

Braves plan to cut off sale of season tickets before opener

ATLANTA (AP) — The Atlanta Braves plan to stop the sale of season tickets to preserve the availability of single-game tickets.

Braves president Derek Schiller says this is the first time in team history season ticket sales have been cut off before the first game.

The Braves plan to cut off the sale of season tickets on or around March 17. The team says it is on pace to approach the 2022 Truist Park record total of more than 3.1 million in attendance, the first time since 2020 at Turner Field the Braves topped 3 million.

The Braves finished fourth in the majors last season with their average of 38,461 fans at Truist Park.

“We are now focused on ensuring that more of our fans who only come to one or two games are able to buy seats,” Schiller said in a statement released by the team.

The Braves say their April 6 home opener against San Diego and some other high-profile games already are approaching sellout or standing room only status.

After March 17, fans who want to purchase season tickets for 2024 can sign up and be placed on a waiting list for priority.

Elliott to miss about 6 weeks with broken leg

CONCORD, N.C. — With Chase Elliott expected to miss about six weeks with a broken left leg, Hendrick Motorsports will turn to Josh Berry and sports car racer Jordan Taylor to fill in for NASCAR’s most popular driver.

Hendrick provided a timetable for Elliott’s recovery Tuesday while saying Berry will continue to drive the No. 9 Chevrolet on ovals and Taylor will make his Cup Series debut on the road course at Circuit of the Americas in Texas later this month.

Berry will be behind the wheel Sunday when NASCAR runs at Phoenix Raceway.

Elliott fractured his tibia snowboarding in Colorado last week and was released from the hospital the following day after a three-hour surgery. The 2020 Cup Series champion is currently rehabilitating in Colorado.

Hendrick general manager Jeff Andrews said the team has begun the process for attain-

ing a NASCAR waiver that would allow Elliott to be eligible for this season’s playoffs. Waivers have been granted to other drivers for various circumstances, including injuries.

In the meantime, Berry and Taylor will continue collecting points for the team. Berry finished 29th at Las Vegas Motor Speedway on Sunday.

Berry drives for Hendrick affiliate JR Motorsports and is a five-time race winner in the lower-division Xfinity Series.

Taylor currently competes in the IMSA WeatherTech SportsCar Championship for Corvette Racing. He also serves as Hendrick’s “driver coach” for William Byron and others in hopes of helping them better navigate road courses. He’s taken on a similar role for NASCAR’s Garage 56 project, which will run at the 24 Hours of Le Mans in June in France.

The 31-year-old Taylor has competed at Road American multiple times, including two wins in four IMSA appearances.

Brave bench

Players and their agents complained loudly last year about doing the bench press on the same day as on-field workouts, so this year organizers changed the schedule, holding the bench press the day after on-field workouts.

Guard Adnew Vorhees crashed to the turf with a right knee injury during offensive line drills on Sunday.

But that didn’t stop the Southern California product, who lifted 225 pounds (100 kg) a combine-high 38 times. While the injury may cost him all of next season, he showed everyone his resilience and determination.

Turning heads

Edge rusher Nolan Smith of Georgia and cornerback D.J. Turner II of Michigan also made strong impressions.

First, Smith broke

down at the podium on Wednesday while publicly sharing his thoughts about Willock for the first time. The next day, his impressive workout included a 4.39 in the 40 and a 41 1/2-inch vertical jump, both tops in his position group, and a broad jump of 10-8, which was third.

Turner drew attention for his blazing time in the 40, 4.26, on Friday. It was the fourth-fastest time since 2003 and the only sub 4.3 at this year’s combine.

Smith already was expected to be a first-round pick, but Turner may get some additional looks thanks to his speed.

Combine future?

NFLPA executive director DeMaurice Smith made no secret about his thoughts on the combine even before anyone arrived in Indy. He thinks it should be discontinued.

Still, team executives and coaches repeatedly said the combine was a crucial piece of the evaluation puzzle, primarily because of the interviews and medical checks. Many of the 319 invitees even called attending the combine a dream.

It’s pretty clear the combine isn’t going away any time soon. Last spring, Indy managed to keep the league’s second-largest offseason event through 2024, beating out Dallas and Los Angeles.

MLB shift limits raising batter spirits and averages so far

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. — When Yankees switch-hitter Aaron Hicks batted from the left side last season, he was almost always greeted by an infield shift — a wall of defenders camped in shallow right field.

So it was a striking moment in New York’s dugout when Hicks — facing a traditional infield alignment — hit his first clean single to right field early this spring training.

“He probably hasn’t seen that hit in about eight years,” manager Aaron Boone said.

Hicks and the rest of baseball’s most frequently shifted batters are getting used to a new reality — or rather, adjusting back to an old one — after Major League Baseball passed rules limiting infield shifts ahead of this season.

So far, those limits seem to be raising batter spirits — and they might be bolstering batting averages, too.

“I really hope this isn’t the year I start hitting the ball to the shortstop on the ground,” Yankees left-handed slugger Anthony Rizzo said with a smile. “Especially young left-handed hitters will be introduced to the 3-4 hole that’s been gone for about seven to eight years.”

Teams must now keep two infielders on each side of second base, all with their feet in the dirt when a pitch is delivered. The aim is to open up space for a few more singles in each game after data-driven teams

spent the past decade carefully crafting defensive formations that targeted each hitter’s tendencies.

It’s too early in spring training to draw conclusions from the numbers, but key statistics are trending in a promising direction for hitters. Batting averages through the first 10 days of spring training are up to .263 in 2023 from .259 last season.

Crucially, left-handed hitters — the most frequent targets of the modern infield shift — are hitting .274 this spring, up from .255, according to the Elias Sports Bureau. Righty averages have dropped from .262 to .255. Overall scoring is at 11.3 runs per game, up from 10.6.

There has been disagreement in the sport’s analytics community about how much impact the shift limits will have, but it does seem to be affecting hitters’ psyches, at least.

“Not getting thrown out from shallow right field on a line drive will be nice,” said Rizzo, shifted in 82.6% of his plate appearances last season.

Tampa Bay manager Kevin Cash said he has noticed some difference already this spring but expects more offense to come later as big league regulars play deeper into games.

“I think there’s been so many balls already this spring that if you look to if that happened last year, they were out. We had a defender there,” Cash said.

Umpires have broad discretion to enforce the league’s new guidelines, but some clubs are already testing how strict those rules are.

When lefty slugger Joey Gallo — shifted in 90% of his plate appearances last year — of the Minnesota Twins came to the plate in a game against the Boston Red Sox last week, Boston experimented with a loophole in the new rules, moving center fielder Adam Duvall to shallow right field and left fielder Raimel Tapia to center field.

That shift didn’t matter much as Gallo drew a walk, but such is the new reality in baseball as teams start searching for advantages to the rules in 2023.

Marlins first base coach Jon Jay, who had 840 singles among his 1,087 career hits, thinks the change could lead to more small ball.

“We’re seeing already ground balls going up the middle that, with the shift, were outs,” he said. “It’s definitely going to create more offense. I think the single is a big player right now. You’re seeing those 10-hoppers up the middle and those ‘roll-over balls’ in the hole ... those are hits again.”

Philadelphia Phillies left fielder Kyle Schwarber, who was shifted against 90.5% of the time in 2022, thinks the shift could help promote more contact, too.

“I punched out 200 times last year,” Schwarber said during Phillies spring camp. He had a career-high 200 strikeouts last season. “That’s not acceptable. If I can cut down on 50-75, that’s more balls in play. And without that wall (the shift) out there, there might be a few to squeeze through.”

Jackson gets nonexclusive franchise tag from Ravens

The Baltimore Ravens put the nonexclusive franchise tag on Lamar Jackson on Tuesday, preventing him from becoming an unrestricted free agent this month but allowing him to negotiate with other teams.

The deadline for teams to apply the franchise tag was Tuesday. The Ravens were always expected to use it if they didn’t reach a long-term deal with Jackson first. The main question was whether they’d use the nonexclusive tag or the exclusive one.

Baltimore could have prevented Jackson from negotiating with anyone else by using the exclusive tag, but that could have cost significantly more. Instead, Jackson would make \$32.4 million if he plays this season on the nonexclusive tag.

Before that happens, Jackson and the Ravens can keep negotiating, and other teams can join in the bidding as well. Baltimore would have a chance to

match any agreement between Jackson and another team, and if the Ravens chose not to match, they’d receive two first-round draft picks in return.

“There have been many instances across the league and in Baltimore when a player has been designated with the franchise tag and signed a long-term deal that same year,” general manager Eric DeCosta said in a statement. “We will continue to negotiate in good faith with Lamar, and we are hopeful that we can strike a long-term deal that is fair to both Lamar and the Ravens. Our ultimate goal is to build a championship team with Lamar Jackson leading the way for many years to come.”

The Dallas Cowboys used the exclusive franchise tag on quarterback Dak Prescott in 2020. A year later, they reached a long-term deal with him.

Kirk Cousins is another quarterback who played on the franchise tag fairly recently. He did it his final two seasons in Washington before joining the Min-

nesota Vikings in 2018.

So now the saga between Jackson and the Ravens enters its next phase. Josh Allen, the other star quarterback drafted in 2018 with Jackson, signed a long-term deal with Buffalo two offseasons ago. Jackson, on the other hand, entered last season — the final year of his rookie deal — still without an extension. His contract status didn’t seem too disruptive last offseason — he participated in mandatory minicamp and training camp — but there’s no telling how the next few months will go.

There obviously is some risk involved with using the nonexclusive tag, especially for a player of Jackson’s caliber, but it could resolve this deadlock sooner. If Jackson is able to find a deal he likes from another team, the Ravens could either match it or take the draft picks and allow him to leave.

Jackson, who doesn’t have an agent, is one player who should pique the rest of the league’s interest, even at the cost of two first-

round picks, and his availability to any degree could shake up NFL free agency, which opens later this month.

Jackson was the 2019 NFL MVP, and his dynamic passing and running make him one of the game’s most unusual stars. At age 25, he already is one of six quarterbacks in NFL history with 10,000 yards passing and 4,000 rushing. His 12 games with at least 100 yards rushing are an NFL record for a QB.

Jackson has been hurt at the end of the past two seasons, and the Ravens haven’t reached the AFC championship game with him, but his impact on their offense is massive. If he remains with Baltimore, he’ll have a new coordinator after the Ravens hired Georgia’s Todd Monken.

Baltimore also announced Tuesday that it had hired Dennard Wilson as defensive backs coach. He coached defensive backs with the Philadelphia Eagles the past two seasons.

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Cornersville faces another board vacancy

One month after returning the Board of Aldermen to full strength, Cornersville is going to have to repeat the process of filling a vacancy. At Thursday night's monthly meeting, the board acknowledged the letter of resignation submitted by long-term Alderman Jimmy Wolaver.

Wolaver was elected to the Board of Aldermen in 2012 and was in his third term, which expires in 2024. After swearing in Alderman Janice Kerber in February to fill the vacancy created by Alderman Beth Vick's resignation, the board will have to repeat the process to fill Wolaver's seat until the next election.

Town Administrator

Taylor Brandon briefed the board on the status of returning brush removal services to the town.

One proposal had been submitted so far he said, ahead of the March 17 deadline, but several parties had expressed interest in submitting by the deadline.

Brandon said that the town had realized almost \$22,000 from recent surplus equipment

sales. He told the board that he'd like to put the proceeds from a chipper and tractor back into the public works budget with an eye toward a new truck for the department and proceeds from various surplus police equipment, likewise, set aside for an eventual replacement police vehicle.

Brandon sketched out a budget timeline for the next fiscal year, as well, with a workshop in April to precede voting on a finalized budget at the May and June board meetings.

Aldermen approved a resolution naming Town Attorney Billy Ostermann as the town's delinquent tax attorney for another year and renewed longtime auditor John Poole to perform the town's audit for the current fiscal year.

Also up for renewal is the town's contract for trash pickup. As it did two years ago, current provider United Waste Haulers has offered to extend the contract for another two year period without a rate increase.

Looking forward, the town Easter Egg Hunt will take place on March 19 on the Lions Club grounds.

According to NHTSA, 11,654 people were killed in drunk-driving crashes in 2020. On average, more than 10,000 people were killed each year from 2016 to 2020 — one person was killed in a drunk-driving crash every 45 minutes in 2020. This is why Chapel Hill Police Department is working with NHTSA to remind drivers that drunk driving is not only illegal, it is a matter of life and death. As you head out to the festivities, help us spread the word: Buzzed Driving Is Drunk Driving.

St. Patrick's Day is one of the deadliest times on our nation's roads. During the 2016-2020 St. Patrick's Day holiday period (6 p.m. March 16 to 5:59 a.m. March 18), 287 lives were lost in drunk-driving crashes. In 2020 alone, 37 people were

killed in drunk-driving crashes over the St. Patrick's Day holiday period (6 p.m. March 16 to 5:59 a.m. March 18). Drivers should also keep an eye out for pedestrians who have had too much to drink. Walking while intoxicated can also be deadly; lack of attention to surroundings could put pedestrians at risk of getting hit by a vehicle.

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Reminder: TennCare renewals start in April

COLUMBIA, Tenn. — Due to legislation ending the Medicaid continuous enrollment requirement related to the COVID-19 pandemic on April 1, those receiving TennCare or CoverKids benefits will be required to reverify their eligibility status for the first time in three years.

TennCare is the state of Tennessee’s Medicaid program and provides health insurance to more than 1.7 million Tennesseans, according to the Tennessee Division of TennCare. It’s imperative that all members update their contact information and respond to all TennCare communica-

tion to avoid a gap in health insurance.

Every TennCare member’s eligibility will be reviewed over a 12-month period and, where approved by state or federal rules, available data sources (Internal Revenue Service (IRS) income data and Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) information) will be used to automatically renew members. If a member can’t be automatically renewed, they will receive a pre-populated renewal packet by mail or a notification by email, depending on the selected preference.

Members will be selected

for review when their renewal dates naturally fell. For example, if they were due to renew in June 2020, their renewal date would be in June 2023. Members will be able to complete the renewal packet through a variety of ways, including online; by phone, mail or fax; or at any county Department of Human Services (DHS) office.

For members no longer eligible for TennCare or CoverKids benefits, their information will be sent to the federal Health Care Marketplace, as required by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS), where alternative

health insurance options are available.

CMS is opening an Affordable Care Act (ACA) special enrollment period from March 31, 2023, to July 31, 2024, for those losing health care coverage after the end of Medicaid’s continuous enrollment provision. Those eligible will have 60 days after they submit their application to select a HealthCare.gov Marketplace plan. Coverage starts the first day of the month after they select a plan.

TennCare Connect, the online portal where members can update their information and renew their

coverage, and the new mobile app have been updated and improved to help make renewal easier. Members should log in to TennCareConnect.tn.gov or call 855-259-0701 to start the process.

New online resource connects Tennesseans in substance-use crisis to local treatment services

NASHVILLE, Tenn. – A new substance abuse treatment locator website from the Tennessee Department of Health is available today at FindHelpNowTN.org. This site links individuals directly to care and help if they are struggling with a substance use disorder.

“There is an immediate, critical point, where those struggling with substance abuse and misuse are absolutely ready to receive help,” said Tennessee Health Commissioner Ralph Alvarado, MD, FACP. “Unfortunately, this point is often at the height of crisis. The FindHelpNowTN.org website puts addiction and treatment resources within immediate reach, in real-time, when individuals and families don’t know where to turn.”

FindHelpNowTN.org guides individuals to location-based openings and services available at substance use treatment facilities. Site users can search facility listings using up to 60 different features such as the type of treatment needed, insurance programs, payment methods and availability of wrap-around services.

Treatment facilities on FindHelpNowTN.org regularly update their availability of residential, in-patient, and out-patient services. Since site users also can access a facility’s contact information, they can reach out immediately for treatment.

Facilities on the site are asked to update the availability of their residential, in-patient, and out-patient services regularly to ensure the most current information is available.

“Individuals and their loved ones facing substance abuse disorder have much to endure in finding a way out of addiction,” said Director Amy Murawski of TDH’s Overdose Response Coordination Office. “Our hope is for FindHelpNowTN.org to be a source to find relief in an extremely exhausting and immensely stressful situation.”

Currently, 243 Tennessee facilities have listings on FindHelpNowTN.org and TDH is working with community partners, providers, and stakeholders to include more facilities on the site.

The launch of FindHelpNowTN.org is the result of a partnership between TDH, Tennessee Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services, Tennessee Tech University’s iCube program and TAADAS (TN Association of Alcohol, Drug and Other Addiction Services).

FindHelpNowTN.org works in cooperation with TDMHSAS’s Tennessee Redline at 1-800-889-9789, a 24/7/365 resource for substance treatment referrals via phone call or text message.

driver on the road, contact the Chapel Hill Police Department via the Marshall County Communication Center at 931-359-6122 or in case of emergency 911.


- Do you have a friend who is about to drink and drive? Take the keys away and let a sober driver get your friend home safely.

The park was established in 1961 and is now one of only six resort state parks in

Tennessee providing a variety of recreational activities and lodging. The new Visitors Center showcases the Duck River, the most biodiverse river in North America and one of the top five most biodiverse

ivers in the world. Large aquariums contain native fish, and the waterwheel outside the center came from the Tennessee State Museum, where it was displayed for many years.

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

Lady Rocket senior Jaedyn Stalnecker didn't always run cross country.

In fact, it started as a conditioning element for other sports she played at Forrest High School.

But after diving into the sport and finding her niche within distance running, Stalnecker found a passion within running and not just competed at a high level, but took her abilities and ran with them—literally.

She recently signed her letter of intent to continue her running career at Austin Peay State University.

"I'm excited to be part of a club and program that is big and just exciting to be part of a school that wants me," she said.

"Originally, I was doing soccer and the coach said to do it for conditioning. So I started

doing track and kept doing it and fell in love with the sport."

Distance running separates itself from most traditional team sports and puts a heavy emphasis on the individual effort and work ethic.

With neither being in short supply for Stalnecker, she continually showed improvements throughout her time running and earned four trips to the TSSAA state cross country meet, including a third-place finish in the DI Small Class meet her sophomore year.

"Because it's an individual sport, it was fun and something I could do on my own. I just took it and ran with it," she said.

Throughout all her races, Stalnecker improved her personal best 5K time to 19:05, but will compete in some longer races of 6K and 10K distances, in addition to 5Ks at the college level.

Stalnecker says she's

looking forward to the new challenge of running races of different lengths against top-end competition.

"I'm definitely looking forward to doing 6Ks and 10Ks," she said.

There were other schools in the mix when it came to choosing a college to attend for the next four years, but in the end, the closeness of Austin Peay, as well as the perfect fit within the cross country team ended up being her collegiate choice.

"I looked into Troy in Alabama, but really liked how close Austin Peay was. I'll be able to come back home and come back to Chapel Hill. I really like the aspect of it being close," she said.

Meeting several of the student-athletes and teachers on campus also played a role in helping her make her college pick.

"I got to see a bunch of the students there and got to meet a bunch

of the other runners. I'm really excited to be there," she said.

While running inherently brings its own challenges as an individual sport, being able to specifically pinpoint improvements to your own dedication and work was perhaps her best memory in looking at her running career.

"I think just the journey from start to finish. I would train alone a lot and seeing that my hard work could get me to a DI school was amazing," she said.

For now, the focus is on finishing her senior year out on a high note and gearing up with summer workouts in preparation for her freshman season this fall.

She will report to campus in August and plans on studying business.

Sorting out who's No. 1 will continue after NFL combine

INDIANAPOLIS — The process of selecting this year's top overall draft pick began in earnest last week at the NFL's annual scouting combine.

It's just the start of a longer process.

After watching quarterback Anthony Richardson wow scouts on the field, seeing 2021 Heisman Trophy winner Bryce Young check in shorter than expected and defensive tackle Jalen Carter become the center of attention for all the wrong reasons, teams will embark on the next step — pro day evaluations.

Here's a look at some of the more memorable moments from the past week in Indianapolis:

Quarterback show

Most of the focus entering combine week centered on the top two quarterbacks — Young of Alabama and C.J. Stroud of Ohio State. But Richardson of Florida and Will Levis of Kentucky might have been more impressive on the Lucas Oil Stadium turf.

Levis brazenly told reporters he intended to throw so he could showcase his "cannon" arm. He did. And while Stroud also looked the part of a franchise quarterback in the throwing portion of drills, Young opted to sit it out after he measured at 5-foot-10 1/8 inches. That would make Young one of the NFL's shortest quarterbacks.

Richardson, meanwhile, helped himself significantly with one of the most athletic performances all week. At 6-4, 244 pounds, Richardson ran the 40-yard dash in 4.43 seconds and posted a 40 1/2-inch vertical jump and a broad jump of 10 feet-9. All three numbers ranked among the best by any quarterback at the combine since 2003.

Carter's troubles

It was a tumultuous week for Carter. After announcing he wouldn't opt out, like many top prospects, he left town Wednesday to return to Georgia, where he was charged with two misdemeanors, reckless driving and racing, in connection with a fatal crash in January.

The news broke minutes before he was scheduled to speak with reporters. He never stood behind the podium.

On Thursday, he was back in Indy, giving himself a chance to explain immediately to evaluators during team interviews what had happened in Georgia. The next day, bodycam footage surfaced of a police officer giving Carter a warning about speeding — just four months before the fatal crash.

Carter's troubles created an unusual dynamic for his former college teammates who spoke with reporters on Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Each drew questions about Carter's character, Georgia's culture and the crash that killed Bulldogs

Alabama looking for another SEC double dip in Nashville

NASHVILLE — The Southeastern Conference Tournament is back in Music City after a one-year detour to Florida, and almost anyone could go home with this championship.

Eight teams currently are projected to make the NCAA Tournament when the bracket is announced Sunday, with Mississippi State on the bubble. The SEC has five ranked teams, led by No. 4 Alabama, with both Vanderbilt and Arkansas also receiving votes.

Alabama is in position to repeat the same double dip the Crimson Tide managed in Nashville in 2021 when they paired the SEC regular-season title with the tournament championship.

First, the Tide (26-5) must shake their slow-starting woes. They have faced double-digit deficits in each of the last three games, including a 67-61 loss in the regular-season finale at Texas A&M. Alabama won't play until Friday against either Mississippi State or Florida.

"If we had the exact answer, I'd try to fix it," Alabama coach Nate Oats said.

No. 17 Tennessee (22-9) is the defending tournament champ after snapping its own 41-year drought. The Volunteers can only hope that experience, plus playing close to Knoxville, helps snap their five-game SEC road skid.

Tennessee coach Rick Barnes said Tuesday that the time for inconsistencies is over, with every game approached like a title opportunity, whether there are two or 10 games remaining.

"It's time everybody does exactly what this team needs to do to move on," Barnes said.

And then there's AP SEC coach of the year Buzz Williams, who has No. 18 Texas A&M on the same side of the bracket as No. 23 Kentucky, which hasn't won this event since 2018.

The tournament starts Wednesday night, with free tickets being offered to attract fans to Bridgestone Arena for the opening session featuring the league's bottom four seeds: Mississippi plays South Carolina, followed by LSU and Georgia.

Kentucky's drought

The Wildcats haven't won the SEC Tournament title since their 31st in 2018. They teetered on the NCAA bubble for much of the SEC slate before earning the No. 3

seed. They play the last game Friday night, giving coach John Calipari time to figure out a point guard.

Hours after Sahvir Wheeler underwent a medical procedure that Calipari said would sideline him for a couple of weeks, starting guard Cason Wallace hurt his left leg last week in a loss to Vanderbilt. Calipari hopes Wallace and CJ Fredrick (ribs) can practice this week. He also needs more from his reserves.

"The guys on the bench, the greatest thing is they've all had an opportunity now," Calipari said on his radio show.

Missing players

Several teams will be missing key contributors in Nashville. The Volunteers lost starting point guard Zakai Zeigler to a torn ACL last week in a win over Arkansas. Vanderbilt lost M Liam Robbins to a lower leg injury requiring season-ending surgery in its win at Kentucky last week.

Florida big man Colin Castleton has missed the last five games with a broken right hand, with the Gators going 2-3 in his absence. He is the Gators' leading scorer and rebounder and still ranks eighth nationally with 78 blocked shots and fourth averaging three blocks a game.

Miller at home

Alabama freshman Brandon Miller, the AP SEC player and newcomer of the year, will be playing in his hometown. Being back in Nashville won't protect him from fans of opposing teams who have taunted the SEC's leading scorer with a variety of chants.

Police said Miller delivered the gun used in the shooting death of 23-year-old Jamea Harris in January, though Miller's attorney said he never handled it and didn't know it was going to be used for a crime.

Streaking

Coach Jerry Stackhouse has Vanderbilt playing its best at the right time. The Commodores have won three straight and eight of nine, a stretch including their first win at Rupp Arena since 2007, a buzzer-beating win over Tennessee and a sweep of Florida.

No. 25 Missouri won't play until Friday after winning four straight in coach Dennis Gates' debut season. Georgia has the league's longest skid at five consecutive losses.

Giants give Jones 4-year, \$160M deal, tag Barkley

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — After days of intense, down-to-the wire negotiations, the New York Giants agreed to a four-year contract with quarterback Daniel Jones on Tuesday and put a franchise tag on running back Saquon Barkley.

The Giants confirmed the deal with Jones Tuesday night. The agreement with his agents was reached with the franchise tag deadline minutes away.

With Jones under contract, the Giants used their franchise tag on running back Saquon Barkley.

"We had productive conversations with Daniel and his representatives over the course of the past week or so," general manager Joe Schoen said. "We are all pleased that we were able to come to an agreement prior to today's deadline. This gives us a greater ability to continue to build our roster."

The long-term contract allows the Giants to sharply reduce Jones' cap number in this and subsequent seasons.

"I said after the season I love

this place," said Jones, who turns 26 in May. "I've really enjoyed my time here and I want to be here. I have great respect for this organization, the (owners), my coaches and teammates. I am happy we were able to come to an agreement."

Barkley's tag is nonexclusive, which means he's able to negotiate with other teams in addition to the Giants. New York would have the right to match any team's offer and would receive two first-round draft picks if it decided not to match.

The No. 2 overall pick in the 2018 draft and the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year that season would earn just over \$10 million playing on the franchise tag.

The deals came after Jones delivered a career season, leading the team to the playoffs for the first time since 2016.

The Giants had refused to pick up the fifth-year option on Jones' rookie contract before the start of last season. He was set to become an unrestricted free agent on March 15.

The No. 6 pick overall in the 2019 draft, Jones had a breakout season and led New York to a

9-7-1 record. Working with new coach Brian Daboll, Jones threw for 3,205 yards, 15 touchdowns and five interceptions. He also added another dimension to the offense by running for a quarterback franchise-record 708 yards and seven touchdowns.

The Giants had their first winning season since 2016 and beat Minnesota in the wild-card round of the NFC playoffs. The Philadelphia Eagles thrashed them in the divisional round.

Signing Jones allowed the Giants to tag Barkley, who also was an unrestricted free agent. Barkley had his best and healthiest season since 2018, rushing for 1,312 yards and 10 touchdowns. He also caught 57 passes for 338 yards.

The Giants had started the off-season with roughly \$46 million in cap space. Safety and leading tackler Julian Love, offensive linemen Jon Feliciano and Nick Gates, receivers Darius Slayton and Richie James and long snapper Casey Kreiter are also set to become unrestricted free agents.

LIV Golf effect noticeable as ever at Players Championship

PONTE VEDRA BEACH, Fla. — Such are the times in golf that so much attention at The Players Championship is on a player who is not even part of the strongest field of the year.

Stranger still is the player in question is not Tiger Woods.

Cameron Smith is a reminder of the fractured world of professional golf. He is the defending champion of the PGA Tour's premier tournament, not able to return this year because the tour has suspended him for joining Saudi-funded LIV Golf.

And it's not just Smith.

The runner-up a year ago was Anirban Lahiri, followed by Paul Casey. They are among 36 players who have defected to LIV Golf, and they are among 17 players who were part of the windy, wild weekend at the TPC Sawgrass last year.

The Australian flag still flies outside the clubhouse in honor of the champion's home country. Smith's pitching wedge is on display in the clubhouse, part of the tradition for the winner to leave a club that was meaningful in his win.

But there's no Smith — or his mullet — even though the No. 5 player in the world has lived down the street since 2016. He probably can be found this week with a rod and reel, not a wedge and a putter.

"I think it'll be a pretty quiet week on the water," Smith told Golf Digest two weeks ago at LIV Golf's opening event in Mexico.

Even at the richest event on the PGA Tour — a \$25 million purse with \$4.5 million going to

the winner — the subject of LIV Golf is never too far away.

Smith is the first defending champion to miss The Players since Woods in 2014, who was recovering from the first of five back surgeries. Woods isn't playing this week either, deciding to rest his battered legs ahead of the Masters.

"Yes, it's awkward," PGA Tour Commissioner Jay Monahan said. "But you know, ultimately that's a decision he made, and we've got an unbelievable field here this week and a history and tradition that one of these 144 is going to go seek to get."

The Players still has the strongest field so far this year, helped by the 144-man field. But by pure numbers, it can be difficult to distinguish between The Players and the Arnold Palmer Invitational last week at Bay Hill, or from the Genesis Invitational at Riviera a few weeks back.

Bay Hill had 43 of the top 50 players in the world ranking. The Players has 44 of the top 50, the difference being Harold Varner III (another LIV player) dropped out of the top 50 this week.

"It's not going to be as big a gap as it maybe has been in the past," Jon Rahm said, though he still noted the increase in prize money (\$25 million), world ranking points (the most in golf except for majors) and FedEx Cup points.

"And then the legacy that a tournament has," Rahm said. "Winning this event is a big step forward to a Hall-of-Fame career ... arguably as close as you can get to being a major champion without officially being one. It is our championship. So I think that's what makes it different to some of the other events."

Left unchanged is the dynamic nature of the Stadium Course.

It is best known for the island green on the par-3 17th hole and for its history of not favoring a particular style of game. Smith is renowned for his short game, Rory McIlroy is built on power and Justin Thomas a blend of distance and his ability to flight the golf ball with his irons.

"I don't have a great track record here at this event. It doesn't take much research to figure that out," said Jordan Spieth, who played in the final group in 2014, his first year, and then missed five cuts in his next seven tries. "But I feel like when striking it well, having some momentum and feeling like a little bit of freedom as far as being able to play aggressively here, that's going to kind of be my strategy this week to try and take advantage."

The wind roared to life on Wednesday, the final day of practice, and that's what caused so much havoc a year ago. Imagine aiming at an island some 145 yards away with the wind blowing nearly 40 mph (64 kph).

Xander Schauffele was two shots out of the lead later in the first weather-delayed first round and faced such conditions. He came up 15 yards short of the island and made bogey. On the next hole, he made a quadruple-bogey 8. His caddie still keeps a statistic as a reminder of how much can change so quickly.

"I think he showed me like a first ever to go from the top 10 to outside the top 100 or something like that," Schauffele said. "My team is all about giving me reality checks, and I got one."

Lawyer: Black Iowa football players at risk under Ferentz

The attorney representing a dozen former Iowa football players who settled their racial discrimination lawsuit with the university's athletic department for over \$4 million — half of which is coming from taxpayer funds — said Tuesday that Black Hawkeyes players will continue to be at risk of harassment "as long as Kirk Ferentz is in charge."

Attorney Damario Solomon-Simmons said in a news release his clients have been vindicated and he is pleased with the state Appeal Board approving the \$4.175 million settlement.

The board voted 2-1 on

Monday in favor of contributing \$2 million in taxpayer funds. Board member and State Auditor Rob Sand voted down the proposal, saying the university's athletic department has the funds to cover the settlement.

"The broadcast deal brings tens of millions of dollars every year going forward," Sand said. "I don't know why they can't cover their own mistakes and pay for their own mistakes instead of having taxpayers do it."

Coach Ferentz said Monday he was "greatly disappointed" in how the matter was resolved. He said he and others named in the lawsuit believed "the case would have been dismissed with prejudice before

trial" if it hadn't been settled and "there is no admission of any wrongdoing."

Solomon-Simmons said he was disappointed to see Ferentz continue to "claim that he and his coaches did nothing wrong."

A report commissioned and paid for by the athletic department "confirmed the racially hostile environment in his Hawkeye Football Program," Solomon-Simmons said.

The lawsuit filed in November 2020 involved former players including former star running back Akrum Wadley and career receptions leader Kevonte Martin-Manley. They alleged they were demeaned with racial slurs, forced to abandon Black hairstyles, fashion

and culture to fit the "Iowa Way" promoted by Ferentz, and retaliated against for speaking out.

The players initially sought \$20 million in damages plus the firings of athletic director Gary Barta, Ferentz and his son and offensive coordinator Brian Ferentz.

Sand agreed that Gary Barta should be fired.

"I can't imagine a private company that would still have someone at the helm after four discrimination lawsuits under that person's leadership," he said at his news conference Monday.

Barta has been Iowa's athletic director since 2006. In a statement to the Appeal Board, Sand noted four discrimina-

tion cases totaling nearly \$7 million in damages under Barta's watch. The largest of those was \$6.5 million to settle a lawsuit in 2017 over the firing of former field hockey coach Tracey Griesbaum. The money used to pay that settlement came from the athletic department, which does not rely on taxpayer funding.

In response to a request for comment from Barta, the athletic department sent a statement Monday attributed to him, saying the department "remains committed to providing an inclusive and welcoming environment for every student-athlete and staff member involved in our program."

"The Hawkeyes overarching goal to win ev-

ery time we compete, graduate every student-athlete that comes to Iowa, and to do it right, remains our focus," the statement reads.

State treasurer Roby Smith and Department of Management director Kraig Paulsen are the other two Appeal Board members.

Paulsen, before voting yes, said it's not up to the board to play a role in Barta's employment status.

"We're here to make a decision as to what's in the best interest of (Iowa) and it seems to me, upon the recommendation of the Attorney General, this is the wise decision to make," Paulsen said, according to Des Moines television station KCCI.

Slap fighting: The next big thing, or unsporting stupidity?

LAS VEGAS (AP) — The competitors stand rigidly upright with their hands behind their backs, waiting to absorb a brutal slap to the face.

When the open-handed blow is delivered, there’s a sharp report and the reaction can be dramatic. Some fighters barely move, while others stumble backward or fall to the floor. Some are knocked out.

UFC President Dana White is selling slap fighting as the next big thing in combat sports, putting his money and the resources of one of the world’s foremost mixed martial arts organizations behind the Power Slap League. The Nevada Athletic Commission has sanctioned the league for competitions in Las Vegas.

“It’s a home run,” said White, who is among several officials involved in the league.

Some slap-fighting beat-downs have gone viral, including a video from eastern Europe showing a man who continues to compete even

as half of his face swells to seemingly twice its size. Such exposure has led to questions about the safety of slap fighting, particularly the risk of chronic traumatic encephalopathy, or CTE, a degenerative brain disease believed to be caused by repeated blows to the head. A former chairman of the commission, which regulates combat sports in Nevada, says approving the league was a mistake.

Chris Nowinski, cofounder and CEO of the Concussion Legacy Foundation, agrees, calling slap fighting “one of the stupidest things you can do.”

“There’s nothing fun, there’s nothing interesting and there’s nothing sporting,” Nowinski said. “They’re trying to dress up a really stupid activity to try to make money.”

White and the competitors remain unfazed, comparing commentary on slapping to the negative reaction the UFC faced in its infancy more than 20 years ago.

“I think it’s definitely overblown with the topics of CTE and the damage that we’re

taking,” said Ryan Phillips, a Power Slap League fighter. “I think a lot of people still just don’t understand that it’s still a slap.”

Concerns about concussions leading to CTE, which can cause violent mood swings, depression and memory loss, aren’t confined to combat sports. The disease has shown up in the brains of former rugby players, and the NFL and college football have taken steps to cut down on blows to the head by changing rules regarding tackling and other hits. CTE can only be detected during an autopsy.

Despite the naysayers, White said he believes slap fighting will follow a similar trajectory to mixed martial arts, which the late Sen. John McCain referred to as “human cockfighting” in 1996, when the UFC didn’t have weight classes or many rules. McCain’s criticism helped force the organization to become more structured, leading to its widespread acceptance.

White said the ratings of the TBS reality show “Power Slap: Road to the Title” bear

out the early popularity of what to many is still a curiosity.

White said he realized there could be a market for the sport in the U.S. when he clocked the millions of YouTube views of slap fighting videos from eastern Europe in 2017 and 2018. The videos were often poorly produced, the slap matches unregulated. White became convinced that fights with written rules and shot with professional video equipment could convert many internet viewers into dedicated, paying fans.

The Nevada commission gave slap fighting some much needed legitimacy when it unanimously sanctioned the sport in October and a month later awarded White a license to promote it.

But White’s enterprise was hampered when he was captured on video slapping his wife on New Year’s Eve. White apologized, but has acknowledged it damaged efforts to get the league off the ground. White is no newcomer to controversy: Former UFC fighters Kajan Johnson and Clarence Dollaway filed a lawsuit

in 2021 against Endeavor, the organization’s parent company, alleging that UFC takes an inordinate share of the profits.

But White is charging ahead.

Three qualifying events have taken place at the UFC Apex in Las Vegas, ahead of the March 11 telecast on the streaming platform Rumble in which champions will be crowned in four weight classes.

Power Slap fights are typically three to five rounds. The fighters take turns hitting each other in the face with an open hand, and those on the receiving end stand with their hands behind their backs. A fighter has up to 60 seconds to recover and respond after receiving a blow. Fighters can earn up to 10 points based on the effectiveness of the slap and the defender’s reaction.

Fights can end in a decision, knockout, technical knockout or disqualification, such as for an illegal slap. All slaps are subject to video review. Each event has two referees and three judges.
