DOC reviewing IPI program

IOWA PRISON INDUSTRIES: Future at several facilities under "close review"

DES MOINES – An offender-based program that has been helped provide services and products to many southeast Iowa governmental agencies, schools and non-profits, is being reviewed by state Department of Corrections officials.

The Iowa Prison Industries program, a 100%-self funding training program for offenders, is under a comprehensive review with most programming halted in the wake of the murder of two staff at Anamosa State Penitentiary March 23.

Two inmates at Anamosa, Michael Dutcher and Thomas Woodard face murder, kidnapping and attempted murder charges based on allegations they struck correctional Officer Robert McFarland and nurse Lorena Schulte in the head with hammers killing both. Investigation revealed the two were able to procure the tools, including a grinder from a maintenance shed on the property.

The two also took Lorie Matthes, another Anamosa employee, hostage and seriously wounded another inmate, McKinley Roby.

After several requests of DOC officials to update the status of the IPI program, DOC spokesperson Cord Overton said Thursday, the program is under review at several locations.

"I can tell you that the future of IPI at several facilities is being closely reviewed at this time," Overton said. "The high-

The visit was part of Ernst's annual 99-county tour hopping across the state of Iowa during a legislative break from Washington D.C.

Iowa's first female senator in Washington D.C. said after her remarks and a brisk question-and-answer session that she hasn't seen a larger student-body FFA. "I can honestly say that don't think I

Ernst impressed with Central Lee FFA numbers

have," she said. "That's pretty impressive."

A couple of Central Lee FFA students whisper as U.S. Sen Joni Ernst (R-Iowa) talks with a group of about 300 people at the schools FFA banquet Wednesday in Donnellson, Iowa.

Ernst told the group that their engagement in agricultural education and the industry is critical to America's future.

"I can't stress enough your commitment to service and the importance of ag education. It's extremely important to the state of Iowa and the future."

The senator's father, sister and brother were all members of Future Farmer's of America. Ernst, a veteran and Iowa State University alum, was a member of 4-H as a youth.

"You are positioned quite well to have a positive influence on the farmers, the leaders, and the educators that will succeed you in generations to come, not just in Iowa, but around the globe."

Ernst grew up on on a farm raising hogs and growing corn in southwest Iowa, and still resides there today.

"My time on the farm did give me a deep appreciation for all Iowa's farmers. Everything they strive for every single morning, in rain, snow, and sunshine to cultivate and grow the goods we absolutely rely on."

She spoke to the students about an exchange program she participated in the former Soviet Union while in college. Ernst said she saw a different culture and one where freedoms didn't exist. She said that pushed her to serve her country for almost a quarter of a century to defend what America stood for.

"I carry the experiences from that ag exchange program with me every single day," she said. "What started as an educational experience in agriculture provided me with much more than I ever could have imagined. One that taught me even greater life lessons.

"The future success of our agriculture industry depends on the continued service of very young, bright, and engaged leaders like yourselves."

One FFA member asked how the current federal infrastructure stimulus would impact agriculture industry.

Ernst said she had concerns about how much of the \$2.2 trillion package will actually go toward improving the country's infrastructure.

"Only 5 to 6% of that \$2.2 trillion goes to roads and bridges. There is more for electric vehicles in that infrastructure package than there is for actual infrastructure. And that would hurt us."

At 6% that would amount to \$132 billion in straight infrastructure investment.

She said conservatives have put together a plan that focuses on locks and dams, roads, bridges, waterways, and broadband at a cost of \$560 billion. She said the plan can be paid for without raising taxes and said some Democrats favor the Republican plan over President Joe Biden's plan.

Ernst said looking at the faces of the students embracing the agriculture industry brings concerns in facing a new global economy. She said America needs to maintain relationships cultivated during Donald Trump's administration.

"We hold steady and hold a course that embraces technology and make sure we are able to transition smoothly into the those changes as they come – and be as productive as we can," she said.

She said protecting the environment is a big deal among younger farmers, but we can't to do it in a way that punishes them.

"We want to incentivize it, and make it easy for them to receive resources, and guidance, and education. And I worry that we're not doing that. That were using a hammer rather than a carrot."

She also shared concerned about creating and maintaining open markets.

"I was able to speak with a U.S. trade rep a week and a half ago and she was very non-committal on a lot of these opportunities. Opportunities that were started in the last administration. Look at the UK, you look at EU markets, and Africa. She talked about them, but all she could say is we're going to continue to

look at them."

Ernst said a holistic approach with China may not be in the country's best interest when there is already a substantial Phase 1 deal in place.

"I'm worried they may go back and make modifications that might harm our

exports to China," she said. "I'll stay engaged and I will communicate with administration as much as I can in a positive way, but we need them to understand the significance of what we export to the world."

est priority for this department is the security of our staff."

According to the IPI website, the program provides work training to the men and women incarcerated at Iowa's state prisons.

"More than 90% of offenders in state prison are scheduled to be released, and our job is to teach them how to get and keep a job once they get out. IPI programs help keep our communities safer because offenders with good job skills are less likely to commit new crimes once they are released. Ex-offenders with good job skills are also an important resource for Iowa employers, contributing to the state's economic development. IPI is 100% self-funding and receives no government appropriations."

IPI is also an integral part of the recently launched Homes for Iowa program where offenders at Newton Correctional Facility build homes on site that are then used to supplement housing stock in Iowa communities. Iowa Prison Industries constructs the cabinetry that was installed in the homes.

a teenager. He sites Jim Knapp as his mentor and his best art educator. He remembers that Jim taught his student many mediums. Jim had his students make charcoal sticks in high school. Anthony has an Eagle piece in the show that he made with charcoal 39 years later. He also credits John Bybee for his direction, saying that classes with him "kicked him back into realism". Prior to this reversion Anthony had been seriously pursuing comic books. He participated in many challenges digitally, in particular the Anthro Challenge, where you had to draw animals doing human things. He was part of an on-line group called Deviant Art. He did his last comic book cover in 2013 and made a move to begin developing his "Hyperrealism" style.

Anthony explains that Hyperrealism is the ability to still read and make out details in a composition no matter what the distance. This can be seen clearly in his Avenue G piece, where you can read the business signs far into the perspective. Anthony is a history buff and will spend up to 15 hours of research on his train or Native American compositions. He loves doing the research on subject matter prior to creation. Time intensity is apparent in the pieces. The drawings can take anywhere from 20-80 hours.

He also designed the Simple Table outdoor sign and did their chalkboard for the first 9 months for the business. Another project he will showcase is the tourism coins he created for the points of interest in Ft. Madison for the tourism director. He researched the history for 9 months before creating the tourist wooden coins. 12 differing tokens were created encasing the historical memorabilia of Ft. Madison and are for sale as collectibles in the show.

The month of May also brings the return of the Member Artist Gallery to the east side while the Yart Sale winds down. Also piano lessons return with Teri Wellborn! Perhaps a return to normalcy has come upon the FMAAA, as wine and cheese return to the reception event this month.
