

Commission
tussles over travel

One section of the county’s personnel policy caused an involved discussion at Monday’s meeting of the Marshall County Commission. Intended as an overall approval of the manual to include recent revisions, the travel reimbursement policy sparked a wide-ranging discussion. As written, the policy does not allow reimbursement of lodging costs for county elected officials or employees within a 60-mile radius of the county, notably excluding overnight stays in Nashville or Murfreesboro. Commissioner Nathan Johnson offered an amendment that would remove elected officials from the requirement, noting the number of training and educational sessions offered in Nashville for officials. Also, he noted, due to the length of the county, if based on place of residence, some commissioners in the north end would be unable to claim lodging, while others in the south end could, based on mileage. The policy was originally put in place by commissioners who felt that the cost to the county, especially at Nashville hotel prices, was not worth the inconvenience an hour drive home for officials. Commissioner Keith Hollingsworth took issue with the amendment’s exclusion of elected officials while leaving county employees responsible for their own lodging within that 60 mile limit. “What’s good for the goose is good for the gander,” he said. After much discussion, Johnson’s amendment was voted down by a 13-4 margin. An amendment from Commissioner Craig Blackwell to return the travel policy section to committee for further discussion passed 16 to one, and the final vote on the policy manual, without the travel section, was unanimous. In other business, commissioners adopted an amendment to zoning maps incorporating new flood plain data. The measure keeps the county in compliance with and eligible for the National Flood Insurance Program. Commissioners approved a renewal of the agreement with the town of Cornersville for the county Building and Zoning Office to handle building inspections for the town. The commission voted to write off \$1.7 million in uncollectable charges owed the county ambulance service, dating from August, 2014, to December, 2017. The amount, the bulk of which is in the difference charged against the amount reimbursed by insurance, concerned commissioners. Commissioner Tony Beyer said that the current billing and collections vendor was in the final year of their contract and that continuing that relationship would garner close consideration from the budget committee.

Elder abuse assertions

The son of a Marshall County man who died several years ago says he was killed through various types of manipulation by a woman who became his wife. Now, he’s wanting to warn the public of how some people take advantage of the ill and elderly for their own gain. The woman got off without a lot of punishment although she did lose her job, the victim’s son says. She allegedly used means varying from changing medications to isolating him from his family. “He was murdered,” says the son, who has asked for legal reasons not to be publicly identified. He hopes other families can learn from his ordeal. The woman, who the son refers to as a “gold digger,” met his father when he was in the early stages of treatment for lung cancer likely stemming from his employment. “He still had a long life expectancy,” the son said. The woman, who the son says “preyed” on his father, was an office employee at a Lewisburg medical facility when they met. His family warned him early in the relationship to be cautious, the son said. “We begged and pleaded with him,” he said. “My father said she was just a companion, it was something to do.” The relationship progressed into marriage as the man became increasingly isolated, according to the son.

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LFD recognized for three decades of fire prevention

Bequest allows access to history

A bequest from the estate of one Marshall county woman has made Marshall County history accessible to the world. On Saturday, Feb. 18, the Marshall County Memorial Library and the family of the late Margaret Nutt officially unveiled The Margaret Langley O’Neal Nutt Digital History and Genealogy Collection. The project has digitized the library’s microfilm holdings of the Lewisburg Tribune, the Marshall Gazette, and the Marshall County Tribune, as well as county wills from the 19th century, birth records, and county marriage records. Digitization of the tens of thousands pages of information has also enabled researchers, students, and genealogists online access to the collection so that use of the materials is no longer restricted to

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Tennessee GOP congressman was ‘mistaken’ on college degree

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Tennessee U.S. Rep. Andy Ogles says he was “mistaken” when he said he graduated with an international relations degree after a local news outlet raised questions over whether the Republican had embellished his education. Ogles said this week he wasn’t made aware of the mistake until he requested his transcript from Middle Tennessee State

University to verify his degree. “When I pulled my transcript to verify, I realized I was mistaken. My degree is in Liberal Studies. I apologize for my misstatement,” Ogles said in a statement released Sunday. Earlier this month, Nashville-based WTVF-TV reported that Ogles has also called himself an “economist” even though he only took one community college economics course. The station then raised questions over Ogles’ claims that he has law enforcement experience

and handled “international sex crimes.” When asked directly by WWTN’s Dan Mandis on Feb. 21 if the congressman had embellished his resume, Ogles said that people should “look at the body of someone’s work” to determine if he’s an economist. “I had the privilege in my career, I’ve spent the last decade working on economic policy and tax policy, so you decide. At the end of the day, I don’t care,” he

said.

Ogles then clarified that he was reserve deputy for a local law enforcement agency, which overlapped with his time working for Abolition International — a Nashville-based nonprofit that combats sex trafficking.

“Maybe I created some of the confusion or maybe it was someone looking to write a story,” Ogles said.

Ogles’ statement released Sunday only addressed his college education, which he said he had to drop out of MTSU to help his family “during a difficult time.” He later returned

as a “non-traditional student” and completed his remaining courses online.

“At the time, it was my understanding I had completed my course of study in Political Science and International Relations,” Ogles said. “Last week, I requested an official copy of my transcript and learned that I was actually awarded a broader degree in Liberal Studies with minors in Political Science and English.”

The controversy comes after U.S. Rep. George Santos of New York has faced numerous calls for his resignation after acknowledging he fabricated, and at times lied, about parts of his education, work experience and even his family’s own religion and history.

“She was moving him from one facility to another,” the son said. The family was not being told by her or medical personnel where he was being taken.

“I was eventually able to track him down when a friend who worked at one of the medical facilities told me where he was,” said the son, who is employed in the health care industry.

The son, who says he has a background in medicine, said the wom-

an began substituting medications as his illness progressed.

“She was able to order them online on the black market,” his son said. “She was swapping his medicines with other drugs.”

The father was receiving treatment, including chemotherapy, at a midstate medical facility. Doctors at that facility were prescribing the meds.

Eventually she allegedly forged her new husband’s signature repeatedly in attempts to divert several of his pensions to herself, the son said. The father himself stopped an attempt for one of the larger pensions, according to his son.

The woman’s hostility eventually led the family to file a restraining order against the woman.

Long after the father’s death, the aftereffects remain for his son, who still becomes emotionally upset when thinking about the circumstances.

He says he finds some solace in having been able to get the woman fired from her job.

But one fact still stand out to the man’s son.

“She got away with murder,” he said.

EMS calls.”

An effective fire prevention program decreases the number of fires, lowers insurance costs and payments, and improves community ISO ratings, which determine premiums, included Williams.

“People don’t stop to think how many thousands of dollars are lost or how many could die from just one needless

fire,” said Griffith. “A few dollars today may save thousands tomorrow.”

Griffith estimated the annual cost of materials for the county at \$6,500.

Materials are provided by the National Fire Safety Council, a non-profit 501(C)3, dedicated to the safety of children, with funds raised locally through the Lewisburg Fire Department.

Williams and Fire Prevention Officer Mike Barron are sending letters to businesses, professionals, and concerned citizens of Lewisburg and Marshall

(On a GREAT day, I place some 138 comic strips and panels in a folder marked "Tomorrow," put on my wife's favorite mood music, go pantsless like Ziggy and...well, this being a family newspaper, never mind. Mary Worth's ticker couldn't handle the details.)

My obsession has grown with time and technology, but my interest in the funnies goes way back. I have a photograph of myself at less than two years old, "reading" the Sunday comics. I couldn't get enough of Donald Duck, Henry, Li'l Abner, Maggie and Jiggs and the rest.

Back then, I never dreamed I would someday have the comics-reading opportunities I enjoy now. (No, I probably dreamed about Henry, Abner, Maggie and Jiggs going DUCK HUNTING. Hey, my father could have canceled the subscription if my nightmares messed with his sleep THAT much.)

A suspect described as the "nicest robber" by a store clerk held up the 7-Eleven on Franklin Pike on Thursday, Feb. 23, Lewisburg police said.

Police responding to a burglary alarm were told by the clerk that the suspect demanded all the money from the registers and kept one hand in his pocket.

"He did not make any threats of a weapon," Officer Christopher Evans said in his report.

The clerk handed over approximately \$55. The suspect took three cartons of cigarettes as he left, Evans' report said.

Lewisburg police said the suspect has been identified. He was described as a black man in his 50s, approximately 5-feet-8 and slim, and wearing a COVID-type mask.

LARGE THEFT

A suspect has been named in the theft of \$42,000 from the safe at East Commerce Liquors, according to Lewisburg police.

A DoorDash driver notified the store's manager Tuesday, Feb. 14 that the store was closed early. The clerk scheduled to work allegedly told the store's owner he had left and was en route to an alcohol treatment center in Nashville.

The manager arrived Wednesday, Feb. 15 to find the door locked, no sign of forced entry, the safe open and money missing. The alarm system had not been activated, Officer Robert Gurley was told.

RAGING DRIVERS

Two cases of road rage have been reported in Lewisburg recently.

One of the victims told police he accidentally pulled in front of an oncoming car Friday night, Feb. 24 on South Ellington Parkway.

The angry driver then taunted the victim, who said he attempted to apologize, from The Acres shopping center to Walmart. Once reaching the Walmart traffic light, the suspect walked up to the victim's vehicle, tapped on the window, displayed a .32 caliber pistol and threatened to shoot, police were told.

The victim drove di-

rectly to the Marshall County Sheriff's Department, with the suspect remaining behind him until he pulled into the parking lot.

The suspect is described as a white, heavy-set man, approximately 30 years old, with a beard, "doo-rag" and green bandana driving a silver late 1990s sedan.

A tractor-trailer driver was attacked at Rock Market BP on Mooresville Highway Wednesday, Feb. 8, said a report released Tuesday, Feb. 28.

The victim said he "swung wide" while turning onto Globe Road but got back into his lane as a vehicle approached. He said the oncoming driver appeared to speed up.

The suspect, described as a white man in his 50s driving a white single cab Chevrolet Silverado pickup, pulled beside him, cursed and spat in his face.

The victim had placed his hand between the cab and bed of the suspect's truck. The suspect sped away with the victim's hand briefly stuck in the truck.

Non-serious shoulder, rib, leg and knee injuries were suffered by the victim on his right side, the report said

ARREST RESISTED

A man accused of making an unwanted visit to a neighbor's residence allegedly shoved a bag of potato chips into the face of a Marshall County deputy on Monday, Feb. 27.

The report said Neil Vader, 46, became combative and hostile toward deputies who chose to "assist him to the ground" due to the disturbance he was causing, Deputy Elijah Stuard's report said.

A threat of taser use quickly ended the tirade, the report said.

Vader is accused of entering an Old Belfast Road home near his residence in a nearby shed and yelling at people inside. He was charged with resisting arrest and disorderly conduct. Bond was set at \$2,000.

ASSAULT CHARGE

A man was charged with aggravated assault Sunday, Feb. 26 after his girlfriend alleged-

ly struck him with her vehicle at his Cowser Road home.

Bobby Medley, 44, allegedly hit her in the head and strangled her during an argument earlier in the day, a Marshall County Sheriff's Office report said. The argument resumed in the afternoon, when Medley allegedly threatened the victim while standing on her vehicle's windshield and breaking the windshield with his foot. The victim allegedly accelerated her vehicle, throwing Medley onto the ground.

Medley said he was walking in front of the vehicle when struck.

A vandalism charge was also filed against Medley. Bond was set at \$10,500.

Reed was charged with possession of a schedule 2 drug and paraphernalia with bond set at \$3,000.

Drugs were confiscated from two of three men found passed out in a vehicle at Berea Church of Christ, Verona Caney Road, on Thursday morning, Feb. 23.

Conner Ryan Jones, 18, of Elm Street, Patrick Deangelo McDevitt-Tahmassabi, 18, of Marsh Road, and Edward Charles Schoenberger, 18, of Belfast Street, were each charged with underage drinking and public intoxication, the MCSO said.

Jones handed over two vape pens containing THC and had several alprazolam pills in his clothing, the MCSO said. He was also charged with simple possession of schedule 4 and 6 drugs with bond set at \$3,000. schedule 6 drug with bond not listed in the report. No drugs were found on Schoenberger, the driver, whose bond was set at \$1,000.

SCAM STOPPED

A scammer's attempt to steal \$100,000 from the account of a Cornersville area business was stopped Tuesday, Feb. 21 when the bank was able to track down the funds, a MCSO report said.

A caller falsely identifying himself as a bank employee called a family member of the business owner and claimed "fraudulent activity" had been detected in connection with the account. The family member revealed banking information, then checked online and discovered three withdrawals totalling \$100,000.

The withdrawals, for \$40,000, \$35,000 and \$25,000, were sent to banks in Houston, Texas, and Bartow, Florida, for three account holders from the Daytona Beach, Florida area.

Transfers were stopped by the intended victim's bank, the MCSO said.

A man wearing a white shirt and black sweat pants was chased from the area by a resident's dog, according to a family member.

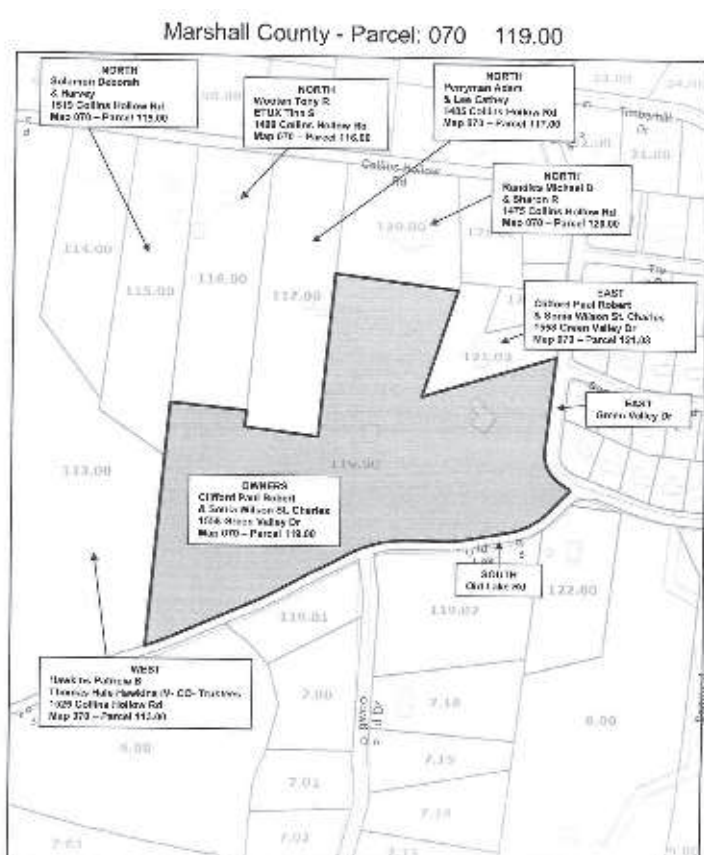

Bill plans to enjoy life as a Papa, do some fishing, travel with his wife, and work on his farm at Harmony Farms in the Laws Hill community.

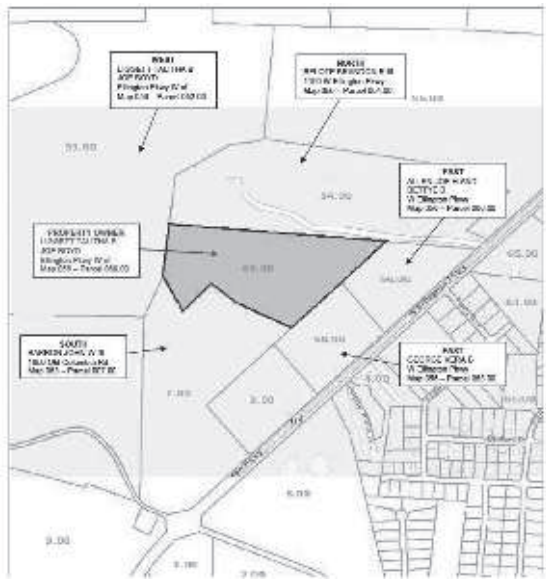

She opened the tournament by pinning Emman Henson of William Blount in 1:28 in her opening match, but fell in a 9-3 decision to sixth-place finisher in the 185-pound division to Audra Buckley in her second match.

Mealer responded in the consolation bracket, beating Mt. Juliet's Abigail Griffin in a 10-5 decision before her run in the tournament came to an end in her second consolation bracket match.

Cornersville High School also made a little history in the tournament with the first appearance by a Bulldog wrestler since the program's restart last season.

J.P. Bennett, a sophomore, qualified in the 106-pound division, but was edged in a 9-8 decision in his first match by Millington Central's Derrick Bolden.

Pitch clock shaves 20 minutes from early games

By the time Cubs outfielder Brennen Davis actually saw a pitch from Arizona's Joe Mantiply, the count was already at a ball and a strike.

Both the hitter and pitcher were penalized at the start of Davis' at-bat to lead off the top of the third inning of Monday's spring training game, the latest odd twist in baseball's speed-up rules. After Mantiply entered the game as a reliever, he took too long to throw his warmup pitches; then Davis was too slow to get ready for the pitch. Major League Baseball ap-

proved its first pitch clock this season, and every day is a new experience for the players as they try to get used to them this spring. On Saturday, Boston's game against Atlanta ended on a walk-off automatic strike; on Sunday, Mets ace Max Scherzer struck out Washington's Joey Meneses in just 27 seconds.

"I like the idea of games being shorter," Marlins reliever Matt Barnes said. "In Boston, we played a nine-inning, four-and-a-half-hour game against New York on a Tuesday. That's not fun. So I like the idea of it being quicker." So far, it's working.

The new rules, which also limit the number of times a pitcher can throw to first base, have helped cut more than 20 minutes from spring training games through the first weekend, dropping from an average of 3 hours, 1 minute last spring to 2:39.

"It's here, and we have to abide by the rules, and we have to learn how to do it," Barnes said. "I'll just have to figure out my routine, adjust my routine a little bit and kind of go from there."

Astros stars return

Houston's star infielders Jose Altuve and Jeremy Peña

made their exhibition season debuts in Monday's 4-3 loss to the Marlins in West Palm Beach, Florida. Both were hitless in three at-bats apiece, but they turned a double play in the fourth.

Peña batted .345 in the postseason last year, and was the first rookie position player to win the World Series MVP. He also won a Gold Glove and was the AL Championship Series MVP.

Astros manager Dusty Baker said he hopes to play Altuve and Peña together as much as possible during Spring Training before the World Baseball Classic starts

in March. Altuve will play for Venezuela, and Peña will play for the Dominican Republic.

"Those guys, they have to really know each other," Baker said. "Especially now, going back to the new defenses, they really have to know the range of each guy and where they are on double plays."

"I was raised and brought up this organization to do exactly what I did today," Marmol said. "You go to home plate. You hand the lineup card and you shake the hands of the four umpires who are running that game."

The bad blood dates back to a game last year when Bucknor ejected Marmol and the manager said Bucknor had "no class."

Spring training for everyone

Cleveland's Shane Bieber, making his first spring start, was also dinged with an automatic ball for throwing a warmup pitch with less than 30 seconds left on the between-innings clock. Miles Mastrobuoni ended up grounding out to the pitcher, and after the inning Bieber and Guardians manager Terry Francona each had discussions with home plate umpire Jordan Baker.

"It was his first action as well. We were joking around, figuring it out together," said Bieber, who walked one and struck out one. "They don't want to have to hit anybody on a violation. They're just trying to do their best to communicate beforehand."

Old days

Yankees manager Aaron Boone said there will be no pitch clock in use when New York plays Tampa at Disney's ESPN Wide World of Sports on Tuesday because the facility isn't equipped for it.

The Rays' game with the Yankees will be the

only one played at the complex, and the first big-league spring training game there since the Atlanta Braves moved to North Port, Florida following the 2019 exhibition season.

Tampa Bay relocated workouts to the Disney facility near Orlando after Hurricane Ian damaged the team's spring training facility in Port Charlotte, Florida, last year. But the Rays will play the remainder of its home spring training games at Tropicana Field, the Rays regular season home.

Easy being Greene

Reds right-hander Hunter Greene, the second pick in the 2017 amateur draft, made his first start and pitched into the second inning before exhausting his pitch count.

Greene went 5-13 with a 4.44 ERA as a rookie last year, including a September game in which he threw 47 pitches at 100 mph or more — the most in baseball. He took a no-hitter into the eighth inning in one start and allowed just one hit in seven innings in another.

"He experienced a lot of success. He had adversity," Cincinnati manager David Bell said, noting that Greene spent some time on the injured list. "He handled it all. You don't want them to get hurt or have failures but it was a perfect season for his development."

Greene was also called for two pitch clock violations.

On the other hand

A day after Scherzer fanned Meneses on three pitches in the time it used to take a lot of pitchers to throw one, the Mets played a more traditional 2:59 game against the Cardinals, with St. Louis winning 12-7.

The teams combined for 19 runs — St. Louis won 12-7 -- 25 hits, 11 walks and 18 strikeouts. There were two balks, neither of them because a pitcher stepped off too many times, and three wild pitches.

Mets manager Buck Showalter made three pitching changes in the middle of an inning; Cardinals pitching coach Dusty Blake made two mound visits.

Marmol said it was more like what he was used to.

"The pace is obviously is going to be quicker. That's for sure," he said. "But the 2:26s of the world—I'm not sure about those."

INDIANAPOLIS — The Green Bay Packers will continue to play the waiting game with Aaron Rodgers.

They're also ready with a backup plan.

Though general manager Brian Gutekunst's first choice still appears to be bringing back the four-time league MVP and long-time face of the team, Gutekunst acknowledged the Packers are willing to go with Jordan Love — if needed.

"I think he's ready to play. I think he's ready to be an NFL starting quarterback," Gutekunst said Tuesday, referring to Love. "He's worked really hard. He's shown a lot of progression. I know he's really eager to have that, and I think that's the next step in his progression, is to play."

First, though, Rodgers must make his call.

The one-time Super Bowl champ is scheduled to cost the Packers \$59.5 million, a prohibitively high number that would prevent the team from doing much in free agency.

Rodgers has already acknowledged publicly if he does return, he would likely redo his contract. He also has completed the "darkness retreat" he said would help him sort out his options.

Green Bay also must decide whether to exercise its fifth-year option on Love, their first-round pick from 2020 who has not played much as Rodgers' backup. Extending Love's contract through next season would cost the team \$20.3 million in 2024.

Otherwise, the Packers next year could be facing the same dilemma the New York Giants and Baltimore Ravens now have — using franchise tags to keep their starters, Daniel Jones

and Lamar Jackson — around. Ravens general manager Eric DeCosta is scheduled to speak Wednesday at the NFL's annual scouting combine.

Still, Gutekunst is willing to be patient with Rodgers and hopeful he'll have an answer before free agency begins March 15. If not, he'll be ready to go either direction.

"We'll move forward and have conversations as we go," Gutekunst said. "There will be a point here soon where we have to make some decisions moving forward."

It's a familiar scenario for Packers fans who still remember when three-time MVP Brett Favre retired in 2008, handing the job to Rodgers, Green Bay's first-round pick in 2005. When Favre later decided to return, he was eventually traded to the New York Jets.

The Jets are in the quarterback market yet again and are one of several teams now jockeying for position to answer their own quarterback questions.

While Jets GM Joe Douglas acknowledged the team remains committed to Zach Wilson, Douglas also said team officials have spoken with the recently released Derek Carr and they plan to meet again this week.

"I can say he (Carr) left a strong impression with everybody," Douglas said. "Obviously we're going to be exploring the veteran quarterback market this offseason and we'll look at every available option."

They're not alone.

Carolina also plans to meet this week with Carr, a person familiar with the situation told The Associated Press on Tuesday. The person spoke to The AP on condition of anonymity because the team doesn't announce its meetings with free agents.

Two other veterans also re-

cently hit the open market. The Washington Commanders cut Carson Wentz on Monday and 2014 Heisman Trophy winner Marcus Mariota was released Tuesday by the Atlanta Falcons.

Both teams seem content to go with second-year quarterbacks Desmond Ridder and Sam Howell, at least for now.

"If you go back to his junior year, coming out, (Howell) is a guy that had some very good grades on him," Washington coach Ron Rivera said. "I looked at our people's grades and we had some very good grades on him, so we feel very confident in his ability. He's got a good arm."

The Tampa Bay Buccaneers also may try the young arm of Kyle Trask — if Tom Brady does not come out of retirement again. That may be out of necessity with the Buccaneers more than \$57 million over the cap.

Still, coach Todd Bowles wouldn't rule out signing a veteran.

"We understand we're over the cap," he said. "We have a long-term plan. We don't want to sacrifice one year for paying someone as opposed to sacrificing the future. But we'll go out and we'll be smart about it. It's also a desirable place because we do have talent."

The same is true of the Packers, who have already restructured the contract of running back Aaron Jones and expect promising second-year receivers Christian Watson and Romeo Doubs to continue improving next season — whether it's Rodgers or Love throwing passes.

"Obviously, he (Rodgers) is a big part — if he comes back," Gutekunst said. "He's a big part of what we're doing, but at the same time, I don't think that will really change the roster much."

Falcons cut former Titan QB Mariota

ATLANTA — The Atlanta Falcons released quarterback Marcus Mariota on Tuesday, a move that was expected after the veteran was benched late in the season.

The Falcons were 5-8 with Mariota as the starter before rookie Desmond Ridder started the final four games, winning two.

"We really appreciate Marcus and all the things he did while he was here, personally, professionally, great man," general manager Terry Fontenot said Tuesday at the NFL scouting combine.

"We just feel we're doing what's best for the team at the time but appreciate him and what he did while he was here."

Mariota signed a \$10.5 million, two-year deal with Atlanta after the Falcons traded long-time starter Matt Ryan to India-

napolis. Mariota completed 184 of 300 passes for 2,219 yards with 15 touchdowns and nine interceptions. He rushed for 438 yards and four touchdowns.

After Mariota was benched, he left the team to have season-ending knee surgery. The Falcons are expected to save approximately \$12 million in salary cap space by cutting Mariota.

Falcons owner Arthur Blank said at the Super Bowl he is excited about building the team around Ridder. Fontenot also had praise for Ridder and said the team will look for help at the position in the NFL draft or free agency.

"We're going to add to the position and we've been really clear with how we feel about Desmond Ridder and what he's done to this point in his career, his makeup and just the way he's handled every role that he's been in and what he did over the last four games of the season," Fontenot said.

Fontenot said Ridder "dealt with adversity, he got off the mat and kept fighting. Desmond has done some good things and we know he's going to continue to improve this offseason and yet we're going to add to the position whether it's free agency, the draft or both."

Fontenot left open the possibility the Falcons could use their No. 8 overall pick in the draft to add another quarterback.

"We're never going to put ourselves in the corner," Fontenot said. "We're always going to leave every door open. Again, draft, free agency, whether it's the eighth pick or some other pick in the draft, we could bring in a quarterback. ... We could bring in a veteran. We could bring in a guy with experience. We could bring in a guy with no experience. We definitely want to add to the room."

Falcons coach Arthur Smith and Fontenot have declined to say Ridder is the 2023 starter.

Trotz returns to Nashville, will replace Poile

Barry Trotz became the Nashville Predators' first coach back in 1997.

Now he will become the team's second general manager on July 1.

On Sunday, David Poile announced his plans to retire as GM on June 30 after 26 years with the Predators.

Trotz and Poile were reunited at Bridgestone Arena on Monday as Trotz was introduced as his replacement. Poile, 73, will remain as an adviser.

The two men have known each other for 41 years, dating back to Poile's time as the Washington Capitals' GM.

"It was my first training camp with the Capitals (in 1982) and Barry was an undrafted player," Poile said of their first meeting.

Trotz was cut, but Washington hired him as a scout before he went into coaching.

He is the NHL's third winningest coach with 914 victories, including stints with Washington where he won



a Stanley Cup in 2018 and the New York Islanders from 2018-22.

Poile said Trotz, 60, turned down several coaching jobs during the off-season and Poile told Trotz this would be his last season as GM.

"Around, I'd say, Christmastime, he kind of said I'm not gonna coach anymore and he said could I talk to you about being a candidate for the GM position," Poile said. "And from that time it went pretty fast with he and I talking and ownership getting involved, and probably by mid-January we probably had that done."

Trotz is confident he can make the transition from coach to general manager.

"I thought long and hard about this," Trotz said. "How coaches, how managers operate --- you've got to work together and I've always tried to do that with David. He's mentored me."

Nashville made three trades over the weekend, but Trotz plans to reset rather than rebuild.

"We are resetting, we are collecting assets," Trotz said. "There are some good players. There could be six first-round picks in Milwaukee (Nashville's AHL affiliate) next year, so there are people coming."

Trotz is keeping an open mind about Predators coach John Hynes, who is 121-86-16 in his fourth year in Nashville.

The Predators are six points out of the second wild-card spot after falling in the first round of the playoffs the past three seasons.

"I've been in coaching for a long time so I know when a team is well-coached," Trotz said. "John is a really good coach. The biggest thing for me is from now until the end of the season, I'm just gonna evaluate."

Nashville will host the NHL Draft for the second time in June.

"We haven't been able to get that franchise-changing center iceman," Trotz said. "We haven't been that poor to get that and there's some luck. There are some guys that changed franchises that got drafted later."

Trotz will get a chance to help shape the Predators' future at the draft with his input, but cautioned that it requires patience.

"It's not like football," Trotz said. "Football, guys are coming out of college. They're either 22, 23, 24, 25, and they're men. We're drafting 18-year-olds."

Trotz said it takes six years for a lot of draft prospects to make an impact.

Poile exits as the NHL's winningest GM with 1,519 victories in 39 years, but Nashville has won only one playoff series since making the Stanley Cup Finals in 2017.

"I've got two loves in my life: my family and hockey," Poile said. "I'm so lucky."

Kurt Busch battling lingering concussion

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. — Kurt Busch might have received a proper sendoff this weekend in Las Vegas, where his hometown track treated him cruelly over 21 tries until he broke through for a win in 2020.

Busch could have been feted with gifts as part of a season-long farewell tour. His parents who helped mold him into a ferocious stock car driver would have cheered him on. Little brother Kyle would take him on in one of the final brother vs. brother battles in the desert.

Yet, those scenarios are implausible now for the 44-year-old Busch, his career prematurely curtailed because of lingering effects from a concussion suffered in a wreck during qualifying last summer at Pocono Raceway.

Busch instead is now a de facto consultant for his old 23XI Racing team and Toyota. He counseled Travis Pastrana at the Daytona 500. He championed crew chief Billy Scott as the next Chad Knaus, and Busch has thrown his arms around anyone in the garage who needs advice. He's chatted up sponsors and is doing the grunt work needed to make the gears turn on the team co-owned by Michael Jordan.

He just can't race. Busch is still walking out of a fog from the blunt impact his brain absorbed in the crash. He's vowed to race in a competitive series again -- even if a Cup Series ride is out of reach -- but he has not yet been cleared by doctors.

"When you look at the therapist, and he's looking back at you, there's work to be done," Busch said. "That's really all I can give you."

Busch is hopeful a new physical therapy program designed to strengthen balance and

eye movement will aid in a full recovery. Until then, Busch keeps pushing in a journey without a true finish line in sight.

"Go-karting has been fine for me, the simulator has been fine," Busch said. "It's just when I had my head in the headrest and there's that movement, that bothers me."

NASCAR's dramatic safety upgrades that included SAFER barriers and head-and-neck restraints in the wake of Dale Earnhardt's death in the 2001 Daytona 500 lulled fans into thinking drivers were bullet proof inside their modernized cars. NASCAR has not suffered a racing death in its three national series since 2001 and most drivers -- think Ryan Newman surviving a fiery crash at the 2020 Daytona 500 -- escape even the scariest wrecks relatively unscathed.

Jeff Burton, an NBC Sports announcer and former driver, said

Busch "was still as good as he's ever been" when the 2017 Daytona 500 champion took his No. 45 Toyota out last July for what should have been a routine qualifying lap on the 2½-mile track in Pennsylvania. Busch, though, seemed to lose control as the Toyota slid up the track and the right rear slammed square into the wall.

The car whipped around and the nose violently tagged the wall, as well.

Looked bad, yes. But certainly not any worse to the naked eye than most wrecks. Busch apologized over the radio and then waved to the crowd to signal he was "OK" as he walked to the waiting ambulance -- and hasn't been inside a Cup car for a race since.

Busch told The Associated Press he was told the rear hit registered at a brain-rattling 30 G's -- consider, modern fighter pilots pull a G-force of about nine --

and the front smacked the wall at 18 G's, numbers that raised concerns about safety in the Next Gen cars.

Hendrick Motorsports driver Alex Bowman missed five races with a concussion late last season after his Chevrolet hit the wall at Texas Motor Speedway, and multiple other drivers complained about the violence of routine hits and wondered if they too had suffered a concussion.

The drivers suddenly didn't seem so invincible.

"The wreck might not look like it wasn't that violent. But primal fear is -- I leaned forward knowing I was backing into the fence," Busch said, as he pulled his hands to his head. "If you feel fear coming from behind, you lean away. So I exaggerated the hit by leaning forward and that 30 G's backward was something I never felt before. I don't remember the right front hit. That's

when things got serious in the infield care center."

Busch, who won 34 races in 776 starts over 23 years, and the 2004 Cup championship, said his examination in the moments after the wreck turned scary when he couldn't stand up straight. Busch also couldn't answer questions from doctors about the impact of the front collision.

Busch returned to his motorhome and took a call from his dad. Busch told his dad, Tom, a former racer who built and won in his own cars, he wasn't cleared to race at Pocono and surrendered his ride to rookie Ty Gibbs. Tom Busch told his son "it was probably that right front hit."

"I go, 'Why are you asking me the same thing?' I don't remember the right front hit," Busch said. Tom Busch ended the conversation and told Kurt to watch a replay.

"That's when it settled in," Busch said. "That's

a whole different view."

Busch, who also got divorced last year, leaned on his parents in the aftermath; his mother, Gaye, accompanied him on his doctor visits. The update is always the same: Busch is not cleared to race.

"There's huge progress," Busch said. "But to race with the best of the best, I'm not 100% and I feel it."

Busch's absence from the Daytona 500 meant there are no active Cup drivers who raced against Earnhardt. There's a youth movement in NASCAR -- fellow 40-something driver and NASCAR champion Kevin Harvick is calling it quits at the end of the season -- and Busch conceded 2023 would have been his last one anyway.

"I see him doing a lot of different things and looking at his schedule and talking with some of the folks around him, he is somewhere doing something every day," Kyle Busch said. "He is fine off the track, as much as it can be inside a Busch's head anyway." Busch has told 23XI co-owner Denny Hamlin he wanted to graduate into a coaching/adviser role once he retired.

Busch just wished the move could have come on his own terms. Busch served as one of the grand marshals at the Daytona 500 -- he was selected as a driver who both won a Cup championship and the "Great American Race" -- and tried to put a bright spin on his early retirement.

He soaked in the Florida sun and enjoyed the bustle of the fans, the camaraderie inside the garage and the thrill of another race day ahead -- just like normal.

"Fans are here for the race and they're all still rooting me on," he said. "It's like they want me to get back in the car and I feel that spirit."

Browns could restructure Watson's \$230M contract

CLEVELAND — The record-setting contract Deshaun Watson received from the Browns could undergo some revising.

Cleveland general manager Andrew Berry indicated the team may consider restructuring the five-year, \$230 million deal -- to clear salary cap space -- it used to entice Watson to agree to a trade from Houston to the Browns one year ago.

"It could be on the table, but there's a lot of flexibility in terms of what we can do," Berry said Tuesday at the NFL scouting combine in Indianapolis.

The Browns are approximately \$14 million over the salary cap and need to get under it if they intend to be active in free agency, which opens on March 15.

Watson's deal not only made league history because it was fully guaranteed, but his salary cap hit is \$55 million in 2023, another record. The contract also established a new bar for quarterbacks around the league.

While the Browns have some current financial constraints, Berry was confident the team will be active

in free agency. Cleveland needs to upgrade its defensive line and may be in the market for a top-flight wide receiver.

"The rules are flexible, whether it's releasing a player, trading a player, restructuring a deal, negotiating an extension," Berry said. "There are a number of different avenues to create cap space. The approach we would take would really be dictated by the opportunities in front of us. One of our tenants is flexibility. We have enough flexibility to be as aggressive or conservative as we need to be."

As for Watson, the Browns need him to be better.

He was suspended 11 games by the NFL last season after being accused of sexual misconduct by two dozen women while he played for the Texans. Watson initially turned down a trade to the Browns before they upped their offer to him in desperation to land one of the league's top QBs.

Cleveland also sent three first-round draft picks to Houston in the deal, which sent a shockwave across the league.

Following his suspension, Watson went just 3-3 in six starts as the

27-year-old struggled to find his Pro Bowl form following a 700-day layoff between games. The Browns finished 7-10, but Berry remains confident Watson will improve in 2023.

"We are pleased with where Deshaun is, pleased with the progress he has made since he has been with us and certainly anticipate him having a very strong year on and off the field going into 2023," Berry said. "We are very excited about Deshaun."

"We are looking forward to continuing to evolve the offense over the next several months. Obviously having him have a full off-season going into 2023 and certainly expect him to play at a high level."

Notes

The Browns will play the New York Jets in this year's Hall of Fame Game on Aug. 3. With former Cleveland All-Pro tackle Joe Thomas slated for induction in a class that includes Jets legends Joe Klecko and Darrelle Revis, the matchup is a natural. It will be the Browns' first appearance in the game since 1999, when they returned to the league as an expansion

NFL owners to discuss Snyder at upcoming meeting

Washington Commanders owner Dan Snyder's future is on the agenda for discussion at upcoming committee meetings in Florida ahead of the annual NFL meeting in Arizona in late March, according to a person familiar with the docket.

The person, who spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity Tuesday because the person wasn't authorized to release details, said voting to oust Snyder if he chooses not to sell the team remains a possibility.

Indianapolis Colts owner Jim Irsay, at a league meeting in October, said there's "merit to remove" Snyder. That would take an unprecedented vote of 24 of the other 31 team owners to happen.

Two weeks after Irsay's comments, and with multiple investigations ongoing into the team's workplace culture, finances and Snyder himself, he and wife Tanya hired a firm to "consider possible transactions." Asked at the time if the Snyders were considering selling part or all of the team, a spokesperson said, "We are exploring all options."

The sales process has since included the likes of Amazon founder Jeff Bezos, Philadelphia 76ers and New Jersey Devils owner Josh Harris and Houston Rockets owner Tilman Fertitta getting involved to various degrees. The New York Post reported that Snyder was blocking Bezos from putting in for a bid, despite him hiring a firm to explore that possibility.

The Commanders are taking issue with the contents of a newspaper report about the sale process and demands being made by Snyder. The team, in a statement late Monday, said a story published hours earlier by The Washington Post is "simply untrue."

Citing anonymous sources, the Post reported that Snyder and his attorneys have demanded that NFL owners and the league indemnify him against future legal liability and costs if he sells the team and threatened to sue if not. The Post said Snyder also wants the findings of a league investigation into him kept private and that his demands angered owners and renewed discussion about possibly taking a vote to remove him.

An NFL spokesperson declined to comment Tuesday on the Post report.

In the aftermath of The Washington Post story about Snyder seeking indemnification, ESPN on Tuesday reported that a federal grand jury has issued subpoenas related to team finances after prosecutors launched an inquiry into a \$55 million loan he took out without the knowledge and approval of his then-minority owners. ESPN said the criminal inquiry is being led by a team of FBI and IRS agents.

Snyder bought out minority owners Fred Smith, Dwight Schar and Bob Rothman in spring 2021 after they sued him the previous November seeking an injunction to allow them to sell their shares of the team. That transaction was approved by league owners.

NFL spokesman Brian McCarthy said in a statement sent to The Associated Press that Snyder and his previous minority owners "had a series of disputes" before going through mediation with an arbitrator and Commissioner Roger Goodell and coming away with an agreement. McCarthy added, "The agreement included full releases of all claims that were or could have been asserted by any party in the arbitration proceeding."

Lady Rockets run out of steam vs. E. Nashville in region semis

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UNIONVILLE — The Forrest Lady Rockets have battled adversity through injury and overcoming a short roster all season. Even losing key personnel for large parts of the season, if not the entire season in some cases, the Lady Rockets (12-16) persevered within coach Hal Murrell's vision for the program and battled to the second-place in the District 7-AA tournament. They followed with a dominant win over Stratford in the Region 4-AA quarterfinals, but eventually saw their season come to a close after a hard-fought battle with top-ranked East Nashville (23-7) in the region semifinals on Monday night. Following a close first half, East used a third-quarter run to pull away for the 60-45 win over the Lady Rockets and end Forrest's season. "I thought we responded. I thought the game plan was good. I thought we handled their pressure and physicality. Even until halftime, it was an eight-point game. They went on that run at the beginning of the third quarter and kind of stretched it out and we ran out of gas. I couldn't be more proud of the season and the effort just to get here. We're one game away from reaching sub-state," Murrell said. It looked like East might run away with the game in the early goings of the first quarter after building a 9-2 lead over the Lady Rockets following a basket by Jaslynn Walter with 3:37 left in the opening frame. But Forrest answered with a trey by Megan Mealer and by the end of the quarter, Forrest closed the gap to a 13-11 Lady Eagle lead. Forrest relied on timely three-pointers by Kinslee Inlow and a stellar rebounding effort against a bigger East Nashville lineup to keep within one possession through the rest of the opening quarter. Forrest continued to hold its own into the second quarter and after a three-pointer by Carli Warner from the top of the key with 6:43, Forrest held a one-point, 16-15 lead. The two teams swapped control of the lead three more times in the following minute until East closed the

half on a 12-2 run. Even with the run to close the second quarter, East Nashville's lead was just eight points. But eventually East's size and depth began to take its toll on a depleted Lady Rocket roster with a huge third-quarter run that broke the game open. East exploded on a 14-5 run that allowed the Lady Eagles to execute their game plan and control the boards. "A lot of times when I'm getting players (on the bench), I'm getting eighth and ninth graders or girls that don't have a lot of experience. I thought Carli (Warner) and Megan Mealer did a really good job. I thought (Kaylin) Pope did a really good job inside to start the game. But they're big and they're physical and they have some next-level players that we held in check early on," Murrell said. Forrest senior Macyn Kirby wasn't about to go down without a fight as she scored all nine of the Lady Rockets' points in the third. She added nine more in the fourth quarter. Kirby led all scorers with 21 points in her final game with the Lady Rockets, while Inlow added 10, including three treys. Monday night marked the final game for Kirby, Mealer, Warner and Samantha Hopkins. "You've got two girls who have signed college softball scholarships and Megan Mealer is the hardest working kid and Sam (Hopkins) does everything we ask her to do, whether it's a guard position or a post position. She is the first one leading the cheers on the sideline for us. It's a team effort. I told them in the locker room I was proud of them. I told them I loved them like they were my own daughters. They have done everything I have asked out of a senior group. I think they have started to turn the culture back to where Lady Rockets basketball ought to be," Murrell said. East was led by Walter, who scored 17 points, while Jayla Horton and Kenya Fairs each scored 14. Even though the game went down as a loss, Forrest showed massive steps forward as a program when compared to last season's region semifinal lost to East Nashville in which the Lady Rockets fell 62-28. "I couldn't be more

proud of how they came out and represented themselves and our program and how much we've improved—not only just this season, but last season when I first got here. We got to this very game last year and we got run out of the gym," Murrell said. The injury bug struck Forrest early and hard this season as the Lady Rockets had to play the majority of the season without key players, or with players who bat-

tled nagging injuries throughout the year. For now, the focus is getting the young Lady Rockets healthy, in the gym and in the weight room with the hopes of taking the next step in qualifying for a state sectional game, if not beyond. "There's going to be some big shoes to fill. I thought we had overcome a lot this year. Cadence Chapman, our starting post player has been out all year; Cam-

reigh Warner has been hurt and she has been 90% of the year; Josie Brown, a good three-point shooter, injured her ankle again in practice; (Kaylin) Pope has been hurt most of the year. I know it hasn't showed, but she's been going to therapy for a shoulder injury," Murrell said. "We're going to be young next year, but I think the sky is possibly the limit. I've got a really good group of young

girls we've pulled up. Hopefully we can get in the gym and get them stronger in the weight room and try to get past this game," Murrell said. Forrest closes the season with a 12-16 overall record.

Kobe Bryant family settles photo lawsuit for \$28.5 million

LOS ANGELES — The family of the late Kobe Bryant has agreed to a \$28.5 million settlement with Los Angeles County to resolve the remaining claims in a lawsuit over deputies and firefighters sharing grisly photos of the NBA star, his 13-year-old daughter and other victims killed in a 2020 helicopter crash, attorneys and court filings said Tuesday. The figure includes a newly agreed upon payment from the county of \$13.5 million along with the \$15 million a

federal jury awarded Bryant's widow, Vanessa Bryant, at a trial in August. The agreement resolves any future claims by Bryant's three surviving daughters, related issues pending in state court, and other costs. A proposed settlement order, which a judge must approve, was filed Tuesday in federal court. "Today marks the successful culmination of Mrs. Bryant's courageous battle to hold accountable those who engaged in this grotesque conduct," Bryant's attorney Luis Li said in a statement. "She

fought for her husband, her daughter, and all those in the community whose deceased family were treated with similar disrespect." Mira Hashmall, the attorney representing LA County, called the statement "fair and reasonable" adding, "We hope Ms. Bryant and her children continue to heal from their loss." Kobe Bryant, the former Lakers star, five-time NBA champion and member of the Basketball Hall of Fame, was traveling with Gianna and seven others to a youth basketball game when the helicopter they were aboard

crashed into hills in Calabasas west of Los Angeles on Jan. 26, 2020. Deputies and firefighters responding to the crash scene shot phone photos of the bodies and the wreckage, which Hashmall argued at trial were an essential part of assessing the situation. But the pictures were shared, mostly between employees of the county sheriff's and fire departments, including by some who were playing video games and attending an awards banquet. They were also seen by some of their spouses and in one case

by a bartender at a bar where a deputy was drinking. Li told jurors that the close-up photos had no official or investigative purpose, and were mere "visual gossip" shared out of a gruesome curiosity. Hashmall argued that the sheriff acted swiftly and appropriately when he ordered the photos deleted. Vanessa Bryant tearfully testified during the 11-day trial that news of the photos compounded her still-raw grief a month after losing her husband and daughter, and that she still has panic attacks

at the thought that they might still be out there and her daughters might someday see them online. The verdict in her favor was erroneously read as \$16 million in court, but was later amended to \$15 million. Federal safety officials blamed pilot error for the crash itself. Chris Chester, Vanessa Bryant's co-plaintiff at the trial, was also awarded \$15 million at trial, and reached his own settlement with the county in September for nearly \$5 million more.
