
This year's theme is "Gingerbread house". Entries are still being accepted by calling 931-359-0351.

Chapel Hill cleared several ordinances last week that had been lingering on agendas for a while and adopted resolutions setting foundation for the future.

The board passed a fat, oils, and grease management policy first proposed months ago by one of the town's consulting engineers.

Uncontrolled fats and grease discharges from restaurants, in particular, into the waste water system cause clogging and other damage.

Between first approval and final passage, aldermen held a special called meeting with restaurant owners after concerns were ex-

pressed about the policy as originally written.

The resulting version passed without issue.

Also passing without issue was the final budget amendment necessary for the town to join the Tennessee Consolidated Retirement System. Regarded as one of the best and most stable retirement plans in the nation, the move is a

boon to town employees.

Water bills will now be able to be adjusted on a case by case basis, a request from the town's utility for more flexibility in dealing with resolution of leaks impacting customers.


The town also adopted new standardized utility specifications for the town, a revised personnel policy for employees, and agreed to have town ordinances codified and revised for clarity.

Don't torture them by making them eat carrots two days in a row after their busy day of watching the same "PAW Patrol" and "Peppa Pig" episodes for the 500th time.

Maybe you'd better be sitting down for this, but leading researchers have determined that the people least likely to lend a hand whipping up a new menu item are the most likely to gripe about leftovers. ("Next, we won a research grant to study washing the dishes. Sweet. Let's celebrate. What... lobster AGAIN?")

Human beings really should hold themselves to a higher standard than my tomcat Moggie. No matter how much dry food he finds already on his plate, he expects a few "fresh" bits dropped on the plate before he'll deign to eat. His mother neglected those all-important lessons about starving cats on the other side of the world.

I grew up eating whatever was set in front of me (I tried eating what was set behind me, but my career as a budding contortionist couldn't handle the chiropractic bills), so I grind my teeth when I hear some effete snob regarding himself as too good to eat leftovers. (Whoa...grinding my teeth dislodged some leftover cranberry sauce. Better the second time around.)

Citizens in First World countries are notorious about sending food to the landfill. We need to revive the World War II motto "Take all you want, but eat all you take." Then we can stop being so tolerant of a chuckled "Guess my eyes were bigger than my stomach."


Maybe the right response is "But my boot and your rear are a perfect match."

# Lamb publishes two books

Michael Lamb, the son of Ken and Angela Lamb of Chapel Hill, has published two books this year.

A Commonwealth of Hope: Augustine's Political Thought, published by Princeton University Press on November 1, explores the thought of St. Augustine of Hippo, one of the most influential thinkers in the Christian tradition and the history of political thought. Against the common view of Augustine as a pessimist about politics, Lamb argues that Augustine is a great teacher of hope and shows how Augustine's virtue of hope can inform politics.

The second book, Cultivating Virtue in the University, is co-edited by Lamb, along with Jonathan Brant and Edward Brooks from the University of Oxford. Published by Oxford University Press, the book highlights the importance of educating character within colleges and universities and gath-

ers essays from leading scholars from a variety of fields—including history, literature, philosophy, psychology, and theology—to explore how educators can develop character. Lamb co-authored a chapter in the volume that identifies seven strategies to develop character, including re-

flecting on experience, imitating virtuous role models, and developing friendships of support and accountability.

Lamb is also a co-editor of Everyday Ethics: Moral Theology and the Practices of Ordinary Life, published in 2019. All three books are available for purchase at booksellers.

After graduating from high school in Chapel Hill, Lamb received a B.A. in political science from Rhodes College in Memphis and then earned a second B.A. in philosophy and theology from the University of Oxford, where he studied as a Rhodes Scholar. After receiving a Ph.D. in politics from Princeton University, he held a postdoctoral fellowship at Oxford, where he helped to launch the Oxford Character Project. He is currently the F. M. Kirby Foundation Chair of Leadership and Character, Executive Director of the Program for Leadership and Character, and Associate Professor of Interdisciplinary Humanities at Wake Forest University in North Carolina. A recipient of teaching awards from Princeton, Oxford, and Wake Forest, Lamb focuses on helping students become leaders and citizens of character.

## Winterberry Holly blazes in color across its namesake months

UT Gardens' November 2022 Plant of the Month

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. – As the beautiful fall-colored leaves drop and we transition into winter, winterberry holly (Ilex verticillata) is sure to catch your eye. The berries are especially prominent when the holly is planted in front of evergreens. Unlike most hollies, winterberry holly is deciduous which adds to the "berry" pleasing display on its bare branches during the plant's namesake winter months. While red berry varieties of the holly tend to be most popular, there are gold and orange cultivars, as well.

Ilex verticillata is native to eastern North America (USDA plant hardiness zones 3 to 9) where it typically occurs in wetlands or along lakes and stream banks. The shrub is slow growing and may reach up to 15 feet in the wild, but tend to be smaller in the home landscape. Though commonly found in wet areas, winterberry holly is easily grown in average, well-drained, acidic soils with adequate moisture. Generally the shrubs are pest and disease free,

but they can be susceptible to leaf spots and powdery mildew. They may readily sucker to form a colony in wet sites, and remain in a tighter clump with drier soils. Winterberry holly will grow in part shade, however their best fruit production occurs in full sun at sites that receive six or more hours of sunlight a day.

The shrub has elliptical, toothed leaves that are two to three inches long, and it develops inconspicuous, greenish-white flowers in late spring. Most importantly, Ilex verticillata is dioecious, meaning that some plants are male and some female. To enjoy the bountiful berries for which this plant is cherished, you must plant both male and female plants in your landscape. One male plant can pollinate five to 10 females and should be planted within 40 to 50 feet. It is also important to match bloom times when selecting a male pollinator. Some bloom earlier than others, and the more overlap you can achieve, the better the berry production will be.

Winterberry holly is quite versatile in the

landscape. As mentioned earlier, the plant is stunning with an evergreen backdrop. Shrubs can also be used as hedges, borders, foundation plantings, native gardens, rain gardens, and for wildlife. Ilex verticillata attract many species of songbirds, as well as butterflies and beneficial insects, including bees and other pollinators. The berries make a wonderful addition to holiday arrangements. In fact, December is a good time to do any needed pruning, or otherwise wait until late winter and prune before new growth appears.

You can see winterberry hollies in person growing at all three locations of the University of Tennessee Gardens.

Popular winterberry holly cultivars with their recommended pollinators include:

'Winter Red' grows 6 to 8 feet tall, multi-stemmed, abundance of red berries.

Pollinator, 'Southern Gentleman' grows 6 to 8 feet tall.

'Winter Gold' grows 5 to 8 feet tall, dense, heavy fruiting orange-yellow berries.

Pollinator, 'Southern Gentleman' grows 6 to

8 feet tall. 'Nana' (Red Sprite) dwarf cultivar grows to 3 feet, bright red berries.

Pollinator, 'Jim Dandy' grows 3 to 6 feet.

'Berry Poppins' dwarf cultivar grows 3 to 4 feet, display of red berries.

Pollinator, 'Mr. Poppins' grows 3 to 4 feet.

'Berry Heavy' grows 6 to 8 feet, bright red berries.

Pollinator, 'Mr. Poppins' grows 3 to 4 feet.

'Berry Heavy Gold' grows 6 to 8 feet, big, bright gold fruit.

Pollinator, 'Mr. Poppins' grows 3 to 4 feet.

The UT Gardens includes plant collections located in Knoxville, Crossville and Jackson, Tennessee. Designated as the official botanical garden for the State of Tennessee, the UT Gardens are part of the UT Institute of Agriculture. 

# Beltrán, Lackey lead 14 newcomers on Baseball Hall ballot

NEW YORK (AP) — Carlos Beltrán, John Lackey and Jered Weaver are among 14 newcomers on the Baseball Writers' Association of America's Hall of Fame ballot in what could turn into an evaluation of the Houston Astros' cheating scandal.

R.A. Dickey, Huston Street, Francisco Rodríguez, Bronson Arroyo and Matt Cain also are new to the ballot, joined by Jacoby Ellsbury, Jayson Werth, Mike Napoli, J.J. Hardy, Jhonny Peralta and Andre Ethier, the Hall and the BBWAA said Monday.

Holdovers include Scott Rolen, Todd Helton and Billy Wagner. Rolen received 249 of 394 votes last year (63.2%), when David Ortiz was elect-

ed with 307 votes (77.9%), 11 more than the 75% needed. Helton was on 205 ballots (52%) and Wagner 201 (51%).

Voters denied several stars tainted by steroids and scandal.

Barry Bonds (260 votes, 66%), Roger Clemens (257, 65.2%) and Curt Schilling (231, 58.6%) were dropped after their 10th appearances on the ballot last year and are among eight players who will appear on the ballot of the Hall's contemporary baseball era committee, which meets Dec. 4 in San Diego ahead of baseball's winter meetings.

Other holdovers on the BBWAA ballot include Andrew Jones (163 votes last year, 41.1%), Gary Sheffield (160, 40.6%), Alex Rodriguez

(135, 34.3%), Jeff Kent (129, 32.7%), Manny Ramirez (114, 28.9%), Omar Vizquel (94, 23.9%), Andy Pettitte (42, 10.7%), Jimmy Rollins (37, 9.4%), Bobby Abreu (34, 8.6%), Mark Buehrle (23, 5.8%) and Torii Hunter (21, 5.3%).

Kent, who received his highest percentage last year, will appear on the BBWAA ballot for the 10th and final time.

BBWAA members with 10 or more consecutive years of membership are eligible to vote. Ballots must be post-marked by Dec. 31 and results will be announced Jan. 24.

Any players elected will be inducted into the Hall at Cooperstown on July 23 along

with anyone elected by the contemporary baseball era committee.

A nine-time All-Star, Beltrán had a .279 batting average, 435 home runs, 1,587 RBIs and 312 stolen bases for Kansas City, Houston, the New York Mets, San Francisco, St. Louis, the Yankees and Texas. He was hired as Mets manager on Nov. 1, 2019, then was fired on Jan. 16 without having managed a game, three days after he was the only Astros player mentioned by name in a report by Major League Baseball regarding the team's illicit use of electronics to steal signs during Houston's run to the 2017 World Series.

Alex Rodriguez, a three-time MVP and 14-time All-

Star who hit 696 home runs, was suspended for the 2014 season for violating MLB's drug policy and collective bargaining agreement, and Ortiz's name was alleged to have appeared on a list of players who tested positive during 2003 survey testing.

Lackey won Game 7 of the 2002 World Series for the Anaheim Angels as a rookie, then added World Series titles with the 2013 Boston Red Sox and the 2016 Chicago Cubs. He was 188-147 with a 3.92 ERA in 15 seasons and 8-6 with a 3.44 ERA in the postseason.

Weaver, a three-time All-Star, was 150-98 with a 3.63 ERA.

## Resurgent Auburn rides Cadillac into Iron Bowl again

Carnell "Cadillac" Williams has been the Iron Bowl hero for Auburn before.

Now, the former All-America tailback is trying to do it again. Not by piling up rushing yards like he did 19 years ago against Alabama, but by making the right calls from the sidelines and saying the right things in the locker room.

Williams has already energized Auburn's team and fan base heading into Saturday's game with the No. 8 Crimson Tide in Tuscaloosa having gone from five straight losses to a two-game winning streak.

The 2005 NFL rookie of the year, who had been Auburn's running backs coach, took over as interim coach on Oct. 31 when Bryan Harsin was fired.

Williams will become the first Black head coach in the Iron Bowl.

"It didn't even hit me, honestly, until I saw it this morning," he said Monday. "And I was like, 'Wow, that's pretty cool.'"

What was shaping up as a disastrous season has at least had an infusion of positives.

Auburn lost to Mississippi State in overtime in Williams' first game in that role, but has since beaten Texas A&M and Western Kentucky to stay alive for bowl eligibility.

"He's done a great job — the energy, the enthusiasm, the way the guys are competing and playing, the way they play to win," Tide coach Nick Saban said. "And that was his personality as a player."

Williams, who ran for 204 yards in the 2003 Iron Bowl, has been a unifying force off the field with an unpretentious, folksy manner — he stepped to the podium with an "Oh, Lordy, Lordy. Wow" after the Western Kentucky win.

New athletic director John Cohen is more likely to turn the program over to someone more established and proven, and Williams seems OK with that.

"I don't know. I really don't care," Williams said. "My seat doesn't dictate my service. Auburn's special and those kids are special."

Williams is clearly the rookie in a matchup against Saban, a seven-time national champion coach who tried to recruit him to LSU.

Williams only had five carries in the first two games against Alabama because of injuries. Then, he broke loose for

an 80-yard touchdown run on the first play to spark a 28-23 Auburn win in 2003 that helped coach Tommy Tuberville keep his job. He still calls it one of his most memorable plays.

The radio call from late Auburn play-by-play man Rod Bramblett "Go crazy, Cadillac" became a rallying cry before the Texas A&M game after the school posted a photo of Williams wearing a "Go Crazy" T-shirt at practice.

Former Auburn quarterback Jason Campbell knew Williams "was taking on a situation that was pretty rough." Campbell noted that he benched starters for the Mississippi State game because they showed up late to meetings and also cracked down on class attendance and punctuality.

"It was definitely a perfect fit," Campbell said. "Think about it ... if you turned to anybody else during this that wasn't an Auburn person, where we felt like we were drowning a little bit, you could set your program back years."

"Now not only did you get someone that played there, you got someone that's well respected in that locker room by the players and the other coaches and you got somebody that the fan base loved."

Campbell, who works on Auburn's radio broadcasts and with the NIL collective, helped lead the Tigers alongside Williams to an unbeaten record and No. 2 final ranking in 2004.

Now, former teammates have rallied around Williams and his team. More than 30 of them attended the Texas A&M game, his first as head coach at Jordan-Hare Stadium, and were brought into the locker room beforehand.

The "Go Crazy" shirt carried many Auburn fans "back down memory lane" to one of the program's best seasons, Campbell said.

Former Auburn defensive lineman Bret Eddins describes Williams as "kind of an aw shucks guy" and thinks that's one reason why Auburn fans and players have rallied around Williams so much.

"That's just who he is," said Eddins, who lives in Auburn and is a season ticket holder. "He's humble. He works hard. He loves Auburn. He loves these kids. He really wants to see these kids be successful."

In Alabama, that can start with beating the Tide.

## Rivalry week picks: From Egg Bowl to Apple Cup to The Game

Conference title and playoff hopes are just part of what's on the line during college football's rivalry weekend.

There's the Golden Egg in Mississippi. The Territorial Cup in Arizona. The Old Oaken Bucket in Indiana. The Apple Cup in Washington. The Fremont Cannon in Nevada. The Governor's Cup in Kentucky.

Wisconsin and Minnesota will play for Paul Bunyan's Axe. And the winner of the Michigan State-Penn State game gets the Land-Grant Trophy, which has a lot going on.

The main course of the Thanksgiving football feast are the rivalry games with championship stakes attached between highly ranked teams. You'll find those in Columbus, Ohio, and Los Angeles and they lead this week's most intriguing games:

### No. 3 Michigan at No. 2 Ohio State, Saturday

The Game has a long history of monster matchups. Eleven previous times the Buckeyes and Wolverines have played with both in the AP's top five. Jim Harbaugh and Michigan broke a long drought in the rivalry last season on the way to a Big Ten title and playoff appearance. There is a chance the winner and loser could land in the CFP this year, but neither wants to test that possibility.

LINE: Ohio State by 7 1/2. PICK: Ohio State 35-24.

### No. 13 Notre Dame at No. 5 Southern California, Saturday

The Fighting Irish have won four straight meetings and eight of the last 11, but the stakes have not been this high for the Trojans in more than a decade. USC has dreams of a playoff spot and Heisman Trophy for star quarterback Caleb Williams. The Irish are hoping to put an exclamation point on Marcus Freeman's first season as coach.

LINE: USC by 5 1/2. PICK: USC 38-31.

### No. 10 Oregon at No. 22 Oregon State, Saturday

The Ducks have owned this rivalry for almost two decades, with the Beavers winning just twice since 2007. It's the first time since 2012 and just the fifth time in 106 meetings that both teams are ranked. Oregon, which earns a spot in the Pac-12 title game with a victory, hopes to have a healthier QB Bo Nix this week.

LINE: Oregon by 3 1/2. PICK: Oregon State 28-24.

### Mississippi State at No. 20 Mississippi, Thursday

The Egg Bowl often produces competitive games and odd drama. Hanging over this year's Thanksgiving night meeting is speculation about the future of Ole Miss coach Lane Kiffin,

who could be a candidate to fill coaching vacancy at Auburn.

LINE: Ole Miss by 3. PICK: Ole Miss 33-28.

### Kansas at No. 15 Kansas State, Saturday

The Wildcats have won 13 straight in the Sunflower Showdown as the Jayhawks have wallowed at the bottom of the Big 12. Kansas is better than it has been in more than decade, bowl eligible but still losers of five of their last six. The Wildcats clinch a spot in the Big 12 title game with a victory.

LINE: Kansas State by 11 1/2. PICK: Kansas State 42-27.

# Virginia cancels Virginia Tech game after players killed

The University of Virginia has canceled its game against rival Virginia Tech scheduled for Saturday following the slaying of three football players on campus just over a week ago. The university made the announcement Monday night, two days after a nearly two-hour memorial service to remember Lavel Davis Jr., Devin Chandler and D'Sean Perry. The three were fatally shot on Nov. 13 after a field trip to see a play in Washington. "The decision was made following

communication between the Atlantic Coast Conference, Virginia and Virginia Tech athletic department administration," Virginia Tech said in a statement. "The ACC and Virginia Tech continue to support UVA following the devastating tragedy ... ." Authorities have said that Christopher Darnell Jones Jr., a UVA student and former member of the football team who was on the trip, began shooting at students on the bus as it pulled to a stop at a campus parking garage. A prosecutor said in court last week that a witness told police the gunman

targeted specific victims, shooting one as he slept. Two other students were wounded. Jones, 23, faces second-degree murder and other charges stemming from the shooting, which set off a manhunt and 12-hour campus lockdown before Jones was apprehended in suburban Richmond. Jones is being held without bond. Authorities have not released a motive. Virginia also canceled a game against No. 23 Coastal Carolina last Saturday. Neither the Cavaliers (3-7, 1-6 At-

lantic Coast Conference), under first-year coach Tony Elliott, nor the Hokies (3-8, 1-6), under first-year coach Brent Pry, have anything to lose by not playing their Commonwealth Cup matchup, the last scheduled game for both. The Hokies, who endured a massacre that left 33 dead, including the gunman, in 2007, wore orange uniforms as they ended a seven-game losing streak with a 23-22 victory at Liberty on Saturday. The Hokies and Virginia share orange as a signature color.

# Widow asks \$55M from NCAA for ex-USC football player's death

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Attorneys asked a jury Monday to award \$55 million to the widow of a former USC football player in a landmark case accusing the NCAA of failing to protect him from repetitive head trauma that led to his death.

Matthew Gee, a hard-hitting linebacker who was on the 1990 Rose Bowl-winning squad, endured countless blows that caused permanent brain damage and led to cocaine and alcohol abuse that eventually killed him at age 49, his lawyers said in closing arguments. His widow, Alana Gee, was in the courtroom Monday.

In the first case of its kind to go to a jury, the attorneys told Los Angeles Superior Court jurors that the NCAA, the governing body of college athletics in the U.S., had known about effects of head trauma in sports since the 1930s but failed for decades to notify players of the risks or put rules in place to protect players. "You cannot bring Matt back but you can say what the NCAA did to him was wrong," attorney Bill Horton said. "Put this on the NCAA's radar. ... This is the only way they will ever listen."

A lawyer for the NCAA said Gee experienced a sudden cardiac death brought on by long-standing hyperten-

sion and acute cocaine toxicity. He discussed a raft of Gee's other serious health problems, which he said were not related to football.

"The NCAA had nothing to do with the things that tragically took Mr. Gee's life," attorney Will Stute said.

The issue of concussions in sports, and football in particular, has been front and center in recent years as research has discovered more about long-term effects of repeated head trauma in problems ranging from headaches to depression and, sometimes, early onset Parkinson's or Alzheimer's disease.

The monthlong trial is one of hundreds of wrongful death and personal injury lawsuits brought by college football players against the NCAA in the past decade.

But Gee's is only the second case to go to trial with allegations that hits to the head led to chronic traumatic encephalopathy, a degenerative brain disease. A 2018 case in Texas settled a few days into the trial.

Gee was one of five linebackers on the 1989 Trojans squad who died before turning 50. As with teammate and NFL star Junior Seau, who killed himself in 2012, Gee's brain was examined posthumously at Boston University's Chronic Traumatic Encephalopathy Center and found to have CTE.

CTE is associated with memory loss, depression and progressive dementia. It can only be diagnosed after death.

Boston University has found CTE in the brains of 110 of 111 deceased former NFL players and 48 of 53 former college players, according to a study in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

Hall of Famers diagnosed after death include Ken Stabler and Mike Webster.

In his senior year, Gee was team captain and led USC in tackles, forced fumbles and fumble recoveries.

Gee married Alana, his college sweetheart, after graduating in 1992, and they lived a normal life for 20 years. They raised three children as he ran a successful insurance company in Southern California.

But things took a turn around 2013, when he began to lose control of his emotions, according to the lawsuit. He became angry, confused and depressed. He drank heavily. He told a doctor he forgot entire days.

Attorneys for Gee said that CTE, which is found in athletes and military veterans who suffered repetitive brain injuries, was an indirect cause of death because head trauma has been shown to promote substance abuse.

Stute said the wrongful death case was about what caused Gee's death and not whether CTE exists, which he said is

still a hypothesis.

After years of denials, the NFL acknowledged in 2016 that BU's research showed a link between football and CTE. The league agreed to settle head injury cases covering 20,000 retired players providing up to \$4 million for a death involving CTE. It's expected to exceed \$1.4 billion in payouts over 65 years for six qualifying conditions.

In 2016, the NCAA agreed to settle a class-action concussion lawsuit, paying \$70 million to monitor former college athletes' medical conditions, \$5 million toward medical research, and payments of up to \$5,000 toward individual players claiming injuries.

Gee never reported having a concussion and he said in an application to play with the Raiders after graduating that he had never been knocked unconscious, Stute said.

He said the NCAA was being placed in a position of having to defend itself from allegations it was unaware of at the time, noting that CTE had not been discovered until 2005. He said nothing the NCAA could have done would have kept Gee alive today.

"You can't hold the NCAA responsible for something 40 years later that nobody ever reported," Stute said. "The plaintiffs want you in a time travel machine. We don't have one ... at the NCAA. It's not fair."

# S.C., Vanderbilt fined for fans on the field

BIRMINGHAM, Alabama (AP) — South Carolina and Vanderbilt were fined by the Southeastern Conference on Sunday, a day after schools' fans rushed the field to celebrate football victories.

The SEC docked Vanderbilt \$250,000 for the school's third violation of the league's access to competition area rules. The Commodores won their second straight league game and broke an eight-game series losing streak with a 31-24 win over Florida on Saturday.

The SEC said it was Vanderbilt's third violation. The last one came in 2016, at a men's basketball win over Kentucky in February 2016.

South Carolina was fined \$100,000 after its fans filled the field following a 63-38 win over then-fifth-ranked Tennessee on Saturday night. The SEC said South Carolina was last fined in 2014, after its men's basketball team topped Kentucky.

The collected fines go into the SEC Post-Graduate Scholarship Fund.

# USC moves into top 5 for 1st time in 5 years

Southern California moved into the top five of The Associated Press college football poll Sunday for the first time in five years.

Georgia received 62 of the 63 first-place votes in the AP Top 25 presented by Regions Bank as the top four teams held their places after playing varying degrees of close games Saturday.

No. 2 Ohio State received the other first-place vote. Michigan was No. 3 again, followed by TCU.

The fifth-ranked Trojans edged up two spots after a thrilling victory against rival UCLA. The last time USC was ranked in the top five was September of 2017, when it started at No. 4 but spent most of the season ranked in the teens before finishing 12th.

Lincoln Riley's first season as USC coach has produced one of the best turnarounds in the country, with the Trojans going from four wins to 10, and the regular-season finale against No. 13 Notre Dame and a Pac-12 championship game still to go.

"If you would have told me at the end of last season I would be here now with this group of guys and being able to play for a championship, I would have called you a dead liar. Just being completely honest," USC fourth-year receiver Kyle Ford told reporters after the UCLA game. "I'm just so thankful for everyone on this team."

LSU stayed at No. 6. Clemson moved up two spots to No. 7. Alabama held at eighth and Tennessee dropped four spots to No. 9 after getting upset in a blowout at South Carolina.

In their 63-38 victory, the Gamecocks scored more points against a top-five team as an unranked team than any in the history of the AP poll. Oregon rounded out

the top 10 after the Ducks beat Utah in the Pac-12's other marquee game on Saturday night.

## Poll points

Georgia set a school record with its 10th appearance at No. 1 this season. Last year the Bulldogs had nine No. 1s, the most in school history.

Georgia has been at No. 1 a total of 34 times, tying Michigan for 12th most in the history of the AP poll, which dates to 1936.

Southern California is a top-five team for the 283rd time in poll history. That's seventh most, 13 behind Nebraska.

The top five at being top five: Alabama (451), Oklahoma (430), Ohio State (418), Notre Dame (318) and Michigan (306).

## In

Texas, again. The 24th-ranked Longhorns, who started the season unranked, have moved into the Top 25 four times. They haven't managed to stay there for more than two weeks.

A blowout victory against Kansas pushed the Longhorns back into the rankings as they head toward a season finale against Baylor.

Oklahoma State lost its rivalry game against Oklahoma to drop to 7-4 and out of the rankings again.

# Bengals, Burrow look to keep momentum after beating Steelers

CINCINNATI (AP) — Cincinnati quarterback Joe Burrow said Sunday's 37-30 win over the Steelers was "one of my favorites since I've been here."

Despite being without receiver Ja'Marr Chase and losing running back Joe Mixon to a concussion, the Bengals took control in the second half.

The third-year quarterback liked how it went down.

There were scoring drives of 92 and 93 yards. Backup running back Samaje Perine caught three touchdown passes, and Trenton Irwin, who was promoted from the practice squad for the game, caught the first TD pass of his career.

The defense forced five punts and a turnover on downs in the second half.

"Man, just all day, just overcoming adversity, fighting through, finding ways to get yards, get first downs, put points on the board," Burrow said.

Cincinnati has won four of its past five games and improved to 3-4, one game behind

the Baltimore Ravens in the AFC North.

"I think we're playing as good as anybody," Burrow said. "We're hitting our stride offensively."

Burrow completed 24 of 39 passes for 355 yards on the day he became the third-fastest player in NFL history to reach 10,000 passing yards.

The four passing touchdowns tied his career high.

His composure and focus were on display in a 93-yard drive in the fourth quarter that ended with a 6-yard TD pass to Perine, extending Cincinnati's lead to 34-23 with 4:30 remaining.

Tyler Boyd made critical catches of 27 and 15 yards to keep the chains moving during the drive.

That, Bengals coach Zac Taylor said, "really put the game away for us."

Tee Higgins caught nine passes for a season-high 148 yards.

## WHAT'S WORKING

Burrow continues to adapt and just find ways to win. The offensive line battled a tough Steelers front and gave Burrow time to throw

when he started looking deeper down the field in the second half. ... Cincinnati's defense allowed only a field goal in the second half until the Steelers managed another touchdown with 45 seconds left in the game.

## WHAT NEEDS HELP

Burrow had several short passes knocked down at the line, and Steelers linebacker T.J. Watt miraculously reached up and picked one right out of the air. Burrow had another interception on a tipped ball.

## STOCK UP

Perine doubled his number of career touchdown receptions with scoring grabs of 29, 11 and 6 yards. The seven-year pro caught four passes total for 52 yards and rushed for another 30 yards. It was the first time a Bengals running back had three receiving TDs in a game in franchise history.

"You know, it's every role you ask him to play, he's going to do it," Taylor said. "Whether it's the second half, feature back when Joe's out, whether it's playing his role on third down, or

some of the other packages we put him in, he's just as reliable as they come. Very dependable."

## STOCK DOWN

Mixon, who scored five touchdowns in Cincinnati's win over Carolina before the bye week, had 20 rushing yards on seven carries and caught three passes for 42 yards before going out with a concussion.

## INJURIES

Mixon's status for Sunday's game is unknown.

## KEY NUMBER

3 — Field goals made by Cincinnati's Evan McPherson on three attempts. The kicks of 45, 54 and 44 yards not only were important to the game, but showed "Money Mac" is back on track after some misses in the past few games.

## NEXT STEPS

The Bengals will need to be at their best when they travel to face AFC South-leading Tennessee (7-3) next Sunday. The Titans, winners of seven of the past eight, beat the Packers 27-17 on Thursday.

# NL champ Phillies extend President Dombrowski through 2027

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The National League champion Philadelphia Phillies gave team President Dave Dombrowski a three-year contract extension that takes him through the 2027 season.

“This is a great organization and I feel so fortunate to be surrounded by such tremendous personnel. We have made significant strides in many areas of baseball operations over the last couple of years, and I am committed to building upon them to form a championship organization for the city and our incredible fan base,” Dombrowski said

Tuesday.

Dombrowski made the pivotal decision to fire manager Joe Girardi with the team scuffling in June and replace him with bench coach Rob Thomson. Behind sluggers Bryce Harper, Kyle Schwarber and Rhys Hoskins, Thomson helped lead the Phillies to their first playoff appearance since 2011 and their eighth NL pennant.

The Phillies finished the regular season 87-75 and earned the third NL wild-card spot. They beat the NL Central champion St. Louis Cardinals and the NL East champion Atlanta Braves in the first two rounds of the post-season and the San Diego

Padres in the NL Championship Series.

The Houston Astros beat the Phillies in six games to win the World Series.

The 66-year-old Dombrowski was hired in December 2020 following stints in the front office with Montreal, the Florida Marlins, Boston and Detroit. His clubs have won five pennants and two World Series titles. He is the only head of a baseball operations department to lead four different franchises to the World Series and only one of five general managers to have won a World Series title with two different teams.

“We are extremely pleased that Dave has agreed to continue to

lead our baseball operations department through the 2027 season,” team owner John Middleton said. “His astute knowledge of the game and keen eye for talent set us on a path to win the National League pennant. I firmly believe that under his stewardship, we will reach our ultimate goal.”

Dombrowski was the youngest general manager in baseball history when he took over the Montreal Expos in 1988 at 31 years old, and he played a major role in putting the small-market club on a path to contention with its fruitful farm system.

He joined the expansion Florida Marlins in

1991, two years before their first game, and was the chief architect of their 1997 World Series championship. Then he oversaw an ownership-mandated fire sale, helping to ultimately rebuild a Marlins squad that won another title in 2003, although Dombrowski had left for Detroit by then.

Dombrowski turned a Tigers team that lost an American League-record 119 games in 2003 into a perennial winner. Detroit won four straight division titles from 2011-14 and AL pennants in 2006 and 2012 before cutting him loose after the 2015 season.

He joined the Red Sox as president of baseball

operations the following August and made a number of key acquisitions that led to Boston's 2018 World Series championship, when Dombrowski also assumed GM duties.

Dombrowski was fired by the Red Sox in September 2019 amid a disappointing follow-up to the championship run.

In his 33 years as a president or general manager, Dombrowski's teams have made the playoffs 10 times, winning seven division titles, five pennants and two World Series. In his last 11 seasons, his clubs have gone 982-768 (.561), with eight playoff appearances, three pennants and one World Series title.

# Argentines shocked, saddened by loss in World Cup debut

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — It was a match Argentines had no doubt would be victorious and joyful. Instead, shock and sadness engulfed the streets of the capital Tuesday morning as the long-awaited debut of the national team in the World Cup ended in a 2-1 loss to Saudi Arabia.

“The truth is, this is a disappointment, a big disappointment,” said Alejandro Pintos, a 36-year-old locksmith who was opening his shop a bit later than usual because he first wanted to watch the game. “This was the match that we had no choice but to win.”

Pintos described the national team as being “very disorganized,” something he found particularly frustrating given its 36-match unbeaten streak leading up to the tournament.

Led by Lionel Messi, Argentina entered the tournament as one of the favorites, but instead suffered one of the biggest World Cup upsets after Saudi Arabia rallied with two second-half goals in Lusail Stadium.

“I’m really quite bitter,” Josefina Licera, a 27-year-old social worker, said as she waited for the bus to go to work. “I was really sure we were going to win and it was a big surprise.”

Susana Leguizamón, 55, woke up half an hour before the match was set to start at 7 a.m. local time and put on her blue-and-white-striped Argentina jersey, ready to celebrate what she thought was going to be a fabulous debut for the national team in Qatar.

“I was very, very, very surprised,” Leguizamón said. “The truth is, we underestimated our rival.”

Argentines were counting on a World Cup win to bring a glimmer of a hope to a country that has been economically stagnant for years, is suffering a nearly 100% inflation rate, and where close to

4 in 10 people are living in poverty.

Oscar López, 67, was visibly upset as he reflected on the team's unexpected defeat while wiping down windows outside the building where he is the superintendent.

“If they’re in the World Cup, no team is easy,” López said, his eyes watering. “You always have to be careful.”

But Santiago Babarro, 40, said he wasn't all that shocked by the result.

“The same thing always happens to Argentina,” the retail worker said. “We say, ‘This is an easy match, we can win it easily,’ and then,

bam! They put us in our place. We always believe we’re more than what we are.”

Sebastián Fabre, 48, woke up with an uneasy feeling Tuesday, worried about what he said was overconfidence on the side of Argentina fans.

“There was way too much unfounded optimism. I didn't want to say anything but I think we were all way too overconfident,” Fabre said.

Leguizamón, who walked to her job at a restaurant still wearing her Argentina jersey, said she could feel those around her were also suffering the loss.

“Everyone is very sad,

very sad,” she said. “We all woke up with lots of hope.”

Still, the fans said they could see a silver lining.

“Really, it's better that this happened in the first match and not in the quarter finals,” Fabre said. “That's the positive side to this.”

Leuizamón agreed.

“A trip is not a fall, as we say here,” she said, using a common Argentine expression. “I'm a big fan of the national team and I get in a really bad mood when it loses but my hope is intact.”

Argentina plays Mexico on Saturday in their second match in Group C.

# Three great years in golf, two of them already forgotten

The PGA Tour's social media army probably meant well.

The tweet it sent Monday night celebrated big years by Rory McIlroy and Lydia Ko, and for good reason. Both delivered some of their best, most consistent golf. Both won the points race on their respective tours and the trophy for the lowest scoring average. Money can be skewed. Scores don't lie.

They won PGA Tour and LPGA Tour player of the year, the former a vote of the players, the latter based on points.

Golf royalty? Sure.

But for the PGA Tour to suggest they “ruled the golf world in ‘22” is to dismiss Scottie Scheffler and to ignore Cameron Smith.

It also overlooks that neither McIlroy nor Ko won a major championship. That's not a prerequisite of a great year, but it stands out — especially on the men's

side — when players who won as much or more have a green jacket or a claret jug to show for it.

Besides, the year isn't over yet.

Smith on Tuesday accepted the keys to his hometown of Brisbane, where he is playing the Australian PGA Championship. He will be going for his fifth win of the year, with the Australian Open still to come next week.

Scheffler closes out his year in the Bahamas against a 20-man field, with all but four of them among the top 20 in the world. Still to be determined is whether he has a chance to regain the No. 1 ranking he had for the majority of the year.

All three had great years.

McIlroy joined Henrik Stenson as the only players to win the points title on the PGA Tour and the European tour in the same season.

Stenson played 10

regular European tour events when he won in 2013. McIlroy played six times without winning, but it spoke to the consistently high level he played all year. Only once did he finish worse than eighth — a tie for 12th to start the year in Abu Dhabi.

In the majors, McIlroy finally left Augusta National on a happy note by holing a bunker shot for a 64 to tie for second (he was 10 back of Scheffler to start the final round). McIlroy had the 18-hole lead at the PGA Championship, was one shot out of the 36-hole lead at the U.S. Open and led after 54 holes at the British Open.

Along with his wins — CJ Cup, Canadian Open, Tour Championship — McIlroy was even more impressive by playing great golf and being such a strong voice for the PGA Tour in its fight against Saudi-funded LIV Golf.

Never mind that McIlroy seemed to ex-

tend an olive branch and then use it as a switch. He said the “us versus them” has gotten out of control, and then he said LIV leader Greg Norman needs to go because talks can only happen “with an adult in the room.”

Even so, his role as the strongest voice for the PGA Tour was one he gladly accepted, and the tour needed it. And all the while, he was at his best late in the year. In his final seven starts, McIlroy had a 67.5 scoring average, never finished worse than eighth, had two wins and earned two very big trophies.

Scheffler gets forgotten because he was at his best early in the year.

In a span of six starts, he beat four of the toughest fields and formats at Phoenix and Bay Hill, at the Match Play and the Masters. So dominant was he at Augusta National that he absent-mindedly four-putted the last hole

and still won by three.

That was his last win of the year, still the most on the PGA Tour. Overlooked is the playoff loss to an unlikely birdie putt at the Colonial, Scheffler being one putt away from a playoff in the U.S. Open and one swing away from a chance to win the FedEx Cup.

He set a record for PGA Tour earnings (which undoubtedly will be broken next year given the \$20 million elevated events) and was No. 1 for 30 weeks, earning him the Mark McCormack Award.

Smith already lost his parking spot and his membership at the TPC Sawgrass, the price of turning his back on the PGA Tour to join a new league that offers few guarantees outside of money. He gave up a shot at being No. 1 in the world, along with recognition he deserves for the year he had.

On a Plantation course at Kapalua built for power, he took down

the No. 1 player (Jon Rahm) and set a record to par at 34 under. He made 10 birdies in the final round at Sawgrass to win The Players Championship against the strongest field in golf. And at the home of golf, he had one of the greatest closing rounds in British Open history with a 64 to rally past McIlroy and hold off Cameron Young.

Against the 48-man fields over 54 holes at LIV Golf, he missed a playoff by one shot in his debut and won the next event by three.

Scheffler and Smith aren't considered “golf royalty” because they've spent only one year in the palace. McIlroy — along with Ko, who reached No. 1 when she was 17 — have been around long enough for their big years to receive proper plaudits.

It just shouldn't be at the expense of two others who were just as good.

# Analysis: Russell Wilson trade looks like Herschel Walker's

DENVER (AP) — The most lopsided trade in NFL history sent Herschel Walker to Minnesota for two fistfuls of players and draft picks that served as the pillars of the Dallas Cowboys' dynasty of the 1990s.

The Russell Wilson trade isn't quite so cockeyed, but eight months in it sure looks as one-sided as any deal since the Walker washout that Jerry Jones immediately dubbed “The Great Train Robbery.”

What Denver has 33 years later might very

well go down as “The Big Bamboozle.”

Walker wasn't exactly a bust in Minneapolis, scoring 25 touchdowns in 2 1/2 seasons with the Vikings. But he was long gone by the time the trade blossomed for the Cowboys after Jones and Jimmy Johnson drafted Emmitt Smith, Alexander Wright, Russell Maryland, Alvin Harper, Dixon Edwards, Robert Jones, Kevin Smith and Darren Woodson on their way to three Super Bowl parades.

Wilson hasn't been anything like the Broncos expected when GM George Paton sent first-

and second-round picks this year and next along with three players for the nine-time Pro Bowl quarterback who was supposedly still in his prime at age 33.

The \$245 million extension he gave Wilson before the season only adds to the angst of Broncos fans who have watched a string of quarterbacks fail ever since Peyton Manning walked away to do game shows and commercials with his brothers after winning Super Bowl 50.

The Seahawks selected tackle Charles Cross in the first round and edge rusher Boye Mafe

in the second with the premium picks they got from Denver. As it stands now, they'll have the No. 6 overall selection in the 2023 draft thanks to Wilson's debacle of a Denver debut.

Not only that, but Geno Smith, Wilson's successor in Seattle, is having the kind of season everyone outside of Washington figured Wilson would have in the Rocky Mountains this year.

Smith has the surprising Seahawks tied with the 49ers atop the NFC West at 6-4. He's completing a league-high 72.8% of his passes

and has 17 touchdown throws and four interceptions in his first year as a starter since 2014.

With six losses in nine starts, Wilson is completing a career-worst 59.5% of his passes, is on pace for a career-high 57 sacks and has thrown just seven touchdown passes to go with five interceptions.

The Broncos are 3-7 and sitting in the basement of the AFC West after getting swept by the lowly Raiders and coach Josh McDaniels on Sunday.

The Seahawks are averaging 25.7 points per game with Smith at

quarterback, just a tick more than the 25.3 they averaged during Wilson's tenure in Seattle.

Wilson's stunningly poor play in Denver prompted a reporter to ask him Sunday after the 22-16 overtime loss to the Raiders if the Broncos just aren't good enough to win these type of games.

Fans are starting to wonder if it's Wilson who isn't good enough anymore because the Broncos have lost six games by one score and are negating Denver's dominant defense by averaging just 14.7 points.
