



Born to believe!

"To Titus, a true son after the common faith: Grace, mercy, and peace, from God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ our Savior." – Titus 1:4

In this letter to Titus written by the apostle Paul, Paul reminds Titus that sound faith and acknowledging God's truth is absolutely essential. Paul then reminds Titus that he is "a true son after the common faith." Being a "true son" means that Titus was a genuine or legitimate child of God according to the faith. This is very important because Paul was a Jew writing to Titus who was a Greek. In that day there were heated racial division was between Jews and Greeks. So to have a Greek (Titus) listen to the gospel message of Jesus Christ from a Jew (Paul) and believe it, that was a divine miracle of God. Then for Paul to embrace Titus as a genuine child of God after the common faith was another divine work of God. What do we learn from this? It is obvious, racial tensions can be eliminated by the pure gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ the Savior of the world (1 John 4:14), which is the "common faith."

The word "common" does not mean ordinary or worthless like we use it today. Instead, "common" means shared or enjoyed by all. Everyone who has the Lord Jesus Christ as his or her object of faith, has the same kind of saving faith. This "common faith" points to the fact that Titus was born into God's family of faith as a legitimate child. It is God's Spirit who comes, using the word of God, to give a lost sinner the new birth. Peter calls it "being born again" (1 Peter 1:23). This is totally a work of God and not by man's choice. The apostle John wrote, "But as many as received Him, to them He gave power (the right) to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on his name: Which were born, not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God" (John 1:12,13). It is clear that one's spiritual birth into God's family of faith is not by pedigree, it's not by our free will, and it's not by the will of another man such as a pastor, a priest, or pope. Obviously, being born again is by God alone.

Even though our faith in Christ is active in our salvation, we must understand that our faith does not cause the new birth. Faith is not something that you stir up inside yourself, but faith is a gift of God (Ephesians 2:8). So the spiritual birth by God comes first, then faith follows. Nicodemus in John chapter three had a hard time understanding being born again spiritually. So Jesus cut to the heart of the matter explaining that the new birth is the Spirit of God's work while we are called to just simply believe on the Son of God (John 3:1-18).



Man dies after being attacked by bull

EAGLEVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — A Chapel Hill man has died after being attacked by a bull in a barn, officials said.

First responders were called to the barn near Eagleville on Wednesday and treated Joseph Young, 55, before he was flown to a hospital, where he later died, the Rutherford County Sheriff's Office told news outlets.

Witnesses heard Young yelling, "Get back! Get back!" while he was inside the barn, Sheriff's Cpl. Jamie Bailey said.

Authorities yelled to distract the aggressive animal and it then charged at them, leading a deputy to fire his rifle and put the animal down, the sheriff's office said.

An autopsy will be conducted to determine the man's cause of death, officials said.

Raids last Wednesday

Last Wednesday, a multi-jurisdictional law enforcement group conducted several raids, including at a residence on Old Columbia Highway, in Lewisburg.

Due to the ongoing nature of the investigation, officials were reticent to divulge many details of the operation which they said focused on a widespread network behind the theft of used cooking oil from restaurants.

Theft of used cooking oil is becoming more and more widespread as the seeming waste product has surprising value for conversion into biodiesel fuel or in other products like animal feed.

The Lewisburg Police Department assisted in the effort. This group apparently located themselves in Lewisburg solely due to its location, with easy access to both the Nashville and Huntsville metro areas.

One man, who was not identified by law enforcement, was reportedly arrested.

The Tennessee Department of Water Resources conducted a sanitary survey of Lewisburg Water and Wastewater's drinking water operations, earlier this vear.

The survey examined records for a two year period, from April, 2021 to February, 2023, and conducted an inspection of the utility's water treatment and distribution systems.

Lewisburg Water received 597 out of a possible 599 points from the survey, a 99% score, maintaining the utility's approved rating.





Hang in there, inflation-battered consumers. If Aunt Marie was here, she would feel your pain.

Or ... you could feel your own dadgum pain and tip 30 percent for the privilege.

New laws require local government to provide agendas, public comment periods

The Tennessee Open Meetings Act hasn't changed too much over the years. But this year, the General Assembly made two major improvements that were a long time coming.

The open meetings law now requires that city and county legislative bodies produce an agenda that is available to the public at least 48 hours before a meeting and that "reasonably describes" each agenda item.

No more hiding important government business behind vague language or putting out an agenda that is only "new business" and "old business."

Another new law re-

governing bodies to have an agenda.

The new agenda law applies to all meetings of local legislative bodies, which include city councils, boards of aldermen and county commissions. TCOG hopes that lawmakers will consider in future sessions adding the requirement for other governing bodies, such as school boards, planning and zoning commissions and state boards and commissions.

Some details:

• The agenda must be available 48 hours in advance in a place accessible to the public. This place can be on the governing body's website, but it also can be in a public building, such as a city hall, if it's accessible to the public. A governing body can add an item to the agenda during the meeting only if members follow their bylaws or properly adopted rules and procedures and comply with all other applicable state laws. • However, the governing body is prohibited from circumventing the advance agenda requirements for the purpose of avoiding public disclosure of business to be considered.

quires public comment periods in all governing body meetings in which action is planned. Many governing bodies already have public comment periods, but nothing in state law required it and some do not have them or eliminate them for various meetings.

Both changes are good for citizens and for the people who serve on our governing bodies. They mean more information gets shared and less funny business can occur through withheld information.

My group, Tennessee Coalition for Open Government, worked with lawmakers and stakeholders on the requirement for an agenda after hearing reports of governing bodies that intentionally left things off the agenda or disguised them to avoid public scrutiny.

When citizens have sought legal relief for such secretive behavior, they were met with a Tennessee Court of Appeals ruling that said that nothing in the statute specifically requires



No cryptic agenda items

One question going forward may be: What does "reasonably describe" mean? Generally, a reasonable person legal standard refers to what a hypothetical person with an ordinary degree of reason and intelligence and exercising average skill and judgment might determine.

An example of what would not be acceptable can be found in a court case regarding the town of Englewood's notice of a special-called meeting. By law, notice for a special-called meeting must include the purpose of the meeting.

The meeting was about the town selecting the route for a highway construction project — one that would bypass the town or one that would widen a twolane road into a fourlane road.

The notice said: "Letter to the State concerning HWY 411."

The Court of Appeals in 1999 found that this "was so lacking that a The new public comment law requires that a governing body reserve a period for comment "on matters that are germane to the items on the agenda for the meeting." Nothing restricts a governing body from also allowing comment on items not on the agenda.

Some additional details:

• The governing body may put "reasonable restrictions" on the comment period, "such as the length of the period, the number of speakers and the length of the time that each speaker will be allowed to comment."

• The governing body may require people to give notice in advance that they want to speak. The meeting notice must tell citizens how they can express their desire to speak — for example, if they need to sign up.

• The law requires that the governing body take steps "to ensure that opposing viewpoints are represented fairly."

• Public comment periods are not required for meetings in which a governing body is conducting a disciplinary hearing for a member of the governing body or for a person whose profession is regulated by the governing body, such as state licensure boards.

The public comment bill was carried by Sen. Adam Lowe, R-Calhoun, and Rep. Elaine Davis, R-Knoxville.

Forrest Middle students rewarded


Forrest Middle School had a group of 88 students to complete the entire science portion of the Study Island learning platform. Ferguson tried to score on Chilton's single, but was out on a close play at the plate as Westview kept its lead.




The Forrest Lady Rockets talk over strategy and prepare to take the field before their game against Westview.

Saban says current track in college football will lead to less competitive balance

DESTIN, Fla. — Alabama coach Nick Saban says college football is not a business that operates like the NFL and warned that without more uniform rules on player compensation only the biggest spenders will compete for championships.

Saban met with reporters Tuesday as the Southeastern Conference began its annual spring meetings on the Florida Gulf Coast.

Two years since the NCAA lifted its ban on college athletes earning money for name, image and likeness, there are still no detailed, national NIL regulations.

Instead, states laws are setting the playing field, especially in the SEC footprint.

"When it turns into pay-for-play, now you're

than others," he said. "Where if you want to bring the NFL into it, they have a salary cap. They have all the things that level the playing field. And we could put guidelines on some of this stuff that would do the same thing."

The NCAA and major college sports are facing multiple legal and political threats that could give athletes in some sports employee status. Plus, a California bill is working its way through the legislature that would force some Division I schools in the state to share revenue with athletes in select sports that do make money — such as football and basketball.

"I think the big mistake that people make is college athletics is not a business. People says it's a business. It's not a business. It's revenue-producing," said Saban, who spent two seasons at coach of the Miami Dolphins before taking the Alabama job in 2007. Last season, Saban was college football's highest-paid coach at just under \$11 million in salary. Saban said most of the tens of millions of dollars that SEC schools generate from football goes back into the athletic department, funding far more sports than just football. "Nobody makes a profit," he said. "All the money gets reinvested for other opportunities for other people. Whether it's facilities, whether it's scholarships, whether it's opportunities for people to play. And if we continue down this road are we going to be able to continue to have those opportunities?" Saban said he is not necessarily against making college football more professionalized. Doing so would create more consistency and parity. "If it's going to be the same for everyone, I think that's better than what we have now," Saban said. "Because what we have now is we have some states and some schools in some states that are investing a lot more money in terms of managing their roster than others." He added: "If you think there's disparity in the college football right now, there's going to be a lot more in the future."

Rockets stay alive with gutsy win over Heritage in state

SMYRNA — A heartbreaking loss in the opening round of the TSSAA Class 2-A State Tournament on Tuesday landed the Forrest Rockets in the consolation bracket with their backs against the wall on Wednesday, where they needed a pair of wins to survive and advance.

After the Patriots scored a single run in the second, the Rockets came up big with four runs in the third inning. Forrest had five hits in the inning, with Preston Gentry leading off with a single and scoring the first run on a single by Carter

Walk.

After Allen followed with a double to score Walk, Ryan Meglis singled and Austin Dillon delivered a two-run single to put the Rockets up 6-1.

The Rockets made it 7-1 in the fourth as Baxter led off with a double and scored on a Patriot error.

But Union County fought back with five runs on three hits in the bottom of the inning to cut the Forrest lead to 7-6.

Allen led off the fifth with a walk and was sacrificed to second by Durbin, Meglis drove in a run with a single to right as the Rockets increased their lead to 8-6.

Allen was a part of an insurance run for the Rockets after leading off the top of the seventh with a single. A Dillon sacrifice scored the run and put Forrest up 9-6.

The Patriots went in order in the bottom of the seventh as Allen went the distance on the mound for the Rockets and took the win as Forrest forced a second game to decide a berth in the TSSAA Class 2-A state tournament championship game.

Baxter, Allen, Meglis,

and Dillon each had two hits to lead the Rockets at the plate. Forrest finished with 10 hits in the contest.

Elliott hit with 1 race suspension for wrecking Denny Hamlin

CONCORD, N.C.— NAS-CAR suspended Chase Elliott for one race on Tuesday, less than one day after the five-time most popular driver and former Cup champion deliberately wrecked Denny Hamlin in the Coca-Cola 600.

Hendrick Motorsports said in a statement it will not appeal the suspension and Corey Lajoie will replace Elliott in the No. 9 Chevrolet this weekend at Gateway, outside of St. Louis.

"We understand NASCAR's need to maintain consistency in its officiating," Hendrick Motorsports said in a statement.

Elliott denied deliberately crashing Hamlin with a dangerous left hook into Hamlin's car during the rain-rescheduled race Monday night at Charlotte Motor Speedway.

Hamlin countered with simulated data he posted on social media after the crash, then double-downed on calls for Elliott to be suspended on his Tuesday podcast.

Hamlin owns the car driven by Bubba Wallace, who was suspended one race last year for deliberately hooking Kyle Larson in a race in Las Vegas. The move is considered one of the most dangerous in NASCAR.

NASCAR suspended Elliott under a section of rulebook covered under "Member Code of Conduct." Among the rules covered in that section is "removing another competitor from championship contention in a dangerous manner when not racing for position based on the available evidence and specific circumstances of the incident."

"It was an intentional act by Chase in our opinion in our view after reviewing all of the available resources," said NASCAR senior vice president of competition Elton Sawyer on Sirius NAS-CAR Radio.

Hamlin said he was so furious after the wreck he wanted to fight Elliott, claiming his counterpart had a "tantrum" on the track and "shouldn't



be racing next week. Right rear hooks are absolutely unacceptable."

Elliott, the 2020 Cup champion and son of Hall of Famer Bill Elliott, denied wrecking Hamlin intentionally.

"Once you hit the wall in these things, you can't drive them anymore," Elliott said after emerging from the infield care center Monday. "So unfortunately not, no, just an unfortunate circumstance."

Hamlin on his podcast, "Actions Detrimental," on Tuesday said the act by Elliott was absolutely deliberate payback for earlier contact between the two.

"There's no explanation that he could possibly give, which he didn't have a reason for hanging left. You know he obviously didn't want to admit it," Hamlin said.

"I pointed out in the data that I tweeted that once he got into the wall, there was nothing wrong with his car. He's turned the wheel back straight, like he was going down the straightaway, and you can tell by data whether you've got toe link damage or not," Hamlin continued. "Everyone hits the wall. But he threw a hissy fit and he just hung the left on us in the most dangerous part of the racetrack that you possibly could and it ended my day and his, and in my opinion, he shouldn't be racing next weekend. Because NASCAR set a precedent last year on this."

Elliott's loss could impact TV ratings and attendance this weekend. He is the fanvoted most popular driver in the past five years.

After Elliott broke his leg in a snowboarding incident, the sport's TV ratings took a nosedive. And when Elliott was deemed healthy enough to race at Martinsville, NAS-CAR recognized its importance and hurried to promote his return on social media and with commercials.

Because he'd already missed so many races because of his leg injury, Elliott was already in a deep hole to make the playoffs. Elliott was ranked 29th after Saturday night, and the top 16 drivers make the playoff field. A win earns an automatic berth. The suspension marks seven races missed by Elliott.

Elliott will most certainly need to win his first race of the season when he returns from suspension to have any chance at making the playoffs.

Before the suspension was announced Hamlin implored NASCAR to "do the right thing" on his podcast.

"Be consistent here. It's time to make the right call. There is no excuse you can give," Hamlin added. "He was going dead straight and then all of a sudden he takes a hard left 120 degrees with the steering wheel. That is not an accident. It is intentional."

Hamlin called the move immature.

"It is childish and it just (ticks) me off," Hamlin said. "You have to be better than that. I don't give a (darn). What goes on in your mind to think that is the right move to make, I don't know."

Hamlin also said on his podcast that as a car owner he wants to see Wallace focus on his accomplishments on the track which includes four top-five finishes in the past four races, rather than making news off of it.

Wallace was seen feuding during a rain delay Monday with Aric Almirola, who shoved Wallace before the two were broken up by NAS-CAR security. A week earlier Wallace received criticism when he used an obscene gesture in a television interview after the All-Star race.

NASCAR did not punish Wallace, saying the incident wasn't malicious.

"It's out of style," Hamlin said of the hand gesture. "Whoever still does it needs to stop. Stop doing it. It's childish. ... It's just not worth it."

Things to know entering NCAA baseball regionals

The NCAA baseball tournament opens Friday with play in 16 double-elimination regionals.

Regional winners advance to best-of-three super regionals next week, and the final eight go to the College World Series in Omaha, Nebraska, beginning June 16.

Some of the top storylines:

Who's hot

Oral Roberts (46-11) has won 18 straight, the longest active win streak in the country, and 36 of 39. The Golden Eagles won't be an easy out as the No. 4 regional seed in Stillwater. They won both regular-season meetings with host Oklahoma State, including 8-5 in Stillwater in April.

Clemson (43-17) has won 16 straight for its longest win streak since 2006, and 21 of its past 22.

Who's not

South Carolina (39-19) is a regional host despite losing 13 of 18 since its 34-6 start. The Gamecocks were rewarded for eight early wins over top-50 RPI opponents and cut slack by the selection committee for dealing with significant injuries to three infielders.

West Virginia (39-

18) has the longest losing streak entering the tournament, at five games. Duke (35-21) has lost four straight. Indiana (41-18) has lost four of its past six and LSU (43-15) three of four.

Dominant Deacons

No. 1 national seed Wake Forest (47-10) leads the nation in wins, ERA (2.82) and shutouts (nine) and is seventh in on-base percentage (.428), eighth in runs per game (8.9) and tied for ninth in homers (110).

Projected top-10 draft pick Rhett Lowder leads the nation in pitching wins (13), Sean Sullivan averages better than 14 strikeouts per nine innings and Brock Wilken (27) and Nick Kurtz (23) have combined for 50 homers.

Still waiting

The No. 1 national seed has not won the championship since Miami in 1999, the first year of the current tournament format.

East Carolina (45-17) has made 32 previous appearances and never reached the College World Series, the longest streak of its kind. The Pirates are in the field for the seventh time in coach Cliff Godwin's eight seasons.

Clemson has never won a national championship, or finished as runner-up, in 44 previous appearances.

It's been a while

There are no teams making tournament debuts for the first since 2001, but three are in for the first time in the 21st century — Penn (1995), Santa Clara (1997) and Nicholls (1998).

Toughest regional

The Arkansas-hosted Fayetteville Regional gets a slight edge over the Oklahoma Statehosted Stillwater Regional.

The No. 3 national seed Razorbacks (41-16) are grouped with TCU (37-22), Arizona (33-24) and Santa Clara (35-18) — all of which are on impressive rolls.

TCU beat Arkansas 18-6 at a neutral site on opening weekend and scored 48 runs while sweeping four games in the Big 12 Tournament. Arizona knocked off Pac-12 regular-season champion Stanford 14-7 in the conference tournament and has won seven of its past nine, with Chase Davis and Kiko Romero combining for eight homers and 40 RBIs during the stretch. Santa Clara has outscored opponents 85-26 during its current eight-game win streak.

He does it all

Florida's Jac Caglianone, the front-runner for John Olerud Two-Way Player of the Year, is listed as the No. 11 prospect for the 2024 amateur draft. He's batting .349 with a program-record 28 homers to go with 65 runs and 76 RBIs. The left-hander has been the Gators' No. 3 starter all season and is 6-3 with a 4.14 ERA and 74 strikeouts in 63 innings.

Repping the West again

The only West Coast regional is at Stanford (38-16), the only program to have hosted in six straight tournaments. The Cardinal are coming off a second straight Pac-12 regularseason championship and going for a third consecutive trip to the CWS.

Under the radar

Iowa (42-14) finished third in the Big Ten, the weakest of the Power Five conferences, and was runner-up to Maryland in the conference tournament.

But the Hawkeyes, No. 32 in the RPI, are capable of winning a Terre Haute Regional that includes Indiana State (42-15), North Carolina (35-22) and Wright State (39-21).

Iowa has a top-15 pitching staff, strong defense and an offense averaging better than eight runs per game. The Hawks also have wins over LSU and Indiana State.

Riding the wave

As strong as Tulane's baseball history is, this wasn't supposed to be a year the Green Wave

made the tournament. At 19-40, Tulane has the most losses of any participant in history.

The Green Wave were 15-39 in the regular season, but earned the American Athletic Conference's automatic bid by becoming the lowest seed (No. 7) to win the league tournament.

"It's another opportunity to shock the world," first-year coach Jay Uhlman said. "All of us

in this room know the struggles of the team this year and how that's gone in terms of the win-loss.

"Not of their mentality or their will or their work ethic or those kinds of things. Just the game and the results weren't kind to us for so long, but they never faltered, they never wavered, they believed and they prepared with purpose and intent."

The Rockets put two runners on base in each of the last two innings but could not plate a run as Union County advanced to the state championship game.


