ATTEMPTED MURDER: Ray describes incident in post to Pen City Current Police ID suspect, victim in Monday shooting at Ivanhoe

FORT MADISON - Fort Madison police have released additional details regarding the shooting that took place Monday evening at Ivanhoe Park in Fort Madison.

The victim in the shooting, Brian Lee Scott Ray, 31, of Fort Madison sustained a gun shot wound to the leg, and was subsequently treated and released from the hospital.

Authorities have also put out a warrant for Aaron Kyle Richardson, 43, also of Fort Madison, who is wanted on suspicion of shooting Ray trying to collect an alleged debt.

Officers located the vehicle and Marshall at a residence in Fort Madison and both the vehicle and the residence were searched after warrants were obtained.

Police believe Richardson has left the area and may possibly be en route to the Chicago area. He is described as a black male, about six feet tall and weighing about 210 pounds. ISP C.O. assaulted Wednesday at ISP

FORT MADISON - A correctional officer was assaulted by an inmate at the Iowa State Penitentiary at approximately 8:15 a.m. this morning.

The officer was escorting an inmate to his cell when another inmate approached the officer and began assaulting him with closed-fist strikes to the officer's face. Additional officers were in the area and immediately began using defensive techniques while restraining the attacking inmate. The officer that was assaulted was taken via department vehicle to the local hospital for medical treatment for injuries suffered during the assault. The officer suffered a broken nose from the assault. The inmate has been evaluated by medical staff and found to have not suffered significant injuries. This incident remains under investigation.

and felon in possession of a firearm. Attempted murder in Iowa is a Class B felony punishable by up to 25 years in prison with 70% mandatory.

On Tuesday at 5:45 a.m., Ray left a comment on the Pen City Current website indicating he was the person who was shot in the incident.

Ray said in that post that he was able to find pictures of the alleged assailant on Marshall's Facebook page and didn't know who Richardson was.

Ray indicated in his post that after he'd been shot in the leg, he put his skateboard up behind his head and two bullets were stopped by his skateboard. That information has not been confirmed by Fort Madison police, however.

The case remains under investigation and additional charges are possible.

All charges are accusations of an offense and the defendant is presumed innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

case of West Nile

DES MOINES - The Iowa Department of Public Health (IDPH) today announced the first case of West Nile virus infection reported in 2021, an older adult (aged 61 years to 80 years) from Montgomery County. The case was confirmed through a test at the State Hygienic Lab.

"Humans get infected with West Nile virus through a mosquito bite and being outside means there's a risk for West Nile virus infection. But we have easily accessible preventive tools like insect repellent, that can help keep Iowans safe from mosquito bites, which lowers the risk of West Nile infection" said IDPH Medical Director & State Epidemiologist Dr. Caitlin Pedati.

With Memorial Day and summer activities on the horizon, IDPH reminds all Iowans take the following steps to reduce the risk of exposure to West Nile virus: Use insect repellent with DEET, Picaridin, oil of lem-

on eucalyptus or IR3535.

Always read the repellent label and consult with a health care provider if you have questions when using these types of products for children.

For example, oil of lemon eucalyptus should not be used on children under 3 years of age and DEET should not be used on children less than 2 months of age.

If possible, avoid outdoor activities between dusk and dawn, when mosquitoes are most active.

Wear long-sleeved shirts, pants, shoes and socks outdoors whenever possible.

Eliminate standing water around the home because that's where mosquitoes lay eggs. Empty water from buckets, cans, pool covers and pet water dishes. Change water in bird baths every three to four days.

In 2020, 3 Iowans were diagnosed with West Nile virus, with zero deaths. For more information on West Nile virus, visit https://www.idph.iowa.gov/cade/disease-information/west-nile-virus.
