#### **My Goat Story Lukas Oliver, Coon Creek Cronies**

My name is Lukas Oliver and this is my sixth year in 4-H and my third year doing market goats. In the last three years, I've been lucky enough to do well in the show ring at the fair and grow as a showman.

My first year showing goats my brother and I bought some nanny goats from the sale barn in December 2021. We didn't know that they were pregnant. One January night, we came home to what we thought was a shadow of a goat, but to our surprise it was a baby black goat! We named her Shadow. A week later, I went out to check on the goats and opened the door to their shelter and there was a little red goat that was just minutes old laying next to his mom. That's when my love for goats started!

That little red goat I named Teddy and he was the most interesting goat always escaping his pen and I would sometimes sneak him into the house to watch TV. My mom couldn't bring in the groceries without him following her right in! Teaching him how to walk on a halter was pretty easy as we spent a lot of time together and since I was calm, so was he in the ring. Even my sister could walk him around. Teddy won Grand Champion at the fair that year in the Market Goat division.

The next year, we researched different breeders and chose a couple of goats that were more on the show style that we wanted to try. The Boer goats we decided on were Double Stuff, Vincent Van Goat and Baaab "Bob." Vincent was my main goat that I chose to work with to show. Goats have a unique personality and act a lot like a dog. I was able to teach Vincent how to stand and shake, which isn't necessarily what you want when you're showing, but it's a part that I love about having goats. That year, I placed well at county and also showed at the state level where I was able to see how other showmen used different techniques and also what feed works best for optimal results in a market show.

Using what we learned our first two years of showing, we chose to stick with a market style goat which tends to grow better with rate of gain based on genetics and feed quality. Choosing a market style animal also tends to have a better overall carcass value which in turns means more marbling and higher meat quality. Knowing what I learned the last two years, this year I went with a market Boer goat that I named Bo. Just like Teddy, he had a personality that I just really enjoyed getting to know the last several months and pretty easy to show. He showed so well that my sister who is 5 was able to show him at the open show at the fair.

I worked a lot with our feed dealer on the type of feed and calculated the daily rations as I had a goal of doing well with both the ultrasound and rate of gain which Bo was lucky enough to win and helped him to win overall Grand Champion at the fair. I've learned a lot through this process about how nutrition and feed quality along with genetics can really make a difference in your market animal. I've really enjoyed the last three years showing, the friendships I've made in the goat barn and the experience even in the challenges and I intend to keep doing it and sharing what I've learned with others.

## **My Woodworking Project Blake Ridgley, Kountry Kids**



#### **Arts and Crafts**

This year my projects included reupholstering a chair, making a toiletry bag and making a stepping stone.

I found my chair at a secondhand shop. When I found it, I really did not like the cover on it, so I decided to cover it with nice leather. First, I had to pull all the old fabric off the chair and I pulled all the old staples and nails out too. I cleaned up the wood to make it shine. We decided to add a piece of cushion for reinforcement. After that we decided to pick out matching leather and cowhide fur pieces. Next, I stapled the large leather pieces onto the chair before trimming with a razor blade down to the size needed. Last I had to install the trim over the seams, and I did that by nailing upholstery nails over it. This was harder than I expected because the nails are round and the hammer is flat. I had to make sure the nails were evenly spaced also, so it looked nice. It is not perfect but I am proud of what I did with it.

I found the toiletry bag at a store and decided to add a leather patch with my name on it. I cut a piece of leather the size of one side. Then I toolled the leather using stamps and I drew a hog on it. Once the leather patch was done, I sewed it onto the toiletry bag. This was hard also because of the small corners. Last I put some leather pulls on the zippers to make it easier to pull the zipper shut. My favorite part of this project was drawing the pig on my leather patch.

The stepping stone kit came from Michael's store. I decided it would be neat to design mine like a tractor. First, I laid the stones out on a sheet of paper like I wanted it on the stone. Then we mixed the concrete mix and placed the stones in the wet concrete. We had let it sit for a day to dry and then 3 days to cure. I had fun designing my tractor design.

The kiln gets very hot and opening the kiln too soon can cause damage to the pieces. At our second class, we glazed our projects. You must handle all glazes with care. I applied a minimum of two coats of glaze to ensure a good solid coating. This was my first year in pottery and I really enjoyed it.


#### Market goat **Thomas Happe, Big Spring Busy Beavers**

Grooming became a routine task, focusing on keeping their coats clean and healthy. I spent significant time training both steers, working on halter breaking, leading and standing for judges. Balancing the needs for both animals was challenging, particularly when it came to managing their different personalities and behaviors, but through consistency and dedication, I was able to help both steers make significant progress.

This project taught me a great deal about time management and the importance of attention to detail. I learned how to develop and execute feeding plans that suited each steer's individual needs. Additionally, I refined my grooming and training techniques, becoming more adept at preparing steers for show. # **Exploring the Treasures of 4-H**

On June 23, 2024, I attended Exploring the Treasures of 4-H at the Middletown Community Center. Exploring was led by Regina Hill and Janice Pritchett. Our first project we made a lighted mason jar. We chose a mason jar and I picked out a blue color of paint to paint the jar. I took a piece of painters tape and placed it on the jar in the shape of a cross. Then, I took my blue paint and painted all around the jar and the tape. Then, we had to wait and let the paint dry before I could take the tape off or touch the jar. After the jar was dry, I took the painters tape off and placed a battery powered tea light in the jar. I was also able to choose another mason jar and I painted it red, white and blue. Our next project was making a terrarium. First, we got to go outside of the Community Center building and we picked up several little rocks to place in the bottom of the jar. Next, we chose a big glass jar and placed the small rocks in a single layer all around the bottom of the jar. Next, we put a layer of sand over the rocks, then we placed potting soil on top of the sand, and then I took a few seashells and placed them on top of the soil. Then, we took a philodendron start and placed it down in the soil, and took about a half a cup of water to moisten the soil. I put the lid on top of the jar and took a piece of clover ribbon and placed it around the edge of the lid. Next, we made the 4-H banner to place the pins we received in 4-H on it. We took a piece of green felt and a piece of white felt that were in a triangular shape and glued them together using a hot glue gun. The piece of white felt was smaller than the green and was placed on top. Then, we glued a four-leaf clover and 4-H on the banner that was cut out of green felt. We placed an American Flag pin and a 4-H pin on it. Then, we took a piece of dowel rod, placed two pieces of green felt around it and glued the pieces of felt to the banner.

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
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

Another thing I learned was how to broil bread in the oven. I made some hamburger sliders and broiled the bread first. They turned out really good.


Also, I learned how to time what I make so everything finishes around the same time. I practiced this a lot while making breakfast meals.

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#### Rabbit

This was my first year raising rabbits, so I had a lot of prep work to do before I got them. First, we made the hutch. We measured, cut and screwed the different boads together. We made different slots, one of each rabbit. Next, we painted it. I picked the color. It was a pretty teal. Then, we put chicken wire on the cage. We used two different sizes, one for around the slots and a smaller one for the bottoms. Now, we started working on the drainage system for the pee and poop. We attached tin to the bottom at a slant. This allowed the pee to drain. At the end of the tin, we put a gutter. The pee drained from the tin, to the gutter and then into a bucket. Next, we bought water bowls, feeders, feed and hay. We attached the feeders and water bowls to each door. We were ready for the rabbits. I got three does – a Californian, a black New Zealand and a red New Zealand. I fed each rabbit a quarter of a cup of pellets twice a day. I also gave them hay every other day.

I cleaned their cages twice a day by making sure the pee drained and then washing the poop out. I also emptied the bucket each time. I worked with my rabbits multiple times every day. Setting them up by patting their feet under and scooting their butt forward. Then, I would start to practice flipping, checking eyes, teeth and nostrils. I would also rub their stomach and check their tails. I chose to show the Californian and got sixth in my class. I had a lot of fun.

In March 2024, I visited Robinson's swine and purchased four good hogs for the fair. From March until July, I prepared my hogs for the fair. I made sure they had full feed and enough clean water. The heat slowed down some of their growth. A mixture of cake mix, feed and water made them eat because of the sweetness. Sometimes this helps. Getting ready for showing pigs also means walking them regularly so they can walk in the show ring.

During the fair, I got second in my class and 27th overall. I also showed in the open show Friday of the fair for extra experience. I love fair week showing and also hanging out with my friends in the hog barn. This fall we are going to try and AI two of our gilts and a sow again and hope for better results. I really enjoy working with hogs and plan to continue growing my operation.
