Dragon girls return four starters

The Pittsburg girls basketball program made significant progress during head coach Dalton Gromer's first season last year, upending Topeka Highland Park to reach the Class 5A sub-state championship game.

Pittsburg lost 47-41 in overtime to Blue Valley Southwest, falling short of a first state tournament appearance since 1999.

The Purple Dragons graduated four-year starter and Missouri Southern recruit Jacqueline Hall, but they return all their other starters and contributors from last season.

"We have a good returning group that's looking forward to something good this year," Gromer said. "It's one of those things where you're proud of the girls for how they battled through last year, and I thought we found our identity toward the end of the year.

"We're a tough team that isn't going to be an easy win. You bring that momentum at the end of the year into start of this season. It's exciting with four returning starters who got that experience of

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The Pittsburg boys basketball team returns two starters and five additional lettermen from last season's 17-5 Southeast Kansas League champion and Class 5A sub-state runner-up.

The Purple Dragons return senior forwards T.J. Wesley and Nate Mitchell, who provided most of the punch on the inside last season.

Pittsburg graduated all-time leading scorer Mason English, who averaged nearly a triple-double with 33.3 points, 9.5 rebounds, 8.4 assists and nearly four steals last season, and key role player and Missouri Valley College recruit Joey Cronister.

The Dragons also lost transfers Jayden Brown to St. Mary's Colgan and Aiden Gazaway to Camden, N.J., as well as three other seniors who were key contributors to a league championship.

Expectations the same for Colgan girls

It'll be a new look for the St. Mary's Colgan girls basketball team, but the expectations are

still the same. The Panthers have not lost a regular-season game since Feb. 19, 2021, against Frontenac. The Panthers have come close to the Class 2A state title, placing third in consecutive years. Last year, Colgan saw its hopes of an undefeated season end in the semifinals of the state tournament to eventual state champion Wichita Independent before defeating Valley Heights in the consolation game, finishing with a 25-1 record.

"The goals and the expectations haven't changed," Colgan head coach Abby Farabi said. "Our goal is to win state and win the league. It's going to be a little tougher.'

Things will look different for the Panthers after all-state center Lily Brown graduated. Brown averaged 23 points and 11 rebounds per game in her senior year.

The Panthers also lost starter and All-CNC League honorable

mention player Polona Kalan to graduation.

"Life is different without our seniors," Farabi said. "A lot of our plays were for Lily; we had a lot of lob plays. We won't be as tall.

"We have five seniors this year and they're doing a great job of being leaders. The expectations haven't changed. Things will be different, but the standard will still be the same."

Leading the charge for the Panthers this season will be their two returning starters, senior forward Mariah Harris, who earned an All-League second team nod, and junior guard Jakayla Davis, who had a breakout sophomore season that included setting a school record with nine 3-point goals in a game.




