National Wreaths Across America Day to be held at Sheffield Cemetery

Sheffield Cemetery in Chapel Hill, named an official Wreaths Across America (WAA) location, will host a wreath-laying ceremony, joining more than 2,500 other locations across the country for National Wreaths Across America Day. Coordinated and led by the Robert Lewis Chapter DAR, fundraising groups are raising funds to sponsor the placement of wreaths on the headstones of service members laid to rest there. This annual event seeks to further the WAA mission of Remember, Honor, Teach, ensuring that the memory of those who served our country endures.

When: 11:00 A.M. December 17, 2022

Where: Sheffield Cemetery on Mt. Vernon Road. Because of limited parking at the cemetery, a shuttle bus will be at Mt. Vernon Baptist Church located nearby at 2811 Mt. Vernon Road to transport those wishing to attend.

Wreaths Across America is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization founded to continue and expand the annual

wreath-laying ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery begin by Maine businessman Morill Worcester in 1992. The organization's mission – Remember, Honor, Teach – is carried out in part each year by coordinating wreath-laying ceremonies in December at Arlington, as well as at more than 2,500 veteran's cemeteries and other locations in all 50 states and overseas.

The Robert Lewis Chapter chose Sheffield Cemetery to sponsor as the first cemetery in Marshall County to take part in this national event because it contains the final resting place of both a revolutionary patriot, Arthur Sheffield, and one of his descendants, John Noble Sheffield, killed in action manning his position during the Viet Nam War. After research of this cemetery, it has been determined that there are twelve veterans in this cemetery. The chapter hopes to add other cemeteries in Marshall County in the future.

The 4-H Chick Chain Project is an eggs-plosion of fun!

It is time to sign up for the Marshall County 4-H Chick Chain Project! Chick Chain is a unique opportunity for kids in 4th-12th grade to raise their own flock of chickens. This project teaches responsibility, financial management, record keeping, communication, and marketing all while allowing participants to enjoy their project and obtain rewards for their hard work. Youth can choose between two breeds, White Leghorn or Black Australorp. They must order at least 10 chicks of one breed and can order up to 20 chicks total. Once the chicks arrive in March the kids will spend the summer raising and caring for their flock.

Youth will get the opportunity to

show off their hard work by entering them into the poultry show held in August where prizes and awards will be given to the top chickens. Following the show, an auction will be held where they get to decide if they would like to keep or sell their chickens. If they choose to sell, they get to keep all the money their chickens sell for. In August of 2022 the average price per chicken was \$23.00!
