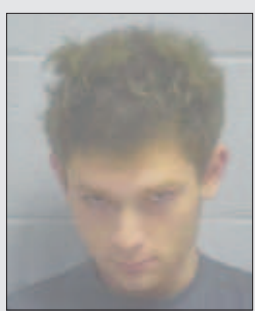

Arriving on scene, officers discovered Ethan J. Miller, 20, outside a residence with multiple gunshot wounds.

Cornersville might have brush solution

Cornersville could have a solution to one of the town's most charged issues--brush pickup.

At last Thursday's monthly meeting, Town Administrator Taylor Brandon told the board that he had reached out to Lewisburg Public Works about possibly servicing Cornersville with brush services.

He said that Lewisburg al-

lowed that they could provide once a week service at an estimated \$24,000 annual cost.

Brandon said that a roughly \$3 per month service fee added on to the town garbage bill for residents within the town limits would cover the cost while returning a desired service to town.

"I think the citizens will be willing to pay that," said Arthur. "I get more complaints on that than I've ever had."

"I get lots of complaints about that too," Brandon told

the board.

Cornersville was forced to stop collecting brush a few years ago after the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation shut down the town's brush burning after a complaint.

With alternate means of disposal cost prohibitive, the town was forced to do away with the service entirely rather than face a never ending accumulation of debris.

Aldermen unanimously agreed to have Brandon draw

up a proposal to present to Lewisburg for consideration.

The meeting began with Mayor John Luna swearing in Aldermen Doris Arthur, Mary Johnson, and Sheryl McCormick for another term on the board.

The three incumbents were the only candidates for three positions on November's ballot.

Aldermen will address vacancies on both the Board of Aldermen and the Planning Commission at next month's

meeting.

Luna told the board that there had been interest and a pair of candidates introduced themselves to the board.

Since a vote was not included on the agenda, any action was deferred to the next meeting.

The board approved a Christmas bonus for town employees as well. Full time employees will receive \$500 and part timers will receive \$250.

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





Did someone say... "Shazam"?

Saint Nick wasn't the only man in a red suit that magical Christmas season 50 years ago.

On Saturday December 23, 1972, I walked from my house to Sharp's Drive-In Market and splurged on four 20-cent comic books.

One of my selections was heavily influenced by an ad appearing in DC Comics: "Coming in December...DC's Christmas gift to you! Shazam is coming!"

I could scarcely wait to rush home and open my copy of "Shazam!" #1. Unfortunately, my gut reaction upon seeing the interior artwork was, "What's this cartoony junk???" You see, I had recently sworn off "kiddie" comics. But "Shazam!" grew on me. By the second issue, it was my favorite title.

"Shazam!" #1 featured the triumphal return of "the original Captain Marvel" and his extended family. Introduced in Fawcett's "Whiz Comics" #2 (cover-dated February 1940), Captain Marvel was the alter ego of boy reporter Billy Batson. By speaking the magic word "Shazam!," Billy summoned a mystical bolt of lightning and transformed into a costumed adult super-hero who saved the world from countless threats.

During the 1940s (what comics aficionados refer to as the Golden Age of Comics), Captain Marvel appeared in his own 12-chapter Republic movie serial and even outsold Superman on the newsstands.

But "the world's mightiest mortal" went into limbo in 1953 because of (a) the declining popularity of super-heroes and (b) a long-running lawsuit in which DC accused the good captain of being a rip-off of Superman.

That's why "Shazam!" was such a big deal in 1972, bringing Captain Marvel and the rest of the Marvel Family back to a nostalgia-crazed world after almost 20 years. (The comic had to be named "Shazam!" after the magic word and the wizard who gave it to Billy, because in the ensuing decades rival Marvel Comics had trademarked the name Captain Marvel and introduced the first of a series of heroes bearing that name. Countless fans over the past half-century have gotten the book title and hero name confused, so DC officially changed the hero's name to Shazam circa 2012.)

Still...even though the revival spawned a fondly remembered live-action CBS Saturday morning program and a 1981 NBC animated version, the Big Red Cheese (as arch-villain Doctor Thaddeus Bodog Sivana dubbed him) never matched his former glory.

(When I was writing for "Comics Buyer's Guide" magazine in 1987, I received a letter from Captain Marvel co-creator C.C. Beck, lamenting that the modern handlers had made the character either too silly or too grim, rarely capturing the delicate balance of whimsy and suspense that marked the original incarnation.)

I'm glad DC keeps going back to the drawing board, trying to let the do-gooder live up to his potential. My family enjoyed the 2019 movie and looks forward to next year's sequel, "Shazam! Fury of the Gods."

I hope that this Christmas some lucky child finds Shazam! graphic novels or a DVD of the aforementioned movie under the tree.

We still need to believe in the triumph of good over evil.

We still need some good, clean fun.

And we sometimes need to comfort ourselves with the fantasy that one magic word could endow us with the strength to solve all our problems.

I heard rumors that the concept has even reached the White House, whose current occupant perhaps read the 1940s adventures of Captain Marvel.

"With one magic word...fourscore and seven years ago..."

State vet urges biosecurity for home flocks

NASHVILLE - The Tennessee State Veterinarian is issuing an alert for domesticated bird owners who also engage in bird hunting. Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) is prevalent in wild birds and is endangering backyard and commercial flocks in Tennessee.

"HPAI detections among domesticated birds and wild birds have been on the rise," Tennessee State Veterinarian Dr. Samantha Beaty said. "We want to alert bird hunters that the risk of bringing this disease to their flock is extremely high. The good news is that

owners can drastically reduce the risk by continually practicing biosecurity and avoiding contact between wild and domesticated birds, alive or dead."

Dr. Beaty recommends that backyard flock owners wash their hands before and after interacting with domesticated birds and dedicate a pair of shoes to only be worn in coops or poultry houses. Those shoes should be cleaned with a 10 percent bleach solution after every visit. Likewise, clothing and shoes used for hunting should not be worn around domesticated birds. The

Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency (TWRA) advises hunters to dress game birds in the field when possible. Remains can be buried at the harvest site or double bagged and disposed with normal household waste.

"It does take effort to sustain biosecurity practices but it's well worth it," Dr. Beaty continued. "Flock owners must be persistent in their efforts to keep birds healthy. If birds appear ill or there's a spike in unexpected deaths, bird owners should notify our office right away."

HPAI is a highly transmissible disease known to be deadly for domesticated fowl. Fowl can be exposed to HPAI through human interactions and through contact with wild birds.

This year, cases in Tennessee have sickened domesticated chickens, geese, and ducks in Obion, Tipton, Bledsoe, and Davidson Counties. According to TWRA, there have been 28 confirmed cases of HPAI in wild birds, including 26 ducks, a Canada goose, and a bald eagle.

Although HPAI does not pose a food safety risk, no infected poultry is allowed to enter the food supply. Poultry and eggs are safe to eat when handled and cooked properly. The risk of human infection with avian influenza during poultry outbreaks is very low. In fact, no transmission to humans was reported during the outbreak that affected commercial poultry farms in Tennessee in 2017.

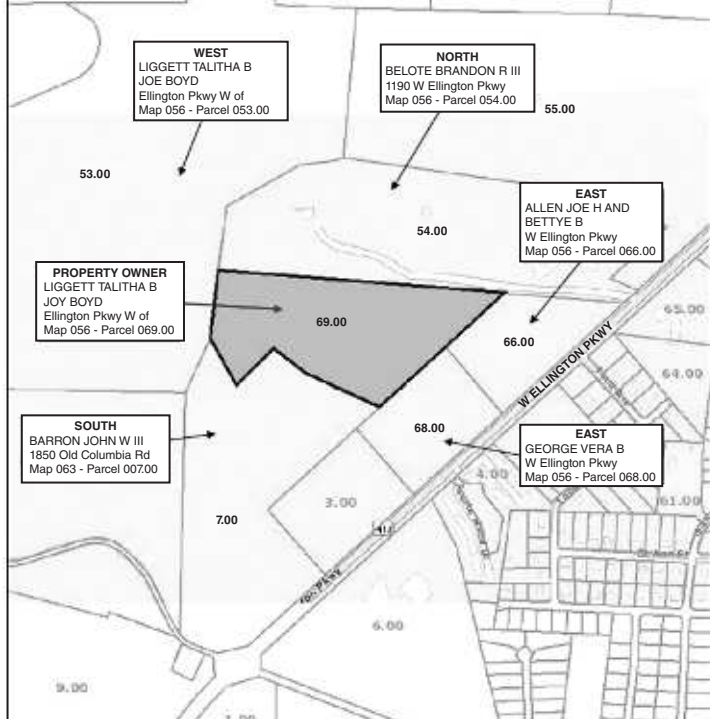

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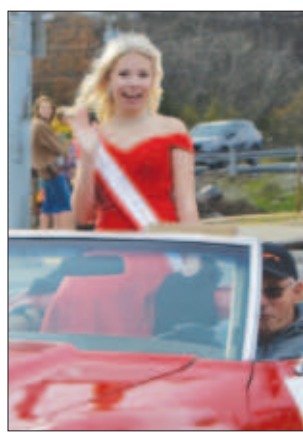
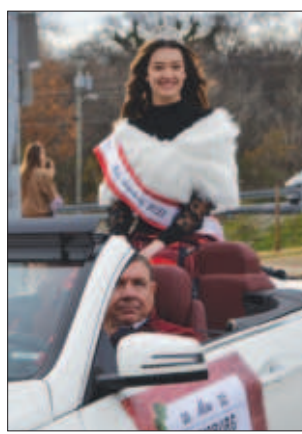
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Lady Rocket duo makes college pick

Warner, Wales headed to Motlow for softball

Parker Wales and Carli Warner have been staples of the Forrest Lady Rocket softball program for several years.

From their earliest time in youth leagues and middle school, through their state championship runs at the high school level, the two have become leaders on and off the field.

That combination of talent, drive and determination helped land the pair a spot at playing at the next level.

Last week, the Lady Rocket duo both signed their letters of intent to continue their softball careers at Motlow State Community College.

"In our program, it kind of starts when they're young. We start having a hand in it in middle school—we say we're Forrest softball. Starting in seventh grade, they're getting to work out beside seniors," Lady Rocket coach Shelby Lightfoot said.

"Having two signing to the same place is awesome. It's a big accomplishment."

Both Wales and Warner have become key

leaders on the field with their consistent, outstanding level of play, from Warner becoming a reliable power hitter, to Wales' efforts behind the plate and managing the Lady Rocket pitching staff.

"Parker Wales is behind the plate for us and has been a phenomenal catcher. For the past two years, she's been agile and quick behind the plate. She's kind of a silent leader that doesn't speak up a lot, but when she does, her voice is heard," Lightfoot said.

"Carli is our clutch hitter. She comes in when you need some momentum or a timely hit or something to happen. She was really big for us last year in the state tournament and also the year before. Although they're different in styles, they balance each other very well," Lightfoot added.

From their youngest days stepping on the field, to last week's signing, the journey has been a culmination of drive and determination that certainly paid dividends for the pair from countless hours of work.

"It's kind of surreal because I never thought I would make it this far, even though it was my

"I started when I was three and just played tee ball. I started playing travel ball when I was around 12 and that's when it picked up," she added.

Warner echoed Wales' sentiments when recalling the many years of work she's put into the

sport and Lady Rocket program.

"This is something I've worked for my whole life. I've known ever since I was eight years old playing on that field that I've wanted to go play at the next level. It's so relieving that I've taken all the chances I can and have achieved this opportunity," she said.

Having played in the state championship in

the past two years, the pair have been part of a community that has embraced the winning tradition of the Lady Rocket program and bringing home the state championship in 2021 and finishing runner-up in 2022.

Throughout all the memories she's had playing softball, being part of the state championship team was among Wales' favorite.

"Definitely the state championship. Probably my favorite was after the state championship, the bus ride home was so fun. We just danced and listened to music. It was so fun," she said.

Warner agreed on a broader scale that being part of the community that's so supportive of their play on the field and being able to look

CHAPEL HILL — It was certainly no offensive masterpiece by either Cornersville or Forrest in the Battle of North and South in Marshall County on Friday night, but in the end, the Bulldogs were able to withstand several momentum shifts and make key baskets in the final minutes to escape Chapel Hill with a 34-32 win over the Rockets.

"It was a defensive battle for sure. My kids didn't quit and they kept fighting. Big 3rd lifts Cornersville past Forrest

CHAPEL HILL — Even with the offense becoming a struggle at times in the first half, Lady Rocket coach Hal Murrell felt like his squad was well-within striking distance of the nine-point Cornersville lead at halftime.

But in the end, the Lady 'Dawgs rattled loose for 18 in the third quarter and coasted to a 42-23 win over Forrest on Friday night.

For Cornersville, the Lady Bulldogs were able to limit Forrest to single digits in all four quarters played—a point of emphasis for Lady 'Dawg coach Hayden McMahon during recent practices.

"Carli, again, being the vocal leader, coming through, getting people going and getting those big hits and leading her team in a way that keeps her momentum going throughout the game."

Once they get to Motlow, the pair will become roommates and not only be teammates once again, but both also plan on pursuing degrees in nursing.

Being able to room with Warner and go through the college experience with her high school teammate was a big draw for Wales.

"It means a lot because we can go through stuff together for the first time and we're going to room together," she said.

Tigers outlast Glencliff in OT thriller

LEWISBURG — The Marshall County Tigers (3-2) welcomed the Glencliff Colts for the nightcap, non-district matchup on Friday night.

The Colts defeated the Tigers 64-61 defeated the Tigers back on November 15 but in the return matchup at Dottie Kelso Memorial Gymnasium, Marshall County turned the tables on the Colts and won by the same score in overtime in front of an enthusiastic home crowd.

The Tigers earned a hard-fought victory on a night when the basketball court at halftime of the boys game was named 'Steely Court' in honor of long time Marshall County assistant coach Don Steely.

It was an emotional evening for the Steely family as former players and Marshall County alumni paid tribute to the Steelys for their decades long support of the basketball program at Marshall County.

The Tigers and Colts played up tempo, hustling and dramatic free-throw shooting

that usually is apparent in late season tournament action rather than early December, the home team thrilled the Tiger faithful with their never-say-die attitude.

"It is exciting to coach these guys even though I don't have a whole lot of hair left, I like it when guys step up and guys come off the bench to make shots. We wanted to push the action, attack the rim and Jabari Howard did, as well as Jamahl (Gentry) and Jayden (Hart) both stepping up," Marshall County coach Lavon King said.

The Tigers were led in scoring by Jamahl Gentry and Jayden Hart with 21 points each.

Howard also chipped in eight points.

Glencliff was led by D'Azjon Dowell with 15 points.

The Tigers gained the tip-off but missed on successive shots at the basket before Glencliff found a rebound and Terron Stricklin buried a three-pointer and after another Tigers misfire, Dowell scored on a 12-foot jumper to push the Colt lead to 5-0.

The Tigers responded with Jayden Hart scor-

ing back-back offensive rebound baskets to make the score 5-4.

Dowell drew a foul on a drive to the basket and made both free throws to push the Colts lead to 7-4.

The Tigers fought back with Hart again making a basket and being fouled in the process but was unable to complete the three-point play and the Colts still led, 7-6.

Dowell was still the man for the Colts as he made one of two free throws and on a put-back, scored a basket to push the Glencliff lead to 10-6.

Gentry then buried a three-pointer from deep in the far corner and on the next trip downcourt, proceeded to sink another three-pointer and the Tigers had their first lead, 12-10.

Thomason sank a free throw so that when the horn sounded, the first quarter ended with MCHS leading 16-15.

With the play by both teams getting heated and whistles for fouls being numerous with less than 90 seconds gone in the second quarter, both teams were in the one-and-one bonus free throw

shooting.

Gentry was feeling the moment and scored nine points in the quarter including another deep three-pointer and a layup that came off high on the backboard to slide gracefully through the net.

After Glencliff's Lazaros Odwar drilled a three-pointer, Hart continued his fine night for the Tigers as he dropped in a basket and a free-throw.

With 2:03 left until halftime the score was knotted at 25-25.

Glencliff's Toby Amosa hit a free throw at the 1:30 mark pushed the Colts into the lead 26-25 but Gentry answered high off the backboard with a layup that brought the Tigers back into the lead, 27-26.

Jayce Harney sank a free-throw for the Tigers with 38.8 seconds until halftime, but Thomason and Hart traded baskets and at the half, the score was tied at 32-32.

The third quarter was more of the same, up-tempo, fast hands, leaping attacks at the rim and contested basketballs by both teams

Robinson out as Titans' GM

NASHVILLE — Tennessee controlling owner Amy Adams Strunk has very high standards for her Titans.

Combined with the millions she's investing, she also isn't afraid of making big moves chasing the Lombardi Trophy that eluded her late father.

Strunk fired general manager Jon Robinson on Tuesday in the midst of his seventh season with the Titans off to a 7-5 start and Tennessee second only to the Kansas City Chiefs for the NFL's longest active streak of consecutive winning seasons in his tenure.

The Titans announced Strunk's decision in a statement. Ryan Cowden, the vice president of player personnel, will handle player personnel for the rest of this season. The Titans plan to start searching for a new general manager soon with a full search at the end of the season.

Strunk said her goal since replacing her brother-in-law as controlling owner in March 2015 has been to raise the standard for every part of the NFL franchise founded by her late father, Bud.

Strunk said she believes the Titans have made "significant progress" on and off the field.

"This progress includes the core of our business, the football team itself, which is regularly evaluated both by results (wins and losses) and team construction/roster building," Strunk said. "I am proud of what we have accomplished in my eight seasons of ownership, but I believe there is more to be done and higher aspirations to be met."

Strunk paid to renovate the Titans' headquarters, essentially doubling the size of the facility to both update the building and hold all the new employees hired.

The Titans also are finalizing the last piece of financing for a new enclosed stadium they want to open for the 2026 season. Strunk and the rest of ownership, with some help from the NFL and the sale of personal seat licenses, are expected to contribute \$840 million toward the stadium estimated to cost \$2.1 billion.

Strunk fired coach Ken Whisenhunt after a 1-6 start to

his second season in November 2015 and a 3-20 record overall. She fired general manager Ruston Webster at the end of that season.

She hired Robinson, a native of Union City in West Tennessee who grew up cheering for the Titans, in January 2016 after the franchise went a combined 5-27 in 2014 and 2015.

When coach Mike Mularkey balked at making changes, Strunk fired him in January 2018 after a loss in the divisional round of the playoffs and quickly hired Mike Vrabel as his replacement.

The Titans never went worse than 9-7 in Robinson's tenure. That includes earning the AFC's No. 1 seed in 2021 with a 12-5 record despite setting an NFL record by using 91 players in a non-strike season. That earned coach Vrabel, whom Robinson helped hire in January 2018, the AP NFL Coach of the Year award.

Both Robinson and Vrabel had their contracts extended in February.

The Titans currently sit atop the AFC South with a chance to win the division for a third straight year, something that this franchise hasn't done since its beginning in the original AFL.

Of their final five games, only one is against a team with a winning record. The Titans host the Jaguars (4-8) on Sunday.

But they just were routed 35-10 in Philadelphia, a loss that featured a big performance by the wide receiver Robinson traded to the Eagles during the first round of the NFL draft. A.J. Brown wanted a new contract and got it from Philadelphia in the deal Tennessee used to draft rookie Treyton Burks at No. 18.

Vrabel said on a national show before the draft that Brown wouldn't be traded as long as he was the head coach.

Brown had eight catches for 119 yards and two touchdowns against the Titans. He has 61 catches and ranks seventh in the NFL with 950 yards along with nine touchdowns for the season. Burks leads the Titans with 369 yards receiving despite spending four games on injured reserve, while veteran Robert Woods has a team-high 33 catches.

Running back Dontrell Hilliard leads Tennessee with four TD receptions on an offense tied

for 29th in total yards, 30th in averaging 171.4 yards passing per game and 26th with 18.3 points scored per game.

The Titans allowed a season-high six sacks in that loss behind an offensive line that featured three new starters due to a combination of salary cap moves during the offseason and a season-ending injury to left tackle Taylor Lewan.

In his first draft, Robinson selected two-time NFL rushing champ Derrick Henry, the eighth man in league history to run for at least 2,000 yards in a season in 2020, and a two-time All-Pro in safety Kevin Byard. His gamble taking defensive tackle Jeffery Simmons in the first round of the 2019 draft paid off with the lineman becoming a starter as a rookie.

Robinson also had several draft and other trade mistakes costing the Titans now.

He drafted offensive lineman Isaiah Wilson out of Georgia in 2020 at No. 29 overall, a player who only took four snaps in garbage time before the Titans suspended the rookie in December of that season. The Titans traded Wilson away after the season ended.

Robinson also selected cornerback Caleb Farley at No. 22 in 2021 despite questions over a second back surgery the month before the draft. Farley, who opted out of the 2020 college football season, has started two of 12 games played with both of his first two seasons ending with him on injured reserve.

Another draft pick that has turned out to be more of a bust is offensive lineman Dillon Radunz, the 53rd pick overall in 2021. Radunz came out of North Dakota State, a Football Championship Subdivision power, but he played only one game in 2020 because of the pandemic.

Radunz lost the right tackle job to rookie Nicholas Pett-Frere this season. His five career starts all have come because of injuries.

Robinson traded for seven-time Pro Bowl receiver Julio Jones in June 2021, reworking quarterback Ryan Tannehill's contract to create cap space. The Titans cut Jones in March, and Robinson traded for Woods as a replacement with the veteran coming off a torn ACL in his left knee last November.

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that excited the crowd as subtle changes by both coaches slowed the scoring, but did not slow the action.

Gentry and Hart continued their assault with two and three points respectively in the quarter, but Jabari Howard joined in as he buried a three-pointer and a short jumper for five points in the quarter as Marshall County enjoyed a one-point lead, 45-44 when the third quarter ended.

The fourth quarter saw the action approach frantic as both teams fought hard and with 4:53 left in regulation the score was tied again at 50-50.

At 4:19 left in regulation Glenciff's Damion McBride was fouled and the Colts began one-and-one free throws by McBride sinking both to put the visitors to the lead 52-50.

Howard then sank a free throw at the 3:02 mark that made the it a one-point lead for Glenciff.

With 36 seconds left in regulation Gentry was fouled, made the first to tie the game at 54-54 but missed the second.

The Tigers, however, regained the rebound and a time out was called by King.

The Tigers hoped to gain a last-second shot, but instead turned the ball over and Thomason, going the other way, was fouled going to the basket and went to the charity stripe with four seconds left to shoot two free throws and a chance to put the Colts in the lead.

Both of Thomason's shots bounced off the

iron and after the second miss, Gentry grabbed the rebound and shuffling the ball to Howard, but his three-quarter court shot was wide as the buzzer sounded with the score tied 54.

In the overtime Hart and Amosa swapped baskets to maintain the tie at 56.

The action being hot and heavy saw Vaughn be the first casualty when he fouled out at the 2:25 mark in overtime.

Amosa sank two free throws to push Glenciff into the lead 58-56 at the 2:18 mark.

Aja Jones then sank two free throws at the 1:19 mark to tie the game at 58-58 then with 58.8 seconds left in overtime, proceeded to make two more from the charity stripe to push the Tiger lead 60-58.

Terron Stricklin struck from behind the three-point line and buried a shot with 33.4 seconds left to put the Colts in front, 61-60.

Marshall County took ball with less than 30 seconds left and with the crowd howling, Gentry was fouled driving to the basket, stepped to the line and sank both free throws to put the Tigers ahead 62-61.

Thomason was again fouled and again stepped to the line, again missing both free throws.

Jones then grabbed the rebound and Howard drove the lane, the ball rolled into the basket with seven seconds left, for the final score.
