Tribune tabs Carter as new staff writer

When the staff writer position came open for the Marshall County Tribune, the paper's management didn't have to search too far to fill the opening.

Will Carter has been named the staff writer of the Tribune and will be coordinating production for the newspaper.

"I'm really excited to be taking on this new role with the Tribune. After covering the tractor pull in Chapel Hill last summer and various sports across the county in the last couple, I've learned a lot about the community and the people that come with it," Carter said.

A 2022 graduate of MTSU, Carter graduated with a degree in journalism, with a focus on sports media.

Prior to MTSU, he attended Cascade High School.

"I grew up in Wartrace and spent all 13 years of school at Cascade High School where I graduated in 2018. Throughout high school I played football, basketball, golf, and track and field while being involved with various clubs like Interact Club and HOSA."

"After that, I went to Middle Tennessee State University where I graduated with a degree in Journalism in 2022. At MTSU I worked with the student newspaper as the Sports Editor in my final year and covered the MTSU baseball team for two seasons. I am also a member of the Phi Delta Theta Fraternity and served as the Risk Management Chairman and President while active within the fraternity."

Having grown up in a small town, the ability to work and cover news within a small, tight-knit community resonated with Carter.

Prior to becoming the staff writer for the Tribune, he worked covering sports for the Times-Gazette, while filling in sporadically covering sports within Marshall County.

"Growing up in Bedford County, everything you needed to know about the community was in the Times-Gazette, and I always loved picking up a copy to see what was going on around town. Local newspapers hold a lot of weight within communities like Marshall County, so it's important to provide news in the best way possible. I look forward to being able to do that for the Tribune," he said.

In becoming a staff writer for the Tribune, Carter will be out in the community and covering everything from sports to local news beats.

"In a broad sense, I will be the

main news writer for the Tribune. I'm going to be covering anything newsworthy in the county and bringing that news to the people. More specifically, I will be handling most of the production of the news side of the Tribune and going out and covering meetings, events, and anything else going on around town," he said.

Having worked with the Times-Gazette helped set Carter onto his journalism path and gave him plenty of experience over the past few years.

"It's very humbling for me because I graduated college just over a year ago, and this industry isn't an easy one to find a job in once you graduate. I was lucky enough to land a part-time gig with the Times-Gazette after graduation, and the past year there set me up to move into a full-time position now," Carter said.

"It means a lot to me

personally to be working so close to my hometown because I owe a lot to Bedford County for molding me into the man that I am and will be. It still hasn't completely hit me that I'm working full-time in the industry that I want, but I'm sure it will soon."

"I am very excited to have Will joining us full-time and know he will be a key component in the growth of the Marshall County Tribune. Will has been a huge asset in the sports department for the Marshall County Tribune and Shelbyville Times-Gazette and with integrating that experience I look forward to watching his continued accomplishments," Tribune general manager Diandra Womble said.

When not buzzing about the town chasing the latest story, Carter spends his spare time on the go, being active within sports and hanging out with his friends.

"Recently I've been playing a lot of golf with my buddies. I played for two years in high school, but I had to stop

"Other than that, I'm an avid Auburn Tigers fan, and I keep up with them religiously. While still a newcomer to the industry, Carter's passion relies with community journalism and providing coverage throughout the various corners of Marshall County.

Did someone say "cataracts"?

"Because I could not stop for cataracts, they kindly stopped for me."

Someday I hope to find time to luxuriate in the collected works of poets such as Emily Dickinson – on paper, not as an audiobook -- so my ears perked up when my recent eye exam revealed the early stages of cataracts in both eyes.

(There's a tiny hemorrhage in each of my peepers as well, but cataracts have center stage for this week's column.)



Don't worry. The optometrist estimated I have five to 10 years until the cataracts will require surgery. Hmm. That will be about the same time I am due for my next colonoscopy. Throw in hypothetical grandchildren enamored with a purple dinosaur and you have "perfect storm" out the ying-yang .

Having long ago gotten over feeling 10 feet tall and bulletproof ("Hey, you guys can't give me a wedgie; I'm 10 feet tall and bulletproof!"), I was more melancholy than shocked. Still, it seems like only five minutes between being warned that you'll put your eye out with a Red Ryder BB rifle and being warned that you'll put your eyes out with birthday candles.

To add insult to injury, I never even found time to enjoy a mid-life crisis a few years back. If I attempt to play catch-up now, I would be forced to buy a sports car that is driven only at early-bird supper time on a non-rainy day.

I have stacks of books I crave to read, a library of classic TV shows to experience and wonders of nature to observe ("There's such a lot of world to see," as Mr. Henry Mancini wrote), so I am resolved to be vigilant about my eye health.

By this time, Mom's cataracts could probably have served as cloaking devices for the starship Enterprise, but Dr. Jordan was somehow able to remove them and give her excellent vision.

I'm glad she was able to dodge a bullet ("They're not making bullets like they did in the good old days – I think they're using sawdust and library paste") and I hope all of you will join me in scheduling regular eyecare visits.

Please don't resign yourself to the words of those folk-rock poets Simon and Garfunkel: "Hello, darkness, my old friend."

This photo was taken three days after the Wilson Hill School, located in the Globe Road community, was blown away by a tornado. The teacher, Miss Mary Wilson, 23, was killed and several of the school children were injured. After realizing how bad the storm was, she sent the children out of the school building and told them to lay flat on the graves in the nearby cemetery. Just as she reached the door, following the children, a strong gust of wind raised the roof off the building, releasing a big beam which fell on her. A small boy, frightened, had his arm around her skirt as they went through the doorway. His head was pinned beneath the beam. Another gust of

wind raised the wooden beam long enough for him to get out the door, but Miss Wilson's body was crushed.

Relatives who lived nearby carried her body to the closest house. It was the next day before an ambulance could go from Lewisburg to the area where the school house was once located to bring her body to the funeral home.

More than 90 people were killed in this storm that swept through Georgia, Alabama, Louisiana, Tennessee, Mississippi, and Texas.

Christ in Noah's Ark

"And God said unto Noah... the earth is filled with violence through them; and, behold, I will destroy them with the earth. Make an ark of gopher wood... and shall pitch it within and without with pitch... A window shalt thou make to the ark... and the door of the ark shalt thou set in the side..."
- Genesis 6:13-16

In Genesis chapters 6-8 we have the record of Noah, the animals, the worldwide flood, and how they all were saved in the ark. Skeptics mock this historical account. According to Duane Gish, who was a biochemist and the author of *Dinosaurs by Design*, he states in his book that, "Evidences of a worldwide flood can be found in more than 270 flood legends which are common in other

countries!" Gish goes on to give an account of some, such as the Hawaiian legend of a man named Nu-u who made a great canoe with a house on it and filled it with animals and all were saved. The Chinese legend of Fuh, is how he and his family escaped a great flood. The Toltec Indians of Mexico said, "the first world lasted 1716 years and was destroyed by a great flood. Only a few men escaped in a closed chest." These historical legends from other cultures are good evidence that the core of the global flood account must be valid. Nevertheless, God gave us the exact historical account in the Bible.

In our verses God instructed Noah to build an ark because He was going to bring a flood of judgment upon the world because of their sin. As we

read, God gave Noah the details how to build this massive boat. Amazingly, Noah's ark is a striking illustration of Christ. First, there was to be only one window. A window gives light. Christ said, "I am the light of the world" (John 8:12). Secondly, there was to be one door. Christ said, "I am the door" (John 10:9), and as the door was located in the side, so Christ on the cross was pierced in His side (John 19:34). Thirdly, we read that the ark was to be covered inside and out with "pitch," an early waterproof adhesive. Amazingly, the Hebrew word for "pitch" is also translated as "atonement" in Exodus 30:15, which means that this ark was covered in atonement. It is said of Christ that through Him "we have now received the atonement" (Romans 5:11).

Lastly, the ark was a place of safety from the judgment. Noah's ark bore the storm of God's judgment while Noah and all that were in the ark were safe. So it is with God's Ark - Christ. "There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus" (Romans 8:1).

So the world that then was, being overflowed with water, perished, but our world, is reserved unto fire against the Day of Judgment (2 Peter 3:6,7). Dear soul, are you in Christ by faith alone? There is only safety in God's Ark - who is Christ! will find the Light of Life.



2024 SEC Format: Winners and Losers

Change can be good, but change can also be scary.

If you haven't seen the news surrounding the Southeastern Conference (SEC), and their conference scheduling format, then you're in for a surprise.

Conference realignment has been a huge topic of discussion in college sports, more specifically college football, over the last year, and the SEC has been at the forefront of those conversations with Texas University and Oklahoma University set to join the conference in 2024.

Questions of where they will fit in and how conference scheduling will play out came with the additions.

Will there still be an East and West? Will there be a pod system?

Well, the SEC recently answered those questions by announcing that there will be no divisions within the conference, and that each team will play an eight-game conference schedule with the top two records being awarded a chance in the SEC Championship game.

Not long after, they released the 2024 conference schedules which outlined each teams' conference opponents and which were home or away games.

Some teams received a similar schedule to what they were used to, but some got the bad end of the deal and will have a treacherous time navigating through the year.

One reason for that is some teams already have a tough non-conference schedule ahead of them, but hey, it just means more right?

So let's take a look at who the change is good for and who it is scary for.

WINNERS Tennessee Volunteers

The Vols are at the top of my list for the winners because their 2024 schedule consists of SEC teams that would normally be on their schedule anyway like Alabama, Florida, Kentucky, Georgia, and Vanderbilt with Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Mississippi State being the other three.

The Crimson Tide, Gators, and Wildcats will all be traveling to Knoxville which is a huge positive for Vol fans while Georgia and Oklahoma will be away games.

On their non-conference slate, Tennessee will play Chattanooga, NC State, Kent State, and UTEP, all of which aren't world-beaters by any means.

Alabama Crimson Tide

Alabama slides into the second spot of the winners because, well, it's Alabama.

Putting all of the Tide's previous success

over the last decade or so aside, their 2024 schedule is set up for them to do what they normally do - win.

Auburn, LSU, and Tennessee stay on their schedule with the Vols being the only road game out of that group.

Newcomers to their regular season include Georgia, South Carolina, Missouri, Oklahoma, and Vanderbilt.

Obviously Georgia is no team to mess with as of late, but along with South Carolina and Missouri, it will be a home game for the Tide which is enormous for them.

The easiest part of their 2024 slate, per usual, is their non-conference games which include Western Kentucky, South Florida, Wisconsin, and Mercer.

One would think they would have no issue at the start of the season before they prepare to tackle a slightly tougher conference schedule than the normal.

South Carolina Gamecocks

Since Shane Beamer

was hired after the 2020 season, it has been an upward trend for the Gamecocks in all aspects of college football.

He, along with his staff, secured the 16th ranked recruiting class in 2023 according to 247Sports after an 8-5 season where they defeated Tennessee and Clemson in back-to-back weeks to end their College Football Playoff hopes.

For the 2024 season, South Carolina has a beefier SEC schedule, but not one to be afraid of.

On their home field, they will face LSU, Ole Miss, Missouri, and Texas A&M while their away slate consists of Alabama, Kentucky, Oklahoma, and Vanderbilt.

The big hitters on that list are LSU and Oklahoma, but the others still have a lot to prove before they can make teams nervous.

South Carolina will still play in-state rival Clemson, but the rest of their non-conference schedule consists of Old Dominion, Akron, and Wofford.

If Beamer can keep the Gamecocks on track, they're set up to have a successful 2024 season.

LOSERS Florida Gators

The Florida Gator faithful should be very nervous for the 2024 season because in my opinion they got the worst end of the deal schedule wise.

In non-conference play, the Gators match-up against Miami, UCF, Georgia, and Florida State.

UCF aside, all of those games have the potential to be top-25 matchups when the season rolls around.

Oh, and on top of that, they have to play LSU, Texas A&M, at Tennessee, and at Texas.

By the time the 2024 season starts, Florida could very well have the toughest schedule in all of college football, and the worst part is they still have a lot to prove under head coach Billy Napier.

And if there isn't much improvement in

the upcoming season, Napier will have his work cut out for him.

Vanderbilt Commodores

Trips to Auburn, LSU, Missouri, and Ole Miss await them with Alabama, South Carolina, and Tennessee all making the trip to Oklahoma while the Sooner's usual rivalry matchup with Texas will be held at the Cotton Bowl in Dallas, Texas.

Sure Oklahoma was considered one of the big boys in the Big12, and that's the main reason they're moving conferences, but the SEC has proven time and time again that it really does mean more on their side.

Will Oklahoma compete right out of the gate?

Probably not, but they've proven over the last decade that they can put strong teams together and win games.

Along with Texas, it will be interesting to see how well they can compete in the SEC.

LIV impacting Garica's Hall of Fame chances? It's possible

LOS ANGELES — The next ballot for the World Golf Hall of Fame will include three players born in 1980, all major champions with remarkably similar records in global golf. One of them is Sergio Garcia, who suspects he will be looked upon differently from Adam Scott and Justin Rose.

Garcia was asked who among those three would be considered the leading candidate to be elected for the 2026 class of inductees.

"I went to LIV, so I'm probably a little behind," Garcia said with a laugh. "Even though things are settling down."

He thought for a few minutes about the trio and settled on Scott before adding, "If I didn't go to LIV and everything that happened, probably me."

That's hard to dispute, and a case could be made for each.

Garcia has 31 wins around the world, including the 2017 Masters in a playoff over Rose and The Players Championship. He also holds the Ryder Cup record for most points at 28.5, going 3-1 in the last Ryder Cup — his final Ryder Cup — at Whistling Straits.

Scott has 29 worldwide wins including a playoff win at the Masters. He also won The Players and two World Golf Championships, and he reached No. 1 in the world ranking for 11 weeks. Rose won his major in the U.S. Open at Merion, won a pair of World Golf Championships and was No. 1 for 13 weeks.

The Hall of Fame committee that votes on finalists includes PGA Tour Commissioner Jay Monahan and European tour CEO Keith Pelley, along with the leadership from Augusta National, PGA of America, the USGA and the R&A.

This won't be on the table until 2025, and there's no telling what golf will look like then.

Scott was asked who he thought would be most appealing of the three and said,

"The next one to win a major." For Garcia, who made it through 36-hole qualifying and then made the cut at the U.S. Open, that might be what it takes.

Riviera

Work was to begin Tuesday on a few tweaks at Riviera Country Club that are expected to be completed by October, well ahead of the Genesis Invitational.

The right portion of the 10th green, which has built up over the years from sand blasted out of the right bunker, is being slightly lowered. More noticeable is the 15th green, which has what amounts to a gully down the middle and limits pin positions. The back right section is being extended to allow for such a pin.

The 10th — one of the most famous reachable par 4s in America — already has an alternate green to the right that will be used, and the hole would play as a par 3 for members for the first few months. A temporary green is being built on No. 15.

Riviera will be getting plenty of attention in the coming years. Next up is the U.S. Women's Open in 2026, followed by the Olympics in 2028.

And with the USGA willing to take the U.S. Open to smaller footprints, Riviera is expected to get the U.S. Open in 2031. An announcement could come as early as this week.

Miller time

On the 50-year anniversary of Johnny Miller shooting a 63 on Sunday to win the U.S. Open, he was asked how he would feel the day someone shot 62. After all, it was bound to happen, considering scores have been coming down for a century or more.

And then it happened the next day — first by Rickie Fowler, then by Xander Schauffele.

Miller's response nailed it, though, as he often did when he was in the television booth.

"The secret of a 63 is the fact that I shot it on Sunday

and it was enough to win the U.S. Open," Miller said. "There will be guys that will shoot 61 or 62, but can they do it on Sunday to win? That's what makes the round what it is."

Miller and Henrik Stenson at Royal Troon in the 2016 British Open are the only major champions to win with a 63 in the last round.

Ranking record

Jin Young Ko is on the cusp of the record for most weeks at No. 1 in the women's world ranking.

Ko tied Lorena Ochoa's record of 158 total weeks atop the ranking, which dates to 2006. She breaks the record provided she stays at No. 1 after the KPMG Women's PGA. Nelly Korda (No. 2) and Lydia Ko (No. 3) are best poised to catch her at the LPGA Tour's second major of the year, which starts Thursday at Baltusrol.

Ko, a 27-year-old from South Korea with a silky putting stroke, has been No. 1 for parts of every year since 2019. Her longest stretch was 100 weeks in a row.

Ochoa's 158 weeks were consecutive, and it ended when the Mexican star abruptly retired from competition to start a family.

Taking a break

Nick Taylor never would have imagined skipping a \$20 million tournament like the Travelers Championship at the start of the year. This hasn't been just any year.

It already was off to a solid start — he had four top 10s, including a runner-up finish to Scottie Scheffler in the Phoenix Open — when Taylor won the RBC Canadian Open by making a 70-foot eagle putt in a playoff over Tommy Fleetwood.

It was a draining win as the first Canadian champion of his national open since 1954. And with no time to digest it all, Taylor was on a plane to Los Angeles for the U.S. Open. He missed the cut, and he needs a moment to recharge

and take it all in.

He can afford that. Taylor is No. 8 in the FedEx Cup, all but certain to reach East Lake for the Tour Championship for the first time. His season earnings of \$5,677,835 are more than his previous five seasons combined on the PGA Tour.

And he's locked into all the elevated events for next year, along with all four majors for the first time in his career.

"There's never been a better time to win than now," he said before leaving the U.S. Open.

That's a popular theme this year.

Divots

Jon Rahm has not missed the cut in a major since 2019 at Bethpage Black in PGA Championship. His 16 straight cuts in the majors is the longest active streak. ... The John Deere Classic keeps an eye on emerging college players and this year awarded exemptions to past NCAA champion Gordon Sargent of Vanderbilt and Michael Thorbjornsen of Stanford. Thorbjornsen is playing this week in the Travelers Championship, where a year ago he finished fourth. ... Xander Schauffele has never finished worse than a tie for 14th in his seven U.S. Open appearances. ... U.S. Amateur champion Sam Bennett and Ben Carr, the runner-up, both made the cut in the U.S. Open. That had not happened since the 1957 U.S. Open when Harvie Ward (tie for 26th) and Chuck Kocsis (tie for 32nd) made the cut at Inverness.

Stat of the week

U.S. Open champion Wyndham Clark has made \$7,200,000 in his two victories this year. He earned \$7,815,024 from his other 135 starts on the PGA Tour.

NCAA committee recommends dropping marijuana from banned drug

INDIANAPOLIS — An NCAA panel is calling for the removal of marijuana from the organization's list of banned drugs, suggesting that testing should be limited to performance-enhancing substances.

The proposal released Friday from the Committee on Competitive Safeguards and Medical Aspects of Sports would mark a big change for the NCAA, which has been conducting drug tests at championship events since 1986. Committee members recommended halting canna-

bis tests at such events until a final decision is made, likely this fall.

Legislation would still have to be introduced and approved by all three NCAA divisions to take effect. Administrators in Divisions II and III had asked the committee to study the issue.

The recommendation comes as the U.S. is seeing more and more states allowing medical or recreational marijuana use.

Earlier this year, the committee increased the THC threshold needed for a positive test and recommended revamped penalties for athletes. The threshold for THC

— the psychoactive ingredient in marijuana — was raised from 35 to 150 nanograms per milliliter, matching that of the World Anti-Doping Agency.

The committee noted last December that marijuana and its byproducts are not considered performance-enhancing substances. Instead of focusing on penalties for cannabis use, the panel suggested stressing policies that focus on the potential threats from marijuana use and the need to reduce the harm and use of cannabis products.

It also recommended schools that test to use those results to help find "problematic" can-

nabis use. The committee also wants to provide schools with additional guidelines about cannabis.

Separately, the committee proposed setting a threshold of 0.1 nanograms per milliliter as a trace level for the hormone GW1516 in hopes of preventing athletes from becoming ineligible because of ingesting the substance unintentionally from contaminated supplements.

The substance was initially designed for diabetes treatment but was discontinued in 2007. It has been linked to positive doping tests in endurance-related sports.

MLB to stage tribute game at Rickwood Field honoring Willie Mays

NEW YORK (AP) — Major League Baseball will stage a Negro Leagues tribute game at Rickwood Field in Birmingham, Alabama, on June 20, 2024, between the San Francisco Giants and the St. Louis Cardinals.

The 10,800-seat stadium, opened in 1910, is the oldest professional ballpark in the U.S. and a National Historic Site. The stadium was home to the Birmingham Black Barons from 1924-60.

The game will honor Hall of Famer Willie Mays, a Birmingham native who began his professional career with the team in 1948.

MLB said Tuesday it is staging the game around the Juneteenth holiday, which commemorates the emancipation of enslaved African

Americans in Texas in 1865. There also will be a Double-A game at the ballpark between the Birmingham Barons and Montgomery Biscuits of the Southern League on June 18.

St. Louis will be the home team for the June 20 game, scheduled to start shortly after 7 p.m. EDT and to be televised nationally on Fox. Period uniforms will be used relating to the Negro Leagues history of San Francisco and St. Louis.

"The legacy of the Negro Leagues and its greatest living player, Willie Mays, is one of excellence and perseverance," baseball Commissioner Rob Manfred said in a statement. "We look forward to sharing the stories of the Negro Leagues throughout this event next year."

Mays, 92, is generally considered baseball's greatest living player. After playing with Birmingham, he signed with the New York Giants and was voted the 1951 National League Rookie of the Year as the Giants won the NL pennant.

A World Series champion with the Giants in 1954, Mays was a 24-time All-Star, tied with Stan Musial for second-most behind Hank Aaron's 25. Mays won the 1954 major league batting title and was voted NL MVP in 1954 and 1965.

"I can't believe it. I never thought I'd see in my lifetime a Major League Baseball game being played on the very field where I played baseball as a teenager," Mays said in a statement. "It has been 75

years since I played for the Birmingham Black Barons at Rickwood Field, and to learn that my Giants and the Cardinals will play a game there and honor the legacy of the Negro Leagues and all those who came before them is really emotional for me. We can't forget what got us here and that was the Negro Leagues for so many of us."

MLB will work with the City of Birmingham and Friends of Rickwood to renovate the ballpark, the home of the minor league Barons from 1910-1961, 1964-65, 1981-87. The Barons have played since 2013 at Regions Field, about 3 miles away, and shift one game annually to Rickwood in a tribute to the team's history.

Antonio Brown's tenure as arena league owner ends

Former NFL receiver Antonio Brown's brief and chaotic tenure as a National Arena League owner appears to be over after the league terminated the Albany Empire's membership over a failure to make its monthly payments.

The NAL on Thursday announced its board of owners unanimously reached the decision after "exhausting all avenues" over the Empire's refusal to make its past two payments, as well as Brown refusing to pay a \$1,000 fine conduct detrimental to the league over recent comments. The termination ends the Empire's season at 1-6 and with seven games remaining. Brown became part owner of the

two-time defending champion Empire in March and then last month took over a 94% stake in the franchise based in New York's state capital.

The NAL said that upon taking over ownership, Brown initially paid the Empire's April assessment, before challenging it a month later and having it credited back to him, while also failing to make the team's payment for May. Teams are required to make the payments, which represent one-seventh of the league's monthly operating budget.

The NAL said Brown's accountant, Alex Gunaris, informed the league "that it didn't seem like Mr. Brown was going to pay the assessment or fine."

A message left with Empire president Alberony Denis was not immedi-

ately returned.

Albany County's executive committee released a statement, saying: "This is an unfortunate situation. We are aware MVP Arena management is alerting ticketholders and we will be reviewing options moving forward." MVP Arena management, which operates the Empire's home, announced it is refunding tickets purchased for the team's final three home games.

Brown spent the 2010 to 2018 seasons with the Pittsburgh Steelers, where he emerged as one of the NFL's top threats, and twice led the league in yards receiving. His career then took a downturn due to various on- and off-field controversies, included his contract being voided by the Oakland Raiders before the start of the 2019 season.

He split his final three NFL seasons with New England and Tampa Bay, and his career ended with Brown stripping off his jersey, pads and gloves, while walking off the field during the Buccaneers' 2021 regular season finale against the New York Jets. Brown announced his retirement a few months later.

The drama carried over into Brown's tenure in Albany. Players and suppliers complained about not getting paid, the Empire changed coaches three games into the season at the same time eight players were suspended after one player filed an aggravated harassment report with police over a dispute that occurred on the team bus, The Albany Times-Union reported last month.

Patriots defensive back pleads not guilty to 9 gun charges

New England Patriots defensive back Jack Jones pleaded not guilty on Tuesday to nine counts of weapons violations in connection with his arrest at a Logan Airport security checkpoint with two loaded guns in his carry-on bag.

Jones was charged with two counts each of unlawful possession of a firearm, carrying a loaded firearm, possession of a large-capacity magazine and possession of ammunition without a firearm identification card. He was also charged with an airport security violation. Jones was released on a \$30,000 cash bail pending an Aug. 18 probable cause hearing, his attorney, Rosemary Scapicchio, said.

Scapicchio said Jones has been cooperative and respectful throughout the process, bristling at media reports that portray him as a "thug" and compare him to "other people."

Asked if she was referring to Aaron Hernandez, the Patriots player who was convicted of first-degree murder in 2013 — and acquitted in a separate double-homicide — Scapicchio declined to elaborate.

"All Mr. Jones wants to do is play football and support his family," she said. "How he's been portrayed in some of the media is not even remotely borne out. He's not a thug, he's not a wannabe gang member. The comparisons to other people are unwarranted and unfair."

A Patriots spokesman said the team was not expected to comment until the legal issues are resolved.

Massachusetts State Police were called to the Transportation Security Administration checkpoint at the Boston airport on Friday after two firearms were found in a traveler's carry-on luggage. Police said they identified the person as Jones and arrested him.

Jones' troubles predate his arrival in New England.

While in college, he was kicked off the Southern California football team in 2018 after two seasons because of academic issues. Later that year he served 45 days of house arrest after police said he burglarized a Panda Express. After transferring to Arizona State, Jones was suspended for most of the 2020 season because of a violation of team rules.

The Patriots drafted Jones in the fourth round in 2022 and he played in 13 games, starting two, with 30 tackles and two interceptions, returning one for a touchdown. He was suspended for two games at the end of the season for reasons that coach Bill Belichick did not disclose.

Hernandez's 2013 arrest led to a reckoning within the Patriots organization, with the usually reticent Belichick promising to improve how the team evaluates players "to build a winning football team, to be a strong pillar in the community and be a team that our fans can be proud of."

Stanley Cup Final shows the value of street hockey in US markets

Music blared from speakers outside the Vegas Golden Knights' practice facility while kids ran around with hockey sticks, batting a ball into a couple of nets. Pizza was available nearby.

A similar scene played out a week later steps from the Florida Panthers' arena before Stanley Cup Final games, with young fans playing inside an inflatable rink underneath palm trees.

The final between Vegas and Florida showcased the benefits of ball and roller hockey in many U.S. markets, with or without professional teams, where ice is hard to come by. The NHL earlier this year launched a street hockey program aimed at knocking down barriers to the sport, with the goal of creating interest in the game, even at more casual levels.

"The influence of our teams going to the South, and you see the players getting drafted out of California, Texas and Florida, and you're seeing that influence already," said former player Andrew Ference, who is spearheading the NHL Street Program as part of his job with the league. "It's a great success story that we have some NHLers coming from those areas, but imagine how many kids are left out. ... There's so many kids and families that aren't going to have the ability to overcome some of those barriers that it takes in those cities."

Barriers range from cost and time commitments to the competitive nature of youth sports and even many families thinking they don't belong in hockey. Stakeholders in the sport are trying many avenues to bring down those barriers, and street hockey is one of the latest attempts.

Ference, who played more than 1,000 NHL games as a defenseman from 1999-2015 and won the Stanley Cup with the Boston Bruins, was lucky to have outdoor ice available to him half the year while growing up in Edmonton. Still, he thinks many future pros logged more time playing street hockey in driveways and cul-de-sacs during their formative years.

Paris Olympics HQ searched in third straight Summer Games scandal

PARIS — French police searched the Paris Olympic organizers' headquarters on Tuesday as part of corruption investigations into contracts linked to the Games, according to prosecutors, the third straight time graft allegations have dogged a Summer Olympics.

The Paris organizing committee said in a statement that a search was carried out at its headquarters in the suburb of Saint-Denis and it was cooperating with investigators. It defended what it called "stringent procedures" around several hundred contracts it has awarded for the Games.

Tuesday's search and other related raids were linked to two preliminary investigations of the Paris Olympics, according to an official with the financial prosecutor's office, who was not authorized to be publicly named according to office policy. One probe was opened in 2017 — the year Paris was picked by the International Olympic Committee as the 2024 host — and the other began last year.

Neither investigation had been made public until Tuesday.

Corruption allegations have hung over the world's biggest sporting event many times — from accusations surrounding how the Games were awarded to how contracts for construction, sponsorship and team services were handed out.

Accusations of vote buying linked to the 2016 Rio de Janeiro Olympics and the Tokyo Games in 2021 led to the removal of several members of the IOC. Scandals around the 2002 Salt Lake City Winter Games led to reforms that limited IOC members' contact with candidate countries, though did not entirely remove the scope for corruption.

But Paris 2024 had gone to lengths to prove it would be different. The biggest event France is hosting in decades, the Games are being billed as a celebration of openness after two Olympics closed off by the COVID-19 pandemic, and as an example of democratic celebration after two World Cups tainted by human rights concerns in Qatar and Russia.

The organizers and Paris city hall have stressed a spirit of transparency and social justice — including planning an opening ceremony outdoors

along the Seine River that will be free for up to half a million people. The Games are scheduled for July 26-Aug. 11, 2024.

Saccage 2024, an anti-Olympics group that argues that the Games cause widespread ecological and social damage, said it was "very pleased" the raids took place.

"For us, an event of Olympic proportions cannot be held without corruption," the group said in a statement. "It's the size of the event that makes it necessary, whatever the country."

The probe opened in 2017 is looking into suspected embezzlement of public funds and favoritism, and concerns about an unspecified contract reached by Paris organizers, the prosecutor's office said.

The 2022 investigation followed an audit by the French Anti-corruption Agency. The prosecutor's office said that case targets suspected conflict of interest and favoritism involving several contracts reached by the organizing committee and Solideo, the public body in charge of Olympic infrastructure.

That body's offices were also searched, prosecutors said. According to Le Monde newspaper, raids also took place at the headquarters of several companies and consultants linked to the organization of the Games.

Solideo oversees construction and renovation of more than 60 projects for the multibillion-dollar Olympics — including the athletes' village in the Saint-Denis neighborhood that is set to provide about 2,000 housing units after the games.

Paris 2024 organizers would not comment on the contracts mentioned by prosecutors or the alleged wrongdoing. In a statement, Paris 2024 described itself "as one of the most audited organizations in France," with regular monitoring of its governance and tough procedures aimed at "transparency and propriety" around contracts.

The IOC said in a statement that it was informed by the organizers that they are cooperating with authorities. It did not comment further.

The raids unfolded as the IOC executive board began a two-day meeting in Lausanne, Switzerland.

IOC president Thomas Bach told reporters early Monday the meeting "of course will be about Paris, where we have some good news after the

visit of the coordination mission and after my visit to France, to President Macron, and also the organizing committee."

Paris was awarded its Olympics six years ago — and at the same time the IOC also rewarded its only remaining bid rival, Los Angeles, with the 2028 Summer Games.

Avoiding a contested vote removed the scope for vote-trading and bribery in a process that has since changed again to effectively shut down public campaigning. Brisbane was picked two years ago as the 2032 Summer Games host after being pre-selected by the IOC to get exclusive negotiating rights.

With the IOC hugely sensitive about cost overruns and potential white-elephant venues, Paris bid leaders insisted during their campaign for hosting rights that their project was in line with IOC recommendations encouraging the use of existing facilities and infrastructure to save money.

More than 70% of the proposed venues in the Paris bid were existing facilities, with a further 25% being temporary structures. But the overall budget, including the cost of building and renovating venues, is about 8 billion euros (\$8.2 billion) and has already gone up from its original estimate, in part because of high inflation.

The runup to the 2024 Games has seen turmoil in French sports.

Just last month, the president of the French Olympic Committee resigned following a period of intense infighting.

Also, Noël Le Graët resigned as president of the French soccer federation in February after a government audit found he no longer had the legitimacy to lead because of his behavior toward women and his management style. Bernard Laporte resigned as president of the French Rugby Federation in January after he was convicted of corruption and illegally acquiring assets and handed a suspended prison sentence.

Last October, Claude Atcher was fired as chief executive of the Rugby World Cup. That event opens in France in September, and also will serve as a test of France's security preparations for the Olympics. Atcher's removal followed an investigation by French labor inspectors into his workplace conduct.

McIlroy is going on 9 years without a major and the questions won't stop

LOS ANGELES — The only thing worse for players than getting asked about winning their first major are endless questions about when they will win another one.

That's what Rory McIlroy is facing.

The scrutiny no longer is limited to the spring, with Augusta National on the horizon and the reminder that a Masters green jacket is all that keeps McIlroy from the career Grand Slam. Any major will suffice at this point.

And about the only answer is what Wyndham Clark offered not long after the tears, the hugs and the hoisting of the U.S. Open trophy.

"I just feel like it was my time," Clark said. Sometimes there's no better explanation.

Clark never had to face the "when" question because he earned his first PGA Tour victory only six weeks ago, and because the U.S. Open was only the seventh major he had ever played.

He showed big game at Los Angeles Country Club, from the par saves around the turn to

his deft touch with a wedge and putter over the last two holes to preserve his one-shot win over McIlroy. Perhaps five years from now it won't seem like such a surprise, at least for Clark.

Tiger Woods never faced those questions, either. Much of those 11 years between his 14th and 15th major was more about when he would play than when he would win.

Woods had reconstructive knee surgery and four back operations. McIlroy missed one major after hurting his knee playing soccer.

McIlroy is a massive talent, and so it's reasonable to at least consider whether a four-time major champion has underachieved. Worth noting is winning majors has become tougher than ever as golf gets deeper and younger. Of the 33 majors McIlroy has played since his last win, 21 of those winners were younger than him.

More alarming is not that McIlroy failed to win Sunday, rather that he has given himself so few chances over the last nine years.

Since his last major title in near darkness at Valhalla in 2014 at the PGA Championship, he has played in the final group

only twice — he was three behind Patrick Reed in the 2018 Masters and tied with Viktor Hovland last year at St. Andrews in the British Open.

Los Angeles allowed for natural comparisons with St. Andrews. It's not so much what McIlroy did wrong as what he failed to do — make putts. He hit all 18 greens and took 36 putts in the British Open. He didn't make a putt longer than 7 feet over the final 33 holes of the U.S. Open.

The final day at LACC wasn't quite that bad, but it wasn't great. McIlroy had 16 pars, one bogey and one birdie. That's a round that often wins a U.S. Open. It's just that this Open featured two 62s and a 63 before the week was over. McIlroy didn't make a birdie over the last 17 holes.

There wasn't much left for him when he finished but to hope for Clark to three-putt — yes, he was hoping for such an outcome because it was all he had — and when that 60-foot putt settled a foot next to the hole, McIlroy didn't bother to stick around in the scoring trailer to watch him finish.

Chiefs get Super Bowl rings, take shot at Bengals

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Chiefs quarterback Patrick Mahomes had a stinging answer for Bengals wide receiver Ja'Marr Chase, who upon learning that his own QB Joe Burrow had picked Mahomes as the league's best replied: "Pat who?"

"That's who," Mahomes posted on social media Thursday night, along with a photo of him flashing his new Super Bowl ring.

Or more accurately, that's two.

Mahomes picked up his first ring in 2020 by leading the Chiefs to a victory over the 49ers, then added a second in February when he led Kansas City to a come-from-behind win over the Eagles. But unlike the first triumph, which came as the pandemic was beginning, the Chiefs were able to thoroughly enjoy the spoils of the latest with a ring ceremony Thursday night.

The red-carpet affair in Kansas City was closed to reporters, but Mahomes and others were happy to send out photographs. And in the case of the Chiefs' burgeoning rivals, they were willing to take a couple of shots at Chase

and the Bengals. "That's what you work for, to win the Super Bowl and get those rings," Mahomes said. "They last a lifetime. To be able to see them, I know they've done a great job with them. I got to help out a little bit with the creating process. They did a great job."

The rings were made by Jostens and each

contains 613 diamonds along with 35 rubies for a total of 16.1 carats.

And like most Super Bowl rings these days, there were plenty of hidden meanings in the design.

Front and center are the organization's three Lombardi Trophies, each with a marquis diamond set atop. The trophies are set against a backdrop of 19 rubies

and 38 diamonds, which reflects both the 38 points the Chiefs scored in the Super Bowl and the 57th edition of the game. In the middle of it all is the Chiefs' logo, which itself is comprised of 16 rubies — the number of division titles for the franchise — and 50 diamonds to reflect the 50th anniversary of Arrowhead Stadium. Elsewhere, the 16 ba-

guette diamonds at the base represent the 16 players that scored a touchdown in the regular season; 54 diamonds across the top represent the total number of points the Chiefs had to overcome in their two most recent title runs; and each player's name is engraved in gold along with a row of 13 diamonds. The ring also features

a removable top so the thing can turn into a pendant that looks like Arrowhead Stadium.

"They're pretty cool," Mahomes said. "They did a great job. I hadn't gotten to see the final product, but I got to see kind of the process of it and gave some ideas and stuff like that. They did a great job. Like I said, with whatever they look like, you get to have them forever and they mean the world. It's cool to be able to have two of them now."

That's two more than the Bengals have these days.

Much like their recent trip to the White House, the Chiefs invited anybody that was part of the team last year, including those that are working elsewhere now. That includes offensive coordinator Eric Bieniemy, who left for a similar job with the Washington Commanders and wasn't sure whether he could fit the trip into his schedule.

"It's a little bit like what went on at the White House," Chiefs coach Andy Reid said, "but they're coming back to Kansas City. I think it's a great deal. I think the Hunt (family) have put together a really nice event for the guys."

"All I did when I was a kid was play ball hockey: literally get home from school, go outside, play with my friends," said retired goaltender Andrew Raycroft, who joined Fercence at an NHL Street event in Boston this past weekend. "It's the easiest way to get into the game. Certainly the cost of skates, sticks, ice time living in the city, it's really tough. But you can still love the game and play the game."

As Commissioner Gary Bettman said, "The more kids are playing hockey in any form, the better it is for the growth of the game." His oldest grandson, Matthew, is a New Jersey high school state champion with a net in this family's driveway, and his 5-year-old grandson is taking skating lessons.

Getting on the ice to skate is harder in some places.

According to Arena Guide, a site that tracks indoor and outdoor rinks in North America, Alabama, Mississippi, Kentucky, Louisiana, Arizona and Oklahoma have only 41 combined — many of them larger arenas not suited for youth hockey. USA Hockey's last annual report counted just over 6,000

players in those six states combined, which is less than in North Carolina alone thanks to growth spurred by the Hurricanes playing there since 1997.

More ice rinks being are being built in other NHL markets like Dallas, Las Vegas and Tampa, which portends positive signs for the future, according to Bettman, who also pointed out how popular ball hockey has been for quite some time across North America.

Because of that, Fercence said he and his colleagues aren't trying to reinvent what street hockey is — just adding more structure to the old tradition of knocking on doors to see if enough neighborhood kids are around for a pickup game. But for a sport built on a team-first attitude, with attention to detail and discipline engrained from a young age, this isn't about copying that.

"We don't have to try to just kind of take ice hockey and put it on the street — basically take the skates off and take the exact same culture and put it on the street," said Fercence, now director of social impact, grown and fan development for the NHL. "Instead, let the kids that are doing the program kind of figure out how they want it to look and feel:

What kind of moves do they want to do on a breakaway? What kind of music do they want on the playlist?"

Basically, make hockey fun.

Fercence said the league drew inspiration from AND1 basketball, snowboarding and video games to try to see what elements of youth interest, culture and creativity could be derived from them. Basketball and winter sports have evolved as a result, and video games are a case of kids being able to try something without practice, to interact with friends and make mistakes more so than on the ice in organized hockey.

The idea is to create an enjoyable environment similar to flag football where the pressure is off but still open a new gateway to hockey.

"Hopefully getting a lot of the crossover athletes that look at it and see something cool and want to try something new," Fercence said. "They're not committing their life to it, but you can create a lot of casual fans that way and people that have a good interaction with hockey. They might not be the complete diehard, all of them, but a lot of them will now be introduced to a sport that they wouldn't have in the past."

"As soon as he coozied it up there, I was like, 'OK, get through this, and then go home and regroup,'" he said.

By "get through this," that would be mean a brief inquisition. He knew what was coming. What happened? How come? What's next?

When? The next chance — the last chance this year — was 32 days away from when McIlroy signed for an even-par 70. The British Open is at Royal Liverpool, where McIlroy won the claret jug in 2014 when he took a six-shot lead into the final day and was never seriously challenged.

That was his time.

Sunday at LACC was not, just like so many others, some of them recent. He was tied for the lead at the Memorial and shot 75 to finish four back. He was two behind going into the final round at the Canadian Open and shot 70 to finish five shots behind.

This time he was in the penultimate group, one shot behind and playing in the group in front of two players — Clark and Rickie Fowler — who had never won a major.

His regret was not making putts — that's true with everyone — and not waiting for a gust to settle when he had a wedge in his hand going into the par-5 14th. Stranger still was why he chose to lay up from a reasonable lie in the left rough. But that's hindsight. Reality is coming up short and taking bogey to lose ground when he could least afford it.

"I'm getting closer," McIlroy said. "The more I keep putting myself in these positions, sooner or later it's going to happen for me. Just got to regroup and get focused for Hoylake."

That's what Fowler used to say when he was finishing in the top five at all the majors in 2014, and what he can say again with the turnaround in his game.

All anyone can say is it starts with opportunity. The questions don't stop — for Fowler getting his first one, for McIlroy getting his next one — until it leads to a trophy.
