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Cornersville approves brush bid

Last Thursday, Cornersville moved closer to resuming brush pickup services in the town. The Board of Mayor and Aldermen considered the three bids for service received from a recent request for proposals.

While each bid offered positives according to aldermen, they selected Top Notch, who also currently performs the same service for Chapel Hill, as the bid winner.

Based on a 450 household estimate and twice monthly service, the proposal, once contracts are finalized, add an approximate \$6.50 monthly fee for brush pickup to the town water billing.

Additionally, one dollar per month was approved in order to offset the time and effort for public works to administer the sanitation program.

Services should begin once details are finalized.

The town was forced to cease brush service several years ago after the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation informed the town that it could no longer dispose of collected brush by burning. The town exhaustively examined other methods of disposal, all of which proved cost prohibitive, but has remained focused on returning the service for residents.

Alderman Mary Johnson raised concerns over the current availability of an ambulance from the Cornersville station.

She questioned how often the station currently staffed or the unit supposedly dedicated for Cornersville was called elsewhere in the county for coverage.

"The people of Cornersville are not getting what they are paying for," said Johnson.

Johnson presented reports from last year showing 100 calls answered by out of county (mainly Giles) ambulances, with an additional 25 mutual aid responses from out of county

Chapel Hill talks water, weather

Alderman Marion Joyce called for the town to conduct a comprehensive, strategic water study at Monday's monthly town meeting.

"I think we need a study," she said. "I want some real data before we start spending a lot of money on our water system."

Her statement stemmed from an agenda item tweaking several water related fees, but secure access to water, and the costs required to run a water system, have dogged the town for years.

Joyce said that she wanted to make a "data driven solution" on the best way for the town to proceed long term, even though she allowed that some board members were opposed in principle to the sale or merger of the system with another utility.

"It might save our customers in the long run," she added.

Joyce also mentioned the inevitable cycle of drought, which can, as it did a few years ago, leave the town struggling for water as town well sources dry up.

Purchasing water from other utilities becomes a necessity for the small system.

Aldermen also approved a 12 month contract with the Marshall County Board of Public

Utilities, in which the county water utility commits to supply the town with 36,000 gallons of water per day.

Aldermen approved approximately \$3,000 to install a weather station with a west facing camera at a yet to be determined high point in town. The vote followed a presentation by Office of Emergency Management Deputy Direc-

tor Kevin Calahan on weather warnings and monitoring, in the wake of recent severe storms.

Ultimately, OEM would like to have four such stations in the county, he said, for improved local weather data, since Marshall County sits at the edge of each of the major radar sites covering middle Tennessee and north Alabama.

Data from the site can be accessed by the public as well, Calahan said, through an \$8.99 app provided by Radar-Omega.

Aldermen approved on the first of three required readings a proposed budget for the next fiscal year beginning on July 1.

The board work session on the first Wednesday in May will focus in detail on the budget.

this year.

She expressed concern over response times for residents needing medical assistance.

The town's agreement with the county, which runs the Emergency

Medical Service, states that in return for providing the station and covering utilities, which are reimbursed partially by the county in a separate agreement, that an ambulance will be stationed in Cornersville to serve the town and southern part of the county.

Town Administrator

Taylor Brandon pointed out that the contract language did allow for coverage of other areas, when needed, so the agreement was being followed to the letter.

County EMS has faced issues for several months attracting and retaining qualified personnel, as surrounding counties and private

entities compete for a shrinking pool of applicants.

"We need to talk to our commissioners," Johnson concluded, to agreement from the board.

"We need to hold their feet to the fire," said Mayor John Luna.

In other business, the board authorized up to \$20,000 for the pur-

chase of a truck for the public works department. Funds for the appropriation have come from the previous sale of surplus public works equipment.

Aldermen also chose to purchase a new Dodge Durango, outfitted for the Cornersville Police Department. The vehicle will replace a current vehicle close to the end of its service

life.

Aldermen also approved replacing current wood chips with recycled rubber pellets on the town playground. The just under \$9,000 cost will be offset by the much longer lifespan of the pellets compared to the wood chips, which must regularly be replaced.

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Tennessee's Coal Creek War tested 13th Amendment

Editor's note: This is second in a series of columns about topics currently slated to be deleted from Tennessee's eighth-grade social studies standards.

Many people believe the Thirteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution outlaws slavery, but that's not exactly true. The Thirteenth Amendment bans slavery "except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted." A long series of nationally publicized events known as the Coal Creek War tested this concept.

The Anderson County town of Coal Creek was founded when the railroad first came in, around 1870. Like many towns on or near the Cumberland Plateau, it was a mining town where men walked underground in the morning, worked hard all day, and were paid based on how much coal they mined.

People often assume coal miners were paid poorly. Barry Thacker, who has studied the area extensively and who makes presentations to teachers about its history, claims otherwise. "In the

1890s, wages that coal miners were getting for two days' work would buy an acre of land in the Coal Creek area," he says. "It was tough and dangerous work, but the miners were paid well, certainly by their standards of that era."

The use of inmates to mine coal near

Coal Creek started in the mid-1870s, when the state operated a branch of the penitentiary there. However, in 1891, things went a step further. After a pay dispute, the Tennessee Coal Mining Company fired all its miners at Coal Creek and nearby Briceville and replaced them with inmates it leased from another company as part of a "convict lease" program.

In the summer of 1891, the Tennessee Coal Mining Company sent more than 100 convicts, escorted by armed prison guards, to Coal Creek. The convict miners tore down the company-owned homes of free miners and built a stockade in which they would be housed.

Free miners decided to fight for their jobs. The next day, about 300 armed miners surrounded the stockade. The guards surrendered without firing a shot. The convict miners and guards were marched to the Coal Creek train station and sent to Knoxville. Miners also sent a telegram to Tennessee Governor John Buchanan, saying their action was "a necessary step in the defense of our families from starvation and our property from ruin."

Governor Buchanan responded by calling out the Tennessee National Guard and going to Briceville himself. The reception he got there from 600 miners, on July 16, 1891, will probably go down as the single most uncomfortable moment ever experienced by a Tennessee governor. "Gov.

Buchanan said he had no speech to make, but also said that he did not make laws but executed them," The New York Times reported.

Under National Guard escort, the convict miners were sent back to Briceville. Again, the local coal miners took over the stockades, this time in both Briceville and Coal Creek, and sent the convicts back to Knoxville.

In early September, Buchanan called the Tennessee General Assembly into special session and asked them to repeal Tennessee's convict labor system. The legislature met, but did nothing of the kind.

In November 1891, miners took action yet again by capturing stockades in Briceville, Coal Creek and Oliver Springs. Instead of putting the 460 convicts on a train, they turned them loose.

Miners then set fire to the stockades in Briceville and Oliver Springs.

The "war" was on. For the next few months, there were reports of company officials, prison guards and convicts being shot at by unknown snipers from nearby hills. There were also reports of the National Guard taking shots at local citizens and miners. In an attempt to placate the citizens of Coal Creek, the National Guard built a fortress called Fort Anderson overlooking the town.

These events were well publicized in national newspapers. Since more than half of the inmate miners in the middle of the

controversy were African Americans who had been arrested and sent to East Tennessee from Memphis and Nashville, some newspapers pointed out that these black miners were no better off than slaves a generation earlier. "The leased convict is worse off than the old-time slave, because the slave owner always had as much interest in keeping his slave in a workable condition and making him last as long as possible as he had in keeping his horses in that condition," one New York newspaper said.

State militia finally put down the rebellion and arrested several of the leaders of the free miners in August 1892. A few months later, after Governor Buchanan was replaced by Peter Turney, the

new governor chose not to renew the state's contracts to lease convicts to private mining companies. Tennessee became the first state in the South to get rid of its convict lease program—one of the prison reforms that came out of the so-called Progressive Movement.

The state of Tennessee replaced the revenue lost from convict leasing by building Brushy Mountain State Prison and Coal Mine in Morgan County. Convicts mined coal there until the 1960s.

As for the town of Coal Creek, it still exists, but has changed its name twice in an attempt to improve its image and lure businesses—first to Lake City, and more recently to Rocky Top.

cers noticed a strong smell of marijuana and discovered a bag of the same in his pants. A check of the VIN for the Challenger returned that it was also stolen out of Paris, Tennessee.

Armstrong was charged with possession of a stolen vehicle and possession of a stolen plate and held on \$15,000 bond.

• On April 8, LPD charged Tabitha Brown with theft after observing video footage from the previous evening from East Commerce Liquor where Brown was employed.

Detectives reviewed the tape which showed Brown let two men into the store where over a

period of some 30 minutes they selected and bagged in excess of \$600 of liquor, while engaging with Brown, who also handed the men cigarettes and vapes without charging them. A single soft drink, valued at \$2.50, was the only register transaction during this period of time.

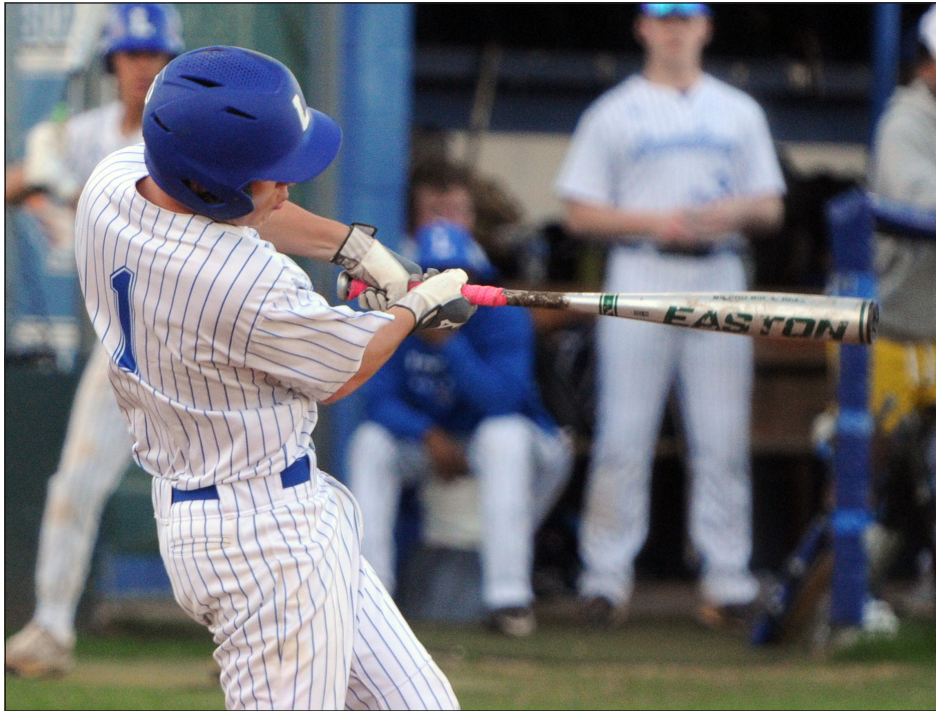

Braves' Anderson to have season-ending surgery

ATLANTA — Right-hander Ian Anderson, who won 10 games for the Atlanta Braves last season after playing a key role in their 2021 World Series championship, will have Tommy John surgery and miss the remainder of the season. Anderson, 24, began the season at Triple-A Gwinnett after control problems prevented him from landing a spot in the Atlanta rotation. He issued eight walks in 7 1/3 innings this spring and then walked two batters while recording only two outs and allowing four earned runs in his only start for Gwinnett.

Following the start with Gwinnett, tests showed Anderson has a torn ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow.

Braves manager Brian Snitker said Tuesday surgery for Anderson is "imminent."

"I think it probably answers some questions with Ian and what he did and didn't do," Snitker said. "Just the life of a pitcher, I guess."

When healthy, Anderson has been at his best in the postseason. He was 4-0 with a 1.26

ERA in eight postseason starts in 2020 and 2021. He threw five no-hit innings in the Braves' 2-0 Game 3 win over the Houston Astros in their 2021 World Series championship run.

Anderson struggled to return to his top form last season, when he was 10-6 with a 5.00 ERA in 22 starts for Atlanta and was sent to the minors in August.

Snitker said there was no evidence Anderson was having physical problems last season or this spring.

"The only time he said anything was after his last start with Gwinnett," Snitker said.

"He's been through a lot at a young age and his experience in a lot of big, big games. Hopefully, he can come back and be the Ian we know."

The Braves activated right-hander Kyle Wright from the injured list to start Tuesday night's game against Cincinnati. The team optioned left-hander Dylan Dodd to Gwinnett.

Wright, who led the majors with 21 wins last season, was placed on the IL on March 27 with right shoulder inflammation.

Some MLB teams extend beer sales to 8th inning

PHOENIX — Thanks to the pitch clock, the action is moving much faster at Major League Baseball games.

It also means a little less time for fans to enjoy a frosty adult beverage.

To combat that time crunch, at least four teams — the Arizona Diamondbacks, Texas Rangers, Minnesota Twins and Milwaukee Brewers — have extended alcohol sales through the eighth inning this season. Others, like the Miami Marlins and New York Mets, still have seventh-inning cutoffs, but haven't ruled out changes.

"Totally makes sense to me," said Tom Lienhardt, who was sipping on a beer Tuesday night before the Brewers-Diamondbacks game at Chase Field. "Since the games are shorter, you've got to adjust."

Teams have historically stopped selling alcohol after the seventh.

At least one team, the Baltimore Orioles, already sold alcohol through the eighth inning, or until 3 1/2 hours after first pitch,

whichever came first.

MLB games have been considerably shorter this season, largely thanks to a series of rule changes, particularly the new pitch clock. Through the first 1 1/2 weeks of the season, the average game time was down 31 minutes, on track to be the sport's lowest since 1984.

The minor leagues played with the pitch clock last season. At least one minor league general manager — Kevin Mahoney of the Class A Brooklyn Cyclones — said there was no dropoff in concession sales even with shorter games.

Still, some big league teams have felt the need to make adjustments.

The Rangers allowed some alcohol sales in the eighth inning last season, but have made that option more widely available in 2023. The team said the move to offer in-seat service to everyone — fans can order on their phones — was done partly in reaction to the pitch clock and the potential of shorter game times so fans would not have to miss extended action waiting in lines at concession stands.

Brewers President of business

operations Rick Schlesinger confirmed to MLB.com that their team's move to extend alcohol sales through the eighth was an experiment.

"If it turns out that this is causing an issue or we feel that it might cause an issue, then we'll revert to what we have done previously," Schlesinger said.

MLB says it does not regulate when teams sell alcohol. Most franchises have used the seventh inning as a cutoff, at least partly to avoid overserving customers who could then get in their cars and drive home.

But in reality, most teams already had areas around the ballpark where fans could get alcohol after the seventh, even if the concession stands stopped serving. Many parks are connected to restaurants or have VIP areas where the booze still flows.

"If it cuts off sales in the seventh inning, the eighth inning or the ninth inning, that really doesn't affect our stance because regardless, we just don't want people to drink alcohol and then drive home from the game," said Erin Payton, Regional Executive Director for Mothers Against Drunk Driving.

Family: QB Haskins was drugged before he was fatally struck

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — The family of deceased Pittsburgh Steelers quarterback Dwayne Haskins has filed a lawsuit against several people, businesses and the state of Florida, claiming he was drugged, robbed and extorted before he was fatally struck while standing drunk on a highway after running out of gas.

The lawsuit, filed recently in Fort Lauderdale, alleges the former Ohio State star was drugged and robbed by a man and three women in the hours before the April 9, 2022, accident. They say it happened at a Boca Raton hotel, at an upscale golf driving range, a bar and a nightclub. The lawsuit does not give any specifics. Haskins, 24, had been in South Florida for offseason workouts with Steelers teammates when the accident happened.

The lawsuit, filed on behalf of his widow and parents, also names the driver and owner of the dump truck that struck him, saying it was exceeding the speed limit, had worn tires and brakes and was overloaded.

It says the pickup truck Haskins had rented had a mechanical defect that caused it to run out of gas. The family also alleges that the state highway department didn't properly maintain and light the road, or post a lower speed limit while construction work was being done. They say a temporary sign blocked visibility on the highway.

Family attorney Rick Ellsley said in a statement that the lawsuit will allow him to subpoena documents and question those who were with Haskins as part of "the process of uncovering the complete truth about this tragedy."

"As to what occurred in the hours before Dwayne was killed, many questions remain unanswered. It is believed that Dwayne was targeted and drugged as part of a blackmail and

robbery conspiracy. In fact, his highly-expensive watch was stolen from him shortly before his death," Ellsley said in a statement. He declined to answer specific questions about the lawsuit's allegations.

The Associated Press is not naming the individuals and businesses Haskins' family are suing because no criminal charges have been filed against any of them and there is nothing yet filed in court substantiating any of the claims.

According to a death report issued in May by the Broward County Medical Examiner's Office, a woman Haskins was with told investigators they had run out of gas on Interstate 595 near Fort Lauderdale-Hollywood International Airport shortly before

dawn. She said he went out in the dark to get more fuel.

Witnesses told the Florida Highway Patrol that Haskins was trying to wave down cars and standing in the center lane when he was hit by the truck and then an SUV. The report said he died of blunt force trauma.

Haskins' blood-alcohol content was 0.20, according to his autopsy. That's 2.5 times the 0.08 legal limit for driving in the state.

According to the University of California, Davis, and other universities, someone of Haskins' weight, 230 pounds (104 kilograms), would have needed at least 10 drinks in the hours before his death to reach that level. He also had the strong pain-

killer ketamine and its metabolite norketamine in his system. The drug can be prescribed by a doctor, but can also be abused recreationally. The report did not say whether drug had been prescribed.

Haskins starred at Ohio State in 2018, setting several school passing records and being named the MVP in both the Big Ten Championship game and in the Buckeyes' Rose Bowl win over the Washington Huskies.

A 2019 first-round NFL draft pick by Washington, Haskins was released by the team after going 3-10 over two seasons. He was signed for the 2021 season by Pittsburgh as a backup quarterback, but he didn't appear in a game.

YouTube TV sets early prices, features for 'Sunday Ticket'

NEW YORK (AP) — With five months until kickoff, YouTube TV announced on Tuesday prices and some of the features it is planning in its first season as the home of "NFL Sunday Ticket."

Early-season pricing for current YouTube TV subscribers will range from \$249 to \$289 while it will be \$349 to \$389 for non-subscribers who will access it through YouTube Primetime Channels.

The NFL reached a seven-year agreement with Google last December to distribute the package of out-of-market Sunday afternoon games on CBS and Fox.

The seven-year deal is worth a little more than \$2 billion per season. The package had been on DirecTV since 1994. The satellite provider paid \$1.5 billion per year on an eight-year contract

that expired last season.

The early-season pricing lasts through June 6. Prices will rise \$100 after that. The average price of "Sunday Ticket" when it was on DirecTV was \$400.

YouTube TV's "Sunday Ticket" will include a multiview option, where viewers will be able to watch as many as four games at the same time. YouTube debuted that feature during the recent NCAA Tournament. Accessing key plays will also be available.

Viewers who have YouTube TV will also be able to access NFL Fantasy data and real time stats.

Google, which owns YouTube, announced last year that YouTube TV had surpassed 5 million subscribers.

"Sunday Ticket" averaged 2 million subscribers on DirecTV.

In total, Huntland connected for 16 hits against Cornersville, with nine of those coming in the first inning.

Cornersville responded in the bottom of the first, not so much by swinging the bat, but having the discipline of not swinging the bat in order to reach base.

The Bulldogs posted a five-spot in the bottom of the frame after drawing seven walks and another batter being hit by a pitch.

By the end of the inning, Cornersville had cut the Huntland lead to 9-5.

Daniel Sellars helped the Dawgs cut even further into the lead with a lead off single in the second.

He later scored and the Bulldogs had cut the lead down even farther.

By the end of the third inning, the hosts had rallied for an 11-10 lead over the Hornets.

In total, Cornersville needed just four hits against Huntland to hang on for the victory.

Sellars went 2-for-4 with a pair of RBIs to his credit, while Beau Schillig and Peyton Cherry added a hit as well.

Cherry took over for starter Tanner Pease and pitched five middle innings in relief, giving up four runs, only one of which was earned, on six hits and striking out five, to earn the win on the bump.

Spring turkey season set to open

NASHVILLE — Tennessee's 2023 statewide spring turkey season is set to open Saturday, April 15. The statewide opening date is two weeks later than in previous years. The Young Sportsman Hunt was April 8-9.

Hunters are also reminded that the bag limit has been reduced from three birds to two birds, and only one bird can be a juvenile or jake. The changes were made by the Commission to benefit the state's wild turkey population. After hearing growing reports of decreasing turkey populations, the Tennessee Fish and Wildlife Commission voted to delay the statewide turkey season to improve reproduction and nesting success.

New turkey regulations will be in effect on select Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs) and hunters are reminded to check each WMA they hunt in the 2022-23 Tennessee Hunting and Trapping Guide. The practice of fanning or reaping turkeys is now prohibited on all WMAs statewide due to safety concerns.

"This spring season is shaping up to be a good one," said Roger Shields, Wild Turkey Program Coordinator for the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency. "We had very good production across the state in 2021, so now we are seeing a lot of 2-year-old birds coming into maturity. If we have decent weather during the early part of the delayed season, we should have excellent hunting."

This will be the fourth spring turkey season to "Tag Before You Drag" where hunters tag their big game animal in the field prior to moving. Hunters can use the TWRA on the Go app to simply E-tag and report their harvest in the field in one easy step, with or without cell phone service, prior to moving.

Hunters not using a phone can attach one of the temporary transportation tags printed at the bottom of your license. Hunters using temporary tags have until midnight on the same day of the harvest (or before leaving the state) to check in a harvest online at Go-OutdoorsTennessee.com or in person at one of several manned check stations. Temporary transportation tags can also be obtained by logging in at GoOutdoorsTennessee.com.

A combination hunting and fishing license, plus a supplemental big game license, or a sportsman license is required. To purchase a license online, visit Go-OutdoorsTennessee.com.

More information on the 2023 spring turkey season can be found in the 2022-23 Tennessee Hunting & Trapping Guide. The guide is online at www.tnwildlife.org and available at TWRA offices and license agents.

Hunting hours are 30 minutes prior to legal sunrise until legal sunset. Legal hunting equipment includes shotguns using ammunition loaded with No. 4 shot or smaller, longbows, recurve bows, compound bows, and crossbows.

Firearms and archery equipment may have sighting devices, except those devices utilizing an artificial light capable of locating wildlife.

Gators launch 'Florida Victorious' to revamp, streamline NIL

GAINESVILLE, Fla. — Three months after losing blue-chip quarterback Jaden Rashada over a failed name, image and likeness deal worth nearly \$14 million, the University of Florida is taking advantage of a new state law that allows colleges and coaches to facilitate NIL opportunities.

A fundraising collective launched Tuesday, called Florida Victorious, will be able to work with the university to raise money and fund NIL deals for student-athletes. The state law passed in February gives Florida colleges a step up on some of the competition around the country, allowing universities to work directly with booster-run and financed collectives that have mostly been operating as third parties.

That was the case for the Gator Collective, the third-party NIL group that had been working with Rashada on his now-failed deal. The Gator Collective was consolidated into Florida Victorious, along with the more exclusive Gator Guard, which had required a \$1 million contribution annually.

The university hopes the new NIL collective will bring the Gators back to their winning ways.

Florida was one of six Power Five programs (along with Boston College, Cal, Georgia Tech, Oklahoma and Stan-

ford) to finish below .500 in both revenue-generating sports, football and men's basketball.

Most alarming, the Gators endured consecutive losing seasons in football for the first time since 1978-79.

The nonprofit organization will work closely with the school's University Athletic Association to raise money that should assist all 19 sports, but most notably football.

"The NIL space is constantly evolving around the country, and we've seen the impact of strong NIL programs," Florida Victorious CEO Nate Barbera told The Associated Press. "And now it's time for us to unify these efforts."

Other schools, including Notre Dame, Ohio State, Texas and UCF, have made similar consolidating moves in recent months.

Ohio State's two main foundations merged in February, and five Texas-driven collectives merged into a rebranded Texas One Fund in November.

The deal that fell through for the 19-year-old Rashada would have paid him nearly \$14 million during his college career. The collective defaulted on the contract before Rashada stepped foot on campus, prompting the four-star signee from California to ask for his release. He ended up at Arizona State.

So far, the Rashada family has not filed a lawsuit against the Gator Collective seeking

financial restitution. And the Gators have not heard from the NCAA regarding any potential investigation into what went wrong.

Florida Victorious, founded by Miami businessman and UF alum Jose Costa of horticultural grower Costa Farms, plans to raise money from the school's 450,000 alumni. Membership options range from \$15 to \$250 a month, with more than 90% of revenues going to student-athletes. Offerings include exclusive content providing an inside look at the lives of student-athletes, unique memorabilia and one-of-a-kind experiences like a dinner with members of Florida's 1996 national championship-winning team at Hall of Fame coach Steve Spurrier's restaurant.

The collective has an advisory board that includes megadonors Gary Condon and Hugh Hathcock as well as former UF quarterbacks Anthony Richardson and Danny Wuerffel, former Super Bowl winner Trey Burton, UF graduate and ESPN celebrity Laura Rutledge, and former basketball standout and current ESPN analyst Patric Young.

"We need to win on and off the field, and do it the right way," Barbera said. "We're building an organization that will make Gator Nation proud to support us."

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
