Living the dream at 19

The new owner of Lewisburg Livestock Market is Thomas "Jackson" Bailey Jr. And it's a dream come true for someone like him who has spent his entire life growing up on and around farms, stockyards, and auctions. Owning and operating stock-

yards is in his blood. Family members before him have bought, sold, and auctioned at the very same stockyard that he is now the owner of.

Growing up, when asked him, "What are you going to be when you grow up?" The answer was simple: "What I'm already doing."

"It's just something he loves. He has the passion for it," said

his mom, Christi Bailey.

When he was 12 years old, Jackson started buying, selling, and trading chickens. When he was 14, he sold goats.

Then, at 16 years old, when he could drive and "wheel and deal" on his own, Jackson told his family he would own a stockyard before he was 40.

But when Jackson graduated from Community High School, and went on to attend the Nashville Auctioneering School in Tullahoma, he moved that goal of owning a stockyard down to 30.

After graduating auctioneering school, Jackson became a 3rd generation auctioneer. Not only following in his father's footsteps, Jackson is also following in his grandfather's footsteps — Tommy Bailey, who was an auctioneer for 50 years.

But he wanted to take it a step

New coalition addresses mental health, addiction

Last Thursday, the Lewisburg Recreation Center hosted the Marshall County Prevention Coalition, a conglomeration of resources and education to spread awareness of and take a stand amidst the suicide epidemic, mental health, and addiction issues. Leading the effort was Liz Bensinger, who started the coalition with two friends, Ansley Hulshof and Tara Tucker.

"The community is in bad shape," said Bensinger when asked about the reason for the meeting, which was a combination of education with speakers from the community and an opportunity for mental health organizations to come and

introduce themselves to those in the area. People were welcome to receive information from a variety of booths and seek out resources available to them. For Bensinger, starting the coalition was both a professional and a personal investment. In her introduction to the public speaking part of the event, she told the story of how her thirty-year-old daughter died of an overdose in 2020 after years of battling addiction. Her inspiration to improve the community flourished from there into a much larger effort to tackle the way in which mental health is dis-



cussed and approached in the day-to-day.

"If we can save one family from the heartache that I've experienced, then we've won," said Bensinger.

addition Bensinger speaking on the importance of the new coalition, Lewisburg officers spoke on the current state of drugs in the lives of children and teenagers in the community. According to Captain Lonnie Cook, "it's been a rough six weeks" speaking on the five overdoses that they've responded to in just the past month and a half of the new year.

Detective Ramirez, who specializes in investigating and responding to drug cases in the area said, "When people ask me if Lewisburg has a drug problem... yeah, without a doubt. The United States has a drug problem. Right now, we're just putting a band aid on a huge

wound out there." Ramirez spoke on the prevalence of drugs in the lives of young people, stressing the concern surrounding the latest gateway drug: vapes. Previously touted and marketed as a safer option, vapes have become a source of addiction for even young children, often targeting them specifically to hook them young. According to Ramirez, the youngest person to have used a vape in the area

was only nine-years-old. Among others, one of the organizations attending the event was TN Teen Talks Truth, a club at the local high school, led by high school seniors that were

putting their best foot

forward in improving the stigmas around mental health.

"There are so many prevalent issues. There's a need for this," said club member Sam Johnson, who was also joined by Seth Grant, Kendall Adams, and

Hailey Bishop. The club provides mental health resources for teenagers at all times of the year, giving them outlets for both mental and physical health, each month addressing a different issue in the mental

health sphere. According to members, the club originated as one to combat tobacco use, but evolved with the growing needs of teenagers and the challenges that they continue to face in the modern

"No one talks about mental health, toxic relationships. I think teenagers are more overlooked," said Ad-

The event was not simply one for small organizations though, hosting companies as large as the TN Department of Health, Homeland Security Investigations, and Centerstone. It provided attendees with resources that spanned from prenatal health and family planning to suicide prevention to sexual assault counseling and haven services. Though there are no current plans for future meetings of this size, Bensinger, as well as the rest of the coalition hopes that it served as a good first step in the right direction, showing Marshall and Lincoln county that there is room for change and those willing to

make it.

and educationally, but he would still be retained under the Third Grade Retention Law that has come against severe resistance from educators across the state. Mrs. Randolph pleaded for legislators to realize "teachers and our local districts know what's best for our students. Please don't take that away from us. Sherrie

Campbell, Cornersville School secondary math instructor, explained to the legislators that all students are required to move at the same pace and master the same number of standards as the college-bound students. Because these unreasonable expectations leave no time for practice and mastery, many students "just shut down because of the continual feeling of defeat." Mrs. Campbell went on to say that deflated students often become apathic about their learning and their future, which has a strong impact on their work ethic as they enter the workforce.



Journalism: can't live with it, can't live without it

I was saddened to hear of the death of Dr. Glenn Himebaugh, co-founder of the journalism department at my alma mater, Middle Tennessee State Uni-

Although I hadn't kept in touch with Dr. Himebaugh since graduation 40 years ago, I have to wonder what he thought of the current reality and public perception of the journalism field.

Sadly, trust in journalism has been underwater in surveys for at least two decades.

Whether you attribute it to bias, hubris or groupthink, newspeople (reporters, editors, publishers and broadcasters) - especially on the national level -- suffer innumerable self-inflicted wounds.

Retractions receive perhaps one-tenth the prominence of the original error.

Stealth-editing of archived articles is the antithesis of account-

Sensationalized headlines prey upon readers who don't have the time to trudge their way to the more nuanced information buried in the 13th paragraph.

Some reporters can't get through a press conference without the all-purpose "Some people are saying..." ploy. "Bombshell"

ter "bombshell" after "bombshell" fizzles out, revealing more about the wishful thinking of the reporter than the people or institutions they're covering.

One public figure gets asked, "Who do you like in the World Series?" Another gets asked, "When did you stop beating your wife?"

"Ready, shoot, aim" seems to be the default reaction in the dreaded "24/7 news cycle."

Words are tweaked for the most manipulative connotation. Fa-"state" vored people things. The wrong people "claim" things.

Race and political affiliation get mentioned only when it serves some agenda (*ahem* Higher Purpose).

The media jealously guard the secret blend of herbs and spices that determines how one gets to be an "expert," what constitutes a "person close to the situation," how the valued whistleblowers are separated from the disgruntled cranks, what distinguishes an "independent fact-checker,"

what defines an "extremist," when a sensitive topic gets cushioned with "context" and



when it's left to twist in the wind, etcetera. "Trust me" requires some minimal basis for

Don't get me started on those three exasperating words: "nothing has surfaced." Nothing has surfaced??? Bulletin: it's not the job of journalists to wait for things to surface!

(I picture an underworld informant going missing for three weeks, his apartment left in shambles and the police refusing to investigate it as foul play until the corpse dislodges from the cement overshoes and bobs to the surface.)

Get off your butts, do some digging, show us your expense report for shoe leather. If you ask the fox guarding the henhouse, "Did you do anything incompetent or corrupt?" and they swear they didn't, don't grin and assert that you've done your due diligence. Remember the film

"The Man Who Shot Liberty Valance"? Too many journalists have adopted the iconic line "When the legend becomes fact, print the legend." No, facts are facts. Legends may become more embellished or more useful for steering the public, but they do not grow more rooted in objective reality with the passage of time. Stuff happens because stuff happens, not because it's needed for some grand, noble

I'm confident that Dr. Himebaugh and his colleagues trained many journalists who have upheld high standards of accuracy, fairness, honesty and public ser-

If there are such dedicated newspeople in your community, don't hesitate to thank them.

But let's all seize every opportunity to shame the bullies who give the journalism profession a black eye.




X'zavier Garrett



"Behold the fowls of the air: for they sow not, neither do they reap, nor gather into barns; yet your Heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much better than they?" -

When my wife and I moved into our new home, one day we opened our windows and doors to enjoy the fall breeze. It was pleasantly refreshing. Then, it happened. A small bird flew inside. Instantly, the bird was frantic trying to find its way out. In its frenzy, the bird kept making the mistake of flying into the glass window.

The bird would fly as hard as it could and – slam – right into the window. It backed off stunned, and then the bird would do it again. We tried and tried to direct the bird to the open doors. So I knew that the only way the bird would find safety and freedom was for me to take a bed sheet and use it like a net to catch the bird. I got the bed sheet and as the bird flew by we threw the sheet over it and caught it. I then took the sheet outside and tenderly drew the frightened bird out safely releasing it into the open air. Happily it flew away.

Many times we are like this little bird. When we get caught up in life and instantly react and slam ourselves into unseen glass walls over and over. Like the little bird, the problem is that we too do not know the way out. So we frantically slam into anything and everything but to no avail.

The Lord Jesus, talking to a multitude in the open air, points at the birds to teach us not to panic in life. Jesus our Savior kindly taught that all who believe and receive Him, they too would have the same caring Heavenly Father who would care for all our needs. There was no greater Teacher than the Lord Jesus. He had a way of making the spiritually difficult, simple.

Tender hands

So if you are desperate like a trapped bird, stop trying to frantically free yourself. You will end up causing more harm. What should you do? Take the advice of the Psalmist and "Be still, and know that I am God" (Psalm 46:10). Understand that the word of God is like a gentle net thrown over you to calm you, and the hands of God

reaching out to you are not going to hurt you. 

Mahomes, there's more to come," Zamora said. "It's going to be fun, and I'm excited to show up."

Manuel Palacio, 48, of Kansas City, was dressed in a cow's suit in a tribute to Kansas City's "Cowtown" nick-

He said he was a longtime Buffalo Bills fan who converted to the Chiefs in about 1993 after losing a bet with a Chiefs fan.

"I had to convert," Palacio said. "It's like being an Oakland Raiders fan; at some point you have to cheer for the team who keeps winning," he said, laughing.

Palacio said he and his extended famrick Mahomes will join ily spend the season teammates, family watching the Chiefs games at home and decided "when - not if — we win the Super Bowl, we're going to go down there and have some fun, celebrate together."

Officials began planning the parade even before the Chiefs defeated the Philadelphia Eagles 38-35 Sunday on a field goal with 8 seconds remaining in the game.


Sports Commission is expected to contribute another \$1 million in private donations, and the Jackson County Legislature voted to add \$75,000. After decades of

Inlow leads Forrest past Cascade on Senior Night

CHAPEL HILL — On a night set aside to honor its senior class, it was a sophomore who delivered the Forrest Lady Rockets (10-14, 4-2) a huge District 7-AA win over Cascade (2-23, 1-5) that secured the No. 2 seed for the upcoming district tournament.

Lady Rocket sophomore Kinslee Inlow caught fire in the first quarter and led the Lady Rockets to a 71-52 win over Cascade. With 5:31 left in the opening frame, senior Macyn Kirby broke a 2-2 stalemate with a corner three-pointer.

From there, Inlow took off and jumpstarted a massive, 28-point first quarter.In total, the four Lady Rockets connected on shots from the perimeter in the opening frame.

Kirby Inlow and tacked on eight in the opening frame, with Inlow knocking down a pair of treys.

Defensively, Forrest held Cascade to a single made field goal over the final four minutes of the quarter—a basket by Cascade forward Sophie Ray, which came with nine seconds left.

On Friday night, Champion senior Jackson Davis came up with a key steal and layup in the final minute to make it a three-point contest.

Forrest had a pair of chances in the closing seconds to tie the game on a three-point attempt.

McCown Bray launched a three-pointer that caught the iron and bounced off and with less than a second left, Forrest caught the rebound and kicked the ball back to senior Davin Porter on the perimeter, who banked in the three, but was ruled to have made the shot after the buzzer sounded, and Cascade was able to escape with a 39-36 win over the Rockets.

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. Spring training games might be a little

Baseball, that's a feature, not a bug.

The Grapefruit and Cactus League games in Florida and Arizona over the next month will be used as a petri dish for the sport's rule changes, including a pitch clock, bigger bases and limits to infield shifts. The idea is that the worst kinks will be worked out before open-

ing day on March 30. Though there's multiple innovations, one stands above the rest.

"The pitch timer is - by far — the biggest change that's coming this season," said MLB executive vice president Morgan Sword said Tuesday. "Frankly, it's probably the biggest change that's been made to baseball in most of our lifetimes."
