Haley charged in 95 count indictment

A Marshall County man is facing a 95 count indictment after an investigation by the state Comptroller determined a series of thefts over several years from a volunteer fire department.

The investigation determined that Fred D. Haley, 65, who had served as the treasurer of the South Marshall Volunteer Fire Department since 1991, had failed to deposit cash from department fundraisers and had written unauthorized checks to himself or his business.

On four such checks, it is alleged that Haley forged the co-signers signature for fraudulent reimbursements or services.

The scope of the Comptroller's investigation covered the period from November, 2006, through July of 2022 when Haley was removed as treasurer by the South Marshall board.

The report alleges that Haley pocketed \$2,789 in cash from fundraisers and wrote \$45,521.83 in checks to himself and his business.

In 2022, he repaid \$437.35 to the department in several transactions, with \$47,873.48 still outstanding.

The Marshall County Grand Jury returned the indictments on January 11, 2023, including 90 counts of theft under \$1,000, four counts of forgery, and one count of theft over \$10,000.

Haley was arrested the next day and held on a \$15,000 bail.

South Marshall VFD was cited in the Comptrollers report for not providing sufficient oversight, failure to separate duties where finance was concerned, and for violating internal controls by co-signing blank checks.

Lewisburg talks property

The Lewisburg City Council covered a wide range of subjects at last week's monthly meeting, ranging from small infrastructure projects to a future development off of the square.

The council heard a presentation from Small Town Startup, a Springfield, Tenn. based business consultant, interested in purchasing the city owned building at 218 West Commerce and continuing the city's plan to develop the space as a co-working space and business incubator.

The company currently oper-

Those costs contributed to Small Town Startup's proposal to purchase the property outright, instead of simply contracting management of the facility.

Any decision on the property will come at a future meeting.

The city will relinquish another piece of property as the council authorized Mayor Jim Bingham to sign any documents needed for the transfer of the Lewisburg Columbia State Community College campus to the state.

The city has owned the building since its construction, currently leasing it to CSCC for \$1,200 annually. ing or replacing sections of code, allowing special permits for the service of alcohol in city parks or at the Recreation Center.

The council approved the installation of eight streetlights on Lexie Drive.

Mary Myers Lambert, 102, died peacefully on Monday, the 9th of January at NHC Lewisburg. She was the daughter of the late Gertrude Line Myers and Samuel Le-Roy Myers.

Tennessee House eases public view of proposed amendments

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — The Tennessee House is offering the public use of an online platform that makes it easier to read proposed amendments to bills.

Republican House Speaker Cameron Sexton announced Wednesday that the TGA House Dashboard application offers the public the same real-time view of proposed and approved amendments that lawmakers have. The system also includes calendars, legislation and video of proceedings.

The House has previously posted packets of proposed amendments for committees and subcommittees online.

Amendments can completely rewrite bills early in the process, complicating the public's efforts to follow along.

People can register and use the dashboard at https://wapp.capitol. tn.gov/apps/Dashboard/ Login. "Tennesseans want transparency in our processes, and they deserve to know more about the legislation that we are proposing and attempting to pass in the House," Sexton said.

The move echoes a recommendation by the Americans for Prosperity of Tennessee about making all amendments publicly available before lawmakers vote on them.

"Adding transparency to the process is a great way to kick off the legislature's business," said Americans for Prosperity of Tennessee state director Tori Venable. "Hundreds of grassroots leaders have taken action across our state calling for more transparency."

The Senate, meanwhile, has generally posted proposed committee and subcommittee amendments in packets online in its public schedule section.

ARMED ROBBERY

Versatile Witchhazels feature fall and winter blooms and bright fall colors

UT Gardens' January 2023 Plant of the Month

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. – We all want something to look at in our gardens year-round. Blooms at unexpected times can bring a world of joy to the garden, and among the plants that offer them are witchhazels (Hamamelis spp.). There are many types of witchhazel shrubs and trees you can grow. Each one is a cool season favorite with fringed, often sweetly fragrant blooms. Many species also have nicely colored fall foliage adding to their appeal.

Ranging in both habit and size, witchhazels vary in form from a dense rounded to a wide spreading shrub, or as upright multi-stemmed vase-shaped tree. While best grown in moist, well-drained, acidic soils, witchhazel is adaptable and tolerant of heavy clay. Plants can be grown in sun or shade, but increased sunlight with adequate moisture improves their flower display.

Witchhazel has low maintenance demands as well as good pest and disease resistance. Pruning is not required, but can be done in spring after flowering to control shape, size, and removal of any suckers from the rot stock. Although serious disease and insect problems are rare, Japanese

beetles, leaf gall aphids, and powdery mildew can occur on occasion.

There are plenty of places witchhazel can fit in the home garden. Plant as a single specimen, add to a mixed border or use in group plantings. Overall, this is an easy and worthwhile plant to add to your landscape.

The following is a list of the more common species and hybrids and recommended cultivars. Most grow between 10- and 15-feet high and thrive in USDA Plant Hardiness Zones 5 to 8. Witchhazels can be found growing in all three locations of the University of Tennessee Gardens.

H. virginiana (common witchhazel): A fall blooming favorite among native plant lovers.

Grows 20 to 30 feet in the wild with cultivars in the 10- to 15-foot range. Fragrant, yellow blooms October to December. Golden fall foliage.

'Harvest Moon' - Notable for its tendency to drop its leaves before it flowers, unlike most other native varieties which flower with the leaves still attached making the blooms less visible.

'Little Suzie' - Compact, slow growing to 4 to 5 feet in 10 years. Blooms at an early age, more densely than

the species.

H. vernalis (vernal/Ozark witchhazel) has the smallest flowers of all the species but makes up for size with the most intense fragrance. Grows 6- to 10-feet tall with wider spread. Yellow to red blooms January to March. New leaves emerge bronze to reddish purple with golden fall foliage.

'Amethyst' – deep red purple flower best backed by some lighter color.

'Quasimodo' – Dwarf, growing slowly to 4 to 6 feet. Fragrant, orange blooms. Leaves smaller than species, blue-green turning yellow in fall.

H. mollis (Chinese witchhazel) & H. japonica (Japanese witchhazel) have been crossed to produce the hybrid H. x intermedia. Cultivars of this hybrid have gained popularity due to their wide range of flower colors like orange, red, pink, and purple opening in January to mid-March.

'Aurora' - Two-toned long petals with yellow tips and an orange base.

'Angelly'-Vigorous upright-spreading form with clear bright yellow flowers.

'Arnold Promise' - Large, clear yellow fragrant flowers.

'Aphrodite' - Copper-red with reddish fall foliage.

'Diane' - Red flowers with leaves turning shades of yellow, orange and red in fall.

'Feuerzauber' - Excellent coppery orange-red flowers. Orange-red fall color.

'Gingerbread' – Deep burnt-orange flowers. Yellow fall foliage.

'Jelena' - This prized hybrid has a sweet fragrance and showy copper flowers in winter with rich, orange-red foliage in fall.

'Wisley Supreme' – This cultivar of H. mollis has sweet-scented, pale yellow flowers often opening as early as Christmas.

The UT Gardens includes plant collections located in Knoxville, Crossville and Jackson, Tennessee. So to leave the Body of Christ is to leave Christ. I have heard it myself, "Well God knows my heart." The answer is "Yes He does." However, the real question is, "Do you love His truth?" With such apathy I cannot see the apostle John

writing a letter to the twenty-first century believers about their love for the truth as he did the first-century believers.

"Nevertheless when the Son of man cometh, shall he find faith on the earth?" (Luke 18:8). I encourage you who have played the "stay away from church" thing - to pray and ask God to lead you to a solid Christ-centered church that actually studies and teaches the truth of the Bible, and then you will find the freedom to love and be loved according to the truth of God's word.

Cardiovascular changes that occur with normal aging make ACS more likely and may make diagnosing and treating it more complex. These changes include large arteries becoming stiffer, the heart working harder but pumping less effectively, blood vessels becoming less flexible and less able to respond to changes in the heart's oxygen needs and an increased tendency to form blood clots. Sensory decline due to aging may alter hearing, vision and pain sensations. Kidney function also declines with age, with more than 1/3 of people ages 65 and older having chronic kidney disease



Rockets put scare into Champs

BELL BUCKLE — It was an eventful night on the hardwood for the Cascade Champions and Forrest Rockets as both teams battled backand-forth until the final seconds when the Champions were able to put the finishing touches on their 63-58 win.

The Champions (15-4, 2-0) got off to a hot start with a 5-0 run after a Thomas Gentry layup and Jayden Gulick three-pointer, but the Rockets (1-16, 1-2) took over from there.

After the baskets for Cascade, Forrest went on a 14-0 run until the final two minutes of the quarter to take a 14-5 lead.

"I'm super proud of how my guys played," Forrest head coach Shane Chapman said. "It's a fun game and a game you want to be a part of as a player and coach. The kids were battling. They (Cascade) didn't have their best night, but they were able to do enough to get the win."

Gentry broke up the run with a tough layup, and the Champions were able to close down their deficit to 19-13 heading into the second quarter.

Bray McCowan notched eight points in the quarter for Forrest.

Cascade opened the second quarter with a high-pressure defense in an attempt to limit the Rockets' attack, and they found some success with it as they held them to a single digit quarter. But it wasn't until the final two minutes that the Champions were able to grab some momentum back as Gulick found his rhythm from behind the arc.

Gulick knocked down three consecutive three-pointers to go on a 9-0 run of his own with just under two minutes remaining in the half, and the Champions grabbed the lead for the first time since the opening minutes.

"We needed somebody to step up and hit some shots, and that was Jayden Gulick," Champs head coach Chris Lawson said. "He hit

He totaled 18 points on the night with all of them coming from threes.

Cascade outscored Forrest 18-9 in the second frame for a 31-28 lead at halftime.

Coming out of the break, it was all Champions in the third quarter.

Cascade turned up their defensive pressure to start the second half which caused some problems for the Rockets and led to some fastbreak points on the other end.

Jackson Davis notched eight points in the quarter and Gulick knocked down another timely three-pointer to extend Cascade's lead to 49-36 going into the final frame.

It was the only double-digit lead either team possessed throughout the contest.

But the Rockets wouldn't

go down without a fight.

Led by Davin Porter, the Rockets found a groove early in the fourth quarter as they went on a 13-0 run over the first few minutes to tie the game back up at 49-49.

Porter accounted for 14 points in the final frame to round out a game-high 26 points on the night for the Rockets.

"There's been some times when we've told him to put the team on his back," Chapman said. "Davin didn't have a great game against Community, but came out tonight and played really well. When our guys can get it going, any of our guys can light it up on any night."

After the run was broken up by a Gentry layup again, Forrest was able to take their first lead since the second quarter after Mason Harper knocked down a three-pointer with three minutes and 15 seconds remaining.

On the final possession for the Rockets, they couldn't find enough space for the game-tying shot and Cascade grabbed the rebound as the clock wound down.

Saebyn Burris was fouled on the play to preserve time, but he knocked down both of his free throws to ice the game and secure the victory for Cascade.

"I told the guys in the locker room that basketball goes this way sometimes," Lawson said. "There's gonna be nights where you just don't play well and the other team does play well. Forrest played well tonight. They came out and shot the ball really well and got the ball in the paint some for layups."

"I told our guys that a mark of a really good team is finding a way to grind a win out sometimes."

While the loss hurts, Chapman was proud of how his team fought on the road and is looking forward to the next matchup with the Champions when they travel to Chapel Hill.

"Super proud of the effort my guys played with tonight," he said. "This is the kind of effort and production I've been looking for all season long. We'll see them again when they come to our place in a couple weeks."

Cascade will be back in action on Friday as they host Fayetteville City while Forrest has some time off before they host Grundy County next Tuesday.

UNIONVILLE – The Community Viqueens led the Cornersville Lady Bulldogs by just four points heading into the final quarter, but the Viqueens pulled away with a 21-point quarter and defeated the Lady Bulldogs 62-52 in a nondistrict basketball game Tuesday night.

Both teams return to district action Friday night. The Viqueens travel to Grundy County for a 6:30 p.m. District 7-AA game while the Lady Bulldogs entertain Moore County in a District 9-A contest.

"It was good to get a lapse of not playing a district game," McMahon said. "We get another game under our belt and go back to district play Friday night."

"This is a good team to get a good experience against," McMahon added. "Playing good teams makes you better."

Bulldogs feel the pressure in loss to Vikings

UNIONVILLE - Throughout the 2022-23 basketball season, the Community Vikings have experienced problems sustaining a consistency on the court for 32 minutes.

Tuesday night, the Vikings turned it around with a highpressure defensive effort the entire game that led to a 20-3 third-quarter advantage as Community picked up its first win with a 64-49 victory over the Cornersville Bulldogs.

"No one felt the pressure of winning more than these kids," Coach Robbie Davis of the Vikings said. "I am happy they finally were able to come into a locker room after a win."

It was a low-scoring first quarter as both teams had trouble getting untracked. Hayden Grover led Cornersville (6-12) with four points while Landon Lovvorn paced Community (1-18) with six points. The Viqueens took an 8-7 lead to the second quarter.

Ben Franklin and Carter Neat each scored eight points as the Bulldogs got hot with 25 points in the quarter. Cornersville used a 7-0 run to get within 12 at 59-47 with 2:03 to play, but it was as close as the Bulldogs would get. Ramone Hernandez of the Vikings was 7-of-8 from the foul line as Community extended its lead with a 5-0 run and took the 15-point win.

Lovvorn led the Vikings with 17 points.

Franklin led the Bulldogs with 12 points while Grover added 11.

The Vikings finished 15-of-24 at the charity stripe while the Bulldogs were 8-of-12.

Davis changed his lineup going into the game.

"We knew we were going to start the young guys and bring in the older kids," Davis said. "Our hopes were that we could contain without fouling and create more offensive opportunities and tonight we did."

"The reason we won this game was 100 percent the attitudes of the seniors," Davis added.

"Our sophomore guards Jason Cullum and Landon Lovvorn came out and played big to start the game. Then our seniors came in with high energy, great pressure, and were flying to the ball."

"We told them in the locker room, it's simple," Davis said. "For the first time this season, let's play to win the game and not to keep from losing it."

Community travels to Grundy County for a District 7-AA game Friday night at 8 p.m. while the Bulldogs play host to Moore County in a District 9-A game also on Friday night.






Community used the
