Bears agree to deal with Titans' Walker

CHICAGO — The Chicago Bears have added help on the defensive line, agreeing to a deal with former Tennessee Titans defensive end DeMarcus Walker.

Walker tweeted that he has an agreement in place with Chicago.

Former Seattle Seahawks running back Travis Homer agreed to a two-year deal with Chicago worth as much as \$4.5 million, agent Spencer Cannold said Tuesday night.

The Bears announced a two-year contract extension with fullback Blasingame Khari through the 2025 season and a one-year extension with long snapper Patrick Scales on Tuesday. Offensive lineman Dieter Eiselen

– an exclusive rights free agent — signed a one-year deal.

Walker is coming off his best year, with a career-high seven sacks in his lone season with the Titans. He played for Denver from 2017 to 2020 and Houston in 2021.

The Bears sorely needed help on the defensive line after finishing with a leagueworst 20 sacks, their lowest total since the 2003 team had 18. A safety — Jaquan Brisker — led them with four sacks, and no lineman had more than three.

Homer has run for 453 yards and one touchdown in four seasons with Seattle. The Seahawks drafted him in the sixth round in

Blasingame played in 16 games and helped

block for a ground attack that led the league with a franchise-record 3,014 yards rushing. Scales is entering his eighth season with the Bears, and Eiselen originally signed with Chicago as an undrafted free agent out of Yale in 2020.

The Bears also have agreements in place with Buffalo Bills twotime Pro Bowl linebacker Tremaine Edmunds, former Philadelphia Eagles linebacker T.J. Edwards and former Tennessee guard Nate Davis, according to people familiar with their situations.

The Bears set a franchise record for losses while finishing with a league-worst 3-14 record. But they've made some big moves since the end of the season.

The Bears agreed

Friday to trade the No. 1 overall pick in the draft to Carolina, two people familiar with the deal told The Associated Press. Chicago addressed a big need for a playmaker to help quarterback Justin Fields by acquiring star receiver D.J. Moore from the Panthers along with the No. 9 and No. 61 overall picks in 2023, a first-rounder in 2024 and a secondrounder in 2025.

The Bears also hired Big Ten Commissioner Kevin Warren as team president in January and last month purchased a 326-acre plot of land in suburban Arlington Heights that the organization has been sizing up for a new enclosed stadium.



Chapel Hill likely to lose fee bid

The response to a request from Nashville dominated discussion at Monday's Board of Mayor and Aldermen meeting in Chapel Hill, which otherwise faced a brief agenda.

Town Administrator
Danny Bingham told
the board that he had
been informed that revisions to the town's
charter submitted to
the legislature for approval had hit a snag.
Bingham, in Nash-

ville attending Tennessee Municipal League meetings Monday, said that two sections would need to be deleted in order for the rest to be approved.

At issue are the inclusion of the ability to assess impact fees on new construction, aimed at offsetting some of the infrastructure costs created by growth.

Lobbyists, especially from the home construction industry, oppose addition of impact fees for new construction.

Lewisburg attempted to add an impact fee on new construction last year during charter revisions, which also had to be removed prior to passage.

The county assesses an impact fee on new construction, the adequate facilities tax, including within the various municipalities, proceeds of which are divided between the Board of Public Utilities and the Highway Department. The mu-

Lewisburg approves special permits and annexations

After a three hour work session last week, the Lewisburg City Council cleared some lingering business Tuesday night, with a 19 item agenda.

Council finally approved the one contentious resolution remaining from amendments that would allow special event alcohol sales on city property.

The special events permit piece of that effort has seen differing versions of the ordinance drawn up by City Attorney Quinn Brandon Stewart and Councilman Joe Bradford.

After a seeming impasse at the work session on which version should proceed to a vote, Brandon's version, with a revision suggested by council, was accepted by the council with a 3

to 2 vote. Bradford and Councilman Tommy Burns, who favored more compromise between the two, voting in opposition

Annexation and rezoning requests figured heavily on this month's agen-

The council approved on final reading the annexation, with an R-1 low density residential zoning, of roughly 24 acres on West Ellington Parkway in the vicinity of Marshall County High School, for the intended development of West Ellington Ridge subdivision.

Also approved on final reading was the annexation of a 20 acre parcel on Green Valley Drive.

Returning to the agenda was a request to annex approximately 146 acres running between Holly Grove



Road and Finley Beech Road and to zone the property for a low density planned urban development.

The council voted against the project, 3 to 2, on the second reading in February after previously passing it on first

There was some unease expressed on the council about the lot sizes at the project, even though they met the requirements of the city's PUD guidelines.

The developer presented the project to the council at last week's work session and answered any questions about the project.

The presentation seemed to have worked as the council again passed the proposal on first reading, unanimously. Questions were raised about proper notice of the request being given for its return to the council.

The council is scheduled to interview two candidates for city treasurer on Wednesday. At the work session last week, Chuck Downham. a consultant from the Municipal Technical Advisory Service, told the council that the response to the posting had been poor, in part due to the salary range advertised, between \$75,000 and 90,000. That range is substantially lower than similar cities are currently offering, he said, and the council should consider pay scales overall if the city wished to attract and retain talent.

That concern is echoed in other departments

as well, as Police Chief Scott Braden informed the council at the work session that his department could potentially see substantial departures in the near future. The police department especially has seen serious turnover for years as area law enforcement agencies compete to attract officers. In the past, former councils have increased starting salaries for officers, but the current council will have to consider similar actions in order to keep LPD competitive with hiring and retaining of-"I'm going to have

trainees training trainees," Braden told the council last week.

Council approved the sale of two acres of city owned property on East Hill Street to the Marshall County Emergency Communications Board. The city will net \$100,000 from the sale.

Council passed a resolution based on Nashville's landlord registration guidelines, requiring owners of rental property to register their properties for a \$10 fee. The resolution was introduced mainly to ensure contact information for landlords when issues with their properties arise.

Council voted to return \$25,000 awarded to the city by the Boyd Foundation in 2018 for the development of a dog park. With the city experiencing fiscal issues afterward, and the grant representing a fraction of the funds needed for the project, the funds were never expended.

(Continued from Page 1) nicipalities, which also face infrastructure costs due to growth, are unhappy that fees are collected within their borders for new construction but none of the revenue is shared for water, road, or emergency services expansion.

The board voted to authorize Bingham and Town Attorney Todd Moore make the necessary revisions required for passage of the revised charter.

The board also voted

to amend the residential code to include language requiring sprinkler systems in new two story townhomes or duplexes. In the past, the county and municipalities have generally excluded such requirements, but now that so many of these units are being constructed in

the area, the language is being added back into the codes.

Aldermen approved on third and final reading an ordinance amending the current fiscal year budget to clean up several accounting issues related to estimated versus ac-

Japanese Cornel Dogwood provides bright mid-winter blooms

UT Gardens' March 2023 Plant of the Month

The landscape can be dreary in January and February, so trees or shrubs that offer a bit of cheer with winter blooms can be a welcome addition to almost any yard or garden. Underused in the landscape, the Japanese cornel dogwood is just such a plant. In midwinter it defies the gloom with showy clusters of yellow flowers.

The Japanese cornel dogwood's exfoliating bark also adds interest to the winter garden with its rich grays, browns and oranges.

Native to Japan and Korea, Cornus officinalis usually grows as a large, spreading, multistemmed, deciduous shrub or a small tree up to 15- to 25-feet tall. A deciduous plant with pale yellow to reddishpurple fall foliage, the Japanese cornel dogwood is effective in the landscape when used in foundation plantings, shrub borders, woodland gardens, bird gardens or naturalized areas.

The plant prefers full sun to partial shade and tolerates a range of soil types. In the autumn, like other dogwoods, showy red fruits (drupes) decorate this plant. Technically these drupes are edible, but most would find them astringent.

Japanese cornel dogwood is just one of about 30 to 50 species of dogwood, including our more familiar native flowering dogwood tree Cornus florida. Although it resembles the cornelian cherry dogwood (Cornus mas), the Japanese cornel dogwood grows with a slightly more open habit, flowers a bit earlier and has more attractive bark than cornelian cherry dogwood.

Several great cultivars of Japanese cornel dogwood are available on the market including 'Sunsphere' which flowers slightly earlier than others in the species; 'Kintoki' known for its heavier bloom; 'Lemon Zest' which has larger flowers than most selections; 'Issai Minan' which flowers well as a young plant; and 'Morris Arboretum' which has heavy bloom and a slightly longer flowering period. Tennessee nursery owner

and University of Tennessee horticulture alumnus Mike Stansberry introduced the Sunsphere selection. He named it for the Knoxville Sunsphere, a landmark architectural tower that was constructed as part of the 1982 World's Fair. East Tennessee is home to Stansberry's Beaver Creek Nursery. 'Sunsphere' Japanese cornel dogwood can be seen growing at the UT Gardens, Knoxville.

The UT Gardens includes plant collections located in Knoxville, Crossville and Jackson, Tennessee. Designated as the official botanical garden for the State of Tennessee, the UT Gardens are part of the UT Institute of Agriculture. The Gardens' mission is to foster appreciation, education and stewardship of plants through garden displays, educational programs and research trials. The Gardens are open during all seasons and free to the public. For more information, see the Gardens website: utia.tennessee. edu/state-botanicalgarden.

"For if the blood of bulls and of goats, and the ashes of an heifer sprinkling the unclean, sanctifies to the purifying of the flesh: How much more shall the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered Himself without spot to God, purge your conscience from dead works to serve the living God? And for this cause He is the mediator of the New Testament," – **Hebrews 9:13-15a**

South Carolina women chasing 3rd title

March Madness is here! Here is what to know about the women's NCAA Tournament, including the favorites and underdogs as well as key games and how to watch:

TOP SEEDS

The top four seeds in the tournament are South Carolina, Indiana, Virginia Tech and Stanford. Each is in a region, some tougher than others (on paper). We break them down for you:

SOUTH CAROLINA (32-0): The defending national champions are the No. 1 overall seed and the Greenville I Region breaks down favorably. It includes two teams in No. 2 seed Maryland (25-6) and No. 4 seed UCLA (23-9) who the Gamecocks beat earlier this season. South Carolina is loaded, with two-time Southeastern Conference player of the year Aliyah Boston and leading scorer Zia Cooke. **INDIANA** (27-3): After a loss to Ohio State in

the Big Ten Tournament semis, some wondered if the Hoosiers might miss out on a top seed. They landed it in the Greenville II Region and start against either Tennessee Tech or Monmouth. Mackenzie Holmes leads Indiana with 22.3 points and 7.3 rebounds per game. Top challengers include No. 2 seed Utah, No. 3 seed LSU and No. 4 seed Villanova, which is led by scoring sensation Maddy Siegrist.

VIRGINIA TECH (27-5): The Hokies won their first ACC Tournament championship and will lead the Seattle 3 Region. Elizabeth Kitley has stepped things up down the stretch as Virginia Tech won its final eight games. Virginia Tech could have to navigate No. 4 seed Tennessee in the Sweet 16 and No. 2 seed UConn or No. 3 seed Ohio State after that.

STANFORD (28-5): The committee looked to Stanford's steadiness for much of the season in giving it the top seed in the Seattle 4 Region. The Cardinal are led by Cameron Brink and Haley Jones, who have combined to score more than 28 points per game this season. Look for a potential high-wattage battle for the Final Four against No. 2 seed Iowa, led by national player of the year candidate Caitlin Clark.

GAMES TO WATCH

No. 3 seed Notre Dame (25-5) vs. No. 14 seed Southern Utah (23-6), Friday. The Fighting Irish's chances for a deep run will certainly be affected by how seriously do-everything leader Olivia Miles is hurt. She left the ACC Tournament quarterfinals two weeks ago with a knee injury. Monmouth (18-13) vs. Tennessee Tech (22-9),

Thursday, ESPNU. Monmouth, surprise winners of the Colonial Athletic Association Tournament, have not played in the NCAA tourney since 1983 and get the chance to extend its stay in a First Four contest Wednesday. Either the Hawks or the Ohio Valley Conference Tournament champions in Tennessee Tech, both 16 seeds, will have to take on top-seed Indiana on Friday.

No. 5 seed Louisville (23-11) vs. No. 12 seed Drake (22-9), Saturday. The Cardinals were a Final Four team a season ago and start their journey back as a No. 5 seed. They'll open things against Drake (22-9), which was seeded fourth in the Missouri Valley Conference Tournament yet defeated Belmont to take the league's automatic bid. Louisville is led by Hailey Van Lith, who's averaged 19.2 points a game this season.

No. 4 seed Villanova (28-6) vs. No. 13 seed Cleveland State (30-4), Saturday. Villanova features one of the country's best players in Maddy Siegrist, a two-time Big East player of year. The Wildcats are in a stacked region with top seed Indiana, No. 2 seed Utah and No. 3 seed LSU in front of them. Cleveland State won the Horizon League and made the NCAAs for the first time

PLAYERS TO WATCH

The women's tournament field is filled with stars, including South Carolina's Aliyah Boston, l ast season's AP player of the year who is back in hopes of winning a second straight national title. She will have plenty of competition for the honor this year, including sharp-shooting Iowa star Caitlin Clark.

Purdue's supporting cast helps set table for March Madness

Purdue stuck to a simple game plan this season: Feed the ball to All-American Zach Edey and let the 7-foot-4 center feast in the post.

The old-school philosophy defied today's trendy, small-ball style heavy on the 3-pointer attack but it allowed the Boilermakers to ascend to No. 1 in the AP Top 25 twice this season. Coach Matt Painter's

squad needed more than just Edey to claim its first Big Ten Tournament title since 2009. If the East Region's top seed wants to avoid another earlier-than-expected NCAA tourney exit, Purdue's supporting cast must supplement Edey's medley in the middle.

"We have a lot of guys who could go to a different team and average a lot of points, be on all-Big Ten teams or whatever, but they're happy we're here," Edey said Sunday. "We have a lot of guys who love winning. That's what Purdue is.' The regular-season

Big Ten champions are no one-man band. At No. 3 Purdue (29-5), the talent pool runs deep and everybody has a role.

Freshman guards Braden Smith and Fletcher Loyer have started all season after finishing first and second in last year's In-

dyStar Mr. Basketball Award voting, just like teammates Caleb Furst and Trey Kaufman-Renn did in 2021. Loyer is the smooth,

polished shooter, the son of an NBA coach who averages 10.9 points per game. Smith is the confident, gritty guy who basks in driving opponents and their fans bonkers. He's also scores 9.8 per game. "We all can shoot, we

knew that coming into the season," Smith said last weekend. "Early on, we haven't shot it well but we're starting to figure it out."

The Boilermakers' rotation has a flavor for evervone. Ethan Morton earned

a starting job this year because he's a defensive stopper though he previously seemed comfortable being the highscoring Pennsylvania prep star who earned the state's Mr. Basketball and Gatorade Player of the Year awards in

Guard David Jenkins Jr., a 24-year-old veteran, compiled more than 1,800 points at three schools, earning all-conference honors in two leagues before coming to Purdue. He is 11 points shy of 2,000. Beefy forward Mason

Gillis was an Indiana Junior All-Star and one of the state's top baseball players before a knee injury cost him his senior high school season. He helps Purdue play physical, but he's also a skilled shooter as Rutgers discovered when he went 7 of 8 in last week's quarterfinal win and Penn State learned when he made a career-high nine 3-pointers in February. "You've got to do

something right?" perplexed Nittany Lions coach Micah Shrewsberry said after that 20-point loss. "But Zach beat us up in the paint so badly the last time ... it's also about how you construct the team. You have the most dominant player in college basketball, and you put guys around him that fit perfectly.'

Few have devised a solution this season and now Purdue has its first No. 1 seed since 1996.

Perhaps nobody appreciates the contributions or sacrifices Edey's teammates have made better than Painter, who grew up in Indiana a fan of the rival Hoosiers but was never recruited by Bob Knight even after making the 1989 Indiana All-Star team.

Instead, Painter was overshadowed by others at Purdue— Steve Scheffler, Woody Austin and Glenn "Big Dog" Robinson, the focal point of the 1992-93 team many also dubbed a one-man show.

Clearly, Painter didn't construct this roster by happenstance. "In recruiting I just tell them, if you become

one of our top two or

three scorers, here's how we'll use you. If you don't, you're going to play a role," Painter said. "But you've got to have people that will play roles, and that's really it's a tip of the hat to those guys."

Now as Painter and the Boilermakers wait to see who they play Friday in Columbus, Ohio either Texas Southern (14-20) or Fairleigh Dickinson (19-15) — the hope is that this NCAA trip won't end like some other recent ones.

Purdue has been to the Sweet 16 four times in its last five tourney appearances but has only advanced to the Elite Eight once. There have also been three firstround exits since 2015.

To achieve their first taste of the Final Four since Joe Barry Carroll took them in 1980, Purdue's complementary players need to produce alonside Edey. Painter knows people will watch to see if the Boilermakers "overdo" their talented big man.

"I just think we have good balance," Painter said. "I always talk about everybody's going to have to sacrifice to be able to win big, and then if you win big collectively, you get individual honors. When you win a championship by three games, I would hope people can kind of open their eyes to it."

Colts to cut Ryan in cap move

INDIANAPOLIS

The Indianapolis Colts acquired Matt Ryan last March thinking he would help them make a postseason run, maybe even win a Super Bowl.

Now the two sides are now splitting up — and Ryan's long career could

Indy plans to release the quarterback officially Wednesday, a person with knowledge of the decision told The Associated Press. The person requested anonymity because the decision has not been announced publicly.

releasing 37-year-old Ryan, the Colts will save about \$17.2 million in salary cap space next season. Indy also saved an additional nearly \$8 million by trading veteran Stephon cornerback Gilmore to Dallas for a fifth-round pick, though they'll use some of that by signing former Los Angeles Rams kicker Matt Gay.

Gay confirmed the deal in two Twitter posts one thanking the Rams and their fans, the other announcing his excitement for joining Indy.

But the Ryan move came as no surprise.

Indy holds the No. 4 overall pick in next month's NFL draft and most analysts expect it to select one of four quarterbacks — 2021 Heisman Trophy winner Bryce Young, two-time Big Ten offensive player of the year C.J. Stroud, strong-armed Will Levis

or Anthony Richardson. "We get caught up in arm strength, but guys that are accurate and who makes plays when the game is on the line," general manager Chris Ballard said two weeks ago, explaining what he values in quarterthe league and I think you can track this back to 7-on-7 back in high schools, 20, 25 years ago — you're getting a lot more athletes playing the position."

Byron emerges as another star in Hendrick's deep lineup

But as of March 2023, William Byron might just be the team's best driver.

It's been a slow, steady rise

for Byron, who has won two straight NASCAR Cup Series races after pushing past Larson in overtime on Sunday at Phoenix Raceway during a pair of frantic restarts. The 25-year-old won in remarkably similar fashion last week at Las Vegas.

"We have four capable teams and four capable drivers of carrying the banner every weekend," Byron's crew chief Rudy Fugle said. "Pret-

ty amazing." Byron got a relatively late

start in racing as a teenager, but has been a quick study. The North Carolina native won twice last season and now looks like a weekly threat while teaming with

This is Byron's sixth season with Hendrick Motorsports and he received a contact extension last season after winning two races early in the year at Atlanta and Martinsville. He had a mid-season lull before closing with seven top 10s in his final 11 races and finished sixth in the Cup

It's part of a progression that's slowly pushed him among NASCAR's elite drivers. He was 21st overall in his first full Cup season in 2018, before improving to 11th, 14th, 10th and then sixth in the ensuing years. Now with two wins in the

season's first four races, it's clear Byron is aiming for the No. 1 spot.

"This level is so different. two was so obvious. It just

Took a lot of homework, a lot of details," Byron said. "I think the fact that I started later than most driving was a little bit — it took some time to bridge that gap at this level.

"Now that gap is bridged obviously."

Jeff Gordon — one of NAS-CAR's most successful drivers who is now vice chairman of Hendrick Motorsports knows a little about winning for Hendrick. His 93 victories are the most in team history.

Gordon sees Byron as a growing driver just now realizing his potential. "I see a progression with

Byron's back-to-back wins are part of a stellar start to the season for Hendrick's Chevrolets. Larson is a threat to win nearly every week and seven-time Cup winner Alex Bowman has four top 10s in four races.

Even Josh Berry — filling in for the injured Elliott was competitive at Phoenix, finishing in 10th place. Berry will likely get a few more races in the No. 9 Chevrolet as Elliott recovers from a broken leg suffered in a snowboarding accident.

"To get out of an Xfinity car and hop into a Cup car that's so different I think is a big, tall task," Gordon said. "We put him in a bad situation last week. This week I saw him putting in the effort and the time, the sim, getting fitted in the seat, doing his

The only bad news for Hendrick came on Friday, when NASCAR officials took the hood louvers from the team's four cars, bringing them to the NASCAR Research & Development Center in North Carolina for inspection. Any potential penalties would be announced this week. Gordon said that issue was

Alabama's Miller tops list of NBA prospects at March Madness

This isn't the type of NCAA Tournament that will give NBA fans an idea of what they can expect in the upcoming draft.

The likely first two picks in the draft – Victor Wembanyama and Scoot Henderson aren't playing college basketball. That's a major change from last year, when the first six picks in the draft all had played in the NCAA Tournament a few months earlier. It's also worth noting

that Villanova freshman Cam Whitmore, generally regarded as one of the top NBA prospects in the college ranks, won't be playing in this NCAA Tournament because his Wildcats failed to qualify.

But there are plenty of guys in this tournament who should have long NBA careers. A look at some of the top NBA prospects in this year's field (listed alphabetically):

ANTHONY BLACK and NICK SMITH **JR., ARKANSAS**

These freshman teammates are regarded as potential lottery picks, though neither was an Associated Press All-Southeastern Conference selection. Black, who is 6-7, averages 12.8 points and 4.2 assists per game, though he also has 3.2 turnovers per game. He's regarded as a very good defensive player. Smith, a 6-5 guard, hasn't gotten much of a chance to showcase the skills that made him the nation's No. 1 prospect in his high school class according to composite rankings of recruiting sites compiled by 247Sports. Smith has played in just 14 games due to a knee injury but scored at least 24 points in three of Arkansas' last four regular-season contests. First-round game: Thursday vs. Illinois.

GRADEY DICK, KANSAS

Dick is a 6-8 freshman with guard skills who earned second-team Associated Press All-Big 12 honors. He's averaging 14.1 points and 4.9 rebounds, and shooting 39.9% (79 of 198) from 3-point range. He has shown he can play well against top opponents. Some of his games with at least 20 points came against North Carolina State, Indiana, Iowa State, Baylor and Texas. First-round game: Thursday vs. Howard.

KEYONTE GEORGE, BAYLOR

This 6-4 guard arrived at Baylor as the nation's No. 9 prospect in his class according to the 247Sports Composite. He's had an impressive freshman season as a key part of Baylor's outstanding backcourt. George has averaged 15.8 points, 4.2 rebounds and 2.8 assists while earning secondteam Associated Press All-Big 12 honors. Firstround game: Friday vs. UC Santa Barbara.

BRANDON MILLER, ALABAMA

Miller's off-court situation has been welldocumented: Police say he was asked to bring a teammate a gun that was used in a fatal shooting which has resulted in the capital murder case against former teammate Darius Miles and Michael Davis. Miller hasn't been charged with anything, hasn't missed any games and has become a star. The 6-foot-9 freshman is the SEC player of the year and has led Alabama to its first No. 1 seed. He averages 19.7 points and 8.3 rebounds and is shooting 39.9%~(99~of~248)~from3-point range. Firstround game: Thursday vs. Texas A&M-Corpus Christi.

JARACE WALKER, **HOUSTON**

Although senior guard Marcus Sasser is Houston's best player, Walker is the Cougars' top pro prospect. The 6-8 freshman isn't particularly polished yet, but he has shown flashes of his enormous potential. He scored at least 21 points four times in an eight-game midseason stretch. NBA teams love his versatility. He should develop into a guy who can defend multiple positions, block shots and shoot the 3-pointer. Firstround game: Thursday vs. Northern Kentucky.

CASON WALLACE, KENTUCKY

Rated as the nation's No. 5 prospect in his high school class according to the 247Sports Composite, Wallace averages 11.6 points, 4.2 assists and 3.5 rebounds per game. The 6-4 guard has done that while dealing with some nagging injuries. Wallace has dealt with an ankle injury lately and has shot only 3 of 26 from 3-point range over his last seven games. Firstround game: Friday vs. Providence.

March Madness: Not just about brackets

LAS VEGAS — March Madness isn't just about filling out - and later trashing — brackets. There are more ways to bet the field in the NCAA Tournament, an event that will consume basketball fans over the next three weeks. Here's a look at the favorites, underdogs and

Who's favored to reach the Final Four?

Top-ranked Houston is the plus-120 favorite to emerge as the Midwest Region representative and play in Houston, according to FanDuel Sportsbook. That means a \$100 bet pays \$120. The next top team in the region is Texas at plus-450.

No. 4 Alabama, which is the No. 1 overall seed, is plus-190 to come out of the South. Next is No, 8 Arizona at plus-440.

The most competitive region appears to be the West. No. 3 Kansas is a slight favorite at plus-320, just ahead of No. 2 UCLA at plus-350. No. 9 Gonzaga isn't far behind at plus-400.

No. 5 Purdue is at plus-300 to come out of the East, with No. 6 Marquette next at plus-420.

Who's favored to win the title?

Oddsmakers agree with the NCAA selection committee that the No. 1 seeds are the favorites — Houston at plus-500, Alabama at plus-800, Kansas at plus-1,000 and Purdue at plus-1,200. After that, oddsmakers favor

UCLA at plus-1,400, Gonzaga at plus 1,500, Arizona at plus-1,600, No. 7 Texas at plus-1,900, and No. 10 Baylor and Marquette each at plus-2,100.

Who is the biggest underdog?

If you're looking for the next Saint Peter's or Loyola-Chicago, check out these options.

Sixteen teams are listed at plus-50,000: Colgate, Furman, Grand Canyon, Howard, Kennesaw State, Kent State, Louisiana, Montana State, Nevada, Northern Kentucky, Southeast Missouri State, Texas A&M-Corpus Christi, Texas Southern, UC Santa Barbara, UNC Asheville and Vermont.

What's the biggest spread difference?

Kansas is a 21 1/2-point favorite over Howard in their firstround matchup. Beyond that, Houston is favored by 19 1/2 points over Northern Kentucky, UCLA by 17 1/2 over UNC Asheville and Gonzaga by 15 1/2 over Grand Canyon.

What's the biggest over/under?

The old saying is that life is too short to bet the under, but it's often the wise play. Some of these totals may give bettors second thoughts before taking the over, but that doesn't mean it's the wrong move. The highest totals are Gonzaga-Grand Canyon at 156 1/2, Missouri-Utah State at 154 1/2, Texas A&M Corpus Christi-Southeast Missouri State at 153 1/2, Auburn-Iowa and Xavier-Kennesaw State each at 151 1/2 and Florida Atlantic-Memphis at 150 1/2.

Not real underdogs Just because the committee seeds one team over another doesn't necessarily mean it's the better team in the minds of the oddsmakers. Here are the games where the lower seed is the favorite on the early line: Tenth-seeded Utah State by 2 1/2 points over seventh-seeded Missouri, 10th-seeded Boise State a half-point over seventhseeded Northwestern and ninthseeded West Virginia by 2 1/2 over eighth-seeded Maryland.

NCAA Tournament success depends on strong guard play

Anyone trying to fill out their NCAA Tournament brackets ought to start by nguring out which teams have the best backcourts.

This has been a guard's

event for years. When Kansas' Ochai Agbaji helped the Jayhawks win the national title last season, he became the ninth straight guard to be selected as a Final Four's most outstanding player. The list started with Duke's Tyus Jones in 2015 and continued with Villanova's Ryan Arcidiacono, North Carolina's Joel Berry II, Villanova's Donte DiVincenzo, Virginia's Kyle Guy and Baylor's Jared Butler.

Occasionally a big man can dominate the college basketball landscape the way Anthony Davis did while leading Kentucky to the 2012 title, but they're the exceptions. The NCAA Tournament generally is all about guard play.

Here's a look at six backcourts that merit watching.

BAYLOR: L.J. Cryer, Adam Flagler and Keyonte George.

Baylor won the NCAA Tournament two years ago behind its outstanding backcourt and will try to do it again with a different set of guards. All three of them score at least 14.5 points per game. Flagler was one of five finalists for the Jerry West Award given to the nation's top shooting guard. He also earned AP first-team all-Big 12 honors. George, the best pro prospect in the trio, was a second-team all-Big 12 pick. Baylor ranks second in Division I in adjusted offensive efficiency, a metPomeroy that essentially translates to points scored per 100 possessions when adjusted for the level of competition.

Sasser and Jamal Shead. Sasser is one of 10 semifinalists for the Naismith Award given to the national player of the year He's eager for this NCAA Tournament showcase after a foot injury ended his 2021-22 season after just 12 games. He injured his groin in the American Athletic Association Tournament and didn't play in Sunday's championship game, so it remains to be seen how close he is to full strength. Sasser has scored over 17 points per game each of the last two seasons. Shead has nearly three times as many assists as turnovers.

KANSAS: Gradey Dick, Dajuan Harris and Kevin McCullar Jr.

The defending national champions had to replace virtually their entire nucleus from last year but still put together an outstanding backcourt to complement forward Jalen Wilson, the AP Big 12 player of the year. Dick, a freshman, is a Jerry West Award finalist, scoring nearly 15 points per game; he arguably is more a small forward at 6-foot-8, but Kansas lists him as a guard. Dick and McCullar both were AP second-team all-Big 12 selections. McCullar, a Texas Tech transfer, has scored in double figures three straight seasons and is pulling down over 7 rebounds per game. Harris is dishing out over 6 assists per game and ranks third among all Division I players in assist-turnover MARQUETTE: Kam

Stevie Mitchell.

Jones, Tyler Kolek and

Kolek, a Award semifinalist and the Big East player of the year, has 7.7 assists per game and has well over HOUSTON: Marcus three times as many assists as turnovers. He was named the Big East Tournament MVP. Jones, a second-team AP all-Big East selection, leads Marquette in scoring and makes nearly three 3-pointers per game. Mitchell has over 7 points per game but is best known for his defense. This group helped Marquette win its first Big East outright regularseason title and first Big East Tournament cham-

> pionship. MIAMI: Jordan Miller, Nijel Pack and Isaiah Wong.

This trio helped Miami win a share of the Atlantic Coast Conference regularseason title and earn the No. 1 seed in the ACC Tournament for the first time since 2013. Wong is a Jerry West Award finalist and AP first-team all-ACC pick. He was named ACC player of the year by a 75-member panel including coaches and media representatives. Wong, Miller and Pack are each scoring over 13 points per

XAVIER: Souley Boum, Colby Jones and Adam Kunkel.

This trio helped Xavier lead all Division I teams in assists per game. Boum and Jones are each averaging over 4 assists per game, while Kunkel has 3 per game. They're also scoring about a combined 42 points per game. Boum, an AP first-team all-Big East selection, ranks second in the conference in scoring. Jones was an AP second-team all-Big East
