him two straight starts, snapping a 49-game start streak for this franchise. Burks is among 13 Titans currently on injured reserve along with fellow rookie receiver Kyle Philips. They also lost three-time Pro Bowl left tackle Taylor Lewan one snap into their second game.

Burks is eligible to be activated this week, or at least open a 21-day window to return. Vrabel praised the rookie for how hard the rookie's worked to be ready for his return.

Key number

9 — The points scored in the fourth quarter, which would be higher if not for a missed field goal in the opener. Two field goals came in the Oct. 23 win against the Colts. At some point, Tennessee will have to score more to reach the postseason for a fourth straight season.

NFL injured reserve rule change forcing teams to be choosy

NASHVILLE — Tennessee Titans cornerback Elijah Molden is used to the business of pro football as a second-generation NFL player.

Molden didn't worry that the injured groin putting him on injured reserve Sept. 9 would cost him a full season even after an offseason NFL rule change limiting teams to bringing back only eight players from injured reserve to the active roster this season.

"It is definitely a game that the front office plays, you know chess, not checkers," Molden said. "So I talked with my agent, talked with the coaches and front office and let them work it out."

As the NFL hits the halfway point of the season, Molden remains on injured reserve as one of 13 Titans sidelined by injury. That's the most in the league per [Spotrac.com](#), a year after the Titans set an NFL record last season using an NFL record 91 different players in a non-strike season.

The Titans already are halfway to the 26 placed on injured reserve a year ago and used the unlimited return rule to help earn the AFC's No. 1 seed.

They are among at least eight teams with at least 10 players on IR as of Monday, a number that changes daily. That includes the defending champion Rams at 11 after finishing last season with only nine. Among that group is starting left tackle Joseph Noteboom, who replaced Andrew Whitworth after his retirement.

The rule changes means every NFL team has to think very carefully about injuries. Not only did the NFL limit the number that can return, but players now must spend four games instead of three on injured reserve. Practice squads stayed at 16 to ensure available players in shape to provide needed help when injuries hit.

Buffalo general manager Brandon Beane likes the rule changes.

"There's a line that the league worries about roster stashing, just putting guys on to get another guy so I think you want to make sure that people aren't stashing," Beane said. "That's going to be what the league stance is. I think it's come to a pretty

good medium."

Under early injured reserve rules, a player was out for a year. Then in 2012, the NFL allowed teams to designate one player to return before doubling that in 2017. The coronavirus pandemic led the NFL to allow teams to bring back an unlimited number of players from injured reserve for 2020 and 2021.

"Now it's down to four weeks, and I think that's more reasonable because fans pay to see these good players," Beane said. "And if you put a good player down you want to be able to bring him back."

Dallas (6-2) hopes to get left tackle Tyron Smith back in December after tearing a hamstring late in training

camp. The Cowboys, with 12 on injured reserve, also lost long snapper Jake McQuaide (torn triceps) and slot corner Jourdan Lewis (broken foot) for the season.

San Francisco (4-4) has nine on injured reserve and has been hit hard.

Quarterback Trey Lance is out for the season, while both starting defensive tackles, including Javon Kinlaw, are out. Niners coach Kyle Shanahan says everyone gets frustrated with the injuries, especially those that have decimated the defensive line.

"It just makes it harder to perform at the level we need them to the more they're out there, but that's part of the NFL," Shanahan said. "And it's why you want depth, and

it's why you hope guys can return and not have too bad of injuries."

Teams also have to balance risk versus reward when deciding whether or not to put a player on injured reserve. Bring someone back too soon, it could cost a team the chance to bring back another player. Keeping a player on the roster also gets expensive.

"A, you potentially could get the player back sooner than the four-week mandate and B, there's cap implications because you're going to be paying two players to really do one job and you've got to account for that salary cap wise," Titans general manager Jon Robinson said.

Deciding when to bring a player back starts with opening a 21-day practice window. Robinson said the player has to tell team officials how he really feels along with feedback from team doctors and watching how the player practices.

"Ultimately, you're going to err on the side of caution when it comes to the health and safety of the player," Robinson said.

The big question is whether the eight-player limit in a 17-game season is too few, and that's something nobody will really know until after this season. Committees will break down the numbers before the league's spring meetings to see if a limit of eight was the correct amount.

"Let's see this year how many teams max it out at eight, and I think if a lot of teams are maxing out that means it probably is," Beane said.






WEEKLY 400-600 LB FEEDER STEER M&L 1-2


WEEKLY 400-600 LB FEEDER HEIFER M&L 1-2

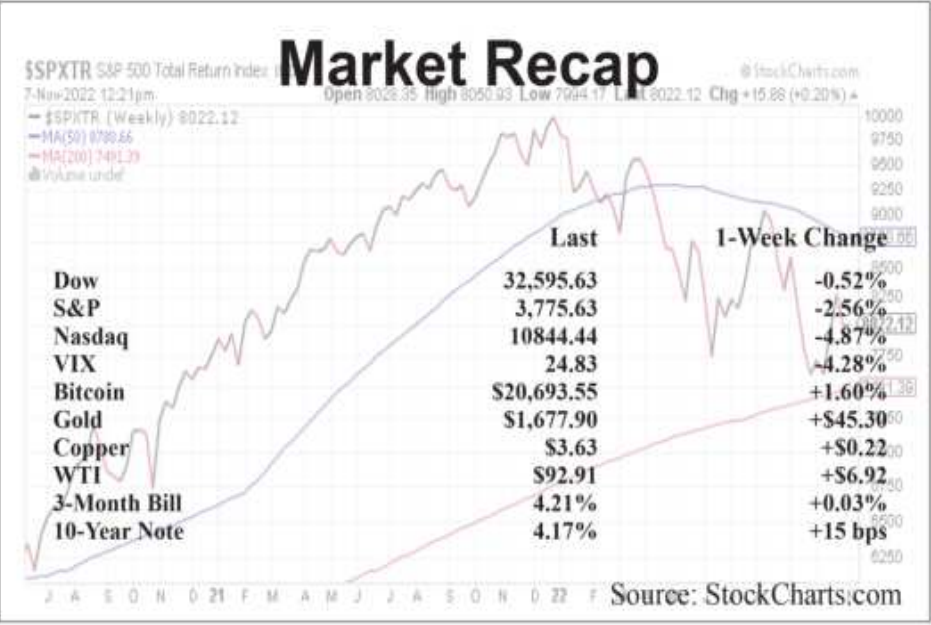

Alabama in unfamiliar territory — out of contention

Bryce Young was 9 years old the last time Alabama played a regular-season game without national championship implications.

That was five national titles ago.

Now, thanks to two ever-so-slender defeats — by a total of four points — Young and the 10th-ranked Crimson Tide (7-2, 4-2 Southeastern Conference) are almost certainly back in that scenario for the first time since that 2010 team went 10-3.

Downright disastrous by the stratospheric standards of Nick Saban's 'Bama teams. "I know people have kind of written us off to some degree," Saban said on Monday. "But at the same time, I think we have a lot of pride as an organization. I think we need to focus on what it takes to win games. Play the game, win the game, prepare for the game."

Alabama must regroup in time to visit Lane Kiffin and No. 11 Mississippi (8-1, 4-1) on Saturday.

FanDuel Sportsbook has installed the Tide as 11 1/2-point favorites, but both losses have come on the road. LSU is in the driver's seat of the SEC West with essentially a two-game lead thanks to wins over Alabama and Ole Miss.

Rebels coach Kiffin doesn't want to hear any of the "dynasty is over" chatter, saying that two plays are separating Alabama from coming in unbeaten and ranked 1 or 2.

"We're talking about two plays, two teams on the road in two of the hardest environments — over 100,000 fans — to play in," said Kiffin, a former Saban offensive coordinator at Alabama.

"This is a great team and the best coach to ever do it."

The Tide figures to be heavily favored in its last two games. against Austin Peay and struggling rival Auburn. Now, the challenge isn't play-

ing with the pressure of staying in the national title hunt, it's playing well without that prospect.

"I think it's a challenge, but at the same time I think we've still got a lot to play for," defensive end Byron Young said. "We've got to play for the name on the back of our jerseys. We've got to play for the 'A' on the front of it."

"And we've got to play for everybody that's beside us because I'm gonna come in here every single day and work just like I'm going to play for a national championship next Saturday. And that's what I expect everybody else to do."

Alabama has played in 171 regular season games with national championship implications since 2008 and only three without, a note that was culled from the team's game notes this week. Those three came in the 2010 sea-

son.

Alabama has posted double-digit wins every season since Saban's 2007 debut and needs to win three of four to keep that string going, counting a bowl game.

The Tide, which lost to Georgia in the national championship game last season, returned as the favorite to win a seventh crown under Saban. Alabama, after all, had arguably the two best players in college football returning, probably for only one more season: the Heisman Trophy-winning Bryce Young and linebacker Will Anderson Jr. Both are highly rated NFL prospects ahead of next year's draft.

The second loss had Saban complaining about the unfairness of placing such expectations on his team "before they ever have a body of work."

"But I think that's kind of

the nature of the beast in this day and age," he said. "But I think being able to handle that, not putting pressure on yourself to try to live up to that expectation, sort of creates a lot of anxiety in some cases."

Saban said he wants his players to experience joy, not relief, from winning.

"I think I've done a pretty average job of getting our players out of that mode," he said.

This team never really was the consistently dominant group many expected. The offensive line has struggled at times to protect Young, and he hasn't had go-to receivers like Jameson Williams and John Metchie III last season.

The defense has given up some big plays, including LSU quarterback Jayden Daniels' 25-yard touchdown run in overtime.

Alabama won squeakers against Texas and SEC West cellar dweller Texas A&M, meaning four games have gone down to the wire.

Saban was asked to evaluate the performance of the offense and offensive coordinator Bill O'Brien, and didn't directly answer the latter part.

"Look, there's things that we need to do better in every part of our organization," he said. "I'm not going to analyze somebody publicly, good, bad or indifferent. We're all working hard together. We're all responsible for what we do. Do we need to play better on both sides of the ball? Absolutely.

"There's not a coach or a player in this organization that can't do things better to help our players have a better chance to be successful."

Logano wins at Phoenix to earn 2nd NASCAR championship

AVONDALE, Ariz. — Penske Perfect.

From the first NASCAR race with the new Next Gen car, the Daytona 500, the IndyCar championship and now the NASCAR Cup title, it's been about as close to a perfect season as possible for Roger Penske.

Joey Logano won his second NASCAR championship on Sunday with a victory in the winner-take-all finale at Phoenix Raceway — a win that gave Penske the Cup title and IndyCar title in the same season for the first time in 31 attempts.

"It's about time," Penske said. "Joey did a great job, and for us to have two championships in the same year, that's what we're here for. That's the goal we have every year. I think we've been close, but we got it this year."

It was the fourth win of the season for Logano, who opened the year with a January win in an exhibition race at Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum in the debut of the Next Gen car. Less than a month later, rookie teammate Austin Cindric won the Daytona 500 on Penske's 85th birthday.

Will Power added the IndyCar championship to the Team Penske trophy case in September and Logano's dominating run Sunday closed out the banner year for the organization.

"I knew going into this thing that we're going to win the championship. I told the guys we were the favorite from Daytona, and we truly believed it, and that's the difference," Logano said. "I had a good team with a bunch of confidence, and we had all the reason in the world to be confident. I've never been truly this ready for a championship race, and yeah, we did it, man. I can't believe it."

Logano was met after the

win by his wife and 4-year-old son, Hudson, the oldest of his three children and only one to make the trip to Phoenix. Logano took Hudson by the hand and ran up the banking to collect the checkered flag.

His son skipped back down the track, waving the flag and holding his champion father's hand. Logano had promised Hudson he'd win the championship.

"We've had so many conversations over the last couple weeks before bedtime. First was 'Daddy is going to get a pole, and he's going to meet me out here and we're going to win the race,' and I couldn't be a liar to my son," Logano said.

Logano then drove Hudson inside the No. 22 Ford to the championship stage.

"I always wanted to do that with Hudson. He's such a little car guy," Logano said.

Logano at 32 was the oldest driver in the championship

four, as well as the only one who is married with children. The Next Gen equaled the competition this season and the Cup Series celebrated 19 different winners, including five first-timers and two drivers making their first appearance in the championship race.

Even with the parity, Logano never doubted this would be his season.

"Getting the bookends, the first and the last race, means a lot," Logano said. "It's just a really special year for us with our third baby, and 22 in '22, I told you so!"

It is the third Cup championship for Penske, who won with Brad Keselowski in 2012 and Logano's first title in 2018. Logano joined Kyle Busch as the only active drivers with multiple Cup titles.

Logano won the pole and was never really challenged on Sunday as his Ford led 186 of the 312 laps, and he

was not the highest running title contender for only one lap. He's the first Ford driver to win two Cup titles since David Pearson in 1968 and 1969.

It is the second Cup championship for crew chief Paul Wolfe, who won with Keselowski in 2012 and admitted to texting rival Ford crew chief Rodney Childers for strategy advice during the race.

"I was texting him throughout the race, 'What are you guys thinking? What would you do?'" Wolfe said. "I have thoughts, but all the other crew chiefs might think something different. It's good to have another perspective. There's guys in the garage you can trust and there's guys you can't. I think Rodney and I have a great relationship, and I appreciate that."

Ross Chastain finished third in his championship race debut, and Christopher

Bell was 10th in his debut. Bell raced hours after Joe Gibbs Racing learned vice chairman Coy Gibbs, son of the Hall of Fame team owner, died in his sleep at 49.

"You wake up this morning and you're racing for a championship, you're happy, you're elated, and then your world comes crashing down," Bell said. "Whenever you get news like that, it definitely puts it in perspective that there's much more to this outside of racing."

Chase Elliott was spun by Chastain early in the final stage, his Chevrolet hit the wall and he was immediately out of contention. It snapped Hendrick Motorsports streak of two consecutive Cup titles.

"Just disappointed, obviously, ended our day and ended our chance at a win or a championship. Just disappointing," Elliott said.

NASCAR's most popular driver won a career-high five races this year and the regular-season championship, but Elliott lost his shot at a second championship when he cut across the front of Chastain and Chastain refused to lift. The contact sent Elliott spinning into the wall, he dropped to 30th and down a lap during the repairs, and finished 28th.

"I feel like it was just hard racing and I had position," Chastain said. "I got to the left of (Elliott) and saw an erratic move that he made to turn left to cover it, but I was already there. It's not how I want to race them or those guys."

Logano, who started his career with JGR and spent five seasons there before he was fired after the 2012 season, gave his regards to the Gibbs family after the win.

"I don't know what to think, but obviously my condolences go to the Gibbs family," Logano said. "But just an incredible day for us, and kind of mixed emotions at the moment."

Marshall Co. primed for Lexington in 2nd round match up

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To win at this stage of the postseason, teams have to play their best game of the year, each and every week.

On Friday night, the Marshall County Tigers (10-1) will travel to face Region 6-AAAA champion Lexington.

Lexington enters Friday night's second round game of the Class 4A playoffs with an 8-3 record, having beaten Greenbrier in the first-round last week.

It's been 14 years since Lexington and Marshall County last met and the Tigers are hoping to win their fifth-straight game of the season on Friday night.

lar to us as as team in regards to their athleticism, size, and being sound in the kicking game. They run a 3-4 on defense and have won seven games in-a-row, shutting down most opponents offenses," Osteen said

For the Tigers, the game plan is to stick

with the balance of the offense and rely on senior tailback Demari Braden out of the backfield, as well as junior quarterback Silas Teat to move the chains through the air.

Braden enters Friday night's second-round playoff game having rushed for 13 touch-

downs and over 700 yards on 132 carries this season.

Teat has been equally as efficient through the air, completing 119 passes for 1,576 yards and 26 touchdowns.

Jayden Randolph and Aja Jones have been the big play threats at receiver for the Tigers, with both having eclipsed the 500-receiving yards mark. Jones has caught eight touchdown passes for Marshall County, while Randolph has 10 to his credit.

"We are gonna stick with our identity which is to try and be balanced and take what the defense gives us.

"I feel like we have gotten better each week this season. That's a tribute to our guys and their commitment to wanting to be coached and pushed each week. I hope that progression continues for another week," Osteen said.

The Lexington Tigers enter Friday night's game on a seven-game win-streak and have scored at least 40 points in their last three games.

Kickoff is set for 7 p.m. in Lexington.

Front office, not Willis, at fault for Titans' loss



It's tough when you've got a machine rolling and you take a hit to that image—especially when you weren't considered to be a player in the first place.

The Titans once again found themselves on the outside of the national media's favorites, which could be expected after starting the season with losses to the New York Giants and Buffalo Bills.

But after that 0-2 start, the Titans rattled off five-straight wins and quickly grabbed control of the AFC South lead.

Even after starting quarterback Ryan Tannehill injured his foot against the Colts on October 23, the Titans turned to rookie third-rounder Malik Willis.

After his debut last

week against the Texans, it's clear Willis isn't ready to be the everyday starter as his style of play at Liberty doesn't necessarily transition well to the NFL.

The tools and mechanics are there' but it's almost like rebuilding a quarterback from the ground up.

With the Titans rolling into Kansas City on Sunday night prime time, fans and pundits alike pinning the blame on Willis is rather inexcusable.

His second-ever start in front of a national audience and facing arguably the greatest quarterback talent to ever play the game in Patrick Mahomes, Mike Vrabel and the coaching staff weren't going to ask Willis to get into a run-and-gun shootout with Mahomes.

Instead, Willis was going to have to be surgical in his throws and rely on Derrick Henry to be the bell cow of the offense.

Henry delivered for much of the first half.

He went on to finish

with 115 yards on 17 carries and a pair of scores.

But the bigger issue is, Willis did what he was asked.

Was his stats line of 5-for-16 for 80 yards impressive? Absolutely not. But he added 40 yards on eight carries and didn't do anything to cost the Titans the game.

As a rookie still transitioning to the NFL, that's exactly what you

want out of a quarterback put in that situation when he's not ready.

Look around the NFL from Sunday: Aaron Rodgers went 23-for-43 for 291 yards and one touchdown and three interceptions; Josh Allen went 18-for-34 for 205 yards and two interceptions; P.J. Walker went 3-for-10 for nine yards and two interceptions.

Those quarterbacks

all made mistakes that led to eventual losses—Willis didn't do that.

No, Sunday's loss wasn't on Willis in the slightest, but rather the Titans' front office for not having a NFL-ready backup to go in the event of a Tannehill injury.

With the trade deadline having come and gone, the Titans stood pat and didn't make a move. There are free agent quarterbacks out

there capable of spot starts and even quarterbacks on the trade block the Titans could have made a move for.

Instead, the front office decided to hope Willis would be ready before his time and Henry could deliver more of his history-making magic.

Willis' numbers through two starts should be taken with a grain of salt at this point. He's been in the system less than nine months and any player who transitions from college to the NFL will tell you, it's not an easy task, and for a quarterback having to relearn proper mechanics, having to unlearn what's made you successful is about as easy as learning how to walk again.

The loss absolutely hurts, but if fans and pundits are going to point fingers and blame at someone, do it at the front office, not at the guy who was put in a no-win situation.

UGA is top 'dog', Vols slip to 5th

Georgia was the new No. 1 in the College Football Playoff rankings Tuesday night, followed by Ohio State, Michigan and TCU.

The Bulldogs' rise from No. 3 was no surprise after their dominant victory against previously top-ranked Tennessee on Saturday.

Clemson, which was No. 4 in the selection committee's first rankings last week, also lost, clearing the way for changes in the top four.

Ohio State stayed at two. The Buckeyes' Big Ten rival, Michigan, moved up from five to three. TCU jumped three spots to No. 4, putting the nation's four unbeaten teams at the top of the rankings.

"It's going to be a challenge to stay here," TCU coach Sonny Dykes said during ESPN's rankings show.

Tennessee fell to No. 5 and was followed by Oregon from the Pac-12 and LSU, which jumped three

spots to seventh after the Tigers knocked off Alabama.

Selection committee chairman Boo Corrigan, who is the athletic director at North Carolina State, said TCU's six victories against teams with above .500 records were notable.

"I don't think it was as much what Tennessee didn't do as much as what TCU did do," Corrigan said.

He added the Volunteers' big victories against Alabama and LSU helped keep them above Oregon, which also played Georgia and lost by 46.

Clemson fell to 10th after being routed by Notre Dame. Alabama dropped from sixth to ninth after its second loss of the season.

This is the first time since the College Football Playoff rankings began in 2014 that neither Clemson nor Alabama have been ranked in the top six.

There has never been a College Football Playoff without the Tigers and the Crimson Tide, which

have combined to win five of the eight CFP championships.

Analysis

Are Alabama and Clemson done?

No, both still have a path to the playoff, but a lot is going to have to break their way — especially for Alabama.

First thing working against the Tide is there has never been a two-loss team in the College Football Playoff. But the SEC champion has never been left out of the CFP.

If Alabama could win the SEC, beating Georgia in the process, good luck keeping the Tide out. But the road to the SEC championship game for the Tide is blocked by LSU, which would have to lose both of its remaining conferences games at Arkansas and Texas A&M to clear the way for Alabama.

That's assuming Alabama wins out. The Tide plays at Mississippi, which was 11th in the committee's rankings, on Saturday and then Austin Peay before the Iron

Bowl against Auburn.

Before writing Alabama off, take note: LSU is only a 3-point favorite at Arkansas this weekend and might be a single-digit favorite against a struggling but talented Texas A&M team.

As for Clemson, this is a long way from over. A 12-1 Power Five conference champion will always have a shot and the Tigers could still end up there.

The Tigers' bigger is-

sue could be winning a resume contest against one-loss champions from the Big 12, where TCU is still unbeaten, or Pac-12, which currently has four teams in the committee's top 13 — Oregon, No. 8 USC, No. 12 UCLA and No. 13 Utah.

Plus, there is the question of whether an 11-1 team that doesn't win its division, like Tennessee or the loser of Ohio State-Michigan, would get the nod over Clemson

at 12-1 with an ACC title.

On top of all that, the Tigers have to win out against an improving Louisville team, rival South Carolina and likely No. 15 North Carolina and star quarterback Drake Maye in the ACC championship game.

After a run of six straight CFP appearances by Clemson was snapped last year, the Tigers are now staring at consecutive seasons being left out.
