Veterans Day honors sacrifice

Rain throughout Friday morning might have washed out the Lewisburg Veterans Day parade but not the ceremonies honoring and remembering those who have served. Moved into the Dixie Theatre, a crowd still gathered for the American Legion led event. Lieutenant Colonel Arthur “Jay” Richards (pictured), a battalion commander in the Tennessee National Guard 278th Armored Cavalry Regiment, delivered the keynote address, focusing on the historic willingness of Tennesseans, in particular, to come to the county’s defense. “We have all sacrificed to give to the greater good,” said Richards, of what unites the less than one percent of Americans who have served in the armed forces. “Our duty is to remember their sacrifices,” he closed, which Marshall County, despite the weather, proved that it does.

Farm Day highlights agriculture

On October 19, 405 fourth graders representing 17 classrooms from Marshall County’s elementary schools attended Farm Day at the Middle Tennessee Ag Research and Education Center of Lewisburg. Hosted by Marshall County Farm Bureau Women’s Group, the purpose of the field day was to share the importance of agriculture with our youth. Seventeen exhibits including displays of products, live animals, games, and agricultural speakers were set up. Petting the animals and learning how our food and clothing is produced were highlights of the day.

The hands-on experience was provided with the assistance of Tennessee Department of Forestry, Lewisburg USDA Soil Conservation Center, Marshall County 4-H, Forrest High School FFA, Tractor Town, Middle Tennessee Ag Research and Education Center, Marshall County Farm Bureau, Tennessee Farm Bureau and many volunteers. Students were thrilled to learn about and often touch dairy cows, beef cattle, pigs, chickens, goats, pleasure and walking horses and bees.

Exhibitors explained the role of soil and the production of cotton, wheat, soybeans, and hay. Tractor safety and fire safety were encouraged. Students enjoyed a straw bale race, tricks with Mr. Moorehead, and a snack of milk. The learning field trip showcased the many “hats” that farm families wear. The goal of the annual Farm Day country classroom experience is to assist students in connecting to their agricultural roots.

The Cost of This Year’s Thanksgiving Has Run A-Fowl

UT Extension Explains Increased Costs, Provides Tips to Stretch Food Dollars

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — Everyone knows that the cost of practically everything has increased. Since last year inflation has boosted overall prices 8.2 percent, but the cost of groceries has increased a whopping 13 percent, which University of Tennessee Extension says will impact this year’s Thanksgiving Day meals. Many staple items, including butter, eggs and potatoes, have had steep price increases.

Andrew Griffith, associate professor in the UTIA Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics, says despite an increased number of birds being placed, turkey production in 2022 is down 4.6 percent compared to 2021 year-to-date. Their average live weight is down, too. This has resulted in an increase in 8- to 16-pound whole hen prices. Whole hen prices exceeded \$1.72 per pound in September but while they are expected to decline prior to Thanksgiving, they are still likely to remain above \$1.50 per pound. Simply stated, turkey prices have followed other meat prices higher.

To identify the total cost for a

Thanksgiving meal for 10 people, UT Extension’s Consumer Economics Leadership Team surveyed grocery stores across Tennessee from November 1 to November 7 to discover how much families could expect to spend on the holiday. This week was chosen to reflect some grocers running specials at certain items. Led by Ann Berry, a professor with UT Extension’s Family and Consumer Sciences, the team surveyed rural and urban locations along with independently owned and big box stores, representing retailers from each of the three regions of the state. Prices for store brands were used when available. Some grocers reported not having some items in stock during this week or estimating that they may not be in stock at all before Thanksgiving.

The survey included items that are traditionally served at a Tennessee Thanksgiving meal, including turkey and stuffing, cranberry sauce, ham, mashed potatoes, sweet potato casserole, green bean casserole, English pea salad, deviled eggs, pumpkin pie with whipped cream and rolls. The leadership team also estimated that the Thanksgiving meal would feed 10 people.

The total cost of the complete meal for 10 was \$112.30, with a

per person cost of \$11.23.

Kristen Johnson, assistant professor and UT Extension nutrition specialist, also advises that Thanksgiving leftovers provide an opportunity to think creatively, try new dishes or develop new holiday traditions. Leftover turkey, green beans, corn, sweet potatoes and other vegetables can be used in soups, stews, sandwiches and casseroles. And leftover cranberries make a great topping for oatmeal, waffles or pancakes. She also stresses to practice food safety steps to keep your food safe this holiday season to prevent foodborne illness. Thanksgiving leftovers should be used within 3-4 days. Set a reminder to use or freeze your leftovers by the Monday after Thanksgiving. As you’re preparing your Thanksgiving meal and your Thanksgiving leftovers, remember that perishable foods should not remain at room temperature for more than two hours. Place perishable foods in the refrigerator or the freezer within two hours of removing them from the oven or refrigerator.

Berry and Johnson suggest utilizing recipes for Thanksgiving leftovers from the SNAP-Ed website, snaped.fns.usda.gov.

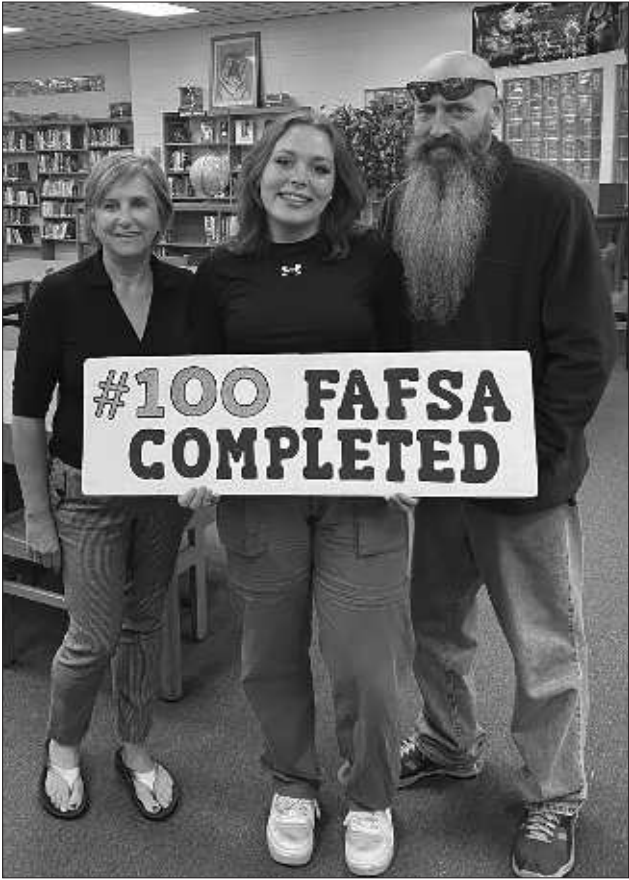

She assists students at all Marshall County high schools and Columbia State as well as current college students to help complete the FAFSA application. This is a free service to Marshall County residents that helps remove the barrier for obtaining financial aid. many details of Biggers’ rise from humble beginnings to prominence as a businessman and community leader, prior to Lewisburg Mayor Jim Bingham reading the official proclamation enacted by the city to honor one of its own.

A 1953 graduate of Jones High School where he was elected most athletic and best all around, he founded Biggers Janitorial in 1955, after being unable to accept an athletic scholarship for college.

The stretch of road is particularly fitting as it passes in front of the convenience store Biggers built in 1982.

Biggers served on both the Lewisburg City

Council and on the Marshall County Commission. He was the first African American elected to office in the county since Reconstruction.

He was key in the establishment of Lewisburg’s ward system as well.

Very active in Greater First Baptist Church and as a Mason, Biggers refereed football for many years and was a passionate outdoorsman.

Biggers’ legacy extends to this day with several of his children still active in the community and in the many memories of the difference he made in the lives of so many.

Caldwell Biggers Parkway serves as, in Henry’s words, “a prestigious honor for a prestigious man.”

Tigers' run ends in 2nd round of playoffs

LEXINGTON — What's been a fantastic season for the Marshall County Tigers (10-2) came to a close on Friday night in the second-round of the Class 4A state playoffs.

Lexington (9-3), the Region 6-A AAAA champion, scored 14 fourth-quarter points to end the Tigers' season with a final score of 21-14.

Lexington's offense, though unconventional, proved incredibly successful on Friday night.

The Lexington Tigers' scheme boiled down to lengthy, sustained drives, moving the chains via the run and limiting Marshall County's possessions.

"First off, hats off to Lexington with some old school, grind it out football. To get a group of kids to buy into that style tells you the type of program coach Hollingsworth has. Big, physical football team with their downhill running game," Marshall County head coach Thomas Osteen said.

"That being said, I'm really proud of our kids for the way we fought

them all night and gave our selves chances. We knew we wouldn't have a lot of possessions offensively, so we had to make the most of them and didn't do that. The margin for error is so thin against a team like Lexington."

Lexington relied on the two-headed monster out of the backfield, featuring Isiah McClaine, who rushed for over 240 yards against Marshall County.

The first possession of the game drained nearly seven minutes off the clock before Marshall County even touched the ball.

While McClaine was able to push the Lexington line of scrimmage into Marshall County territory, a pair of fourth-down penalties forced the home team to punt.

Giving Lexington a taste of its own medicine, Tiger senior Demari Braden helped the Marshall County Tigers press to the Lexington 28-yard line where Wyatt Joyce attempted a 45-yard field goal.

The try, however, was blocked and Lexington eventually converted on that possession with

a Jakob Davis 14-yard run.

Marshall County responded in short order with a 39-yard touchdown pass from junior quarterback Silas Teat to Marcus O'Neal to even the score at 7-7 with 4:10 left.

That score held until mid-way through the third quarter.

After Marshall County forced a punt with 8:00 left, the Tigers found themselves deep in Lexington territory.

A 37-yard run by Braden breathed life into the possession and on second and goal from the six-yard line, Teat faked a handoff and darted for the end zone on a bootleg to give Marshall County a 14-7 lead with a quarter to play.

The continued barrage of McClaine pounding the Tiger defense continued to take its toll and the lead was

short lived as he was able to punch it in the end zone with 10:22 left in the fourth to knot

the game at 14 apiece.

Disaster struck Marshall County on its attempt to answer when

the Tigers fumbled the ball into Lexington's hands on the 25-yard

Deer season opens Saturday

NASHVILLE — Tennessee's 2022-23 statewide gun hunting season for deer opens Saturday, Nov. 19. The season traditionally opens each year on the Saturday prior to Thanksgiving. During gun season, sportsmen may also use muzzleloaders or archery equipment.

"Deer hunting season is one of our state's most cherished traditions," said Jason Maxedon, Executive Director of the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency. "We hope everyone will be able to get into the woods and have the opportunity to carry someone with you to continue the tradition."

The statewide bag limit for antlered bucks is two. No more than one antlered deer may be taken per day, not to exceed two for the season. Hunters are allowed the following antlerless bag limits: Unit A-three per day, Unit B-one per season, Unit C-one per season (Nov. 19-Dec. 4 only), and Unit D-one per season (Nov. 19-25 only).

In Unit CWD, there is a limit of three antlerless deer per day with no season limit. A bag limit of three antlered deer applies in Unit CWD, too. However, the bag limit of three antlered deer may be exceeded within Unit CWD if taken under the Earn-A-Buck Program or if taken under the Replacement Buck Program. Details on each of the programs are on page 31 of the 2022-23 Tennessee Hunting and Trapping Guide.

Anyone born on or after January 1, 1969 is required to carry proof of satisfactory completion of a hunter education class or be in possession of the Apprentice Hunting License (along with other required licenses) while hunting any species in Tennessee. Hunter education can be completed online for free.

For more information about Tennessee's 2022-23 deer hunting seasons, exact boundaries of deer units, and complete license requirements refer to the 2022-23 Tennessee Hunting and Trapping Guide available online at tnwildlife.org or the TWRA App. Physical copies can be picked up at an agency office or license agent retail location.

Banged-up Titans turn plug-and-play into stingy defense

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee Titans keep swapping bodies in and out on defense, using 24 different starters alone midway through the season.

Now the Titans face another challenge Thursday night in defending four-time MVP Aaron Rodgers in Green Bay (4-6).

The way Tennessee is playing, someone will be ready.

"We're just a plug-and-play team where it's like everyone's held to the same standard," two-time All-Pro safety Kevin Byard said Tuesday. "Everyone's held to the same standard. Backups prepare like starters. They get asked questions in the meeting rooms like starters, so when they get in the game there's no drop-off."

The Titans (6-3) lead the NFL in third down defense, allowing 27.9% conversions on 34 of 122 chances. They rank second against the run, allowing 85.1 yards per game. They've been even better since Week 2, giving up an average of 61 yards per game.

Packers offensive coordinator Adam Stenavich said the Tennessee defense will be a huge challenge.

"Their linebackers are very aggressive, fill hard, very instinctual," Stenavich said. "Their safeties play in the box really hard as well, so they do a good job stopping the run and you can tell that's a big priority for them."

The Titans also improved to eighth in fewest points allowed at 18.7 points a game. Tennessee has held its past seven opponents to 22 points or fewer, including just 10 in three of the past four games.

The Titans did it again in a 17-10 win over Denver and Russell Wilson despite missing five defensive starters before kickoff. They lost three more defenders to injuries during the game. Jeffery Simmons, a 2021 Pro Bowl defensive lineman, watched the game from home resting his sprained left ankle.

Simmons noted the Titans have dealt with a bunch of injuries over the past two years. They set an NFL record in using 91 different play-

ers last season, most in a non-strike season, in winning the AFC's No. 1 seed. They lead the AFC South despite having 14 on injured reserve.

"Adversity hit, we don't fold out," said Simmons, who is hoping to play Thursday night. "I think that's kind of the motto and kind of I guess the way Vrabels try to build this team on next man up mentality and guys just being able to come in and step up."

"Vrabels would be Titans coach Mike Vrabel, a 14-year NFL linebacker who won three Super Bowls.

The coach said this group plays extremely hard and has figured out how to get stops even after giving up big plays. They're getting turnovers and are allowing fewer explosive plays that plagued

them early.

The Titans coach likes seeing players seize their chances.

"It's cool to see them take advantage of them and then hopefully earn more opportunities and be ready to go if we need them," Vrabel said.

Even with all the replacements, the Titans had six sacks last week — most in a regular-season game under Vrabel. Their 16 sacks combined in their past four games lead the NFL in that span.

The defense also has the NFL's longest active streak, and the longest in franchise history since 1979, with six consecutive games with three or more sacks. Denico Autry leads the team with seven, and DeMarcus Walker, an offseason signee, has had at least a sack in three straight games.

They ended the game on Terrance Mitchell's interception, the seventh straight game with a pick for the franchise's longest streak since having eight such games in 2010. Only the Patriots have a longer active streak this season at eight consecutive games.

Only Byard, nose tackle Teair Tart, linebacker David Long Jr. and rookie cornerback Roger McCreary started against Denver after also starting the season opener.

"Guys are just buying into what we're doing first and foremost," Byard said. "Just playing hard is just the bare minimum, and I think we're getting better with the details."

Notes

The Titans made a slew of personnel moves Tuesday. That included placing CB Caleb Farley, their 2021 first-round draft pick, on injured reserve with a back issue. With K Randy Bullock on the injury report with a right calf issue and not practicing Tuesday, they signed Josh Lambo to the practice squad. ... C Ben Jones (concussion) did not practice for a second straight day. ... They also signed DL Larrell Murchison and LB Joe Schobert to the active roster. DBs Greg Mabin and Davontae Harris and LB Andre Smith signed with the practice squad.

Titans' timing for 1st Thursday night game couldn't be worse

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee Titans face their first Thursday night game this season at the worst moment possible.

Yes, the Titans (6-3) are coming off a 17-10 win over Denver, their sixth in seven games. They also have 13 players on injured reserve and had to scratch five defensive starters before kickoff.

Then Tennessee lost three more to injuries during the game.

And oh yeah, Titans kicker Randy Bullock's calf on his right, kicking leg is hurt now too before a trip to Green Bay (4-6).

It's time for some Jedi mind tricks — beyond the usual NFL ploy of pretending Monday really is Wednesday and not the day usually spent recovering from playing a game 24 hours earlier.

"We have to tell ourselves that, we have to tell our bodies that, we have to tell our minds that," Titans coach Mike Vrabel said Monday.

"But we also have to try to do the best that we can to win the mental performance and the physical recovery battle here the next couple of days. Everybody deals with it."

The Titans (6-3) have battled through plenty of injuries to climb back atop the AFC South after an 0-2 start. Patching together a lineup for the next game is nothing new for a franchise that set an NFL record using 91 different players last season while earning the AFC's No. 1 seed.

They also got quarterback Ryan Tannehill back from a sprained right ankle that cost him two straight starts.

"No doubt it is a challenge," Tannehill said. "It is a challenge each and every Thursday night game that comes around. We have to get past this one quickly."

What's working

The defense. Somehow, somehow the Titans plug and play and don't skip a beat even when they sat 2021 Pro Bowl defensive lineman Jeffery Simmons (left

ankle), safety Amani Hooker (left shoulder), outside linebacker Bud Dupree (hip) and cornerback Kristian Fulton (hamstring) with linebacker Zach Cunningham put on IR.

They're tied for fourth in the NFL with 29 sacks, lead the league in allowing the fewest third down conversions and rank eighth for fewest points allowed.

What needs help

The offense. Yes, Tannehill had his third-best passing performance this season with 255 yards, and they scored a rare touchdown in the third quarter. But Tennessee has scored two fewer points (166) than the defense has allowed (168).

The Titans rank last in averaging 281.7 yards per game.

Derrick Henry, second in the NFL with 923 yards entering Monday, remains their biggest weapon. He's also the biggest focal point for opposing defenses to stop first and foremost. That's why his five-game streak of 100-yard rushing performances was

snapped with 53 yards against Denver, his second-worst performance this season.

Stock up

WR Nick Westbrook-Ikhine. The guy who went undrafted out of Indiana in 2020 is coming off a career-best performance with 119 yards receiving and two touchdowns, including a 63-yarder off a flea-flicker play. That tripled the number of TD catches by Tennessee receivers, which had been one by Robert Woods.

Stock down

CB Caleb Farley. The 2021 first-round pick dropped from a potential top 10 selection to Tennessee at No. 22 because of a second surgery on his back weeks before the draft. He left the Denver game with a back injury. But he hadn't played a defensive snap in the past four games, contributing only on special teams.

Injured

17 — That's the number of Titans on Mon-

day's estimated injury report, though Henry and defensive lineman Denico Autry were limited not by injury. Center Ben Jones had a concussion and was among seven who did not practice. LB David Long (neck), CB Roger McCreary (calf) and Tannehill — who all finished Sunday's game — were limited. S Amani Hooker, who missed the past two games with an injured left shoulder, was listed as practicing fully.

Key numbers

7 and 6: The Titans have intercepted at least one pass in seven straight games. They also have at least three sacks in six straight games.

Next steps

Heal up enough to go to Green Bay and find a way to end a couple of skids. The Titans are 0-2 in prime-time games this season and have lost their past two at Lambeau Field by a combined score of 95-21. Then the Titans can get a long weekend off before hosting Cincinnati on Nov. 27.

UGA, Ohio St, Michigan, TCU remain CFP top 4

Georgia, Ohio State, Michigan and TCU held on to the top four spots in the College Football Playoff rankings. The Bulldogs' Southeastern Conference rivals Tennessee and LSU are at Nos. 5 and 6, respectively. With three of the top six teams and only three weeks left until Selection Sunday, the SEC appears well positioned to put two teams in the CFP for the second straight season and third time overall. USC, the Pac-12's best and probably last hope to make the final four, is seventh.

Georgia, Ohio State, Michigan and TCU held on to the top four spots in the College Football Playoff rankings on Tuesday night, with Tennessee at No. 5 and LSU at No. 6.

With three of the top six teams and only three weeks left until Selection Sunday, the Southeastern Conference appears well positioned to put two teams in the CFP for the second straight season and third time overall.

Georgia (10-0) and LSU (8-2) have already clinched spots in the SEC title game. Tennessee (9-1) can do no better than 11-1.

"The committee believes there's been separation with Georgia," said selection committee chairman Boo Corrigan, who is also the North Carolina State athletic director.

Ohio State (10-0) and Michigan (10-0) will finish the regular season against each other the Saturday after Thanksgiving.

No. 7 USC (9-1), the Pac-12's best and probably last hope to make the final four, is seventh. USC faces UCLA (8-2), the committee's 16th ranked team, on Saturday.

In another key Pac-12 game on Saturday, No. 10 Utah (8-2) visits No. 12 Oregon (8-2).

Alabama (8-2) is eighth, but the Crimson Tide has been eliminated from SEC championship contention and with two losses virtually eliminated from the CFP race.

Clemson (9-1) moved up to ninth, the highest ranked Atlantic Coast Conference team.

Analysis

The selection committee not only chooses the four teams that play for the national championship, they fill any at-large spot available in the four other New Year's Six bowls.

That job won't be too tough this season.

With the semifinals being played in the Fiesta and Peach bowls, that leaves only a couple bids that have not already been spoke for because of conferences' contracts with bowls.

The Rose Bowl gets either the Pac-12 and Big Ten champions or the next-highest ranked team if that champion makes it into the semifinals.

If the Big Ten can get both Ohio State and Michigan into the CFP, it could open up a spot in Pasadena for No. 11 Penn State (8-2).

The Sugar Bowl similarly gets the SEC and Big 12 champions unless they are in the playoff and then it's the next teams up in those conferences. For Georgia, Tennessee or LSU, the Sugar could be a consolation prize.

The next highest ranked Big 12 team after TCU is Kansas State (7-3) at 15. TCU has locked up a spot in the conference title game, but its opponent is TBD.

TCU is the Big 12's only CFP contender, so the Horned Frogs making it into the semifinals would pave the way for one of its conference rivals to land in New Orleans.

The Orange Bowl gets the ACC champion or the next highest ranked team from that conference if the champ is in the playoff. Clemson and No. 13 North Carolina (9-1) are already set for the conference title game.

The Orange bowl also gets the highest ranked Big Ten or SEC team available, which puts Alabama in play depending on how many SEC teams make the CFP. Penn State will be in that mix if it wins out.

The Cotton Bowl has two at-large spots, but one of those is already reserved for the highest ranked champion from a Group of Five conference.

No. 20 UCF (8-2) from the American Athletic Conference is currently the best ranked non-Power Five team. No. 21 Tulane (8-2) and No. 25 Cincinnati (8-2) are also ranked from the AAC, setting up that conference to likely nab one spot in the Cotton Bowl.

The other Cotton Bowl bid is the one true at-large that can be filled by the highest ranked team available regardless of conference.

The likely candidates: TCU if it were to fail to win the Big 12, Alabama or Penn State. Dark horses: A Pac-12 runner-up, North Carolina and No. 14 Mississippi (8-2).

UVA cancels upcoming game in wake of shooting that killed 3

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. — The University of Virginia student accused of killing three members of the football team and wounding two other students in an on-campus shooting was due in court Wednesday morning for his first hearing.

University officials and police have said Christopher Darnell Jones Jr., 22, joined a group of about two dozen others on a field trip Sunday from the Charlottesville campus to see a play in the nation's capital, about 120 miles (195 kilometers) away. When their bus arrived back on campus, authorities have said Jones opened fire, killing Lavel Davis Jr., D'Sean Perry and Devin Chandler, and wounding two others, one of them also a football

player.

Jones — who police have said was able to flee the shooting scene, setting off a manhunt and 12-hour campus lockdown — faces three counts of second-degree murder, two counts of malicious wounding and additional gun-related charges.

The prosecutor handling the case, Albemarle Commonwealth's Attorney James Hingeley, said by email that Jones was expected to appear by video link from a local jail.

Online records do not list an attorney for Jones. If he is financially eligible for court-appointed counsel, an attorney will be appointed Wednesday, Hingeley wrote, adding there also could be a preliminary bail review at the hearing.

Jones has been in custody since he was arrested in suburban Richmond late Monday

morning.

University President Jim Ryan said Monday that authorities did not have a "full understanding" of the motive behind the shooting. Court documents filed so far in the matter have offered no additional insight.

Jones was a member of the football team during the 2018 season, a one-semester walk-on, according to athletics director Carla Williams.

In interviews, his father has expressed confusion and astonishment and apologized to the victims' families.

The violence at the state's flagship public university has set off days of mourning among students and faculty, the broader Charlottesville community and other supporters. Classes resumed Wednesday and a campus-wide event honoring the victims was in the works.

Vols nosedive to No. 22 in latest poll

North Carolina didn't have a dominating start at No. 1. The Tar Heels open their second week atop the Associated Press men's college basketball poll with coach Hubert Davis reminding his players it will take time to find a flow like the one that carried them to last year's NCAA championship game.

UNC (2-0) earned 44 of 63 first-place votes to finish ahead of No. 2 Gonzaga in Monday's first regular-season AP Top 25, which featured only slight changes from the preseason poll released Oct. 17.

The Tar Heels return four starters from last year's team, including AP preseason All-American Armando Bacot inside. But they labored through wins last week, first against UNC Wilmington and then against College of Charleston.

After the opener, Davis said he hoped it was "first-game anxiousness and nervousness." After the second, he said he had talked to his team about dealing with expectations.

"One of the things I've sensed in them — I just felt not a nervousness, but maybe a little bit of a burden of the expectations," Davis said. "And I tried to get them to understand

that though those are expectations are noise, it means nothing.

"I felt like on every play, they were trying to make it look like the way we looked in April. That's just not possible. That just can't happen. This is this year's team."

The top tier

The second-ranked Bulldogs (2-0) picked up 14 first-place votes after wins against North Florida and Michigan State, the latter coming on the deck of an aircraft carrier. Third-ranked Houston (2-0) and fourth-ranked Kentucky (2-0) picked up the remaining five votes.

Baylor and Kansas were tied for fifth previously. This time, Baylor is alone at No. 5, followed by Kansas and Duke. UCLA, Arkansas and Creighton round out the top 10.

The new eras

Duke and Villanova both are starting with young coaches replacing retired Hall of Famers. One had an early stumble that carried it right out of the poll.

The Blue Devils beat Jacksonville and USC Upstate — surrendering 82 combined points — in their first two games under Jon Scheyer, who has taken over for Mike Krzyzewski in that program's first coaching change

since 1980.

The Wildcats have turned to Kyle Neptune, who took over in the spring after the retirement of Jay Wright. They won their opener against La Salle then lost to Temple, which dropped them from 16th to unranked for the first time since February 2019.

Rising

Illinois (2-0) had the biggest jump, climbing four spots to No. 19 after two easy home wins. No. 14 Arizona and No. 21 Dayton each rose three spots. In all, 12 teams moved up from the preseason poll.

Sliding

Tennessee (1-1) took the biggest tumble, falling 11 spots to No. 22 after losing to Colorado in its home state.

Kansas — which fell out of the voting tie at No. 5 — Creighton and No. 15 TCU fell one spot each to round out the four teams that slid from their preseason rankings.

Status quo

Seven teams, all inside the top 10, held their preseason position.

Welcome

No. 24 Texas A&M and No. 25 Connecticut are the week's new additions. The Hus-

kies spent most of last season in the AP Top 25, though the Aggies joined the poll for the first time under fourth-year coach Buzz Williams. Texas A&M was last ranked in February 2018, a season that ended with an NCAA Sweet 16 appearance.

Farewell (for now)

Oregon (No. 21) joined Villanova as the two teams to fall out from the preseason poll. The Ducks opened with a home win against Florida A&M but lost at home to UC Irvine four days later.

Conference watch

The Southeastern Conference led the way with six ranked teams, with No. 13 Auburn and No. 18 Alabama joining Kentucky, Arkansas, Tennessee and Texas A&M.

The Big 12 was next with five, with No. 11 Texas and No. 23 Texas Tech joining Baylor, Kansas and TCU.

The Atlantic Coast Conference had three, with No. 16 Virginia joining UNC and Duke; while the Big Ten had three with No. 12 Indiana and No. 20 Michigan joining Illinois.

The Pac-12 and Big East each had two ranked teams, followed by the West Coast, American Athletic, Mountain West and Atlantic 10 conferences each having one.

Watson set to practice with Browns next week

BEREA, Ohio — Deshaun Watson has one last weekend off the field.

The Cleveland Browns’ suspended quarterback can begin practicing on Monday as part of his settlement with the NFL after he was accused of sexual misconduct by two dozen women when he played for Houston.

Watson, who was acquired by the Browns in a controversial trade in March, was banned for 11 games in August for violating the league’s personal conduct policy. He agreed to the suspension, a \$5 million fine and to undergo counseling and treatment.

He returned to the team last month, but the three-time Pro Bowler has been limited to attending meetings, weight-room workouts and conditioning sessions with members of Cleveland’s training staff.

That changes on Monday, when he’ll be allowed to prac-

tice.

The Browns (3-5) play at Miami on Sunday and won’t have their next on-field workout until Wednesday when Watson, who will be eligible to play on Dec. 4 — against Houston — can rejoin his teammates.

“I’ve been waiting. We’re still waiting. I’m ready to play with him,” said Browns defensive end Jadeveon Clowney, who was also Watson’s teammate with the Texans. “I’ve played with him before. He’s a big energy booster for a team. He can go out there make some crazy throws, make some plays, and I think when he gets back we can open up our playbook with him a little different.

“It’s going to be exciting to see when he gets back. I’m just ready for it.”

Watson has always denied being inappropriate with the women, who claim he exposed himself and touched them inappropriately during massage therapy sessions. The 27-year-old settled 23 of 24 civil lawsuits brought against

him. (In October, another civil lawsuit accusing Watson of sexual misconduct was filed in Texas.)

Two grand juries in Texas declined to indict him on criminal charges.

Watson was courted by other teams and initially turned down a trade to the Browns before changing his mind after the team offered him a five-year, \$230 million contract that’s fully guaranteed. The Browns sent three first-round draft picks to the Texans for Watson, and are counting on him to become a franchise QB.

Jacoby Brissett has played well while filling in at quarterback, but he’ll soon step aside for Cleveland’s final six games.

Browns coach Kevin Stefanski declined to specify the team’s immediate plans for Watson when he comes back next week.

“We kind of have a plan for that moving forward,” Stefanski said. “Deshaun is a great, great teammate. He

has been awesome having him back in the building and in the meetings rooms.”

The Browns can’t afford many more losses or their playoff hopes will vanish before Watson comes back. There’s obvious incentive to play well to set up Watson’s return to games, but All-Pro defensive end Myles Garrett said that can’t be the focus.

“We’ve got to win regardless if he comes back or not,” Garrett said. “Anything can happen, praying to God that he’s healthy and everything goes right when he comes back, but I don’t plan on handing it to anyone.

“He’s coming back to us, so we’re all going to do our part and he’s going to come in and do an exceptional job, and we fully believe that. But we’ve got to win for the sake of winning, wanting to be great and do great for the sake of this city. Not just for him coming back.”

McIlroy says Norman needs to ‘exit stage left’ from LIV Golf

Rory McIlroy remains hopeful that the fractured state of golf between established tours and Saudi-funded LIV Golf can heal. He said Tuesday that probably won’t happen until two lawsuits are decided and Greg Norman is no longer involved in LIV Golf.

“I think Greg needs to go. I think he just needs to exit stage left,” McIlroy said at the DP World Tour Championship in Dubai. “He’s made his mark, but I think now is the right time to sort of say, ‘Look, you’ve got this thing off the ground, but no one is going to talk unless there’s an adult in the room that can actually try to mend fences.’”

“But right now, it’s a stalemate because there can’t be any other way.”

The Daily Telegraph reported last week that Norman would be moving away from his role as commissioner and CEO and that LIV Golf was pursuing Mark King, who formerly ran TaylorMade and now is CEO of Taco Bell. Majed Al Sorour, CEO of the Saudi Golf Federation, denied the report.

LIV Golf is now the lead plaintiff in an antitrust lawsuit against the PGA Tour, with a

trial date scheduled for January 2024 if it goes that far. Courts in the United Kingdom are expected to rule in February whether the European tour can punish players for joining LIV Golf.

It was the latest barb McIlroy has tossed at Norman, dating to McIlroy gleefully pointing out in his TV interview in June after he won the Canadian Open that he had more career PGA Tour wins than Norman.

What might have prompted the latest remark was Norman’s in-

terview in Australia on Monday, during which it was announced that LIV Golf would be playing in Adelaide next April.

Norman was talking about the value competition brings to business and sport when he mentioned how PGA Tour players are benefiting from LIV Golf, primarily through a \$100 million “Player Impact Program” that has doubled in size in response to the LIV threat.

The PGA Tour also has 12 elevated events starting next year that

average \$20 million in prize money.

“Every PGA Tour player should be thanking LIV, including Tiger Woods and Rory McIlroy, because the PIP program wouldn’t have been increased without LIV,” Norman said. “Prize money wouldn’t have been increased without LIV, all these other things that have been introduced by the PGA Tour because of LIV. Competition is the best thing in life, in business and in sport. LIV is not going to go anywhere.”

McIlroy would beg to

differ.

“I’ve said this a million times: Tiger is the reason that we are playing for as much as we are playing for,” McIlroy said. “Tiger is the reason that stature of our game is where it is. The generation of Tiger and the generation coming after Tiger have all benefited from him and his achievements and what he’s done for the game of golf.

“I don’t think Tiger should be thankful to anyone for anything. I think everyone else in the game should be thankful.”
